Planning Commissioner Savanna Bradley reported the main issues for the commission are zoning for marijuana and regulations. The commission is creating tighter regulations that can be loosened later. The intent is to avoid creating potential nonconformities and use more time to hear issues. At the last meeting the commission heard from several people not wishing for retail sales of marijuana on the Spit. They wish to keep the family-friendly environment. Considerations have been made to those that sell alcohol now. The commission recommended the Borough approve the Waddell plat and will hold another public hearing on December 2<sup>nd</sup> regarding zoning recommendations for marijuana and limiting the number of licenses within the city and establishing hours of operation for retail facilities. Also on the December 2<sup>nd</sup> agenda are two conditional use permits for easement vacations, a preliminary plat, and consideration for tall towers.

Parks and Recreation Advisory Commissioner Robert Archibald reported they now have a full commission. At the November 19<sup>th</sup> meeting the commission walked through city parks to assess conditions. The City is lucky to have volunteers to maintain the parks as resources become tight. At the Bayview Park the fence is being replaced to improve the park. Adopt-a-Park is still looking for people or entities to adopt a park or trail. With the uncertainty of the city budget, generating revenue through the use of the HERC facility was discussed. Requests to utilize building space were denied due to occupancy restrictions; the commission requests the restrictions be revisited in a public forum. With in-kind design, funding, and labor, the public could step in. Parks and recreation will purchase dog waste containers to be placed around town. Dog waste bag holders will be purchased and passed out by Parks and Recreation to bring attention to dog waste. Replacement bags are available through local vendors. Bishop's Beach has undergone severe weathering that is changing the beach.

Vehicles should not be allowed on the vegetated storm berm to the east of the entrance. The commission realizes the Council will be taking action on Bishop's Beach access restrictions.

Mayor Wythe advised Commissioner Archibald they have to stop holding onto the HERC. They need to figure out an alternative to the HERC and focus on a building that is sustainable.

Sustainable Animal Control Review Committee Members Francie Roberts and Casey Moss explained the fee schedule was reviewed in depth. Fees have not been adjusted in many years. The committee examined Kenai and Soldotna shelter fees. The public commented that the current \$15 adoption fee was too little to pay for an animal ready to walk out the door. The proposed increase to \$75 is for an animal ready to walk out the door. The animal shelter gives vouchers for spaying and neutering at appropriate ages; that appropriate age is still being discussed. Given the City's financial situation, the committee submitted the best and reasonable fees; the shelter still advocates for adopting animals.

### **CITY MANAGER'S REPORT**

#### A. City Manager's Report

##### **Get out the Vote for HART**

HART education is in full swing in preparation for the December 1<sup>st</sup> election. This includes the attached mailing that was sent to all registered voters in City limits, spots on local radio stations, and pieces in the paper. Thank you to councilmembers who volunteered to be on the radio and write opinion pieces for the paper.

##### **Strategic Doing on ADA**

When Council initiated the strategic doing process, they chose ADA accessibility as one of the items they would like to tackle first. I have been working with Rick Malley of the Independent Living Center on suggestions on how to make the City of Homer more ADA friendly. He has met with public works staff to go over some of the accessibility issues and put me in contact with a specialist in training municipal employees on ADA sensitivity. In light of the Council's commitment and the Independent Living Center's willingness to help the City of Homer become more ADA friendly, I have dedicated the January Strategic Doing to ADA accessibility. At that session the Council will work on laying the ground work for a transition plan detailing the ways Homer can be more accessible. One thing that I have learned through this process is that ADA accessibility is often not about infrastructure but about employees finding creative solutions to help all residents access municipal programs, information and activities. In that vein, I am hoping to bring in a specialist and offer training to frontline City of Homer employees on ADA sensitivity in the near future.

##### **Website Upgrades**

We have been talking for quite some time about making the City of Homer website more mobile friendly and updating its form and functions. The contractor that designs our website (aHa Consulting) will be here in December to train employees on the new interface. We are hoping to keep many of the features that the community loves the same, but upgrade the look and functionality of the website. Stay tuned for a fresh and functional City of Homer web experience for the new year.

### **Welcome New Faces to the City of Homer Staff**

### **Town Hall**

Despite the blustery and slushy winter weather, we had a great Town Hall on Monday the 9<sup>th</sup>. I really appreciate the full Council attending. It provided a great opportunity for those in attendance to ask direct questions of the decision makers and exchange ideas and opinions.

At the Town Hall we unveiled an excel spreadsheet tool that lets the public chose elements of Budget A (assumes revenue) and Budget B (bare bones) coupled with the suspension of the HART fund to try their hand at balancing the budget. A survey is also included with questions on HART and the outreach process (<https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/N639HFG>). Preliminary survey results are attached. We also introduced an online budget tool called Open Budget that provides a graphic representation of the City of Homer budget over the last 5 years. This is neat tool for the public, Council and staff to more easily understand both historical budgets and current spending. So far, lots of great questions internally have come from being able to see the numbers in a bar chart form and I am looking forward to questions from the public. ### **Land Sales – Do we Need a Professional?**

This fall Council directed me to make City of Homer Land sales simpler. In response, Council passed Ordinance 15-28(A) streamlining the land sale process. Staff proceeded through the process of RFPing lots Council had identified an interest in selling. For example, we RFP'd the Lillian Walli lots in October. Even though we have had developers express an interest in the lots, no one has signed up on the planholders list and I extended the time frame until December 14<sup>th</sup>. During this time we also began advertising the lots on Zillow and Craigslist. As of Monday the 16<sup>th</sup>, we had almost 500 views - but no bites yet. I perceive a disconnect between the City of Homer RFP process and how people look for property. To maintain integrity and transparency of the RFP process, staff cannot let individuals know when City of Homer has issued an RFP. However the RFP process is problematic for land sales. For the most part, people use a real estate agent, or at least browse online through sites like MLS, when looking for property. If the City wants to make an active push to get rid of land, I think the City should consider hiring a municipal real estate agent.

Using an agent is necessary to get property onto MLS and other information sources commonly used by prospective purchasers to search for properties that are for sale. A good agent also can provide helpful advice regarding pricing and market conditions. The best way to hire an agent consistently with the code would be to solicit proposals to provide this service. The RFP might be for particular properties and/or for a particular limited time period (agents are accustomed to an agreement for an exclusive listing for a specified period). This

would allow the City to evaluate the effectiveness of this approach (and the selected agent) without making a more general commitment.

### **Out of Room at Hickerson Cemetery**

Hickerson Cemetery has only a handful of lots left that are spread out around the cemetery. Parks has proposed a \$350,000 capital request to purchase land for a new cemetery. Fully developing the cemetery would cost an additional \$230,000. Public Works has proposed a fee increase as part of the FY2016 budget process to help recoup these costs (\$250 to \$1,000). However, there is a substantial upfront capital investment that is needed. The current City Manager's proposed budget does not include expansion of the cemetery. Without this project, the City will likely have to turn families away in the near future.

City Manager Koester highlighted the lots for sale in the Lillian Walli subdivision. To date there has been no interest and she asked the Council for direction on listing the lots with a realtor so they could be advertised on the MLS. The Council advised to list the lots with a realtor and negotiate the percentage of the sale.

There are 21 plots left to sell at Hickerson Memorial Cemetery. Those available are single lots that are spread out. The City purchased three parcels of adjoining land but it will cost \$350,000 to develop the parcels. Raising the plot prices from \$200 to \$1,000 for the new cemetery addition will recoup investment costs over time to develop the cemetery. City Manager Koester will submit a budget amendment for the next meeting.

The committee is also looking at how to track revenues at the shelter, liability issues for the City, volunteers at the shelter, monthly pro bono visit of veterinarians at the shelter, and safety and OSHA issues when people come in to inspect the shelter.

### **COMMENTS OF THE CITY COUNCIL**

Councilmember Aderhold is thankful to be on City Council and representing City employees of high caliber. She recently toured the water and sewer and port and harbor facilities. Both were wonderful tours and she is very impressed with the people who operate those facilities.

Councilmember Smith commented as his first official meeting it was pretty easy. He is grateful to be here and to serve the City. He hopes that he can live up to the expectations of those that voted for him. Homer High wrestlers beat out 42 other teams and took second place in the jamboree. The Homer Mariner volleyball team qualified for state tournament. The Lions Club prepared annual Thanksgiving boxes for families in need. He appreciates the experience to serve in a community that cares and thanked all that contributed to coordinate over 200 boxes. He thanked the commissions and committees for all their hard work.

Councilmember Zak thanked City Manager Koester for putting together a very well prepared budget and thanked Finance Director Li for putting the work in to make the Council's job easier. He announced absentee voting that is now open and the importance of voters turning out. We have been providing services for residents that are not within city limits; it is expensive to do so and we have to find a new revenue stream. By accessing HART funds for the next three years, the Council will have the ability to look for future revenue sources.

Councilmember Reynolds announced the updated All Hazard Mitigation Plan and the need for community participation. As a FEMA requirement, the plan is updated every five years. The public may view the document on the City's website before it is brought before Council in January or February. MAPP has issued a community health survey that is available online or on MAPP's Facebook page. To find the survey you may email Catriona or Jo also. Student seats are available on the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission, Library Advisory Board, and Economic Development Advisory Commission. She plans on announcing the vacancies at the high school. It is a way to fulfill a service requirement and enrich one's life. She echoed a thank you to Beau Burgess who was a great mentor to her. She also thanked all the volunteers and staff.

Councilmember Van Dyke thanked staff for bringing two budgets forward. It was a tremendous amount of work. December 1<sup>st</sup> is an extremely important election. Get out and vote in person, or vote by absentee ballot. There is no reason not to vote. He thanked Heath for the nice pat on the back. Councilmember Van Dyke has been a Lion for twenty years now. The Lions meet the first and third Wednesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. at the Chamber of Commerce.

Councilmember Lewis echoed the same thank you to all. He announced the Cannabis Advisory Commission meeting on November 30<sup>th</sup> at 5:30 p.m. As to the budget, there are certain things in a community that make it a community but will not be money makers. Libraries and community centers cost money, but they along with police and fire make a town a community. That is what we need to remember when dealing with the budget. Hopefully people will come out Tuesday and vote YES. He hopes to see more than a 30% turnout.
