SUBJECT: North West ADA Visit

During David's visit August 15-17, Dan Gardner and I spent a fair amount of time walking through some of the City's facilities doing mini-surveys and getting answers to some of the questions that came up during the survey work the committee did prior to his visit. David Lewis from the Independent Living Center joined us at the Harbor and the Police Station.

We started at the Harbor at the area around ramp 5 at the corner of Spit Road and Freight Dock Road. We looked at the bathroom, addressed the parking situation at the ramp, and measured the pathway and the markers that are placed near the accesses to the ramps. While there are spaces marked as HC parking by the ramp entrance, technically because it's all loose gravel, it really isn't accessible. David pointed out that relocating the dumpster, paving a section for parking and creating a surface that accesses the paved trail would create a usable path of travel for the ramp and also the bathrooms.

David spent some time with the Harbormaster talking about accessibility in and around the harbor. He said they had a good discussion and the Harbormaster has a good handle on accessibility. He also surveyed the Harbormaster's office and found one discrepancy. He also visited the fishing hole and didn't realize the fishing area that was there. I'm looking forward to getting his report and sharing with the group.

We went to the Police station. That went fairly quickly because it's very obvious nothing is accessible. It was built in the mid 80's before the ADA went into effect, but it's been out of compliance far too long.

We also visited the Animal Shelter, Library, City Hall, Karen Hornaday Park, the RV dump station at the spit and in town, and the bathroom by the fire station.
