A. Draft Ordinance 16-XX, Outlining the Regulatory Responsibilities of the Commission regarding Applications

Correct title according the Draft ordinance submitted by the City Attorney: Amending Homer City Code 21.62.040, Currently Entitled Pre-Application Conference" to Authorize the City Planner to Recommend to the State of Alaska that it Deny an Application for a Marijuana Establishment that Does Not Comply with Homer City Code and Authorize the City Planner to Recommend that the State Impose Conditions to Approval When Necessary to Ensure Compliance with the Homer City Code.

There was a bit of confusion to bringing the ordinance to the floor for discussion or making a motion to approve. City Planner Abboud stated he could provide a report on the ordinance. Chair Young yielded the floor.

City Planner Abboud stated that this ordinance was very simple and amended Title 21 putting the applications under his review. Since it is amending Title 21 this will have to go before the Planning Commission for review, Public Hearing and approval before going to Council and he has not finalized the next Planning Commission agenda so he can get it on that for the next meeting.

Commissioner Harris wanted to postpone this ordinance until after the new council is elected.

Commissioner Clark commented that he saw no reason to move this forward that it is pretty straight forward. Commissioner Reynolds agreed and recommended sending this to Planning Commission that everything is so up in the air that there is no reason to withhold action on it now.

Commissioner Harris expressed concerns with expediency in reviewing and approving applications received by the city. City Planner Abboud responded with the time requirement that is already imposed in state regulations regarding local opposition. He did not believe it would take much time to review and resubmit to the state.

Commissioner Harris expressed clarification on her concerns that existing membership on Planning Commission would try to change the rules from the time an application is received and approval. City Planner Abboud noted that under the proposed regulation the Planning Commission would not be involved unless the applicant appealed his decision. He further noted that his recommendations would fall under existing requirements. He further noted that reviewing an application within 10 or 15 days is doable.

Commissioner Harris further explained that she would like to see a date within this ordinance that current regulations as of this date to make sure that no regulations change in the meantime.

Discussion and points made by the commission ensued on the following:

- 10-15 day limit is appropriate

- the application will be coming from the state to the city planner

- to change current city code will require two meetings at the planning commission and two meetings at the city Council level and will also require at least two weeks to get on the agenda.

- lack of public involvement in the zoning changes because they fall under the public's radar

- notice requirement by the state gives the city the notice required to make changes in building requirements and codes

- preference to have a review board other than the planning commission review an application especially those applications that have been denied

#### REYNOLDS/YOUNG - MOVED TO AMEND LINE 45 TO ADD WITHIN 15 DAYS OF RECEIPT OF APPLICATION.

Discussion ensued in clarification of intent of the motion was to amend the ordinance to provide the 15 day time limit for review and approval with or without recommendations. The intent for the paragraph to read as follows:

b. The City Planner shall be responsible for reviewing all applications filed with the State of Alaska under AS 17.38 for the operation of marijuana establishments in the City of Homer once those applications have been submitted to the city for its review by the State of Alaska. The City Planner or his or her designee, shall recommend to the State of Alaska, WITHIN 15 DAYS OF RECEIPT OF AN APPLICATION, denying an application that does not comply with this code or he or she may recommend approving the application with conditions that, if adopted, will result in compliance with this code.

City Planner Abboud stated that he does have staff available to act in his absence in response to a question by the commission.

Chair Young called for the vote.

VOTE. YES. NON-OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

Commissioner Reynolds recognized that the City Planning Department has a responsibility to follow and apply the guidelines and regulations that are imposed and she has never seen a bias previously. Commissioner Sarno echoed those sentiments and further stated that City Planner Abboud has shown professionalism and believes that any application they received would get a fair hearing.

Commissioner Sarno inquired if any zoning changes were proposed to revise code that affect marijuana businesses would this (Cannabis Advisory) commission get a chance to review these changes before going to Council?

Commissioner Stead responded that they would not, he is not the expert but any proposed changes to zoning falls under the purview of the Planning Commission and there is no requirement to notify this commission. He also stated that to suggest that members of the Planning Commission are nefarious and feels that those acts would be a criminal, he cannot think that the commission in how it acts and works together today would do that, they do their very best to put personal feeling aside and he is a bit affronted at the implication but appreciates it is Commissioner Harris' personal opinion and she is entitled to her opinion. Commissioner Stead appreciates the other commissioners supportive comments and believes City Planner Abboud does his very best to be fair in his recommendations.

HARRIS/REYNOLDS - MOVED TO AMEND THE DRAFT ORDINANCE TO INCLUDE ADDITIONAL WHEREAS ON LINE 16 THAT STATES CONDITIONAL USE PERMITS WILL BE APPROVED ACCORDING TO EXISTING ZONING REGULATIONS AS OF THIS MONTH.

Commissioner Reynolds cited that there is no precedent to set a zoning map and regulations in place. She understands that it is confusing but does not think there is a way to lock the zoning into place. Further discussion on the time frame for approval within 15 days and additional limits would be onerous.

# Marijuana fees could fund Sitka student travel

During their regular meeting Tuesday night, the Sitka Assembly approved – on first reading – a dedicated fund for student activity travel using marijuana fees. See ordinance here: Ord 2016-39

The ordinance, co-sponsored by Assemblyman Steven Eisenbeisz and Deputy Mayor Matthew Hunter, proposes depositing all money generated from marijuana licensing fees into a specific fund for student travel. Depending on how Sitka's marijuana industry evolves, Eisenbeisz believes this could generate \$8000 to \$10,000 a year for activity travel sponsored by the Sitka School District.

This year, Sitka High School received roughly \$132,000 for student activities from the city. The local contribution has been fairly stable, but with more teams and clubs flying to meets, the need is greater.

Superintendent Mary Wegner appreciates the Assembly's work.

"Activities and athletics are a great antidote to smoking marijuana. When you're involved with activities, you don't want to. So it is a very interesting and novel approach, but I appreciate the [Assembly's] creativity in keeping the students first and foremost in their minds and in their actions," Wegner said.

The Assembly also decided – on first reading – to move \$250,000 from the general fund into a committed fund balance for landslide mitigation. This includes legal, geotechnical, and other costs anticipated by the city.

Specifically, the city wants to proceed with geotechnical mapping around Keet Goshi Heen Elementary School, which has been identified as a moderate risk area. City Administrator Mark Gorman said some of the money could also be used for legal fees related to the Kramer Avenue landslide.

"We have two suits that have been filed against the city, related to the landslide. These came in about six weeks ago. We are working with council – David Bruce, who you met with several times – and he's given us his best case scenario as to what the expenses are going to be this year. And it includes geotechnical work," Gorman said.

Bruce, an attorney based in Seattle, has been working with the city since November. Gorman also hopes the city's insurance will kick in to help with legal fees.

In other business, Sitka Community Hospital took a major step toward paying down its line of credit, which the Assembly increased two years ago to resolve the hospital's cash crisis. The hospital is in a much better financial position now, with 81 days of cash on hand. And Tuesday night (09-27-16), they presented the Assembly with a check for \$463,000 towards that line of credit.

"That will bring us down where we'll owe slightly less than \$1 million dollars," said hospital CEO Rob Allen. We're also set up so that from this month forward, we'll be making monthly payments on the line of credit.

ECG Consulting is currently looking at ways for Sitka Community Hospital and SEARHC to integrate operations. Allen says the hospitals will hold a work session with the Assembly in November to discuss the findings.

During his report, City Administrator Mark said that construction on Jeff Davis street may take longer than anticipated due to issues with the old sewer main.

The Assembly's next meeting will take place on October 11th in their new chambers at Harrigan Centennial Hall. During that meeting, the current Assembly will resolve old business and then change hands, welcoming a mayor and either one or two new Assembly members.

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# October 5, 2016 Alaska's recreational cannabis market just weeks from debut

The fourth recreational marijuana industry in the United States is ready for launch.

Alaska's adult-use program is just a few weeks from the first retail sales, according to estimates by multiple sources. A number of rec shops are scrambling to open their doors, perhaps by month's end.

The last hurdle is that local and state authorities must clear testing labs to open so cultivators can have their crops checked for potency and microbial contaminants. After that, growers will be allowed to

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begin supplying retailers, with owners putting the finishing touches on their storefronts.

"Looks like we're about two weeks from being open," Nick Eade, who co-owns Frozen Budz with his wife, Destiny, said Tuesday. "We're pretty adamant on being open by the 21st. There's another big outfit here called Pakalolo Supply, and they're planning on being open on Halloween ... It's pretty important to us to be the first."

The Eades have other retailers right behind them, and may not be the first to open their doors. On Tuesday, The Remedy Shoppe in Skagway got final approval from the state, and is waiting for the first labs to begin testing product, just like Frozen Budz, according to a local NBC affiliate.

Also on Tuesday, the Anchorage Assembly approved that city's first rec shop as well, The Arctic Herbery. Its owner is aiming to be open by the first week of November, the same NBC affiliate reported.

So far, the state has signed off on business permits for at least 60 cultivators, 17 retailers, four product manufacturers and a pair of testing labs. Regulators still have scores of applications to evaluate.

## What's left to do

Eade said Frozen Budz has received the necessary authorization from local officials, and only a few minor items are left to finish on their retail shop – such as installing security cameras – before a final inspection by the state's Alcohol & Marijuana Control Office (AMCO).

After that, the big question mark is when the two licensed testing labs in the state may open and begin accepting product to be tested for potency and contaminants.

"I'm kind of looking for the middle to end of October," said Mark Malagodi, the CEO of CannTest, one of the two labs.

> "There's a few things (that) are out of my control, like receiving a letter from the municipality that I'm waiting on," he added. "And once I get that letter, it triggers a final inspection. I'm not

anticipating any problems with the final inspection; but it's out of my control, and then a final inspection from the state as well, and the completion of the outside accreditation agency."

If all of those steps go smoothly, Malagodi said, his firm can start testing before the end of the month, and then cultivators will be able to move quickly to start supplying storefronts with product.

But, of course, snafus can emerge that take time to fix.

"If issues come up with any of those, we have to solve the issues," Malagodi said. "I'd expect by Thanksgiving that Alaska would see its first retail sale."

Alaska's rec market is expected to hit between \$25 million and \$50 million in sales in the first 12 months after rec stores open, according to estimates in the *Marijuana Business Factbook 2016*. Voters approved adult-use cannabis in 2014.

## Supply ready to sell

Once CannTest and the other licensed lab, Alaska Green Labs in Anchorage, are able to start testing cannabis, it should just be a matter of a few more days before retailers like Frozen Budz can start stocking marijuana products.

"Whenever they open, we hope to be ready to transport it down. I don't think we'll be camping out in front, like for a rock concert or anything," said Mike Emers, manager of Rosie Creek Farm, a cultivator in Fairbanks.

Emers' outdoor harvest was completed just days ago, he said, and he's not even certain how much volume in crop he was able to accumulate. But it's ready to go whenever either of the two labs can begin accepting samples.

"I think the whole state is waiting for the city of Anchorage to OK their permit," Emers said of CannTest and Alaska Green Labs.

By being in Anchorage, the two testing labs are about a six-hour drive from Fairbanks, which adds some logistical issues for companies up north. And there remain other unanswered business questions surrounding cannabis transportation, according to regulator Cynthia Franklin, AMCO's executive director.

"We emphasize that our licensees have the right to transport marijuana from one licensed establishment to another," said Franklin.

"That's important here because there are many communities that cannot be reached by road. So you're talking about putting marijuana on a plane or a boat, and everyone is very worried about the federal response to that. We don't yet know what that is, because we haven't really started transporting marijuana."

Although there hasn't been any specific word 23m the U.S.

Department of Justice on whether it may object to transporting cannabis via plane or boat – which would be a first for any statelicensed marijuana business in the nation – Franklin said all indications are that the U.S. attorney in Alaska won't make an issue of it.

### What the future holds

However optimistic the next few months may look for Alaska, there may be dark clouds on the horizon, too.

For instance, Franklin said, the state legislature could try to overturn the 2014 ballot measure that legalized rec. That possibility has likely kept many potential cannabis entrepreneurs out of the game, because they want to wait and see if entering the industry is truly a safe bet.

"I actually expect a lot of applications next spring, once the legislature adjourns, assuming they don't repeal the ballot measure, because there are a lot of people who have decided to wait to invest until they know whether or not it's real," Franklin said.

There's also been local pushback. For example, voters in the Matanuska-Susitna Borough near Anchorage, which could be home to multiple cannabis businesses, were asked on Tuesday to ban adult-use marijuana companies, but the prohibition measure was defeated, the Alaska News Dispatch reported.

There are other positive signs for MJ entrepreneurs as well.

Franklin said AMCO's board may consider loosening the state's residency requirement for ownership in a marijuana business, which would be a positive development for out-of-state entrepreneurs. She also said on-site consumption at retail shops may yet still get the board's green light.

Over the long run, Franklin is optimistic Alaska could become home to around 1,000 licensed cannabis businesses.

"About 900 or 1,000 is all the marijuana establishments the state can support, and that might be a few too many. But it's going to be a free-market thing, where there's too many at first and the market will decide how many are successful," said Franklin.

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
