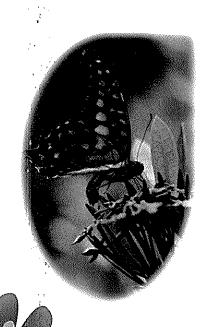

I. PURPOSE and INTENT

- 1. The H.A.R.T. is a combined local funding source of dedicated sales tax and assessments to upgrade city streets, new city streets and new city non-motorized trails.(Ordinance 06-42(S); Resolution 88-47 #1)
- 2. The intent of the program is to reconstruct local substandard city roads and/or upgrade existing city roads, construct new city streets and non motorized trails, thereby reducing maintenance cost, improving access, increasing property values and improving the quality of life. (Ordinance 06-42(S); Resolution 88-47 #2)
- 3. Reconstruction and new construction shall be to City Standards. (Ordinance 06-42(S) Resolution 88-47 # 19)
- 4. The City will not accept a street for full time maintenance until it meets city standards and is shown on the official maintenance map. (Ordinance 85-14 07/01/85; Resolution 88-47 #8)
- 5. When practical, the intent of the program is to preclude the destruction of existing property improvements in built up areas. (Resolution 88-77(A), be it further Resolved clause.)
- 6. State maintained roads are not part of this program. (Resolution 88-47 #7)
- 7. The criteria for the H.A.R.T. shall be reviewed annually by the Transportation Advisory Committee, with recommendations reported to the Homer City Council. (Resolution 88-47 #22)
- 8. Annexed roads are included as newly eligible roads, as listed on the Official Road Maintenance Map. (Resolution 03-116, 08/25/03)
- 9. New roads shall be listed on the Official Road Maintenance Map. (Resolution 07-82)
- 10. New trails shall be listed on a map in the City Clerk's Office. (Resolution 07-82)

II. DEFINITIONS

- A. Sidewalk- the term "sidewalk" means a pedestrian facility associated with a road and generally within a street right of way. (Resolution 07-82)
- B. Trail a pedestrian facility detached from a road, or not within a street right of way. (Resolution 07-82)

III. QUALIFYING CRITERIA

A. Roads

The schedule of street improvements and costs developed by the Public Works Department August 87, consisting of Groups I-IV and the annexed roads of the City boundary amendment of Ordinance 02-08(A) and as noted on the Official Road Maintenance Map, are hereby incorporated. (Resolution 05-70, 06/13/05; Ordinance 02-23(A), 06/10/02; Ordinance 02-08(A), 04/08/03; Resolution 03-116, 08/25/03)

Amendments to the schedule can be accomplished only by Council action and are limited to additions to the schedule due to revision of the street map or transfer of state rights-of-ways to the City.

All projects will be authorized only after a public hearing to insure public participation in the process. (Resolution 88-47 #13)

- 1. The following criteria may be considered for roads qualifying for reconstruction/utility improvements: (Resolution 88-47 #14, Resolution 87-61(S))
- a. Life, safety and traffic flow (Resolution 87-61(S), Resolution 88-47);
- b. Correct deficiencies of existing systems (Resolution 87-61(S), Resolution 88-47);
- c. System wide basis versus local needs (Resolution 87-61(S), Resolution 88-47);
- d. Complete traffic circulation pattern (Resolution 87-61(S), Resolution 88-47);
- e. Encourage economic development (Resolution 87-61(S), Resolution 88-47);
- f. Correct drainage problems (Resolution 87-61(S), Resolution 88-47);
- g. Reduce maintenance cost (Resolution 87-61(S), Resolution 88-47);
- h. Built to city standards prior to acceptance for maintenance (Resolution 61(S), Resolution 88-47);
- i. Reconstruction is a higher priority than new construction projects (Resolution 87-61(S), Resolution 88-47);
- j. Property owner contribution through LID process by paying \$30 per front foot for gravel and \$17 per front foot for paying cost of a residential standard street and the city pays all costs for additional improvements deemed necessary (Resolution 87-61(S); Resolution 88-47, Resolution 94-50; Resolution 95-97)
- k. City share can apply to related utilities, sidewalks, street lighting, drainage, paving and/or reconstruction of roads identified on the road maintenance map. (Resolution 88-47, Resolution 04-41(A).);
- l. Other factors deemed appropriate by the City Council. (Resolution 87-61(S, Resolution 88-47))
- 2. The following criteria may be considered for new local roads in addition to applicable criteria in 1:

- a. Connectivity to existing road(s), for example completes a traffic pattern.
- b. Arterials or thoroughfares;
- c. Existing utilities;
- d. Contributing funds such as property owner assessments, loans, grants, etc;
- e. Level of need. (Resolution 07-82)

B. Trails

New local non motorized trails shall be prioritized according to the following:

- a. Project is listed in the HNMTTP or furthers a stated goal of that plan;
- b. Solves a safety concern;
- c. Creates connectivity to existing trail(s), completes pattern or provides access to a point of interest;
- d. Protects an established trail;
- e. Creates or improves a trailhead;
- f. Has significant scenic or aesthetic value;
- g. Existence or potential for contributing funds;
- h. Property owner participation. (Resolution 07-82)

IV. FINANCING and ASSESSMENTS

- 1. The program will utilize an additional dedicated City sales tax not to exceed three quarters of one percent (3/4%) supplemental with assessments against adjacent benefited properties. (Ordinance 06-42, Resolution 87-61(S), Resolution 88-47 #3).
- 2. A three quarters of one percent (¾) dedicated sales tax and will be collected for up to twenty years expiring December 31, 2007 and reauthorizing up to an additional twenty years expiring December 31, 2027 to participate in funding the accelerated roads and trails program (Ordinance 06-42, Resolution 87-61(S), Resolution 88-47 #4). Reauthorized twenty additional years at the October 3, 2006 election (Resolution 06-145(S)) to expire December 31, 2027. Ten percent of the annual revenue shall be used for trail projects.
- 3. The road improvements will be financed on a combined pay as you go basis as well as sale of revenue bonds in a fifty-fifty ratio. There may be future bond sales as revenues increase. (Resolution 87-47 #6)
- 4. The City will attempt to obtain long term financing for up to ten years for the private share of funding. (Resolution 88-74 #12, bond change Ordinance 89-17, regarding ten years financing.)

- 5. Interest, if any, generated from the program will remain with the program funds. (Resolution 88-47 #18)
- 6. Abutting property owners will share the cost of upgrading a street to residential standards by paying \$30 per front foot for gravel and \$17 per front foot for paving.² (Resolution 87-61(S), Resolution 88-47, Resolution 94-50, Resolution 95-97)
- 7. The City will pay all costs for any additional improvements required when deemed necessary by the City. Other improvements requested by the benefited property owners will be paid by those same property owners. (Resolution 88-47 #11)
- 8. The \$30/\$17 split in front foot assessment stands unless there is 100% agreement on a revised formula for a specific project or the amount is adjusted by the City Council. (Resolution 87-61(S), Resolution 88-47; #21; Resolution 95-97)
- 9. Road Reconstruction assessment payment date, penalty and interest shall be set as soon as the reconstruction project has been accepted by the Public Works Department regardless if the LID/Assessment district wherein reconstruction has been completed is also scheduled for paving as part of the same LID/Assessment District. Paving assessment payment date, penalty and interest will be set as soon as the paving project has been accepted by the Public Works Department. HCC 17.04.070--110. (Resolution 96-73)
- 10. New Local Roads may be constructed by 100% program funds when the construction thereof benefits the entire City or when the City owns the property wherein the road is to be constructed. The Road to be constructed must meet the qualifying criteria and be recommended by the Transportation Advisory Committee to the City Council. This expenditure must be approved via Ordinance with justification noted within the body of the Ordinance. Whenever possible, New Local Roads will be constructed using the LID process HCC 17.04 and the assessment methodology as noted in item 6. and 8. (Resolution 07-82)
- 11. HART funds may be used to leverage outside funds for New Local Roads and Trails. (Resolution 07-82)
- 12. New Local Trails may be constructed using 100% program funds and follow the procedures listed in item 10. (Resolution 07-82)
- 13. Sidewalks shall be paid for out of road funds, and trails shall be paid for out of the 10% allocated to trails. (Resolution 07-82)

V. UTILITIES

- 1. Prior to street reconstruction, necessary related non existing water and sewer improvements shall be encouraged whenever possible. (Resolution 88-47 #9)
- 2. Water and Sewer utility extensions necessary to extend the utilities short distances beyond a construction area will be paid for by the program. (Resolution. 88-47 #10)
- 3. Water and sewer utility relocations directly caused by reconstruction will be paid for by the Accelerated Roads Program. (Resolution. 88-47 #10)
- 4. Water and sewer utility upgrades necessary for future capacity that are done concurrently with reconstruction and/or paving will be paid for by the utility (a) fund. (Resolution 88-47 #10)
- 5. The City shall recover from the property owner the cost of construction of City-provided sewer and water service connections by including the cost of construction of such connections in the service connection fee established under HCC Chapter 14.13. (Resolution. 88-47)
- 6. Cost of installing stub-outs would be a necessary expense to anyone building on lots requiring sewer and/or water service. Sewer and/or Water funds or other public money was provided to pay the cost of these stub-outs because of the benefit of a quality finished road and the use of stub-outs benefit only those particular lots. Costs will be recouped from benefiting property owners through deferred assessments. The Planning Clerk and Finance Department will maintain a listing of these deferred sewer and/or water service connection fees.
- 7. Whenever practical street lights shall be included in the construction of new local roads and shall be paid by HART funds. Property owners participating in a road reconstruction and/or paving LID may request street lights. If the project is deemed feasible the property owners shall be assessed for the installation of the street lights on an equal share per parcel methodology. Property owner approval of the street light assessment shall follow the process in HCC 17.04. Once constructed, the City will absorb the utility billing for the street light(s). (Resolution 07-82)

VI. SPECIAL PROVISIONS

- 1. Additional right-of-way required will be paid by this program, at no additional cost to abutting property owners. (Resolution 88-47 #20)
- 2. Corner lots are exempt from a double front footage assessment and the total assessed frontage shall not exceed the longest side of the lot. Reconstruction assessments apply to

- reconstruction and paving. Corner lot agreement is required after 10/25/94. (Resolution 87-61(S) #15; Resolution. 88-47 #15, Resolution 91-68, Ordinance 94-16(A))
- 3. Lots having a frontage on two parallel streets, or flag lots having a frontage on two perpendicular streets, are exempt from a double front footage assessment unless actually accessing the lot from both streets either prior to or after reconstruction and/or paving Deferred Assessment Agreement Required pursuant to HCC 17.04.160. (Resolution 88-47 #16)
- 4. This program includes paving driveway aprons on contracts funded by H.A.R.P. (Resolution 88-47 #17; Resolution 91-48)
- 5. When at all practical, the center line of rights-of-way will be the established road center line. Where impractical, the center line may be shifted to mitigate improvement encroachments of high cost hillside excavation. (Resolution 88-77(A))
- 6. In established neighborhoods, where improvements such as housing, carports, lawns or landscaping have been constructed near the right-of-way line and ditching would seriously impact these improvements, alternates to open ditching may be considered. These alternates may include gently sloping ditches back to the lawn, trench drains, standard or rolled curbs and gutter or any other sound engineering practices. The cost of these alternates will be born by the road program unless the residents elect to participate in the curb, gutter and sidewalk programs. (Resolution 88-77(A))
- 7. Pedestrian amenities shall be included in all new road projects unless exempted by the City Council. (Resolution. 04-41(A))
- 8. Exempting Certain Lands that will not be Developed due to Conservation Easements or Owned by Organizations that Conserve Land for Public Purpose and/or Habitat Protection from the Homer Accelerated Roads Program and the Homer Accelerated Water and Sewer Program Assessment District Assessments on a Case by Case Basis and that Each Program Shall be Amended to Include this Exemption under Special Provisions. (Resolution 05-50(A).)
- 9. New Subdivisions may not participate in HART for the construction of subdivision roads or trails.
 - a. Exception: To encourage trail connectivity, the Subdivider will be required to pay a prorated share of the project cost not to exceed 75% of the cost of public trail construction. (Resolution 07-82)
- 10. HART funds may be used in accordance with Title 11.04.05. If a development includes a segment of an arterial or collector street as shown on the Master Plan, the

developer shall construct the streets on the alignment adopted in the Master Roads and Streets Plan, and conforming to the respective classification. The developer shall be required to construct the street to a twenty-eight-foot width in accordance with the minimum requirements of a local residential street; provided, however, that the City may, upon direction of the City Council, elect to require construction to the full standards and pay to the developer the cost difference between the required street and the proposed street. (Resolution 07-82)

VII. TRAIL PRIORITIZING CRITERIA AND PLANNING GUIDELINES

A. Trail Prioritizing. The TAC and Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission will review the trail priority list during the annual review of the HART. The list will be presented in a memorandum from staff, and will contain a mix of large and small projects. Generally it will include up to five trail projects that staff has reviewed and found ready for preliminary work. Trails on this list are planned for construction in the near term (one to three year timeframe). Staff will actively work to prepare those projects for construction. (Resolution 07-82)

B. Trail Planning Guidelines

Trail design shall take into account at minimum the following:

- 1. Use context sensitive design when locating and planning trails to take advantage of scenic resources.
- 2. Respect the character of trails based on function, setting, and expectation of accessibility.
- 3. Evaluate the soils, drainage, wetlands, Tsunami zone, flood plain, stream setbacks, historical resources, visual resources, topography, existing and potential land use, zoning and land ownership.
- 4. Where estimated costs, operating costs and outside funding availability are considerations and important criteria, care should be used to ensure that important trails are not eliminated solely using cost as a determinant.
- 5. Multi-use trails are encouraged. Design of the trail should include consideration of compatible uses such as pedestrians and bicycles.
- 6. All trails should be designed to recognize the requirements of ADA standards and guidelines. (Resolution 07-82)

Introduction

The Homer City Council created the Homer Natural Gas Distribution Task Force through the adoption of Resolution 10-75. Resolution 10-75 provided that the scope of work for the Task Force shall include:

- Review the range of distribution system financing options and make recommendations to the Council.
- Review current City Code related to Local Improvement Districts and utility construction
 practices and permitting and make recommendations regarding necessary code
 amendments to the Council.
- Function as a "review board" for Enstar's plans to construct the distribution system.
- Prepare a written plan which addresses the financing, permitting, and construction of a potential gas distribution system within the City limits.

The Task Force convened five regular meetings during which it received staff reports, heard a presentation from Enstar, and received testimony from the public regarding the scope of work items contained in the resolution. The Task Force paid special attention to the legislative intent language contained in the Capital Budget last year, political considerations surrounding legislative approval of Phase II of the main transmission line, political and financial considerations related to public financing of the both the transmission line and the distribution system in town, amendments that might be required to the Homer City Code, potential "build-out scenarios, and potential incentives or financing options for stimulating construction of a distribution network within the City.

At its regular meeting on February 28th, the Task Force considered a draft resolution and a staff memorandum which both contained proposed recommendations for the Council. The draft resolution was originally based upon a set of points presented by the Chair to support his recommendation that the Council ask the voters to approve using a portion of HART funds to finance the distribution system mains (the lines in the street). The memorandum was an attempt to help frame the discussion and provide a roadmap for completing the scope of work.

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The Task Force amended the resolution and the amended version appears in your packet for consideration. The Task Force also voted yes on all three questions posed in the memorandum and requested that a new memorandum incorporating those items also be forwarded to Council.

At the end of the meeting, the Task Force voted to "stand down" and suspend operations for now. It did so because it concluded that it had completed its assigned tasks to the extent that it could given current conditions circumstances. For example, it will not know what the actual "build-out plans" will be until it is known if the primary transmission line is funded and which institutions and businesses attempt to hook-up first. Although the Task Force discussed possible build-out plans with Enstar, the current uncertainty makes it difficult to "function as a review board for Enstar's plans to construct the distribution system" in a comprehensive way. Further, it is difficult to perform this function since no actual permits have been applied for. So, instead of disbanding, the Task Force decided it was best to just suspend operations until more information is known or until the Council gives it additional tasks.

Recommendations of the Task Force

Following are the Task Force recommendations that resulted from discussion of the staff memorandum referenced above.

The Primary Transmission Line / Anchor Point to Homer to Kachemak City

RECOMMENDATION: The Task Force recommends that the City Council aggressively pursue state funding for Phase II of the pipeline project to get natural gas into the Homer area.

<u>Discussion</u>: The Task Force recognizes that the Council has already moved the project up on its CIP List and has directed the City lobbyist and staff to work on the project with legislators and the governor's office. It recognizes further that the staff have been making informational presentations at various civic group functions and distributing spread sheets illustrating potential energy cost savings.

However, the Task Force concluded that much more can and should be done and that it was important for the Council to make itself heard with an unambiguous and clear voice. The Task Force found that getting natural gas to Homer is potentially one of the biggest economic development projects Homer has seen in many years. The positive impacts on the overall economy are potentially substantial. Natural gas would lower the cost of living, lower the cost of doing business, help to keep taxes down, and put the community on an equal footing with the rest of Southcentral Alaska. When North Slope gas eventually makes its way to this area and/or new gas discoveries are brought on line locally, Homer will be in a position to benefit.

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Natural gas would also reduce the City's greenhouse gas emissions and help achieve the goals of the adopted Climate Action Plan. The community has been attempting to get natural gas for decades. It is closer now than ever and the Task Force felt that the City should do all it can to make sure this opportunity does not slip away.

The Task Force suggests that the Council authorize the administration to initiate a coordinated and comprehensive strategy to educate the public and our elected officials about the benefits of the project and advocate for its funding. Some of this effort would be performed using information provided by Enstar. The strategy could include things like:

- Draft newspaper articles and Points of View.
- Post information on the City website.
- Disseminate information regarding the overall impacts to the Homer economy.
- Provide information on potential energy costs savings for residential, business, and institutional / public buildings.
- Provide information on the estimated costs to convert and hook-up to natural gas.
- Provide information about potential "build-out" scenarios and their cost.
- Provide information about potential financing options and what that might cost property owners if Council chooses to provide those incentives.
- Organize or assist in organizing a community-wide letter writing / lobbying campaign.
- Organize or help to organize a broad-based regional coalition to meet with the Governor and key legislators.

Planning in Advance

RECOMMENDATION: The Task Force recommends that the City Council authorize the administration to prepare the ordinances needed to amend the municipal code and pave the way for the arrival of natural gas.

<u>Discussion</u>: The Task Force spent a significant amount of time discussing the points contained in the legislative intent language in last year's capital budget. Council will recall that one of the points was that Homer should have a plan in place to prepare for the gas distribution system within the City limits. The Task Force concluded that it was important for the City to be able to show the legislature and the Governor that the City had a plan and that it was actively preparing for arrival of gas. The Task Force agreed that doing this could help to avoid another veto given what the Governor said in his veto message last year.

There are several amendments to the code that would be necessary. The first would be amendments to Title 13 to provide for standard construction practices and permitting to place

natural gas lines within City rights-of-way. If the Council chooses to make available natural gas local improvement districts, then amendments would be needed to Title 17. If the Council chooses to utilize any of the other financing options discussed below, additional ordinances and code amendments may be required. The Task Force recommends that the Title 13 code amendments be prepared and approved quickly. Ordinances related to financing options for street mains could follow at a later date after the Council has time for deliberation.

Financing Options

RECOMMENDATION: The Task Force recommends that the City Council work to select the best funding source possible for the natural gas distribution system within the City limits.

<u>Discussion</u>: The question of whether the City should provide financing for the distribution system generated perhaps the most discussion at Task Force meetings. This is the most important decision the Council will have to make. There are many financial, economic, and political considerations that the Council will have to weigh. Most of the discussion centered around whether the City should pay for or finance construction of the main lines in the streets. (The State is being asked to fund the primary transmission line from Anchor Point only). Local property owners would be responsible for getting the service connection to their buildings.

The Task Force concluded that the City should provide financing and incentives because it would accelerate the build-out phase which would benefit the overall economy and make the transition to natural gas more affordable for local residents and business owners. Doing this might also demonstrate to the Legislature and the Governor that support in Homer for this project is so strong that the City Council is willing to provide local matching money and assume some of the risk. The Task Force also felt it would be helpful to make it known that HART funds were potentially available for a local match.

One point should be made clear. The City is not obligated to do anything in this regard. Doing nothing has been referred to by the staff as the "No Action" alternative. This approach has advantages and disadvantages like any other. Enstar already has a procedure for expanding the distribution system that is approved and regulated by the Regulatory Commission of Alaska. Under this program, local property owners pay for extending mains to their properties and can be reimbursed later when other landowners hook up to the extension. Enstar estimates that under this scenario, build-out will occur naturally throughout Homer in approximately ten years without any City financing or financial assistance.

The Task Force reviewed a list of financing options that were prepared by the staff. The memorandum describing those options is attached. The Memorandum also includes a brief

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discussion of the relative advantages and disadvantages of each option. In the end, the Task Force decided to recommend a list of preferred options for Council to consider rather than selecting just one. The Task Force determined that was the best approach because there are still too many unknowns and because this is a political decision as much as a financial and economic one.

The preferred options put forward by the Task Force, in no particular order, are:

Local Improvement Districts

Special Service Areas

A General Mil Rate Increase to finance main lines in the streets throughout the City

Asking voters to make HART Funds available.

A. Bryan Zak, Small Business Development Center

Bryan Zak, Director for the Small Business Development Center (SBDC), Kenai Peninsula, reported he oversees one of the five regions throughout Alaska. His territory includes cities on the Southern Peninsula including Tyonek and the Aleutian chain. The mission of the SBDC is to promote and assist in the growth and development of small business in Alaska. They assist in finding a plan to reach the next level, are business advisors, and create collaborative experiences with community partners. Annually the SBDC updates the breath and depth of the business tool box, consistently reporting clients' actions. All information gathered is confidential; business ideas are not shared with others unless authorized. Kevin & Donna Maltz, Fresh Sourdough Express owners, are a fine example of a business starting from a bread truck to a viable business they operate and employee lots of people.

The SBDC started in Alaska in 1986, this being their 25th year. The Homer Chamber of Commerce provides an office and two years ago the City allocated funding for classes, creating an opportunity for the SBDC to leverage funds. There are opportunities within sustainable Homer for economic development. Micro lending companies are needed to get small businesses

funded. The SBDC provides different tools for both start-up and existing businesses, along with the tools and strategy to pay credit cards off that were used to fund businesses. Additionally, the SBDC helps with a business plan, enlisting ROPE, PTAC, and BuyAlaska services.

Mayor Hornaday presented Bryan Zak and the SBDC a plaque recognizing the contributions of the director and the organization.

ANNOUNCEMENTS/PRESENTATIONS/BOROUGH REPORT/COMMISSION REPORTS

A. Mayor's Proclamation – Alaskans Choose Respect

Mayor Hornaday read and presented the proclamation to Haven House representative Jessica Lawmaster. On March 31st Homer will participate in planned events to include a stand up for peace to end domestic violence and sexual assault. More events are planned in April, as it is the designated month to end child sexual assaults and child abuse. Haven House events will be advertised in the local newspaper and radio.

B. Borough Report

Kenai Peninsula Borough Assemblyman Bill Smith reported the Assembly is getting into the budget year, deciding on the funding for the school district and the solid waste transfer site at Bayview Hill. The current fund balance is \$19M. The established range is between \$12M and \$22M. Last year \$3M was used to pay off bonds for the solid waste site in Seldovia and other government operations. Eighty percent of the monies the KPB collect goes to the KPBSD. Mayor Carey and Assemblyman Smith are sponsoring a resolution to fund schools the same amount as last year. It will still provide opportunity to fund more later in the year. The KPB School Board will adopt their budget April 4th and forward to the KPB; the KPB then has 30 days to tell them what their minimum funding level will be.

Funding the solid waste transfer site to replace the landfill is another big issue. The landfill has to be closed by August 2013. An extension until December 2013 is sought to get an extra construction season. The intent is to fund the project without going for a bond issue. The project may be phased, with half completed in 2012 and the other half in 2013. The project is anticipated to cost \$9.5M to \$12M, with \$3 to \$3.5M from the land trust fund and \$3.5 from the fund balance. A mil rate increase of .5 mil would raise \$3.2M. Money has been requested from the Legislature as well. Mayor Carey has proposed to eliminate the tax holiday on unprepared food. The food tax holiday costs the KPB \$2.8M per year.

Council asked Assemblyman Smith questions regarding the proposed mil rate, funding for the college, and LNG plant closure. Mr. Smith answered the mil rate increase would be temporary, the college may be funded fully, and the Nikiski plant closure would not have an effect until next year.

Mayor Hornaday commented the Climate Action Plan was selected to be included in a book from a professor at Cal Poly (California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo). The CAP is one of six selected for the book and is being used in the classroom.

Mayor Hornaday participated in a telephonic conference with Alaska Mayors and Senator Begich. Proposed cuts in the House would amount to Alaska losing \$42M. Democrats are proposing a level budget (as is); Republicans are proposing huge cuts. Senator Begich was not encouraging about earmarks. They are redefining earmarks. As like other coastal mayors, Mayor Hornaday is concerned about the funding for the port and harbor expansions. The Corps of Engineers does not recommend which projects will be built so Congress has to step in and make a recommendation. Senator Begich hopes for a redefining of earmarks. He is discouraged with the Obama administration on economic development in Alaska. He went on and on about all the regulations and clinkers thrown in to economic development. There are problems with drilling for natural gas, trying to cut off a major portion of the petroleum reserve in the Arctic, no directional drilling in the wildlife refuge, and a halt on Shell's activities.

Representative Seaton's office expressed concern about the resolution passed on the gas line. The Mayor provided a letter to clarify moving the gas line up to the number two CIP project.

It eliminates any grandfather rights as an Alaskan or fisherman to be part of the City. When annexed, people were promised the uses would continue. The Supreme Court already ruled it as illegal; it will be devastating to Homer.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

A. City Manager's Report

- 1. Fire Training Facility: The fire training facility has arrived in Homer and it is now located at its new home adjacent to the Chip Pad on the Spit. HVFD is presently looking into fencing the area for security reasons and finding the resources to move the fire hydrant to the other side of the street for easier access. Chief Painter is currently planning a "train the trainers" session to familiarize key people with the facility and equipment. A dedication ceremony and open house will be held later this Spring when it warms up a bit. We will keep you informed.
- 2. Bridge Creek Fire Mitigation Project: At the time this report was written, it was looking increasingly likely that no work will take place this winter. The Spruce Bark Beetle Program staff are extremely busy and no contracts for this project have yet been executed. Further, recent snows have left us with a snow depth that is not conducive to the operation of mechanized equipment. Things could change, but at this point we are likely looking at some hand work and tree stock assessment this summer, and more intensive mechanized work next winter. The Borough has confirmed that the money will be available for the project again next year.
- 3. Staff Turnover: Library Director Helen Hill has formally submitted her resignation letter and will be retiring at the end of April. We are currently advertising for the position and have been informed by members of the State Library Board that they believe we will get some very qualified candidates. We sure hope they are correct. This week I started the interview process for the Personnel Director position. I am hoping to get someone in that position as quickly as possible so that they can get some training and orientation with Sheri before she departs at the end of April. Sheri is working hard to complete the parity study before she leaves.
- 4. Potential Cuts to Borough College Funding: You may already be aware that Mayor Carey has proposed eliminating Borough funding for the college system on the Peninsula. He has also proposed eliminating tuition waivers for Peninsula residents. One of the primary stated reasons for proposing this is that the Borough needs money for the Homer landfill project. The voters authorized the Borough to contribute up to one tenth of a Mil to the college system back in 1990. This year the Borough contributed \$637,570 to the University system. Of that amount, \$194,800 or about 31% came to the Kachemak Bay Campus here in Homer. Carol Swartz, the local campus director reports that if eliminated, this funding would directly affect core services such as GED programs, the college library, tutoring, student advisors, testing, and more. It is my understanding that the City of Kenai has already adopted a resolution opposing this proposal and other Cities in the Borough are considering doing the same. Supporting the local college campus is a big part of the City Comprehensive Plan and the College is a significant part of the local economy. Please let us know if you would like to sponsor a resolution. We can help draft it and get it on the next Council agenda.

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- 5. City Hall Expansion / Renovation: The Task Force, the Public Works Director, and the contractors are working very hard to keep us on the ambitious construction schedule established by the Council. This project has taken priority over others at the moment, as requested by Council. A construction contract has been signed and a number of alterations have already been made to the draft site and building plans based upon input from the staff, the department heads, the architect, the building contractor, and the Task Force. At its meeting on Tuesday, the 22nd, the Task Force reviewed preliminary site and building plans, and a preliminary cost estimate for accomplishing all of the items on the current "wish list". The contractor was looking for feedback on the general direction this is project is taking so that we do not waste unnecessary money later on architectural and planning work. The Task Force was presented with a very preliminary spreadsheet showing what could be accomplished with the amount of money available and what additional, identified priority items would cost. The Task Force agreed that the additional items were very desirable and necessary and encouraged us to continue planning as though those items would be included in the final project budget. Accomplishing those items would save the City money in the long run. The additional cost is about \$275,000, much of which could be accomplished with depreciation and energy efficiency funds. The Council members on the Task Force are hoping to bring the Council up to speed at this meeting. The task force will receive costs estimates that are more refined at its next meeting.
- 6. <u>Lobbyist:</u> Things are working smoothly with the new lobbyist team so far. They really enjoyed their visit to Homer. Please let me know how you would like to receive their lobbyist reports (other that the status update on bills). You might recall that the contract calls for regular updates on City priorities and what they are working on. They could call in at Council meeting or just provide written reports.
- 7. <u>Energy Efficiency:</u> Work continues to take place on this project now that the Council has approved both a project budget and a contract. We are reevaluating one of the project items (high mast lights) based upon new information we received. If we make any changes, it would simply mean that this item was delayed on placed on hold and less money would be spent than authorized.
- 8. <u>TORA Agreements:</u> Work is proceeding on all three of the TORA Agreements we discussed at the last meeting. We hope to have the one regarding Spit parking back before you soon.
- 9. Staff Training: The City will be providing training this week to employees who have daily contact with the public. The focus is on how to deal with difficult, angry, emotional, harassing, or unstable citizens and customers. This occurs more than you might think. The training will be geared toward providing professional and helpful responses without aggravating the situation or causing it to deteriorate. Training will also be provided on coping skills and how to avoid letting abusive and harassing clients affect your work, attitude, or state of mind.
- 10. Water and Sewer Rate Setting: As you know, the Council has decided to start working on water and sewer rates at a workshop before the first meeting in April. I think we will start out with a refresher on how rates are set now so everyone is on the same page. The letter below from the Department of Commerce reminded me that there are resources out there which could assist with this process if Council wishes. As a reminder, the Department reviewed the City methods and rate structure several years ago and determined that it was

very good. A University study reached the same conclusion. Regina also attended some training this year on utility rate structuring and came back thinking that the City is in line with recommended practices.

City Manager Wrede reported he informed DOT the Main Street/Sterling Highway Intersection resolution failed and that Council prefers to go ahead with a scaled back intersection improvement with a traffic signal. Council is not pleased it will be another two years before the project and requests an interim short term improvement to address immediate safety concerns. Council will opt for the bigger STIP project later on.

The memorandum about Community Recreation from Mike Illg was addressed at the last council meeting. Mike Illg, Sheri Hobbs, and City Manager Wrede met with school district officials. The meeting was very productive in bringing concerns to the table, things we can do to help the school district, and talk about the cost of water and conservation. Maybe Council would consider not charging the KPBSD the commercial rate, although it would shift costs to someone else. There was discussion the district could use our gym in the event of overflow. The school district wanted to know if we were considering using city equipment to rid snow for earlier play.

On the Bridge Creek Fire Mitigation Project, the Spruce Bark Beetle folks are advertising for a contractor with a closing date of March 8th. They incorporated everything in the Conditional Use Permit. Phase I will be the mechanical work which may not get finished this year, but they can come back next winter. The money will not run out until July 2012. This April there is a contract for the hand work with selected loggers going in and taking trees in areas too sensitive for mechanical equipment.

Councilmember Roberts reported on the City Hall Renovation and Expansion Project. The task force met with Carey Meyer and the contractors last week to review the general drawings of the proposed addition in its 10% design phase. The task force is pleased and moving forward. The budget does not quite cover all the work; they are working to include energy items that will save money in the future and replace worn out items.

Councilmember Wythe reported there is a long list of things identified when the college did their walk through of City Hall. There are genuine wear and tear items on the building. We could use depreciation funding to pay for those items. We will come back to Council to request depreciation funding to make those things happen while in construction.

Councilmember Lewis asked if people would be able to retrieve the wood from the spruce bark beetle mitigation program. City Manager Wrede answered although that was part of the original plan, after talking to the Soil and Water Conservation District there was concern about disturbing the soil by dragging logs out. There is an agreement that no skidding and logging be done; the logs will be dropped and left on the ground. Caution will be used when individuals go in with mechanized equipment.

Increase fuel costs are having an impact on property owners.

The 1,500 sq. ft. restricted outdoor storage area is a broken promise to the people that were annexed. With tanner crab coming back people will want pots in the yard. It is forcing people out of town, and forcing them to live a lifestyle that is not Alaskan. He asked Council to reconsider the ordinance.

He thanked the Mayor for the SBDC recognition that caught him by surprise.

Also the Corps works with the USCG to maintain operating depths at the Cutter Hickory berth. The City is responsible for the disposal of the dredge materials created from these efforts.

Past averages for annual quantities of materials are approximately 13,000 cubic yards. Due to isostatic rebound, rebound from the 1964 earthquake and normal sedimentary transport 2010 harbor surveys conducted for the Corps in the navigation channel from the fuel floats to approximately JJ float, show that we are above our operating depths in the harbor and additional dredging will be required to maintain project depth. Early estimates are that this additional dredging could create as much as 20,000 more cubic yards to our quantities for 2011.

The City, Coast Guard and Corps have also been working on a special project that concerns the Cutter Hickory's berth which will bring an additional 10,000 cubic yards into the system for disposal. All total we may be looking at 40,000 cubic yards or more of dredge materials for 2011.

Challenges ahead:

You may have already noted in the handouts the Corps maintenance project limits outline an approximately 100' channel from the harbor entrance to the Load and Launch Ramp. The remainder of the harbor basin is our responsibility to maintain. I have made inquires with the Corps, who administers the dredge contract, as to whether the Port would be able to add to the work scope allowing us to bring harbor basin back into project depth by using the dredge while its on the job in the harbor. My contact person said that this has been done in the past on other projects. I will ask for a confirmation in writing.

If the additional dredging from the fuel floats to the area of JJ float in a 100' channel may produce an additional 20,000 cyds, then you can see that it looks as though we may have a big job ahead of us in order to fulfill our responsibilities for maintaining the proper operating depths in the basin.

We will need to hire a survey completed for the areas in the harbor outside of the Corps navigation channel in order to estimate total scope of materials to be removed and we won't have any actual quantity or cost estimates until the survey is completed. As of now I believe we will be able to take this on section by section over the course of many years. However you cut it though, we are looking at much higher numbers when it comes to our responsibilities for dredge materials disposed in the future.

Possible fiscal impacts: I have some preliminary cost estimates of between 8 and 10 dollars per yard to the dewatering site. I wouldn't hazard any guesses at this time but there will be a heavy fiscal impact to the Enterprise in order to maintain the harbors operating depths.

Past method of dredge materials disposal: Dredge materials may be used only on the Spit either for City projects or sold to private business owners for use on the Spit. This is a very limited market and we have nearly reached the saturation point. In an effort to take a proactive tack on this issue, the Port and City are currently seeking permits for beneficial uses of dredge materials on the Homer Spit. This is a multi pronged approach at using these materials in beneficial ways on the Spit for beach re-nourishment and two build-up projects that would be used to create additional parking in the boardwalk areas on the Spit.

In light of the results of the latest harbor soundings and the spike in dredge materials quantities, I have research the Ordinance dictating that materials may not be removed from the Spit. It is my belief that the required annual maintenance dredging of our Port and Harbor is a completely different issue from the one that prompted the original and then the amended Ordinance of 1998 titled Excavation of the Homer Spit Beach.

Dredge materials management could easily be lined out in a prioritized check list starting with:

- 1. Beach re-nourishment
- 2. Build-up projects, land creation benefitting City of Homer Port and Harbor
- 3. Materials for sale on the Spit to land owners or leases for use on the Spit
- 4. Stock pile of materials for emergency erosion repairs and for small quantity sales for use on the Spit 6 to 10K cubic yards
- 5. When items 1-4 are fulfilled, RFP for sale off the Spit as fill material. Proceeds from sale would be used only for Enterprise Operational costs.

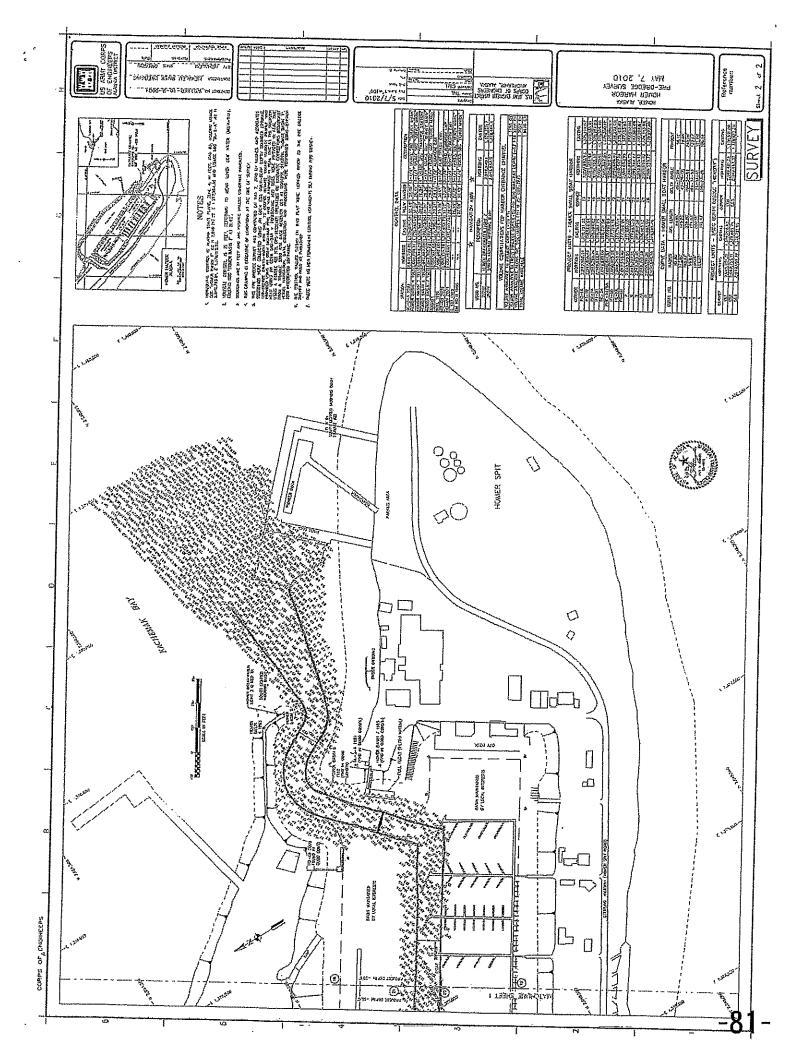

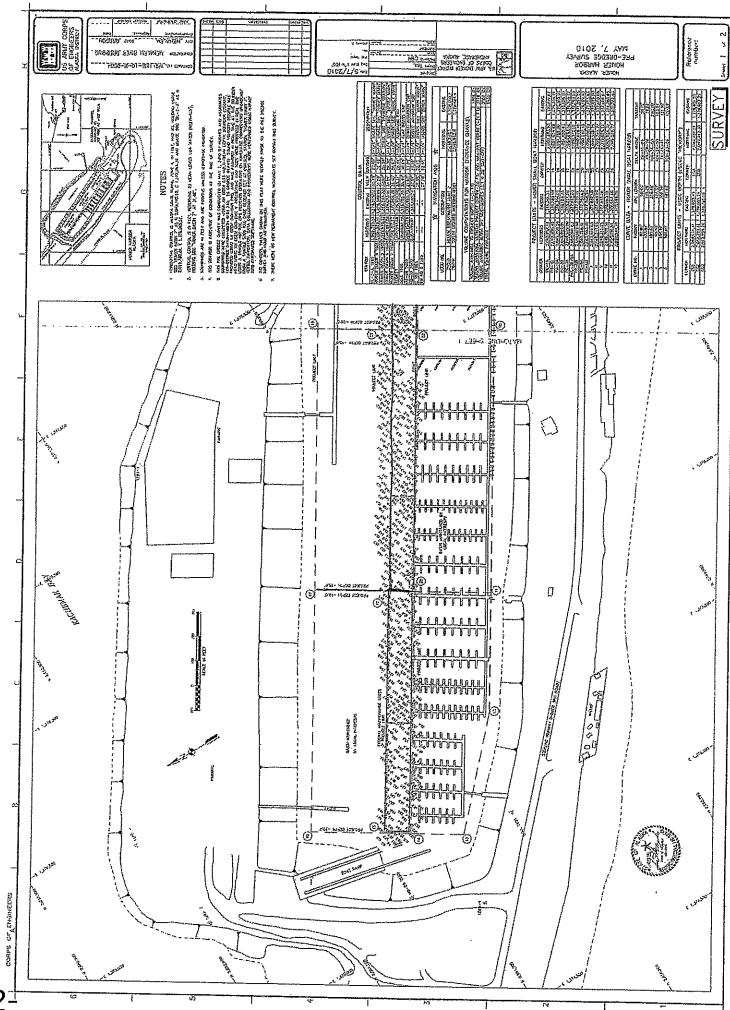

THE CITY OF HOMER ORDAINS.....

SECTION 1. INTENT. It is the intent of this ordinance to protect and preserve the stability of that land area known as the Homer Spit and all the land areas within the corporate limits of the City of Homer which may require like protection.

SECTION 2. REFERENCE TO MATERIALS PLAT; PERMITS. The removal or excavation of gravel, gravel fill or other fill material from any beach or from any portion of the Homer Spit shall be regulated by the City. Reference shall be made in all cases to the Materials Plat prepared jointly by the State Division of Lands and the U. S. Corps of Engineers, which is available and may be examined during business hours at the Homer City Hall. A permit shall be required in the following instances:

- Whenever gravel, gravel fill or other fill material is removed from Homer Spit or from beaches elsewhere within the corporate limits of said city.
- Whenever such materials are removed or excavated from any naturally created berm area, or from any berm area created for the protection of said land areas.

SECTION 2. <u>GUIDELINES</u>. Any applicant for a permit shall comply with the following:

- Permits shall be issued pursuant to guidelines formulated by the State Division of Lands and the U. S. Corps of Engineers, as referred to by the above-mentioned Materials Plat. Such guidelines may be altered from time to time by the Division of Lands and the Corps of Engineers as additional data is received by these agencies.
- No permits shall be issued for excavation or removal of gravel or fill materials from area "A" as designated on the above-mentioned plat prior to review and approval of the permit application by the Corps of Engineers and the Division of Lands.

SECTION 3. EXCEPTIONS. No permit shall be required for excavation necessary for the installation of sewage lines, water lines, underground power lines, wells, oil and fuel tanks and related lines and above ground power lines from any location other than a berm area, provided such excavated material is not removed from site of construction, nor shall a permit be required for clearing or maintaining any public road.

SECTION 4. <u>REVIEW</u>. Any person whose application is denied shall be entitled to a review of such denial by the City Council. A request for review shall be in writing and submitted to the City Clerk within ten days of such denial. The City Clerk shall, whenever feasible, thereafter place the matter of review on the agenda for the next regularly scheduled meeting of the City Council, but in any event, such review shall not be later than the second regularly scheduled meeting after such request is received.

SECTION 5. NONLIABILITY. The City shall not be liable for damages accruing as a result of any excavation or removal of gravel, gravel fill or fill material pursuant to the issuance of a permit under this ordinance.

SECTION 6. CONFORMANCE TO PERMIT REQUIRED. Any excavation or removal of gravel, gravel fill or fill material except by permit where required shall be considered a violation of this ordinance.

SECTION 7. <u>PENATUTES</u>. Every person convicted of a violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) or by imprisonment for not more than thirty (30) days, or both such fine and imprisonment. Each act of violation and every day upon which any such violation shall occur shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 8. <u>DEFINITIONS</u>. The following words, when used in this ordinance shall, for the purpose of this ordinance, have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section.

EXCAVATION: The digging out and removal of gravel or other fill materials whereby any existing surface grade is altered or disturbed.

REMOVAL: The movement, by lifting, pushing aside or taking away or off of any gravel or other fill materials from any area subject to the provisions of this ordinance.

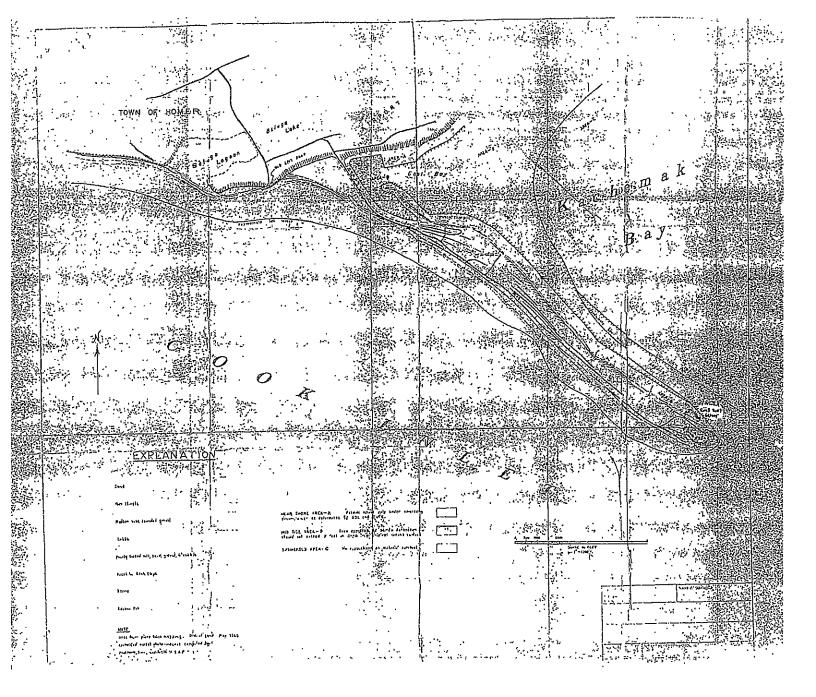

BACKUP SOFTWARE FOR CITY HALL

The City of Homer has employed Symantec Backup Exec Software over the past 10 years to manage, backup and restore all City documents, databases, emails, and user information on all City of Homer Servers. The revision of software that we had been running up to this point is version 10D, which was dated from 2004. The model of licensing of the software required a license for each resource that was being backed up.e.g. if we were backing up a total of 3 Microsoft SQL databases, we would need 3 Symantec 'Agent for SQL' backup licenses. At the time, we paid over 10,000 for the software, and it has served us well, and there has been little impetus to upgrade the software since it worked for our purposes. However, over the past year, as we have upgraded other components of our IT system, such as installing a new Microsoft Windows 2008 Server with SQL 2008R2 for Clarity, the backup software has been unable to backup these 'newer' resources since the technology used for the newer resources is dramatically different. As a result, there have been some 'holes' in our backup strategy which, though we have worked around them, have not given us the same level of security and safeguards that we had prior.

The IT department proposes therefore upgrading our Backup Exec Software to the latest version, as well as all applicable Agent Licenses, which would put us on Symantec Backup Exec 2010. Notably, this upgrade would allow us to:

- Backup all resources automatically, and put into place policies which would notify IT staff of any errors detected in backup jobs
- Allow us to backup and seamlessly restore all Microsoft SQL databases (Clarity, CMI, Blackberry Services), Oracle Databases, and Microsoft Exchange Email Services
- Allow us to backup and seamlessly restore all VoIP Phone servers (used for all incoming and outgoing telephone communications)
- Enable a higher level of monitoring of backup progress, and granular restoration (e.g. be able to restore a single email in a single users inbox, as opposed to a whole inbox)
- Allow files to be backed up on newer resources even if they are open or in use (e.g. if a word document is open on a users computer overnight, it will still get backed up)
- Allow up to 60% faster backups vs. the older version (a complete backup job of all resources on the old system would begin on Friday at 5PM and end on Monday at 7AM). In testing, the newer system began at 5PM and would be done by Saturday 11PM.
- Faster restoration of any all data using Hard Disk based backup vs. older DAT or DLT tape backups which have limited storage and lifetime usability (tape gets stretched over time, hard disks do not, and there is more storage capacity available on a hard disk)
- Allow access to support from Symantec if there are any problems with the software. Currently
 since the software is out of support, we are on our own if something does not work correctly.

UPDATES / FOLLOW-UP

- 1. <u>Fire Training Facility</u>: Attached is a report from Chief Painter which discusses training at this facility and other training and drills that HVFD has or will be participating in.
- 2. Bridge Creek Fire Mitigation Project: This project is moving ahead. The Borough has been advertising for bids and the deadline was March 8. The City has reviewed and submitted comments on the ITB (Invitation to Bid). The ITB incorporates the conditions and stipulations contained in the CUP approved by the Planning Commission. The CUP is attached as an addendum and the ITB states that if there are conflicts between the ITB and/or the contract and the CUP, the CUP will prevail. The Borough is advertising for bids for the mechanized work only at this time. Another ITB will go out in April for the hand felling work. After a successful bidder is selected, the next important step is for the contractor to submit an operations plan. That plan will contain some of the important details such as where the access points will be and where refueling will occur. The operations plan must be approved by the Borough and the City before a contract can be signed.
- 3. Staff Turnover: I have completed the process of reviewing applications and interviewing candidates for the Personnel Director position. I have offered the job to a very qualified local candidate and she has accepted. She will begin work on April 4th which will give her almost a full month working with Sheri before she departs. The closing date for applications for the Library Director position is Thursday, the 10th. At this point, I am optimistic that we will receive interest from good candidates.
- 4. Potential Cuts to Borough College Funding: You may already be aware that Mayor Carey has proposed eliminating Borough funding for the college system on the Peninsula. He has also proposed eliminating tuition waivers for Peninsula residents. One of the primary stated reasons for proposing this is that the Borough needs money for the Homer landfill project. The voters authorized the Borough to contribute up to one tenth of a Mil to the college system back in 1990. This year the Borough contributed \$637,570 to the University system. Of that amount, \$194,800 or about 31% came to the Kachemak Bay Campus here in Homer. Carol Swartz, the local campus director reports that if eliminated, this funding would directly affect core services such as GED programs, the college library, tutoring, student advisors, testing, and more. It is my understanding that the City of Kenai has already adopted a resolution opposing this proposal and other Cities in the Borough are considering doing the same. Supporting the local college campus is a

- big part of the City Comprehensive Plan and the College is a significant part of the local economy. It is my understanding that Council member Roberts will be sponsoring a resolution.
- 5. <u>City Hall Expansion / Renovation:</u> The Task Force, the Public Works Director, and the contractors are working very hard to keep us on the ambitious construction schedule established by the Council. At the last Task Force meeting, Carey, the contractor, and the architect presented revised floor plans and an updated 10% project budget. Additional funds will be needed to do some basic energy efficiency work, address some of issues identified by the UAA architects, and take care of issues already identified such as carpet replacement. All of this additional work is pretty basic and would be for the existing building. This agenda contains a resolution sponsored by Council Member Wythe which asks Council to conceptually approve the use of existing depreciation funds for these purposes. She will speak to her resolution.
- 6. Energy Efficiency: The contract with has been signed with Siemens. The scope of work has been amended with respect to the high mast lights. We are now planning to do a demonstration project on one pole to see how things work based upon new information received by the staff. For example, we would like to see how the loss of lumens affects overall light coverage at the port and harbor, the visual differences between the new "white" light and the old light folks are used to, the actual energy savings, the cost and amount of labor necessary to replace these bulbs more often, and the impact on "broadcast light" to other areas of town. The contract is written so that we can come back and replace all of the bulbs later if desired. The advantage to this approach is that we get some of our questions answered before we spend a whole bunch of money (This is a big ticket item). The downside is that there may be a delay before we start realizing the savings predicted.
- 7. SB 37: Attached is a copy of SB 37. I testified in favor of this bill at the Senate Transportation Committee hearing on Tuesday. This bill has very broad support from AML, to the Mining Association, the State Chamber of Commerce, the Truckers Association, and the Alaska General Contractors. Alaska is the only state in the union that does not have its own fund to build new transportation infrastructure and repair what it has. We rely totally on the Feds (except for maintenance and operations, which is also underfunded) and we all know those days are going away. This bill would provide seed money for such a fund, make earnings of the fund available, and add money from gas tax receipts and driver license receipts. Having a state transportation fund and not relying solely on the Federal government could have bid benefits for some of Homer's priorities that never seen to quite make the STIP List; such as Main Street. Linda and Yuri may have more to say about this bill in their report. I am also pretty familiar with the bill and could take questions if you have them. This bill appears to have some momentum behind it and a resolution from the Council might not be a bad idea as it works its way to the Finance Committees and eventually the Governor.
- 8. <u>Contracts</u>, <u>Contracts</u>: Carey and Bryan are working hard to get jobs out on the street using money that Council approved or received. The past two weeks have seen a flurry of bid opening and at this meeting, Council will be asked to award

- contracts for a wide variety of projects from demolition of the old water treatment plant to refurbishing a crane at the Fish Dock.
- 9. Audit: The City Auditors are here for the two weeks beginning March 7. The Finance Department staff have been working very hard the past month or so preparing for the audit. They are really busy right now so if you ask for information from Finance and it takes a little while to get to you, you will know the reason why. The audit is several weeks early this year but that is probably good for a variety of reasons, including the fact that we will have updated and audited water and sewer, HAWSP, and water and sewer debt numbers as we go into the new rate setting process this Spring.
- 10. Alaska Association of Harbor Masters and Port Administrators Here: Bryan Hawkins is doing his part to boost the local economy. He has convinced his professional association to hold its annual meeting in Homer this year. The meeting will take place on October 10 through 14 and 50 to 100 people are expected, not including family and friends that may come along. This could be a shot in the arm for local businesses such as hotels, restaurants, galleries, water taxis, etc.
- 11. Other Port and Harbor News: The Port and Harbor Commission has approved a long term parking plan that includes annual permits. This is something that has been discussed for quite some time. Probably at the next meeting, the Council will see a resolution for consideration that approves the parking plan and establishes a new fee for annual permits. Bryan has been in discussion with the owners of the jack-up drilling rig that may be doing future work in Cook Inlet. The company needs dock space to do some retrofitting and other work prior to deploying in the Inlet. Discussions about permits and the type of work anticipated are on-going. This is potentially a big money maker for the enterprise fund.

Re: Fire Department Activities

Items of interest. First March 12 (Saturday) we are conducting the "Train-the-Trainer" course for the Fire Training System located on the Homer Spit. A company provided instructor will be here to train our fire department instructors and officers about the features of the system. We have invited officers and instructors from other Peninsula departments to take part in this exercise so that this resource can be a truly shared benefit to all the area.

Our Emergency Medical Technician-2 class finished the end of February with 5 students graduating. Four students successfully passed the State Practical Exams and took their State Written Exams for certification (one student had a schedule conflict and will test at a later date). We hope that the State EMS Office in Juneau will have their test results and certifications back by the end of March.

The Coast Guard conducted a preliminary workshop on "Mass Rescue Operations" on March 8, 2011. It is their desire to work with the City of Homer and other local agencies to develop an Annex to the Homer Emergency Operation Plan to incorporate Mass Rescue. They are willing to help with the plan development and are conducting similar workshops for all coastal communities that are potential "Reception" centers for maritime passengers being rescued/evacuated from vessels. They hope that we can have a draft plan by the beginning of May.

There is a Special Tsunami Warning Test scheduled for March 23rd that will happen between 9:45 AM and 10:00 AM. This test is being conducted by the National Weather Service and State Homeland Security and Emergency Management. The KPB OEM is hoping to work with us to provide some community outreach prior to the test and is spearheading the public service announcements informing the public of the test. We are working with the OEM to make sure all local news outlets are informed of the test.

RE:

Clarification

Due to public testimony at the February 28th City Council Meeting, this item was amended and reconsidered. The intent of the ordinance is to simplify enforcement and make it much easier to determine if a violation has occurred. I wish to further clarify some concepts of the ordinance including the issue it is designed to address, the changes that are suggested, explanation of the provision of termination, and an estimation on the amount of parcels it would affect.

The primary purpose of the ordinance is the creation of a tool to better clarify and address the storage of 'dead' vehicles. Currently, junk vehicles are not allowed to be stored in any of the districts in question. Junk vehicles include those that are "wrecked, scrapped, partially or fully dismantled ..." (not too difficult to determine) or those that are "inoperable" (could be difficult to determine). So instead of gaining a warrant and sending a mechanic out to a site to determine if a vehicle is actually inoperable, it was thought to have an easily identifiable standard to determine if the vehicles (up to five) are in compliance. All that has to be done to refute the claim is for the vehicles in question to move within 240 days.

This ordinance does not change what can be currently stored outside, only how much is acceptable. Current code addresses outdoor storage of "commercial fishing gear, noncommercial equipment including noncommercial trucks, boats, and not more than one recreational vehicle... provided no stored equipment, boat or vehicle exceeds 36 feet in length." All of this is currently allowed as private outdoor storage (reminder: junk is not allowed) and it was kept in the proposed code and would be regulated by the 1500 square foot allowance. To my knowledge, we have never had a compliant and not enforced anything related to the "accessory" private outdoor storage commercial fishing gear or fishing boats.

It was recommended that the grandfather provision of outdoor storage be terminated after one year. Our attorney is scheduled to be present and should be able to further clarify this provision. My take on this provision is that it is inherently difficult to establish a nonconformity of this sort (what type of documentation is available?). It also seems quite problematic to apply standards of the continuation of a nonconforming use which include provisions that, among other things (HCC 21.61.040), "No nonconforming use shall be moved in whole or in part to any other portion of the lot that was not

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occupied by the nonconforming use as of the date it became nonconforming" and "If at any time a nonconforming use is abandoned, changed, discontinued, or ceases to be the primary use of a lot, the use of that lot shall thereafter conform to the code provisions applicable in the zone in which the lot is located, and the nonconforming use shall not thereafter be resumed or allowed to continue." A few issues that come to mind is the consequence of moving or changing the storage, especially when expanding and the fact that storage of this sort is never going to be the primary use of the lot. Again perhaps the attorney will comment on this.

Finally, this ordinance as presented only affects a small amount of properties (perhaps less than half a dozen). 1500 feet is as large as or larger than the average house footprint. Storage encompassing an area greater than the existing house (principle use) would technically make storage the principle use and then would be outside of the provision of code to lawfully continue. This ordinance was intended to maintain the integrity of the residential neighborhoods as suggested in the newly adopted comprehensive plan. If the primary concern is the effect of this ordinance on the annexed areas, I would recommend passage as presented except to exclude the Rural Residential District where one would expect to find all of the area subjected to annexation in this ordinance and much larger lots. The higher density areas of the Urban Residential and Residential Office District would be well served by such and ordinance and all of the proposed provisions.

Commission may question the public. Once the public hearing is closed the Commission cannot hear additional comments on the topic. The applicant is not held to the 3 minute time limit.

A. Staff Report PL 11-02 Draft Ordinance Zoning Enforcement

City Planner Abboud reviewed the staff report. He referenced a lay down letter in support of the draft ordinance.

Patricia Wallace, city resident, said she has lived on Rochelle Road for 19 years and lived Homer 27 years. Off and on in her neighborhood there have been a lot of junk vehicles and just plain clutter and garbage type junk in people's yards. There is still some, but it certainly is getting better. It is very disgusting and hazardous. Homer is a beautiful place, let's take some pride in it and get rid of the eyesores. She would like to thank the people in her neighborhood who have done just that and others in the community who have participated in getting rid of some of this stuff. She thanked the City for helping financially to get rid of abandoned and junk vehicles. She agrees with the 1500 square feet of storage for 2 drivable vehicles, one recreational, one boat less than 36 feet, one work truck, plus 200 square feet for miscellaneous storage. That seems more than fair. If someone needs more storage, they can go rent it. A neighborhood is just that, not a place to accumulate junk and vehicles that don't run or boats that never see the water.

There were no further comments and Chair Minsch closed the public hearing.

KRANICH/HIGHLAND MOVED TO BRING THE DRAFT ORDINANCE TO THE FLOOR FOR DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE AMENDMENT.

Commissioner Kranich commented that this has been discussed several times at the Commission level and it has been refined to where it should work for most people.

Regarding enforcement, there was discussion that it should be identifiable if a vehicle sits longer than the number of days allowed. It was clarified that line 182 refers to one year after adoption of the ordinance. It was noted that the commercial districts are not included as they have different provisions than the residential chapters, and City Planner Abboud said he could provide the Commission with a better explanation at another time.

KRANICH/DOLMA MOVED TO FORWARD THE DRAFT ORDINANCE ZONING ENFORCEMENT TO CITY COUNCIL AND RECOMMEND ADOPTION.

There was no further discussion.

SUBJECT: Storage in UR, RR, RO & Nonconforming (Outdoor Storage)

Introduction

In the City's efforts to meet the intention of residential zoning districts, the City has found that enforcing excessive outdoor storage is problematic. If complaints are a gauge to what is not acceptable, it is parcels that have more than six vehicles and that have the appearance of a "continual garage sale." Currently, Homer City Code burdens the City with proving that items stored outside are "incidental to the residential use" and to demonstrate that a vehicle is "inoperable." This draft ordinance eliminates these subjective determinations.

Purpose of the residential districts

The purpose of the residential districts is to provide a sound environment and the preserve and enhance the residential qualities.

Staff interprets that excessive outdoor storage does not provide a sound environment or preserve and enhance the residential qualities of the neighborhood.

Applicable Comprehensive Plan Goals for residential districts: Chapter 4, Land Use

Goal 2:

Maintain the quality of Homer's natural environment and scenic beauty.

Goal 3:

Encourage high-quality buildings and site development that complement Homer's

beautiful natural setting.

Goal 5:

Maintain high-quality residential neighborhoods; promote housing choice by

supporting a variety of dwelling options.

Draft ordinance

This draft ordinance also eliminates the subjective determination of "orderly manner" and "incidental to residential use" and "operable" vehicle by setting a maximum area for outdoor stage.

Based on work sessions conversations staff has increased the area for outdoor storage coverage to a maximum of 1,500 square feet. The maximum of 1,500 square feet provides for what some people consider "typical Homer storage:"

- 400 sf for two vehicles (Snowbirds may need to store two vehicles for eight months, or 240 days)
- 300 sf for one Recreational Vehicle
- 360 sf for one boat (boats less than 36 ft in length)
- 200 sf for one work truck
- <u>200 misc. storage</u> 1,460 total coverage

Line 41. Let's assume that the average single-family residence has an approximate footprint of 1,500 sf. When the outdoor storage area exceeds 1,500 sf the "principal residential use" of the property is questionable and overtaken by outdoor storage.

Line 44. Outdoor storage "as an accessory use incidental to residential use..." Incidental use begins to conflict with the purpose of both residential and business districts when it dominates the use of the property. If "incidental" is one that is "minor in relation to the primary use" then 1,500 sf seems a Homer typical benchmark.

Line 46-47. Staff recommends eliminating references to ownership of commercial fishing gear. Proving ownership of fishing gear is burdensome and the line between commercial and noncommercial boats is thin.

The work session conversation also explored amending the ordinance to include the Central Business District (CBD). Currently, storage in the CBD in limited to "enclosed buildings" per HCC 21.18.020(k)(v) and HCC 21.18.030(i). Extending this draft ordinance into CBD would conflict with the above code citations and the Community Design Manual. Therefore, staff does not recommend extending the draft ordinance into the CBD.

Other communities

As foreclosures increase, some communities have adopted the International Property Maintenance Code which "governs the minimum conditions and the responsibilities of persons for maintenance of structures." In particular, the 2003 IPMC does not allow the storage of inoperative or unlicensed motor vehicles (IPMC 302.8). Properties shall be free from any accumulation of rubbish or garbage (IPMC 307.1).

Juneau Junkyard means a lot or portion thereof, where junk is bought, sold, exchanged, scrapped, baled, cleaned, packed, disassembled, handled or stored. The term "junkyard" also includes auto-wrecking yards, house-wrecking yards, used-lumber yards, and any storage of junk occupying more than 200 square feet outside an enclosed building. JCC 49.80.

Portland Disabled vehicles. No storage of a disabled vehicles for more than 7 days unless the vehicle is enclosed within a legally permitted building or unless it is stored by a

licensed business enterprise dealing in junked vehicles lawfully conducted within the City. PCC 29.20.010 Outdoor Maintenance Requirements.

Remove unless specifically authorized by ordinance to do otherwise:

- 1. Accumulations of wood pallets.
- 2. All firewood that is not stacked and useable.
- 3. Accumulations of vehicle parts or tires.
- 4. All construction materials except those that are stored in a manner to protect their utility and prevent deterioration...
- **5.** All appliances or appliance parts except for storage of appliances that are reasonably expected to be used at the site and are stored in a manner to protect their utility and prevent deterioration.
- **6.** All indoor furniture except that which is stored in a manner to protect its utility and prevent deterioration and is reasonably expected to be used at the property.
- 7. All recycling materials except for reasonable accumulations (amounts consistent with a policy of regular removal) that are stored in a well-maintained manner.

Anchorage

In 2004 Dykstr v. Municipality of Anchorage a Supreme Court case affirmed that car storage does not meet the purpose of residential district (R-3 Multi-family). The brief notes that "two-and three-car families are commonplace." "Uncommon extremes" violate the "accessory use customarily incidental to a residential neighborhood."

Junk means any worn-out, wrecked, scrapped, partially or fully dismantled, discarded tangible material, or combination of materials or items, including junk vehicles as defined in Section 15.20.010. Also included are machinery, metal, rags, rubber, paper, plastics, chemicals and building materials which cannot, without further alteration and reconditioning, be used for their original purpose. ACC 21.35 Definitions.

Junk vehicle means a vehicle that:

- 1. Is not currently registered....
- 2. Is stripped, wrecked or otherwise inoperable due to mechanical failure:
- 3. Has not been repaired because of mechanical difficulties or because the cost of repairs required to make it operable exceeds the fair market value of the vehicle; or
- 4. Is in a condition which exhibits more than one of the following elements:
 - a. Broken glass;
 - b. Missing wheels or tires;
 - c. Missing body panels or parts; or
 - d. Missing drive train parts

STAFF RECOMMENDS discuss changes presented by staff, amend if so desired and send to public hearing:

Line 43-44 Amend the draft ordinance to allow private outdoor storage in safe and orderly manners occupying an area not **exceeding 1,500 square feet.**

Line 46. Eliminate reference to ownership of commercial fishing gear. commercial fishing gear owned by an occupant who is permitted to engage in commercial fishing under federal or state law.

Line 48. Increase the number of stored vehicles from two to five vehicles and allow storage for upto 240 consecutive days. not more than two five stored motor vehicles owned by an occupant. A motor vehicle is stored if it is not moved for at least 30 240 consecutive days.

Line 70-157 Clarify that the amendments represent all the residential zoning districts.

There was discussion of the challenges of dealing with junk cars currently and the requirement to have someone who can come in and establish the vehicle is inoperable and having cooperation from the owner to have access to the vehicle.

Chair Minsch called for a short break at 8:15 p.m. The meeting resumed at 8:18 p.m.

Introduction

In our efforts to enforce nuisance property and facilitate of the removal of junk cars, we have found the code problematic in the way it deals with storage, especially junk cars.

Currently, by my interpretation, one of the ways to deal with removal of junk cars is under title 18 where it refers to abandon vehicles. If they are not abandoned, this is not too useful. The other way of going after this would be as junk, using the definition of junk vehicles. It is pretty much illegal to store dismantled vehicles, unless you are permitted as a junk yard, but many junkers may appear to be operable. It just too burdensome to investigate and prove that vehicles are inoperable in order to enforce regulations regards the storage of junk. In order to make it more understandable and enforceable, I suggest that we have some sort of limit on the number of vehicles or the space that they may occupy. I talked to the attorney to develop something more clear cut.

Attorney Comments

The attachment is the first of several documents that I will be working on to develop more effective methods of zoning enforcement. It establishes limitations on storage as an accessory use in residential zones. In particular, it limits the lot area that can be used for storage, requires that stored items be owned by an occupant of the property, limits the number of motor vehicles that can be stored, and limits the period during which nonconforming storage can be grandfathered.

The quantities used for these limitations are merely placeholders, which you and the Planning Commission may adjust to establish quantities that are reasonable for Homer.

Notable Changes

Line 41 removes terminology of "incidental" and further prescribes a "principle" residential use. Not much of a change other than possible narrowing down some possibilities (that I cannot seem to think of an example at this time - do we have the storage of things not incidental to the "primary" residential use?).

Lines 43 - 44 describe an area of not more than 400 square feet. This needs discussion. I do not believe that this number may be appropriate in all situations. Perhaps some number this small or a bit larger may be appropriate for an UR district but, maybe less reasonable for the larger lots found in RR?

Lines 46 - 52 further prescribes that commercial fishing gear is owned by an occupant who is permitted for such an activity, no storage for your buddies.

Not more than 2 "stored" vehicles (not moved for at least 30 days) allowed per property. Is this adequate for the snow birds? Two stored trucks approach 400 square feet.

The changes noted above are identical as written for UR, RR and RO districts.

Lines 170-171 nonconforming storage terminates after one year. Perhaps a date would be added after passage by the City Council.

Recommendation

Review and suggest date for public hearing(s) or schedule time for further review.

COMMENTS OF THE AUDIENCE

Members of the audience may address the Commission on any subject. (3 minute time limit)

Beau Burgess, city resident, thanked the Commission for taking more time to review the fine details of the steep slope and fill ordinances. He thinks there should be some attention to recourse of how to constructively use concrete and macro woody debris rather than seeing it in a land fill. On a humorous note, he said he does drive a small dump truck and parks it on his property.

Dr. Nancy Livingston, city resident, thanked the Commission for consideration of the fill ordinance and urged them to move something forward in a reasonable time frame and not stall indefinitely something that has been going on for a historical period of time. More complicatedly with the number of subdivisions in Homer the fact that those subdivisions have very small lots and anything done between two property owners on one common line not only affects the two property owners but also properties below them. Drainage down her lot line affects two houses below hers and the home adjacent to hers affects three. She was not afforded an opportunity of agreement with the common land owner but confronted with a situation that caused disastrous damage that should not have to happen to the 59 other homeowners in the subdivision. As it stands there is a total absence of this not recurring by not having any definition to the fill codes. She submits that there needs to be guidelines that are applicable to large and small estates and there needs to be some common base line that is more focused as opposed to just having a privilege for two people who share a common lot line and agree on their property. They can not mandate what happens on other adjoining properties and what might satisfy two may be very damaging to others. That being a given the Commission could consider a moratorium on subdivision or in real estate for selling these properties without people being forewarned through warning waiver and liability.

Scott Adams, city resident, advised the Commission that he was unaware of the CUP 10-08 at 5655 Scenic View Place. He said he is one of the affected land owners and he did not receive any notice about the proposed CUP. He questions where they propose to put the additional building because he thinks it will be on Skyline Drive, which affects his property because they abut a driveway to his property and that happened about 4 years ago. He has the property on Skyline and also on Scenic Place. He said he is not happy about this situation.

A RESOLUTION OF THE HOMER CITY COUNCIL FINDING THE NEED TO CREATE THE KACHEMAK DRIVE PHASE TWO WATER AND SEWER LOCAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT, AND SCHEDULING A PUBLIC HEARING ON THE NECESSITY OF THE IMPROVEMENT AND PROPOSED IMPROVEMENT PLAN AT THE APRIL 11, 2011 REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

WHEREAS, The City of Homer ("City") formed the Kachemak Drive Phase Two Water and Sewer Local Improvement District ("District") by the adoption of Resolution 05-81(S) on July 25, 2005; and

WHEREAS, The original engineer's estimate of the cost of constructing the improvements in the District was \$2,626,525, and the original petition to form the District was based on an estimated total project cost of \$3,277,953, of which 25% was to be paid by the Homer Accelerated Water and Sewer Program and 75% was to be paid by special assessments on benefited properties; and

WHEREAS, The solicitation of bids to construct the improvements in the District was delayed due to difficulties in easement acquisition and a lengthy environmental permitting process; and

WHEREAS, When bids to construct the improvements in the District were opened on October 7, 2010, the apparent lowest responsive bid exceeded 115% of the engineer's estimate, and the City rejected all bids; and

WHEREAS, The City has obtained an updated engineer's estimate of the cost of constructing the improvements of \$3,304,058, based on current construction costs and a redesign of some elements of the project, and an estimated total project cost of \$3,935,280; and

WHEREAS, The Council finds that the project continues to be necessary to the health, safety and welfare of residents of the District, and benefits the properties that are located in the District; and

WHEREAS, Under HCC 17.04.030(d), the Council may determine that an improvement is needed, and initiate a local improvement district by a resolution approved by a vote of not less than three-fourths of the Council.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Council hereby finds the need to create the Kachemak Drive Phase Two Water and Sewer Local Improvement District, and that

Recommendation to Formally Adjustment LID Costs

In 2005, the Council approved the creation of a water and sewer LID for the above referenced project. The engineer's estimate for construction was \$2,626,525; total project costs were estimated to be \$3,277,953; and property owner's assessments were estimated to be \$28,586.80.

In 2010, the project was bid with an engineer's estimate of \$2,986,382; total project costs were estimated to be \$3,479.104; and property owner's assessments were estimated to be \$29,992.28. Unfortunately, the City was unable to award the project to the low bidder due to errors in the bid.

Public Works is preparing to bid the project again in the next few months. Based on bids received in 2010, The new engineer's estimate is \$3,304,058; the total project cost is estimated to be \$3,935,280; and property owner's assessments are now estimated to be \$33,924.83.

In 2010, the City could have awarded the construction contract at the revised engineer's estimate, because it not greater than 15% of the original engineer's estimate. Although the plans now reflect some cost cutting measures; new Clean Water act requirements regarding storm water runoff from construction sites may increase costs of construction. Since it takes three and a half months to obtain property owners approval to award at more than 15% of the estimate, it makes sense to initiate the approval of property owners now so that we do not miss another summer construction season.

Recommendations: The City Council pass an resolution finding the need to adjust the LID project costs and formally initiating the public hearing process and non-objection period.

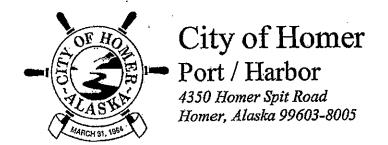

Discussion

The Request for Proposals for the replacement of the Card Reader Access System for the cranes and ice on the Homer Fish Dock and Deep Water Dock closed Tuesday, February 8, 2011.

This Request for Proposals was advertised in the Homer News January 13th and 20th; and in the Anchorage Daily News January 16th.

Proposal Results

The Port of Homer requested a total of four proposals:

- Fish Dock Proposal #1: for the design, furnishing, and installation of materials on the Fish Dock.
- Fish Dock Proposal #2: for the design and furnishing only of materials on the Fish Dock.
- Deep Water Dock Proposal #1: for the design, furnishing, and installation of materials for both docks.
- Deep Water Dock Proposal #2: for the design and furnishing only of materials for both docks.

The Port reserved the right to remove the Deep Water Dock portion of the project based on a cost/need review.

There were a total of five responders to the Request for Proposals. A team made up of City staff met for the purpose of evaluating and scoring the responses for the Crane Card Access System Upgrade. The team scored the proposals as per the grading criteria laid out in the Request for Proposals.

After careful review, staff recommends awarding the work to ATS Alaska for their proposed option of Fish Dock Proposal #1 for a total cost of \$53,144.00.

Recommendation

Award the proposal for work to ATS Alaska, 139 E 51st Avenue, Ste. 100 Anchorage, AK 99503, for a total cost of \$53,144.00.

GFOA Members Urged to Submit Comments on Proposed Municipal Advisor Definition

The Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) has proposed arule (34-63576) that defines municipal advisors as those providing advice to the municipal entity about issuing municipal securities, swap transactions, and/or investment strategies. These municipal advisors are subject to new Dodd-Frank registration, disclosure, and other requirements.

To the alarm of the GFOA and many others in the state and local-government community, the proposal would also require appointed board members of a municipal bond issuer or entity that invests governmental funds to register as municipal advisors with the SEC and the Municipal Securities Rule making Board (MSRB).

The GFOA's Governmental Debt Management Committee developed a new policy statement on this matter, which is available on the GFOA's Web site. A list of talking points to assist members with their SEC comment letters is also posted on the site. Comments to the SEC are due February 22, 2010.

INVESTMENT AND COLLATERALIZATION OF PUBLIC FUNDS

Sections:

- 3.10.010 Scope. This chapter applies to the investment of all City monies, unless otherwise provided expressly by ordinance. (Ord. 93-14 § 3, 1993)
- 3.10.015 Objectives. The City investment portfolio shall be managed so that the portfolio, as a whole, meets the objectives set forth below. All persons selecting investments for City monies shall adhere to these objectives, which are listed in order of relative importance.
 - ' (1) Safety of principal;
 - (2) Maintain sufficient liquidity to meet the City's cash flow requirements; and
 - (3) Achieving a reasonable market rate or return.

Not withstanding the above objectives, no person shall invest City monies in a manner which violates any provision of this chapter or the administrative procedures established hereunder. (Ord. 93-14 § 3, 1993)

- 3.10.020 Delegation of authority. Management responsibility for the investment program is hereby delegated to the Finance Director/Treasurer who shall establish written procedures for the operation of the investment program, consistent with this investment policy. Such procedures shall include explicit delegation of authority to persons responsible for investment transactions. No person may engage in an investment transaction except as provided under the terms of this policy and the procedures established by the Finance Director/Treasurer. Finance Director/Treasurer shall be responsible transactions undertaken and shall establish a system of controls to regulate the activities of subordinates. (Ord. 93-14 § 3, 1993)
- 3.10.030 Prudence. All persons having responsibility for making decisions regarding the investment of City monies shall utilize the same judgement and care, under the circumstances then prevailing, that an institutional investor would use in the conduct of an enterprise of a like character and with like aims, not for speculation but for investment, considering the probable safety of capital as well as the probable income to be derived in accordance with the stated objectives. (Ord. 93-14 § 3, 1993)

3.10.040 Authorized investments.

- a. City monies shall be invested only in the following instruments: All securities purchased by the City, and all other City investments, must mature not later than the time indicated below, measured from the date of the City's investment transaction:
 - U.S. Treasury securities 3 years;
 - Other obligations by the U. S. Government, its agencies and instrumentalities - 3 years.
 - 3. Repurchase agreements of acceptable securities listed in subsections 1 and 2 of this section which meet a margin requirement of 102%; provided, however, the maturity limitations specified in those subsections do not apply lift the securities in the repurchase agreement are marked to market daily;
 - 4. Units of the Alaska Municipal League Investment Pool in accordance with an executed common Investment Agreement and in conformance with AS 37.23.010--37.23.900.
 - 5. Certificates of deposit and other deposits at banks and savings and loan associations collateralized as provided in Section 3.10.070 3 years.

- 6. Uncollateralized deposits at banks and savings and loan associations, to the extent that the deposits are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) or the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation 3 years;
- 7. Taxable bonds or notes which are issued by any state or political subdivision thereof, and which are graded AA or higher by Moody's Investor's Service, Inc., or Standard and Poor's Corporation 3 years;
- 8. Commercial paper graded A1 or higher by Moody's Investor's Service, Inc., or P1 or higher by Standard and Poor's Corporation 270 days;
- 9. Bankers' acceptances offered by banks rates at least "AA" by Moody's or Standard and Poor's;
- 10. Money market mutual funds whose portfolios consist entirely of instruments specified in subsection 1, 2 and 3 above with net asset value of \$1.00.
- b. No person shall invest any City monies in any instrument which is not listed in subsection a. This prohibition includes but is not limited to, investment of City monies in any mutual fund (except as otherwise provided in subsection a (10), common or preferred stock, precious metals, zero coupon bonds, corporate bonds, option contract or futures contract.
- This chapter represents the maximum amount of authority and discretion which the Finance Director/Treasurer may utilize in investing City monies. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed, however, to prohibit the Finance Director/Treasurer for adopting standards, rules, policies and procedures which restrictive than those contained in this chapter. The enumeration in this chapter of instruments which are authorized for City investments shall not be construed as requiring the Finance Director/Treasurer to invest in all, or any particular instrument contained in said list at any given time. The Finance Director/Treasurer may invest in some or all of said instrument as deemed appropriate. Similarly, the enumeration of instruments which are acceptable as collateral for City investments shall not be construed as requiring the Finance Director/Treasurer to accept all or any particular, instrument contained in said list at any given time. The Finance Director/Treasurer may accept some of said instruments, and reject others. (Ord. 93-14 § 3, 1993)

3.10.050 Placement of City investments.

- a. Because of rapid fluctuations of interest rates and the brief period of availability of some securities, bids may be solicited, received, and accepted, either orally or in writing. Solicitation, receipt, and acceptance of bids by telephone is authorized. In order for a bid to be responsive, it must meet all the specifications and requirements of the bid solicitation. The Finance Director/Treasurer shall not consider nonresponsive bids.
- b. The Finance Director/Treasurer shall award a bid to the financial institution whose bid best fulfills the investment objectives contained in 3.10.010, considering the City investment portfolio as a whole.
- c. All securities transferred to or from the City, except securities transferred as collateral, shall be transferred using the delivery versus payment method. Securities transferred as collateral shall be actually received by the custodial bank designated by the Finance Director/Treasurer may require financial institutions to deliver collateral to a custodial bank prior to bidding on City investments. (Ord. 93-14 § 3, 1993)
- 3.10.060 Diversification. City investments shall be diversified to minimize the risk of loss resulting from over concentration of investments in a specific maturity, a specific issuer, a specific class of security or a specific financial institution. Investments will be diversified to maintain a degree of liquidity. The Finance Director/Treasurer shall adopt administrative procedures to implement this section. (Ord. 93-14 § 3, 1993)

3.10.070 Collateralization.

a. If City monies are invested in certificates of deposit or other deposits, the entire amount of principal and interest which will be payable to the City upon maturity of the investment must be collateralized by a combination of the following securities, at the following margin requirements and maturities.

COLLATERAL MARGIN TYPE REQUIREMENT

1. U.S. Treasury Securities with a maturity date 5 years or less from the date of the City's investment transaction.

- 2. Actively traded U.S. Government agency or Instrumentality Securities, except mortgage pass+through securities with a:
 - a. Maturity date 1 year or less from the 103% date of the City's investment transaction.
 - b. Maturity date between 1 and 5 years from 107% the date of the City's investment transaction
- 3. Government National Mortgage Association 120% mortgage pass-through securities.
- 4. Obligations of the State of Alaska and its political subdivisions secured by the full faith, credit and taxing power thereof;
 - a. Maturity date 1 year or less from the 102% date of the City's investment transaction
 - b. Maturity date between 1 and 5 years from 107% the date of the City's investment transaction
- 5. FDIC and FSLIC Insurance 100%
- 6. Securities underlying units in the Alaska Municipal Investment Pool.
- b. A financial institution shall not release, assign, sell, mortgage, lease, transfer, pledge or grant a security interest in, encumber, substitute or otherwise dispose of or abandon all or any part of pledged collateral without prior written authorization of the City. (Ord. 93-14 § 3, 1993)
- 3.10.080 Safekeeping. Procedures and criteria for selection of a custodial or safekeeping institution shall be established under Section 3.10.020 of this chapter. Selection of an institution shall be in accordance with those procedures and the City purchasing code. The Finance Director/Treasurer shall enter into agreements with one or more financial institutions to provide custodial and safekeeping services for City investments. All investments purchased by the City and all securities used as collateral for certificates of deposit, or other deposits, shall be either held directly by the City, or held by a third party custodial bank as agent for the City. Collateral for overnight repurchase agreements shall be pledged to the City but may be held by the financial institution. (Ord. 93-14 § 3, 1993)

- 3.10.090 Agreements. Security agreements instituting this policy will be entered into prior to the purchase of a certificate of deposit or repurchase agreements. (Ord. 93-14 § 3, 1993)
- 3.10.100 Internal controls. The Finance Director/Treasurer shall establish a system in internal controls, which shall be documented in writing. The City's external auditor shall review and evaluate, at least annually, the system of internal controls to ensure that they are adequate for the purposes stated in this section. The controls shall be designed to prevent losses of public funds arising from fraud, employee error, misrepresentation by third parties, unanticipated changes in financial markets, or imprudent actions by employees or officers. (Ord. 93-14 § 3, 1993)
- 3.10.110 Reporting. The Finance Director/Treasurer shall submit quarterly to the City Manager an investment report that summarizes the portfolio in terms of investment securities, maturities, risk categories, returns and other features. The City Manager shall present this report to the City Council in its entirety. (Ord. 93-14 § 3, 1993)
- 3.10.120 Definitions. As used in this chapter, the following definitions apply:
 - 1. "Actively traded" means a security which is frequently bought or sold on a nationally recognized market.
 - 2. "Delivery vs. Payment" means that a security will be delivered to safekeeping before cash is paid for the security.
 - 3. "Financial institution" means a bank, savings and loan association, or securities dealer.
 - 4. "Margin requirement" means the amount by which the market value of the securities collateralizing a transaction exceeds the amount lent.
 - 5. "Marked to market" means to value a security at its current sales price.
 - 6. "Money market mutual funds" means a mutual fund which maintains a constant share price regardless of market fluctuations and which has an average maturity for its entire portfolio of one year or less.

- 7. "Pledged" means specific securities set aside as collateral which are identified to a specific account.
- 8. "Bankers' acceptances" means an order to pay a certain amount of money on a certain date and bearing an unconditional promise of a bank to pay the draft at maturity. Bankers acceptances are secured by the credit worthiness of the bank and a U.S. Corporation as well as goods underlying the transaction.
- 9. "Commercial paper" means an unsecured promissory note of a corporation backed by a line of credit with a bank, issued for a specific amount and maturing on a specific day.
- 10. "Repurchase agreements" means short term transactions consisting of the purchase of a security with the promise to return it at a later date.
- 11. "U.S. Government agency or instrumentality securities" means obligations of the U.S. Government issued on behalf of U.S. Government departments through the Federal Financing Bank and securities issued by U.S. Government-sponsored enterprises or quasi-public corporations.
- 12. "U.S. Treasury Securities" means a security that is backed by the full faith and credit of the U.S. Government.
- 13. "Net Asset Value" means the invested fund's value remains the same. Any value above that is treated as income, i.e. invest \$1.00 today and withdraw \$1.00 tomorrow plus interest earned. (Ord. 93-14 § 3, 1993)
- 3.10.130 Governance of Homer Permanent Fund Assets. a. In investing and managing the monies of the Permanent Fund established pursuant to HCC Chapter 3.12, the persons having responsibility for making decisions shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which an institutional investor of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercises in the management of large investments entrusted to it, not in regard to speculation, but in regard to the long term investment of funds considering the probable safety of capital as well as probable income, in accordance with the stated objectives of the Permanent Fund.
- b. In order to ensure sound investment strategy, the city council will take action in the following manner:
- 1. The city council shall establish written investment policies by formal resolution which shall be adhered to without exception;
- 2. The city council shall review the investment policies of the permanent fund at least once each year during the first quarter and shall, by formal resolution, re-adopt or modify said policies;

- 3. The city council shall establish, by formal resolution, a plan for the allocation of investment assets each year that provides for the following:
- (a) That earnings available for annual appropriation and distribution shall be confined to the interest, dividends or coupon discounts derived from the investments of the fund. Realized or unrealized gains to the portfolio value are not considered earnings,
- (b) The portfolio of growth sub-fund will be invested primarily in equities, and is exempt from HCC 3.10.040.
- (c) The portfolio of the income sub-fund will be invested primarily in bonds and the other fixed rate securities authorized by HCC 3.10.040 (d) The income sub-fund may be used as a revolving loan for various city capital projects as provided in HCC Chapter 3.12.
- (e) Sets forth portfolio duration, and which establishes performance benchmarks, and which estimates the percentage or amount of that year's annual earnings that would be necessary to retain to inflation-proof the fund principal;
- 4. The city council shall establish a permanent fund investment committee consisting of the finance director, the city clerk, two members of the city council, and two members of the community atlarge. The term of each appointment shall be two years, with initial terms of the city council members and members at-large staggered so that half of the terms will expire each year. The committee shall be appointed by the mayor and confirmed by the city council. The appointment of any city official will automatically terminate on the date when the person no longer holds such city office. Any city council member or member at-large may be removed from the committee at any time by the City Council.
- 5. The committee shall meet at least quarterly to provide direction as required for maintenance of the fund. The committee shall provide regular reports of its activity to the city council.
- 6. The city administration shall maintain on file within the offices of the Finance Department monthly reports which indicate transactions affecting the investment account, to include, at a minimum, transfers of cash into and out of the account, and interest or dividends received by the account;
- 7. The city administration shall order an objective performance evaluation of the investment program every year;
- 8. The city administration shall retain one or more bank custodians to hold all investment cash and fixed income securities of the permanent fund and require that the custodians shall render monthly reports to the administration regarding assets held at both book and market values, and individual transactions which have taken place; that the banks shall have adequate fidelity insurance, and that written contracts be entered into between the city and the custodian banks.

c. The city, with the approval of the city council, shall retain one or more professional investment managers to design portfolios and invest funds in accordance with the written investment policies adopted by the city council. The investment managers shall be registered financial advisers with both the United States Securities and Exchange Commission and the state of Alaska, unless otherwise exempt from registration, and the investment managers shall agree to serve as a fiduciary to the city. Each investment manager shall carry professional liability insurance in an amount satisfactory to the city, and the terms of the investment relationship shall be memorialized in a written contract entered into between the city and the respective investment advisers. (Ord. 05-14(S) §2), 2006)

- 3.12.020 Contributions. a. If monies from the distribution of the Exxon Valdez settlement or other forms of "wind-fall monies" become available to the City, 95% of such funds shall be placed in the Homer Permanent Fund.
- b. "Wind-fall monies" shall be defined as any new monies received by the City from any source other than standard budgeted operating revenues and not allocated to any specific purpose. "Wind-fall monies" do not include bond proceeds, grant funds allocated to a specified purpose, or the proceeds of non-Exxon Valdez litigation when such proceeds are recovered as damages to compensate or reimburse the city for expenditures previously made by the city. In all cases, the City Council's determination of whether monies are "wind-fall" is final and conclusive.
- c. The remaining five percent of Exxon Valdez settlement funds and other wind-fall monies are available to be appropriated by the City Council for grants to the Homer Foundation or other local non-profit organizations for the benefit of the community. (Ord. 05-14(S))
- 3.12.030 Allocation to sub-funds. When a contribution is made to the Permanent Fund pursuant to HCC 3.12.020, the money received shall be allocated to two sub-funds as follows:
- a. Sixty percent of each contribution shall be allocated to an income sub-fund.
- b. Forty percent of each contribution shall be allocated to a growth sub-fund. (Ord. 05-14(S) $\S1$), 2006)
 - 3.12.040 Additions to fund. The City Council may elect to contribute
- monies to the Permanent Fund. Unless otherwise allocated by the council, such contributions shall be allocated to sub-funds pursuant to HCC 3.12.030. (Ord. 05-14(S) §1), 2006)

- 3.12.050 Investment of fund. The sub-funds of Permanent Fund shall be invested and managed in accordance with HCC 3.10.130. (Ord. 05-14(S) \$1), 2006)
- 3.12.060 Expenditures of income. a. Expenditures of Permanent Fund income may be made only as authorized in this chapter.
- b. The income from the income sub-fund may be appropriated by the City Council and be expended for general governmental purposes, including but not limited to ordinary operating expenses.
- c. The income from the growth sub-fund shall not be expended. It shall be added to the principal of the growth sub-fund and reinvested. (Ord. 05-14(S) §1), 2006)
- 3.12.070 Loans from income sub-fund. The principal of the income sub-fund may be used as a source of loan funds for city capital projects, and not as a grant. To be eligible for such a loan the project must receive a majority of its funding from other sources. Such loans shall be on terms approved by resolution of the City Council, which must provide for the repayment of the loan over a reasonable period of time. (Ord. 05-14(S) \$1), 2006)
- 3.12.080 Expenditure of principal. a. Expenditures of Permanent Fund principal may be made only as authorized in this section.
- b. Except as a source of loan funds as provided in subsection 3.12.070, the principal of both the income sub-fund and the growth sub-fund shall, neither be distributed nor spent without the authorization of sixty percent of city voters at a regular or special election.
- c. Prior to submitting to the voters the question of whether to distribute or spend funds from the principal of the Permanent Fund, the City Council shall find that all reasonable options for borrowing have been exhausted, including the option of borrowing from the Homer Permanent Fund pursuant to section 3.12.070. (Ord. 05-14(S) §1), 2006)

WHEREAS, The Task Force has held regular meetings, reviewed reports by the staff, heard presentations by interested parties including Enstar, and provided opportunities for public comment; and

WHEREAS, The Task Force has provided a set of recommendations to the Council in Memorandum 11-038; a copy of which is attached and incorporated herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Homer City Council hereby approves and adopts the recommendations provided by the Task Force in Memorandum 11-038.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council will actively pursue State funding for construction of the primary gas transmission line from Anchor Point and authorizes the City administration to initiate a coordinated and comprehensive public education and lobbying strategy to help ensure success.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council will continue with the planning effort and prepare for the arrival of natural gas and authorizes the administration to prepare the necessary ordinances for Council consideration.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council will work to select the best possible funding source and financing mechanism for expanding the natural gas distribution system within the Homer City limits.

Introduction

The Homer City Council created the Homer Natural Gas Distribution Task Force through the adoption of Resolution 10-75. Resolution 10-75 provided that the scope of work for the Task Force shall include:

- Review the range of distribution system financing options and make recommendations to the Council.
- Review current City Code related to Local Improvement Districts and utility construction practices and permitting and make recommendations regarding necessary code amendments to the Council.
- Function as a "review board" for Enstar's plans to construct the distribution system.
- Prepare a written plan which addresses the financing, permitting, and construction of a potential gas distribution system within the City limits.

The Task Force convened five regular meetings during which it received staff reports, heard a presentation from Enstar, and received testimony from the public regarding the scope of work items contained in the resolution. The Task Force paid special attention to the legislative intent language contained in the Capital Budget last year, political considerations surrounding legislative approval of Phase II of the main transmission line, political and financial considerations related to public financing of the both the transmission line and the distribution system in town, amendments that might be required to the Homer City Code, potential "build-out scenarios, and potential incentives or financing options for stimulating construction of a distribution network within the City.

At its regular meeting on February 28th, the Task Force considered a draft resolution and a staff memorandum which both contained proposed recommendations for the Council. The draft resolution was originally based upon a set of points presented by the Chair to support his recommendation that the Council ask the voters to approve using a portion of HART funds to finance the distribution system mains (the lines in the street). The memorandum was an attempt to help frame the discussion and provide a roadmap for completing the scope of work.

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The Task Force amended the resolution and the amended version appears in your packet for consideration. The Task Force also voted yes on all three questions posed in the memorandum and requested that a new memorandum incorporating those items also be forwarded to Council.

At the end of the meeting, the Task Force voted to "stand down" and suspend operations for now. It did so because it concluded that it had completed its assigned tasks to the extent that it could given current conditions circumstances. For example, it will not know what the actual "build-out plans" will be until it is known if the primary transmission line is funded and which institutions and businesses attempt to hook-up first. Although the Task Force discussed possible build-out plans with Enstar, the current uncertainty makes it difficult to "function as a review board for Enstar's plans to construct the distribution system" in a comprehensive way. Further, it is difficult to perform this function since no actual permits have been applied for. So, instead of disbanding, the Task Force decided it was best to just suspend operations until more information is known or until the Council gives it additional tasks.

Recommendations of the Task Force

Following are the Task Force recommendations that resulted from discussion of the staff memorandum referenced above.

The Primary Transmission Line / Anchor Point to Homer to Kachemak City

RECOMMENDATION: The Task Force recommends that the City Council aggressively pursue state funding for Phase II of the pipeline project to get natural gas into the Homer area.

<u>Discussion</u>: The Task Force recognizes that the Council has already moved the project up on its CIP List and has directed the City lobbyist and staff to work on the project with legislators and the governor's office. It recognizes further that the staff have been making informational presentations at various civic group functions and distributing spread sheets illustrating potential energy cost savings.

However, the Task Force concluded that much more can and should be done and that it was important for the Council to make itself heard with an unambiguous and clear voice. The Task Force found that getting natural gas to Homer is potentially one of the biggest economic development projects Homer has seen in many years. The positive impacts on the overall economy are potentially substantial. Natural gas would lower the cost of living, lower the cost of doing business, help to keep taxes down, and put the community on an equal footing with the rest of Southcentral Alaska. When North Slope gas eventually makes its way to this area and/or new gas discoveries are brought on line locally, Homer will be in a position to benefit.

Natural gas would also reduce the City's greenhouse gas emissions and help achieve the goals of the adopted Climate Action Plan. The community has been attempting to get natural gas for decades. It is closer now than ever and the Task Force felt that the City should do all it can to make sure this opportunity does not slip away.

The Task Force suggests that the Council authorize the administration to initiate a coordinated and comprehensive strategy to educate the public and our elected officials about the benefits of the project and advocate for its funding. Some of this effort would be performed using information provided by Enstar. The strategy could include things like:

- Draft newspaper articles and Points of View.
- Post information on the City website.
- Disseminate information regarding the overall impacts to the Homer economy.
- Provide information on potential energy costs savings for residential, business, and institutional / public buildings.
- Provide information on the estimated costs to convert and hook-up to natural gas.
- Provide information about potential "build-out" scenarios and their cost.
- Provide information about potential financing options and what that might cost property owners if Council chooses to provide those incentives.
- Organize or assist in organizing a community-wide letter writing / lobbying campaign.
- Organize or help to organize a broad-based regional coalition to meet with the Governor and key legislators.

Planning in Advance

RECOMMENDATION: The Task Force recommends that the City Council authorize the administration to prepare the ordinances needed to amend the municipal code and pave the way for the arrival of natural gas.

<u>Discussion</u>: The Task Force spent a significant amount of time discussing the points contained in the legislative intent language in last year's capital budget. Council will recall that one of the points was that Homer should have a plan in place to prepare for the gas distribution system within the City limits. The Task Force concluded that it was important for the City to be able to show the legislature and the Governor that the City had a plan and that it was actively preparing for arrival of gas. The Task Force agreed that doing this could help to avoid another veto given what the Governor said in his veto message last year.

There are several amendments to the code that would be necessary. The first would be amendments to Title 13 to provide for standard construction practices and permitting to place

natural gas lines within City rights-of-way. If the Council chooses to make available natural gas local improvement districts, then amendments would be needed to Title 17. If the Council chooses to utilize any of the other financing options discussed below, additional ordinances and code amendments may be required. The Task Force recommends that the Title 13 code amendments be prepared and approved quickly. Ordinances related to financing options for street mains could follow at a later date after the Council has time for deliberation.

Financing Options

RECOMMENDATION: The Task Force recommends that the City Council work to select the best funding source possible for the natural gas distribution system within the City limits.

<u>Discussion</u>: The question of whether the City should provide financing for the distribution system generated perhaps the most discussion at Task Force meetings. This is the most important decision the Council will have to make. There are many financial, economic, and political considerations that the Council will have to weigh. Most of the discussion centered around whether the City should pay for or finance construction of the main lines in the streets. (The State is being asked to fund the primary transmission line from Anchor Point only). Local property owners would be responsible for getting the service connection to their buildings.

The Task Force concluded that the City should provide financing and incentives because it would accelerate the build-out phase which would benefit the overall economy and make the transition to natural gas more affordable for local residents and business owners. Doing this might also demonstrate to the Legislature and the Governor that support in Homer for this project is so strong that the City Council is willing to provide local matching money and assume some of the risk. The Task Force also felt it would be helpful to make it known that HART funds were potentially available for a local match.

One point should be made clear. The City is not obligated to do anything in this regard. Doing nothing has been referred to by the staff as the "No Action" alternative. This approach has advantages and disadvantages like any other. Enstar already has a procedure for expanding the distribution system that is approved and regulated by the Regulatory Commission of Alaska. Under this program, local property owners pay for extending mains to their properties and can be reimbursed later when other landowners hook up to the extension. Enstar estimates that under this scenario, build-out will occur naturally throughout Homer in approximately ten years without any City financing or financial assistance.

The Task Force reviewed a list of financing options that were prepared by the staff. The memorandum describing those options is attached. The Memorandum also includes a brief

discussion of the relative advantages and disadvantages of each option. In the end, the Task Force decided to recommend a list of preferred options for Council to consider rather than selecting just one. The Task Force determined that was the best approach because there are still too many unknowns and because this is a political decision as much as a financial and economic one.

The preferred options put forward by the Task Force, in no particular order, are:

Local Improvement Districts

Special Service Areas

A General Mil Rate Increase to finance main lines in the streets throughout the City

Asking voters to make HART Funds available.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force shall have five members, two members of the Homer City Council and three members of the general public; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the three seats reserved for the general public shall be open to all applicants, but City residents with experience in public financing, utilities, utility permitting and regulation, business, and other relevant fields are desirable and encouraged to apply.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the task force shall receive strong staff support which shall at times and as appropriate, include the City Attorney, the City Manager, the Public Works Director, the Finance Director, the City Planner, and other staff members or experts as needed.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Task Force Scope of Work shall include:

 Review the range of distribution system financing options and make recommendations to the Council.

- Review current City Code related to Local Improvement Districts and utility construction practices and permitting (relevant portions of Chapters 11, 13, and 17) and make recommendations regarding necessary code amendments to the Council.
- Function as a "review board" for Enstar's plans to construct the distribution system.
- Prepare a written plan which addresses the financing, permitting, and construction of a potential gas distribution system within the City limits.

version

The purpose of this memo is to describe the potential financing mechanisms that have been investigated by staff so far. Some were determined to be unworkable for Homer but are included here to provide a more complete picture of the research that has taken place to date. (Also, it appears that a couple of these programs might work for neighboring communities.) The second part of the memo describes options which should work within Homer city limits and therefore deserve further consideration by the task force.

These programs have been ruled out for Homer:

- 1. The City of Homer, in cooperation with Representative Paul Seaton's office, has investigated several USDA grant and loan programs to see if they might be a source of funding for the natural gas pipeline project within Homer. The short answer is "no." The programs are summarized below.
 - Rural Economic Development Loan Program: Kachemak City might be able to use this program to secure up to \$750,000 in a 0% loan guaranteed through a property tax assessment. Homer Electric Association would have to be willing to act as an intermediary on the loan. (Kachemak City has approached HEA with this proposition.) Because the maximum available in any given year is only \$750,000 (statewide), the program is not adequate to meet needs within the City of Homer.
 - Rural Business Enterprise Grant Program: This program is intended to "support the development of small and emerging private business enterprises in rural areas." Our thinking was that the availability of natural gas would support business development. However, we learned that because the gas distribution system would be owned by a large company (Enstar) rather than a small company, the project would not be eligible for funding.
 - Rural Energy for America Program: This program is used to fund both renewable energy programs and
 energy efficiency improvements. We had thought that because natural gas infrastructure would make it
 possible to increase energy efficiency (e.g, in boilers and other equipment), our project might be eligible.
 However, we were told that a natural gas distribution system would be outside the parameters of the
 grant program.

2. The City also investigated whether areas within city limits would be eligible to apply for status as a <u>Kenai</u> <u>Peninsula Borough Utility Special Assessment District</u> (USAD). The answer is no, because the program only applies to unincorporated areas within the borough. **Anchor Point** is looking at this program. It would add a special assessment to property taxes in areas where a majority of property owners agree to form the USAD. Loans are repaid in this fashion with an interest rate equivalent to the prime rate in effect at the time plus 2%.

These programs could work in Homer:

1. <u>Enstar's Main Line Extension Agreement Program</u>: Within its tariff approved by the Regulatory Commission of Alaska, Enstar can extend main lines into neighborhoods through agreements with property owners who request the extension. In this situation, Enstar determines the cost, which is then paid by the property owner in one lump payment. If it is necessary for a line to cross under a street (because lines are run only on one side of a street; not both), Enstar will pick up that cost. Likewise, if Enstar decides to put in a larger line (larger than the typical 2-inch pipe) in anticipation of future needs, current property owners involved in the Main Line Extension Agreement will not be asked to pay the additional cost. When additional property owners ask for natural gas service in future years, a formula is applied so that early customers get some reimbursement.

Currently, Enstar's fees for a main line extension are \$17.90/ft. for the main line (down the street) and \$948 for the first 100 feet of service line (to the house or building), with additional charges of \$2 for every foot thereafter.

2. <u>Mill rate payback</u>: This strategy is the same as the one Kachemak City is currently pursuing. The City would obtain financing for construction of the main lines, and then all property owners would pay for the lines over time through a property tax mill rate increase.

3. <u>Special Service Districts</u>: This is a variation of the mill rate payback strategy. It would assume a phased build-out, neighborhood by neighborhood. Property owners within a neighborhood (defined area) would ask to form a Special Service District. City Council could approve the SSD with no particular threshold of participation. Enstar would provide a cost estimate and the City would obtain financing for construction of mains. Property owners would then repay the costs through a mill rate increase applied only to that service district.

Enstar would provide a cost estimate and then the property owners would reconsider the proposal. 5. (New since last memo): <u>Transform the HART fund to cover costs of natural gas distribution lines</u>. Currently, a dedicated sales tax of three-quarters of a percent (.75%) is collected in Homer to support the

Homer Area Roads and Trails (HART) fund. The fund was first authorized by voters for roads only in 1987, with a sunset date of 2007 unless reauthorized. In October 2006, voters approved continuing the program for an additional 20 years and adding a trails component. (Ten percent of the annual HART revenue is to be used for trails.)

Some observers have remarked that HART is more than adequately funded to meet local demand for new/improved roads (typically requested through the LID process), and that a portion of the dedicated sales tax revenue could be redirected to fund natural gas distribution lines rather than roads. This change would require voter approval.

SUBJECT: Moving Forward / Recommendations to City Council

INTRODUCTION

At the last meeting, the Chair presented a list of recommendations regarding what the Task Force should advise the City Council on the gas line and gas distribution system. There was very little substantive discussion regarding these recommendations in the time that was available. A motion was adopted to put these recommendations in the form of a draft resolution for City Council consideration. A copy of the draft resolution is included in the packet for your deliberation at this meeting.

I hope that you will give this resolution serious consideration. The staff came away with the impression that Task Force members wanted to talk about this some more but felt that they needed to take action of some kind quickly. Further, it is my understanding that the Chair may have some second thought about these recommendations also and will be submitting a memorandum addressing those thoughts. We also get the sense that the Task Force members are feeling some urgency to wrap this process up but that there is uncertainty about the way forward.

My purpose in writing this memorandum is to try and help by suggesting a framework in which the discussion could move ahead. My hope is that these suggestions will help with structure and focus and provide for an exit strategy for the Task Force. The suggestions below are based upon the enabling resolution adopted by the Council which created the Task Force and by the discussion the Task Force has engaged in to date. It seems to me that there are three basic questions that the Council is seeking advice on, most of which you have already discussed in some detail. Those questions are:

You have had discussion on this topic and the many layers of politics surrounding it. The Council has taken steps to raise the profile of the project in the past few weeks. It has moved the pipeline up to Number 2 on the CIP List and it has instructed the City Lobbyist to spend significant amounts of time on it. The Council sent a delegation to Juneau two weeks ago to educate the Governor and key legislators. We told them about how the City is attempting to address the legislative intent language in last year's capital budget. Last week I spoke about this topic at the Chamber meeting and on Coffee Table. I will speak to the Rotary next week. But much more can be done.

If the answer to this question is No, then you should so advise the Council.

If the answer is Yes, then I would suggest that you articulate why it is in the community's interest to do so and recommend to the Council that it authorize the staff, in cooperation with the Chamber and others, to launch a public information campaign and community lobbying effort. This is not going to be an easy task with the Legislature and the Governor. We will need broad based community support. Possible suggestions might include:

- Newspaper Articles, Points of View
- Broader dissemination of information on potential energy cost savings, residential, business, government
- Information about overall economic impact to the Homer economy
- Broader dissemination of information about possible "build-out" scenarios
- Organized community wide letter writing/ lobbying campaign
- · Invitations to Governor and key legislators to meet with broad based coalition of interest groups

The Legislative Intent Language. Should the City Plan in Advance? Yes No

As you know, the Capital Budget last year contained legislative intent language which the Governor referred to in his veto message. One of the important points was that Homer needed to have "a plan" in place in preparation for the arrival of natural gas. Part of being prepared is having the legal and regulatory standards in place for installing gas lines within the City. That would definitely include the adoption of ordinances amending the City Code to regulate the installation of gas lines within the Rights-of-Way. Adopting such an ordinance definitely constitutes planning and preparation, regardless of whether the Council ultimately decides to provide financial incentives to stimulate quicker build-out. If you recommend making financial incentives available (see next question), you could also recommend an ordinance amending the code to provide for gas line Local Improvement Districts.

If your answer to this question is No, The Council should know that.

If you answer is Yes, then it would be helpful if you recommended to Council that the City proceed with all haste to adopt the necessary ordinances and to make the Governor's office aware of that action.

Should the City Provide Financial Incentives to Assist Local Property Owners and Accelerate Build-Out? Yes___No___

If your answer is No, then it would be helpful to advise the Council as to the reasons for this recommendation. It would also be helpful to inform the Council about what the "no action" alternative would mean. In other words, explain Enstar's normal RCA regulated system expansion procedures and what they would mean for build-out in Homer.

If your answer is yes, then it would be good to provide the Council with a set of preferred options and the advantages and disadvantages of each option. Based upon discussions you have had so far, it seems like the range of preferred options would include:

- Local Improvement Districts, LIDS
- Special Service Areas
- Asking Voters to Make HART Funds Available

If you include HART Funds in the preferred options, it would be good to articulate what exactly the funds would be used for. In other words, would they be used to provide the up-front financing for Special Service Districts? Would they be used to pay for main line extensions outright? ETC.

Conclusion:

It is my view, that if the Task Force answers the three questions above and puts those recommendations in a memorandum to the City Council, it will have completed its mission and could dissolve.

I would recommend that these questions be discussed in detail at this meeting. If more information is needed before a decision is made, the staff will do the best it can to get that information to you. If you have the answers now, I recommended adopting the recommendations by motion. The staff will prepare a draft memorandum to the Council for Task Force consideration at the next meeting. If the memorandum is adopted, you are done!!

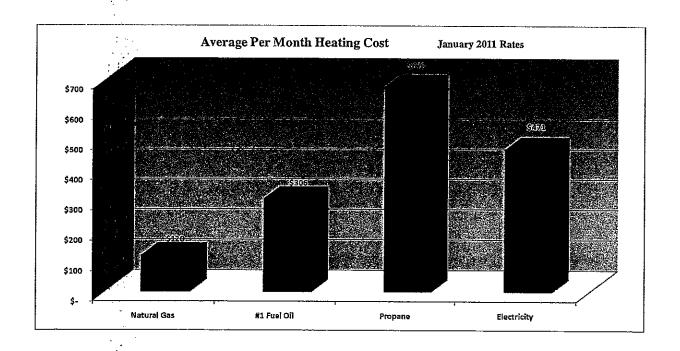

The agenda was approved by consensus of the Task Force.

PUBLIC COMMENTS REGARDING ITEMS ON THE AGENDA

There were no public comments.

RECONSIDERATION

No reconsiderations were scheduled.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

A. February 14, 2010 Synopsis

The synopsis was approved by consensus of the Task Force.

VISITORS

There were no visitors.

STAFF/COUNCIL/BOROUGH/KACHEMAK CITY REPORT

There were no Staff, Kachemak City, or Borough reports

PUBLIC HEARING

No public hearings were scheduled.

PENDING BUSINESS

A. Financing Options

- 1. Memo from City Manager Re: Moving Forward/Recommendations to City Council
- 2. Draft Resolution

Mr. Heimbuch arrived at 12:05 and assumed the Chair.

City Manager Wrede reviewed his memorandum. There was brief discussion of procedure regarding the memorandum and draft resolution.

Mrs. Howard expressed that she is now inclined to think taking the same approach as Kachemak City may be the way to go. It is the easiest to administer financially and the mil rate is a general sweep through the city. It would alleviate having to have certain percentages for districts and keeps neighbors and groups from going against each other. She noted her appreciation of the format of the memorandum from staff and suggested incorporating it into the resolution.

Mr. Zak commented that at the Economic Development District Board meeting concern was expressed that even if the project does make it in the budget, the Governor would still veto a large portion of the gas line because the project is not shovel ready for 2012. Mr. Zak said the information needs to get out that it is feasible for 2012.

Point was raised by Bill Smith through the City Manager that Enstar is planning to do it in one year by having two sets of contractors working in both directions.

Mr. Pate commented that a strong yes on the points of the memorandum would be warranted by the task force, and then it is the council's job to implement it. He believes the information provided with cost break downs is information the public needs and he thanked staff for bringing it to the group.

Chair Heimbuch concurred and recognized their goal of getting something to council and not being a hindrance to the process of moving forward.

HOWARD/ZAK MOVED TO ADOPT THE RESOLUTION AND RECOMMEND SUPPORT.

There was discussion of procedure and efficient ways to incorporate the points in the memorandum.

HOWARD/ZAK MOVED TO AMEND RESOLUTION POINT 1 THAT IT READ WORK TO SELECT THE BEST FUNDING SOURCE POSSIBLE FOR THE NATURAL GAS DISTRIBUTION OFF THE MAIN LINE WITHIN THE CITY OF HOMER.

There was brief discussion clarifying that the rest of the language in #1 would be removed and it still allows for multiple options to consider.

VOTE: NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT

Motion carried.

HOWARD/ZAK MOVED TO STRIKE NUMBER 5 AND 6 IN THE DRAFT RESOLUTION.

There was brief discussion that this allows number 1 to do the work and not be specific. It says we have multiple sources and will select the best one.

VOTE: NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT

Motion carried.

Point was raised that it is important to including the information about Enstar's suggested work schedule. It was noted that it is information that would be more beneficial in the supporting documentation for the resolution.

HOWARD/ZAK MOVED TO STRIKE NUMBER 2.

There was no discussion.

VOTE: NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT

Motion carried.

Question was raised about item 7 and the role of the middleman. Chair Heimbuch explained that in the original charge of the task force they were supposed to act as a sounding board for Enstar's build out and it was something that was incorporated in the resolution from his memo in the last packet. The task force discussed the importance of the city's role in working with Enstar and the public through this process.

HOWARD/ZAK MOVED TO STRIKE "AS A MIDDLEMAN" IN NUMBER 7 AND LEAVE THE REST.

There was no discussion.

VOTE: NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT

Motion carried.

ZAK/HOWARD MOVED TO AMEND NUMBER 4 TO CHANGE LOCAL INSTITUTIONS TO REGIONAL BUILDINGS.

Brief discussion ensued regarding the substantial benefits to all buildings in the city, whether they are city, borough, state, or private institutions.

VOTE: NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT

Motion carried.

City Manager Wrede asked for clarification on the intent of item 3. Chair Heimbuch commented that if the city is going to push this project we need to be pulling Kachemak City's economic engine along with us at every juncture.

There was discussion in support of moving this forward to Council despite its imperfections so they can take it from this point and refine it as they see fit.

VOTE (Main motion as amended): YES: PATE, HEIMBUCH, ZAK, HOWARD

Motion carried.

Discussion ensued regarding the memorandum and how it would be revised to follow the resolution. City Manager Wrede explained it would focus on the task force recommendation to ramp up the public lobbying effort, request administration to work post haste on required ordinance amendments, and that council evaluates the pros and cons of the range of options for funding. The pros and cons for the alternatives will be included. Mrs. Howard requested that HART be included in the options for consideration.

ZAK/HOWARD MOVED TO HAVE ADMINISTRATION PREPARE THE SUPPORTING DOCUMENTS.

There was clarification to include the building cost break downs and the memorandum of January 24th from Special Projects Coordinator Holen.

VOTE: NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT

Motion carried.

Chair Heimbuch asked for recommendations on how to proceed regarding disbanding or future meetings. The members agreed not to schedule a future meeting at this time but acknowledged that they may be requested to come together by council at a future time.

NEW BUSINESS

No new business items were scheduled.

COMMENTS OF THE AUDIENCE

Dave Weber, Kachemak City Representative, said he has done a lot of personal contact to major businesses, minor businesses, and citizens. One thing that keeps coming to the front are people saying they thought it was coming so why write a letter. This includes business that can save \$30,000 to \$40,000 per year on fuel. He would like the City of Homer to send a letter to its citizens and businesses to let them know. If people don't write letters, we won't get support for this. Safeway heats with propane and he expects they spend over \$100,000 a year on heat. Neither Safeway nor Kachemak Wholesale has written letters. He doesn't know how we can wake these people up, but we need to do it.

Anne Marie Holen, city employee and city resident, commented that it has been an interesting exercise working with the task force both from a public policy stand point, and as a home owner. This is relevant to her as when she built her house she hooked up to propane because at that time they were saying natural gas was two years out and she wanted to be ready to convert. She discovered that she cannot afford to heat her house with propane and is now using wood, which has its own issues. She thinks there would be a lot of people eager to switch to natural gas. She expected the task force to come forward and say either the city should take a role in helping to cover the upfront costs by providing an LID or special service districts where homeowners like her could pay the city back. Absent that it may be tough for many homeowners to move quickly to convert. She congratulated the task force on getting their work done. She thinks this is doable and agrees with others who have said we need to get the word out.

Bill Smith commented that Enstar is preparing a map that will give a schematic of how the build out could happen over time with main extensions off the pipeline. That would be within the City of Homer, but he hopes they would do one area wide as well. If Kachemak City comes up with the money up front it will happen within the first year. Otherwise if the City doesn't get any money together to participate in the plan Enstar still anticipates that within 10 years natural gas will be everywhere on the Homer bench including Skyline and Diamond Ridge. He hopes the map will be here in the coming week for Council to look at.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY STAFF

There were no staff comments.

COMMENTS OF THE CHAIR

Chair Heimbuch commented that they are aware in Juneau that people and groups in our region are starting to write letters, but no one is giving us a hard target to aim at. The Governor's office commented to him that if it's such a good idea and saves so much money how come the city isn't stepping up to fund this big line? He responded that they haven't given us anything to shoot at; they sit there with arms crossed waiting to hear it's such a good idea. Mr. Heimbuch said he thinks we need people down there to be more proactive and we need to keep on our Senator and Representative to really be driving this home as much as they can. You see in the paper every other day something about a 150 million dollar bridge or road to Nome or a hydro project. He continues to think that having money available and willing to put it up is the big deal. He agrees with Ms. Holen that we have to do stuff to get in between the homeowners, the institutional buildings, and Enstar and be ready to jump in and do something. He wishes the City Council luck on what they decide to do with this.

COMMENTS OF THE TASK FORCE

Mr. Pate said he agrees whole heartedly that it is incumbent on the council and task force to use every opportunity we can to push forward with the general population of the community as far as educating. It needs to be done rapidly. He doesn't know if there is a way to publish email addresses in Juneau through an article in the paper but it would be important to have that available. He thinks the city has a responsibility to facilitate funding a project of this nature. To him it's no different than a water or sewer system. He hopes the council will see it in that light.

Mrs. Howard thanked Kachemak City reps and Assembly member Smith for coming to the meetings and staff for their work. When we bring this to council she will be making two recommendations, first that we encourage folks to write letters, but more importantly to help with points to be made in the letters and who to send it too. Secondly she will be proposing that when we know gas is coming then we zero in on how to get it from the street to the property owners. Right now we don't need to lock that in but in the meantime Juneau should do their part and we will be working in tandem.

Mr. Zak commented that when he talks about the gas line he hears people say why should we do that for them when they don't do anything for the rest of us? We have to overcome that mentality. Homer is part of the peninsula and just as important of an economic player as others in the Borough. Its 14 miles and \$10 million, but what an important thing for the economic future of the whole Borough to make this all happen.

There being no more business to come before the Committee the meeting adjourned at 1:03 p.m. No further meetings were scheduled.
