Good morning Diana,

This is Bryan Hawkins I'm the Port Director and Harbormaster for Homer's Harbor.

#1 I included a overview of the parking lots that will be seasonally restricted for long term parking (any vehicle parked in excess of 7 consecutive 24 hour days) Please note these areas are the congested areas during the summer months.

#2 Note the overview shows the areas were a person can not park long term May 1 through October 1. The rest of the lots will remain as open public parking and will be signed to allow long term permit parking.

#3 It is true that there is plenty of room on the Spit in the off season however, we felt that consistency in enforcement is needed in order to avoid targeting one user group over others, for instance South side residence verses commercial fishermen. The Spit is also used for Storage of vehicles whose owners for one reason or another have decided to leave on them on the Spit. Often times these become abandoned and there is a cost in staff time and disposal fees. Enforcing the rule year round will give us the ability to fight against the clutter that we have had to deal with over the years.

#4 I would say that when it comes to parking fees on the Spit it has never been the goal of the Port and Harbor Commission to create another revenue stream from parking fees. Rater the fees are used to recapture costs associated with managing parking for the Port/Harbor Enterprise and to help offset the costs of making future improvements. Fees are also a deterrent the goal is not to attract more long term parking to Port properties. If it's free then people are free to abuse the privilege but when a fee is applied and enforced year round, then we'll see the privilege respected.

#5 Yes day use parking lots 1, 2, 3, and 4 will be free in the off season (Labor day to Memorial day)

Dear City Manager Wrede,

I am a year round resident on the south side of Kachemak Bay and keep one car on the Spit. Usually I come over at least once every two weeks for shopping, medical visits, and banking.


A friend forwarded to me a copy of Resolution 11-034(S) Long Term Parking for Homer Spit passed by the city council on March 29th, 2011. It did not contain a map and the wording left me somewhat confused. Could you please clarify for me the following questions.

- 1) Where will the long term lots be and will they be restricted to those who hold the \$200 permits?
- 2) Will the long term permits also allow parking in any other lots (except on Ramps 1-4)? If not, what do we do if the long term lots are full and we don't expect to return in 7 days?
- 3) Why will the enforcement also apply October 2 through April 30 when there is ample parking available on the Spit?
- 4) Is the \$200 fee designed to pay for enforcement? If so, cutting down the number of months' enforcement would make it possible to have a lower fee. Although I can afford the charge, I know many working people who will find it a hardship.
- 5) Annual permits for day use parking for \$250 will allow up to 7 days parking at Ramps 1-4. Will day parking be free in the off-season or will the daily \$5 fee now be collected year round for locals coming out to the Spit?

I understand how difficult it is to rationalize parking on the Spit in the summer. Before putting your resolution into effect, however, I urge you to reconsider the costs of enforcement and who exactly is bearing the brunt of the expense. Providing free parking for visitors is good for Homer's business, but when commercial fishing people and year round residents are the only ones paying for the costs of this new program there is bound to be a howl of protest.



Bob Thompson, a year-round resident across the Bay, called and wants to provide some feedback/suggestions regarding the parking plan before it gets passed on Monday. He does not have internet and will not be able to be at the meeting on Monday evening.

His suggestion is that there be an additional category for residents that allows residents to park for two weeks before having to move their cars, as he can't always get over on a weekly basis. He feels this is forcing residents across the bay into paying \$200 for long term parking, and that the long term parking is not convenient. He also wants to convey that while many residents who reside across the Bay are able to afford the \$200, there are several, including himself, that are on a fixed income, and that \$200 is a large sum of money for them. A second suggestion would be that there be an income threshold implemented around the yearly parking fee,
