VISITORS

A. **Miranda Weiss,** HoPP, Update on the Karen Hornaday Park Playground Project

Miranda Weiss provided an update on the playground project and acknowledged the people contributing to the project's success. The request for funding is for \$50,000 for the new playground. The City secured \$250,000 in state capital funds nearly two years ago for improvements to Karen Hornaday Park. Additionally, the City allocated \$55,000 for improvements at the park. Hopp requests \$50,000 of those funds.

The playground project includes: tree fort, twisty slide, hill slide, a float plane, climbing structures and mats, multiple boats and sandboxes, a train, a water feature, trails, balancing and bouncing structures, boulders, benches, landscaping and swings. There will be a fenced area for the community's youngest members, a tot lot up to age 5, and structures and equipment for everyone else. There will be handicap accessible equipment and trails, and chairs for sitting. Provided funding is met, the playground will be built in a barn raising manner from Sunday, May 20 through Sunday, May 27. There will be hundreds of volunteers working under professional direction from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. with borrowed and donated tools. The goal is to raise \$220,000 to make it happen.

Karen Hornaday Park is about 38 acres that came into public ownership in the 1960's. It was originally a homestead, then the fairgrounds before becoming public land. The acres are restricted by deed so that they are forever dedicated for recreational purposes for the community. Many improvements have been made to the park including the ballfields, campground, and playground. The park has been well used and loved over the years. The Karen Hornaday Park Master Plan was approved June 2009, with an ambitious and inspiring vision for the park. Playground improvements were identified as a priority engaging the community and adopting the playground as a project. HoPP has done just that.

HoPP first got together in April with representatives of the City, the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission, Friends of Woodard Creek, and parents. At the second meeting they had a name, two co-chairs, and a mission. HoPP has developed into a highly organized group with different committees for different things.

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Members include: Rebecca Clark – Fundraising Committee Cheryl Illg – Children's Outreach Todd Steiner – Consultant and Counselor on Construction Deb Cox – Inspired the Project

Angie Newby – Co-chair of Fundraising Committee Kara Clemmons - Childcare Operations Tolya Stonorov – Professional Architect Jarred Cook – Designer and Builder

HoPP is organized, has a number of people doing different things, and over 300 people on their contact list. There is incredible momentum building and \$50,000 from the City would mean a great deal. There is a pending grant with Rasmuson Foundation for \$25,000. HoPP announced a fundraising challenge that before February 27th the group will raise \$22,000 to bring their amount up to \$100,000.

Soldotna Mayor Peter Micciche advocated for the project and provided an overview of a similar playground improvement in Soldotna.

Kenai Peninsula Borough Assemblyman Bill Smith reported the Homer delegation did a fine job in Juneau and was well received. The main topic was the gas line with the message from administration that if not too much money was spent it would not be vetoed. The more the City can get its core area development together the stronger the case will be. There should be significant assistance for the project in Juneau.

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Assemblyman Smith stated the Assembly has not taken a position on HB184.

4. Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission

Parks and Recreation Advisory Commissioner Robert Archibald reported the commission has just revised their strategic plan and has three committees: Karen Hornaday Park, Kachemak Drive Path Committee, and the Spit Campground Committee. The most active is the Karen Hornaday Park Committee. They have been struggling for some time with the Friends of Woodard Creek to see the things they want to happen at the park. The commission is happy to see HoPP come along and recommended to fund the group. HoPP is a dynamic group and it will be another step in keeping the park up. The commission has discussed the park host volunteer program due to vandalism and the investment at Karen Hornaday Park. The commission hopes to make more recommendations for funding at the park as other big entities require repairs.

5. Port and Harbor Advisory Commission

Councilmember Hogan reported he attended the International Pacific Halibut Commission (IPHC) meeting in Anchorage on his own will. Although we lobbied for the meeting in Homer from the large turnout he doesn't think Homer could handle it. The IPHC has been overestimating the biomass for a long time. There are intended harvest restrictions for the next year. The commercial sector will have nearly a 20% cut from last year, a big impact to our halibut landings. At an industry section meeting he was cornered by advocacy groups of the fishermen's organizations. They asked him to bring a message to the Council. This year Homer was made the #2 port and unless they see a demonstration that Homer supports the commercial industry they will make us #4. He invited them to speak to Council directly. The perception is that Homer is anti-commercial. We need to pay attention to the message and address it in a positive manner.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

A. City Manager's Report

1. Memorandum from Port and Harbor Director, Re: End of 2011 Year Update & Upcoming 2012 Projects

At the last meeting, the Council requested a presentation from the Port and Harbor Director which contained the elements of the year-end report he prepared for his staff and the Port and Harbor Commission. Bryan has prepared a written report and a power point presentation for you. His presentation will be the City Manager's report for this meeting. I may have several items that I will report on verbally and of course, the Council can ask questions about items of interest.

Port and Harbor Director Bryan Hawkins provided a report on the 2011 and proposed 2012 projects for the port. A PowerPoint presentation on the different projects accompanied his report.

2011 accomplishments include: Spit Parking; Derelict Boats; Deep Water Dock Security Gate System; Barge Ramp; Uplands Leases; Ordinance for Managing Dredge Materials on the Homer Spit; Pioneer Dock Sediment Basin Project; Spring and Fall Expanded Dredging Effort at the Harbor; Harbor Condition Survey; Alaska Clean Harbors; Fish Dock Projects; Port Maintenance Returns; Alaska Association of Harbormasters and Port Administrators 32nd Annual Conference; Homer Spit Sign Post Project; Hickory Parking Lot Improvement Project; Petro Marine Pipeline Project; Alaska Marine Highway System Lot 48 Warehouse Project; Marketing; Harbor Improvement Committee; Harbor Tug Projects; Deep Water Dock Cruise Ship Head Tax Grant Monies; Load and Launch Ramp; Tsunami Warning System.

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Port and Harbor Director Hawkins indicated their goals for 2012:

Pioneer Dock:

- Complete the pipeline from Petro Marine terminal to the face of the dock.
- Begin the planning stages of demolishing the old Main Dock. It's time for us to take it down before it falls down.
- Complete repairs to the mooring dolphin.

Deep Water Dock:

- Develop a time line for head tax money projects.
- See attached list of projects.

Beach Moorage Facility:

In terms of projects that will bring new revenue sources to the Enterprise, it has been suggested that we create a barge mooring facility just off the beach between the fishing lagoon entrance and the northern end of the harbor. Staff will bring the results of an industry survey and a request for permitting to the Port Commission and City Council by April. I hope to have a decision by June and if it is decided to build, that we contract and begin construction in October 2012. See attached diagram for project overview.

Fishing Lagoon:

How do we maintain this important community asset? I believe that 2012 will be the year that we tackle this challenge. From my perspective, we need accurate numbers to work with. So far we've all been guessing about the quantities of material needed to be removed from the lagoon. We need a hydrographic survey to be done so that accurate volumes can be calculated for cost purposes. Costs for a survey will be in the range of \$3,000 to \$5,000.

Once we have that information, a small committee can be organized whose mission will be to research options for a response to the sedimentation issue. I would highly recommend the coastal engineers at DOT be on this team as well as Fish and Game and the City. Further, by benefit of hindsight, I can see the reason we ended up facing this issue is because once the Fishing Lagoon was built, no thought was given to maintaining it. One of the goals of the committee should be to create a maintenance schedule for preventative care and to identify a source of funding for that purpose. The coastal engineers and hydrologists will be able to help us with this need as well.

Load and Launch Ramp:

• Complete the engineering and design for the Load and launch Ramp refurbishment.

Fish Dock/Ice Plant:

- Rebuild Ice Chute.
- Refurbishment of two more dock cranes.
- Complete corrosion protection which will require replacing zincs. Was recommended in the 2011 dock condition survey under the dock.

• Continue replacing fish dock gratings.

Harbor Basin:

- In addition to the normal day to day maintenance of the harbor facility, Port Maintenance plans to step up efforts this spring and summer and address concrete spalding on the floats.
- The Harbor Improvement Committee will continue working on the harbor project list with a goal of securing funding for the approved projects.

Councilmember Lewis commented that this weekend Homer Hockey sent two teams to Anchorage to participate in the presidential tournament. The Pee Wee's took first place and the Bantams took second.

Councilmembers Roberts and Howard had no comment.
