PUBLIC COMMENTS UPON MATTERS ALREADY ON THE AGENDA

Mayor Hornaday passed the gavel to Mayor Pro Tempore Wythe to offer public comment.

James Hornaday, city resident and Mayor of Homer, commented he vetoed the plastic bag ordinance as a number of people oppose banning the bags. It reminds him of the smoking ban when the liberals and conservatives agreed they did not want regulation. The bag ordinance is very confusing, adds costs to small businesses, and he hopes a voluntary program will work.

Dave Brann, city resident, supports Resolution 12-079 for the Kachemak Drive trail. It is most essential that a pathway be created for safety measures. It will happen timely with the City rather than the State or DOT. A lot of thought and effort has gone into creating a path. Using HART funds is a way to get pieces of funding. The total project cost is mind-boggling so it is better to look at it in bits and pieces.

Kevin Walker, Homer resident, supports Resolution 12-079. He worked closely with the Kachemak Drive Path Committee, working on graphics. City support is needed for funding and easements across people's property. When a survey is done we can get started and ease into grants from other areas. He opposes Resolution 12-080 for the land purchase; he supports using the Pratt's restroom for the public.

Sue Post, Homer business owner, supports Resolution 12-079 since we need connecting paths. She is against the veto on Ordinance 12-036(A) and was thrilled when she heard the plastic bag

ban will go in effect. Unless it is law people will not change their ways. She showed an array of cloth bags and expressed a willingness to serve on a task force for plastic bags.

Larry Sloan, city resident, asked Council to uphold Resolution 12-079. The ban on plastic bags is causing undue burden on store owners as several say it will cost hundreds of dollars. Council should revisit it again as the populous needs to be educated.

Lynn Burt, city resident and Kachemak Drive Path Committee member, urged support for Resolution 12-079.

Beth Cumming, city resident, urged passage of Resolution 12-079. She supports a path along Kachemak Drive from the base of the Spit to East End Road as a city project. The first section of trail would be 1/3 of a mile starting at the base of the Spit to long term parking. It is an accident waiting to happen because it is heavy industrial area.

Craig Forrest, Homer business owner, supports Resolution 12-079. He supports the Mayor's veto of Ordinance 12-036(A) because education is the best source for plastic bags. Ninety percent of the customers at his business do not want the plastic bags offered. If it is raining visitors must have plastic bags instead of paper.

Robert Archibald, city resident, lives on Highland Drive and Sprucewood, a bio-fare to the dump. A lot of people go flying through and he picks up their plastic bags. The City could reevaluate fines and increase revenue for loose debris from cars.

Parks and Recreation Advisory Commissioner Dave Brann reported the commission is seeking more funds for recreational purposes. Mike Illg is working hard on ways to utilize the HERC building. Improvements at Karen Hornaday Park are moving right along. The park has been cleaned up considerably and the playground is great. Mike Illg has been nominated for various statewide recognitions, along with the Public Works crew that maintains the park. There are still surveying and drainage issues at the park. The red shed is being torn down; no one stepped forward to repurpose it. Improvements at Jack Gist Park are coming along. The ball fields will need an investment to make them viable areas for competition ball on a State level. There are drainage problems there too. The Park Walk Thru is Saturday, September 15th at 9 a.m. (meet at City Hall). The Mariner Park driveway will be redone and it is hoped the speed limit can be reduced to the corner to make it safer.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

A. City Manager's Report

1. Memorandum 12-140, re: Employee Wellness Program from Employee Committee.

This City Manager's report will be devoted primarily to a verbal update on progress regarding the proposed transition plan for moving the Community Recreation Program into the HERC Building. The timing for this discussion and presentation is good because the Council requested that I bring forward a proposal for consideration as part of the budget process. We are working on the draft budget right now and we are scheduled to deliver it to the Council at the meeting on September 24. The Parks and Recreation Commission has recommended that Community Recreation be moved into this facility. They have also recommended that renovation of this building be a CIP Priority for the City. Further, the Boys and Girls Club wishes to work with Community Recreation and they have held off on submitting a proposal for a long term lease until they see what they Council will do with respect to Community recreation and the CIP request.

As you can see, this discussion is timely for a variety of reasons. The Council is about to take up both the budget and the CIP list and Community recreation and the HERC Building will be important parts of the discussion.

City Manager Wrede referenced Memorandum 12-140 on the wellness program. Councilmember Wythe made a suggestion and the committee took it under advisement. Katie provided a laydown outlining the website for the gas distribution project. The website is actively under development.

Mr. Wrede asked Council to review the information and let him know if more information was needed. Questions and answers regarding the gas line will be provided. Most people don't realize they will be paying an assessment whether they hook up to gas or not. The map in Council Chambers will be added to the website soon. It shows properties that will not be included in the Special Assessment District.

A MOU between the City and DOT for the Spit Trail has been signed. The extension of the trail on the other side of the Spit can be designed in conjunction with cruise ship money.

A MOU with the Alaska Marine Highway System was signed. Starting September 19th there will be construction in the driveway. Petro Marine will be replacing their pipeline, removing pipe on the old wooden dock. When the new piping is done the old dock will come before Council.

The jackup rig is still at the dock and Buccaneer has requested an extension until September 18th to be there. They are still doing work and need some more permits and certifications before the rig can be towed to the drilling site. They will be off the dock next Saturday for the incoming cruise ship and then return to the dock.

Mayor Hornaday asked that a letter be written to Buccaneer to request a job fair here. City Manager Wrede noted they have 60 people working, some locals and some brought into town. They are eating in restaurants or buying food locally; it is an economic shot in the arm.

Rental rates for the HERC building were discussed at the Committee of the Whole. Councilmember Wythe requested an ordinance expending money for an engineer's report to see what upgrades from code perspective would be required to change the occupancy from classroom to other uses.

Councilmember Wythe expressed concern with the information provided. The trail has been a top priority of the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission. The project will require all trail dollars from HART for many years. She is not opposed to building the trail, but rather concerned with the amount of money it will require and the other projects that will languish.

HOWARD/WYTHE – MOVED TO POSTPONE TO SEPTEMBER 24.

There was no discussion.

VOTE: (postponement) YES. WYTHE, HOWARD

VOTE: NO. ROBERTS, ZAK, BURGESS

Motion failed.

Councilmembers Burgess and Roberts asked that a breakdown of costs and phases be provided. Although they support the concept they want a more specific idea to move forward, including phases for the project. It is hard to see where things are going with the resolution in its current state.

Councilmember Howard appreciates the vision, but noted problems with the concept. If the trail is built it encourages folks to go on the trail and then they end up on the industrial road.

City Manager Wrede reported it was the intent of the committee that we spend a certain amount of money for engineering work to help with the design and costs. That can be handled with an ordinance at a subsequent meeting. The path is a terrific project as the trail is needed. It is a monumental effort that will require a huge amount of staff time to get easements and permits. It will take many years. It is a big effort on many levels and the City will have to maintain the trail on the State right of way when it is done. That will require patching, plowing, and sweeping.

Councilmember Howard questioned the \$200,000 fiscal note on the resolution, asking if they were supposed to ignore it.

Parks and Recreation Advisory Commissioner Dave Brann reported the committee does not have the expertise to do the surveying and come up with detailed costs. They are asking for up to \$20,000 for surveying from the end of the Spit to the access road. For the longer term it may require \$150,000 for preliminary engineering and design. This will provide professional judgment on the grade and slope.

WYTHE/BURGESS - MOVED TO RETURN RESOLUTION 12-079 TO STAFF AND THE PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION WITH VERY SPECIFIC REQUESTS THAT THEY ADDRESS THE RESOLUTION TO BE EXACTLY WHAT THEY ARE ASKING FOR AT THIS PHASE.

The resolution title is not currently in agreement with the therefore, now be it resolved. There are many unresolved questions. If design money is needed for Phase I of the project that would be a better request with specifics rather than asking for open ended funding.

VOTE: (refer) YES. NON OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

Mayor Hornaday commented in the interest of full disclosure at the last meeting when the Kachemak Drive trail was discussed extensively, a member of the public came and represented that the City Manager had met with the committee and assured them there was no problem getting the property owners to sign off on the easements. It is Mayor Hornaday's understanding that is not a correct interpretation of what the City Manager told the committee. The comment was made at an open meeting in City Manager Wrede's absence.

City Manager Wrede acknowledged he had heard about the comment and does not know why the person would have said that. The problem is exactly the opposite. There are a few people that gave easements for the sewer project that told Public Works Director Carey Meyer specifically not to come back looking for a trail easement.

COMMENTS OF THE AUDIENCE

Dave Brann, city resident and Parks and Recreation Advisory Commissioner, expressed frustration over Resolution 12-079. He requested a meeting with one or more councilmembers and the City Manager to get the wording for the resolution.

Kevin Walker, Homer resident, commented on Resolution 12-079. A maximum of \$20,000 is needed for detailed information of what the section of trail will cost. Then the trail can be opened up to other funding sources for trails. Trail maintenance of the gravel trail will not kill the budget.

Beth Cumming, city resident and Kachemak Drive Path Committee member, would like for Council to tell them what they want. She asked for up to \$20,000 to determine the cost of building 1/3 of a mile of the trail which would be from the base of the Spit to long term parking.

Ingrid Herrald, city resident, repeated the sentiment of other frustrated speakers. The Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission and Kachemak Drive Path Committee worked really hard with open houses and public feedback. She is not sure how many councilmembers attended the public hearings. The committee did research, got input, and conducted surveys. She is frustrated their work is stagnating.

Larry Slone, city resident, reminded Council of the competing interest for a limited amount of funds that the City has. There are a lack of walkways and facilities for Main Street that is used

year round. Many people without vehicles live up there. Walking at night in dark clothes is extremely dangerous. Council needs to keep that area in mind as a competing interest.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY ATTORNEY

City Attorney Wells had no comment.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY CLERK

City Clerk Johnson had no comment.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY MANAGER

City Manager Wrede had no comment.

COMMENTS OF THE MAYOR

Mayor Hornaday urged everyone to enjoy the sun while it lasts.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Councilmember Wythe appreciates Sue Post's comments on plastic bags. Homer is a town of grass roots movements and a task force is not needed for a movement for reusable bags. A group can work through the Chamber of Commerce for a bag that is promoted by all businesses in Homer. It can be accomplished by the community without a law that would be difficult to enforce. She appreciates the work the Kachemak Drive Path Committee has put into the path. Mr. Slone brought up valid points which the Council has succinctly identified, including a priority list of the many projects included in the trail. Council has asked for a resolution that will very succinctly identify the \$20,000 that will be used for an engineering review of the first part of the trail. The wording should flow consistently from the title to the now therefore be it resolved clauses. She would be happy to work with the commission in drafting the resolution.

Councilmember Roberts is glad to see a MOU signed with DOT to finish the Spit Trail. It is a wonderful additional to the community. The Kachemak Drive trail is a valid project. The resolution was very broad and asked for a lot of things, along with more money than committee members are telling us they want. She would be happy to help the commission rewrite the resolution. There is support for the trail, although it is a project that has to go in small steps and increments. As presented tonight there is no clue to the bottom line costs and she cannot commit the City of Homer to it.

Councilmember Howard commented resolutions and ordinances are the marching orders for distribution of the taxpayer's dollars. The auditors expect the allocation amounts to match the checks that are written. She did not hear or read \$20,000 until the end of testimony; the resolution states \$200,000. Council has to be picky for the protection of all. She is glad to hear two councilmembers are willing to work with the commission on the language. She is sure the commission will be successful next time.

Councilmember Burgess reiterated comments of Councilmembers Roberts and Howard. He loves the idea of a trail on Kachemak Drive as it is a dangerous industrial area. He walked it with a committee member and family member. It is a matter of getting the legalese and the bureaucratic process to line up so Council can get behind and represent the public interest. Council can't sign a blank check or approve wording that does not match the title.

Councilmember Zak had no comment.

ADJOURNMENT
