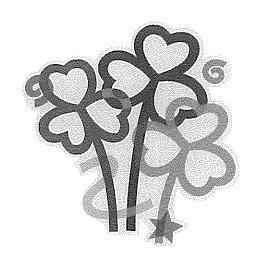
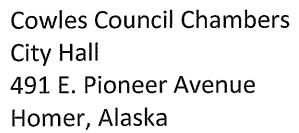

Eileen Faulkner, Chair of the Library Advisory Board, reported the computer program at the library is progressing with the program to start March 28th. March 4th – 7th the trainer will be at the library. The library will be closed to the public on Monday and Tuesday, March 4th and 5th, for staff training. The outreach partnership program with Best Beginnings is going well. As part of a grant Claudia travels to McNeil Canyon School weekly and Razdolna every other week for story hour. The final week of Big Read is this week. Tim O'Brien, author of *The Things They Carried* will give a presentation on March 1st at the Mariner Theatre. Board members are needed to fill vacancies. Interested persons are encouraged to apply.

Josh Ross, Economic Development Advisory Commissioner, reported on the commission's work. They have been discussing marketing Homer for high tech businesses, revitalizing downtown Homer, and promoting Homer as an agricultural center. They have heard a lot of presentations from business owners on their ideas and concerns. A small group was formed to explore downtown revitalization. They came up with ideas for RV parking as outlined in Resolution 13-021.

4. Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission

Tricia Lillibridge, Parks and Recreation Advisory Commissioner, reported on the commission's work. They have been working on the Karen Hornaday Park playground and park projects, and the Diamond Creek recreation area. Council will be getting reports on the Diamond Creek area to approve. It is hoped a new pavilion can be constructed this summer at Karen Hornaday Park. A subcommittee was formed and has a pavilion design. The plan is the old pavilion will be taken down to be reused near the T-ball fields. The design was passed by the commission and forwarded to Public Works. There is a wonderful outdoor fire pit design, safe against the weather and winds, and has separate departments for multi users. Grass and walking trails will be used. The project will take a week to complete. Reservations will be handled through parks and

recreation department. HoPP has another piece of playground equipment to install. The commission reviewed the Land Allocation Plan and forwarded their recommendations. The Kachemak Drive Path Committee is still in effect; it has not been disbanded. There is a lot of work to do on the trail.

Councilmember Burgess asked the City Attorney if the Borough could compel the City to foreclose on property in arrears of the assessment. Or can the Borough simply enforce that we must place the lien?

City Attorney Klinkner answered the lien is statutory and imposed on the property at the time assessments are levied. It is an automatic process and does not require any discretionary action on the part of the City. The City needs to use due diligence of enforcement of the assessments to raise the funds to pay the loan. The City is not compelled to foreclosure on a property to satisfy a lien.

Mayor Pro Tempore Roberts noted Council talked about the loan agreement at the Committee of the Whole and investigated all the changes in Ordinance 13-03(S)(2).

Larry Slone, city resident, expressed his support for the City to cover the costs. The City has some obligation if they did not inform the water and sewer user an event such as this was possible. There is a rider a person could put on their insurance policy.

Mayor Wythe closed the public hearing.

Mayor Wythe called for a motion for the adoption of Ordinance 13-05 by reading of title only for second and final reading.

BURGESS/LEWIS - SO MOVED.

Councilmember Lewis asked if there was any insurance coverage the City could acquire that would cover like acts of deity.

City Manager Wrede answered insurance companies cover anything if you pay; you would be hard pressed to find an insurance company that would cover force majeure.

Councilmember Burgess noted it would be prudent of the City to advise potential new customers and existing customers though a disclaimer that installing a check valve is an option. It would advise people it is a possibility that uncommon things do tend to happen.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

A. City Manager's Report

1. Finance Director Resignation: Finance Director Regina Mauras has accepted a job in Washington State and has tendered her resignation. Her last day at work will be March 8. She will make herself available after that if questions come up. We have started the recruitment

process for this very important position. I would like to thank Regina for all of her dedication and hard work over the past seven years. She has contributed a lot to the City and its financial management. I would especially like to take note of the very significant improvements she made in the areas of internal controls and basic accounting practices. Regina was a real asset and she will be missed.

- Damage at Water Treatment Plant: At recent meetings the Council was briefed on the extreme weather event that caused damage to the sewer collection system and to three structures in town. Understandably, most of the focus to date has been on the damage to the structures and the displaced tenants. However, there was also extensive damage to the sewer treatment plant itself. We did not realize the extent of the damage at the time but that is now becoming clear. The staff at the treatment plant has performed yeoman's work troubleshooting and making repairs to insure that the plant is functioning properly. Much of this work was done standing in knee deep sewage. Lots of overtime has been needed and these guys deserve a special thank you for keeping the community and Kachemak Bay protected from potential contamination. The bottom line though, is that the cost of repairs now exceeds \$100,000 and could continue to grow. We have not yet brought forward an appropriation ordinance because we did not fully understand the extent of the damage or ultimate cost for repairs and for health and safety reasons, we needed to move fast. At the time this was written, we were considering whether to file an insurance claim. The deductible for this policy is \$100,000. This insurance is for coverage of property damage to property owned by the City and differs from the coverage in place regarding the private structures.
- 3. Grant Aviation: As you probably heard by now, Grant Aviation is discontinuing service to Homer effective immediately. We are currently in the process of terminating their lease at the terminal and all of the normal steps that entails.
- 4. Transportation Committee Recommendations: Council recently asked the administration to look into acquiring the ROW that would be needed to push Waddell Way through to Heath St.; an important step in implementing the Transportation Plan. It has come to the City's attention that there is a potential buyer for the property (currently for sale) and PW and Planning have been working with the interested party to see if we can work out a plan that benefits all. There are a number of variables and considerations that come into play when thinking about the best alignment for the proposed east-west corridor. Carey brought this issue to the Transportation Committee at their meeting on the 19th. The Committee gave it careful consideration and its recommendations are attached. We hope to talk about this in some detail at the Committee of the Whole.
- 5. Emergency Operations Plan Update: Chief Painter has hosted three meeting so far. The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, February 21. The Emergency Operations Plan is a very important document and we appreciate the volunteers who are participating on the Committee.
- 6. Trip to Juneau: Next week the Mayor and Katie will travel to Juneau to visit legislators and members of the administration. We have developed a general work plan / agenda on issues to be addressed but any input the Council might have would be most welcome.
- 7. Harbor Projects; This week I hope to be able to start the harbor revenue bond application process with the Alaska Municipal Bond Bank. The goal is to have the financing in place close to the time the capital budget is approved so that we can keep to the proposed construction schedule.
- 8. Lillian Walli Estates: The Council requested by resolution that the City initiate the petition process for forming a road, water, and sewer special assessment district in Lillian Walli

Estates. The Planning Department is working on that and is making good progress. Letters of interest went out to all property owners recently.

- 9. Port and Harbor Rate Study: The adopted budget contains funding for a Port and Harbor Rate Study. We are starting to focus attention on that issue and we should have more information for you soon.
- 10. Fiscal Impacts of the drill rig Endeavor: At the last meeting we discussed the possible benefits of commissioning a study of the economic impacts associated with the drill rig being moored in Homer. Several Council members expressed interest in doing this. This agenda contains a resolution on that topic sponsored by the Mayor and Council member Burgess to get the issue on the table.

City Manager Wrede reported the deadline for the re-appropriation of the \$2M is March 7th for the capital budget. Both Senator Micciche and Representative Seaton are on board. The Mayor will be talking to them on her upcoming Juneau trip. Council requested re-appropriation of the \$2M to the Skyline Fire Station with remaining funds going towards the Harbormaster's office. The estimate for the Harbormaster's office without the bathrooms is \$2M. After the Skyline Fire Station is built there should be \$1.3M or \$1.4M to put towards the Harbormaster's office.

Council discussed Waddell Way, the proposed east/west corridor from Lake Street to Heath Street. The corridor is a long term goal of the Transportation Plan. The Transportation Advisory Committee recommended the road be placed through the HEA property. A request to purchase the land is before HEA for consideration. There is a potential buyer for the Waddell property. A Worksession will be scheduled when more information is available.

City Manager Wrede reported Council appropriated \$20,000 for survey and engineering work on the Kachemak Drive trail. Public Works Director Carey Meyer has been looking at it closely. The original vision was to angle up the bluff; it is extremely steep in some places. To get a 10-ft. wide pathway bridges and retaining walls would be needed. Carey outlined a different plan for the trail, an extension of the existing trail that goes to the airport. The trail would stay at the toe of the bluff, similar to the Spit trail. His idea was it didn't make sense to spend a lot of money surveying a trail that would be too expensive to build. It received mixed results at the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission meeting. The resolution approving the survey was not specific about a route; the money was to be used on a survey.

CITY ATTORNEY REPORT

City Attorney Klinkner was asked by Councilmember Burgess to comment on the input received on the inequity of rendering assessments for the gas line per lot per user to the value of the lot.

City Attorney Klinkner advised there are numerous different methods to assess costs of an improvement to a benefitted property. They include a flat assessment per lot, by square footage, front street footage, square footage to a particular depth, assessed valuation, or by proximity to the improvement. Council approved an improvement plan that proposed assessments on a per lot basis. That is not binding and final at this point. The time that assessments and their method of assessment become binding and final is when the assessment roll is before Council after notice to property owners and their opportunity to object. Council can make adjustments to the assessment roll and the assessment method they think is warranted before the final roll is approved. After the final roll is approved and confirmed by the Council any party dissatisfied with the methodology has thirty days to take the matter to Superior Court. At this point any challenge to the proposed method of assessment is premature. A final challenge has to follow the exhaustion of the remedy by first coming to Council for the relief before going to court. The matter is still open for discussion and deliberation if there is a sentiment amongst Council based on public input that another method is more appropriate. Council may still consider it.

Asked by Councilmember Burgess if the assessment per lot is consistent or out of the norm, Attorney Klinkner advised the courts give the Council broad discretion in determining what is the appropriate method of assessment. The statutory standard is that the method of assessment is proportionate to the benefit received. There is considerable precedent in practice around the state of assessing for natural gas improvements on a per lot basis. It has happened in Mat-Su, within the Kenai Peninsula Borough, and the cities of Kenai and Soldotna. There was one case decided by the Alaska Supreme Court upholding per lot assessments on a road improvement.

Mayor Wythe asked if Council were to make a substantial change in the manner they determine the assessment, would they be required to go back for an objection period? People have said if the assessments are changed on the multi-tenant lots they would have voted differently.

Attorney Klinkner answered when the contract with Enstar is entered the City is contractually committed to the construction of the distribution system. Council cannot go back and undue the district. Property owners can still object to the actual assessments before the assessments are levied. Council would be able to say the condos are assessed as one property and everyone else's assessments would change.

Councilmember Burgess commented the agreement obligates Enstar to build out a 2" line. Some areas may have higher volume.

City Manager Wrede answered that is covered in the agreement. Enstar has discretion to oversize the pipe in an area with a lot of development. They do that at their own expense.

The Permanent Fund Committee is tasked with review of the established investment policies of the Permanent Fund each year. At their February meeting the committee made the review and recommended an amendment to the language for the five percent of funds allocated to non-profits.

The committee recommended clarifying the language of the five percent distribution of the eligible earnings from the income sub-fund. Additionally, they recommended The Homer Foundation be the sole recipient of those funds for distribution. The committee felt that distributing the eligible earnings solely to The Homer Foundation would be a better means of ensuring the funds were used for the benefit of the entire community.

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt Ordinance 13-06 with the amendments as proposed by the Permanent Fund Committee.

A. Review of Homer City Code 3.12 the Established Investment Policies of the Permanent Fund

The language in HCC 3.12.020(c) may need to be cleared up to exclude other local non-profit organizations and allocate to The Homer Foundation only. The current language reads five percent of funds are available for distribution. It should be interest on five percent of the funds.

MAURAS/ROBERTS – MOVED TO AMEND HCC 3.12.020(A) TO 100%; HCC 3.12.020(C) TO READ: FIVE PERCENT OF THE ELIGIBLE EARNINGS FROM THE PERMANENT FUND AND OTHER WINDFALL MONIES ARE AVAILABLE TO BE APPROPRIATED BY THE CITY COUNCIL FOR GRANTS TO THE HOMER FOUNDATION FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE COMMUNITY.

Subject: Used Truck Purchase for New Steamer

We have finally taken possession of our new 2012 vapor steamer unit. This unit was purchased as a backup to our existing steamer unit which frequently cannot keep up with the workload that it is needed to be performed. We also found out last year how the community suffers when our only steamer breaks down as spring arrives.

This unit was intended to serve as a back up to our existing truck mounted unit. Public Works does not have a truck in which to mount the new steamer unit to allow it to be used. Based on the type of winter that we have had (extreme glaciation), and warnings that Homer should expect more winter rain and ice formation in ditches and culverts, a second truck mounted unit will be a great asset to the community.

Our existing unit is mainly used for fire hydrant steaming/thawing (preventative maintenance on the 370 hydrants on the system). To keep these hydrants from freezing and breaking our program includes the steaming/thawing of these (3) times each during the winter months. This is a full time job during the winter. Our steamer also is needed and used for thawing culverts and drainages and also thawing frozen water and/or sewer services which precludes it from fire hydrant steaming.

With our ever expanding infrastructure it would be of great benefit to City residents and this department to have two mobile steaming/thawing units available for use.

We have researched the availability of a used truck for this purpose and have not found a suitable one in the state of Alaska. We have identified several units in the lower 48 and one being in the Seattle area @ \$27,500. Below is a proposed budget for the purchase of a used truck and associated needed appurtenances.

Recommendation

As this equipment is used for both general fund and water/wastewater fund work, the Council should fund this purchase equally from the PW Fleet Reserve Fund, Water Reserve Fund & Sewer Reserve Fund @ 1/3 each.

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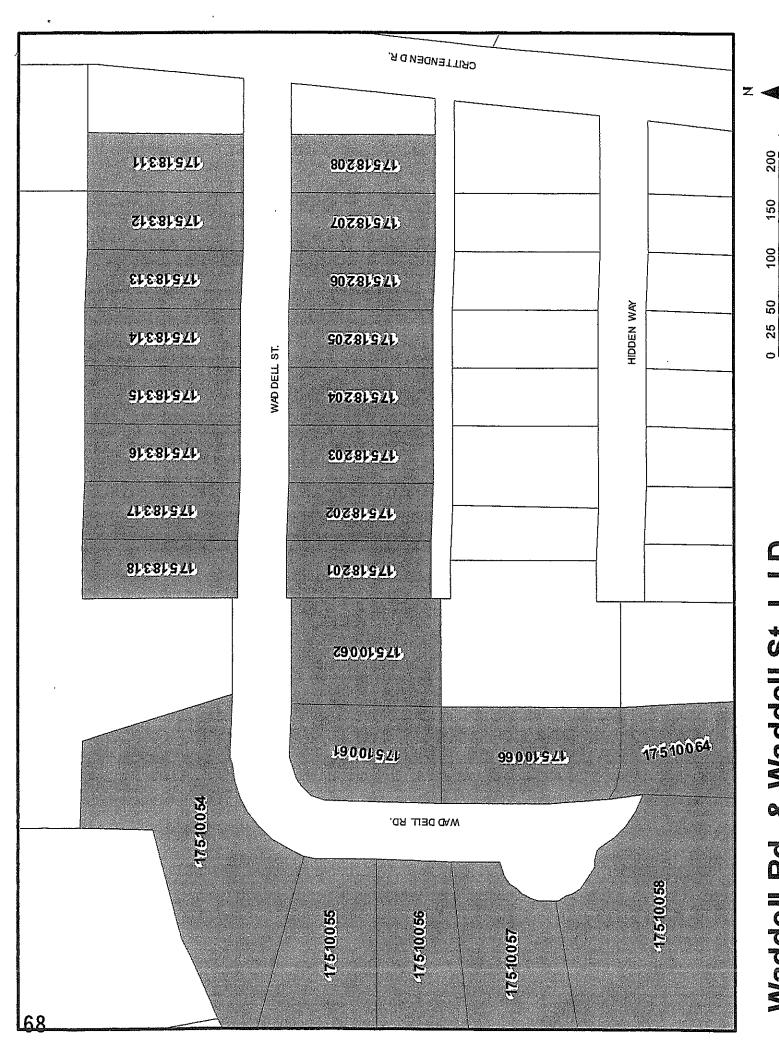

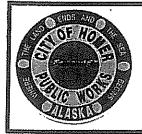

RE: Proposed Waddell Street Road Paving SAD

Recently the City Clerk mailed you a petition regarding the creation of a Road Paving Special Assessment District (SAD) for Waddell Street. You probably have seen a petition before and may be wondering why you are seeing another one.

Previous attempts at creating a SAD have not been successful, partly because the City changed the way SAD's are created in midstream during the last attempt, which reportedly introduced some confusion into the process. Some property owners, having previously signed petitions, did not respond to the second mailing. This letter is intended to clear up any alleged confusion and allow each property owner to express their support (or lack thereof) for the creation of a SAD one last time.

If you support the project, sign the petition and return it to the City Clerk. If you oppose the project do not sign the petition (no response indicates no support). Even if you have expressed support previously, it is important that you use the petition sent to you recently to voice your support for this SAD.

If owners of more than 50% of the assessed value of properties sign the request, a neighborhood meeting will be scheduled (probably in March) to answer any questions you may have about the project. After the meeting, a 90 day non-objection period will be implemented (objections will count as a no "vote"; no response will count as support). In the mean time, please do not hesitate to call the City Clerk (235-3130) about SAD creation procedures or me (399-7232) if you have any questions about the project.

For over twenty years, the community has agreed to pay an additional ¾ of a cent sales tax, the proceeds of which are used to subsidize the cost of paving roads in neighborhoods like yours. If a SAD is successful, the benefitted properties are assessed \$30/frontage foot to bring the road up to gravel standards and an additional \$17/frontage foot for paving. Based on the cost of construction on past SAD's and the per linear foot assessments mentioned above; my analysis indicates that the City subsidizes approximately 75% of the cost of gravel road construction and about 40% of the cost of paving.

Assessments are financed by the City, with payments spread over a 10 year period. The assessment payments do not start until the project is complete.

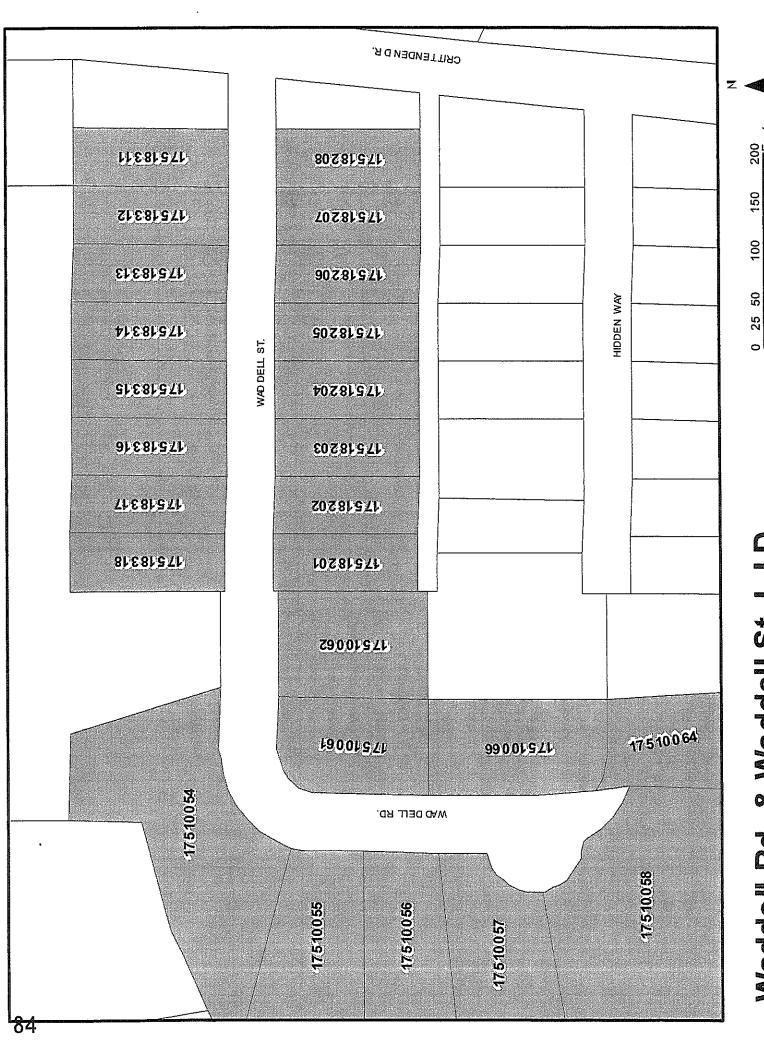

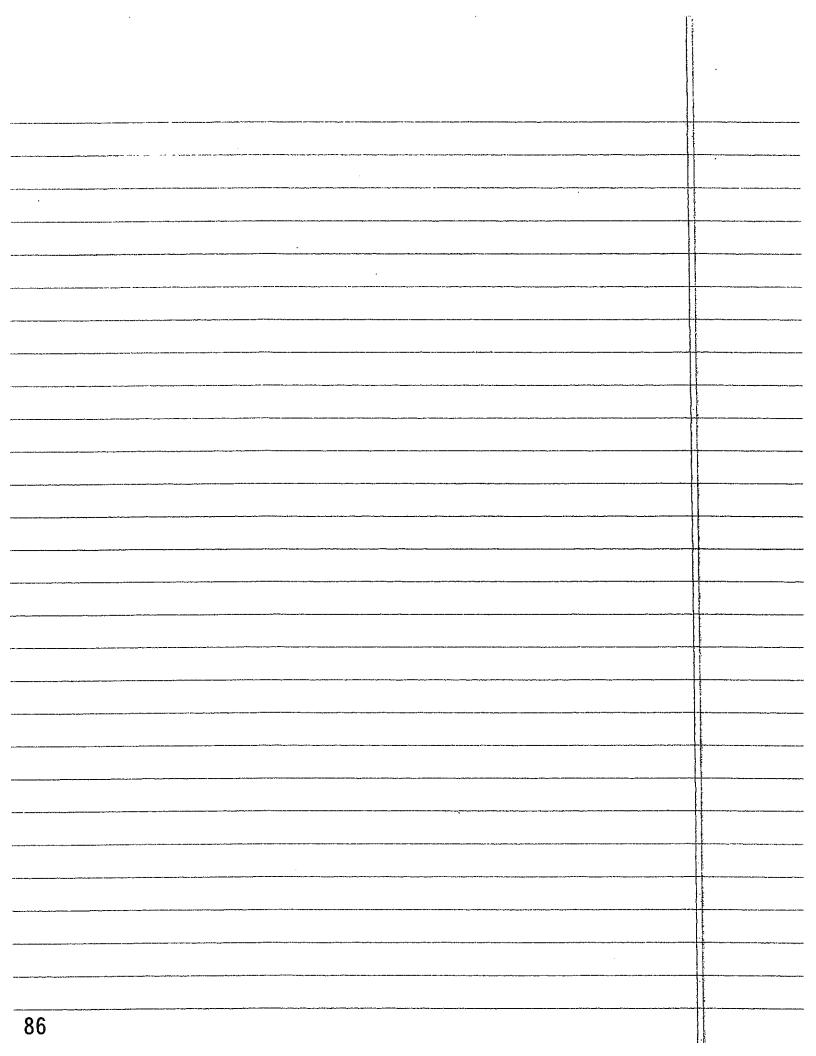

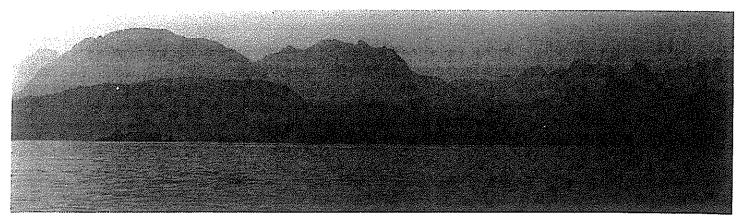

Dear Representative Kreiss-Tomkins,

Kachemak Bay State Parks are at a critical point; they need your help. The inverse relationship between the increasing use of the parks and the decrease of park funding is threatening the ability of the parks to function. Since 1985 park use has increased 1000% but park funding has steadily declined. The parks generate millions of dollars and create jobs for the local economy. Since 2006, Alaska has had a 40% surge and is second in the nation in fishing, hunting, wildlife watching, and outdoor recreation.

Kachemak Bay State Parks (KBSP) spans 400,000 acres and includes the first legislatively designated state park in Alaska. The parks have evolved into one of Alaska's most visited recreational areas, attracting well over 50,000 hikers, kayakers, hunters, fishermen, backpackers, campers, and wildlife viewers yearly from around the state, the country, and the world. The abundance of recreational opportunities provide a powerful economic engine for the southern Kenai Peninsula, and have become the basis of many local businesses: lodges, B&Bs, water taxis, fishing guides, kayak guide services, restaurants, to name a few. Here in Alaska, according to the 2011 National Survey of Fishing, Hunting, and Wildlife-Associated Recreation conducted by the US Fish and Wildlife Service, wildlife viewers spent over \$2 billion and anglers spent over \$600 million.

The Parks have grown significantly in the past three decades. In 1985, there were two trailheads for 10 miles of hiking trails, one campsite, no public use cabins, no bridges, and two water taxi services, overseen by two rangers and a number of support staff. By 1999 there were six rangers covering the lower Kenai Peninsula. Today there are 16 trailheads for 90+ miles of hiking trails, five public use cabins with 100% occupancy in the summer, 18 campsites, multiple bridges, and over 12 commercial water taxi operators. Despite these improvements and increased visitation, funding for maintaining the parks has steadily eroded. Now, there is no ranger dedicated to the parks, with only one district ranger overseeing the entire lower Kenai Peninsula. He has one

seasonal support staffer. At the current level of funding, the parks cannot continue to attract visitors, who, in turn, infuse the local economy with millions of dollars.

In these days of economic uncertainty, it is imperative to have a diversified economy. Putting a relatively modest sum of money into a park system that generates millions of dollars for the local economy is a simple step that will go a long way towards addressing the parks' funding shortfall. Adding an additional \$283,600 to the budget would enable State Parks to hire more staff to professionally manage Kachemak Bay State Parks, develop more year round recreational activities and keep the area safe and well maintained. Also a one-time capital expense of \$105,500 for equipment and training would be needed. A cost breakdown is attached.

Sponsor Statement

HR 131

HB 131 assists state agencies and municipalities with the problem of derelict and abandoned vessels in Alaska. Derelict vessels can be a very costly problem for the state. Sunken derelict vessels present environmental and navigation hazards requiring removal, the cost of which often falls on state agencies and municipalities. Abandoned vessels in harbors create a large problem for municipalities and take up valuable moorage space. HB 131 would provide state agencies and municipalities with authority in statute to address abandoned and derelict vessels.

During the past 20 years, the state has transferred ownership of most of the state-owned harbors to local municipalities. Municipal harbormasters often find themselves without sufficient legal authority to deal with abandoned and derelict vessels left in these harbor facilities. Some local municipal governments do not have the legal and financial resources to create or change codes to protect themselves from the liabilities and hazards of abandoned and derelict vessels. HB 131 provides clear authorization for municipalities to respond to abandoned and derelict vessels.

Current derelict vessel statute at AS 30.30 puts the primary duty to handle derelict vessels on the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities (DOT&PF). DOT&PF has not historically been funded to establish a derelict vessel program. The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has responsibility for clean-up activities when an abandoned vessel is on state submerged land or state tideland. Often DNR relies on state criminal trespass statutes in their efforts to remove abandoned and derelict vessels from state submerged land. For DNR to perform

work under the Abandoned and Derelict Vessel statute, they must receive a delegation of authority from DOT&PF which can create time delays in performing necessary clean-up activities. HB 131 broadens to abandoned and derelict vessel statute from DOT&PF to "a state agency". This provides agencies such as DNR and the Department of Environmental Conservation with a greater ability to quickly respond to individual derelict vessel situations.

HB 131 also creates a requirement that if a vessel has been denied entrance to a harbor due to its derelict status, the vessel may not be stored in state waters for more than two weeks unless all of the petroleum products and hazardous materials have been removed. The two-week timeline is consistent with the current DNR requirement that an anchored vessel receive authorization to be stored in state waters for more than two weeks.

Sponsor Substitute for House Bill 4 In-state Gasline Development Corp

House Bill 4 (HB 4) creates an entity charged with getting Alaska's natural gas into the hands of Alaskans. HB 4 empowers the Alaska Gasline Development Corporation (AGDC) to lead Alaska into a natural gas future.

For decades, Alaskans have looked to natural gas to ease crippling instate energy costs and air quality problems; to support new industry and jobs; to promote economic development; and to generate state revenue as the resource is commercialized. HB 4 provides AGDC the authority and resources to develop, finance, and operate a 500 million cubic feet per day gas pipeline from the North Slope, serving Fairbanks and Southcentral, at the lowest possible cost, without delay. While pursuing this project, AGDC is structured to be responsive if alternatives materialize that provide greater benefit to Alaskans, including potential partnership with industry on a large-diameter export pipeline. Finally, HB 4 enables AGDC to consider future pipelines that extend the benefits of natural gas to more Alaskans.

This legislation includes ways for the state to support AGDC and an instate natural gas pipeline and to alleviate uncertainty and risk, thereby minimizing the prices Alaskans pay for natural gas. HB 4 maximizes state efforts; separates AGDC from political influence; and creates a regulatory environment for a contract carrier pipeline that encourages future development of oil and gas resources. HB 4 also provides crucial checks and balances to ensure AGDC is accountable to Alaskans.

To date, private sector companies have not built a gas pipeline of this magnitude. The risks and costs associated with a pipeline spanning the 700-mile-plus length of Alaska are significant for any private sector entity. Yet, Alaskans remain in critical need of natural gas for instate use. The state can act now to bring a project together, opening new private sector development opportunities while addressing our instate energy issues.

This is Alaska's opportunity to advance the state's interests to get Alaskan gas into the hands of Alaskans on our schedule, without waiting for others to determine our future.

Lobbyist Report – Half Way Mark March 6, 2013

Overview

This week the first session of the 28th Legislature passed the half-way mark. This is the time when the pace quickens and the rubber hits the road for Legislators, staff, Administration officials' and lobbyists. A daily task of advancing favorite projects or slowing the passage of unfavorable legislation becomes more challenging. Longer days and nights are required of all those who successfully negotiate the 'end game' of lawmaking as the 90 day adjournment approaches. And thus decision making and negotiating skills are taken to elevated levels. In an attempt to gain support to advance their district and personal priorities, this is that time of session when Legislators begin to lobby one another. Armed with information from the Administration, constituents, staff, professionals, lobbyists and interests, they now begin to spend much more time making their case with their colleagues and securing votes.

Operating Budget (HB65)

House Finance Committee proposed the same funding level for Community Revenue Sharing as the previous few years; \$60million. They are in the final stage of completing the FY14 Operating Budget. As House leaders strive to limit their draw from savings reserves to balance this year's budget, this is the first time in almost 10 years that the Legislature has reduced the Governor's budget as opposed to adding budget increments.

As noted in the last report, the following schedule applies to final passage of the House FY14 Operating Budget. Senate Finance will then amend the House bill. After the Senate passes their version of the Budget, it will be assigned to a conference committee whose members include the Finance Chairs of the House & Senate. There they will compromise on line by line differences between the bills. Word has it that the Senate will not aim as high in their budget reductions in FY14 and intend to take a slower approach to reducing the State's operating budget over the next 5 years.

The House Schedule: (fyl only - no pressing issues requiring Homer testimony at this time)

March 6

4:15pm – 5:15pm Testimony from Homer, Kenai, Ketchikan, Kodiak, Mat-Su, Glenallen, Tok, and Seward. Testimony is limited to 2 minutes each.

FY14 Capital Budget (SB18)

As the above process ensues, Senate Finance set a deadline for Legislators to work with their respective Delegations to submit their top 15 priorities totaling no more than \$7million per Senate District. This dollar amount does not include an amount set aside for discretionary dollars for individual legislators. Of course simple math indicates that \$7million per Senator District x 20 districts totals \$140 million. As previously reported, a goal of \$200 - \$240million in total legislative additions is a sharp decline from \$1.2billion added to the Governor's budget last year.

In meetings with District Legislators, it was suggested that since Homer did very well in the Governor's capital budget the Districts limited allocation would more than likely be spread to other district requests and priorities. It is important to note here that 3 of the 4 projects in the Governor's budget are for 'Federal Authorization' of projects and are not general funds. These are projects that have been prioritized for advancement by DOTPF IF AND WHEN federal funds are received in the future. It is by no means a guarantee of a near term project.

Homer recently proposed that the Delegation fund the 2nd and 3rd priorities through a reappropriation; redirecting unobligated general fund dollars to the Skyline Fire Station and the Port & Harbor Building. While these funds are not enough to provide for completion of either project, a strong advocacy in support of at least \$410,000.00 to complete the Skyline Fire Station will allow all funds to go toward the Port & Harbor Building, thereby completing both projects. That was the message delivered to the Homer Delegation during last week's Juneau meetings.

Status of Legislation - Homer Bills of Interest

<u>HB4</u>, 'In-State Gas Line' The Alaska Gasline Development Corporation bill was amended March 5 and passed from House Resources to the House Finance committee. House Leaders, with the support of many communities and other entities, are pushing ahead to fund \$400million to capitalize the fund and advance the project this year (details in millions):

HB 30 'Performance Review' On February 19 this bill passed the House with a near majority of House Legislators. It was sent directly to Senate Finance for consideration. As previously noted, this bill is part of the House Majorities recent announcement of their guiding principles. The House has established a goal to significantly reduce the operating budget. Their actions on HB65 noted above, indicates this commitment. The bill requires agencies to identify potential cuts equaling 10% of their budgets over a 10 year period and identifying non essential programs. This effort is one to watch closely with its potential for negative impact and pressure on Municipal Revenue Sharing.

<u>HB35</u> ' **Home Conversion Loans'** This legislation is still in House Finance committee. The issue is not one of support amongst committee members, but rather, how to fund the program for conversions. In an effort of relationship building, Mayor Beth Wythe and Katie Koester met with Rep. Wilson to again communicate their support and offer assistance wherever possible.

HB 40 'Farm Exemption'

Rep. Hughes bill has passed through both the House & Senate in record time. The optional municipal program will allow a property tax exemption of structures for the sole purpose of food preparation and storage. The bill is expected to pass the Senate next week and be sent to the Governor for his signature.

HB 152 PRS/TRS Termination Cost Legislation

This municipal consensus legislation has been in the making since the start of session and was introduced yesterday and sent to the House Labor & Commerce Committee. As a means to cut costs to municipalities, the bill is extremely complex and a top priority for AML and many communities, large and small. As one who has studied the issue and worked on PRS/TRS legislation over the past 6 years, Anderson Group's Yuri Morgan is taking the lead on this bill and has been intricately involved in its complexities. See attached summary.

SB23 / HB74 North Slope LNG Trucking Project

This legislation was introduced by the Governor on behalf of Fairbanks and Interior Communities in recognition of their cost of energy at 250 times that of the rest of the state. The bills authorize AIDEA to provide up to \$275 million in financing at 3% for a natural gas liquefaction plant affiliated infrastructure on the North Slope as well as providing for financing of a liquid natural gas (LNG) distribution system within the Fairbanks North Star Borough. In today's hearing on HB74 in House Labor & Commerce, Rep. Chenault informed the committee that Homer was in the process of forming an LID and paying the cost of their distribution. The City of Homer has requested grant funding of half of the cost of their distribution system. If a state policy is to be made to aide communities in their efforts toward natural gas distribution systems, its only fair that all communities have access to equal or similar subsidies.

Homer's Fly-In....and valuable 'face time' in Juneau...

was extremely successful. As mentioned above, the schedule began by meetings with Rep. Seaton & Senator Micciche and included discussions with Speaker Chenault and the Governor's Chief of Staff Mike Nizich. The busy 2 ½ days of appointments ended literally on the way out of 'Dodge' with a stop at the DOTPF office where Homer was joined by the Deputy Commissioner as well as Department Directors overseeing highways and ports and harbors.

Mayor Wythe & Katie were welcomed everywhere with their message of 'Homer is open for business and paying our way to the extent possible'. Of particular interest was the meeting with Mike Nizich who was more than impressed with the speed at which Homer has advanced their effort to complete their gasline distribution system and their willingness to participate in the cost. This was recognized as no small undertaking.

HB 152 - Modification to PERS Termination Costs

Speaking Points

I. KEY MESSAGE:

- a. System-wide salaries (DB + DC) have <u>increased by \$325 million</u>, or 18.6%, over the <u>salary base</u>

 <u>"floor"</u> established in SB125 by the 25th Legislature in 2008. As a result, contributions toward the unfunded liability have NOT been compromised or reduced; rather, they have INCREASED at a rate greater than the actuarial-assumed annual growth rate of 4%.
- b. Muni's understand the challenge associated with the unfunded liability and support the need to reduce the liability. However, the current penalty for termination costs is significant to Muni's and immaterial at the SOA level.
- Employers are incentivized to maintain a stable salary base and avoid termination costs, which if triggered would be due annually until the unfunded liability is paid off.
- d. Muni's must have operational flexibility during these challenging fiscal times so that they can adjust staffing levels as a result of funding changes and other mandated and/or basic changes in programs or services the public needs, i.e. reduced Federal or State funding.
- e. A \$70 million (estimated) fiscal note represents 1% of total PERS Unfunded Liability (\$6.9 B) PERS @ 6/30/11.
- f. Muni's propose <u>partial</u> termination costs, sharing with the SOA, to enable efficient decision making in our communities
 - 1. Muni's request that 22% remain as the contribution to PERS.
 - 2. Muni's request the legislature to provide relief to the communities based on salary size if circumstances warrant

II. Modification to the PERS termination language is needed due to the following:

- a. Municipal organizations need flexibility in staffing levels to operate and manage efficiently
 - Grant funding may be reduced or eliminated due to changes beyond municipal control i.e. reduced Federal or State funding. This potentially results in need to reduce staff/classification
 - 2. Staff flexibility (classification changes) is required to meet changing community needs.
- b. Municipalities are working toward modernizing and standardizing job classifications. This will likely result in fewer classifications, but not necessarily fewer employees. Current language will trigger a termination study and costs unnecessarily.

III. Bill proposes the following modifications:

<u>Section 1:</u> Retains the minimum requirement for employers to make contributions based on 22% of the greater of (i) their current salary base, or (ii) their salary base as of 6/30/08, regardless of terminated participation - partial or otherwise - from the DB plan.

<u>Section 2:</u> Regarding the DB plan, replaces the requirement for termination cost studies performed by the actuary with termination costs determined via formula incorporating the following:

- a. Establishes partial termination thresholds beyond which termination costs would apply. Employer categories based on salary base size
 - 20% for employers whose total system-wide salary base is greater than \$5MM (~93% in FY12)
 - 2. 50% for employers whose total system-wide salary base is greater than \$1MM (~6% in FY12)
 - not applicable for under \$1MM (~1% in FY12)
- b. Establishes a rolling, two-year period, over which costs from partial terminations would be determined;
- c. Using readily available data, establishes the formula for determining termination costs whereby any terminated salaries beyond the threshold (20%/50%) would be applied to the current past service contribution rate (24.19% today), and paid annually, until the debt is paid off.
- d. Formula is simple and does not require a consultant fee. For example:
 - 1. Amount by which an employer's salary base exceeds its salary base from two years prior (by 20% or 50% depending on current salary base level) * past service contribution rate * years to pay down total unfunded liability; $$100,000 \times 24\% = $24,000$ annually $\times 30$ years = \$720,000

Sections 3, 4 & 5: Same as Section 2 described above, only pertaining to the DC plan.

<u>Section 6</u>: Repeals language requiring a termination study for an employer that requests termination from the plan all together. Such an employer would still be subject to the 6/30/08 salary base "floor".

Section 7: Annuls the current regulation that covers the calculation of termination costs/studies.

<u>Sections 8 & 9:</u> Adds applicability/retroactivity language to allow employers to discontinue any payments after the effective date of the Act where an employer would not have had to pay if the new formula were in place after 6/30/08.

Section 10: immediate effective date.

NATURAL GAS DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM EXTENSION CONTRIBUTION IN AID OF CONSTRUCTION AGREEMENT FOR THE CITY OF HOMER NATURAL GAS DISTRIBUTION SPECIAL ASSESSMENT DISTRICT

THIS AGREEMENT made this _____ day of March, 2013, by and between ENSTAR Natural Gas Company, a division of SEMCO Energy, Inc., whose address is 3000 Spenard Road, P. O. Box 190288, Anchorage, Alaska 99519-0288 (hereafter "ENSTAR"), and the City of Homer, whose address is 491 East Pioneer Avenue, Homer, Alaska 99603 (hereafter "CITY").

WHEREAS, ENSTAR is a gas distribution public utility which provides natural gas service subject to tariff on file with the Regulatory Commission of Alaska and is authorized to provide said service within the CITY, and

WHEREAS, the CITY is in the process of forming a natural gas distribution special assessment district (hereafter "HSAD") consisting of the lots and tracts within the CITY area as shown on Attachment "A", for the purpose of installing a natural gas distribution system extension (hereafter "System"), and

WHEREAS, the System, which will be an extension of ENSTAR's existing system, will be constructed and ultimately the responsibility of, and be owned and operated by ENSTAR, its successors or assigns, and,

WHEREAS, said System must be installed to ENSTAR's specifications, by ENSTAR or by a contractor approved by ENSTAR in order for ENSTAR to connect to the System and to assume full responsibility for the System, and

WHEREAS, Section 602 of ENSTAR's tariff governs System extensions.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises ENSTAR and the CITY agree as follows:

- 1. For a contribution in aid of construction (CIAC) in an amount not to exceed \$12,160,632 calculated in accordance with Section 602 of ENSTAR's tariff and subject to the provisions below, ENSTAR will construct an extension of its natural gas distribution system of approximately 392,000 feet of 2" High Density Polyethylene Pipe to allow service to all lots and tracts within the HSAD as depicted on Attachment "A" to this Agreement. ENSTAR may elect (but shall not be obligated) to construct the System to accommodate future customer load, but all costs to accommodate future load in excess of the CIAC stated above will be borne solely by ENSTAR. This Agreement does not provide for the connection of a service line from the System to the property owner or customer's facilities. The cost, terms and conditions for the connection of a service line is governed by a separate Service Line Agreement between ENSTAR and the individual property owner or customer which must be executed before natural gas can be provided to said facilities. The not to exceed CIAC referenced above is an estimate calculated in accordance with Section 602 of ENSTAR's Tariff. This is a total project cost estimate used to calculate property assessments in the HSAD and for the purposes of seeking project financing. The parties agree to the following provisions with respect to the CIAC.
- (a) Construction of the System will occur in two Phases. Phase I is planned for the 2013 construction season and Phase II is planned for the 2014 construction season. The not to

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exceed CIAC applies to the total System and to both Phases and construction seasons. ENSTAR agrees that if construction is delayed and cannot be completed until 2015, the not to exceed CIAC and the final CIAC based upon the actual costs described below apply and remain in effect.

- ENSTAR agrees that if the total project cost exceeds the not to exceed CIAC, it will be responsible for the excess, and will not ask the CITY for an additional contribution.
- ENSTAR agrees that the actual CIAC may be less than the not to exceed CIAC. In accordance with the provisions of Section 7 below, ENSTAR agrees to invoice the CITY for its actual costs of construction on a time and materials basis. For the purposes of this contract, actual cost means:
- Labor costs for work performed by ENSTAR employees plus (1) allowable administrative and construction overheads at the rates established by the State of Alaska Annual Systems Audit for 2013 reimbursable construction projects.
- The actual contract cost for installation of pipe by a qualified thirdparty contractor. ENSTAR agrees that there will be no mark-ups, overhead or profit charged on third-party contracts.
- The actual contract cost of all other third-party contracts, including, (3) but not limited to, surveyors. ENSTAR agrees that there will be no mark-ups, overhead or profit charged on third-party contracts.
- The actual cost of all project materials, plus a markup on material (4) handled by ENSTAR employees to compensate ENSTAR for its administrative and construction overheads at the rates established by the State of Alaska Annual Systems Audit for 2013 reimbursable construction projects. ENSTAR agrees that inventory overheads will not apply if materials are delivered directly to the construction site.
- The CITY reserves the right to examine or audit all financial records directly related to this project and the invoices submitted to the CITY. This includes, but is not limited to, contracts, invoices, timesheets, and other relevant documents.
- ENSTAR shall perform, or have performed, all studies, analyses, engineering, 2. contracting, acquisition, construction, supervision, testing, acceptance and other acts necessary to construct the System.
- ENSTAR shall install the System within existing easements and right-of-ways where 3. natural gas lines may be installed or it will obtain easements as needed where existing easements and right-of-ways are not adequate. ENSTAR's inability to secure the necessary easements and/or right-of-ways shall be considered reasonable cause under paragraph 15 of this Agreement.
- ENSTAR shall own the System; however, if at any time before the end of the useful 4. life of the System, ENSTAR or its successors or assigns formally abandons natural gas service to any lot or tract shown on Attachment "A," excluding abandonment of service lines or related plant then, ENSTAR shall, upon written demand by the CITY, convey to the CITY all of ENSTAR's rights, title and interest in that part of the System abandoned, including any unrefunded construction deposits.

- 5. The CITY makes no warranties of title, quality or fitness for a particular use and specifically denies any warranty or responsibility of any kind with respect to the engineering, construction, location, condition or completeness of the System.
- 6. ENSTAR shall assume full responsibility for all aspects of the System, including but not limited to the System's maintenance, upkeep and safety. ENSTAR agrees to maintain and operate the System at ENSTAR's sole expense for the useful life of the System or until gas service is discontinued in accordance with applicable law. Additionally, excluding incidents which arise in whole or in part from the negligent acts or omissions of the CITY or its personnel that cause bodily injury or death or physical damage to tangible property, ENSTAR agrees to indemnify, save, hold harmless and defend the CITY for and from any and all claims, charges and suits arising in whole or in part out of the engineering, construction, location, operation, use or any condition of the System, or arising from ENSTAR's failure to obtain necessary permits, authorizations, or failure to comply with any federal, state or local law applicable to the Agreement, or arising out of any other action or failure to act by ENSTAR related to the System.
- 7. The CITY shall pay ENSTAR, in total, no more than the not to exceed CIAC set out in paragraph 1 above. The actual CIAC may be less and will be based upon actual costs incurred as described in Section 1 above. The parties have a mutual interest to ensure that the project proceeds expeditiously and efficiently. Therefore, the City agrees to advance funds in three lump sum installments in calendar year 2013. On or about March 25, 2013, the City will provide a lump sum in the amount of \$2,000,000 to facilitate pre-construction activities including, but not limited to, permitting, surveying, engineering, design and procurement. This date is subject to final approval of the financing documents by a lending institution, the City Council, and the availability of the bond proceeds. Notwithstanding a written authorization to proceed from the CITY, until ENSTAR has received this initial advance of \$2,000,000, ENSTAR shall not be obligated to commence preconstruction activities.

Provided that ENSTAR first has notified the City that ENSTAR has signed a construction contract with a third-party contractor, the City will forward a second lump sum in the amount of \$3,000,000 no later than June 3, 2013. Notwithstanding a written authorization to proceed from the City, until ENSTAR has received this second advance payment of \$3,000,000, ENSTAR shall not be obligated to commence installation of natural gas distribution mains.

Finally, the City shall forward a third lump sum payment in the amount of \$2,000,000 no later than August 5, 2013. If the third advance is not made by August 5, 2013, ENSTAR may cease all construction activities until such payment is actually received by ENSTAR.

The foregoing advance payments will be made in 2013 for a total of \$7,000,000. If the project is terminated for any reason, ENSTAR will refund any unused balance within thirty (30) days of contract termination.

Beginning in 2014, after all funds advanced in 2013 are exhausted, ENSTAR shall invoice the CITY each month during construction of the System for actual costs for ENSTAR labor, project

materials, and contractor work incurred during the preceding month. Save and except for portions of an invoice that are disputed in good faith, payments are to be made within thirty (30) days of receipt by the CITY of an ENSTAR invoice until the project is deemed complete, or the CIAC amount in paragraph 1 has been paid in full. Any amount outstanding after thirty (30) days will accrue interest at the rate of 10.5% percent per annum. In the event that all or a portion of any invoice (except for any portion of the invoice that is disputed in good faith) is not paid within forty-five (45) days from receipt of billing, ENSTAR may suspend all construction activities until the past due balance has been paid in full.

- 8. For the purposes of conforming with the section of ENSTAR's tariff governing System extensions (Section 602), the HSAD will be considered a developing subdivision. The CITY will be analogous to a developer for the purposes of payment and refund of the CIAC outlined in paragraph 1 above.
- 9. The HSAD is designed and engineered to accommodate a single service line and meter to each lot and tract shown in Attachment "A." In the event a tract or parcel is subdivided into multiple lots, or a tract or parcel is developed in a manner requiring multiple meters or service lines, ENSTAR, in its sole discretion, may require payment for a separate main extension and/or reinforcement costs.
- shown in Attachment "A" as property not eligible for connection to the HSAD without payment for a separate main extension and/or reinforcement costs. Alternatively, ENSTAR may elect to connect such property to the System installed under the terms of this Agreement. In that event, property outside of the HSAD shall be treated as property that has not contributed to the cost of the System. Accordingly, if the property is connected during the calendar year of construction, or within two (2) full years following the year of construction, the property owner or customer will be required to pay, as a main CIAC, a prorated share of the original CIAC prior to connection to the System, as outlined in Section 602e(2)(a) of ENSTAR's tariff. Any deposits collected from outside the HSAD plus the Free Main Allowance (FMA) attributable to the new customer will be refunded pro rata to the CITY and any new customer who has paid a deposit by February 1 for the previous year's new customer additions.

11. Refunds:

- (a) The Main Extension CIAC collected from a new Participant (as described in paragraph 10 above) plus the FMA attributable to the new Participant will be calculated and paid by ENSTAR annually on a pro rata basis to the CITY and any new Participant having paid a Main Extension CIAC. These will be paid by April 1 and be based upon the prior year's Participant additions to the Main Extension.
- (b) Refunds not involving the collection of a CIAC will be calculated for the CITY and those Participants who have Main Extension Advances on the Main Extension, except for Feeder Mains, prorata, equal in total to the amount of the Free Main Allowance for each new consuming Customer directly served by the Main Extension (not already included in a refund made under paragraph 11(a) above) until all of the CIAC portion of the Advance has been refunded or

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until the end of ten (10) full calendar years following the calendar year of construction, whichever occurs earlier. These refunds will be calculated and paid by ENSTAR quarterly within one month following the end of the calendar quarter and will be based upon the previous calendar quarter's Customer additions to the Main Extension.

- After the end of ten (10) full calendar years following the calendar year of construction the entire remaining amount of the CIAC shall become non-refundable and the property of ENSTAR.
- ENSTAR may offset against any portion, or all, of any Main Extension CIAC, or any refund of a Main Extension CIAC, for any or all outstanding monies due ENSTAR by the CITY.
- This Main Extension CIAC shall bear no interest and in no case may the (e) amount of the refund or the amount totally refunded exceed the amount of the original CIAC.
- After April 1st of each year, the CITY may request a report of Customers added, in the preceding calendar year, to an outstanding Main Extension CIAC.
- The CITY may distribute the refund entitlements, credit the refund against assessments due the CITY under the HSAD, make special assessment bond payments (related to financing the HSAD), deposit the refund in a fund used as security for said special assessment. bonds, or may make such use of the refund as it determines to be appropriate.
- 12. The CITY shall indemnify, hold harmless, save and defend ENSTAR from any and all claims, charges and suits arising out of the formation of the HSAD, the collection of the HSAD assessments by the CITY and claim for a refund by a property owner if such claim arises from a property within the HSAD/Special Assessment District and asserts misuse or misappropriation of refunds paid to the CITY under the provisions of this Agreement.
- 13. Subject to the provisions of Section 7 above relating to advance payments, this Agreement becomes effective on the date it is fully executed, provided ENSTAR shall not proceed with the construction of the System until written authorization to proceed has been received from the CITY, and provided further, if the CITY is unable to secure financing for the project at what the CITY Council determines are reasonable terms and conditions, or if the CITY Council does not form the HSAD, the CITY may cancel this Agreement. If an HSAD is canceled by the CITY, the CITY agrees to reimburse, upon demand by ENSTAR, all expenses and costs related to construction of the System, incurred after the receipt of written authorization to proceed.
- Subject to the provisions of Section 7 above relating to advance payments, upon 14. receipt of written authorization to proceed and certification of funding availability satisfactory to ENSTAR, ENSTAR shall proceed expeditiously with surveys, acquisition of permits and easements, and other actions necessary to begin the project. However, should adverse weather conditions render completion of the project either too costly or impractical in ENSTAR's judgment. ENSTAR may delay completion of the project until the following construction season, unless prior to construction start-up, the CITY cancels this Agreement pursuant to paragraph 15 below. If project completion is delayed under the provisions of this paragraph, ENSTAR agrees that the not to exceed CIAC remains in effect.

- 15. This Agreement is entered into based upon an estimate of actual construction costs. If for any reasonable cause ENSTAR is unable to begin constructing the System during the 2013 construction season, either party may cancel this Agreement or may negotiate a new price consistent with the same methodology as described in this agreement as determined for the following year. In this paragraph, "reasonable cause" means a delay that is caused by a "Force Majeure Event" as defined in paragraph 26 below, or any other event or condition that another provision of this Agreement identifies as reasonable cause for the purpose of this paragraph.
- 16. ENSTAR shall be responsible for obtaining all permits, easements, authorizations, labor, materials, contracts and other things and actions necessary to construct the System. ENSTAR's inability to secure the necessary permits, easements, authorizations, labor, materials or contracts shall be considered reasonable cause under paragraph 15 of the Agreement.
- 17. The CITY will be allowed to participate in ENSTAR's typical processes associated with subcontracting the services to third-party contractors. Selection of any contractor, however, will be the sole responsibility of ENSTAR. In the selection process, preference will be given to a qualified bidder with the lowest bid. ENSTAR agrees to publish public notice in a newspaper of general circulation in the Homer area when soliciting bids from third-party contractors. In no event, however, shall this Section 17 be interpreted to require ENSTAR to deviate from its normal procedure for accepting and awarding contracts.
- 18. Pursuant to Section 602f(3)(d) of ENSTAR's tariff, the CITY will annually provide ENSTAR with a sworn verification that refunds to the CITY for the previous year made pursuant to ENSTAR tariff Section 602e(3) have been applied on behalf of individual Participants in accordance with the CITY's ordinances and resolutions that authorized the HSAD.
- 19. This Agreement is binding on the successors, assigns and legal representatives of the parties.

- 22. No failure or delay by any party in exercising any right under this Agreement shall operate as a waiver of that right, nor shall any partial exercise of a right preclude any further exercise of that or any other right. The rights shall be cumulative and not exclude any rights or remedies provided by law.
- 23. The parties to this Agreement make no representation (except as expressly stated herein) or warranty of any kind or nature, directly or indirectly, express or implied, as to any matter whatsoever, including merchantability or fitness for a particular purpose.
- 24. This Agreement shall be construed under the laws of Alaska. Any dispute hereunder will be resolved by the Alaska Superior Court at Anchorage. However, this clause shall not be interpreted to affect the primary jurisdiction of the Regulatory Commission of Alaska.
- 25. Neither ENSTAR nor the CITY shall be liable to the other for exemplary, punitive, incidental or consequential damages (including without limitation lost profits or revenues) resulting from or arising out of this Agreement, whether the claim is based in contract, tort, strict liability or any other legal theory or principle.
- 26. No delay or failure of performance by ENSTAR or the CITY, or the agents, directors, officers, employees and contractors of either, shall constitute a default hereunder or give rise to any claim for damages if and to the extent that such delay or failure is caused by Force Majeure affecting that party's ability to perform. "Force Majeure Event" means any event that directly or indirectly renders a Party unable, wholly or in part, to perform or comply with any obligation, covenant or condition in this Agreement if the event, or the adverse effects of the event, is outside of the control of, and could not have been prevented by, the affected Party with reasonable foresight, at reasonable cost, and by the exercise of reasonable diligence in good faith, and is not attributable to the negligence or willful misconduct of the affected Party. Force Majeure Events include without limitation the following events (to the extent they otherwise satisfy the definition):
- (a) act of God, fire, lightning, landslide, earthquake, storm, hurricane, hurricane warning, flood, high water, washout, explosion or well blowout;
- (b) strike, lockout or other industrial disturbance, act of the public enemy, war, military operation, blockade, insurrection, riot, epidemic, arrest or restraint by government of people, terrorist act, civil disturbance or national emergency;
- (c) the inability of the affected Party to acquire, or the delay on the part of the affected Party in acquiring materials, supplies, machinery, equipment, servitudes, right-of-way grants, pipeline shipping capacity, easements, permits or licenses, approvals or authorizations by regulatory bodies or oil and gas lessors needed to enable the Party to perform;
- (d) breakage of or accident to machinery, equipment, facilities, or lines of pipe, and the repair, maintenance, improvement, replacement, test, or alteration to the machinery, equipment, facilities, or lines of pipe, and the freezing of a well or line of pipe, well blowout, or the partial or entire failure of a Gas well; or

(e) act, order, or requisition of any governmental agency or acting governmental authority, or any governmental law, proration, regulation, or priority.

This Force Majeure provision shall not apply to payment when due of money that is owed by one party or to the other under the terms of this Agreement.

- 27. ENSTAR and the CITY are independent entities and are not the agent, partner or employee of the other.
- 28. Nothing in this Agreement is intended to benefit any third party not a signatory hereto.
- 29. The parties recognize that this Agreement is the product of the joint efforts of the parties and agree that it shall not be construed against one party or the other as a result of the preparation, submittal or other event of negotiation, drafting or execution hereof.
- 30. In the event of any action, or any judicial proceedings, or if the parties agree to arbitration proceedings to resolve any dispute under this Agreement, or to enforce any term of this Agreement, or to protect or preserve any rights under this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to an award of its actual reasonable costs and actual reasonable attorney fees incurred.
- 31. Each person signing this Agreement warrants that he or she has authority to sign the Agreement.
- 32. Neither party shall assign this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. Notwithstanding the foregoing, and subject to the provisions of Section 17 above, the CITY agrees that ENSTAR may assign portions of the Work to qualified subcontractors without the consent of the CITY.
 - 33. Additional Terms.
- (a) The CITY represents and warrants that neither federal Davis Bacon wages nor Alaska 'Little Davis Bacon' wages' (AS 36.05) apply to this project.
- (b) ENSTAR will not be required to provide revegetation in areas where working in previously disturbed soils.
- (c) ENSTAR will follow all federal, state, municipal and local codes and regulations in the installation and preparation of the pipeline extension.
- (d) ENSTAR shall prepare its own SWPPP to ensure adequate coverage for ENSTAR's scope of work.
- (e) ENSTAR believes (but does not warrant) that this Agreement does not require the review or approval of the Regulatory Commission of Alaska.

1 CITY OF HOMER 2 HOMER, ALASKA 3 City Manager 4 RESOLUTION 12-081 5 6 A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF HOMER, 7 ACCEPTING ALASKA, APPROVING AND THE 8 **IMPROVEMENT** PLAN SUBMITTED BYTHE **CITY** 9 MANAGER FOR THE PROPOSED NATURAL **GAS** 10 DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM SPECIAL ASSESSMENT 11 DISTRICT. 12 WHEREAS, The Homer City Council recently adopted Resolution 12-069 which 13 initiated the proposed natural gas distribution system special assessment district pursuant to HCC 14 15 17.04.040 (a) (1); and 16 WHEREAS, HCC 17.04.040 (b) (2) provides that upon adoption of a resolution initiating 17 a special assessment district, the City Manager shall prepare "an improvement plan for the 18 district that includes final boundaries for the district, the design of the proposed improvement, a 19 cost estimate for the improvement, the percentage of the improvement cost to be assessed against 20 properties in the district, a method for allocating the assessed cost of the improvement among the 21 properties in the district, the time period over which assessments will be financed, and a 22 23 preliminary assessment roll for the district."; and 24 WHEREAS, The City Council subsequently adopted Resolution 12-076 which 25 established exclusion criteria to determine which parcels within the City limits would not be 26 served by the proposed improvement and which parcels would be served but exempted from the 27 assessment district because they were not benefitted by the improvement; and 28 29 WHEREAS, The City Manager presented a proposed district improvement plan to the 30 City Council for review and approval at its regular meeting on September 24, 2012; and 31 32 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Homer City Council hereby accepts 33 and approves the Natural Gas Distribution System Special Assessment District Improvement 34 Plan submitted by the City Manager; a copy of which is attached and incorporated herein; and 35 36 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council authorizes the Administration to proceed 37 to the next steps in the Special Assessment District approval process beginning with the required 38 meetings with record owners of real property in the proposed district (HCC 17.04.040 (b) (1)). 39

NATURAL GAS DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM

IMPROVEMENT PLAN

September 24, 2012

Introduction

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The Homer City Council recently adopted Resolution 12-069 which initiated the Natural Gas Distribution System Special Assessment District. The Homer City Code (HCC 17.04.040 (b) (2)) provides that after a resolution initiating a special assessment district is adopted, the City Manager must prepare an improvement plan for the district. This document constitutes the improvement plan for the proposed gas distribution system special assessment district and contains the information required by code.

Boundaries of the District

When the City Council adopted Resolution 12-069 initiating the District, the intent was to initiate one special assessment district that would cover the entire area within the City limits. However, this does not mean that every lot or parcel in the City will receive direct access to gas. This special assessment district is designed to provide financing for construction of gas mains in most City streets. The City Council subsequently adopted Resolution 12-076 which established exclusion criteria to assist in determining which properties would not be served directly by gas mains constructed through the assessment district and which properties would be served but not benefitted and therefore exempted from the assessment district.

The exact boundaries of the proposed assessment district are difficult to draw on a map because of the size, complexity, and special characteristics of this district. The boundaries of the district can better be articulated by a narrative definition. This special assessment district includes all lots or parcels that are directly benefitted by the proposed improvement. Directly benefitted is defined as properties that have frontage on a road which contains a gas main. Properties fronting the trunk line that was partially funded with a legislative grant are also included. A list of properties within the assessment district is contained in the Preliminary Assessment Roll which is attached as Exhibit A. The preliminary assessment roll does not contain properties that are served but exempt from assessment under Resolution 12-076. Finally, Exhibit B is a map which shows the location and extent of the gas main improvements to be constructed. Lots with direct frontage on the mains are included in the assessment district.

Design of the Improvements

Exhibit B illustrates the location and extent of the gas main improvements. The improvements consist of 73 miles of pipe plus the portion of the trunk line which runs through the City. Most of the main lines

are two inches in diameter. Some are four inches in diameter if the demand load justifies it. Some are four inches or larger in order to provide for anticipated future growth. The specific design and engineering specifications will be the responsibility of Enstar Natural Gas Company. The exact location of mains within City Rights of Way will be determined through the City permitting process. Construction permits will be approved and construction work in City roads will be inspected by the Department of Public Works. The build-out of this construction project is expected to take two construction seasons. Exhibit B is color coded to show Year I and Year II phases, beginning with the downtown core in Year I. If this Special Assessment District is approved by January 2013, construction on the distribution system in the downtown area could begin in 2013.

Cost Estimate

Enstar has provided a construction cost estimate of \$12,160,632 for constructing the improvement other than the trunk line in the City (1). This translates into \$31.55 per foot (2). In addition to the construction cost, the City will add an administrative fee (3) and direct construction costs (4) to the total to be assessed. Based upon the number of properties to be assessed (3,855), it is estimated that the construction cost (excluding the cost of the trunk line in the City) per lot is \$3,283.30 plus interest on the portion of the project that the City will finance (5). This assessment number is anticipated to be an upper end, conservative estimate. The cost per property may be reduced depending upon the interest rate and the actual construction costs. The cost per lot will also be reduced by the Free Main Allowance (6).

NOTES

- 1. This is a not to exceed construction contract number and is good for two construction seasons provided a construction contract is signed in 2013. The estimate is probably high due to the large numbers of unknowns and the complexity of the built environment in Homer. The actual amount the City pays will be based upon actual costs. The City will receive invoices and have the ability to audit construction accounts. If the bids and actual costs are lower than this estimate, the assessments will be adjusted downward.
- This number is significantly higher than the published tariff for standard construction. The tariff
 permits costs above the published tariff rate for non standard construction conditions; which
 Homer has. Costs that exceed the tariff rate must be justified and the City will request a full
 accounting.
- Adopted Fee Schedule for Special Assessment Districts. For projects \$500,000 and over: \$25,000 plus 2.5%. The fee is \$316,515 and covers work by multiple departments to support this assessment district.
- 4. Direct Construction Costs: Estimated to be \$180,000. To cover the cost of seasonal inspectors, utility locators, project management, and equipment.
- 5. Interest: The assessment per property is estimated to be \$3,283.30 plus interest on the portion of the project that the City will finance. The interest rate is estimated to be 4% at this time. The City will take whatever interest rate it receives from the lender and pass it on to the property owner. The City will make no money on interest.

6. The Free Main Allowance is a type of refund the City will receive when properties hook up to natural gas. The intent is to partially compensate the City for its investment in the infrastructure. Initial estimates are that the City will receive \$1.6 Million in refunds over 10 years. The free main allowance can be applied to the City's loan payments and therefore reduce assessments.

Financing

The City will pay Enstar Natural Gas Company to construct the distribution system. Enstar will construct, own, operate, and maintain the system and assume all liability. In order to pay for construction, the City will need to borrow \$12,160,632; the balance of the construction cost will be paid for from grant funds. This can be done a variety of ways including selling special assessment bonds, obtaining AIDEA loan guarantees for a commercial loan, selling revenue bonds through the Alaska Municipal Bond Bank, and borrowing money from the Kenai Peninsula Borough. The City will weigh all of the alternatives in an effort to obtain the best terms. The decision on where to obtain financing will likely be made in November or December. This improvement plan anticipates a ten year term.

Percentage of Improvement Cost to be Assessed Against Properties in the District

75% of the cost of the improvement, including administrative and direct costs will be assessed against properties in the District. 25% of the cost of the improvement will be paid from grant funds.

Method for Allocating the Assessed Cost for the Improvement Among the Properties in the District

Resolution 12-069 initiating the Special Assessment District stipulates that all properties in the District will be assessed equally regardless of frontage, square footage, or appraised value.

Time Period Over Which Assessments will be Financed

Ten Years

The natural gas distribution system in the City that is proposed in the 34 improvement plan will improve the public health, safety and welfare, and is necessary and of 35 36 benefit to the properties to be assessed. 37 Section 2. Owners of real property that would bear 50 percent or more of the assessed 38 cost of the improvement did not file timely written objections to the improvement plan with the 39 City Clerk 40 41 Section 3. There is hereby created the City of Homer Natural Gas Distribution Special 42 Assessment District ("District"). The improvement that is to be constructed in the District shall 43 be as described in the improvement plan and illustrated in Exhibit B to this ordinance. The 44 properties that are to be assessed for the improvement are described in Exhibit A to this 45 46 ordinance.

47 48 49	Section 4. The estimated cost of the improvement is \$16,875,551. Seventy-five percent (75%) of the cost of the improvement will be assessed against the properties in the District. The estimated amount of the assessments is \$3,283.30 per lot.
50 51 52 53	Section 5. The improvement shall be constructed in two phases. Phase I construction shall commence in 2013 and Phase II construction shall commence in 2014. The two phases are illustrated in Exhibit B to this resolution.
54	
55	Section 6. The City Manager is authorized to proceed with the improvement, negotiate
56	for the sale of a special assessment bond or other financing for the construction of the
57	improvement for Council approval, and take such other actions that are necessary to accomplish
58	the improvement in accordance with the improvement plan upon financing approval by the
59	Council.
60	
61	Section 7. Upon the completion of Phase II of the construction of the improvement, an
62	amount equal to the actual total improvement cost not paid from grant funds, divided by the total
63	number of properties within the District shall be assessed against each property within the
64	District. The City Clerk shall prepare a final assessment roll assessing to each property in the
65	District the amount determined under this section. The proposed assessment roll for the District
66	shall be prepared and presented in accordance with HCC 17.04.070.
67	Section 8. The special assessments against properties in the District are liens on those
68 69	properties and are prior and paramount to all liens except municipal real property tax liens and
70	may be enforced as provided for the enforcement of municipal real property tax liens.

72	Section 9. This ordinance is not permanent in nature, and shall not be codified.
