CITY OF HOMER PROPERTY OWNER'S

RE: Ordinance 13-11(A) Amendment

Dear Council Members,

The Kachemak Bay Conservation Society (KBCS) researched the process for the rewriting of the Homer Spit Zoning. There was a public hearing at a Planning Commission Meeting; the Planning Department held a Spit Workshop and all spit landowners received a mail out regarding these changes. KBCS opposes amending Ordinance 13-11(A) to re-allow Heliports for helicopter flightseeing as a conditional use on the Homer Spit for the following reasons:

- 1. The Spit is not intended to be a flight zone for frequenting landing aircraft.
- 2. Helicopter flightseeing is not very compatible with the purposes of some of the other zones that have been designated on the Spit, particularly the Conservation Zones. The areas outside of the Marine Industrial Zones are used for recreation, commercial shops, parking for harbor access, sport fishing, bird watching, biking, sightseeing, and more.
- 3. The frequent takeoff and landing of flightseeing aircraft would add a noise level that would be disturbing, as this is one of Homer's most heavily used recreational areas.
- 4. The takeoff and landing of helicopters amongst all this activity is not only disturbing, noisy, and polluting, it can poses an unacceptable safety risk. These safety concerns consist of many birds flying around the Spit. Bald Eagles, shorebirds, geese, cranes, ravens, crows, sea ducks, kittiwakes, and multispecies of gulls' flights mixed with helicopters could lead to tragedy.
- 5. KBCS believes that helicopters are already based nearby at the airport and should remain there.

While KBCS thinks that there may be some valid reasons for a carefully regulated and a carefully sited heliport for marine industrial purposes that would be placed in the Marine Industrial Zone, heliports elsewhere on the Spit for commercial purposes, such as flightseeing, should be prohibited. Therefore, KBCS is opposed to amending Ordinance 13-11(A) to allow heliports on the Spit for helicopter flightseeing.

The following summarizes our activities as City Attorney during the month of April 2013.

City Council. I attended the April 8, 2013 City Council meeting.

<u>City Clerk</u>. I drafted an ordinance revising the City Code before its republication, based on recommendations from the new Code publisher.

<u>Natural Gas Distribution System</u>. I reviewed a form of easement for natural gas lines located on City property.

<u>Castner v. City of Homer</u>. I responded to Mr. Castner's opposition to the City's motion for summary judgment, and opposed Mr. Castner's motion for summary judgment against the City in this challenge to the assessment of individual condominium units.

<u>City of Homer v. Shadle</u>. The Planning Department and I provided Mr. Shadle and his engineer with additional information regarding requirements to bring his property into compliance with the Homer Zoning Code.

<u>Library</u>. I advised the Library Director regarding compliance with the First Amendment in adopting a policy regarding the use of library computers and video equipment.

<u>Harbor Revenue Bonds</u>. I prepared ordinances authorizing the City to issue up to \$4.2 million in harbor revenue bonds through the Alaska Municipal Bond Bank. On April 22, 2013, I attended a Council work session to explain the terms of the ordinances.


<u>The Auction Block Company v. City of Homer</u>. It appears that Mr. Hogan has found new financing, so the threatened foreclosure of his leasehold will not proceed. Holly Wells has negotiated the terms of an assignment to the new lender, and has worked to resolve other lease defaults as well.
