## **2014 BUDGET MESSAGE**

# Fiscal Year 2014

# Introduction

Homer City Code Section 3.05.010 requires that the City Manager provide the City Council with a budget proposal for the next fiscal year by the third Friday in October. HCC 3.05.011 states that the budget proposal should be accompanied by a budget message which summarizes the proposal, highlights significant changes from the previous year's budget, and addresses other important fiscal policy considerations.

The budget proposal for Fiscal Year 2014 is attached for your consideration. The Committee of the Whole meeting on October 14<sup>th</sup> is dedicated entirely to going over the draft budget. The Finance Director will be there to talk about revenue projections and to make sure everyone understands the budget layout and where to find the information they need. The Acting City Manager and Department heads will be available to discuss expenditures and overall fiscal policy. It is my goal to make sure the Council understands the budget and the assumptions that went into putting it together. This is a draft budget and is commonly referred to as the "Manager's Budget." Once the budget ordinance is introduced by Council, (scheduled for October 28), it becomes the Council's budget and amendments can be made as Council deems appropriate.

# **General Fund**

The draft budget contains revenue projections that we consider to be realistic and conservative. The projections are based upon audited numbers from Fiscal Year 2012 and revenue received so far for Fiscal Year 2013 through the end of September. This data is supplemented with tax and economic projections provided by the Borough and the State. Finally, we take into consideration information about economic trends provided by local sources such as the Chamber of Commerce and the Marine Trades Association. Based upon anecdotal information, we expect that the third quarter sales receipts will be significantly higher than last year. We have projected, based upon what we know, that revenues will increase by at least \$400,000 over last year. Once again, we are preparing a budget with limited information regarding revenues. New property tax information and additional sales tax information will become available in November. Therefore, it is possible that the Council will be able make budget amendments based upon this new information prior to final adoption of the budget in December.

On the expenditure side, this can basically be described as a "status quo" or "treading water" budget. The budget is "balanced" in the sense that expenditures do not exceed revenues. The budget is basically flat with the exception of the new items added which include funding for depreciation, Phase I of the IT upgrades, and a 2% COLA. Noteworthy expenditure reductions occurred in fuel costs and insurance premiums. The conservation and risk management measures we have implemented are paying off.

Unfortunately, revenue limitations prevent us from proposing that important programmatic and staffing issues be addressed at this time. In addition to that, proposed contributions to depreciation accounts are less than desirable and cannot be increased unless revenue projections improve or significant program cuts are made. Hopefully, it will be possible to address depreciation further either before the budget is adopted in December or at mid-year. Once again, the Department Heads have been very frugal with respect to operating expenditures and keeping costs down. There are very few increases in line items that are discretionary. The Budget contains very lean departmental operating budgets.

On the capital and equipment side, this budget contains proposed expenditures that begin to address the priority needs backlog. A description of these expenditures and a justification for them is included in the budget. These expenditures can be explained more fully at the Committee of the Whole meeting. They include repainting the 1995 backhoe, removing an underground fuel tank at the airport, and a new vehicle for the project manager at Public Works, a new phone system, air conditioner for the radio room and new squad car for the Police Department, a new gas detector and external fire escape for the Fire Department, new technology equipment at the Library, and Phase One / virtual server and storage arrays for IT. Unfortunately, I was not able to approve other worthy projects. These projects are included at the back of the budget and I hope to have those added soon.

# Highlights / What is and is not Included

This section contains a list of highlighted items in the operating budget that are of great interest and importance to the City Administration, City employees, the Council, and the general public. These are issues that the Council is likely to hear much more about as the budget approval process moves forward.

- COLAs: The budget includes a 2% COLA for all employees. The employees have not received a COLA for the past five years. Adding a COLA is consistent with the Council's request that we look at the entire compensation package and not just focus on health insurance. The COLA helps employees keep up with inflation and helps to partially compensate for the pay cut contained in the health insurance plan amendments. The cost of living continues to rise and the value of City compensation continues to erode. This issue is beginning to affect the City's ability to recruit and retain quality employees. I hope Council will increase the COLA if it has the opportunity.
- Personnel: This budget does not include any new personnel, including positions requested and filling currently vacant positions. From a management perspective, I can tell you that we have very urgent needs in some departments, especially Police Dispatch, building maintenance, parks, and the library.
- Depreciation: This budget contains a minimal amount of money for depreciation. The good news is that we were at least able to transfer some money into depreciation accounts this year. That was not the case last year. The fleet reserves are funded at last year's levels.
- Nonprofits: This budget contains funding for all nonprofits at last year's levels. The Chamber of
  Commerce has formally requested an increase in its budget allocation. Other requests may be
  coming. None of these requests are included in this draft budget. The Council may amend this part
  of the budget as it sees fit and appropriate.
- Money for a Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment is not included due to budget limitations.

 Money requested by the Public Arts Committee for Baycrest gateway is not included due to budget limitations.

# **Budget Priorities**

This section contains the City Manager's budget priorities for items that are presently not included in the budget. If revenue projections improve before December or by mid-year 2013, I would recommend that the following be added to the budget.

- Personnel: We have very serious needs in some departments, especially Police Dispatch, Public
  Works and the Library. Staffing requests from Fire Department are well supported and would
  improve public safety and public services. Parks could really use another seasonal employee. The
  top, critical priorities from my perspective are filling the vacant police dispatch position, upgrading
  the Children's Librarian position, and getting help for building maintenance.
- Depreciation: It is the Council's adopted policy to provide significant funds for depreciation and I could not agree more. This should be addressed if more revenues become available.
- COLA: This issue is very important for competitiveness and for the morale of City employees.
   Unfortunately, I could only find enough money for 2%. That does not keep up with inflation over the past five years.

# **Policy Considerations**

There are several important General Fund policy consideration that I believe the Council should take into consideration as it moves ahead with budget discussions.

- Health Care Costs: Rapidly escalating health insurance costs continue to consume more and more of
  the available revenues despite recent steps that were taken to restrain or reduce costs. This puts
  significant constraints on the City's ability to address program and service delivery needs. We
  believe the amendments proposed for the health insurance plan which accompany this budget will
  address the problem in a very significant and meaningful way. We look forward to your response.
- Core Programs: There has been a good deal of discussion lately about new programs and services that the public wants but the City cannot afford. The public has been asked to identify where the money would come from or to show that they were willing to pay for it. I think at this point, it would be useful to note that the City needs some of that additional revenue to take care of its most basic services and functions. The fact that we are continually talking about the lack of funds for depreciation, maintenance and repair, replacement of aging equipment, vacant positions and competitive compensation should be an indicator.
- The Disconnect: There continues to be a huge public disconnect between what we want and what
  we are willing to pay for and maintain. We all love our capital projects. There is no shortage of ideas
  about new programs, new services, and new infrastructure. There are so many examples and the
  pressure continues to grow. We continue to build new stuff and make requests for more.
  Unfortunately, all of that new stuff requires money and increased staffing for maintenance and
  operations. The City's maintenance and operations responsibilities continue to grow while the

budget and staffing levels continue to stagnate and in many cases, decrease. The City staff have done an excellent job of increasing efficiency and "doing more with less." However, we are getting very close to our limits and the point of diminishing returns. This needs further public discussion.

# Port and Harbor Enterprise Fund

The Draft FY 2014 Budget projects that revenues will increase by approximately \$200,000. We believe that number is very conservative and it ultimately could be significantly more than that. Most of the increase is related to increased activity at the Deep Water Dock which we expect to continue. This projection does not assume that the drilling Rig Endeavor will dock there again this year. It also does not include any increases in fees. An increase across the board to cover inflation is recommended and fee increases are also recommended by Northern Economic in their new rate study. Fees will be discussed in detail by the Port and Harbor Commission and it may make recommendations by the time the Budget is formally introduced on October 28. Revenue projections are based on actual revenue receipts in 2012 and receipts to date in 2013. We also take into consideration current revenue trends and business cycles. The projected revenues are sufficient to cover basic maintenance and operations. The Enterprise Fund is balanced in the sense that expenditures do not exceed revenues. This Budget contains revenues of \$4,544817 and expenditures of \$4,534,344.

Expenditures have changed very little from last year if you look solely at maintenance and operations. The Port and Harbor staff has been very frugal and efficient when it comes to costs that are within their control. The increase in overall expenses is attributable largely to a substantially larger transfer to depreciation reserves and to new bond payments. This budget funds depreciation at \$705,217 which is about \$200,000 more than last year. It also transfers \$300,000 into the Bond Reserves Account. In short, the fee increases instituted in 2012 and 2013 are doing exactly what they were intended to do; cover the cost of bond repayment and provide additional revenue for depreciation. Overall, the Enterprise Fund is in pretty good shape. There are operational needs that cannot be funded at this time but should be identified and prioritized. Chief among them is the need to increase staffing levels and contributions to depreciation accounts.

This budget contains several relatively small capital expenditures which total \$62,000. They are all explained and justified in the budget document and can be discussed more fully at the Committee of the Whole meeting. Capital improvements include maintenance cameras at the Fish Dock, a float sweeper, a new door on the Fish Dock cold storage unit, a used two wheel drive vehicle, and a new waste oil heater for the maintenance shop.

# **Budget Priorities**

If the revenue picture were to change in a positive way, there are several priority items that I would recommend be added to the budget or receive increased funding.

 Depreciation: The depreciation account fund balance is insufficient for the amount of assets the Port and Harbor owns and maintains and transfers to this account are far below what is recommended by the auditors. • Funding for a Port Operations Specialist.

# **Budget Policy Considerations**

- Depreciation: The depreciation fund balance remains insufficient given the assets of the Port and Harbor. This fund took a big hit when approximately \$800,000 was transferred recently to the Port Bond Reserves Account. According to the Bond Bank, we should transfer that money back into the depreciation account. The Bond Reserve account only needs to have a balance of 1:25 times the annual bond payment. The City should to find ways to increase contributions to the depreciation fund.
- Revenues for Operations: Fees were increased recently to cover anticipated bond payments and
  depreciation. However, this left little room for additional fee adjustments to cover increasing
  maintenance and operations costs. The City recently received the rate study it commissioned from
  Northern Economics. The study addresses maintenance and operations and the level of revenues
  that are needed to make the enterprise fund sustainable.
- Staffing levels: Staffing levels have not changed for many years but duties and responsibilities have
  increased dramatically. Most evenings there is only one harbor officer on duty which is a bit risky
  considering the total value of not only the port and harbor assets, but the value of assets mooring in
  or otherwise using the facilities.
- Revenues Generally: Significant structural changes are occurring in both the commercial and sport
  fishing industries. It will be important to monitor these changes and their potential impacts upon
  the revenues and business model of the port and harbor.

# **Water and Sewer Special Revenue Fund**

There is good news overall about the Water and Sewer Special Revenue Fund. This proposed budget is balanced and there is no need to dip into the reserves, raise fees, or make unsustainable cuts to an already lean budget. The Fund is expected to be operating in the black in 2014 which is good news for all. The projected revenues are conservative. We felt that a conservative approach was necessary because revenues under the new rate structure are much more dependent on consumption than the prior fee schedule which brings with it a greater level of uncertainty. In addition we don't know what effect the new schedule might have on consumer behavior. Consumption was definitely trending upward this year and that provide a measure of confidence in our projections. The projected revenues are sufficient to cover budgeted expenditures. The budget is balanced in the sense that expenditures do not exceed revenues. At the time this report was written, revenues were projected at \$3,621,500 and expenditures were \$3,616,062. Some last minute adjustments are anticipated before the Council receives the final draft.

Expenditures for basic maintenance and operations have changed very little from last year. In fact, the sewer budget has actually decreased slightly. The Water and Sewer Superintendent and his staff should be commended for providing a very lean and efficient operating budget and for holding expenses down. The slight increase in expenditures is mostly attributable to increases in fixed costs. This budget transfers the minimal amount (\$200,000) into the depreciation account. More would be desirable.

The draft budget contains a number of capital expenditures which will come out of depreciation and fleet reserve accounts. The capital budget includes a total of about \$75,000 in expenditures for sewage lagoon improvements, a water storage tank diffuser, a snow plow and flatbed for an existing truck, mixed oxidant disinfectant at the water treatment plant, and a new mid-size 4by4. If more revenues become available, it is recommended that they be placed into the depreciation account.

# **Policy Considerations**

- Increasing Customers: This has been discussed many times before. One of the fundamental flaws that needs to be addressed is that we have an expensive and expansive treatment, collection and distribution infrastructure and very few customers to pay for maintenance and operations. There are many ideas for increasing the customer base from in-filling, to expanding the system to the rest of the city, to identifying new buyers for bulk water. All of these ideas should be explored further.
- Rate Model: 2014 will be the first year for the new rate structure and it should provide us with
  experience and good information as we head into 2015. We would recommend that the Council
  consider spending some funds to commission a rate study similar to the one it received for the Port
  and Harbor.

# <u>Introduction</u>

In June of this year, the City Council held a workshop to hear a presentation from the City's insurance broker / consultant on the state of the employee health insurance plan. The picture presented was bleak despite recent amendments to the benefit package, the implementation of employee premiums, an increase in the City contribution, and the implementation of a new wellness program. Health care costs are rising so rapidly that it affects every decision we make about the budget. Health Insurance is now driving the bus. There are many factors contributing to this including escalating medical costs, an aging workforce, and very high utilization of a rich plan.

Following is a quick recap of the workshop information. In calendar year 2012, the City budgeted \$1,300 per employee per month for health insurance. Actual expenses for that year were \$1,912.82 per employee per month. The City experienced cost overruns for that year of \$641,115. In 2013 (this year), the City contribution was raised to \$1,500 per employee, per month. The average cost was \$1,871.20 per employee per month at the end of May and based upon that trend, it was projected that the City would lose another \$371,290 in 2013. The Council transferred \$800,000 from reserves to the self-insurance fund as part of the mid-year budget amendment. This transfer covered real and projected losses for these two years but it did little to replenish the insurance reserve fund.

To make matters worse, the broker projected that if no changes were made to the plan, the cost in 2014 would be \$2,050.81 per employee, per month or \$2,486,588 a year. This would require another \$600,000 and would likely result in significant budget cuts. It was clear to everyone that this trend is not sustainable.

# <u>Response</u>

The consensus of the Council was that we needed to again address rapidly rising health care costs. Several ideas were floated about how to approach it. The Council was informed that the Administration was already working on amendments to the plan for consideration. It was generally agreed that the best and most appropriate course of action would be for the administration to amend the plan and for the Council to approve it as part of the normal budget process. The City Manager reported that the administration's goal was to keep the City contribution at the same level as 2013; \$1,500 per employee, per month. The extra funds needed would be made up through changes in the plan and a larger employee contribution.

Since the June workshop, HR Director Andrea Petersen and Insurance broker Jeff Paxton have been working almost non-stop to come up with plan amendments that satisfy our goals. Finance Director John Li and I were brought into the conversation at crucial decision making points. The broker also called upon other experts and an actuarial as needed. Our goals going into this process were:

- Maintain the current (FY 13) City contribution of \$1,500 per employee, per month in order to slow the rapid growth in City expenses for health insurance and protect other programs from budget cuts.
- Protect existing jobs and programs
- Produce health insurance plan options for employees that are still very good plans compared to industry standards and comparable cities and organizations.
- Minimize to the extent possible the financial impacts to employees.
- Compensate employees for the loss in benefits with a COLA (if possible).
- Mitigate the potential impacts of the excise tax.
- Have the amendments approved as part of the normal budget process.

Andrea and Jeff worked very hard to come up with a plan that was sustainable and at the same time minimized to the extent possible the impacts on employees. This was a very difficult task given the magnitude of the problem. I believe they reviewed and adjusted at least 80 different plans using different assumptions, utilization trends, and interpretations of the data. We started out thinking that we would do as much as we could with plan amendments and try to minimize premiums (money deducted from paychecks). The two plans forwarded to employees ended up containing both plan amendments and increases in premiums. Significant increases in premiums was necessary because if we relied totally on plan amendments, we would have had deductibles and out of pocket max levels so high that the end result was a plan that essentially covered only catastrophic events.

We met with employees the weeks of September 23 and 30 to explain the need for changes and go over the new, proposed insurance plans. The reaction was what you might expect.

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Employees in general were not very happy. Many employees knew this was coming sooner or later and were not surprised. Others appreciated the fact that they have a choice between two different plans. Employees who are recent arrivals let us know that these are still good plans compared with what is available in most other places.

But, there is no way to sugar coat this. If implemented, this would be a significant reduction in employee benefits and real hit to their wallets. I don't like reducing employee benefits and would increase them if I had the resources to do so. They deserve it. The biggest impact will be disproportionately to employees in middle income brackets who have families. From my conversations with employees, it seems like the premiums are a bigger concern than increases in deductibles and other plan amendments. This is a lot to absorb all at once and will really impact family budgets. The Council could reduce premiums or delay their full implementation but that would likely require budget cuts elsewhere, new revenues, or acceptance of the risk that there might be additional cost overruns and no replenishment of the reserve fund.

Based upon the feedback we received from employees, we reduced the new premiums 20% across the board with the exception of the premium for employee only. The plans were calculated to cover the Plan costs and replenish the reserve fund. After a lot of additional number crunching, I concluded that this reduction in premiums was an acceptable risk. If this decision turns out to be a bad move, the risk is that the reserve fund will not be replenished and further adjustments may be necessary.

It is projected that the two plan options that have been rolled out would save the City approximately \$600,000 in 2014 assuming we did nothing and maintained the status quo. It is important to be clear about this though. We have not cut the City budget for health insurance. We have simply stopped the escalation in cost. The City contribution to insurance is maintained at last year's level. The employees are making up the additional cost through plan amendments and premiums. It is hoped that these plans will result in employees thinking more like consumers and making typical consumer choices when it comes to purchasing health care services. The result could be less utilization and lower costs.

# <u>Characteristics of the New Plans</u>

Copies of the proposed health insurance plans that have been provided to the employees are attached for your information. A copy of the current plan is also attached for comparison purposes. In short, the primary amendments contained in the new plans are:

- Two plans for employees to choose from; a "Core Plan" and a "Buy-Up Plan."
- Unbundling of medical, dental, and vision plans.
- Higher co-pays, higher deductibles, and higher out of pocket limits.

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- The preferred Provider Organization (PPO) Network will no longer be silent to the participant
- Higher premiums (payroll deductions)
- A new co-pay for office visits.
- New fees for spouses who have insurance at their own employer but choose to seek coverage by the City Plan.
- Payments / incentives to employees who "opt-out" and take coverage with their spouse's plan.

# The Process Going Forward

It is my understanding that the Council's expectation is that the Administration will amend the health insurance plan to reduce the City's costs, hold the City contribution to the same level as the FY 2013 Budget, and submit the package to Council as part of the normal budget approval process. We have completed our work. I believe that we have produced the best product we could given the circumstances and the limited financial resources available to us. This has been a very painful process as you might imagine. But I believe that if implemented, the new plan will slow the rapid escalation in health care costs and still provide a very good benefit to employees. I very much want to provide a COLA this year but chances are that I may not be in a position to do so in the draft budget. I would welcome any Council discussion about COLAs or providing assistance with the premiums however, you should be aware going in that this will likely mean cuts somewhere else or new revenue.

The Budget schedule calls for the City Manager to deliver the draft budget to the Council by October 14. This is the date of a regular Council meeting and the Committee of the Whole will be used for an introduction to the draft FY 2014 Budget. As part of the budget discussion, we can also review the proposed health insurance plan.

I would strongly recommend that the Council let us know early on whether it is in favor of this plan or not. Council will have two opportunities to do this, at the meeting on the 14<sup>th</sup>, when the budget is delivered to you and on October 28<sup>th</sup>, when the budget is formally introduced by ordinance. The reason for requesting that you act quickly on this is that in order to implement the new plan beginning January 1, 2014, we must start an open enrollment period on November 1. The open enrollment period will last for two months until the end of December.

# **Future Recommendations**

As we worked our way through this process, it became clear to me that a self- insured plan may no longer be the most cost effective approach for the City. The self-insured plan has served us very well for many years. For a long time, the City had the best coverage at the

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lowest cost per employee of any City. But things have changed, and changed rapidly. We now have some of the highest costs per employee. There are many possible reasons for this. The reasons include rising medical costs overall, an aging workforce, a rich plan that results in high utilization and costs, and a very small pool over which to spread the risk.

I would recommend that the City stick with the self-insured plan for at least one more year until we have more information about some of the variables and uncertainties that currently exist. As things shake out, we might recommend a variety of changes next year that could reduce costs further. For example:

- The exchanges: As you know, the Affordable Health Care Act includes insurance exchanges which are currently being established. These exchanges may provide options that are not available now.
- Private Insurance: As we amend the benefit package to get closer to industry standards, the bids we receive from the private sector insurance companies become more and more attractive. We are rapidly moving toward the time when private insurance will be cheaper than the self- insurance plan.
- Plan Utilization: The proposed plan is projected to change utilization as employees make choices about where and how to spend their money. In short, there is a possibility that utilization may decrease, thus reducing costs.

Council will also need to consider how it will respond if costs continue to escalate in future years. Will the City increase its contribution? Will the City and employees split the additional costs based upon some formula? Employees are very worried about this because they know health care costs will only continue to go up. These are discussion items we will need to have as we move forward.

# Honorable Mayor Wythe & City Council:

Having reviewed the City Manager's Budget Memo to Council I would like to provide comment regarding the lack of support for the numerous funding requests presented to the City Manager regarding urgently needed and necessary maintenance issues regarding the existing station and the serious lack of advanced life support coverage during the summer months.

The Homer Volunteer Fire Department was established in 1952 by volunteers dedicated to providing fire protection and ambulance service to their neighbors. In 1979, following years of fundraising, the existing station on Pioneer Avenue was constructed using mostly volunteer time and labor and dedicated in 1980. Following consolidation with the City of Homer in 1990, the station and other assets were transferred to the city's care. Except for a major seismic construction upgrade and other necessary repairs in 1996/97 there has been little done to the station except routine maintenance. The majority of the floor coverings (rubber tile and carpeting) is original to the building (installed in 1979) and is simply wearing out. The exterior of the building, last stained more than 5 years ago, is also in desperate need of repainting and staining to maintain both the structure of the building and to prevent rot and decay of this critical infrastructure.

We realize that replacing the existing fire station with a new Public Safety Building has been identified as a capital priority but this process, with all good intentions, will still take at least 3-5 years before completion, if funding is obtained. In the meantime, it is vital that the existing facility be adequately maintained so that it retains its value and functionality. Deferring routine maintenance is neither wise, nor fiscally prudent if there is money in the building depreciation account.

As indicated in the City Manager's memorandum, his budget only included funding to replace the exterior fire escape and to replace aging and obsolete gas detectors and calibration equipment necessary for the safety of our responders. For Fiscal Year 2014 the Fire Department also requested funding for two, full-time seasonal Emergency Service Specialists (Firefighter/EMT-3) personnel to help provide coverage during the summer when a number of our volunteer responders are on leave and our paid staff tend to take annual leave (full staffing places 3 personnel [Fire Chief, Departmental Services Coordinator and ESS] in the station during the workweek 8 am until 5 pm, but only 1 on duty [ESS] 24 hours). As the call volume of the fire department continues to rise almost every year, our volunteer membership is harder pressed to be available around the clock, especially during the daytime hours when the majority of calls are handled. These two seasonal employees would aid in providing a more immediate response to calls both during the day and help ensure that advanced life support is available 24/7 as required by our ambulance certification level. As the fire department has had a vacant full-time position for some time (Assistant Chief), the remaining staff strives to provide continuous EMS coverage, often resulting in overtime and on-call pay.

I can assure the Mayor and City Council it is not my desire or intention to create a fully paid fire department. The community has been well served by the mostly volunteer fire department for over 60 years, and we strongly desire to retain both the volunteer spirit and level of professionalism demonstrated by HVFD from its inception. None-the-less, I do believe that we have reached a crossroads in the evolution of the fire service in Homer and must, for the benefit of our community, add more paid personnel during the busiest time of year to relieve the stress on both paid staff and volunteers alike.

I request the Council's support of my request for additional seasonal personnel in the 2014 budget.

To the Members of the Homer City Council:

By the time you receive this letter, there will be at least one – and possibly two – new faces on the City Council. Whatever the results of the election, I wish new and current members of the Council the wisdom and patience it takes to properly conduct the people's business. Public service takes a tremendous amount of time and energy, and it is often a thankless task. Good luck.

As you now settle in and tackle the upcoming budget, I ask that you consider incremental funding for the Homer Public Library. In particular, I ask that you consider increased funding for the library's badly outdated book collection, as well as increased funding to bring the Youth Services Librarian position from part-time to full-time. I can only hope that you will keep an open mind as you review the facts.

The book budget has been an ongoing issue for many years, with Homer perpetually behind the curve when compared to neighboring communities of similar size. In 2012, for example, the Homer Library's book budget was \$23,000, compared to \$48,500 for Kenai, \$50,300 for Kodiak, and \$40,000 for Soldatna. The City Council increased the book budget in 2013 to \$33,000 (thank you!), but we still have a lot of catch up. The average publication date of our adult non-fiction collection is 1992, for goodness sake! The Library Advisory Board provided at excellent overview of these dismal facts at a recent City Council Meeting. If any members missed that meeting, I hope that you will take the time to review that information.

The Youth Services Librarian is currently funded part-time at 28 hours per week. That is not enough to meet the demand, which has increased steadily each year and even more since the closure of the Boys and Girls Club. If you have had occasion to visit the library during Story Hour or any Summer Reading Program event, you already know how popular those programs are (who knew that we could squeeze over 150 adults and children into the Children's Library for a puppet show?). Those and similar programs are not just one-off events – they take time and organization. A Youth Services Librarian staffing the Children's Library during peak hours would also provide for greater oversight of the materials and facility, as well as allowing for a check-out area in the Children's enclosed space, thus decreasing noise and congestion at the main circulation desk.

One other thing – about that puppet show? In case some of you find that to be a "non-essential" expenditure of city funds, you should be aware that the puppeteer and supplies associated with that event – and indeed all of the Summer Reading Program events as well as many other events and programs held at the Library – were paid for by the Friends of the Homer Public Library. Since the new Library opened, the Friends have provided over \$130,000 in direct support of Library services and programs. This includes expenditures for programs and events that some might find non-essential (a puppet show) as well as some very essential items like landscape improvements/maintenance, memberships to the American Library Association and Grant Station, and needed equipment and shelving. In addition, volunteers provide hundreds of hours augmenting the Library's bare bone staff by doing everything from shelving books to mending muchloved books so that they can be checked out again. The point being – we are doing our part. It is up to you to ensure that the City does its part to fund this very essential service.

I am writing to request your support for a Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment for the City of Homer and it's surrounding areas. I support the Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee's request for this action. The completion of a Recreational Needs Assessment would ultimately result in a Recreational Master Plan for the City of Homer and it's surrounding areas.

I am a resident of Homer. When I first moved to Homer in 2002, I worked as a Skills Trainer for The Center. It was an endless search for healthy, recreational activities to do with people of all ages. We often used the HERC building, and I regularly accompanied kids to the Boys and Girls Club there. As a mother of two young children (ages 4 and 6) I continue to look for recreational opportunities for our whole family. I have attended the toddler playgroups at the HERC building, regularly enroll in Community Schools programs, and search endlessly for indoor (and outdoor!) activities. My husband and I own a business in town, a primary residence and a rental home (both in town) and we hope to remain here to raise our children until they graduate from Homer High School.

Recently, I was a co-chair for the Homer Playground Project. This opportunity provided me with a chance to meet and talk with many people from all walks of life here in Homer. The subject of recreational opportunities was a regular discussion. I had the pleasure of spending time with many parents, who were, and are, continually searching for "things for their kids to do". And, often, a place for them to do it! The new Homer Playground is only one part of the improvements taking place at Karen Hornaday Park, through it's Master Plan. The Plan is a work in progress, and a guide for action. (I also serve on the Karen Hornaday Park Sub-Committee).

I am now a part of the new group, ReCREATE REC, which formed in April, here in Homer. I know the Council has been introduced to our group. The group is growing in size each meeting, and is represented by diverse folks from a variety of Recreational User Groups. In our discussions, we all feel a state-of-the-art Recreational Facility (such as the HERC has tried to be) is needed in Homer. We also realize we need money for this, not only to build, but to maintain. The goal of ReCREATE REC is more broad than just a gathering space: "To assist the growing recreational, wellness and extracurricular needs of the citizens of the Southern Kenai Peninsula through support and growth of social, artistic, and recreation programs as well as the establishment of an indoor recreation and community space."

#### PUBLIC COMMENTS UPON MATTERS ALREADY ON THE AGENDA

Kathy Hill, city resident, commented in support of Resolution 13-095. She has a glimmer of hope regarding the HERC gym. She acknowledged that indoor recreation space is at a premium in our community and in her opinion the gym should be saved. It makes no sense to her to tear down the building then search for a huge amount of dollars to build a new one. Let's figure out a way to renovate it and keep it functioning for many more years. It is known that the school district can ask the community recreation programs to vacate their facilities, and with the demolition of the HERC gym, there would be no place to go. She questioned if the HERC gym could be integrated with the new public safety building and be used as a community facility as well. In her research she found two grants that appear to be geared toward recreation facility renovation, one is the State administered Community Development Block Grant sponsored by the Department of Housing and Urban Development, and the other is the Community Facilities Grant funded by the Department of Agriculture. She asked that Council please consider saving the HERC gym for our community.

Doug Dodd, city resident, thanked Mike Illg, City Administration, City Council, and the Mayor for making the HERC gym available for pickle ball over the past year. If that venue had not been available, he would not have participated at the International Senior Games in Fairbanks last month. Mr. Dodd acknowledged the economic benefits that accrue through community recreation and told Council about a retired couple from Fairbanks who came to visit in their motorhome for a week or so before moving on, but stayed for two months, regularly participating in the Pickle Ball games. The decision of how to best use the HERC gym and property is important with lasting consequences and should be made after an open discussion involving all the stakeholders. It would be best to do this through facilitated public hearings, not during regular council meetings. He thanked Council for their time, for making the HERC available for the past year, and for allowing Pickle Ball to continue while the issues surrounding the HERC are resolved.

Scott Adams, city resident by annexation, commented that he would like to see the fire department and police department proposal be put to the voters of the City of Homer. They did so for the city hall and he thinks they would get an outstanding idea of how people feel about what they are planning to do. It's a prime location and the value of the property could be better used than putting a fire and police department. His mom lives in Chatham, Mass, and their population is more than Homer and they have less police force, fire department, and less government than we do. He would like to see the City Council step back and review this. With the upcoming election there will be some change on Council and he would like to see any action taken after the election. He fears the way this council is going will break us all. Realistically we will be taxed for this.

## **VISITORS**

A. **Beth Cumming,** Kachemak Drive Non-Motorized Path Group, 10 minutes.

Beth Cumming, Lynn Burt, and Kevin Walker were present to comment to the Council about the Kachemak Drive Non-Motorized Path Group.

Beth Cumming said the group's first request is to turn down Resolution 13-040, second is allocate additional funds from HART to complete the survey as was laid out in Resolution 12-079, third they would like Council to show support for this project. It now appears it may be a state project since a title check shows the land in question is owned by the state. Some thoughts expressed about tonight's resolution are that it cuts out the possibility of any request for HART funding relative to the proposed Kachemak Drive Path. If it's a state project this could be a moot point. Another thought is that it's negative and unnecessary since the city has no financial obligations to the group beyond completion of the survey. Additionally this resolution is like a door slammed in the face in terms of encouraging other grass roots groups to go to the city with their ideas for addressing a public need they perceive as critical. The group is offering to provide matching funds to go with additional HART funds to complete the survey. One way for the city to show support is to provide half the cost of completing the survey. They will now be approaching a state agency in their attempt to provide the path, and offering memorandums would help show support as well.

Lynn Burt said they are her tonight to introduce themselves as HAT, Homer Area Trails. HAT is a tax exempt non-profit under the Homer Foundation. There is a bank account in place which will allow HAT to acquire and distribute funds. HAT is asking the City of Homer's permission to build, with volunteer labor, a level 1 or 2 trail on the first half mile of Kachemak Drive starting at the Y off of the Mud Bay Trail, up through the woods to Homer Airport long term parking, since this section poses the greatest challenge. It happened this summer that the airport required trees to be cut for the western approach of the airport runway. This is the hillside where HAT wants to put the trail. She cited a letter from City Manager Wrede to the Airport Manager appreciating DOTPF's concern about safety at the airport, and that section of road is the most dangerous section of road for bicyclist and pedestrians. A separated bike path on the south side of the road in that location would greatly enhance public safety. Ms. Burt continued that the trail is now more doable because of the tree removal. Please vote down resolution 13-040, they are confident that the trail section of the first half mile can be built inexpensively with volunteer labor doing 90% of the work. All they need for now is the city's expression of support. She shared a comment from Lindiann Sarno that if she were on the council and a group of volunteers devoted hundreds of hours to to a trail project that will increase public safety and organizing volunteers to do the trail work, I would say thank you.

Kevin Walker commented that they found an 8% grade in the middle section they want to build and they have a good start at engineering. He's done a cost estimate loosely based on Nelson Engineering's for a level 1 or 2 trail, coming out at a tenth of their cost. He estimates \$35,000. They want to keep this rolling and ask for councils support.

Discussion ensued regarding whether or not any of the funds allocated in Resolution 12-079 were still available, but weren't able to determine at the time.

Mike Barth, Economic Development Advisory Commissioner, gave the Council a brief overview of the Commission's activity including weighing on the Capital Improvement Plan, and discussion of Town Center and the need for an anchor tenant. He explained that CIRI is a key land owner in the town center and they believe it would be good to find out what they may have planned for their land. The group has also addressed affordable housing with a focus on the challenges for Coast Guard housing. Mr. Barth advised that there will be a bylaw amendment coming before Council soon to add the Chamber Director as a non-voting member.

Mayor Wythe suggested including a Marine Trades seat as well.

4. Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission

Robert Archibald, Parks and Recreation Advisory Commissioner, commented that the Alaska Recreational Parks Association held its annual meeting in Juneau where Mike Illg gave a presentation on Professional Certification and Commissioner Matt Steffy conducted a session on Schoolyard Habitat using West Homer Elementary as an example. At the award ceremony Homer Hockey Association was awarded the 2012 Outstanding Organization Award in recognition of its success as a non-profit organization, one of only four such organizations in the U.S. Mr. Illg and Mr. Steffy invited the Association to hold their 2015 meeting in Homer. The Commission talked with the Old Town group about a sign and statue at Bishop Beach. They sent several memos to Council regarding Resolution 12-040, and requesting Council support to use HERC site for recreation and education.

Mayor Wythe opened the public hearing.

Justin Arnold, city resident, commented at a prior meeting Councilmember Burgess brought up a point that we can use the fire hall for community rec. Mr. Arnold said we already have a building, a school house, with one of two wood basketball courts that we can use. He understands there is asbestos in the building and it raises a lot of problems, but why are we moving forward with a new fire hall and police station, spending \$300,000 for planning. He commented that when they did the new bumpers on the Deep Water Dock, planning and engineering cost twice as much as putting the bumpers on. He doesn't see why we are moving forward with a new building when we could easily, and hopefully cheaply, renovate the buildings and structures that are next to each other already. He questions why we would tear down a building that is going to be expensive. He doesn't understand why we are moving forward with this. He thinks there needs to be a lot more thought into what we're doing here.

Corbin Arno, city resident, said he also believes this is being rushed. One day Council saying the police department is understaffed and there isn't money to hire more staff. The next meeting you want to spend \$15 million on a brand new building, that is three or four times larger. It will take more staff to take care of the building, and more money. He thinks they need to take some more public comment before they rush this thing through. He doesn't think it's a good idea.

Scott Adams, city resident, commented that his insurance rate will go up if they do this because it will move him one mile further from the fire department. He wonders how many other people would be affected by moving the fire department to the proposed site. He thinks they should hold off on this and let other people decide, other than the six or seven of them. He knows we voted the Council in, but this seems to be a big issue and needs more people involved.

There were no further comments and Mayor Wythe closed the public hearing.

Mayor Wythe called or a motion to substitute Ordinance 13-38(S) for Ordinance 13-38.

LEWIS/ROBERTS SO MOVED.

There was no discussion for the substitution.

VOTE: YES, NON OBJECTION, UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

Mayor Wythe called for the adoption of Ordinance 13-38(S) by reading of title only for second and final reading.

HOWARD/ROBERTS SO MOVED.

Councilmember Lewis commented the Council held their worksession on August 17 where they chose their list for the CIP and one of the reasons they selected the police and fire department as it is push by legislature to fund that. If we are going to put things on the list, it needs to be things they are interested in funding. It is his understanding the study they requested will also look at a second location off Main Street.

ZAK/BURGESS MOVED TO AMEND LINE 9 TO ADD AFTER POLICE DEPARTMENT **RECREATIONAL DEPARTMENT** AND ON LINE 11 ADD PUBLIC SAFETY/**RECREATIONAL BUILDING**.

Councilmember Zak explained that this is the design stage and that way we can open it up for the public input on whether it should be fire and police, and/or recreation.

There were comments from other Councilmembers that they understand the intent of the amendment, this wasn't their intent when they chose their CIP items. They have other options for the recreational center as they have previously discussed.

VOTE: YES: ZAK, BURGESS

NO: LEWIS, ROBERTS, HOWARD

Motion failed.

Councilmember Burgess recognized the comments from the two City Council candidates and said it is easy to look from afar and observe the City Council as people who make decisions on whim and don't give consideration to all these things. But the decision to put a public safety building up in Homer is the result of a very long process. Our police and fire station are grossly undersized. Our firefighting equipment gets the abuse of elements and lack of functionality because it can't be stored in a warm spot which means reduced response time, which means we spend more money on upgrades and maintenance to the equipment. There have been some slow response times, especially in the winter, which is a reason they decided to do a fire station up on Skyline. The police station right now has almost nonexistent jail facilities. We pay money to the state and have to move a lot of inmates up to Wildwood in Kenai, resulting in more dollars leaving the City. Ultimately when they design the CIP list they are looking at what they think the legislature can give the City money for. All of the money to build the facility isn't going to come out of the tax payers' pockets, but with monies they think they can get from state and federal organizations, as well as the legislature. The Council has considered

lots of variables and alternatives regarding location, and the HERC site is the most cost effective site to develop which is one of the reasons they arrived at that situation. The HERC building itself is filled with asbestos, is very expensive to maintain, and we all love community recreation, but we have to weigh the cost versus benefit of budgetary decisions. Lots of thinking goes into this figure, they want public input, but if people want to participate in the process they need to bring informed dialog to the process.

Mayor Wythe added that this is proposed as a five year program, there is nothing about it that is going to be quick. Having it organized for 2015 consideration by Legislature is the objective Council is working on now. The City's match, or contribution is the introduction of design with the hope of drawing in the additional funds throughout the process. The anticipation is a 2016-17 construction season and 2018 occupancy.

VOTE: YES. NON OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

Mayor Wythe called for a five minute break at 7:08 p.m. The meeting resumed at 7:14 p.m.

#### A. City Manager's Report

City Manager Wrede commented about the Kodiak Island Borough Resolution regarding the Tustumena included in the supplemental packet and advised that a resolution to the Council is forthcoming. He reminded the public that the new public restrooms are being built with cruise ship head tax funds and City staff is working to address the maintenance aspect. He advised the Council of Buccaneer's interest in wintering the drill rig Endeavor at the harbor. Lastly he reported that the City was successful getting a Land and Water Conservation Fund grant for more work at Hornaday Park.

Mayor Wythe commented in support of the contract with Buccaneer, Homer has an active port and we are open for business.

Councilmember Howard asked about the status of the Economic Benefit Report from the drill rig, and was advised that the report is still pending from Northern Economics because they are waiting for information from Buccaneer.

Councilmember Lewis asked about year round access to the new public bathrooms. City Manager Wrede said they are still working to make that decision.

Councilmember Zak expressed his hope that if the rig comes back some of the monies will go to the Homer Foundation as they did last time.

Councilmember Burgess reiterated the need to get the ball moving on annexing what part of the harbor area waters the City will want for future use and expansion.

Councilmember Roberts agreed with City Manager Wrede's suggestion of a building committee for the public safety building, as this process has worked well in the past. She also found the information about funding from FEMA for new emergency operation centers and states interest in helping with the jail.

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Councilmember Lewis said he doesn't think they should stop all work on the path, he thinks it's important and it would be nice to have a trail connecting the East End trail to the base of the spit. He would like to see a plan that addresses the whole trail and he doesn't think we should stop work on it.

There was discussion that this resolution isn't the appropriate ways to show support to the State regarding the trail on State property.

Howard.

Mayor Wythe called for a motion for the adoption of Resolution 13-096 by reading of title only.

HOWARD/ZAK SO MOVED.

Councilmember Howard explained that she is asking for the Borough to give them the right to sell the property, should they feel they need to should they locate the public safety building someplace else. It doesn't mean they are going to sell it, but it puts more options on the table that belong to the City. Right now their hands are tied. They can't sell it and there are specific ways to use the building. It is an expensive building and we have to do something with it.

There was brief discussion whether there were more deed restrictions. City Manager Wrede was unsure, but Attorney Klinkner has concluded that the only restrictions that are still in place are the two listed.

Councilmember Lewis commented that he isn't in favor of getting rid of any city land. It's easy to say we won't sell it, but a future council might. If we have this land we should hold it because it's a prime piece. If it isn't going to be used for fire and police, we may find a recreational use.

Councilmember Burgess thinks it is better to empower this or any future council to have as many options at their disposal as possible. He doesn't like the idea of selling the parcel and leasing or other

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uses could be advantageous to the community, but he doesn't see a reason why they shouldn't seek the possibility to be more flexible with the options.

Motion carried.

#### **COMMENTS OF THE AUDIENCE**

Kathy Hill thanked the Council for their support tonight and invited them to observe or play pickle ball some time.

Public Works Director Meyer responded to a comment that was made about how much money was spent to plan and design new fenders on the Deep Water Dock. He thinks the suggestion was that we spent twice as much on planning and design as we did on construction. He explained that he will not recommend to the City Manager to sign a contract that represents spending any more than ten percent of a construction cost for design and planning. When it comes to the Deep Water Dock we had a very effective engineer do the design of the project which we spent between five and six percent of the cost of the design. He just wanted to clarify that they try to spend the communities money as if it were our own, and to get the best bang for the buck that they can.

Mike Barth, city resident, commented regarding the HERC and public safety building. He encouraged everyone to evaluate the priorities. He doesn't think there is any question they both are needed at some point. For him rushing into a public safety building might be kind of a near sighted decision because he doesn't know that it's an immediate need at this point, versus a recreational facility. The bottom line is the one there is not a viable option at this point, so an option needs to be provided. He noted Councilmember Burgess' comment about making sure we know what the usage is and the statistics. Mr. Barth said he doesn't know the statistics, but hopes Council has them. His wife Amanda said the building was used twice a week during the school year for toddler and preschool play group. She hopes there is a way to bring that group back, it was very busy and exactly what moms and dads needed to get out with their kids in the winter months. Coming back to priorities, both are needs and what's more important.

Beth Cumming, city resident, commented that the respects city staff, City Council, and the Mayor. They might be surprised to know how closely her philosophical outlook follows our Mayor's. She respects the person who didn't follow the survey as was requested last October. In a way she wants to offer an apology from herself. If it had occurred to her or other members of the proposed path group that we could reduce the proposal from a level 3 trail to a level 1 or 2 with some aspects of a level 3, we would not be sitting here tonight. She said she is a slow thinker and it never occurred to her. She acknowledged the request of Council for them to get specific. She wanted to give examples of prices they could have had, but felt they had to go through an acceptable city process. They had an offer of doing the engineering and survey by a licensed firm to do it for free. Because they hemmed and hawed they missed that opportunity. Secondly they did a title search and they paid from their pockets to have the title search done, and found the land belongs to the state.

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Bonnie Jason, city resident, thanked the Council for keeping the HERC building open and available for Homer recreational enthusiasts. She hopes they will come for pickle ball. She encouraged the continuing support of the recreational movement in Homer. She hopes they will support the recreational needs assessment, she thinks it's a great opportunity.

Robert Archibald, city resident, commented that storing the jack up rigs on the spit might be interesting and provide funding for the harbor and the city. Earmarking some of that money for the Homer Foundation might make things a little more palatable. He thinks it's an excellent idea and hopes they consider it. He noted that they the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission will be losing the Chair, Bumppo Bremmicker, and they look forward to the appointment of Roger MacCampbell.

Chance Rockett, non-resident, commented regarding community recreation. He thinks the Council asked for public support and over the last three or four meetings, we have shown how important that is to Homer, more so than a lot of things. In research he doe, he sees how important the public safety building is, and the harbor are to Homer. He sees that getting grant money for a public safety building is more realistic than getting money for recreation. They are pursuing that and asking for everything they can, just like others would do for a recreation facility. He wants the public to know that we need to move on and not take stabs and think the City Council doesn't care about rec. He doesn't think that's the case, he thinks there are issues with people about the building being where the HERC building is. He thinks it is unrealistic to spent \$10 million to revamp the building, but he would like to point out that the gym could be a part of the actual plan for the public safety building. Maybe the gym, skate park, and basketball court could be saved and included with the building. Police and fire could benefit from having the gym as well. He thanked the Council for listening to them. They will continue to come for recreation. Recreation is needed. He was born and raised here and thinks the youth should be provided with more options besides academics and arts, he thinks that's a big hole.

#### **COMMENTS OF THE CITY ATTORNEY**

Deputy City Clerk Jacobsen reminded listeners that Election Day is October 1<sup>st</sup>, and absentee/early voting is available at the City Clerk's office for anyone who can't get to their polling place on October 1<sup>st</sup>.

#### **COMMENTS OF THE CITY MANAGER**

City Manager Wrede clarified that it is not the intent to store the rig Endeavor at the Deep Water Dock, it is his understanding that the purpose is to perform maintenance starting November 1<sup>st</sup>.

#### **COMMENTS OF THE MAYOR**

Mayor Wythe thanked the candidates for attending and participating at the meetings this month, it shows sincere intent to learn what's going on. She wished them good luck at the polls. With regard to earlier comments about priorities, Mayor Wythe explained that the responsibility of a first class city first comes to safety and roads. The council has to meet those obligations before considering things like contributing funds for parks and recreation. This is an ongoing battle every year for the City of Homer. It becomes harder as our funds become more restricted. She has said this several times in the last couple years, the Council has reduced the budget for the City of Homer over \$3 million over the last eight and a half years, a huge reduction. In addition to that we are the only city on the peninsula

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that honored the vote of the citizens to fully suspend the sales tax on food in the winter. Every other first class city on the peninsula suspended the borough portion but still collects their city tax. That was a substantial financial reduction to the city. When you reduce your city income by almost \$1 million of tax revenue, those are funds that could be had for keeping the library open more, providing parks and recreation facilities, much less a department for parks and rec. Those are all things we need to take into consideration as citizens when we vote on how we want our tax dollars to be reduced. No one, herself included, is interested in paying taxes, but she is interested in providing the money required by the community to provide those services that are important to her. That is what people lose when they think about not paying sales tax. Property tax will keep the basic services funded, and that's about it. Regarding the jack up rigs coming to Homer, for her, there is much more than money in the coffers of the community. She sees it when she drives down the hill and for her the conversation about the jack up rig being at a working harbor port in our community, if you can tell there is a jack up rig at the harbor, you aren't looking at the view anyway. She thanked everyone for coming out and looks forward to the upcoming elections. Everyone come out and vote.

#### **COMMENTS OF THE CITY COUNCIL**

Councilmember Roberts commented about the Kachemak Drive Path, she didn't vote for the resolution, that doesn't mean she doesn't support the path, she just didn't think it was the right vehicle to proceed. She thinks they indicated they support it, it seems like there are more issues coming up. She is glad to see the people come and talk about recreation; she thinks it's an important part of the community. She also knows from looking at plenty of city budgets that the recreation doesn't pay for itself right now. For people asking for more recreation, citizens must be willing to start adding back the sales tax to the budget. We can't afford to do these things in recreation right now and she would like to think the public would start telling them that they want to spend some money toward recreation. She thinks adding sales tax back in the equation for food tax is a way that non city residents can contribute to the program. Lastly, good luck to everyone in the upcoming election.

Councilmember Zak thanked Ms. Cummings for coming here tonight and he doesn't think there is anything wrong with slow thinking, the fact that we are thinking is what matters. Over time there may be added pieces and facts that come out. He congratulated the Homer Area Trails nonprofit group. That's huge. He acknowledged Chance Rockett for coming out and taking notes. He said they are saving a little bit with paper reduction and using the tools. The citizens who come out and realize their voice is being heard is wonderful. When we have discussions tonight about budget considerations and if the Homer Foundation will see funds from the jack up rig, we are thinking about it and listening. Finally he likes pickles so he will have to come out and play pickle ball. He prefers the dill pickles.

Councilmember Burgess said he appreciated Mr. Rocketts comments, they were thoughtful and measured. He thinks the larger discussion about community recreation needs to be how do we establish a funding mechanism to support the program and a facility. There are a lot of people in the community who support recreation, he is one and a lot who sit at the table are. They don't want to tie their horse to a building that would be costly to remodel. We all need to expand our vision and think out of the box and long term about what the community really needs. Right now isn't that any one wants to get rid of recreation, it's that they have a real possibility of meeting one of the city's core long term needs in a public safety building. Police and fire are at the core of what a city needs to provide. They have the opportunity to seek funds for a facility that can meet the community's needs

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for the next thirty plus years. We need to weigh those priorities and go after that money. If there is really the community will to have a larger discussion about recreation, let's talk about the funding mechanism. Let's talk about a borough wide service area to support the users outside the City. If we are really dedicated, let's talk about sales tax. Let's see what a budget for that is, see what we can build and support in a building and program. Instead of saying City Council want to take away our last vestiges of community recreation, we need to say how can we make it possible to have a long term plan, long term goal, and effective solution to the problem. He appreciates the rec groups who have started to figure this out and been talking to them about how to develop a long term strategy and vision to do that. He thinks this council will support them in doing that.

Councilmember Lewis said everyone should get out and vote. When he first got elected and the sales tax was on the ballot they had 28% voter turnout. 18% voted in favor of getting rid of the sales tax. An 18% majority of 28% made that decision. If you don't vote, then you won't things done. We need to have a good turnout; he would love to see 50 for 60 % of the registered voters voted. We aren't going to get anything done; we won't get recreation or a lot of things if people don't vote.

Councilmember Howard put forth a challenge to the community, that between now and July 2014, some sort of package is put together to say to the voters on the October 2014 ballot, do you want a recreation department and if so are you willing to tax yourself for it and in the meantime, have a needs assessment done. We don't really know what the need is. We aren't the bad guys, we just need to know what you want and how do you want to pay for it. Let's get something on target to make this happen so this time next year we will have something to vote yes on.

They need backup for the south side of the bay when the lines go down in storms. There is a need to recap the landfill; there is \$250,000 for design work and \$1.9M to manage the landfill after it is closed. It is the first of three phases to close the landfill that will be ongoing for the next 15 years.

ZAK/LEWIS - SO MOVED.

Councilmember Zak brought the resolution forward for a chance to discuss it. Memorandum 13-147 from the city attorney talks about the reasons why we cannot just grandfather businesses in. He talked to Planning about procedures anyone with a business could go through to become conforming. Just one day of operating the business within the twelve month period makes it conforming. If that is not possible there is the option of a conditional use permit through the Planning Commission or addressing the definition of non-conforming or discontinuance. Both of those options might be another way for businesses to continue operations.

Councilmember Burgess agrees with Councilmember Zak's intention to assist a business. We do run a lot of legal risks by playing favorites or micromanaging. The best approach is to find a more universal solution, still remaining business friendly.

Councilmember Howard commented a property owner has the right to have his property at the highest and best use. The value of the subject property has been reduced by taking it back to residential. A solution must be applicable city-wide. In most courts property rights are precious and we need to be careful. She encouraged the applicants to work through the proper channels to resolve things for the good of the whole.

Councilmember Lewis asked the city attorney if it is possible to go back to the ordinance that all businesses in the annexed portion of the city could be grandfathered in permanently. Because of annexation businesses should not be punished.

City Attorney Klinkner will review the annexation/grandfather rights for properties.

Councilmember Dolma thinks the conversation is not properly directed. There are legal mechanisms by legal remedy that could have been taken by the landowner to avoid the situation. It is wrong to address this for a specific landowner.

Mayor Wythe advised Council they can provide direction to Planning and Zoning. It can be a broad direction that they explore alternatives with no impact on businesses. The attorney could look to see if there is a provision related to annexation.

Councilmember Dolma reiterated the situation wasn't caused by the way the grandfathered business was set up. The problem was that the owner of the property did not do things that were possible; it was poor planning. It is not something the city did wrong and this is not the correct way to fix it.

Councilmember Burgess requested the Planning Commission take a look at how to transition uses that are nonconforming into conforming uses. He runs into th situation with neighbors and other small businesses. He requested the Planning Commission to come back with something more user friendly.

Mayor Wythe confirmed Council's recommendation to have Planning review nonconforming uses.

VOTE: NO. LEWIS, ROBERTS, DOLMA, ZAK, HOWARD, BURGESS

Motion failed.

The applicant is entitled to an informal conference with either the director or the board and, if not satisfied by the informal conference, is entitled to a formal hearing in accordance with AS 44.62.330-44.62-630. IF THE APPLICANT REQUESTS A HEARING, THE LOCAL GOVERNING BODY MUST ASSIST IN OR UNDERTAKE THE DEFENSE OF ITS PROTEST.

**Approval to Create Deferred Assessments on Benefitted Properties** 

A property owner on Paradise Place is in need of replacing their on-site sewer system, and desires to connect to the City sewer collection system. The referenced lot is identified as Lot #1 Delehanty on the attached map. A 700 foot sewer mainline extension would be required for this lot to have sewer service. The owner has made contact with all but four lot owners in the area north and west of their lot and there is not anyone that is interested in participating in a sewer LID. Based on this information, the owners of Lot #1 have pursued a design for the 700 foot extension and also have a cost estimate for the extension and are ready to pursue construction.

When the proposed 700 foot extension is completed, there will be a total of 5 benefitting properties. One of the properties would be owned by the "developer", and identified on the attached map as Lot 1 Delehanty. Two of the lots have active city sewer service and are identified as Lot #4 Springer and Lot #5 Schulz. These two lots paid extension costs at the time of their connection, and the lots were considered "adjacent to the main" at the time of their connection. Based on this fact, and the city attorney's opinion, the city should pay for the extension costs for the main along these two lots. The remaining two lots are Lot #2 Anderson and lot #3 Lucas, neither of which are interested in connecting at this time.

Homer City Code does provide for a method that allows a "developer" who extends a main to be reimbursed by benefitting properties when connections are made. The method is seldom utilized because it requires considerable upfront documentation, only applies to connections made within 10 years, and the situation is difficult to monitor after construction is complete.

Another approach to this situation, used in the past as recently as 2007 on Fairview Avenue and again in 2009 on Fairview Avenue, is for the City to reimburse the "developer" for the costs of extending that portion of main that benefits others and create deferred assessments

(based on fairly apportioned construction costs) on benefited properties. These assessments are due and payable to the City, only if and when connection permit applications are made.

Below is a cost estimate and methodology approach for deferred assessments:

The lot owner needing service (Lot #1 on attached map) is required to extend the sewer main from Spencer Drive, west to the western edge of their property to be eligible for sewer service (approximately 700 feet). This proposed extension would front and benefit Lot numbers 2, 3, 4, and 5 in addition to the "developer's" lot.



#### Recommendation

City Council authorize expenditure of Homer Accelerated Water & Sewer Program (HAWSP) funds for construction of the proposed Paradise Place Sewer Main Extension, and approve the creation of deferred assessments on benefitted properties. The owner of Lot #1 (see attached map) will initially cover all costs associated with design and construction. As soon as the improvements are installed and approved, the City will reimburse the owner the value of the deferred assessments based on the actual, documented design and construction costs and according to the cost share table referenced above.

## REPORT TO THE CITY HOMER CHAMBER OF COMMERCE & VISITOR CENTER October 28, 2013 Jim Lavrakas / Executive Director

Mayor Wythe, City Council members, City Manager, and residents listening on the radio tonight. I'm Jim Lavrakas, executive director of the Homer Chamber of Commerce & Visitor Center, and I'm happy to come before you tonight to report on how the grant from the City was used last year in the marketing of Homer, and how successful those efforts were.

But please remember that my time as the executive director has been less than 2 months, so I am making my best <u>estimations</u> of the effectiveness of individual marketing efforts.

I'd first like to acknowledge the relationship the Chamber has with the City of Homer. For all intents and purposes, the Chamber has an agreement with the city to provide a service. For any grant money that comes from the City you contract us to market and promote the City of Homer as a place to do business, and a destination where people can enjoy the unique qualities that make Homer stand out from other places in Alaska.

No City funds go towards the operating costs of the Chamber -- no salaries, utilities, or other expenses are paid with those dollars. It all goes into marketing.

It's an immense job, the marketing of our town, and we're the obvious organization to take on that job that the City may not have the resources to do.

This past year we reached out to writers and travel professionals by working with our partners at the Alaska Tourism Industry Association and the Kenai Peninsula Tourism Marketing Council to leverage our advertising dollars with theirs to promote the peninsula as a destination for Alaskans and Outside visitors.

ATIA does the vetting of the professionals we actually host. That means, that we have only had to focus our energies on travel writers and professionals who the State's public relations firm actually feels have potential to reach a market that will help bring more travelers to our area. Of course, some of the publicity we get from these folks is spread out over several years. A writer who goes on a bear viewing adventure, for example, may write about it soon afterwards, AND may use the details and/or photos they collected in future stories about the Homer area.

Some of the professionals we hosted this year were:

With our partners at the Alaska Travel Industry Association we hosted 14 travel professionals from Trek America and Grand American Adventures for several days at the beginning of August. They got to see that our town is still a "lively place" on the shoulder season. They are taking back with them some new adventures, dining, and lodging options for their targeted audiences in England, Germany, the Netherlands, and the U.S. We should start to see the results of that in the next couple of year.

The Cooke & Haggerty party came to town in August contracted by McClatchy Newspapers to write on affordable family travel. Anne Cooke, a travel and adventure writer, is a regular contributor to the McClatchy-Tribune wire service, a other dozen major daily newspapers, and has been blogging for the Huffington Post since late 2010.

We hosted Elizabeth Hey from AAA's VIA Magazine, who will have a story focusing on fishing scheduled for their Jan 2014 issue, but who also did a great feature article in February of this year, on "Where the Bears Are".

In looking at last year's grant of \$41,000 from the City, as you can see in your packets *more than* \$21,000 out of the total budget of \$62,000 went towards local marketing and advertising, for both design, publication, and printing. That's a nice "Buy Local, Shop Local" shot in the arm.

The dues from our members paid the remaining \$21,000 in that \$62,000 marketing budget.

I think that advertising our events in our local newspapers is a wise thing, but after my years of experience in the newspaper business, I've come to understand that there is a limit to the effectiveness of print advertising these days. I believe that a more thoughtful approach to advertising is warranted on all fronts.

I'm looking at more targeted online ads, limiting the number of print ads in the various publications that come calling, and sticking with the tried and true: The Alaska Milepost, and Fish Alaska Magazine, the state visitors guide and Alaska Magazine, where we've had good editorial coverage in the past year.

My contacts at the various media outlets in Anchorage affords the Chamber the kind of publicity for Homer that you cannot buy. Here's an example of that when I engineered a daily photo update from this past Shorebird Festival. For a couple of hundred dollars I hosted Anchorage Daily News staff photographer Bob Hallinen for a week and the resulting space in the Anchorage paper, *if* you could buy space on the Front page, was valued at well over \$10,000.

This is the kind of publicity that I am able to generate with very little expense.

So, here's what I pledge to you. I promise to scrutinize all marketing dollars going out of the Chamber's doors to make sure they are spent prudently. I promise to focus on the core programs that have been so successful, like our Jackpot Halibut Derby, and those <u>community</u> events like the 4th of July Parade, Winter Carnival, Cleanup Day, Getting to Know Homer, and community forums, that contribute to the quality of life here in our fair city.

One of the efforts I've already started is a rebranding program for our Chamber. A simple revision of our logo produced this image of a modern seaport town with lots to offer as a destination. Just follow your compass. I'll continue to update all the materials that come out of the Chamber to bring any marketing we do more current, consistent, and contemporary.

I plan on exploring the possibility of having a presence on 4th Avenue in Anchorage, where many travelers fresh off their planes and cruise ships seek out the best destinations in the Southcentral area. We want to make them come to Homer.

I look forward, as I know we all do, to the healthy return of salmon to the Nick Dudiak Lagoon. I watch and filmed with excitement the stocking of the 130,000 plus coho smolt into the The Fishing Hole this past May. Those fish should come charging back next Spring! I plan on creating a "They're Coming" campaign that will target Alaskans first and help bring back the glory days of our man-made fishing hole.

Friends of the Fishing Hole, a Chamber program that has gone by the wayside, will be making a comeback and make a late run of coho salmon a possibility again.

We are one of a few seaside towns in Alaska that does not have a webcam set up out at our harbor. When I lived in Ketchikan, before I went to work, I checked the webcam of the charter boat floats just to see the action. I'll be investigating getting our own webcam to create the same excitement for people who want to see the action at *our* Port.


And finally, I will work on a new approach to drawing new residents to our town with an updated relocation program, both on our website and in the materials we send out to folks enquiring about moving to Homer. With the Google eCity award this year we can plan a promotion to those online business entrepreneurs looking for a savvy place where they can start a business and raise a family in a healthy place, like Homer.

So, I finish by saying it's business as usual at the Chamber, and it's not. Where my predecessor was a cheerleader, I'm a project leader. My background is in producing a daily product driven by deadlines that could not be missed, and I know how to lead a team.

I ask you to trust us at the Chamber to do our very best as your contractor to market and promote all of Homer to all of our potential visitors and future residents.

**Recommendation to Appropriate Funds** 

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission has identified landscaping as a priority in implementing the Karen Hornaday Park master plan. The Public Works pursued a cooperative agreement with the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service for 50% match grant funding up to \$25,000 for the installation of landscaping at the Karen Hornaday Park playground. The grant has been accepted by the City (per Resolution 12-048).

The City is working with the Center for Alaskan Coastal Studies (CACS) and the Homer Playground Project (HoPP) to plan and implement *Learning Landscape* improvements at Karen Hornaday Park, and obtain in-kind matching funds and donations. Landscape work associated with the day use area such as soil tillage, grading, drainage, top soil, seeding, pathways, benches and work being completed at the new playground will qualify for in-kind match funds.

The landscaping project will have a focus on local native plants with such themes as 'Pollinators,' 'Edible Plants,' 'Economic Benefits of Plants,' 'Exotic Beauty of Native and Nonnative Plants,' 'Plants of the Beach Dunes,' 'Wetland Habitat Plants' and other themes to be developed.
