SUBJECT: COMPENSATION

Base Pay

"What does base pay for the City of Homer mean?" Base pay is an employee's initial rate of compensation, excluding increases in the rate of pay. An employee's base pay can be expressed as a base hourly rate of pay or as an annual salary. Extra forms of compensation that are excluded from base pay typically include: shift differential pay, on-call pay, incentive-based pay or merit-based pay. As a general rule, an employee's base pay is the pay they will receive at a minimum, while extra forms of pay may increase the total pay above this level.

Range Classifications

"How does the City determine the range of a classification?" Job descriptions are written and reviewed on a regular basis and revised when needed. The job description will include but not limited to the following:

- Knowledge, skills, abilities, experience, education, training or specialization.
- Developing policy and procedures or carrying out policy and procedures.
- Nonsupervisory position or Supervisory position and type of supervisor (i.e. City Manager, Department Director, Division Head, Unit Supervisor).
- Budget/expenditure authority.
- Exposure to adverse weather or hazardous working conditions.
- Overall liability to the City.
- Public Visibility (Visibility of the incumbent to individuals and agencies with which City personnel are likely to come into contact such as key City personnel, general public, government officials, and key service personnel).

These "core functions" of the position are then evaluated by using a rating system. Typically, three supervisors review the job description and use the City's Factoring Form to help them determine the

range of the classification. Once the factoring is complete the supervisors will discuss their evaluation of the position to determine the range the position should be placed in. This has been a successful procedure for the City in the past; however, there are times that the market needs to be reviewed and considered as well.

Total Compensation

"What does total compensation mean?" When most of us hear the term "compensation" we typically only think of the money we receive in our paycheck each payday. However, "Total Compensation" goes beyond salary, it is the complete pay package for employees. Total compensation can be defined as all of the resources available to employees, which are used by the employer to attract, motivate and retain employees.

City of Homer regular full-time employees enjoy a total compensation package that exceeds the value of their base salary alone. The image below represents some of the key elements which makeup Total Compensation:



Compensation Surveys

"What is a compensation survey?" A compensation survey is survey of compensation practices and trends among participating companies, typically compiled by an independent research organization. Compensation surveys enable their participants to learn market compensation practices for jobs offered in their organizations. There are five compensation surveys enclosed for you to review. Public entities are challenged with comparing positions of like kind. Many positions are not the same in other public entities. Some positions have unique or other duties that are not typically included in the position in the private sector. This makes it very challenging when reviewing compensation surveys that are not tailored to fit the organization's interests and needs. Enclosed is an analysis of some positions within the City of Homer. Please remember this analysis is comparing titles and not necessarily actual duties. The AML Salary and Benefit Survey is very informative; however, the City's close competitors (Soldotna, Kenai, and Seward) information is not included.

Closing

Total compensation can be challenging for many organizations. The biggest challenge is to have a good balance of offered benefits to the actual base compensation. Although offering excellent benefits is a smart recruitment strategy, benefits do not always allow employees to financially keep up with inflation. SUBJECT: CHARTER COMMISSION ELECTION PETITION

Pursuant to AS §29.10.010(e), I am submitting this report on the charter commission election petition. The petition for a Charter Commission Election was submitted timely on January 27, 2014 by sponsor Ken Castner. In all, 15 petition booklets were received. Of the 15 petition booklets, 14 were sufficient and one was blank. The number of names on the sufficient booklets totaled 224.

A current list of registered voters within city limits was requested and received by the Clerk's office on January 24, 2014. Deputy City Clerk Jacobsen reviewed the 224 names on the petition and determined that: 28 signatures were insufficient because the name was not listed on the current voter roll, the name was illegible, a signature was not included, or the person signed the petition more than once. It was determined 196 of the signatures were valid signatures of registered voters within the city limits.

Pursuant to AS §29.10.010(e), the petition must bear a number of voter signatures equal to 15 percent of the number of votes cast at the October 1, 2013 regular City election, which is 185. I find the petition for a Charter Commission Election bears sufficient signatures, and therefore have certified the petition.

Alaska Statutes do not provide guidance as to when the charter commission election should be held, however, Council may choose to be guided by the provisions for scheduling an initiative or referendum election. An initiative or referendum is submitted to the voters at any of the following occurring at least 60 days after certification of the petition: (i) the next regular election; (ii) a previously scheduled special election; or (iii) a special election scheduled by ordinance if the Council determines it to be in the best interest of the City and no other election will occur within 75 days after certification of the petition.

Since there presently is no special election scheduled in the City, the Council has two options: place the question on the ballot at the October 7, 2014 regular City election, or call an earlier special election.

Once the Council has determined when to hold the election, it will fix the date for submission of charter commission candidate nomination petitions to the City Clerk. The submission date should allow enough time for the Clerk to give the required 20-day election notice after the candidates for charter commission have been determined.

Assuming the charter commission election will be held on the regular election date in October, I suggest the candidacy filing period for the charter commissioners open on May 1 and close on July 15, 2014.

RECOMMENDATION:

Determine when the election for a charter commission shall be held and schedule the candidacy filing period.

I previously have described the process by which the City would adopt a home rule charter, and some of the consequences of doing so. The purpose of this memorandum is to provide a more general discussion of the effect on the City of adopting a home rule charter.

The home rule option first appeared in the Alaska Constitution—there were no home rule cities in Alaska before statehood. The Alaska Constitution and statutes now provide for two general categories of cities. A home rule city is a city that has adopted a home rule charter.¹ A general law city is a city that has no charter.²

The starting point for describing the effect of adopting a home rule charter is Article 10, §11 of the Alaska Constitution, which provides:

A home rule borough or city may exercise all legislative powers not prohibited by law or charter.

The constitution was intended to grant broad power to home rule municipalities:

The authors of this provision hoped that its simple language and sweeping grant of power would enable home rule municipalities to meet a multitude of legislative needs without depending on specific grants of power from a state legislature.³

However, the evolution since statehood of Title 29 of the Alaska Statutes, which provides for municipal government, has blurred part of the distinction between home rule and general law cities. While the Alaska Constitution provides that home rule municipalities may exercise all

powers not prohibited by law or charter, Title 29 also provides that all cities—whether home rule or general law—may "exercise any power not otherwise prohibited by law."

With this introduction, I will examine the two-part constitutional limitation on the powers of home rule cities: (i) prohibition by law, and (ii) prohibition by charter, emphasizing the remaining distinctions between home rule and general law cities.

Prohibition "by law" means prohibition by statute enacted by the legislature.⁵ The courts use the same test to determine whether a home rule or general law city's exercise of a power is prohibited by law: "The prohibition must be either by express terms or by implication such as where the statute and [city] ordinance are so substantially irreconcilable that one cannot be given its substantive effect if the other is to be accorded the weight of law."⁶

Title 29 continues to distinguish between home rule and general law cities in expressly prohibiting the exercise of powers. All prescriptions in Title 29 of the manner in which municipal governments must act are express prohibitions on general law municipalities acting otherwise. In contrast, only those provisions of Title 29 that are identified in AS 29.10.200 "apply to home rule municipalities as prohibitions on acting otherwise than as provided."

An example of prohibition by implication is that state statutes of limitations impliedly prohibit a home city from requiring written notice within 120 days after an injury to allow the injured person to bring a lawsuit against the city.⁸

Prohibition "by charter" means that the City's home rule charter itself could prohibit the City from exercising certain powers. Once included in a home rule charter, such a prohibition could be changed only by a charter amendment, which requires voter approval. Examples that frequently appear in other municipalities' home rule charters include requirements of voter approval to dispose of city property, a limitation on the hours during which the council may meet, and a limitation on city indebtedness to a specified percentage of assessed valuation. In contrast, the Council may not limit the legislative power of future councils by enacting ordinances that include restrictions on their future amendment or repeal: "One council may not

1. Introduction and Summary.

This responds to your request for information regarding what a charter commission is, and how it will affect the City. In short, a charter commission is a group of seven City voters that is elected to prepare a proposed home rule charter for the City. The City's voters may petition for the election of a charter commission. The charter that the commission develops is submitted to the City's voters, and becomes effective upon voter approval. Upon adoption of a home rule charter by the City's voters, the City would cease to be a first class, general law city, and would become a home rule city governed by the charter. Adopting a home rule charter would have the following effects on the City. First, the structure of the City government would be determined by the charter rather than by statute. Second, the charter, rather than statute, would govern the scope of the City's general powers. Third, becoming a home rule-city-would allow-the-City-to-adopt-a-sales-tax-structure different-than-that-of-the-Kenai Peninsula Borough without the consent of the Borough Assembly.

2. A Charter's Effect on the City.

A. In General.

The Alaska Constitution and statutes provide for two general categories of cities. A home rule city is a city that has adopted a home rule charter. A general law city is a city that has no charter. All cities have powers conferred by law (i.e., state statute). In addition, home rule cities have powers conferred by home rule charter and may exercise all powers not prohibited by law or by charter.

There is little practical distinction between the general powers that are granted to home rule and general law cities. While the Alaska Constitution provides that home rule cities may exercise all powers not prohibited by law or charter, statutes grant powers to general law cities in similar broad terms. All cities "may exercise any power not otherwise prohibited by law." A liberal construction is to be given to the powers of all cities. The courts use the same test to determine whether a city's exercise of a power is "prohibited by law" without regard to whether it is a home rule or general law city: "The prohibition must be either by express terms or by implication such as where the statute and ordinance are so substantially irreconcilable that one cannot be given its substantive effect if the other is to be accorded the weight of law."

B. A Charter Could Determine the Structure of the City Government.

Title 29 of the Alaska Statutes governs the powers and functions of municipalities. Only certain provisions of Title 29 apply to home rule cities as a prohibition against acting otherwise. Most of the important provisions of Title 29 that do not apply to a home rule city concern the internal structure of city government. Thus, through a home rule charter the City's voters could determine such matters as the number of council members, the number of votes by which the council may act (either generally or on specific subjects), when and whether the mayor may vote on matters before the council, and the scope of the mayor's veto power.

C. A Charter Could Restrict the Exercise of the City's General Powers.

In addition to the restrictions in state statute on the exercise of powers by a first class city, the City's voters could impose other restrictions on the exercise of the City's powers in a home rule charter. Unlike an ordinance that restricted the exercise of a power by the City, which could be overturned by the subsequent enactment of another ordinance by the Council, 13 restrictions in a home rule charter could be changed or eliminated only with voter approval. Examples that frequently appear in other municipalities' home rule charters include requirements of voter approval to dispose of city property, a limitation on the hours during which the council may meet, and a limitation on city indebtedness to a specified percentage of assessed valuation.

D. A Charter Would Allow the City to Adopt Its Own Sales Tax Structure.

Most statutes affecting the relationship of the City to the Kenai Peninsula Borough still would apply to the City if it were a home rule city. One significant exception to this general rule concerns the autonomy of the City's sales tax structure. A general law city within the Borough must uniformly tax the same sources as the Borough, and allow only the same exemptions as the Borough, unless the Borough Assembly by ordinance authorizes the city to levy and collect its sales tax on other sources. However, the statute that requires that the sales tax levied by a city within a borough must conform to the structure of the borough's sales tax is not made applicable to home rule municipalities, and therefore does not act as a prohibition on a home rule municipality acting other than as the statute provides.

3. The Role of a Charter Commission in the Adoption of a Charter.

A proposed home rule charter is prepared by a charter commission of seven elected members.¹⁶ The Clerk has certified an application for a petition for a charter commission election and will issue a petition to its sponsors. The petition requirements are similar to those for an initiative or referendum petition.¹⁷ When the Clerk receives the completed petition she delivers it to the Council with a report of the number of valid signatures that she has determined to be on the petition.¹⁸

If the petition has sufficient valid signatures, the Council fixes a date for the submission of nominations of charter commission candidates. A candidate for a charter commission shall have been qualified to vote in the City for at least one year

immediately preceding the charter commission election.²⁰ There are no other qualifications or limitations on eligibility to be elected to a charter commission. A charter commission candidate is nominated by a petition signed by at least 50 voters or the number of voters equal to ten percent of the number of votes cast in the City during the last regular election, whichever is less.²¹ Since more than 500 votes were cast at the October 1, 2013, regular City election, each charter commission candidate must be nominated by at least 50 voters. If at least seven nominations for qualified charter commission candidates are not filed, the petition or resolution calling for a charter commission is void and an election on the question may not be held.²²

The statutes do not prescribe when a charter commission election shall be held. However, the Council may choose to be guided by the provisions for scheduling an initiative or referendum election. An initiative or referendum is submitted to the voters at any of the following occurring at least 60 days after certification of the petition: (i) the next regular election; (ii) a previously scheduled special election; or (iii) a special election scheduled by ordinance if the Council determines it to be in the best interest of the City and no other election will occur within 75 days after certification of the petition. At the charter commission election the voters shall consider the question "Shall a charter commission be elected to prepare a proposed charter?" and shall elect the members of the commission. If the question is approved, the seven candidates receiving the highest number of votes immediately organize as a charter commission.

Within one year after its election, the charter commission shall prepare a proposed home rule charter for the City. The commission shall give published notice of and hold at least one public hearing on the proposed charter. The proposed charter shall be signed by a majority of the members of the commission and filed in the office of the Clerk. Within 15 days, the Clerk shall publish the proposed charter and make copies available. The proposed home rule charter is submitted to the voters at an election held not less than 30 days or more than 90 days after the proposed charter is published. If a majority of those voting favor the proposed charter, the proposed

charter becomes the organic law of the City effective on the date the election is certified.³¹

If the proposed charter is rejected, the charter commission shall prepare another proposed charter to be submitted to the voters at an election to be held within one year after the date of the first charter election.³² If the second proposed charter is also rejected, the charter commission shall be dissolved and the question of adoption of a charter shall be treated as if it had never been proposed or approved.³³

VISITORS

A. Lisa Roberts, United Way

Lisa Roberts, Executive Director for Kenai Peninsula United Way, reported they help fund programs to support victims of domestic violence and sexual assault, provide confidential health care services, active social daycare for elderly people, services to children under age 3 that might be experiencing development delays, and a mentoring program for children in the area. These programs are vital to the health of our community. Some agencies rely heavily on the help from United Way. There are 27 member agencies that receive funds from the annual campaign; six of those reside in Homer. Last year for every dollar donated to United Way from Homer, \$5 was returned. Kenai Peninsula United Way uses only 15% of the raised funds for administrative costs. Everything that is raised stays on the peninsula. The organization runs with minimal staff. United Way wants to advance the common good of the whole peninsula by focusing on education, income, and health. She would like to recruit people and organizations to give and partner for a better community. B. James Hornaday & George Matz, Kachemak Bay Research Reserve

Ralph Brosches, Kachemak Bay Research Reserve (KBRR) member, reported they have a federal and state partnership between the NOAA coastal office and the Alaska Department of Fish and Game (ADF&G) Division of Sports Fish. The local council fosters dialogue with local coastal issues of concern and provides a voice for the community. KBRR was dedicated as an estuarine research system in 1999. It is Alaska's first and only research reserve, the only subarctic reserve, and the largest reserve in the national system. The mission of KBRR is to enhance understanding of the Kachemak Bay estuary and adjacent waters to ensure the ecosystems remain healthy and productive. The ADF&G Sports Fish is undergoing a period of sustained budget constraints that is associated with declining license revenues, decreased federal grant funding, and limited general fund allocations relative to increasing operating costs. ADF&G contributes 40% to the research. The outlook for 2014 is uncertain. It is the intent of ADF&G to seek a new state partner.

KBRR is an economic driver for the community with an annual operating budget of \$2M. This provides local jobs and expenditures to the community. They also partner with local state and federal agencies for added grant funding. This brings research to Kachemak Bay including coastal erosion, bluff erosion, sea level rise, and coastal uplift and juvenile salmon nursery research. KBRR is important to K-12 local school education, reaching 3,500 people per year. State funding is crucial for funding to the Islands and Ocean Visitor Center.

Jim Hornaday, member of KBRR, passed out a memo. He provided a three-point sermon:

- 1. KBRR is the furthest north national estuarine reserve. They have a good relationship with ADF&G Sports Fish Division. There is a close connection on the work of the reserve and the City of Homer Climate Action Plan. They are doing legal research on ocean rise, uplift, and erosion. The City is implementing the Climate Action Plan to include: converting buildings to natural gas, buying more efficient cars, and tidal power development. KBRR coordinates with other agencies.
- 2. KBRR is an important economic engine bringing in millions of dollars over the years in wages and grants. Since the fishing industry is the key to our economic survival, the KBRR works on salmon and the overall health of Kachemak Bay. Preservation of the beauty and integrity of the environment is essential to the tourism industry.
- Ask the City to pass a resolution in support of KBRR and urging the State of Alaska to meet its continuing responsibility to serve as a partner to NOAA and the agreement with Islands and Ocean Visitor Center.

KBRR employs eleven people; employment varies in the summer. ADF&G Sports Fish is looking for a new partner or mesh of partners to help with the financial responsibility. There is currently nothing in the works. When Islands and Ocean Visitor Center was built the State was to take over the rental agreement. The State entered into the original agreement with NOAA, who requires a state partner. There is a moral obligation and argument can be made that there is a legal requirement. Another lease agreement will be signed in April and may include a new partner.

Jessica Ryan, Education Coordinator at KBRR, reported they are doing research on melting glaciers and measuring the rebound of the mountains across the bay. They are rising and there is instrumentation in place that compares that with the sea level rise. In a three-year study it appears that we are outpacing sea level rise by a little bit. KBRR is looking at circulation patterns as the fresh water empties into the bay and accelerates with warmer weather and more melting. It may change circulations patterns by creating more of a freshwater lens on top of the bay that that will change what organisms live in the bay and affect the food chain of the bay. The uplift at the current time is more rapid than the rise of the ocean. Dredging in the harbor will continue as we are losing 2.5 ft. to erosion.

The City could be most effective with general support, requesting that the State meet the requirements it signed on for.

They talked about the recreation needs assessment and the City Manager provided them information about forming a steering committee to get things moving quickly. Chair Steffy asked to join the Alaska Recreation and Parks Association, and the commission agreed to become a member. The ribbon cutting ceremony for the Kachemak Bay Water Trail will be Friday, June 6th. An agreement with the Little League for park usage is being worked on. Lastly, it is an ongoing effort to get hosts at Karen Hornaday Park. The commission is exploring options for providing utilities or a better site.

5. Port and Harbor Advisory Commission

Mike Stockburger, Port and Harbor Advisory Commissioner, reported there are exciting times at the port and harbor. Money is coming in and needs to be spent so more money will come in. He thanked Council for approving folks for the Large Vessel Haul-Out Task Force. Several people have voiced an interest in a larger boat haul-out facility that may attract more people to Homer. It could be a new building in a new location to facilitate the needs. There will be a new load and launch ramp with funding from Fish and Game. The five lanes will remain to allow bigger boats to come in. A steeper slope will help with the loading of boats on trailers. They are trying to get rid of the hard break at the top of the ramp and provide improved traction on both the ramp and walking ramp.

Barb Brodowski, city resident, spoke in opposition of Ordinance 14-03 as it will bring an undue hardship on people.

Andy Haas, Homer resident, supports Ordinance 14-03 for stable funding.

Bumppo Bremicker, city resident, spoke in support of Ordinance 14-03 since it is easier to pay a little bit every time you buy groceries.

Larry Slone, city resident, spoke in opposition of Ordinance 14-03 as it taxes people on primary needs and gives in for secondary things.

Kevin Hogan, city resident, spoke in opposition of Ordinance 14-03 citing the constitution Article 9, Section 7.

Charles Davis, city resident, opposes Ordinance 14-03 as it is taxing the wrong people instead of those that will benefit from enhanced recreation.

Steve Zimmerman, city resident, spoke in opposition of Ordinance 14-03 as it is confusing with three different things in it.

Ken Landfield, city resident, spoke in opposition of Ordinance 14-03 as it the cultural and recreation needs on the backs of poor hungry people.

Michael Kennedy, city resident, opposes Ordinance 14-03 on the basis of meeting primary needs versus secondary needs.

Jim Lavrakas, Chamber of Commerce Executive Director, commented the Board of Directors at the Chamber are opposed to Ordinance 14-03.

Steve Hooker, city resident, opposes Ordinance 14-03 since it will be a hardship on families.

Mayor Wythe closed the public hearing.

Mayor Wythe called for a motion for the adoption of Ordinance 14-03 by reading of title only for second and final reading.

LEWIS/BURGESS - SO MOVED.

Councilmember Lewis expressed doubts the ordinance will pass. People drive up the road and pay sales tax to Soldotna and Kenai that goes to their parks and recreation. There is the sin (alcohol) and bed taxes, but both come with costs to administrate them. As a hockey and soccer parent he drove up the road and spent thousands of dollars in other cities paying for their facilities. Sarah Palin instituted the sales tax in Wasilla to fund their sports center.

Councilmember Burgess commented the idea of sponsoring the ordinance was to initiate a dialogue and have the community take some responsibility for finding a solution. The ordinance puts something on the table the voters can vote on at the next election. During budget discussions the most consistent consensus from people who wanted funding for recreation and public arts was to reinstate the sales tax on food. Although he finds the idea abhorrent, most of the citizens felt it was a reasonable idea. Recreate Rec doesn't support it because it is not a dedicated tax. Nothing Council does is set in stone; the voters can change it. He is not sure he buys the fact people will go elsewhere for food, but does sympathize that the food tax is regressive. He questioned the harm in letting people vote on this. Recreation is a fundamental need. Another option is a service area, but it is not as easy as a tax since it is a borough-wide effort and not all property owners will support it. His hope is someone will come forward with a better solution.

Councilmember Van Dyke knows there are ways we can fund things; we have to get together and figure out the good way to do so. He opposes the ordinance as it is an unfair burden on residents within the city. Money will go up the road and the .25% allocated to recreation is only as good as the council seated here. He would like to see the ordinance buried so deep it never surfaces again.

Councilmember Roberts noted it does not just put the burden on the city residents, but also collects sales tax from people outside the city. She asked if the ballot measure can be pulled if the recreation needs assessment comes up with a different choice.

City Clerk Johnson answered the question could always be removed from the ballot by the end of June.

LEWIS – MOVED TO AMEND THE DEDICATED SALES TAX TO FUND A PARKS AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT FROM .25 TO .75 SO IT IS AT THE SAME AMOUNT AS HARP AND HAWSP FUNDS.

Motion died for lack of a second.

Mayor Wythe recognized the community has voted on reinstating sales tax on nonprepared food two or three times. That is the only reason the community does not collect sales tax on food from September to May. As the vote was passing the Borough changed the regulations so that a First Class city could choose to accept or decline the city's portion of the sales tax. Per the voters will that they were eliminating both city and borough sales tax, she was a strong supporter of eliminating the tax. She would like the community to recognize the ownership of

the 4.5% tax belongs to the City Council, not the community. Citizens believed they were voting the whole thing down and that is the only reason Council has taken this position. This tax exists today on our books and is waived at the pleasure of the Council. They are not required to bring it to the voters. It is not a new tax; it exists on our books. Council can reinstate the tax at any time. Mayor Wythe hopes Council votes this down.

When we raised the sales tax by 1% we also lowered the mil rate by .5%. Those rates have not changed since the Library was built. She suggested creating a blog spot on the city webpage where citizens could give us their ideas to find additional revenue.

Councilmember Lewis called the title "nonprepared foods" a misnomer. You do not pay sales tax on food staples, nor do you pay sales tax on junk food snacks. Whatever is covered under the SNAP (Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program) is included.

Councilmember Burgess noted the budget included funding for things outside the primary needs. When people say we need to fund the wonderful and essential things we say yes we will fund them. When people say you need to balance your budget on paper we say no that's okay we won't fund our depreciation. We will pass that on to our kids and grandkids. It is not sustainable and we are going into debt to run our city government. City employees are taking a down cut on their healthcare and we are looking at workforce reduction quality. Council needs to take more responsibility and put something forward for the voters to vote on. If you want to raise revenues it is the people that have to do it. We are not living within the means set for us.

Councilmember Roberts clarified the .25% tax does not come from just increased food tax; it comes from total city sales tax.

Councilmember Burgess explained if we were to reinstate the winter sales tax on nonprepared food it raises about \$800,000. Dedicating .25% of total sales tax is \$300,000 to \$350,000, an amount to sustain the parks and recreation department at the current level or fund a debt service on a community recreation facility. If approved, one-third of the income would go to community recreation and the other two-thirds to the budget shortfall and a portion of reserve account funding. We would still be running at a long term deficit.

VOTE: NO. ZAK, VAN DYKE

Motion failed.

Councilmember Burgess supports the expenditure for the specialized fish grinder. He agrees with Mr. Hogan that the City could take an in-depth look at the RFP process. There could be an email subscription list to get more private enterprise involved. He suggested a Worksession to come up with different ways to do this.

City Manager Wrede acknowledged the need to revamp the procurement policy. He doesn't believe we are consciously trying to go around the procurement policy. There are problems and we could do better. We can review the policy and make some recommendations on how to change it.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

- A. City Manager's Report
 - 1. **Memorandum 14-023,** from Community and Economic Development Coordinator, Re: Citizens Academy.
- 1. Natural Gas Conversions: City Hall, the Library, the Public Works building, the Sewer Treatment Plant, and the Animal Shelter are all converted, hooked up, and being heated with natural gas. The two new restrooms downtown are also connected. The

- remainder of the buildings on the approved list for conversion will be done in phase II, probably late summer or early fall this year. We have taken another look at converting the Fire Hall and may want to discuss that further.
- 2. Airport Terminal Gas Conversion: The Airport Port Terminal was also scheduled to be converted to natural gas this month. However, that project has been slowed a bit while PW looks at another approach. The mechanical room at the terminal is rather small. It turns out that adding new jets to the furnace there makes it almost impossible to get in and do any work. The boiler is already 20 years old and may need increased maintenance going forward. We are considering the purchase of a new boiler instead of converting the old one. The new boilers are close to 100 percent efficient, they are so small that they can be mounted on the wall, and of course, you have a boiler that you can expect to last many years. If we went this route, we would have to request another \$20,000 from the Council, but I think it would be worth it. Even though more investment would be required upfront, the payback period is still just a little over a year and the City ends up with a new and much more efficient boiler. Much depends on whether we can sell or find a use for the jets we already purchased. Carey and Dan are working on that now.
- 3. Downtown Restrooms: The new downtown restrooms are undergoing final inspection and they will be ready for use shortly. By far, most of the feedback we have gotten is that they look really attractive and will add to downtown. The downtown business owners have been requesting public restrooms for many years and it is finally a reality. Many business owners have expressed how happy they are about this and we are receiving inquires about when they will be open. We anticipate that the restroom at WKFL park will receive more use in the winter than the one by Bartlett St. They will be really popular during parades and special events. Right now the tentative plan is to keep just one door open in each restroom during the winter months. After a few months, we should have better information about usage patterns and maintenance and operations costs.
- Harbor Construction Projects: This agenda contains a resolution awarding a 4. construction contract for the replacement of Ramp 3 and several floats in the harbor. You may recall that this work was paid for by a 4.2 Million State grant and \$4.2 Million in bond sale revenue. Here is the good news. All of the bids came in under the engineers estimate and the two lowest, from very reputable companies, came in approximately \$2 Million under the estimate. Carey has double checked the bids and he and Bryan have talked to the engineers who did the cost estimate to look for discrepancies. So, there are decisions to be made about what to do. We are currently checking with the granting agency, the Municipal Bond Bank, our attorney's, and others to see what the possibilities are, from borrowing less and returning some grant money to using the money for other projects. Bryan is compiling a list of other projects on the CIP list that these funds could be used for. We would be very happy to discuss this situation in detail at the meeting. Right now, we are leaning toward recommending that we add a change order to the construction contract to replace additional floats on the CIP List and provide them with water and electric. Bryan would like to design a new float to accommodate the 6o' by 6o" fishing vessels that are becoming more common in the

fleet. This could generate additional revenue for the Enterprise Fund. The advantages of going this route include 1) save on mobilization costs, 2) save on engineering and design costs, 3) approval from funding agencies is easier because we are simply expanding the existing project scope rather than adding new, completely different projects, and 4) we can move quickly. Remember that the State grant money must be expended within 18 months.

- 5. Skyline Drive Fire Station: As you know, the City has many construction projects underway, soon to be completed, or in the planning stages. It is really hard to keep all of those balls in the air and I am constantly amazed and appreciative of the job that Carey, Bryan, and Dan do in that regard. I really don't believe we could keep up this pace and get as much done as we are if the Council had not seen the wisdom in hiring a new project manager several years ago. One of the projects that is flying under the radar a little is the new Fire Station on Skyline Drive. I just wanted to mention that this project is also moving ahead. Engineering and design is complete and I signed the Public Notice / Request for Construction Bids this week. Hopefully we will receive good bids and construction will commence this spring or summer.
- 6. Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment: Work has begun on the Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment. Based upon the conversation the Council had at the last meeting (move fast, form a committee administratively, use the Parks and Recreation Commission) and the discussion the Parks and Recreation Commission had at its meeting on January 16, I have formed the small working group/steering committee. The first meeting is Thursday, January 23, at 5;30. It is a seven member Committee. Not all of the names have been finalized at the time this was written but the seats include Community Recreation Program, ReCreate Rec, Chair of the Parks Commission, MAPP, Homer Council on the Arts, Voices for Business, and the Homer Hockey Association. The first meeting will be organizational in nature and will include meeting schedule, work plan, etc. The Parks and Recreation Commission will be involved at key points, approve work products, hold public hearings do public outreach, and make recommendations to the Council.
- 7. GC/CM Proposal Receipt Log: At the last meeting the Council approved creation of a GC/CM Committee to oversee the new public safety building project. You may recall that the City has already solicited proposals which were due January 21. Evaluating the proposals is one of the first tasks the Committee will do. Attached is the Proposal Receipt Log. You can see that we got a good response. I am pleased to see a good response from local firms.
- 8. Citizen's Academy: Katie is working very hard on setting up the Citizens Academy. The Academy is scheduled to begin February 20. We appreciate the helpful input from Council member Howard. Attached is a memorandum from Katie on this topic and she will be available to discuss it at the meeting.
- Gompensation Parity Studies: At the last workshop on employee compensation, the Council requested copies of recent parity studies conducted by other municipalities. Andrea has obtained these documents and I believe they will take up several hundred pages in your packet. Sorry! Andrea is also doing a report for you which summarizes and consolidates this mass of information so it is easier to digest. Because of the

- executive session, it is likely that we won't have too much time to talk about this on Monday night. Another workshop will probably have to be scheduled if the Council wants to dive into this in any detail.
- 10. Sound System in Council Chamber: You will recall that the sound system, the mikes, the teleconference connection, and everything associated with it was a disaster at the last meeting. Further, the reception at KBBI was awful as well. Nick is looking into this in detail and will provide you with a report and some recommendations, probably at the next meeting.
- 11. Critical Habitat Legislation: Katie and Linda Anderson are making great progress with building consensus and crafting legislation that would remove the Homer Port and Harbor from the Kachemak Bay Critical Habitat Area. We have received lots of help from the Planning Department, Bryan Hawkins, ADF&G, and DNR. The legal description of the new boundaries is being prepared by DNR and will be included in legislation that will be introduced shortly. Special thanks go to Representative Seaton, Senator Micciche, and the Speaker of the House, Mike Chenault.
- Spit Parking Lot: At the last meeting, during public comments, a citizen mentioned 12. that he thought HART funds should not have been used to construct a parking lot on the Spit. That is a fair point and may warrant additional discussion. You will recall that Council recently approved design of a parking lot extension adjacent to the existing parking lot at the Seafarer's Memorial. We told you at the time that using HART funds for this might be a stretch and that other sources of funding were available if Council wanted to discuss it. In short, we have used HART money for parking lots in the past. We have received legal guidance that constructing parking lots was probably OK if the parking lot has a direct nexus to a trail. In other words, it was the jumping off point for a trail, access point, or it was obvious that everyone parked there to use the trail. We did this most recently with the parking lot improvements at Bishops Beach (paving) because it is a jumping off point for the Beluga Slough Trail, the new trail to be built on Charles Way, and the new pedestrian lanes in Old Town. I think we may have also used HART funds for improvements and expansion at the Spit Trail Parking Lot on Kachemak Drive. The parking lot expansion at the Seafarers Memorial will clearly be used by folks using the new and extended Spit Trail and the trail extension to Coal Point. However, it is across the street and a block away from the trail and it will also be used by folks patronizing local businesses. So, let us know if you want to discuss this one further.
- 13. Chief Painter Accepted into FEMA Academy: Fire Chief Bob Painter has been accepted into the National Emergency Management Executive Academy. This program is a collaborative effort between FEMA's Emergency Management Institute and prominent programs at higher education institutions offering a cutting edge curriculum that support the advancement of the emergency management profession and its executive leadership. Collaborators include Harvard University, the University of Hawaii-National Disaster Preparedness Training Center, U.S Navy Post graduate School, Center for Homeland Defence and Security, and Texas A&M Engineering and Extension Service. Only 40 applicants were selected nationwide. The course is held in Emmitsburg Maryland in four week long sessions spread over the entire year. Congratulations to

Bob. This training will serve the community well and we are fortunate to have someone as qualified as Bob in this position.

- 14. Wastewater Agreement with Kachemak City: This agenda contains a resolution approving a new wastewater agreement between the City of Homer and Kachemak City. This agreement has not been updated since it was originally signed in 1988. The new version is mostly an update and removes much of the language that is no longer relevant; especially all of language having to do with construction of the new sewer treatment plant and the sewer lines in Kachemak City. One thing of particular note is that the draft agreement says the baseline average for gallons put into the system is 2,500 instead of 3,500. You will recall that this was a big issue for Kachemak City when the new water and sewer rate fee schedule was approved. Since the fee schedule was approved, we have spent more time talking to Kachemak City about this and we are pretty certain that the average monthly number of gallons placed into the collection system is significantly less than 3,500. There are many reasons for this including the fact that everyone either hauls water or has it delivered. People who do that tend to be much more conservation minded. Also, the demographics there are changing. Kids are grown up and moving out, the population is aging, and many residences have only two occupants. The new rate model was based primarily upon consumption. Keeping that in mind, it seems inconsistent with the intent of the model to charge people for more than they are actually using. Installing meters is problematic for a variety of reasons and measuring how much water people use is complicated because it is delivered, hauled, collected by roof cistern systems, and obtained via wells. 2,500 gallons seems like a reasonable number. The available evidence seems to suggest that the average is probably less than that. Another reason for dropping the number to 2,500 is that Kachemak City residents do not have the ability to shut off their meters and pay less during the months that they are away and are not putting anything into the system. They pay the full amount whether they are home or not. We recommend changing the amount to 2,500. If Council agrees, we will have to amend the fee schedule. The estimated fiscal impact is about \$27,000.
- 15. The Finance Department has been awarded a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for their comprehensive annual financial report for the fiscal year ending December 31, 2012. This certificate is well deserved by the dedicated staff in the Finance Department.

City Manager Wrede congratulated the Finance Department on the Certificate of Achievement for excellence in financial reporting. It was for a good audit and very few comments.

Fire Chief Painter has been accepted into the prestigious National Emergency Management Executive Academy which will benefit the entire community.

The bid for harbor construction projects came in \$2M under the engineer's estimate. The Port and Harbor Advisory Commission will discuss if we should return grant money or put the excess funds towards other projects on the CIP list. Council could amend the contract with the contractor and do some float work and upgrades to water and electric. Adding projects now

will realize less mobilization and engineering and design costs. Council will have a conversation at the next meeting. We have 18 months to expend the grant monies. One project would be to reconfigure one float to accommodate $60 \text{ ft.} \times 60 \text{ ft.}$ vessels.

Councilmember Burgess issued kudos to Project Manager Nelsen on the Port and Harbor building project.

Councilmember Burgess commented water and sewer is a contentious issue. To alleviate some derisiveness the Water and Sewer Task Force was formed. The task force worked hard to bring in all the information to make an informed decision. It was decided to use the 3,500 gallon figure of sewer usage per user per month for Kachemak City residents. It was based on precedent and no hard information to go on. Kachemak City users have their water delivered or they are on wells; there is no way to assess the sewer usage figure. In the contract we are reducing the rate of sewer usage to Kachemak City users by a third - from 3,500 to 2,500 gallons per user. As a representative of the City of Homer when he thinks of an external user group, city residents should have a benefit for a system they pay for. He would like to err on the side of financial conservatism when charging for water and sewer outside of the city. He has received input from Kachemak City residents that they should be charged a fair price. There are lots of options: to meter the one flow in from all of Kachemak City. Some Kachemak City users are using far less than 3,500 gallons per month and some are using way more. Council should have a larger discussion. Also in the contract is the City's obligation to hire a third party consultant to act as an arbitrator. He sees big dollar signs and smiling attorneys.

Councilmember Roberts concurs with the concerns of Councilmember Burgess and is not ready to vote. She ultimately wants to pass a contract for Kachemak City, but first we should examine how much sewage they are sending into the system.

ROBERTS/BURGESS – MOVE TO POSTPONE UNTIL AFTER WE HAVE A WORKSESSION.

The Clerk will send out a meeting invitation.

VOTE: (postponement) YES. NON OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

The feedback he received was that Brother Asaiah's philosophy was better immortalized than he was in human. We need to heed the public's input.

Motion carried.

Councilmember Van Dyke declared a potential conflict of interest as Dan Coe has his car fixed in his shop. Councilmember Van Dyke has not derived more than \$5,000 per occurrence or more than \$5,000 in a year for car repairs. Mayor Wythe ruled there was not a conflict and there was no objection from the Council.

VOTE: YES. NON OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

COMMENTS OF THE AUDIENCE

Lindianne Sarno, city resident and Recreate Rec, commented on the HERC building. It is now called Homer Heritage High School and they want to save the building and operate it as Kachemak Bay Community Center for culture, arts, recreation, education, and economic development programs.

Ken Castner, city resident, supports the new harbor building. We need to agree what our values are. The CIP is the community's and he would like to see a better comprehensive approach in the CIP and expenditures. He turned in the Home Rule petition today with more than enough signatures.

Tony Burgess, city resident, urged Council to explore a locally or regionally public funded health insurance, sharing the risk with cities or the borough. There is an opportunity to make a remarkable statement of community values with a more coherent and compassionate approach to the welfare of our citizens.

Charles Davis, city resident, commented we are running an inefficient government that costs more money and hurts the low income people. We need to have a much more efficient operation with no more taxes on food.

Jeanne Parker, city resident, asked why the placement of the public safety building was so high on the CIP and came out of the blue. The HERC building is very important to her as it has the nicest gym floor in town. She would not want it torn down to build a new public safety building.

Ginny Espenshade, city resident, appreciates the efforts of finding a consensus to place the Brother Asaiah statue. She suggested a borough-wide recreational area funded by a small property tax increase.

Larry Slone, city resident, told Council there are alternative methods of funding the City's requirements. Gears of the government are beginning to slip and get gummed up with confusion, uncertainty, suspicion, and personal vendettas. The Citizens Academy may help get the City back on track.

Michael Kennedy, city resident, believes it is a bad idea to appeal the Castner lawsuit over natural gas. It has opened avenues for other inequities in the system. It is discriminating against Anchor Point to only allow 99603 zip code commissioners and would be a rule for only one commission and not the others. We are quibbling over \$300,000 for parks and rec yet talking \$15M for police and fire, something a town of 5,000 people cannot afford.

Ken Landfield, city resident, commented the \$15M for police and fire could include room for an arts and cultural facility. He appreciates there will be a community wide conversation on the statue of Brother Asaiah.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY ATTORNEY

City Attorney Klinkner was not present.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY CLERK

City Clerk Johnson announced the upcoming Citizens Academy.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY MANAGER

City Manager Wrede commented on the proposed amendment to limit commissioners to the 99603 zip code. Cutting out Anchor Point would cut out a lot of commissioners. As to the procurement policy, one guy comes to every meeting saying we don't follow the procurement policy. The first question City Manager Wrede asks department heads if we are going sole source is if we have a good reason. The policy needs to be rewritten, as it is a little outdated. For increased revenues there are ways outside the box. Maybe we should have a community discussion. Charlie Davis raised one, increasing the \$500 limit on sales tax. It hasn't been raised

since 1964. We asked the Borough to look into this and the estimated tax revenue is estimated at \$700,000 to \$800,000, about the same as reinstating sales tax on nonprepared food. There is a required ratio between property and sales tax with 6 mils being the limit. Sales tax is our biggest revenue source. The first meeting on the group working with the recreation needs assessment was held. There are strong feelings about keeping the HERC building, especially the gym. The site for the Public Safety building is not blocked in stone. The engineers will look at all the sites identified. The HERC site was preferred since the City already owns it and it has gas and utilities. Council has talked about the HERC building quite a bit and has looked at the costs to fix it up and tear it down. We have talked about getting together with contractors or cost estimators where improvements could be phased in. There is still a lot of debate to be had about the HERC.

COMMENTS OF THE MAYOR

Mayor Wythe commented to do anything different to the HERC building from the current classrooms, it has to be brought up to code. The \$7M estimate to do that could be used to build a new building. We do not have \$200,000 a year to expend just to keep it open. We do not have money for parks and recreation. The Public Safety building has been on the CIP for a number of years. It was elevated since there are potentially funds available. It is a five year project and we need to move forward. The existing public safety buildings are not meeting the needs of the community; they do not have adequate space. Public safety is a number one responsibility of a First Class city. We are not asking the community to come up with \$15M. Mayor Wythe congratulated Fire Chief Painter on his acceptance to the FEMA academy and Finance Director Li for the good audit report. Council is committed to doing a long range strategic plan and we need to get it on the agenda sooner than later. The meetings will be open to the public. There are currently two openings on the Public Safety Building Review Committee.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Councilmember Lewis commented he keeps bringing up the sales tax to bring Mike (Kennedy) here to keep him from doing other things. The college rented the HERC building for a number of years paying \$60,000 a year and performed the maintenance work on it. That is what kept the Boys and Girls Club there. Tomorrow night is senior night at the hockey rink with the high school hockey team. They beat SoHi the last two games and are playing Kenai. He invited people to come out and watch the game.

Councilmember Burgess said the City does work hard to honor the bid and procurement policy, but it could use a good revamp. If you are a member of the business community and have things to offer, please email him. The CIP process is quite inclusive with feelers sent to the commissions and non-profits. Council then prioritizes the list as to where we can get funding. A new public safety building is being sought, as it is a good opportunity for the State to supply funding without spending our own tax dollars. The site is not set in stone and HERC is not on the verge of getting demolished. It costs more money to remodel the HERC than it would cost to build something new. Council doesn't want to tear down the building or get rid of it unless it

has a means to do so. We are limiting ourselves by not exploring more building site options. We need to think outside the box for feasible options that the community can get behind.

Councilmember Van Dyke commented the port does need the new building. Although he is set in his ways that it should be done within the budget, he can bend.

Councilmember Zak commented tonight is an excellent example of why we serve on the council. It is the characters that make up the community. A meeting ago we learned the drift netters were affected by changes to Area 1A; city representatives are going to talk to the Board of Fisheries. That is <u>W</u>isdom. We gained <u>K</u>nowledge when Kachemak Bay Research Reserve shared the importance of their organization and the need to keep the economic base strong. We have <u>F</u>aith by Lisa Roberts' presentation of the United Way, and <u>L</u>ove for the little girl with the congenital heart condition and the many ways the community reaches out to the citizens. It is a unique and wonderful community with all those elements and the citizens all working together to bring it together. The budget process worked well; we have to make tough decisions.

Councilmember Roberts congratulated Fire Chief Painter for being selected for the FEMA academy. She worked with him on the Emergency Operation Plan last year. She thought the Borough Assembly had to raise the \$500 sales tax limit. During budget time a lot of people came to us asking for things and Council felt frustrated. There were a lot of comments on the sales tax and people are adamantly opposed to sales tax, yet people want recreation. Everyone needs to remember we don't know how we are going to do it. The Citizens Academy is about to come to fruition with city employees giving a lot of their time to explain their functions.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Council, Mayor Wythe adjourned the meeting at 9:49 p.m. The next Regular Meeting is Monday, February 10, 2014 at 6:00 p.m., Committee of the Whole 5:00 p.m., and a Worksession at 4:00 p.m. All meetings scheduled to be held in the City Hall Cowles Council Chambers located at 491 E. Pioneer Avenue, Homer, Alaska.

At the November 6, 2013 meeting, the Planning Commission directed staff to bring forth amendments to the HAPC Bylaws and Policies and Procedures Manual. The changes to the documents are listed below. Final action on these amendments will be at the January 2nd meeting. Amendments must be presented in writing at one meeting, and may be acted upon at the next meeting. This meeting is the first where the proposed amendments are provided in writing. A separate staff report will introduce an accompanying ordinance at the January 2nd meeting to provide needed code amendments to Title 21 and Title 1.

1. Remove the majority plus one vote needed for Conditional Use Permits and Variances.

a. From HAPC Bylaws, pg 4, Section K. Quorum; Voting:

"Four Commission members shall constitute a quorum. Four affirmative votes are required for the passage of a an ordinance, resolution or motion. Conditional use permits and zoning variances require a majority plus one vote. Voting will be by verbal vote, the order to be rotated. The final vote on each resolution or motion is a recorded roll call vote or may be done in accordance with J. Consensus. For purposes of notification to parties of interest in a matter brought before the Commission, the Chair may enter for the record the vote and basis for determination."

From the HAPC Policies and Procedures Manual:

- b. Page 4 of 8, Conditional Use Permits, delete text stating "Approval of a conditional use permit requires five yes votes."
- c. Page 8 of 8, Variances, delete text stating "Approval of a variance requires five yes votes."
- 2. Amend the number of times a Commissioner may miss meetings from three consecutive or six regular meetings in a calendar year; to three consecutive unexcused absences, with the Chair approving absences or six regular meetings in a calendar year.
 - a. From HAPC Bylaws, pg 5, Section O. Vacancies:

Staff Report 13-93 Homer Advisory Planning Commission Meeting of December 4, 2013 Page 2 of 2

"A Commission appointment is vacated under the following conditions and upon the declaration of vacancy by the Commission. <u>The Chair shall determine excused absences.</u> The Commission shall declare a vacancy when the person appointed:

- Fails to qualify;
- 2. Fails to take office within thirty days after his/her appointment;
- Resigns and the resignation is accepted;
- 4. Is physically or mentally unable to perform the duties of his/her office;
- 5. Misses three consecutive <u>unexcused</u> or six regular meetings in a calendar year; or
- 6. Is convicted of a felony or of an offense involving a violation of his/her oath of office."

Previously, a conditional use permit was required if a homeowner wanted to build a cabin, or other detached dwelling unit, on the same lot a s primary single family home. Duplexes, or a single structure with two dwelling units, were allowed as a permitted use. The result of these regulations was the increased cost and regulatory process requirements for the applicant to build a detached dwelling opposed to an attached dwelling. The Commission considered many such conditional uses over the years, with few if any denials, and few conditions. It was not a productive use of Commission time, or the applicant's money. Ordinance 2011-44(s) allowed these accessory dwellings as a permitted use, with the issuance of a zoning permit.

Conditional use permits and zoning variances require a majority plus one vote. Voting will be by verbal vote, the order to be rotated. The final vote on each resolution or motion is a recorded roll call vote or may be done in accordance with J. Consensus. For purposes of notification to parties of interest in a matter brought before the Commission, the Chair may enter for the record the vote and basis for determination."

Comments of the Audience

Members of the audience may address the Commission on any subject. (3 minute time limit)

Ken Castner, city resident, commented that the SWPPP plans are very costly, noting Kachemak City's was \$350,000 of a \$2 million project cost. Relating to changes to the city code, Mr. Stead had commented we aren't going to make changes to the city code. Mr. Castner said he has been addressing to the City Council for years, two topics, finish Greatland and put in a storm water distribution system that makes sense. But you don't start storm water at the top, you start it at the bottom. It's just like tributaries feeding to a stream, then to a river, then to a concourse. We don't have adequate drainage into Kachemak Bay off of this bench. When you look at that map you can see where it has sloughed off over the course of time. His building on Ben Walters flooded when impounded water up above the road discharged. But the City had nothing to say about it, it wasn't their fault, it was an act of God, sorry Mr. Castner, but not our problem. Mr. Castner said he French drained the entire property and hasn't had a problem since. Still, when you all take an action of approval, you have to take some ownership of it. It's not that we're doing the best we can according to code. If the code is no good, then change it and give us some relief. It's a bigger problem than Mr. Neal's project. Except for the center of town, we have a ditch by ditch solution to storm water. He would like to see the Commission start developing a comprehensive plan on dealing with it according to the Climate Action Plan. Mr. Castner explained a project he did in Kodiak that included differential vaults that were the size of this room to handle storm water. It isn't a secret as to how to handle it.

Ginny Espenshade said she forgot to thank the staff for getting all this information together and she appreciates that they went above and beyond to get it into the packet. She thanked the two who walked the property and isn't surprised they are the ones with the most concerns. From her legal back ground she commented that when you worry about putting something in writing that may raise liability, you should also worry if you are liable. She thinks there is a record now that includes science, cross section, and she urged them to reconsider and look at the 2005 plat approval process. Concerns were met with specific recommendations about runoff, traffic, and street design. They can support development that is safe in the interest of the whole community. Say fifty lots and she'll say sold. We aren't saying no development on the property, we are saying responsible, safe development that respects the neighboring properties and the entire community. The high school is a critical structure; it is a shelter for our area. People stayed at the high school when the lcicle fire happened. So you'll have slope failure, run off, floods, and it runs into the site where your supposedly sheltering people. She urged them to reconsider.

The Economic Development Advisory Commission has asked that an advisory seat for the Homer Chamber of Commerce Director be added to the Economic Development Advisory Commission. Ordinance 14-01 does this. In the past Council has discussed extending the same opportunity to the Homer Marine Trades Association (HMTA). The Association has considered this carefully and at their January 16, 2014 meeting passed a motion to request the Homer City Council create a non-voting seat on the Economic Development Advisory Commission for an HMTA representative. At the meeting, which I attended, it was discussed that there is a vacant regular seat on the Commission a member could apply for. HMTA preferred a seat that was dedicated, non-voting and advisory.

Recently, the design team has made significant progress in limiting the scope of the project and reducing the cost (project cost is shown below as 2014 budget). Attached are revised site plan, floor plan and building elevations.

The new 2014 budget reflects a decrease in square footage from the original 2012 project; a decrease in the per square footage cost, a reduction in the overall project cost and a reduction in the need for additional funding beyond that currently authorized. This project will need additional funding above that currently authorized (\$350,500).

The current project includes over-slope development, but the second floor has been removed, the maintenance shop size was reduced, and the administrative areas were decreased.

Further reductions in the cost of this project would most likely include elimination of overslope development and building square footage reductions that would negatively impact current and future building functionality.

Recommendation: The Port and Harbor Building Task Force approve the budget for this project in the amount of \$2,297,000 (as shown above), approve proceeding with 65% design based on this budget, and support the acquisition of the additional required funding.

At the January 22nd regular meeting of the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission the Commissioners received an update on the Port and Harbor building project. They reviewed the drawings and discussed funding that is available including legislative monies and matching funds from harbor reserves, and also addressed the \$300,000 shortfall for the project.

The Commission recognized the key role that the Port and Harbor facility plays in city revenue and that it is appropriate for the City Council to grant the \$300,000 for the project.

- The project benefits the City of Homer, not just the harbor
- There is \$500,000 committed from the harbor reserves

- It is an expensive infrastructure so building reserves for continued maintenance and replacement is needed

SUBJECT: Authorization to Replace Boilers – Airport Terminal

The Airport Terminal is in the process of being converted to natural gas. The boilers that exist at the terminal are over 20 years old. Replacing these boilers at the same time that the burners are being replaced will increase substantially the efficiency of the heating system and reduce maintenance costs. The existing boilers that are reaching the end of their useful life would be replaced.

Replacement of both boilers and burners will cost \$54,173. The Council has already authorized spending \$20,084 to replace only the burners. An additional \$34,089 would be needed to implement a complete conversion.

The old boilers operate at 50% efficiency. New boilers will operate at 97% efficiency.

If both the boilers and the burners are replaced:

Current average annual fuel cost to heat Terminal \$32,000 Proposed average annual fuel cost (complete conversion) \$5,000

Annual cost savings \$27,000

Benefit /Cost = \$54,173/\$27,000 = .49 (payback in 2 years)

The current balance in the Airport Reserve Fund is \$73,000.

Recommendation:

The City Council pass an ordinance amending the 2014 Operating Budget by appropriating \$34,089 from the Airport Reserve Fund for the replacement of the boilers at the Airport Terminal and authorizing the City manager to execute all appropriate documents.

MANAGER'S REPORT February 10, 2014

TO: MAYOR WYTHE / HOMER CITY COUNCIL

FROM: WALT WREDE

UPDATES / FOLLOW-UP

NOTE: Some of these items appeared in the last report. I have updated them and brought them back in case the Council wanted to discuss.

- 1. Public Works Department: Carey Meyer wears many hats for the City and he juggles many important responsibilities. The Council and the Public see him and interact with him most often in his roles as Project Manager and City Engineer. In fact, that is where he spends a great deal of time and where his work is most visible. However, Carey is also the Public Works Director and the head of the City's largest department, with the biggest budget and the most personnel. The Public Works Department has experienced a number of retirements lately and it has lost many great employees and years of experience. This was not a surprise and we knew this was coming for several years. As a result, Carey has been involved in succession planning and in looking at ways to reorganize the department with the goal of increasing efficiency, saving money, and providing an even better product to the public. Carey has a report on this for you (attached) and I would like to devote my time for the Manager's report to Carey so you can get some insight into what is happening in the City's biggest (and many in the public would say most important) department.
- 2. Ramp 7: As most of you probably know by now, we experienced a structural failure at Ramp 7 last weekend and the lower end of the ramp is currently sitting in the water. The ramp is blocked off so that the public cannot access it. This is the ramp constructed by the Seldovia Village Tribe (SVT) to access the Seldovia Ferry Berth. It also provides much improved access to the System 5 float. The ramp is available for public use and will become the property of the City when the lease expires. We are currently working closely with SVT to determine the cause, get the ramp out of the water, and repair the damage.
- 3. Board of Fisheries Testimony: I went to Anchorage last week to provide testimony at the Board of Fish meetings related to Resolution 14-019. A copy of my testimony is attached for your information. I plan to head back to Anchorage on Thursday, the 6th to provide additional testimony at committee meetings.
- 4. Harbor Construction Projects: The last agenda contained a resolution awarding a construction contract for the replacement of Ramp 3 and several floats in the harbor. You may recall that this work was paid for by a 4.2 Million State grant and \$4.2 Million in bond

sale revenue. Here is the good news. All of the bids came in under the engineers estimate and the two lowest, from very reputable companies, came in approximately \$2 Million under the estimate. Carey has double checked the bids and he and Bryan have talked to the engineers who did the cost estimate to look for discrepancies. The Bond Bank and the State of Alaska have approved the idea (that we talked about at the last meeting) of using the unallocated funds for additional float replacement and improvements that are already on the CIP and are simply an expansion of the existing work. The Port and Harbor Commission has reviewed and endorsed this approach. This agenda contains a resolution authorizing us to proceed accordingly.

- 5. Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment: The second meeting of the Needs Assess Steering Committee took place on Wednesday, February 5th. The focus of this meeting was reviewing other needs assessments, reviewing draft RFPs, and talking about the kinds of questions that should be asked.
- 6. Citizen's Academy: Katie is working very hard on setting up the Citizens Academy. The Academy is scheduled to begin February 20. We appreciate the helpful input from Council member Howard. Attached is a memorandum from Katie on this topic. This information appeared in the last packet. Since the time is getting short and we want to get the word out to the public, I thought it would be good to include this information again.
- 7. Enstar Meeting: We had a meeting with Enstar officials last week to discuss the workplan for the upcoming construction season (which has already begun apparently!). In the next month we will be approving the workplan, and adjusting the assessment roll to account for decisions that were made during construction last year. Enstar's contractor, UTI is already working on the Spit, which you may have noticed. They expect to have gas to Spit business by April. Kachemak Drive will be next and then the bluff areas. Enstar projects that it could be done and construction completed by the end of August.
- 8. Critical Habitat Legislation: The legislation that would remove the Homer Port and Harbor from the critical habitat area is on the move. Companion bills have been read across in both the House and the Senate. Committee hearings in both Chambers are scheduled this week and I will testify, once from Homer and once from Anchorage.

BOARD OF FISHERIES TESTIMONY

January 31, 2014

Thankyou Chairman Johnstone and members of the Board. For the record, my name is Walt Wrede. I am the City Manager of Homer, Alaska and am here speaking on behalf of the Mayor and the Homer City Council. I appreciate the opportunity to comment.

The City of Homer is strongly opposed to Proposals 138,139,140,142, and 143, all of which which close or severely restrict driftnet fishing in Area 1. The City Council unanimously adopted Resolution 14-019 which states its opposition to these proposals. I believe a copy is in your packet.

Others with much more expertise than I will testify about how these proposals are not based upon good science, effective management practices, or the sustained yield principle. You will hear how these proposals will fail to achieve the result the proposers want and will result in chronic over escapement, reduced product quality, lost revenues, and diminished economic opportunity.

My purpose here is to discuss the social and economic impacts these proposals would have on Homer and the Lower Kenai Peninsula. Area 1 has comprised the traditional fishing grounds of the Cook Inlet drift fishery since statehood. Cook Inlet Sockeye equals about 5% of worldwide sockeye production; a very important and valuable fishery . 300 or about half of the Cook Inlet drift permit owners live in Homer and neighboring communities. 250 Cook Inlet drift net permits have Homer addresses on them. Driftnet vessels usually employ two deckhands and that generally translates into financial support for two families and 900 jobs in the Homer area. These are primarily long time, year around residents, who have worked in this fishery for decades and in many cases, have passed the tradition down from generation to generation. These are our friends and neighbors and commercial fishing is deeply ingrained into the social and economic fabric of the community.

There are over 100 Homer based commercial fishing vessels that participate in the Cook Inlet Drift fishery. These proposals will triple travel time to the fishing grounds, increase costs, and reduce harvest opportunities. Instead of basing their operations out of the Homer Port and Harbor, they will likely be forced to move farther north near the Kasilof and Kenai River corridors. Moving the fleet's base of operations away from Homer will have a devastating ripple effect on all of the support businesses including the marine trades, marine supply stores, fuel distributors, seafood processors, Fish Dock operators, grocery stores, and so on. The money lost by third parties will ripple through the entire economy.

The Homer Port and Harbor is operated as an Enterprise Fund and it is the primary fishing port on Cook Inlet. The Port and Harbor is designed and operated to provide services and support to the commercial fleet. Homer has 170 accounts associated with fishing vessels, tenders, and fish processors which participate in the Cook Inlet Drift Fishery. These accounts generate between \$800,000 and \$900,000 annually in revenues associated with things like moorage, seafood wharfage, ice sales, slip fees, cold

storage and crane rentals. These revenues are needed to maintain critical infrastructure and services to the fleet. These proposals would likely result in significant revenue declines. Keep in mind that this is only direct revenue to the Enterprise Fund. It does not account for losses in sales taxes, fisheries business tax, local salaries, and payments to third parties that circulate through the local economy 2 or 3 times.

In summary, The Cook Inlet drift fishery is a vital economic engine which has sustained Homer for many years. The economic impacts associated with these proposals are immense and cannot be justified if they are not based upon good science, conservation, sound management practices, and sustained yield principles. We see no evidence that they are and we urge the Board to reject Proposals 138,139,140,142, and 143.



PREVIOUS PUBLIC WORKS ORGANIZATIONAL CHART





The following summarizes our activities as City Attorney during the month of January 2014.

<u>City Council</u>. Holly Wells attended the January 13, 2014 City Council meeting. We drafted ordinances repealing the sales tax exemption for nonprepared foods, and explained the Council's authority to enact the repeal.

<u>Castner v. City of Homer</u>. The superior court found in favor of Mr. Castner's claim that the City's proposed assessments against the condominium project in which he owned units were excessive. We advised the Council on actions to be taken in response to the court's decision.

<u>Planning</u>. We advised the Planning Department regarding whether the Planning Commission's approval of a preliminary plat was subject to appeal, the procedure for reconsideration of a Commission action, and the Commission's visiting a site that is the subject of an application.

Port and Harbor. I completed revised moorage agreements for the Harbor.

<u>City of Homer v. Shadle</u>. Mara Michaletz prepared for the continued court hearing on the imposition of penalties for Mr. Shadle's zoning violation.

<u>City of Homer v. Reidel</u>. Mara Michaletz tried the latest citations issued to Mr. Reidel for failing to keep his goats confined to his property, and obtained a conviction on each citation.

<u>Auction Block Company v. City of Homer.</u> Holly Wells is preparing the City's prehearing brief, and preparing for oral argument before the Federal Maritime Commission in early April.

I will be available to answer questions regarding these matters at the February 10, 2014 Council meeting.

The Economic Development Advisory Commission has asked that an advisory seat for the Homer Chamber of Commerce Director be added to the Economic Development Advisory Commission. Ordinance 14-01 does this. In the past Council has discussed extending the same opportunity to the Homer Marine Trades Association (HMTA). The Association has considered this carefully and at their January 16, 2014 meeting passed a motion to request the Homer City Council create a non-voting seat on the Economic Development Advisory Commission for an HMTA representative. At the meeting, which I attended, it was discussed that there is a vacant regular seat on the Commission a member could apply for. HMTA preferred a seat that was dedicated, non-voting and advisory.

If the Council would like to add an advisory seat to the Economic Development Advisory Commission, I suggest the following amendments to Ordinance 14-01:

Line 30 following "meeting." Insert "; and

WHEREAS the Homer Marine Trades Association represents professionals and businesses in the marine trades that contribute to the economic vitality of the community; and

WHEREAS the work the Economic Development Commission does to promote economic development would benefit from the perspective and expertise of this industry."

Line 45 following "Councilmember" insert ", a representative of the Homer Marine Trades Association"

Amend the title to include the Homer Marine Trades Association member.

CITY OF HOMER ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADVISORY COMMISSION

BYLAWS

Section 1. History/Membership/Record Keeping

The City of Homer Economic Development Advisory Commission was established in 1993 with those powers and duties as set forth in Title 1, Chapter 78, of the Homer City Code. (Ordinance 93-15(S)(A). The Commission was inactivated January 24, 2000 at EDC request on January 11, 2000. Council reactivated the Commission on February 27, 2006 via Resolution 06-20. The Commission is established to act in an advisory capacity to the City Manager and the City Council in areas of economic development within the City.

The Homer Economic Development Advisory Commission consists of seven voting members; no more than two (2) members may be residents from outside the city limits. Members shall be nominated by the Mayor and confirmed by the City Council to serve 3-year staggered terms. In addition to the seven members who make up the voting body, one Homer area high school student and one City Council member may also be appointed as non-voting members. The Mayor, City Manager, and/or-City Planner, and/or the Director of the Homer Chamber of Commerce may serve as non-voting ex-officio members of the Commission.

Permanent records or minutes shall be kept of the proceedings of the regular monthly meetings. The minutes will record the vote of each member upon every question. Every decision shall be filed in the office of the City Clerk and shall be public record open to inspection.

<u>Section 2</u>. The duties and responsibilities of the Commission are:

- A. Act in an advisory capacity to the City Manager and the City Council on the overall economic development planning for the City of Homer.
- B. Provide ongoing review and evaluation of the City of Homer Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (formerly known as the Overall Economic Development Plan) and formulate recommendations for revision. Revisions, amendments and extensions of the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) may be adopted by the City Council after consideration and report by the Commission.
- C. Collect and analyze data relevant to economic development to evaluate existing community resources.
- D. Formulate and develop the overall long range economic development goals of the residents of the City of Homer through public hearing process.
- E. Identify specific alternatives or projects to accomplish the City's objectives and recommend priorities.
- F. Review recommendations of the Homer Advisory Planning Commission to encourage a business-friendly environment in Homer.
- G. Promote public interest in overall economic development.

- H. Make inquiries regarding matters related to economic development.
- I. Collaborate with other City of Homer advisory bodies, the Homer Chamber of Commerce, Kenai Peninsula Economic Development District, and Kenai Peninsula Tourism Marketing Council in activities of mutual interest.

<u>Section 3</u>. The Economic Development Commission will abide by the following rules and guidelines:

- A. Existing Alaska State Law, Borough Code, and Homer City Code, where applicable.
- B. Robert's Rules of Order, current version, in so far as this treatise is consistent with Homer City Code.

C. Decision Making

- 1. Quorum: Four commission members shall constitute a quorum. At least four affirmative votes are required for the passage of any action of the Commission and shall constitute the meaning of "majority vote." The final vote on a motion may be expressed through roll call or by unanimous consent ("no objection").
- 2. Voting: All Commission members present shall vote unless the Commission, for special reasons, permits a member to abstain.
- 3. Abstentions: All Commission members present shall vote unless the Commission, for special reasons, permits a member to abstain. A motion to excuse a member from voting shall be made prior to the call for the question to be voted upon. A member of the Commission requesting to be excused from voting may make a brief, oral statement of the reasons for the request and the question of granting permission to abstain shall be taken without further debate. A member may not be permitted to abstain except upon the unanimous consensus of members present. A member may not explain a vote, may not discuss the question while the roll call vote is being taken and may not change his/her vote thereafter.
- 4. Consensus: The Commission may, from time to time, express its opinion or preference concerning a subject brought before it for consideration. Said statement, representing the will of the body and meeting of the minds of the members, may be given by the presiding officer as the consensus of the body as to that subject without taking a motion and roll call vote.
- 5. Notice to Reconsider: A member of the Commission who voted on the prevailing side on any issue may provide notice of reconsideration within 48 hours from the time the original action was taken. The Chair or Vice-Chair shall notify staff of the reconsideration.
- 6. Conflict of Interest: A member of the Commission shall disqualify himself/herself from participating in any official action in which he/she has a substantial financial interest per HCC 1.12. The member shall disclose any financial interest in the topic before debating or voting. The member cannot participate in the debate or vote on the matter, unless the Commission determines the financial interest is not substantial. Following the Chair's announcement of the agenda item, the Commissioner should state that he/she has a conflict of interest. Once stated, the member should distance himself/herself from all

motions. The Commission must move and vote on whether or not there is a conflict of interest. At this time a motion shall be made by another Commissioner restating the disclosed conflict. Once the motion is on the floor, the Commissioner can disclose his/her financial interest in the matter and the Commission may discuss the conflict of interest. A vote will then be taken. An affirmative vote excuses the Commissioner and he/she takes a seat in the audience or remains nearby. Upon completion of the agenda item, the Commissioner will be called back to join the meeting.

D. Communication with Mayor & Council and City Manager

- 1. Any recommendation the Commission may have regarding economic development is to be directed to the City Council through the City Manager. Recommendations of the Commission concerning policy issues may be sent directly to the Council upon request of the Commission.
- 2. Any report or recommendation made in response to a specific request from the City Council shall be made directly to the Council, unless otherwise directed by the Council.

E. Meetings/Agendas:

- 1. Regular meetings will take place on the second Tuesday of each month at 6:00 p.m.
- 2. Items may be added to the Regular Meeting agenda at the request of staff, the Commission as a whole, or individual commissioners. Agenda deadline is the Wednesday of the week preceding the meeting date at 5:00 p.m. Packets should be available by end of day on the Thursday following the agenda deadline.
- 3. After the agenda deadline, the commission may, through majority vote, add or remove agenda items at the beginning of a meeting during "Approval of the Agenda." Added items shall be for discussion purposes only; no action may be taken.
- 4. Special Meetings, Worksessions, and Public Forums may be called by the Chair or a majority of the Commission. Worksessions and Public Forums do not require a quorum. However, no action may be taken at a worksession or forum; items on the agenda are for discussion only.
- F. The general order of business during a Regular Meeting shall be as follows: (Information in parentheses need not appear on the agenda. Time limits do not include optional question/answer period. The Chair, with concurrence of the body, may adjust the time limit.)
 - 1. Call to Order
 - 2. Approval of Agenda
 - 3. Public Comments Regarding Items on the Agenda. (3 minute time limit per person)
- 4. Reconsideration (Vote on reconsideration with item placed under pending business for reconsideration of action by the Commission.)

- 5. Approval of Minutes
- 6. Visitors (Scheduled visitors who have been invited to give a presentation will be allotted no more than 20 minutes per presentation. For unscheduled visitors, the Chair will set a time limit of no more than 5 minutes per person. Topics should be relevant to the role of the Commission as an advisory body.)
- 7. Staff & Council Report/Committee Reports/Borough Reports (Written reports are to be provided by packet deadline. Time limit for oral reports not to exceed 5 minutes.)
 - 8. Public Hearing (3 minute time limit per person.)
- 9. Pending Business (Items that have been carried over from previous meeting, postponed, reconsidered, tabled, etc.)
 - 10. New Business
- 11. Informational Materials (No action may be taken on these matters; they may be discussed only.)
 - 12. Comments of the Audience (3 minute time limit per person.)
 - 13. Comments of the City Staff
 - 14. Comments of the Council member
 - 15. Comments of the Chair
 - 16. Comments of the Commission.
- 17. Adjournment/Next Regular Meeting (Also state any additional meetings to be scheduled. All Regular Meetings will be held in the Homer City Hall, Cowles Council Chambers.)
- G. Duties and Powers of the Officers:

A Chair and Vice-Chair will be selected annually (November meeting) by the voting members. The Chair will preside at all meetings of the Commission, call special meetings in accordance with the by-laws, sign documents of the Commission, see that all actions and notices are properly taken, and summarize the findings of the Commission for the official record. The Vice-Chair will perform all duties and be subject to all responsibilities of the Chair in his/her absence, disability or disqualification of office. The Vice-Chair will succeed the Chair if he/she vacates the office before the term is completed, to complete the unexpired term. A new Vice-Chair will be elected at the next regular meeting. It is the responsibility of the Chair to advise the City Clerk regarding any and all non-regular meetings within a timely manner to meet Code requirements for advertisement/publication.

H. Vacancies:

A Commission appointment is vacated under the following conditions and upon the declaration of vacancy by the Commission. The Commission shall declare a vacancy when the person appointed:

- 1. fails to qualify to take office within 30 days after his/her appointment;
- 2. resigns and the resignation is accepted;
- 3. is physically or mentally unable to perform the duties of his/her office;
- 4. misses three consecutive regular meetings unless excused; or
- 5. is convicted of a felony or of an offense involving a violation of his/her oath of office.

I. Amendment of Bylaws:

The by-laws may be amended at any meeting of the Commission with five affirmative votes, provided that notice of said proposed amendment is given to each member in writing. The proposed amendment shall be introduced at one meeting and action shall be taken at the next Commission meeting. The amendment shall be presented in the form of a Resolution by the City Council and shall be forwarded to the City Council through the City Clerk at the earliest possible date.

(These Bylaws were approved by the Homer City Council on August 25, 2008 via Resolution 08-89.)

SUBJECT: CHARTER COMMISSION ELECTION PETITION

Pursuant to AS §29.10.010(e), I am submitting this report on the charter commission election petition. The petition for a Charter Commission Election was submitted timely on January 27, 2014 by sponsor Ken Castner. In all, 15 petition booklets were received. Of the 15 petition booklets, 14 were sufficient and one was blank. The number of names on the sufficient booklets totaled 224.

A current list of registered voters within city limits was requested and received by the Clerk's office on January 24, 2014. Deputy City Clerk Jacobsen reviewed the 224 names on the petition and determined that: 28 signatures were insufficient because the name was not listed on the current voter roll, the name was illegible, a signature was not included, or the person signed the petition more than once. It was determined 196 of the signatures were valid signatures of registered voters within the city limits.

Pursuant to AS §29.10.010(e), the petition must bear a number of voter signatures equal to 15 percent of the number of votes cast at the October 1, 2013 regular City election, which is 185. I find the petition for a Charter Commission Election bears sufficient signatures, and therefore have certified the petition.

Alaska Statutes do not provide guidance as to when the charter commission election should be held, however, Council may choose to be guided by the provisions for scheduling an initiative or referendum election. An initiative or referendum is submitted to the voters at any of the following occurring at least 60 days after certification of the petition: (i) the next regular election; (ii) a previously scheduled special election; or (iii) a special election scheduled by ordinance if the Council determines it to be in the best interest of the City and no other election will occur within 75 days after certification of the petition.

Since there presently is no special election scheduled in the City, the Council has two options: place the question on the ballot at the October 7, 2014 regular City election, or call an earlier special election.

Once the Council has determined when to hold the election, it will fix the date for submission of charter commission candidate nomination petitions to the City Clerk. The submission date should allow enough time for the Clerk to give the required 20-day election notice after the candidates for charter commission have been determined.

Assuming the charter commission election will be held on the regular election date in October, I suggest the candidacy filing period for the charter commissioners open on May 1 and close on July 15, 2014.

RECOMMENDATION:

Determine when the election for a charter commission shall be held and schedule the candidacy filing period.

QUALIFICATION STATEMENT

Nothing in this chapter should be considered in lieu of any applicable laws and procedures found in the Alaska State Statutes, the Kenai Peninsula Borough Code of Ordinances, where applicable, or the Homer City Code.

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INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this policy manual is to clarify the role of the Homer Advisory Planning Commission ("Commission") in administration of the Homer Zoning Ordinance, Title 21, and Subdivisions, Title 22. Further, this manual describes policies for the Commission that are supplementary or explanatory to the requirements of Homer City Code.

This manual is divided into sections, which explain the policies for administering and implementing the land use permitting ordinances and the zoning ordinance.

The policy and procedure manual will be endorsed by resolution of the City Council and may be amended at any meeting of the Commission by a majority plus one of the members, provided that notice of the proposed amendment is given to each member in writing. Proposed amendments to the procedure manual shall be introduced at one meeting and action shall be taken at a subsequent Commission meeting.

PUBLIC TESTIMONY AND COMMENT

The Commission invites citizen participation regarding matters brought before it for consideration.

For any public participation before the Commission, the citizen should walk to the microphone located at the rostrum directly in front of the Commission podium, sign in, and after receiving recognition from the Chair, state his/her name and address and purpose for appearing. Comments are limited to three minutes. In special circumstances, this time limit may be extended by two minutes by the Chair with concurrence of the body. Items that generate a large amount of citizen interest may be taken out of their regular position on the agenda at the discretion of the Commission as an accommodation to the public. Moving these items on a published agenda will be done at the beginning of the meeting, during the adoption of the agenda.

Comment time limits

Comments and testimony are limited to three minutes. In special circumstances, this time limit may be adjusted by two minutes up or down by the Chair with concurrence of the body.

Public Comment

Any citizen desiring to speak on any matter other than public hearing items or preliminary plats on the agenda may do so under "Public Comments." After the public comment period is introduced, the Chair may recognize any member of the public who wishes to address the Commission. No official action will be taken by the Commission under this item.

Public Hearings and Plats

The public may comment on public hearing items and preliminary plats when those agenda items are addressed by the commission. These are generally items eight and nine on the regular agenda.

Comments on topics not on the agenda

Any citizen desiring to speak on a matter not on the agenda may do so under "Comments of the Audience," item number thirteen on the regular agenda.

DELIBERATION of QUASI-JUDICIAL DECISIONS

When making a quasi judicial decision, the Commission may choose to deliberate at an open meeting, or may choose to meet at a time, date and location set by the Commission. Such a meeting for deliberations only is not subject to the Open Meetings Act and is not required to be open to the public.

APPEALS (Quasi Judicial)

PURPOSE

The purpose of review of appeals before the Commission is to ascertain that errors of fact or interpretation have not been made pertaining to zoning matters. Generally, appeals to the Commission will be appeals of a determination, decision, or permitting matter decided upon by the City Planner.

The City Council, sitting as the Board of Adjustment, hears appeals of decisions made by the Commission. For example, conditional use permits, variance, etc, can be appealed to the Board of Adjustment, or a matter that was appealed to the Commission can be further appealed to the Board of Adjustment.

Public Hearing

Appeals before the Commission require a public hearing. Notice of the public hearing will be in accordance with HCC 21.93 and HCC 21.94.

Review Standards

In reviewing an appeal request, the Commission will consider:

- Documentation of evidence;
- 2. The Record of Appeal; and
- 3. Controlling sections of Chapter 21 Homer City Code;

4. Any new evidence or testimony presented during the public hearing. Once the public hearing is closed, the Commission cannot hear additional comments on the topic.

Determination

All decisions will be in writing. The officially adopted minutes shall be made part of the decision. A specific statement of findings and reasons supporting the decision shall be made. Copies of the decision will be promptly mailed to the persons participating in the appeal.

An appeal from an action or determination of the Commission is to be filed with the city clerk within thirty days of the distribution of the decision document.

REVIEW OF BRIDGE CREEK WATERSHED PROTECTION DISTRICT

PURPOSE

The Commission may approve development within the Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District (BCWPD) subject to the standards provided in the zoning ordinance and in compliance with the Comprehensive Plan, for those uses or structures specified within the Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District ordinance. The purpose is to prevent the degradation of the water quality and protect the Bridge Creek Watershed to ensure its continuing suitability as a water supply source for the City's public water utility. These provisions benefit the public health, safety, and welfare of the residents of the City of Homer and other customers of the city's water system by restricting land use activities that would impair the water quality, or increase the cost for treatment.

Conditional Use

A conditional use permit may be issued in accordance with Chapter 21.61 and subject to the requirements of the Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District Chapter 21.40.060 Conditional uses and structures, and/or Chapter 21.40.080 Erosion sediment control, Chapter 21.40.090 Agricultural activity, Chapter 21.40.100 Timber growing and harvesting operations, Chapter 21.40.110 Stream buffers, and Chapter 21.40.130 Exceptions to buffers.

Preliminary Plats

The Commission will review and comment on all subdivision proposals within the Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District.

REVIEW POLICIES FOR CONDITIONAL USE PERMITS (Quasi - Judicial)

PURPOSE

It is recognized that there are certain uses which are generally considered appropriate in a district, provided that controls and safeguards are applied to ensure their compatibility with permitted principal uses. The conditional use permit procedure is intended to allow Commission consideration of the impact of the proposed conditional use on surrounding property and the application of controls and safeguards. This procedure assures that the conditional use will be compatible with the surrounding area and in keeping with the character and integrity of the neighborhood.

Public Hearing

A public hearing before the Commission is required before a conditional use permit may be granted. Notice of the public hearing will be in accordance with HCC 21.94.

Review Standards

The Commission has 45 days from the close of the public hearing to make a decision on a conditional use permit application. The applicant may agree, in writing, to the extension of the 45 day time period for Commission action.

The Commission may approve, approve with conditions, or disapprove an application. The Commission must prepare written findings and reasons supporting its decision. Approval of a conditional use permit requires five yes votes. If a conditional use permit is denied, the written findings and reasons for that decision will be approved by those who voted against the permit, even if the number against is less than a majority of the Commission.

<u>Specific conditions may be required.</u> Such conditions will be part of the terms under which the conditional use permit is granted and violations of such terms shall be deemed a violation of this ordinance. Failure to meet any time limitations imposed by the conditional use permit shall void the permit. An extension may be granted following a public hearing on the matter. Extensions will be granted for good cause only.

The development of the conditional use project or site, following issuance of the permit, will be in accordance with the conditions of the permit, standards of the zoning regulations and/or the approved site plan. Failure to observe any conditions or standards will be deemed a violation.

Determination

The Commission must make findings of fact sufficient to support its decision. Upon determination the Commission will document the decision and the basis for decision. The petitioner will be notified by mail by a copy of the meeting minutes and the decision documentation.

Appeals

The Commission Chair will alert the petitioner and other interested parties in attendance that an appeal of the Commission's decision is possible and that the appeal must be filed within thirty days of the distribution of the decision document.

NONCONFORMITY REVIEW POLICIES (Quasi - Judicial)

PURPOSE

The Commission shall review and determine the nonconformity of certain structures and uses. The purpose of review is to establish the commencement date of use, establish the effective date of applicable regulations, and formally accept the nonconformity.

City code states which nonconformities are reviewed by the City Planner and which are reviewed by the Commission. Generally, the Commission will be reviewing nonconforming uses within the city, excluding the areas annexed on March 20, 2002.

Public Hearing

The Commission shall conduct a public hearing per HCC 21.94.

Review Standards

It shall be the responsibility of the owner to show proof of continuing nonconformity of any property, use or structure.

Prior to determining the nonconformity of a use or structure, the Commission will determine:

- 1. The commencement date of use;
- 2. The effective date of applicable regulations.

There may exist uses, or structures which were legal before the effective date of the controlling regulation, but which are now prohibited under the terms of the existing ordinance. See HCC 21.61.040.

To avoid undue hardships, actual construction lawfully begun prior to the effective date of the zoning ordinance will be allowed to continue provided the work will be carried on diligently. Actual construction is defined as the placement of materials in a permanent position and fastened to produce a product.

Nonconforming Uses of Land/Structures

When a lawful structure exists prior to September 28, 1982, or March 20 2002 for annexed areas, but does not meet the district or ordinance requirements, it shall be considered nonconforming. Nonconforming structures may be continued and/or expanded only if the nonconformity of the structure does not increase.

Legally existing structures are those that:

- 1. Exist prior to effective date of Ordinance 4-300-2 (Interim Zoning Ordinance) dated June 13, 1966.
- 2. Exist prior to effective date of Ordinance No. 33 (Kenai Peninsula Borough) dated May 2, 1967 and are in compliance with Ordinance 4-300-2.
- 3. Exist prior to effective date of Ordinance 78-13 (Kenai Peninsula Borough) dated May 16, 1978 and are in compliance with Kenai Peninsula Borough Ordinance No. 33 and Homer Ordinance 4-300-2.
- 4. Exist prior to effective date of Ordinance 82-15 (Homer Zoning Ordinance) dated September 28, 1982 and are in compliance with previous zoning ordinance requirements.

Once a structure made nonconforming by this title is abandoned or brought into conformity with this title, the structure shall thereafter conform to the regulations of the zone in which it is located, and the nonconformity shall not be allowed to continue.

A lawful nonconforming use may continue so long as it remains lawful. No nonconforming use may be enlarged to occupy a greater area of land than was occupied as of the date it became nonconforming, or August 12, 2008, whichever is later. Once a use made nonconforming by this title is abandoned, changed, discontinued, or ceases to be the primary use of a lot, the use of that lot shall thereafter conform to the regulations of the zone which the lot is located, and the nonconformity shall not thereafter be resumed or allowed to continue.

Determination

Upon presentation of such proof that establishes the continuing nonconformity of any use or structure, the Commission shall formally accept the nonconformity, as a valid use or structure until such time as the use ceases. Upon determination by the Planning Commission staff will document the decision and basis for decision. The petitioner will be notified by mail by a copy of the relevant meeting minutes and the decision documentation.

Appeals

The Commission Chair will alert the petitioner and other interested parties that an appeal of the Commission's decision is possible. The appeal must be filed within thirty days of the distribution of the decision document. The City Clerk will process all appeals.

PRELIMINARY PLAT REVIEW POLICIES

PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy statement is to clarify the position of the Commission with regard to their recommendations of acceptance or denial of preliminary plats. This review provides the opportunity for the City to make comments and recommendations to the Kenai Peninsula

Borough Planning Commission. The Kenai Peninsula Borough holds platting powers for the entire borough, both inside and outside the city limits. The Homer Advisory Planning Commission acts as an advisory body to the Borough Planning Commission on plat matters inside city limits and within the Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District.

The preliminary plat process allows an exchange of information between the subdivider, the Planning and Zoning Office, and the Commission. Proper utilization of the preliminary process should result in a recommendation of approval for the majority of the plats.

Procedures

General. Kenai Peninsula Borough Code 20.12.050 governs subdivisions in first class cities. A surveyor will submit one full size copy and a 11" x 17" reduced copy of the preliminary plat to the Planning Director when subdividing land in the City of Homer or the Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District. The Commission shall review the plat and take action within forty-nine days of the date of receipt unless the applicant agrees to an extension. Recommendations of the Commission based upon lawful ordinances shall be incorporated in the final plat.

The Commission will consider plats and make recommendations. The staff report and minutes are then forwarded to the borough planning department.

The borough planning commission makes the final determination. Once the preliminary plat has been accepted, the final plat is submitted to the borough for either administrative approval or approval by the borough planning commission.

ZONING ORDINANCE AMENDMENTS

PURPOSE

The Commission will review all proposals to amend the zoning ordinance or zoning map and make recommendations to the City Council per HCC 21.95. Neither the Commission nor City Council may consider a zoning ordinance request which is substantially the same as any other amendment submitted within the previous nine months and which was rejected.

Initiation/Application

Amendments to the zoning ordinance will be made in accordance with HCC 21.95. When the amendment request is accepted as complete by the Planning Department, the matter will be presented within 30 days to the Planning Commission, according to the Commission meeting schedule and due dates.

Public Hearing

A public hearing before the Commission is required. Notice of the public hearing will be in accordance with HCC 21.94. In the case of a zoning ordinance amendment or major district

boundary change, no notification of neighboring property will be required, but notices will be posted in at least three public places.

Review Standards

Zoning text and zoning map amendments shall be reviewed according to HCC 21.95.

Determination

The Planning Commission shall submit to the City Council its written recommendations per 21.95.060(d) regarding the amendment proposal along with the Planning Department's report on the proposal, all written comments on the proposal, and an excerpt from its minutes showing its consideration of the proposal and all public testimony on the proposal. Such recommendations of the Commission shall be advisory only and shall not be binding on the City Council.

POLICY FOR REVIEW OF ZONING VARIANCES (Quasi-Judicial)

PURPOSE

The Commission may grant a variance to provide relief when a literal enforcement of the regulations and standards of the zoning ordinance, Chapter 21, would deprive a property owner of the reasonable use of his real property.

The purpose of review is to ascertain that those conditions specified as necessary to granting a variance shall be satisfied; that the variance will be the minimum necessary to permit the reasonable use of land or structure, and that the variance will not be granted which will permit a land use in a district in which that use is otherwise prohibited.

Public Hearing

A public hearing before the Commission is required before a variance may be granted. Notice of the public hearing will be in accordance with HCC 21.94.

Review Standards

In reviewing a variance request and prior to granting a variance, the Commission must consider the standards of review as established in HCC 21.72. All of the conditions must exist before a variance can be granted.

Determination

The Commission must prepare written findings and reasons supporting its decision. Approval of a variance requires five yes votes. If a variance is denied, the written findings and reasons for that decision will be approved by those who voted against the permit, even if the number against is less than a majority of the Commission. Upon determination, staff will document the decision and the basis for decision. The petitioner will be notified by mail with a copy of the meeting minutes (those portions that apply to the petition) and the decision

documentation. The Commission Chair will alert the petitioner and other interested parties that an appeal of the Commission's decision is possible. The appeal must be filed within thirty days of the distribution of the decision document. The City Clerk will process all appeals.

At the November 6, 2013 meeting, the Planning Commission directed staff to bring forth amendments to the HAPC Bylaws and Policies and Procedures Manual. The changes to the documents are listed below. Final action on these amendments will be at the January 2nd meeting. Amendments must be presented in writing at one meeting, and may be acted upon at the next meeting. This meeting is the first where the proposed amendments are provided in writing. A separate staff report will introduce an accompanying ordinance at the January 2nd meeting to provide needed code amendments to Title 21 and Title 1.

1. Remove the majority plus one vote needed for Conditional Use Permits and Variances.

a. From HAPC Bylaws, pg 4, Section K. Quorum; Voting:

"Four Commission members shall constitute a quorum. Four affirmative votes are required for the passage of a an-ordinance, resolution or motion. Conditional use permits and zoning variances require a majority plus one vote. Voting will be by verbal vote, the order to be rotated. The final vote on each resolution or motion is a recorded roll call vote or may be done in accordance with J. Consensus. For purposes of notification to parties of interest in a matter brought before the Commission, the Chair may enter for the record the vote and basis for determination."

From the HAPC Policies and Procedures Manual:

- b. Page 4 of 8, Conditional Use Permits, delete text stating "Approval of a conditional use permit requires five yes votes."
- c. Page 8 of 8, Variances, delete text stating "Approval of a variance requires five yes votes."
- Amend the number of times a Commissioner may miss meetings from three consecutive or six regular meetings in a calendar year; to three consecutive unexcused absences, with the Chair approving absences or six regular meetings in a calendar year.
 - a. From HAPC Bylaws, pg 5, Section O. Vacancies:

Staff Report 13-93 Homer Advisory Planning Commission Meeting of December 4, 2013 Page 2 of 2

"A Commission appointment is vacated under the following conditions and upon the declaration of vacancy by the Commission. The Chair shall determine excused absences. The Commission shall declare a vacancy when the person appointed:

- Fails to qualify;
- 2. Fails to take office within thirty days after his/her appointment;
- Resigns and the resignation is accepted;
- 4. Is physically or mentally unable to perform the duties of his/her office;
- 5. Misses three consecutive <u>unexcused</u> or six regular meetings in a calendar year; or
- 6. Is convicted of a felony or of an offense involving a violation of his/her oath of office."

This memo contains the planning staff review of the zoning code amendment as required by HCC 21.95.040.

21.95.040 Planning Department review of code amendment. The Planning Department shall evaluate each amendment to this title that is initiated in accordance with HCC 21.95.010 and qualified under HCC 21.95.030, and may recommend approval of the amendment only if it finds that the amendment:

<u>a</u>. Is consistent with the comprehensive plan and will further specific goals and objectives of the plan.

Discussion: Comprehensive Plan Chapter 4 Goal 3 Object A states: "Create a clear, coordinated regulatory framework that guides development." One of the implementation strategies states: "Provide a clear and predictable approval process for every development including organizing project review and permitting and providing appropriate staff review."

This proposed amendment will allow a decision on a conditional use permit at any meeting with a quorum of Homer Advisory Commission members. This will give applicants greater certainty as to when their application will be heard by the Commission, and a decision rendered.

Staff response: This amendment is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan.

b. Will be reasonable to implement and enforce.

Staff response: This code amendment will be reasonable to implement and enforce. The amendment relaxes a more stringent code requirement.

<u>c</u>. Will promote the present and future public health, safety and welfare.

Plat Consideration

A. Staff Report PL 14-05, Barnett's South Slope Subdivision Quiet Creek Park Preliminary Plat

City Planner Abboud reviewed the Commission's role in plat consideration and the staff report that includes the following recommendations:

- Planning Commission recommends approval of the preliminary plat, with the following comments:
- 1. Increase the size of lot 2 to meet the dimensional size requirement of 10,000 square feet. Elimination or reduction in size of Park A to meet this requirement is acceptable.
- 2. A development agreement is required.
- 3. The shared driveways shall meet fire department access requirements.
- 4. The developer shall clarify with Public Works prior to final platting which creeks shown on the plat have a drainage easement and the width of the easements.
- 5. Continue the 15 foot utility easement around the bulb of Sophie Court
- 6. Work with the City of Homer and the Kenai Peninsula Borough address officer on E911 compliant street names
- 7. During the first phase of construction, build Nelson Ave and Ronda Street from East End Road all the way to the intersection with South Slope Drive, and that portion of South Slope Drive within the subdivision.
- 8. Construct fire hydrants as part of the subdivision.
- 9. Dedicate the area shown as Park "A" as future right of way providing access to the south of the subdivision.
- 10. A fire department accessible shared driveway provides reasonable access to lot 8, and Tract A, AA Mattox Sub 1958 Addn, in lieu of a full right of way dedication to these lots.

Chair Venuti asked Commissioners who visited the site prior to the meeting to report to the Commission.

HOMER ADVISORY PLANNING COMMISSION BYLAWS

The Homer Advisory Planning Commission is established with those powers and duties as set forth in Title 1, Section 76, of the Homer City Code. The Commission is established to maximize local involvement in planning and to implement and recommend modifications to the Homer Zoning Ordinance, Title 21, and Subdivisions, Title 22. The Commission's jurisdiction is limited to the area within the City boundaries and that area designated as the Homer Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District.

The Homer Advisory Planning Commission ("Commission") consists of seven members; no more than one may be from outside the city limits. Members will be appointed by the Mayor subject to confirmation by the City Council for three-year terms (except to complete terms). The powers and duties of the Commission are described in HCC 1.76.030.

- A. To abide by existing Alaska State law, Borough Code of Ordinances, where applicable, and Homer City Code pertaining to planning and zoning functions;
- **B.** To abide by Robert's Rules of Order, so far as this treatise is consistent with Homer City Code;
- **C.** Regular Meetings:

All Commission members should be physically present at the designated time and location within the City for the meeting. Teleconferencing is not permitted.

- 1. First and third Wednesday of each month at 6:30 p.m.
- 2. Agenda deadline is two weeks prior to the meeting date at 5:00 p.m. Agenda items requiring public hearing must be received three weeks prior to the Commission hearing. However, conditional use applications may be scheduled for public hearing in accordance with HCC 21.94. Preliminary plats must be submitted the Friday two weeks before the Commission meeting.
- 3. Items will be added to the agenda upon request of staff, the Commission or a Commissioner.
- 4. Public notice of a regular meeting shall be made as provided in HCC Chapter 1.14
- 5. Meetings will adjourn promptly at 9:30 p.m. An extension is allowed by vote of the Commission.
 - Procedure: The Chair will entertain a motion to extend the meeting until a specific time. After the motion has been seconded, the Commission will vote. A yes vote will extend the meeting until the specified time. A no vote will require that the Chair conclude business at or before 9:30 pm

and immediately proceed to comments of the audience, the Commission and adjournment.

D. Special Meetings:

All Commission members should be physically present at the designated time and location within the City for the meeting. Teleconferencing is not permitted.

- 1. Called by Chair or majority of the Commission.
- 2. Require reasonable notification be given to the Planning Department staff and twenty-four hour notice to Commissioners.
- 3. Public notice of a special meeting shall be made as provided in HCC Chapter 1.14

E. Duties and Powers of the Officers:

A Chair and Vice-Chair shall be selected annually in August or as soon thereafter as practicable by the appointive members. The Chair shall preside at all meetings of the Commission, call special meetings in accordance with the bylaws, sign documents of the Commission, see that all actions and notices are properly taken, and summarize the findings of the Commission for the official record. The Vice-Chair shall perform all duties and be subject to all responsibilities of the Chair in his/her absence, disability or disqualification of office. The Vice-Chair will succeed the Chair if he/she vacates the office before the term is completed to complete the un-expired term. A new Vice-Chair shall be elected at the next regular meeting.

F. Committees

- 1. The Chair shall appoint committees for such specific purposes as the business of the Commission may require. Committee appointments will be confirmed by the Commission. Committee membership shall include at least two Commissioners. Other Committee members may be appointed from the public.
- One Committee member shall be appointed Chair and be responsible for creating an agenda and notifying the City Clerk of meetings so they may be advertised in accordance with Alaska State Law and Homer City Code.
- 3. One Committee member shall be responsible for furnishing summary notes of all Committee meetings to the City Clerk.
- 4. Committees shall meet in accordance with Commission bylaws and Robert's Rules.
- 5. All committees shall make a progress report at each Commission meeting.

- 6. No committee shall have other than advisory powers.
- 7. Per Robert's Rules, upon giving a final report, the Committee is disbanded.

G. Motions to Reconsider:

Notice of reconsideration shall be given to the Chair or Vice-Chair, if the Chair is unavailable, within forty-eight hours from the time the original action was taken. A member of the Commission who voted on the prevailing side on any issue may move to reconsider the commission's action at the same meeting or at the next meeting of the body provided the above 48-hour notice has been given. Consideration is only for the original motion to which it applies. If the issue involves an applicant, staff shall notify the applicant of the reconsideration.

H. Conflict of Interest:

A member of the Commission shall disqualify himself/herself from participating in any official action in which he/she has a substantial financial interest per HCC 1.12. The member shall disclose any financial interest in the topic before debating or voting. The member cannot participate in the debate or vote on the matter, unless the Commission has determined the financial interest is not substantial.

Following the Chair's announcement of the agenda item, the Commissioner should state that he has a conflict of interest. Once stated, the member should distance himself/herself from all motions. The Commission must move and vote on whether or not there is a conflict of interest. At this time, a motion shall be made by another Commissioner restating the disclosed conflict. Once the motion is on the floor the Commissioner can disclose his/her financial interest in the matter and the Commission may discuss the conflict of interest. A vote will then be taken. An affirmative vote excuses the Commissioner and he/she takes a seat in the audience or remains nearby. Upon completion of the agenda item, the Commissioner will be called back to join the meeting.

I. Situation of personal interest

A situation of personal interest may arise. For example, a Commissioner may live in the subject subdivision or may be a neighboring property owner. If the Commissioner feels that by participating in the discussion he/she may taint the decision of the Commission, or be unable to make an unbiased decision, the Commissioner should state his/her personal interest. The same procedure as above should be followed to determine the conflict.

J. Ex parte Communications

Ex parte contacts are not permitted in quasi-judicial actions. Ex parte communications can result in a violation of procedural due process. If a Commissioner finds him/herself about to be involved in ex parte contact the Commissioner should recommend that the citizen submit their comments in writing to the Commission or testify on record. If a Commissioner has been involved in an ex parte contact, the contact and its substance should be disclosed at the beginning of the hearing. The Commissioner should state whether or not s/he thinks s/he can make an unbiased decision.

K. Quorum; Voting:

Four Commission members shall constitute a quorum. Four affirmative votes are required for the passage of an ordinance, resolution or a motion. Conditional use permits and zoning variances require a majority plus one vote. Voting will be by verbal vote, the order to be rotated. The final vote on each resolution or motion is a recorded roll call vote or may be done in accordance with J. Consensus. For purposes of notification to parties of interest in a matter brought before the Commission, the Chair may enter for the record the vote and basis for determination.

The City Manager, or his/her designee and Public Works Director shall serve as consulting members of the Commission but shall have no vote.

L. Findings:

Findings will be recorded for conditional use permits, variances, acceptance of nonconforming status and zoning ordinance amendments. The findings will include the result of the vote on the item and the basis of determination of the vote, as summarized by the Chair or Vice-Chair, in the absence of the Chair.

M. Consensus:

The Commission may, from time-to-time, express its opinion or preference concerning a subject brought before it for consideration. Said statement, representing the will of the body and meeting of the minds of the members may be given by the presiding officer as the consensus of the body as to that subject without taking a motion and roll call vote.

N. Abstentions:

All Commission members present shall vote unless the Commission, for special reasons, permits a member to abstain. A motion to excuse a member from

voting shall be made prior to the call for the question. A member of the Commission requesting to be excused from voting may make a brief oral statement of the reasons for the request and the question of granting permission to abstain shall be taken without further debate. An affirmative vote of the Commission excuses the Commissioner. A member may not explain a vote or discuss the question while the roll call vote is being taken. A member may not change his/her vote thereafter.

O. Vacancies:

A Commission appointment is vacated under the following conditions and upon the declaration of vacancy by the Commission. <u>The Chair shall determine excused absences.</u> The Commission shall declare a vacancy when the person appointed:

- Fails to qualify;
- 2. Fails to take office within thirty days after his/her appointment;
- Resigns and the resignation is accepted;
- 4. Is physically or mentally unable to perform the duties of his/her office;
- 5. Misses three consecutive <u>unexcused</u> or six regular meetings in a calendar year; or
- 6. Is convicted of a felony or of an offense involving a violation of his/her oath of office.

P. Procedure for Consideration of Agenda Items:

The following procedure will normally be observed:

- Staff presents report and makes recommendation;
- 2 If the agenda item involves an applicant s/he may make a presentation;
- 3. Commission may ask questions of the applicant and staff.

Q. Procedure for Consideration of Public Hearing Items:

- Staff presents report and makes recommendation;
- Applicant makes presentation;
- 3. Public hearing is opened;
- 4. Public testimony is heard on item (presentation of supporting/opposing evidence by public Commission may ask questions of public);
- Public hearing is closed;
- 6. Rebuttal of evidence by staff (if any);
- Rebuttal of evidence by applicant (if any);
- 8. Commission may ask questions of the applicant, and staff.

- g. The Commission will move/second to accept the staff report, with or without staff recommendations. The Commission will discuss the item, may ask questions of staff, and make amendments to the recommendations of staff. Amendments may be made by motion/second.
- 10. The Commission may continue the topic to a future meeting. Once the public hearing is closed no new testimony or information will be accepted from the public. The Commission may ask questions of the applicant and staff.

R. Procedure for Consideration of Preliminary Plats:

The following procedure will normally be observed:

- Staff presents report and makes recommendations;
- 2. Applicant makes presentation;
- 3. Public comment is heard on the item;
- 4. Applicant may make a response;
- 5. Commission may ask questions of applicant, public and staff.

S. The Commission shall act as a body:

A member of the Commission may not speak or act for the Commission without recommendation or direction given by the Commission. The Chair or Chair's designee shall serve as the official spokesperson of the Commission.

T. Bylaws Amended:

The bylaws may be amended at any meeting of the Commission by a majority plus one of the members, provided that notice of said proposed amendment is given to each member in writing. The proposed amendment shall be introduced at one meeting and action shall be taken at a subsequent Commission meeting. The bylaws will be endorsed by a resolution of the City Council.

U. Procedure Manual:

The policy and procedure manual will be endorsed by resolution of the City Council and may be amended at any meeting of the Commission by a majority plus one of the members, provided that notice of said proposed amendment is given to each member in writing. Proposed amendments to the procedure manual shall be introduced at one meeting and action shall be taken at a subsequent Commission meeting.

At the November 6, 2013 meeting, the Planning Commission directed staff to bring forth amendments to the HAPC Bylaws and Policies and Procedures Manual. The changes to the documents are listed below. Final action on these amendments will be at the January 2nd meeting. Amendments must be presented in writing at one meeting, and may be acted upon at the next meeting. This meeting is the first where the proposed amendments are provided in writing. A separate staff report will introduce an accompanying ordinance at the January 2nd meeting to provide needed code amendments to Title 21 and Title 1.

1. Remove the majority plus one vote needed for Conditional Use Permits and Variances.

a. From HAPC Bylaws, pg 4, Section K. Quorum; Voting:

"Four Commission members shall constitute a quorum. Four affirmative votes are required for the passage of a an ordinance, resolution or motion. Conditional use permits and zoning variances require a majority plus one vote. Voting will be by verbal vote, the order to be rotated. The final vote on each resolution or motion is a recorded roll call vote or may be done in accordance with J. Consensus. For purposes of notification to parties of interest in a matter brought before the Commission, the Chair may enter for the record the vote and basis for determination."

From the HAPC Policies and Procedures Manual:

- b. Page 4 of 8, Conditional Use Permits, delete text stating "Approval of a conditional use permit requires five yes votes."
- c. Page 8 of 8, Variances, delete text stating "Approval of a variance requires five yes votes."
- 2. Amend the number of times a Commissioner may miss meetings from three consecutive or six regular meetings in a calendar year; to three consecutive unexcused absences, with the Chair approving absences or six regular meetings in a calendar year.
 - a. From HAPC Bylaws, pg 5, Section O. Vacancies:

This memo contains the planning staff review of the zoning code amendment as required by HCC 21.95.040.

21.95.040 Planning Department review of code amendment. The Planning Department shall evaluate each amendment to this title that is initiated in accordance with HCC 21.95.010 and qualified under HCC 21.95.030, and may recommend approval of the amendment only if it finds that the amendment:

<u>a</u>. Is consistent with the comprehensive plan and will further specific goals and objectives of the plan.

Discussion: Comprehensive Plan Chapter 4 Goal 3 Object A states: "Create a clear, coordinated regulatory framework that guides development." One of the implementation strategies states: "Provide a clear and predictable approval process for every development including organizing project review and permitting and providing appropriate staff review."

This proposed amendment will allow a decision on a conditional use permit at any meeting with a quorum of Homer Advisory Commission members. This will give applicants greater certainty as to when their application will be heard by the Commission, and a decision rendered.

Staff response: This amendment is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan.

b. Will be reasonable to implement and enforce.

Staff response: This code amendment will be reasonable to implement and enforce. The amendment relaxes a more stringent code requirement.

c. Will promote the present and future public health, safety and welfare.

Staff response: A vote of four Commissioners will still be required to approve a conditional use permit, thus protecting the present and future public health, safety and welfare.

d. Is consistent with the intent and wording of the other provisions of this title.

Staff response: This amendment is consistent with the intent and wording of other provisions of this title. Within Homer City Code, only Conditional Use Permits require a vote of a supermajority, or five Commissioners. All other business, such as variances, nonconforming reviews, conditional fence permits, public signs and Bridge Creek Watershed mitigation plans only require four affirmative votes for approval. The amendments have been reviewed by the City Attorney and are deemed consistent with the intent and wording of the other provision of this title.

21.95.030 Restriction on repeating failed amendment proposals.

A. Staff Report PL 13-86 Review of Bylaws

Acting City Planner Engebretsen briefly reviewed the staff report and noted discussion during the worksession about the Commissioner absences as outlined in the bylaws, and also changing the voting requirements to a simple majority regarding CUP's and variances. She noted that staff doesn't have a recommendation at this time regarding the simple majority issue.

Commissioner Highland expressed interest in Commissioners being allowed to participate telephonically. She understands that it couldn't be done for the quasi-judicial actions of the meeting, but for the other parts it would be helpful when people are ill or travelling.

Acting City Planner Engebretsen noted that because of the actions the Commission addresses, it would significantly limit what the person on the phone could speak to. She also explained her experience has been that some people do well at participating telephonically but many don't.

SONNEBORN/HIGHLAND MOVED TO AMEND BYLAWS TO ENABLE A SIMPLE MAJORITY TO APPROVE A CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT OR VARIANCE.

Commissioner Slone noted that during the worksession they discussed and agreed that because staff clearly does a more than adequate job of reviewing criteria for CUP and variances to verify compliance with the ordinances. Generally very little discussion necessary by the Commissioners and four would be adequate from his perspective.

VOTE: NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

HIGHLAND/SLONE MOVED TO ALLOW TELEPHONIC PARTICIPATION EXCEPT FOR PARTICIPATION ON ANY QUASI JUDICIAL MATTERS.

Commissioner Sonneborn commented she isn't sure they need that complication in their meetings. By addressing the voting, they won't have the problem of not enough Commissioners in the future. She thinks it is really important to be here in person. There are times when it is challenging to follow things when you're here in person, and being home with distractions she wouldn't trust that the group is getting full attention. It's only a couple times a month and people just need to plan to be here. If people are ill, their minds aren't up to it, so they should be home taking care of themselves. It is okay to miss a meeting sometimes.

HOMER ADVISORY PLANNING COMMISSION REGULAR MEETING MINUTES NOVEMBER 6, 2013

Chair Venuti agreed with Ms. Sonneborn, but said it would be nice to call in and listen. Deputy City Clerk Jacobsen noted that if a Commissioner is absent and would like to hear the discussion, they can request a copy of the recording from the City Clerk's office.

Commissioner Highland reiterated that it is another possibility for Commissioners to participate if they have already missed some meetings.

Motion failed.

SLONE/HIGHLAND MOVED TO AMEND CITY CODE 1.76.040 C ANY COMMISSIONER WHO SHALL HAVE TWO THREE SUCCESSIVE UNEXCUSED ABSENCES SHALL BE SUBJECT TO REMOVAL BY THE COMMISSION BY A MAJORITY VOTE OF THE MEMBERS PRESENT; BYLAWS SECTION 0.5, THREE CONSECUTIVE UNEXCUSED OR SIX REGULAR MEETINGS IN A CALENDAR YEAR; AND REFINE THE WORD UNEXCUSED TO DEFINE THAT UNEXCUSED REQUIRES APPROVAL BY THE CHAIR.

Commissioner Slone explained that it gives a little more flexibility for extenuating circumstances they might miss more than three meetings, but requires them to be accountable for their time if the situation arises.

VOTE: NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT

Motion carried.

Commissioner Slone also noted a section of the policy manual that needs clarification under item U. It states "The policy and procedure manual will be endorsed by resolution of the City Council and may be amended at any meeting of the Commission by a majority plus one of the members,". He suggested changing it to "The amended policy and procedure manual must subsequently be endorsed by a resolution of the City Council." Acting City Planner Engebretsen recognized it as a grammatical change that staff can take care of.

Staff Report PL 13-87 Draft Ordinance 13-42 Amending the Definition of "Discontinued" in Homer City Code 21.61.015, Definitions, to Extend Time Required to Discontinue a Nonconforming Uses from 12 to 24 Months

Chair Venuti advised the Commission that he has a conflict of interest on this matter because he is involved with the Bayview Inn property.

There was discussion that with only 3 Commissioners in attendance to address the conflict it was recommended that this matter be postponed to the next meeting.

SLONE/SONNEBORN MOVED TO POSTPONE TO THE NEXT MEETING.

There was brief discussion.

A. Staff Report PL 14-02, Draft Ordinance 14-XX Amending HCC 21.71.050(d) to allow a simple majority vote for approval of Conditional Use Permits

City Planner Abboud reviewed the staff report.

Chair Venuti opened the public hearing and there were no public comments.

HOMER ADVISORY PLANNING COMMISSION REGULAR MEETING MINUTES JANUARY 2, 2014

Ken Castner, city resident, asked for clarification regarding the process for water and sewer hookups relating to the accessory dwellings. City Planner Abboud explained that the accessory dwelling would be hooked up to water and sewer as required by Public Works and as outlined in code.

BOS/HIGHLAND MOVED THAT THE PLANNING COMMISSION APPROVES THE DRAFT ORDINANCE AMENDING HOMER CITY CODE 21.12.020 AND 21.12.030 TO ALLOW AN ACCESSORY DWELLING UNIT AS A PERMITTED USE AND RECOMMENDS ADOPTION BY CITY COUNCIL.

Commissioner Slone commented that it brings up a good point whether the accessory dwelling will be put on a separate meter. It would be a significant consideration with respect to the income the city derives of the water and sewer system. It isn't a major consideration relating to this action, but is something to think about. Another point is that we are doing some infilling based on infrastructure and additional usage of water and sewer would be beneficial to the city.

Plat Consideration

A. Staff Report PL 14-05, Barnett's South Slope Subdivision Quiet Creek Park Preliminary Plat

City Planner Abboud reviewed the Commission's role in plat consideration and the staff report that includes the following recommendations:

- Planning Commission recommends approval of the preliminary plat, with the following comments:
- 1. Increase the size of lot 2 to meet the dimensional size requirement of 10,000 square feet. Elimination or reduction in size of Park A to meet this requirement is acceptable.
- 2. A development agreement is required.
- 3. The shared driveways shall meet fire department access requirements.
- 4. The developer shall clarify with Public Works prior to final platting which creeks shown on the plat have a drainage easement and the width of the easements.
- 5. Continue the 15 foot utility easement around the bulb of Sophie Court
- 6. Work with the City of Homer and the Kenai Peninsula Borough address officer on E911 compliant street names
- 7. During the first phase of construction, build Nelson Ave and Ronda Street from East End Road all the way to the intersection with South Slope Drive, and that portion of South Slope Drive within the subdivision.
- 8. Construct fire hydrants as part of the subdivision.
- 9. Dedicate the area shown as Park "A" as future right of way providing access to the south of the subdivision.
- 10. A fire department accessible shared driveway provides reasonable access to lot 8, and Tract A, AA Mattox Sub 1958 Addn, in lieu of a full right of way dedication to these lots.

Chair Venuti asked Commissioners who visited the site prior to the meeting to report to the Commission.
