1. Introduction and Summary.

This responds to your request for information regarding what a charter commission is, and how it will affect the City. In short, a charter commission is a group of seven City voters that is elected to prepare a proposed home rule charter for the City. The City's voters may petition for the election of a charter commission. The charter that the commission develops is submitted to the City's voters, and becomes effective upon voter approval. Upon adoption of a home rule charter by the City's voters, the City would cease to be a first class, general law city, and would become a home rule city governed by the charter. Adopting a home rule charter would have the following effects on the City. First, the structure of the City government would be determined by the charter rather than by statute. Second, the charter, rather than statute, would govern the scope of the City's general powers. Third, becoming a home rule city would allow the City to adopt a sales tax structure different than that of the Kenai Peninsula Borough without the consent of the Borough Assembly.

2. A Charter's Effect on the City.

A. In General.

The Alaska Constitution and statutes provide for two general categories of cities. A home rule city is a city that has adopted a home rule charter. A general law city is a city that has no charter. All cities have powers conferred by law (i.e., state statute). In addition, home rule cities have powers conferred by home rule charter and may exercise all powers not prohibited by law or by charter.

There is little practical distinction between the general powers that are granted to home rule and general law cities. While the Alaska Constitution provides that home rule cities may exercise all powers not prohibited by law or charter, statutes grant powers to general law cities in similar broad terms. All cities "may exercise any power not otherwise prohibited by law." A liberal construction is to be given to the powers of all cities. The courts use the same test to determine whether a city's exercise of a power is "prohibited by law" without regard to whether it is a home rule or general law city: "The prohibition must be either by express terms or by implication such as where the statute and ordinance are so substantially irreconcilable that one cannot be given its substantive effect if the other is to be accorded the weight of law."

B. A Charter Could Determine the Structure of the City Government.

Title 29 of the Alaska Statutes governs the powers and functions of municipalities. Only certain provisions of Title 29 apply to home rule cities as a prohibition against acting otherwise. Most of the important provisions of Title 29 that do not apply to a home rule city concern the internal structure of city government. Thus, through a home rule charter the City's voters could determine such matters as the number of council members, the number of votes by which the council may act (either generally or on specific subjects), when and whether the mayor may vote on matters before the council, and the scope of the mayor's veto power.

C. A Charter Could Restrict the Exercise of the City's General Powers.

In addition to the restrictions in state statute on the exercise of powers by a first class city, the City's voters could impose other restrictions on the exercise of the City's powers in a home rule charter. Unlike an ordinance that restricted the exercise of a power by the City, which could be overturned by the subsequent enactment of another ordinance by the Council, 13 restrictions in a home rule charter could be changed or eliminated only with voter approval. Examples that frequently appear in other municipalities' home rule charters include requirements of voter approval to dispose of city property, a limitation on the hours during which the council may meet, and a limitation on city indebtedness to a specified percentage of assessed valuation.

D. A Charter Would Allow the City to Adopt Its Own Sales Tax Structure.

Most statutes affecting the relationship of the City to the Kenai Peninsula Borough still would apply to the City if it were a home rule city. One significant exception to this general rule concerns the autonomy of the City's sales tax structure. A general law city within the Borough must uniformly tax the same sources as the Borough, and allow only the same exemptions as the Borough, unless the Borough Assembly by ordinance authorizes the city to levy and collect its sales tax on other sources. However, the statute that requires that the sales tax levied by a city within a borough must conform to the structure of the borough's sales tax is not made applicable to home rule municipalities, and therefore does not act as a prohibition on a home rule municipality acting other than as the statute provides. 15

3. The Role of a Charter Commission in the Adoption of a Charter.

A proposed home rule charter is prepared by a charter commission of seven elected members.¹⁶ The Clerk has certified an application for a petition for a charter commission election and will issue a petition to its sponsors. The petition requirements are similar to those for an initiative or referendum petition.¹⁷ When the Clerk receives the completed petition she delivers it to the Council with a report of the number of valid signatures that she has determined to be on the petition.¹⁸

If the petition has sufficient valid signatures, the Council fixes a date for the submission of nominations of charter commission candidates. A candidate for a charter commission shall have been qualified to vote in the City for at least one year

immediately preceding the charter commission election.²⁰ There are no other qualifications or limitations on eligibility to be elected to a charter commission. A charter commission candidate is nominated by a petition signed by at least 50 voters or the number of voters equal to ten percent of the number of votes cast in the City during the last regular election, whichever is less.²¹ Since more than 500 votes were cast at the October 1, 2013, regular City election, each charter commission candidate must be nominated by at least 50 voters. If at least seven nominations for qualified charter commission candidates are not filed, the petition or resolution calling for a charter commission is void and an election on the question may not be held.²²

The statutes do not prescribe when a charter commission election shall be held. However, the Council may choose to be guided by the provisions for scheduling an initiative or referendum election. An initiative or referendum is submitted to the voters at any of the following occurring at least 60 days after certification of the petition: (i) the next regular election; (ii) a previously scheduled special election; or (iii) a special election scheduled by ordinance if the Council determines it to be in the best interest of the City and no other election will occur within 75 days after certification of the petition. At the charter commission election the voters shall consider the question "Shall a charter commission be elected to prepare a proposed charter?" and shall elect the members of the commission. If the question is approved, the seven candidates receiving the highest number of votes immediately organize as a charter commission.

Within one year after its election, the charter commission shall prepare a proposed home rule charter for the City. The commission shall give published notice of and hold at least one public hearing on the proposed charter. The proposed charter shall be signed by a majority of the members of the commission and filed in the office of the Clerk. Within 15 days, the Clerk shall publish the proposed charter and make copies available. The proposed home rule charter is submitted to the voters at an election held not less than 30 days or more than 90 days after the proposed charter is published. If a majority of those voting favor the proposed charter, the proposed

charter becomes the organic law of the City effective on the date the election is certified.³¹

If the proposed charter is rejected, the charter commission shall prepare another proposed charter to be submitted to the voters at an election to be held within one year after the date of the first charter election.³² If the second proposed charter is also rejected, the charter commission shall be dissolved and the question of adoption of a charter shall be treated as if it had never been proposed or approved.³³

I previously have described the process by which the City would adopt a home rule charter, and some of the consequences of doing so. The purpose of this memorandum is to provide a more general discussion of the effect on the City of adopting a home rule charter.

The home rule option first appeared in the Alaska Constitution—there were no home rule cities in Alaska before statehood. The Alaska Constitution and statutes now provide for two general categories of cities. A home rule city is a city that has adopted a home rule charter.¹ A general law city is a city that has no charter.²

The starting point for describing the effect of adopting a home rule charter is Article 10, §11 of the Alaska Constitution, which provides:

A home rule borough or city may exercise all legislative powers not prohibited by law or charter.

The constitution was intended to grant broad power to home rule municipalities:

The authors of this provision hoped that its simple language and sweeping grant of power would enable home rule municipalities to meet a multitude of legislative needs without depending on specific grants of power from a state legislature.³

However, the evolution since statehood of Title 29 of the Alaska Statutes, which provides for municipal government, has blurred part of the distinction between home rule and general law cities. While the Alaska Constitution provides that home rule municipalities may exercise all

powers not prohibited by law or charter, Title 29 also provides that all cities—whether home rule or general law—may "exercise any power not otherwise prohibited by law." 4

With this introduction, I will examine the two-part constitutional limitation on the powers of home rule cities: (i) prohibition by law, and (ii) prohibition by charter, emphasizing the remaining distinctions between home rule and general law cities.

Prohibition "by law" means prohibition by statute enacted by the legislature.⁵ The courts use the same test to determine whether a home rule or general law city's exercise of a power is prohibited by law: "The prohibition must be either by express terms or by implication such as where the statute and [city] ordinance are so substantially irreconcilable that one cannot be given its substantive effect if the other is to be accorded the weight of law."⁶

Title 29 continues to distinguish between home rule and general law cities in expressly prohibiting the exercise of powers. All prescriptions in Title 29 of the manner in which municipal governments must act are express prohibitions on general law municipalities acting otherwise. In contrast, only those provisions of Title 29 that are identified in AS 29.10.200 "apply to home rule municipalities as prohibitions on acting otherwise than as provided."

An example of prohibition by implication is that state statutes of limitations impliedly prohibit a home city from requiring written notice within 120 days after an injury to allow the injured person to bring a lawsuit against the city.⁸

Prohibition "by charter" means that the City's home rule charter itself could prohibit the City from exercising certain powers. Once included in a home rule charter, such a prohibition could be changed only by a charter amendment, which requires voter approval. Examples that frequently appear in other municipalities' home rule charters include requirements of voter approval to dispose of city property, a limitation on the hours during which the council may meet, and a limitation on city indebtedness to a specified percentage of assessed valuation. In contrast, the Council may not limit the legislative power of future councils by enacting ordinances that include restrictions on their future amendment or repeal: "One council may not

Mr. Carroll presented a shallow draft vessel that hauls out easily on the air bags, but a deeper draft vessel falls over on the air bags. The solution is a cradle to keep the deeper draft boats upright. The air bags and cradle afford the opportunity of handling two

styles of boats. The visual picture Mr. Carroll presented was meant to help the Council

understand the final report of the Vessel Haul-Out Task Force to be presented soon by

Councilmembers Howard and Lewis.

Memorandum 14-111 from City Manager and Police Chief as backup.

Mayor Wythe called for a motion for the adoption of Ordinance 14-36 for introduction and first reading by reading of title only.

BURGESS/ROBERTS – SO MOVED.

Councilmember Burgess acknowledged the need to clear out brush and open trails along the library for safety measures, but pointed out \$35,000 is too much to do the job.

BURGESS/ROBERTS - MOVED TO AMEND ALL REFERENCES OF \$35,000 TO READ \$16,000.

BURGESS/ROBERTS - MOVED TO AMEND THE AMENDMENT TO READ UP TO \$16,000.

Councilmember Burgess commented that including the amount informs potential bidders how to bid. He has walked the plots. His own land company does this type of work and unless there is padding to do design work, the figure is high.

Councilmember Howard expressed confidence with staff's recommendations which have proven to be fiscally conservative.

City Manager Wrede reported Public Works Director Meyer talked to contractors to come up with the number. Although there is some urgency to do the library trail before fall, we could go out to bid and then come back to Council for the award.

Public Works Director Meyer reported we don't do a lot of land clearing of city property and he is not an expert on what it will cost. If a project exceeds \$25,000 the contractor is obligated to pay Davis-Bacon wages. The project will be a competitive bid process and he can support a reduction. The price was put together earlier when we wanted to do it in the summer time.

Since then we have talked about doing it in the winter. The Corps of Engineers supports that also. We will get a better price if the contractor does the work after the peak of construction season. We can put it out to bid in August and give the contractor until Thanksgiving to complete the work.

Council discussed the safety needs for the library. The Police Chief has expressed concern about the other side of Town Center and there was clearing done on Poopdeck. Council suggested putting it out to bid to find where the bids are.

BURGESS/ROBERTS - MOVED TO WITHDRAW THE MOTION TO AMEND.

There was no discussion.

VOTE: YES. NON OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

LEWIS/BURGESS - MOVED TO DELETE ALL REFERENCES TO \$35,000.

City Manager Wrede advised we could put the project out to bid and address the work areas separately if needed.

VOTE: (amendment) YES. HOWARD, ZAK

VOTE: NO. VAN DYKE, LEWIS, ROBERTS, BURGESS

Motion failed.

Options are to amend the amount to \$25,000 or vote the ordinance down and have Administration move forward with the bid process.

Bids could be split for the Library and Town Center project.

BURGESS/LEWIS – MOVED TO AMEND \$35,000 TO READ \$25,000 EVERYWHERE IN THE ORDINANCE AND ADD A LINE WHERE APPROPRIATE TO SAY WE AUTHORIZE AND ENCOURAGE PUBLIC WORKS TO BID THE TWO PROJECTS SEPARATELY IF THEY SO DESIRE.

ROBERTS/BURGESS - MOVED TO AMEND THE AMENDMENT TO SAY "UP TO \$25,000".

There was no discussion.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

A. City Manager's Report

1. Kachemak City Sewer: Mayor Morris has provided a new proposal for addressing the Kachemak City sewer charges dispute. Phil's idea is basically a hybrid system which combines elements of various approaches which have received support. Essentially, Phil's proposal is that customers in Kachemak City would have a choice of either continuing to pay the fee at the assumed average gallonage of 3,500 gallons or, they could install a water meter to measure the amount of water that goes into the house and pay by the gallon. If they choose that option, they would have to pay a service charge for the meter and its maintenance and would need to become a direct customer of the City of Homer. The Mayor likes this idea because it becomes an economic decision for the customer rather than a political one. Carey, Dan Gardner, and I went to Kachemak City to discuss this with the Mayor last week. Dan brought up some practical problems with meters which we discussed in some detail. Everyone in the room agreed once again that the easiest way to resolve this is to reduce the assumed gallonage because the administrative headaches associated with meters seems to outweigh the benefits. The Mayor also mentioned that the Kachemak City Council remains interested in a committee which has two members from both Councils. They have already picked their two members. Please let me know if you wish to talk about this in more detail. In the meantime, Tom and I are working on a new contract.

- 2. <u>Hoka Hey</u>: Hoka Hey is returning to Homer this summer. A headquarters will be established the week of July 28 and riders are expected to start arriving shortly thereafter. The organizers have been coordinating with the City, especially HPD, the Port and Harbor, and the City Manager's office. The City is renting the Old Alaska Ferry Service Building to the organization for two weeks. A Special Events Permit is being reviewed as this report was being drafted for a main event at the Down East Saloon.
- 3. Ocean Drive Paving and Striping: Community discussion is starting to ramp up a little regarding ADOT/PF's plans for Ocean Drive. As you know, ADOT/PF is planning to repave the Sterling Highway from its intersection with Pioneer Ave. to the end of the Spit. Part of the paving job includes striping and signage related biker and pedestrian safety. Some of this work is part of the MOU between the City and DOT/PF whereby the City assumes responsibility for managing speeds, parking, pedestrian safety, and signage in the business area at the end of the Spit. On Ocean Drive, DOT/PF is planning to restripe the road so that instead of one large bike lane on one side of the road, there is a six foot bike lane on both sides of the road. DOT/PF planners thought this was a good idea because having bike lanes on both sides of the road makes it easier to make the transition from the bike lane on the causeway to the bike lane on the Spit, which are on opposite sides of the road. Also, some local bikers have indicated that they like the idea of lanes on both sides of the road because they can travel with the traffic and not run into bikers going in the opposite direction. The City provided comments in favor of this idea. However, the wide bike lane that currently exists is popular and there are people in the community who fought hard to get it established. It was a big victory and major improvement. The wider bike lane improves safety and it is used by many including people pushing baby strollers. You may hear more about this in the future. In the meantime, the City will look for solutions that might address everyone's concerns. Narrowing the driving lanes to 10 feet and putting 8 foot lanes on either side is one idea that Carey mentioned yesterday. This would slow traffic and improve pedestrian safety even more. DOT/PF is proposing exactly that for Pioneer Ave. and for the End of the Spit.
- 4. <u>Joint Work Session / Planning Commission and Council</u>: In the past, the Council has indicated that it would like to have a joint workshop with the Planning Commission at least once a year. It has been a long time since we did that. The idea is to communicate about issues of common concern and discuss planning policy matters that affect the future of the City. There are several issues that come to mind right now that are crying out for discussion. One is whether and to what degree to regulate communication towers. This is a very complicated issue and the planning staff and Planning Commission could spend a huge amount of time and resources on it. Even if an ordinance were drafted and adopted, the City does not have the resources or the expertise to implement and enforce it. We don't have a building inspector which would be very helpful. All of this does not make much sense if it turns out that the Council and the Community at large is really not interested in regulating towers, which are popping up around town faster than

dandelions. This is one example of the type of discussion that could be useful. Let me know if you would like to schedule a workshop. I will ask Rick to come up with an agenda.

City Manager Wrede reported he attended two meetings last week with groups talking about trails and restoration projects. The Woodard Creek Coalition and the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission are talking about restoring and daylighting Woodard Creek. Homer Council on the Arts is about to build a new building as the old one had water damage. Pratt Museum is interested in Woodard Creek too. The City replaced two culverts with bridges. Mr. Wrede wrote a letter of support to the National Park Service to say the City is interested in broad planning for the entire watershed. Upper parts of the watershed are in Karen Hornaday Park.

He met with the Friends of the Library and Kachemak Heritage Land Trust. They are working with the Forestry Service on trails and signage on their land, to do something in conjunction with the Friends.

The DOT plans for specifics on a pedestrian/bike lane and crosswalks on Ocean Drive was presented for Council review.

Mayor Wythe called for a recess at 7:04 p.m. and reconvened the meeting at 7:11 p.m.

Council recommended one pedestrian/bike lane instead of one on each side of Ocean Drive and that the crosswalks remain where they are.

A Worksession with the Planning Commission will be scheduled between October 21 and 31. The Clerk will send out a poll to provide the best date. A resolution will be forthcoming at the August 11th meeting for the Worksession.

City Manager Wrede hopes Ordinance 14-32 might be reconsidered. The Planning Commission is advisory to the Council and many things the Planning Commission does may be appealed to the Board of Adjustment. Platting authority still rests with the Borough. The focus of Ordinance 14-32 was to eliminate the inconsistency with the Borough code that the City Council would have the ability to reject plats.

Council discussed the Kachemak City sewer rates and Mayor Morris' suggestion of meters for Kachemak City sewer customers. Residents would buy a meter if they wished and pay rates based on usage, or pay the flat 3,500 gallon fee. It was suggested the City's sewer-only customers be provided with the same option of individual meters. City Manager Wrede will bring forth a resolution amending the fee schedule by the August 25th council meeting. The sewer contract with Kachemak City will be forthcoming at the August 11th meeting.

Mayor Wythe passed the gavel to Mayor Pro Tempore Roberts during the gas distribution system discussion.

City Manager Wrede reported the construction crews are ahead of schedule; they only have 4 miles left of distributions to install out of 74 miles. Most of it is on Kachemak Drive. Crews are working there now. They were delayed due to obtaining necessary easements from 18 property owners. The DOT has no right-of-way for parts of the road. It will take three to four more weeks to finish installation, then cleanups and restoration work are needed. The two construction companies, UTI and Clark Management did a tremendous job. We anticipated the worst going in, but very little of that happened. It was a major project that took a lot of cooperation. City Manager Wrede is cautiously optimistic we may come in at budget or under. The total project was not to exceed \$12,160,000. At the end of June costs are at \$10.6M. Costs will come in through the end of August. Once all project costs are in we will calculate final costs and will make sure who was served and who was not. The number of lots served is still a moving target, with Council exempting some. For a variety of reasons 17,000 ft. of line was not built. The contractors found a better way to service customers. This means there are less properties being assessed, but we spent less money in construction.

City Manager Wrede advised the free main allowance will come back to the City as soon as the final assessment roll is completed. The City will get rebates from Enstar for all those that hook up. The Council has talked about a number of ways to use the money, including reducing assessments further. By September we should have final project costs and recognize which properties are served. The Council will need to make a decision on condominium assessments by August 25. We will make it very public and let people know if they object to assessments the time to file an objection is when the final assessment roll is out there. The final assessment roll will be introduced in January. There will be an objection period and final assessments will be mailed in March. There is enough work to do in that period to make sure the software runs properly. Deputy City Planner Julie Engebretsen said

for subdivisions we may not have the final approval from the Borough until the end of December. We will still get the assessments out in the first quarter of 2015.

Council commented on the condo owners' assessments as a complex issue that requires legal counsel. The Castner vs. City of Homer ruling may not be definitive for all condo owners. Council will need to make a decision on the method of assessments to direct city staff on how to proceed.

City Attorney Klinkner advised the Enstar tariff under which free main allowance is paid goes back to the developer. The City is the administrator of the gas improvement. As free main allowance payments come in they may be held in a separate fund to pay the City's obligation for construction costs. It is up to the Council to determine what the money is to be used for. City Manager Wrede was asked to prepare a memo to list the pros and cons of each method.

Mayor Pro Tempore Roberts returned the gavel to Mayor Wythe.

The continuing conversation is the need to maintain public access to the HERC building for different purposes. Council has allocated money to provide minimal fire code requirements, but not for public health and safety. For the August 11th meeting she will sponsor a resolution identifying an alternate location for a community center in the Town Center where we had proposed building City Hall. This will be pending the PARC Needs Assessment and the community voting for financial support. She is asking for a good faith gesture from the City Council to say they are in support of doing something if the community is supportive of providing and finding finances to make it happen.

The public safety building has the community's awareness and Mayor Wythe is providing legislative outreach to the Governor and representatives on the Kenai Peninsula Borough. She is updating them on the progress, including the 35% plan that will be presented later in September. The public safety building has been the #1 item on the CIP and the City has followed through on its commitment. She encouraged Council to come to the meeting on Thursday to listen in. The GC/CM will be telephonic and has a person specifically dedicated to public outreach.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Councilmembers Howard and Lewis had no comment.

Councilmember Van Dyke congratulated the Library on serving the one millionth visitor.

Councilmember Roberts congratulated the people appointed to commissions. She is glad to appoint Savannah Bradley, a young person in the community. She is glad to see young people serving. A lot of people didn't hear about North to the Future, but the eight pages are very impressive. She thanked Taz Tally and Jim Lavrakas for their work on the project. Councilmember Zak dittoed Councilmember Roberts' remarks on North to the Future. While reading it he sees the wonderful things that make Homer what it is, the marine trades, tourism, and quality of life. There are lots of people here in the summer. North to the Future will be a good way to communicate to our Legislators. Homer's future is bright and we are all optimistic. There has been an increase in tourism to Alaska overall. He thanked the Council for supporting the Fishing Hole with the dredging and stocking. The word is out the silvers are back in the lagoon; that has a great impact on the economy. There are many good things happening on the City Council.

Councilmember Burgess commented there is a real legitimate need to update the public safety infrastructure and now is the time to move on it. One concern he has heard is, "Why are we going to spend \$15M to \$17M on a new building?" The more proactive we are the less municipal money we have to spend as we anticipate leveraging State or Federal funds. It is a good summer and someone wrote us a letter to tell us we did something well.¹

SUBJECT: Thermal Imaging Camera (TIC)

Our oldest of two thermal imaging cameras (TICs) has malfunctioned. We returned it to the manufacturer for repair and have been advised that due to its age, replacement parts are no longer available, thus the unit was unrepairable. While we still have one working TIC I believe it is important for us to have two units immediately available in cases of fire, one for each crew making entry into the structure.

Thermal imaging cameras enable crews to "see" in the dark, smoky environment always present at a fire, especially at night. Crews, equipped with TICs are more quickly able to locate victims trapped by fire, and allow rescue crews to more quickly exit the hazard zone by being able to see the most advantageous egress route. TICs operate by using the infrared spectrum of light and projecting that image on the hand held camera. The camera differentiates between items that reflect and absorb heat at different rates. In addition to being a tool for search and rescue, in any low light condition (TICs are routinely used for searches at night to locate victims outdoors), TICs can be used to determine fluid levels in exterior fuel tanks such as propane and fuel oil, and hidden fire in walls, floors, and ceilings, thus reducing the amount and extent of damage necessary to locate and extinguish residual "hot spots".

The manufacturer of the TIC, Bullard, is currently offering a trade in credit for the old camera, even though it isn't working, of \$500. I would request that \$10,000 be budgeted from Fire Department Reserves for the replacement to enable us to also purchase an additional spare battery pack for the unit.

Ordinance 14-32 entitled "AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF HOMER, ALASKA, AMENDING HOMER CITY CODE 2.72.030 (b) REGARDING THE DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE HOMER ADVISORY PLANNING COMMISSION RELATED TO SUBDIVISIONS, AND AMENDING HOMER CITY CODE 2.72.060 REGARDING THE COMMISSIONS'S MEETING SCHEDULE AND DELETING THE REQUIREMENT TO PROVIDE RECORDS OF COMMISSION ACTION TO THE COUNCIL", failed upon introduction at the regular Council meeting on July 28, 2014. The primary objection to this ordinance seemed to be the deletion of the requirement that the Council be notified of Commission decisions or findings at the earliest possible date. It was noted that the Planning Commission is advisory to the Council and the Council should be aware of its actions and decisions.

At the meeting I suggested that a reconsideration of the vote on Ordinance 14-32 might be appropriate because the ordinance could easily be amended to address the specific concerns voiced by the Council. Voting the Ordinance down threw out the primary objective of the Ordinance which was to make HCC 2.72.030 (b) consistent with the Borough Code with respect to Planning Commission duties and powers, and remove the clause which says Planning Commission recommendations to the Borough on Plats can be forwarded after 20 days if the Council does not disapprove of the recommendation. Ordinance 14-32 was brought to you for two reasons. First, The City Attorney thought it was important to remove inconsistency between the City and Borough Codes in order to avoid confusion and potential legal actions. Second, I was under the impression (perhaps incorrectly), that the Council did not want to hear appeals of Planning Commission recommendations to the Borough on platting matters. The Borough has not delegated platting powers to the City. Therefore, the Planning Commission in this case is advisory to the Borough, who is the final authority. The

appeal of Planning Commission recommendations on the proposed Quiet Creek Subdivision Preliminary Plat brought this issue to the forefront.

The Council suggested that rather than reconsidering Ordinance 14-32, it would be better if I simply came back with a different ordinance. The packet for this meeting contains Ordinance 14-41 which addresses the concerns expressed by the Council. Specifically, it states that Planning Commission minutes should be placed in the Council packet at the first meeting after they are prepared. This requirement should serve to keep the Council up to speed on Commission decisions, findings and actions. The ordinance keeps the language contained in Ordinance 14-32 which clarifies the duties of the Commission with respect to subdivisions and plats in order to make it consistent with the Borough Code. The ordinance also deletes the provision that says Commission recommendations on plats are forwarded to the Borough after 20 days if the Council does not disapprove.

Several complex issues have presented themselves to the Planning Department. Due to the nature of the items and the amount of resources that may be used in preparing amendments to Title 21 of the Homer City Zoning Code, the City Manager and myself thought that it would be prudent to get an impression from the City Council of just how receptive the City may be to the proposed issues and possible solutions.

While a great deal of background material is available, I will make short reference to the issues with the idea to present more comprehensive information at a joint work session.

- 1. Tower regulation
- 2. Permit requirements

Both of the subject's breech the concepts of just how much regulation is the city willing to support and enforce. Towers are a very complicated subject with some model ordinances spanning 30 pages or so. Permitting requirements is additionally complex in that, so far, Homer has not taken the route of creating a building department with an inspector. We are hoping that these subjects interest the Council and they may be able to meet with the Commission to provide input to degree of support they might have for possible scenarios presented in a joint works session.

Each year the Homer Public Library applies for the Alaska Public Library Assistance Grant, a matching grant funded by the State of Alaska. As in past years, we were awarded the grant. When we applied for the grant, the amount offered and requested was \$7,000. However, the State Library, which administers the grant, has reduced that amount to \$6,650 because not enough money was appropriated to fully fund the grants. In that case, each grant to qualifying libraries is reduced proportionally.

The Homer Public Library is obligated to match at the original amount of \$7,000. The funds are intended to be spent on books and library materials. Our current book budget meets the \$7,000 requirement.

I have revised the budget, as requested by the Alaska State Library. The agreement is ready to be approved and signed. It must be received by the State Library by September 1 in order to receive this year's award.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve Ordinance 14-33 accepting the Alaska Public Library Assistance Grant.

Dear Ann,

The total Public Library Assistance grant for FY2015 for the Homer Public Library will be \$6,650. Although the State Library has reduced the grant, your library may NOT reduce the amount of local match, \$7,000.

The reason that we will not be able to fund grant requests at \$7,000 is that the grant line in the State Library's budget has not been fully funded for some years. Since the money appropriated is not sufficient to fully fund the grants, regulations require that we: "reduce each grant proportionally."

In order to receive your grant check as soon as possible, please:

- Return the enclosed grant agreement and budget revision as soon as you can. Two different people (the librarian and the appropriate legal authority) must sign the grant agreement, since it is a legal document committing your library to certain obligations in return for receiving the public library assistance grant. Once we have your agreement and budget revision, we will start mailing out grant checks.
- Please review your original grant budget and revise that budget to show how you plan to spend the lower amount of the grant. For libraries without branches, show how you plan to spend \$6,650, rather than the \$7,000 you requested on the grant application. We have included a copy of the budget from your original grant application and a budget revision form. This budget revision form should be submitted with your grant agreement.
- As you fill out the budget revision form, please remember that the library MUST spend at least \$3,500 on the Collection (Library Materials). Of this \$3,500, each library may include UP TO a total of \$500 for Electronic Materials and Online Services. We have broadened the definition of Electronic Materials and Online Services to include: Internet Service Provider (ISP) fees, OCLC license fees, and database access or purchase fees.

The FY2015 Public Library Assistance grant year starts July 1, 2014. Librarians and officials should carefully note and follow the regulations governing the administration of this grant. To remain eligible for the grant, the library MUST:

- Submit by September 1, 2015 the following legally required reports for FY2015: Final Grant Report, Technology Report, and Annual Public Library Report.
- Spend at least \$3,500 on library materials and online services.
- Be open at least 10 hours per week for 48 weeks.
- Schedule some evening and weekend hours each week.
- Have trained paid or volunteer staff on duty in the library during all open hours.
- Combined school/public libraries must take special care to not use grant money or local funds used as matching money for school library purposes. This includes purchasing school-type library materials (books, magazines, etc.)

Each library director is required to attend at least 6 hours of continuing education during the current two year cycle, which includes FY2014 and FY2015 (July 2013 through June 2015). If you attended continuing education during FY2014, do be sure to record that training on your FY2014 public library annual report.

The State Library audits the records of selected libraries at the end of the grant year and reclaims any grant funds not properly accounted for. The Grantor will agree to:

- 1. Furnish funds in the amount of \$6,650.
- 2. Provide advisory services in furtherance of the grant project.

The Grantee will agree to:

- 1. Expend local funds of at least \$7,000 for project purposes. Funds may be expended only for public library purposes and must be clearly attributable to public library services and operations.
- 2. Provide at least the following services free to residents of the municipality or community:
 - Establish and maintain a collection of books and other materials for loan;
 - Provide access to interlibrary loans;
 - Provide reading or other educational programs for children; and
 - Provide reference information.
- 3. Abide by the conditions set forth in its application and approved by the Grantor, including:
 - The number and timing of open hours;
 - The existing and ongoing educational requirements for the library director.
- 4. Expend at least \$3,500 on library materials and online services for each outlet.
- 5. Have trained staff on duty in the library during the scheduled open hours.
- 6. Submit a Final Grant and Technology Report and Public Library Annual Report by September 1, 2015.
- 7. Maintain accurate records for auditing purposes.
- Return any grant funds unexpended or unencumbered by June 30, 2015, and all funds for which there is no proper accounting.
- 9. Repay any portion of grant funds that have not actually been matched by local funds over the course of the grant period.
- 10. Receive prior approval from the Grantor for any line item change that exceeds 10% of the line item, except that no prior approval is required for:
 - Line item changes of less than \$100; or
 - Line item changes that add funds to library materials and online services.

The source of funding for this agreement is as follows:

State Sources \$6,650

By accepting this award or agreement, the grantee may become subject to the audit requirements of State of Alaska Administrative code 2 AAC 45.010. As a result, the grantee may be required to provide for an audit and to permit independent auditors to have access to their records and financial statements. The grantee should consult with an independent auditor for assistance in determining audit requirements for each fiscal year.

Approval of Agenda

Chair Venuti called for a motion to approve the agenda.

HIGHLAND/ SLONE SO MOVED.

There was no discussion.

VOTE: NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT

Motion carried.

Public Comment

The public may speak to the Planning Commission regarding matters on the agenda that are not scheduled for public hearing or plat consideration. (3 minute time limit).

Merlin Cordes, city resident, commented on behalf of Faith Lutheran Church and read the letter that was included in the packets informational materials. The current sign for Faith Lutheran Church is in need of replacement and they would like to put up a new sign that includes a changeable copy area to advertise their community events. In accordance with HCC 21.95.010, they are asking that a Planning Commissioner initiate an amendment to HCC 21.60.060 table 3 to allow changeable copy signs and internally illuminated signs in the Gateway Business District.

Reconsideration

Adoption of Consent Agenda

All items on the consent agenda are considered routine and non-controversial by the Planning Commission and are approved in one motion. There will be no separate discussion of these items unless requested by a Planning Commissioner or someone from the public, in which case the item will be moved to the regular agenda and considered in normal sequence.

Chair Venuti called for a motion to approve the consent agenda.

There was no discussion.

HOMER ADVISORY PLANNING MMISSION REGULAR MEETING MINUTES APRIL 16, 2014

New Business

A. Staff Report PL 14-35, Discussion on moving a lot line in the Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District

Commissioner Stroozas left the table based on his earlier declaration in relation to being a property owner within 300 feet of the subject property.

Deputy City Planner Engebretsen noted that there is no formal action on this tonight; this is a conceptual check on whether the Commission agrees with moving property lines to match the watershed boundaries as we know them. The issue addressed here is how to address a lot with a portion that flows toward the watershed and a portion that flows away. The concept of shifting a lot line to follow the watershed boundary is an option to consider, or allow the portion of a lot that flows away considered as not part of the watershed. Either option will likely include a code amendment, but staff would like to have a conceptual conversation with the Commission as to what they think would be preferred.

David Treat explained he owns two lots in the watershed protection district that are relatively equal in size. The property line between the two lots is very close to the structures that were built on the lot that is out of the watershed. The survey showed a section of the land behind the lot that was just exempted that drains away from the watershed. He is interested in a future action to shift the lot line to encompass the portion that drains away from the watershed into this lot that was just exempted. It gives him a little more room between the structure and the property line, and allows for a clear line between what is and is not in the watershed.

The Commission discussed the situation and agreed that it would be appropriate to consider a code amendment to address circumstances where a portion of a lot flows toward and a portion that flows away from the watershed.

Deputy City Planner Engebretsen said staff will bring back some proposals for consideration.

The Commission continued discussion regarding the sign code in the GBD, and options for amending the code, which includes collecting signatures and request from a Planning Commissioner to institute

a change. Commissioner Erickson requested an ordinance change relating to changeable copy and internally illuminated signs in the district.

Commissioner Highland commented about a comment from the Boroughs review of the Quiet Creek Subdivision that Homer is supposed to have a storm water management plan to address those concerns about runoff transfer. She asked if that is what they have been discussing recently. Deputy City Planner Engebretsen suggested that it might not have been very clear in the testimony what the city has and when it applies. She believes there was some discussion about storm water requirements like in the CBD, which is different than city wide storm drainage, and also different from subdivision storm water regulations.

Comments of the Audience

Members of the audience may address the Commission on any subject. (3 minute time limit)

Joe Carter commented regarding the discussion replatting a lot line in the BCWPD, he thinks replatting between two common properties is a separate issue from any issue relating to the drainage. He believes if the lodging were provided, some folks from the NRCS would come out free of charge to go out with real time GPS and walk the 2100 acres of the BCWPD and map it on the ground. He talked about the current process of the LYDAR mapping and its inaccurateness. He will provide information he talked about in the worksession to staff for review.

Buck Jones, President of the Faith Lutheran Church Planning Board, commented that the GBD is very small and is one lot deep along the Sterling Highway, and changeable copy signs are only restricted in that area. He referenced other changeable copy signs in Homer, and said what they are asking is for the GBD to follow the rest of the sign code around town. He wouldn't want to see it limited to just churches or non-profits, due to the chance of starting a conflict.

Gary Syth, Pastor of Faith Lutheran Church, gave a brief example of their need for the changeable copy sign. This weekend the service times are changing for the Easter Service, but they don't have a way for the general public to know the times are changed. Sandwich boards are not allowed in the GBD either.

Comments of Staff

Deputy City Clerk Jacobsen reminded the Commission that the appropriate time for commissioners to declare their conflicts of interest is after the Chair announces the agenda item, and before the applicant begins their presentation.

Comments of the Commission

Commissioner Highland said she received a call from a member of the public expressing concern that the Dolphin Villa does not have running water, and also about the buses that are parked over by Two Sisters. Deputy City Planner Engebretsen said that in the future it is best to refer people with those type questions the Planning Department.

HOMER ADVISORY PLANNING MISSION REGULAR MEETING MINUTES APRIL 16, 2014

Commissioner Slone welcomed Shelly back to the Commission and advised that he will likely miss the next meeting.

Commissioner Erickson said she is glad to be back.

Commissioner Bos thought it was a good meeting with respectful conversation all the way around. He thanked staff for doing another marvelous job.

Commissioner Stead and Stroozas had no comment.

Chari Venuti commented about driving in to Soldotna and seeing all the signs, he would hate to see Homer get like that. There is a reason we have no changeable copy signs in various areas. It is a great idea the church should have a good sign out there, but he doesn't think it should be a changeable copy sign. He thinks they could do the same thing with portable signs they add to what they have. He said it was an interesting meeting and thanked everyone for their participation.

There being no further business to come before the Commission, the meeting adjourned at 8:36 p.m. The next regular meeting is scheduled for May 7, 2014 at 6:30 p.m. in the City Hall Cowles Council Chambers.

INTRODUCTION: The Faith Lutheran Church Planning Board submitted a letter, requesting a change to the sign code to allow internally lit, changeable copy signs in the Gateway Business District (GBD). At the meeting of April 16th, the Planning Commission reviewed the request, and initiated a code amendment per 21.95.010. This item is not currently scheduled for public hearing; this staff report is an introduction to the issue and for discussion purposes. A public hearing, with a complete draft ordinance, will be on the May 21st HAPC agenda.

When reviewing this staff report, a key question emerges: Will allowing changeable copy and/or internally lit signs provide an attractive gateway to residents and visitors as they enter Homer on the Sterling Highway?

BACKGROUND:

For years the church has used temporary signs such as banners to notify the public of upcoming events because permanent changeable copy signs are not allowed in the GBD. The church requests two amendments to Homer's Sign Code HCC 21.60.060, Table 3:

- 1. To allow changeable copy signs, and
- 2. To allow internally illuminated signs.

If both amendments are approved, a principal building in the GBD would be allowed one permanently mounted, internally lit, changeable copy sign. For the most part, the sign standards in the GBD are the same standards as in the other business districts with the exception of Table 3 (HCC 21.60.060). Table 3 does not allow changeable copy or illumination internal signs in the GBD.

ANALYSIS:

Changeable copy signs can be internal or externally lit. In Homer all changeable copy signs must be permanently mounted and the lettering can only change one time per day, with an exemption for time and temperate, HCC 21.60.040 Definitions:



""Changeable copy sign" means a sign that includes characters, letters, or illustrations that can be changed or rearranged without altering the face or the surface of the sign, and on which the message changes less often than one time per day; provided, that a changing electronic or mechanical indication of time or temperature does not cause a sign to be a changeable copy sign."

Internally lit also referred to as Illumination Internal signs: If the light source is not external; it's internal. Technology changes rapidly, so by today's standards internal light sources may include LED, Electronic Message Center, back lit and halo lighting. In general, internally lit signs are more legible because the light bulbs are better maintained and the light source can't be misdirected. Regardless of the district, Homer's Sign Code does not allow animated signs, HCC 21.60.080(e) Design, construction, and maintenance.

"Illumination, if used, shall not be animated. Light rays shall shine only upon the sign or upon the lot on which the sign is located, and no direct light or significant glare shall be cast onto any adjacent lot, street, or right-of-way."

Gateway Business District and Overlay District: The GBD runs west from the Homer Middle School along both sides of the Sterling Highway, south to Kachemak Bay, and ends just past the corner of West Hill Road and Carriage Court where Story Real Estate is located. Permitted uses include: retail, restaurants, hotels, financial institutions, churches, schools and entertainment establishments. The portion of parcels that front and are within 150 feet of the centerline of the Sterling Highway are within the narrow Scenic Gateway Corridor Overlay District (SGCOD). The SGCOD does not affect signage in the GBD because the SGCOD requires that signs comply with the sign code as it applies to the GBD.

Purpose of the GBD:

"The purpose of the Gateway Business District is primarily to promote mixed use development, with an emphasis on visitor-oriented business. Conflicts between residential and business uses are resolved in favor of business. Among the goals of the Gateway Business District regulations are the minimization of future traffic congestion along the Sterling Highway corridor, and preservation of the favorable experience residents and visitors have when entering Homer by way of the Sterling Highway."

Purpose of the SGCOD:

- a. The primary purpose of the Scenic Gateway Corridor Overlay District is to make additional provisions for preservation of scenic vistas, to enhance the compatibility of development and to minimize future traffic congestion and maintain safety along the Sterling Highway corridor.
- b. The Scenic Gateway Corridor Overlay District shall overlap and overlay existing zoning districts. The intent of this district is to have development that is sensitive to the "Gateway" of Homer and provide an additional layer of protection for the panoramic views of the Gateway while furthering the primary purposes of the district.

The 2010 Comprehensive Plan references the Gateway as a mixed use, "visitor-oriented area that should be developed in a manner that provides an attractive gateway to Homer." Ch 4. pg 5. This aligns with the Chapter 4 Land Use goals:

Goal 2: Maintain the quality of Homer's natural environment and scenic beauty." Ch 4, pg 4-1.

Goal 4: Support the development of a variety of well-defined commercial/business districts for a range of commercial purposes.

Illumination Internal Signs: Discuss how internally lit signs relates to the purpose of the GBD and the Comprehensive Plan. Some considerations are:

- Attractiveness, or not, between internally lit and externally lit signs.
- Legible: Research indicates the internally lit signs are more legible because the light is more evenly distributed.
- Public safety: When a sign is more legible, motorist have more time to react.
- Lighting levels: Homer does not have sign brightness or luminance levels.

Changeable copy sign code amendment: Staff supports changeable copy signs because a permanently mounted changeable copy sign is more attractive than temporary signs such as banners or sandwich boards. This combined with Homer's Sign standards upholds the purpose of the GBD.

HCC 21.95.040 Planning Department review of code amendment states that: The Planning Department shall evaluate each amendment to this title that is initiated in accordance with HCC 21.95.010 and qualified under HCC 21.95.030, and may recommend approval of the amendment only if it finds that the amendment:

a. Is consistent with the comprehensive plan and will further specific goals and objectives of the plan.

Finding 1: This amendment is consistent with the 2010 Comprehensive Plan Chapter 4 Land Use Goal because a permanently mounted, changeable copy sign is more attractive than temporary signs such as banners or sandwich boards.

Finding 2. Homer's Sign standards restrict the sign size and sign height (10 ft) which helps to further the goals and objectives of the Comprehensive Plan. This amendment to allow changeable copy signage is not contrary to the goal and objectives of the comprehensive plan.

b. Will be reasonable to implement and enforce.

Finding 3: This amendment will is reasonable to implement and enforce.

c. Will promote the present and future public health, safety and welfare.

Finding 4: This amendment promotes health, safety and welfare by allowing uses in the GBD to notify the public of community events by using permanently mounted, changeable copy signs.

d. Is consistent with the intent and wording of the other provisions of this title.

Finding 5: This amendment is consistent with the intent, wording and purpose of HCC Title 21.

STAFF COMMENTS/RECOMMENDATIONS:

- **1. Changeable Copy Signs:** Planning staff-recommends amending HCC 21.60.060 Table 3 to allow Changeable Copy signs.
- **2. Illumination Internal Signs:** Discuss how internally lit signs relates to the purpose of the GBD and the Comprehensive Plan.

Upon receiving a quote for an acceptable sign, we took the new sign plan to the Planning and Zoning department and learned that changeable copy, internally lit signs are not allowed in the Gateway Business District. As a church, we have various events for the community throughout the year and would like to be able to communicate times and dates to the passing public. The sign that we are wanting to install does this in a clean, simple manner and complies with the rest of the sign code.

We at Faith Lutheran Church are requesting an amendment to Homer City Code 21.60.060 Table 3 to allow changeable copy signs in the Gateway Business District.

We would also request to amend Homer City Code 21.60.060 Table 3 to allow an internally illuminated sign in the Gateway Business District.

According to HCC 21.95.010, a member of the Planning Commission may initiate an amendment to this Title.

NEW BUSINESS

A. Staff Report PL 14-41, Draft Ordinance 14-XX Amending Homer City Code 21.60.060 Table 3 Permitted Sign Characteristics by Zoning District to permit Changeable Copy and Internally Illuminated signs in the Gateway Business District

Staff reviewed the report. Recommendation to allow changeable copy signage and discuss allowing internally lit signage at this meeting.

A lengthy discussion was entertained on the pros and cons of changeable copy and whether the signage was internally lit or externally lit. Staff requested the commission come to consensus on what they would like to see and then the public can weigh in on the guidelines as presented. Currently signage that is externally lit is allowed.

Staff stated that the commission initiated an ordinance. This item can be postponed and discussed later. They can vote on it. The commissioners can recommend no changes be made and Council will make the final decisions.

Staff confirmed any commissioner can initiate a zoning ordinance referencing HCC 21.95.010. The next step is a public hearing held by the commission; the commission will then submit a recommendation to City Council will make the final decision.

Further discussion covered allowing permanent changeable copy signs on private property in the gateway business district, urban residential, rural residential and residential office districts; adding the word "permanent"; adding portable signs not permitted.

Staff summarized the recommendations of the commission and stated this would be back before the commission in June.

Background: At the May 7, 2014 HAPC meeting the Commission discussed Staff Report PL 14-41 which puts forth two requests to amend the sign standards in the Gateway Business District. If approved, the two amendments to Table 3 in Homer's Sign Code 21.60.060 would:

- 1. Allow changeable copy signs in the GBD, and
- 2. Allow internally illuminated signs in the GBD.

Permanently mounted: The commission discussed the need for changeable copy signs to be permanently mounted. Homer's Sign Code requires that all changeable copy signs be permanently mounted, HCC 21.60.060 Table 3 (c). "Changeable copy signs must be wall- or pole-mounted, and may not be flashing."

Churches are Institutions (per Table 1 (a) HCC 21.60.060) and Institutions may have an internally lit, changeable copy sign in the <u>residential districts</u> with a maximum sign area of 20 sf Table 2 Part A HCC 21.60.060. Since the GBD is not a residential district this code provision for institutions does not apply.

Gateway Business District: The attached draft ordinance only makes changes to the GBD which runs west from the Homer Middle School along both sides of the Sterling Highway, south to Kachemak Bay, and ends just past the corner of West Hill Road and Carriage Court where Story Real Estate is located. SR 14-41 pg 2.

Motions are needed to move this draft ordinance to public hearing.

- a) If no motion(s) are made, the attached draft ordinance will move forward to public hearing to allow changeable copy signs and internally illuminated signs in the GBD.
- b) If the Commission does not recommend changeable Copy signs in the GBD, a motion is needed to clearly documenting the reasoning.
- c) If the Commission does not recommend Illumination Internal signs in the GBD, a motion is needed clearly documenting the reasoning.

Plat Consideration

A. Staff Report PL 14-51, Bidarka Heights Unit 3 Knutson Replat Preliminary Plat

City Planner Abboud reviewed the staff report.

There was no applicant or public comment.

There was brief discussion regarding the street name Highland Drive being west Highland. There wasn't adequate information to determine which was correct.

Smoking in any form is objectionable to many and shall not be permitted in any public buildings owned by the City of Homer or leased by the City as lessee and in all motor vehicles or watercraft owned, rented, leased or used by the City of Homer, or by any departments, councils, commissions, or other agencies of the City. This would exclude public sidewalks, streets, public parks, other outdoor areas, and leased properties in which the City is the lessor.
- b. The City shall designate a "smoking area" outside City-owned buildings and facilities, in which this section does not prohibit areas for smoking by nonminors shall be allowed. A smoking area shall be situated no closer than 15 feet from premise entrances, open doors or windows.
- c. Smoking shall be prohibited on City-owned properties located within 50 feet of a petroleum fuel dispensing facility.
- d. The person in charge of City areas listed above shall make reasonable efforts to prevent smoking in those areas in which smoking is not allowed and shall post "No Smoking" and "Warning" signs conspicuously in these areas.
- e. The person in charge of a City area listed above shall post signs in those areas in which this section does not prohibit smoking is allowed.

Section 4. This Ordinance is of a permanent and general character and shall be included in the City Code.

Concerns about the safety of vapor emissions from e-cigarettes

Compiled by Ann Dixon 7/30/2014

This is not an exhaustive list of information and research on e-cigarettes. It's a quick survey compiled during my own attempts to better understand the issue of safety as it might apply to the Library. I've tried to include articles with varying points of view from sources such as research journals, health organizations, and government offices. I have not included e-cigarette industry sources.

Three general points can be garnered from the information below.

- Although data is still being collected, it appears that e-cigarette emissions contain varying levels of toxins, nicotine, and particulates which may in at least some cases be harmful to bystanders.
- E-cigarettes are being marketed to teens, are addictive, and their use among teens is growing rapidly. Public health organizations are very concerned about research showing that e-cigarettes are encouraging use of regular cigarettes among teens.
- The nicotine liquid used in e-cigarettes is concentrated (to various degrees, depending on brand) and toxic if ingested or absorbed on the skin. Amounts as small as a teaspoon can kill a child. Cases of accidental poisoning of children are rising significantly.

American Lung Association Statement on E-Cigarettes. 2014.

"The American Lung Association is very concerned about the potential safety and health consequences of electronic cigarettes...absent Food and Drug Administration (FDA) oversight, there is no way for the public health, medical community or consumers to know what chemicals are contained in e-cigarettes or what the short and long term health implications might be...

A study has estimated that there are 250 different e-cigarette brands for sale in the U.S. today...in initial lab tests conducted by the FDA in 2009, detectable levels of toxic cancercausing chemicals were found, including an ingredient used in anti-freeze, in two leading brands of e-cigarettes and 18 various cartridges...

Also unknown is what the potential harm may be to people exposed to secondhand emissions from e-cigarettes. Two initial studies have found formaldehyde, benzene and tobacco-specific nitrosamines (a carcinogen) coming from those secondhand emissions."

"Current state of knowledge about chemistry of liquids and aerosols associated with electronic cigarettes indicates that there is no evidence that vaping produces inhalable exposures to contaminants of the aerosol that would warrant health concerns by the standards that are used to ensure safety of workplaces. However, the aerosol generated during vaping as a whole (contaminants plus declared ingredients) creates personal exposures that would justify surveillance of health among exposed persons in conjunction with investigation of means to keep any adverse health effects as low as reasonably achievable. Exposures of bystanders are likely to be orders of magnitude less, and thus pose no apparent concern." (Note: I'm not sure what this means! But it's from the article 35 cited in Wikipedia, connected with the e-cigarette industry.)

But higher concentrations, like 10 percent or even 7.2 percent, are widely available on the Internet. A lethal dose at such levels would take "less than a tablespoon," according to Dr. Cantrell, from the poison control system in California. "Not just a kid. One tablespoon could kill an adult," he said.

SUBJECT: Town Center and Library Trail Clearing

Chief Robl reports that homeless and seasonal camps appear to be expanding in both number and size this year over previous years. Unfortunately, these illegal and unsanctioned camps are in many cases hotspots for illegal and dangerous activities that present a threat to the safety and well-being of the general public. Two of the biggest problem areas are City owned land in the designated Town Center and the trail that leads from the Poopdeck Trail to the library. Both areas are thickly forested with dense black spruce, alders, and underbrush which makes visibility difficult. Chief Robl recommends that these areas be cleared similar to what the City did last year along the Poopdeck Trail.

The City Council discussed this issue briefly at the last meeting in response to a section in the City Manager's Report. The Council appeared to be in agreement that something needed to be done. Council was informed that the administration would put together a plan of action and a budget request for the next meeting.

Administration recommends that these areas be cleared similar to what occurred on the Poopdeck Trail. This would entail clearing underbrush and small diameter trees. Large healthy trees would be preserved but limbed high enough so that visibility is improved. Carey has been working with the Corps of Engineers on wetlands delineation and a clearing strategy that would cause minimal damage to wetlands and habitat. It is likely that the work will be done with some combination of mechanized equipment and hand tools. Because mechanized equipment might be most efficient, it is probable that the work will not be done until fall or winter to minimize disturbance to wet soils.

At this time, we are not planning to haul wood out to a location where the public could take it for firewood. There are two reasons for this. First, doing that would definitely drive the cost higher. Second, most of the trees that will be removed will be 8 inches in diameter or less. The current plan is to take stumps right down to the ground and leave small pieces on the ground. Much of the debris will be ground into wood chips. Carey has obtained some very

On September 23, 2013, the Council adopted Resolution 13-095. Resolution 13-095 authorized the City Manager to keep the HERC Gym open for pickleball, basketball, and other Community Recreation programs that require only minimal heat and utilities. The gym is heavily used by the Community Recreation Program and its use has expanded because facilities at the High School and Middle School are in high demand for school related activities. Many people consider the gym to be a community asset. The Council decided to make it available for use by the public until such time as it is demolished or a final determination is made as to the future of the building and property.

Every time the Council discusses this building, the fact that it does not meet modern building codes invariably comes up. Of particular concern is the Fire Code. The City consulted with the Fire Marshall on several occasions over the years regarding this building. We provided old building plans prepared by the Borough and the University, described current uses and building characteristics over the phone, and requested a site visit. A Fire Marshall plan review was performed on this building before the college moved in and the occupancies had not changed much since the college moved out, especially with respect to the gym. The Fire Marshall did not express concern about this building and its uses however, we never received anything definitive. Since the gym is now the only part of the facility now open to the public, we decided to ask the Fire Marshall for a full plan review of the gym only. We did this to assure the Council and the public that the building is safe from a Fire Code perspective and to get a more precise handle on what deficiencies there are and how much it would cost to fix them.

Attached is a copy of the letter the City received from the Fire Marshall which constitutes his preliminary plan review response. Also attached is a rough estimate from the City Engineer regarding what it would cost to address the issues raised. You will see that the Fire Marshall requested additional information and confirmation, which the Public Works Department is in the process of providing.

Although the Fire Marshall plan review is not final, we decided to get an ordinance moving now so that we are in a position to make the required improvements quickly and not interrupt activities at the gym. We believe the chances are good that a final determination will be received prior to second reading of the ordinance. The cost to bring this building into compliance is relatively inexpensive and it would be a good investment in the community to keep it open until a determination is made as to its final disposition. The \$19,000 would come from the HERC Building Depreciation fund.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve Ordinance 14-37 appropriating up to \$19,000 from the Leased Property Depreciation Account.

SUBJECT: FY 2014 MID-TERM BUDGET AMENDMENT

The Port and Harbor's approved 2014 budget is in need of account adjustments to either repair accounts that were underfunded as an oversight, or to add funding to accounts due to unforeseen expenditures that came up during the Spit trails and harbor improvements projects. Mid-term adjustments are requested for the following accounts:

601-5202: We do not have a line item for signage in our operations budget, therefore all harbor signage costs are coded to our operations supplies budget, which has been exceeded. This expenditure replaced signage that was either faded out and unreadable or addressed necessary changes in signage due to construction of the trail and improvements at the Load and Launch Ramp.

601-5207: The new "No Wake" harbor buoys were an end-of-the-season purchase that was intended to be paid for out of our 2013 budget, but the auditors disagreed and instead moved the expenditure to our 2014 account, effectively wiping out our vehicle boat maintenance account for the year.

601-5287, 602-5218, 604-5218: These expense accounts have corresponding revenue accounts related to electrical retail sales on System 5 and water retail sales on the Pioneer and Deep Water Dock. Because there have been significant increases in sales, the expenses too have increased and are exceeding budget.

400-0380: When we set up our bond reserves, we funded it from the Port and Harbor reserves. When the City Manager applied for the bond he was told by the bank that we "overfunded" the account and that our goal should be to keep 1.25 times the total amount of an annual bond payment in the bond reserves. This adjustment accomplishes that goal and helps our depreciation reserves picture at the same time.

400-0380: Revenues earned in 2013 exceeded expenditures. This adjustment moves those surplus monies to the Port and Harbor Depreciation Reserve.

SUBJECT: Land Purchase - Proposed Water Tank

The City Council authorized the acceptance of an EPA grant, Ordinance 12-40(S), which provided design funds for various water system improvements. One of these improvements is a new water tank, recommended in the Water/Sewer Master Plan, to provide more dependable fire flows to the core area of the City and a more redundant distribution system for the areas below the bluff.

After contacting several property owners in the general vicinity of the proposed tank location (near the Shellfish Ave./South Slope Dr. intersection), Public Works has determined that one particular property was best suited for the new water tank. The site needs to be at a particular elevation and as close as possible to the pressure zone below the tank, to create the proper pressures on the system and minimize construction costs. The property is shown on the attached map. The property is unique, in that it best serves the needs of the project.

The property owner is a willing seller (assuming the price is fair). To establish a fair value for the property, Public Works has looked at the KPB tax assessment values of vacant property in the area. Based on KPB tax assessment values, similar property in the area (immediately across the street) is assessed at \$1.08 - \$1.09 per square foot. The proposed 1.497 acre lot would then be valued at approximately \$72,000. Although the Borough maintains that their tax assessment values reflect market value, our experience in the past is that they were low (up to 25%). Currently, they may be closer to market value.

The value established by the appraisal is \$45,000. The appraiser acknowledges that due to the lack of recent raw land sales comparable to the proposed property, the value he can place on the property is lower than what he could have established in the past.

The proposed location of the tank site is part of a larger parcel, the lot for the tank needs to be created by subdividing the larger parcel. This means that there is no KPB land value for tax purposes established for the lot. Public Works has received preliminary plat approval from both the Homer Advisory Planning Commission and the KPB Platting Committee to create the new lot.

Homer City Code requires that property *sold* by the City be appraised and that property cannot be sold for less than the appraised value. There is no requirement that the price of property purchased by the City be limited by the appraised value.

Based on the review of potential sites for the tank, the subject property is best suited for a new water tank because:

- 1) The lot is at the correct elevation.
- 2) Owners of other potential lots are not willing to sell.
- 3) Building the tank on other lots would increase the cost of the project.

Based on the evaluation of the value of the lot proposed to be purchased for the new tank, Public Works concludes that the fair value of the property is \$72,000 because:

- 1) It is consistent with the KPB assessed value for tax purposes.
- 2) The lot has unique characteristics from the perspective of this project.
- 3) The price is higher than the current appraised value (raw land sales appear to be very slow), but lower than what the property might have appraised for a few years ago.
- 4) The proposed purchase price reflects the value that the new water storage tank has to the entire community and all of the water system customers.

The property owners initially wanted more than \$72,000 for the property. Comparable raw land sales from a few years ago would indicate the property was worth \$85,000 to \$90,000.

Attached is a draft purchase agreement (reviewed by the City Attorney) that offers to purchase the property for \$72,000. The owners are evaluating whether to accept the offer. The City Manager has the authority to sign the purchase agreement, Council approval would be appropriate, due to the special nature of the expenditure.

Recommendations:

The City Council pass a resolution authorizing the City Manager to sign the attached purchase agreement (purchase price \$72,000); and pass an Ordinance authorizing the expenditure of \$80,000 from the Homer Accelerated Water/Sewer Program (HAWSP) for the purchase of the proposed lot for a new water tank (including purchase price and closing costs).

MANAGER'S REPORT August 11, 2014

TO: MAYOR WYTHE / HOMER CITY COUNCIL

UPDATES / FOLLOW-UP

NOTE: Some of these items appeared in the last report. I have updated them and brought them back in case the Council wanted to discuss.

- Kachemak City Sewer: I have informed Mayor Morris that the Homer City Council liked his
 proposal and that I was instructed to bring back a resolution which amends the Fee Schedule for
 sewer only customers in both Kachemak City and within the Homer City limits. The Mayor was
 scheduled to relay this information to his City Council this week. Tom Klinkner is working on a
 draft of a new wastewater agreement between the two Cities. Resolutions amending the fee
 schedule and approving the new wastewater agreement are scheduled for the August 25
 meeting.
- 2. Ocean Drive Paving and Striping: At the last meeting, the Council discussed the proposed paving and striping plan for Ocean Drive. Council requested a resolution expressing its recommendation that the existing wide bike lane on the South side of the road remain and that the proposed crosswalk at Lake Street be eliminated. A resolution to that effect is included in the agenda for this meeting. I conveyed the Council's recommendations to the ADOT/PF project staff in an e-mail and follow-up phone call last week. In response, the Project Engineer and the Construction Project Manager have decided to come down and address the Council at this meeting. I have scheduled them as a Visitor on the meeting Agenda.
- 3. <u>DEC Grant Application</u>: Attached is a copy of the City's DEC water and sewer grant application for State Fiscal Year 2016. I have attached this information for your review in part, because the City generally lists DEC projects as its number 1 Priority on the CIP List. These projects are reviewed and scored by DEC and if they score high enough, and funding is available, they are inserted in the Governor's Capital Budget and transmitted to the Legislature for final approval. This application requests a grant in the amount of \$1,922,577. The total estimated project cost is \$2,746,538. A local match of approximately \$800,000 will be needed. In the past, the City has provided local matches by taking low interest lows which reduces pressure on the HAWSP Fund Balance. The loans are repaid through a combination of property assessments and sales tax revenues. The proposed project is phased and includes several components which are included

in the Water and Sewer Master Plan. The projects were designed and engineered using an EPA grant. There is also an alternative energy component.

- 4. <u>Storm Water Plan</u>: Carey Meyer has submitted a grant application to EPA for a storm water master plan. Storm water and drainage generally, can be a problem in Homer, as you know. We have applied for grants in the past for this purpose but have not yet been successful. The Planning Department nominated a storm water plan as a new project for inclusion in the CIP.
- 5. <u>FY 2015 Budget Priorities</u>: The Committee of the Whole Agenda for this meeting includes a discussion of Budget Priorities for Fiscal Year 2015. This is the Council first opportunity to let the staff know what its budget priorities are for the next fiscal year. This information is very helpful to me as we prepare the draft budget for next year. In order to help jump start the discussion, I thought it might be a good idea to list my priorities going in to the process. The following list of priorities is not exhaustive but it includes most of the big ones:
 - Restore GF Depreciation Funding
 - Maintain Desirable Fund Balances
 - Sustainable Employee Health Insurance Plan
 - Maintain Existing Programs at Current Staffing Levels
 - City Gas Assessment Payments
 - Borough Loan Repayment
 - Increase Building Maintenance and Police Staffing Levels
 - Wage Scale Adjustments
 - M&O Requirements for New Buildings and Infrastructure
 - P&H Tariff Adjustments
 - W&S Revenues
- 6. Parks, Arts, Recreation, and Culture (PARC) Needs Assessment: The ink is dry on the contract with the consulting firm Agnew::Beck. The consultant is ready to start work and we anticipate some initial meetings as early as next week. The consultant's first meeting with the PARC Committee will be toward the end of this month or early September. At the time this report was written, there was a possibility that Chis Beck, a principle in the firm, would be available to speak with the Council at this meeting. He will definitely be in town that day doing some initial consultations with key stakeholder groups.
- 7. <u>Strategic Planning</u>: Katie has received proposals from consulting firms that are interested in facilitating a Council planning session. The objective is to establish priorities and an action plan based on existing already adopted plans; a plan to implement the plan. A proposal review team which includes the Mayor is currently reviewing and rating the proposals. We hope to have a recommendation to you soon on a consultant and the proposed date for the planning session.
- 8. <u>Finance Department</u>: The Finance Department is very busy this summer with the normal increase in sometime activities. The Department has "recovered" from recent audit and is now gearing up for preparation of the FY 2015 Budget. A great deal of time and effort is going into grant and financial reporting since we currently have so many capital projects in various stages of completion. Department staff members are working hard to test and implement new software that will make ambulance billing and special assessment district accounting more efficient and precise.

- 9. <u>Clerk's Office</u>: In addition to their regular duties, the Clerk's office is very busy gearing up for the upcoming primary and municipal elections. The candidate filing period is now open and there will be a proposition on the October ballot.
- 10. <u>Police Department</u>: HPD continues to be very busy this summer. The jail has not seen too many vacancies. Last week we said goodbye to Officer Steve Smith who is retiring after many years of service with HPD and the Alaska State troopers. Steve Smith was an excellent officer and he was loved and well respected by the community. He will be missed and we wish him the best in all of his future adventures.
- 11. <u>Fire Department</u>: Chief Painter reports that the two temporary, summertime EMT/firefighters that the Council approved are working out great. Summer is often a difficult time to get volunteers to respond in sufficient numbers to emergency medical or fire calls. Because it is summer, may volunteers have other things calling them, like the rest of us. Having these two paid staff members at the station and available to respond has been very helpful and HVFD has been able to keep its level of service high during the busiest part of the year. These positions have been particularly helpful with emergency medical calls. It is my intent to try and fit funding for these two positions in the budget for next year.
- 12. <u>Library</u>: Library Director Ann Dixon reports that the temporary/part time position the Council approved has also been very helpful. This staff person has been stationed almost exclusively at the front reference desk which frees the staff up to do other tasks and assist library patrons. The library is experiencing record numbers of visitors. At the last meeting, Council member Van Dyke noted that the Library has passed the 1 million visitation mark. The library reports that it had 12,242 visits in June (up from 10,639 last June) and 12,997 visits in July. There were only two months this year (February and May) in which visitation was less than 10,000. Library circulation in July was 11,892 which is significantly up over July of last year (9,612). The Summer Reading Program has more kids signed up than ever, over 300.
- 13. Construction Projects: You may have noticed that the slab is poured and framing has already begun on the new Port and Harbor Office Building. The contractor has an aggressive construction schedule and the new expectation is that the Port and Harbor staff may be able to occupy the building as soon as March of next year. What you probably haven't noticed is that the steel frame of the new Skyline Fire Station is up and that project is moving along as well. Both buildings should be closed in by winter so work can proceed on the interior. The City is waiting for the final design plans on the Load and Launch Ramp work and will put that out to bid as soon as possible. We also expect to solicit RFPs from engineering firms for the preconstruction work on the proposed Deep Water Dock expansion within the next few weeks. The harbor work, including float replacements, water and electric service to System 5, and Ramp 3 replacement will begin this fall.





The following summarizes our activities as City Attorney during the month of July 2014.

<u>City Council</u>. I attended the July 28, 2014 City Council meeting. At the request of Council Member Lewis, I drafted an ordinance prohibiting the use of e-cigarettes in City buildings. Holly Wells prepared to advise the Board of Adjustment o regarding a pending appeal.

<u>City Clerk.</u> I drafted a resolution calling the charter commission election, and advised the City Clerk regarding the procedure for issuing absentee ballots. Holly Wells advised the City Clerk regarding Board of Adjustment procedural issues.

<u>Planning Department</u>. I advised the City Planner regarding a conditional use application for a property with zoning code violations, and researched the regulation of towers under the zoning code. I drafted a code amendment regarding the City Planner's participation in zoning appeals.


