August 7, 2014

Dear Mayor Wythe,

I understand that the city of Homer has begun to consider a ban on the public use of vapor products such as ecigarettes. I applaud the council's interest, according to news reports, in getting a better understanding of the issue before taking action that might not only unnecessarily restrict freedom, but that could also have the unintended consequence of undermining the public health goal of reducing the harm from tobacco use.

I have been studying policy approaches to e-cigarettes and other forms of tobacco harm reduction for nearly a decade, but in the U.S. and overseas. While I regret that I will not be able to testify in person at your August 11th hearing, I appreciate your consideration of my written thoughts on the matter, as you consider the merits and risks of this proposed e-cigarette legislation.

As you are aware, the Food and Drug Administration is spending \$270 million to understand the science of vapor products and how they are being used, as part of the agency's plan to develop science-based regulations that protect the public, while at the same time, not removing the incentive for smokers to switch to these dramatically less-harmful alternatives to cigarettes.

As cities around the country have struggled with how, if at all, to regulate e-cigarettes over and above pending FDA regulations now being put in place, some reasonable approaches have emerged that strike a balance. Examples of those regulations include a ban on all e-cigarette sales to minors, restrictions on how the products can be displayed in stores, and bans on the use of the products in daycares and schools.

However, a compete ban on the use of e-cigarettes in public places goes too far because:

#1) there is no evidence that it will do anything to protect public health,

#2) there is a real risk of undermining public health by reducing the incentive for smokers to switch.

Evidence continues to emerge that smokers who are trying to quit do better with e-cigarettes than they do by willpower alone or with medical nicotine replacement therapies. see: <u>http://www.addictionjournal.org/press-releases/e-cigarette-use-for-quitting-smoking-is-associated-with-improved-success-rates-</u>

If smokers who quit smoking and are now using dramatically less harmful e-cigarettes instead are forced to use the product (which produces no second hand smoke)together with smokers, we run a serious risk that they'll

revert back to smoking. In this case, "playing it safe," by banning the use of e-cigarettes in city structures, vehicles and watercraft, is likely to do more harm than good.

In fact, Mitch Zeller, the Director of the Food and Drug Administration's Center for Tobacco Products, recently spoke to the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation about the potential for E-cigarettes to reduce the harm from tobacco use. in particular, he cautioned about the need to regulate the products carefully in light of their harm-reduction potential. By treating e-cigarettes like cigarettes, and banning their use in all places, the city would be failing to heed Mr. Zeller's advice.

Zeller's comment on e-cigarettes left little doubt that there's a risk to over-regulation.

He said that,

"if at the end of the day people are smoking for the nicotine, but dying from the tar, then there's an opportunity for FDA to come up with what I've been calling a comprehensive nicotine regulatory policy that is agency-wide and that is keyed to something that we call the continuum of risk: that there are different nicotine containing and nicotine delivering products that pose different levels of risk to the individual."

He added, "Right now the overwhelming majority of people seeking nicotine are getting it from the deadliest and most toxic delivery system, and that's the conventional cigarette. But if there is a continuum of risk and there are less harmful ways to get nicotine, and FDA is in the business of regulating virtually all of those products, then I think there's an extraordinary public health opportunity for the agency to embrace some of these principles and to figure out how to incorporate it into regulatory policies."

Because e-cigarettes present a huge opportunity to eradicate smoking around the country, I encourage you to take all of the science, as well as the FDA's Mitch Zeller's insightful thoughts on the danger of over-regulation.
