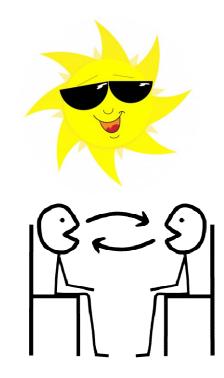

Staff members Jo Johnson, Carey Meyer, John Li, Rick Abboud, Katie Koester and myself met in preparation of this work session on Monday February 2nd. The free main allowance is a fee that people pay when they hook up to natural gas. Enstar collects the fee, and annually refunds the City. The City has stated that these funds will be used equally between all property owners in the assessment district. To date, we don't know how much money Enstar has collected, but we hope to have an update at the meeting. After much staff discussion, there are three key points that emerged.

<u>Key Points:</u>

1. The City needs to create a reserve fund for the free main allowance. Enstar will send the City a check every year, for ten years, with the free main allowance funds collected for the year. These funds should not be deposited in the general fund.

2. There has been discussion of whether the City could credit free main funds against the assessment amount, resulting in a lower assessment, or a reduced bill the first year. At this point, we don't have the free main funds, nor do we know how much they might be. So the assessment amount is moving forward without this potential credit.

3. In the coming months, Council should pass a resolution setting the policies the City will follow with the free main allowance. Finance Director Li is working with Enstar to learn when during the year the City should expect payment and the amounts for 2013 and 2014. When considering this resolution, staff has some suggestions:

A. Plan to credit the free main allowance toward the assessments in year 1, 2, 5 and 10, and only when the amount is over a certain dollar amount, say \$100.00. There are two parts to these suggestions. First, we expect the majority of the free main allowance in years one and two, when the majority of people will have hooked up to gas. Second, there will be a smaller amount of free main funds over 10 years. But it's a large administrative burden to credit accounts and issue checks; we don't want to be sending \$3.00 checks. Council can

determine a dollar amount over which the City would apply a credit to the assessment amount. (The Borough has a \$25 threshold, for example). For land owners that have paid the assessment in full, the current land owner would receive a refund check.

B. Refund 70-80% of the free main allowance to the assessment district. Retain a percentage to cover the costs of bad debt, and low income deferred assessments. The City has a 10-year loan, but it is possible not everyone will have paid their assessment in full in that timeframe. This policy can be revisited in future years and amended by resolution as needed.

Requested actions:

1. Direct staff/attorney to draft an ordinance creating a reserve account for free main fund.

2. Direct staff/attorney to begin drafting a resolution, creating policies for dispersing the free main allowance. Bring the resolution to a future work session.

What refunds will ENSTAR pay the City?

ENSTAR projects the economic feasibility of a main extension by comparing the estimated cost of constructing the main extension with the total Free Main Allowance (FMA) for the customers that are expected to receive gas service from the main extension. The FMA is designed to allocate the cost of existing ENSTAR plant among its customers, and ENSTAR calculates it annually. Its calculation is described in Section 602c of the ENSTAR tariff.

ENSTAR will refund to the City of Homer the amount of the FMA for each customer that connects directly to the gas mains that are constructed within the HSAD during the year of their construction and during the following 10 years. One estimate by Enstar is that if 90% of the homes in the HSAD hook up to gas in the first few years, approximately 10% of the project cost will be refunded back to the City.

A customer that connects to main extension from a gas line constructed within the HSAD must pay a prorated share of construction of the improvement in the HSAD. ENSTAR refunds to the City the amount of such payments received during the year of construction of the improvement in the HSAD and the two following years.

The City will use any funds refunded from ENSTAR to pay down the loan for building the distribution system in the HSAD. The City will equally distribute the benefit to all lot/parcel owners. If you pay your assessment in full when the improvement is completed, you would receive a refund of part of the assessment from the City. If you are paying your assessment in annual installments, either the number or the amount of the installments will be reduced. Because the City cannot predict how much ENSTAR will refund through the FMA and new hookups outside the HSAD, this figure has not been included in the calculation of the per lot/parcel assessment of \$3283.

You are hereby notified the Kenai Borough Assembly on September 4, 2012, in Ordinance 2012-32 confirmed the final assessment roll and the construction of a natural gas main line within the Anchor Point Utility Special Assessment District (USAD).

FINDINGS: On August 11, 2011, the Kenai Peninsula Borough Clerk certified a petition for USAD formation as having signatures at least 70% of the owners of parcels within the USAD and owners of 75.7% of the parcels signed the petition. After written notice of public hearing to property owners dated August 15, 2011, and published notice of public hearing on August 18, 2011 and September 1, 2011, the Assembly adopted a resolution to form the district and proceed with the construction of the improvements, Resolution 2011-090, on September 20, 2011. The Assembly found that natural gas Anchor Point USAD Page 1 of 5 "Notice of Final Assessment"

is an economical and safe source of heat and increases parcels marketable value. Written objections to the formation of the district were to be filed with the borough clerk within 30 days of the mailing of the notice of the public hearing of Resolution 2011-090, after which the Assembly found that 50% of the property owners within the USAD did not oppose proceeding with the improvement. After construction of the improvement the final costs were established and the final assessment roll presented to the assembly. Notice dated August 24, 2012 was mailed to property owners within the USAD of the September 4, 2012 hearing on the final assessment roll. Publication of this public hearing was published August 2, 2012 and August 30, 2012. Two individuals having ownership in one parcel included in the project appeared to state objections at that hearing. The assembly confirmed the final assessment roll of the parcels specifically benefited within the USAD by the natural gas pipeline on September 4, 2012. Ordinance 2012-32 and the Final Assessment Roll will be recorded with the Kenai Recording District. This recording constitutes a lien placed upon the parcel and will remain until the total assessment is paid in full.

PAYMENT SCHEDULE: The total assessment allocated to each parcel is \$2,699.28. After applying any pre-pay requirement of \$0.00, the total due at this time for your benefited parcel is **\$2,699.28.** There are two payment options:

1. The entire assessment may be prepaid without interest or penalty within thirty days of the date of this notice. If you take this option please make a payment of **\$2,699.28** payable to the Kenai Peninsula Borough no later than <u>October 26, 2012.</u>

Interest on the unpaid amount of the assessment shall accrue at the rate of 5.25 percent (5.25%) per annum. Accounts become delinquent the day after a payment is due but unpaid. If an installment of the assessment is delinquent, the installment of the assessment, plus accrued interest and penalty becomes due thirty days after the date of notice of the installment delinquency. If the installment, plus accrued interest and penalty are not paid within sixty days following the installment due date,

incurred by the KPB becomes due. The penalty for delinquent installment payments is the same as the penalty for delinquent real property taxes in effect on the date of the delinquency. Currently, penalty is calculated on the unpaid principal payment in the amount of 5% on the day the payment becomes delinquent and an additional 5% added when the payment is more than 30 days delinquent.

"FREE MAIN ALLOWANCE" CREDITS: The Borough has created a reserve account that will accumulate all refunds from Enstar Natural Gas Company, arising from new customers connecting to the main gas line referred to as "free main allowances". At the end of each fiscal year, the Borough will analyze the balance in the reserve account. If the balance is less than \$25.00 per lot, no further action will be taken. If the balance is equal to or greater than \$25.00 per lot, the balance in the reserve account will be distributed. If your total assessment is "paid in full", the Borough Assessor. If your total assessment is NOT paid in full, the Borough will apply a credit to your account. The Borough will apply such credits in the following order: First, to ANY outstanding balance applied in the order of unpaid costs, penalty, interest and then principal; and, Second, to the owner of record as shown on the most recent. The application of credits will not impact the subsequent payment schedule.

If any lot or tract within the District is divided into two or more lots, the credit for such re-subdivided lots shall be computed by counting the re-subdivided lots as a single lot for purposes of determining the initial credit entitlement. If any lots or tracts are consolidated, the converse shall apply. The

initial credit entitlement shall then be divided equally among the subject lots. If an account is in a delinquent or foreclosure status, any such credit shall be applied against the delinquent balance in the order described above.

APPEAL OF CITY MANAGER WALT WREDE'S PARTIAL DENIAL OF FRANK GRISWOLD'S NOVEMBER 6 AND 11, 2014 PUBLIC RECORDS REQUESTS

Appellant Frank Griswold and Attorney Thomas Klinkner, representing city administration, were present.

A. Preliminary Matters

Councilmember Zak disclosed a potential conflict of interest. About a half hour ago he had a call from an individual who had read about this in the paper and wanted to give him his input. He did not discuss it with him.

Mayor Wythe ruled it does not constitute a conflict of interest. There was no objection from the Council.

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Appellant Griswold raised preliminary matters in his brief that he submitted today. Mayor Wythe has a conflict of interest/bias since the documents were written to or from her. He asserted Mayor Wythe has an amorous relationship with Mr. Wrede as depicted in the Homer News photo.

Mayor Wythe passed the gavel to Mayor Pro Tempore Roberts.

Mayor Pro Tempore Roberts called for a motion to disqualify Mayor Wythe. There was no motion stated.

Mayor Pro Tempore Roberts returned the gavel to Mayor Wythe.

Appellant Griswold stated Attorney Klinkner has a bias and conflict of interest. His name is in Attorney Levesque's redacted records. The Council should be advised by unbiased independent legal counsel. The decision is due January 9, 2015 and should not be written by Birch Horton Bittner or Attorney Levesque. Legal arguments were presented in his brief; he hopes there is an impartial review of the legal issues before the decision is made.

Mayor Wythe told Mr. Griswold his recommendations will be taken under advisement.

Appellant Griswold clarified there are more parts to his ligation matters; it is laid out in his brief.

B. Oral Argument

Mayor Wythe advised the parties on the procedures for oral argument.

Appellant Griswold would like to rely exclusively on his brief. He was not able to find any procedures in city code if new evidence is allowed. This is similar to a board of adjustment hearing where most procedures are laid out. It may be a good idea to prescribe procedures so they are not made up arbitrarily. He referenced the eight redactions which had bled through, but there were just four redactions disclosed.

28:50 minutes remain.

Attorney Klinkner, on behalf of the City Manager, clarified he is not here to represent or advise the Council. If the Council feels it needs independent representation it is entitled to get it. The issues are straightforward enough that it should not be necessary, but it is the Council's call.

The way the matter has evolved, attorney client privilege is the principal concern, deliberative process secondary if relevant at all. There are two classes of documents:

communications between Attorney Holly Wells and the Mayor and/or City Clerk on behalf of the Board of Adjustment regarding its June 14th decision. The documents have been provided to the Council in-camera. The Council will make the call as to if they are privileged. The second call are the invoices for legal services, confined to invoices for litigation matters and two redactions for non-litigation matters. One was a pre-litigation discussion of potential litigation; the other was an ongoing litigation matter that was billed to the wrong account. Finally there is the matter of Joseph Levesque invoices. Mr. Wrede provided those to Mr. Griswold on December 10th with redactions. Attorney Klinkner became aware when Mr. Griswold complained to the Clerk's office the end of December. He has not yet had an opportunity to collect un-redacted copies of those invoices for the Council's inspection. He suggested that we roll that into the current appeal and get it disposed of. He will work with the Clerk to get copies without redactions as part of the in-camera inspection.

He agrees with Mr. Griswold that the Cool Homes case is the most pertinent authority and guidance pertaining to attorney client privilege. He referenced page 5 of his written submission pertaining to attorney client privilege communications. He encouraged the Council to look for discussion of facts and controversy in litigation and litigation strategy. The Council may find things that don't involve either of those in the mails withheld; those documents should be made available to Mr. Griswold. If the Council finds discussion of litigation strategy they should affirm the City Manager's decision to withhold the documents.

Councilmember Roberts noted the records request was filed on November 6th. She asked when Attorney Levesque's billings were received.

Attorney Klinkner answered the Levesque invoices were responsive to Mr. Griswold's November 11th records request. Attorney Levesque's invoices were for his work on Conditional Use Permit 14-05. Mr. Griswold broadened his request for invoices on November 11th. City Manager Wrede overlooked the Levesque invoices when he initially responded to Mr. Griswold's request on December 10th. The Levesque invoices have not been pulled together yet.

Councilmember Zak asked for clarification as to attorney/client privilege on invoices as referenced in Mr. Griswold's brief.

Attorney Klinkner advised invoices for legal services are not privileged just because they are from an attorney. If the invoices indicate that services were provided and the amount charged, that is not privileged. If the time entries and work description entries reveal privileged facts or litigation strategy there is an issue of privilege.

B. Rebuttal

Appellant Griswold objected to the absence of the Levesque invoices well before Christmas. After that he was provided the redacted Levesque invoices. Mr. Wrede claimed there were names that were redacted, but the redactions render most invoices meaningless. It is not the responsibility of the billing attorney to redact his own invoices. Very seldom have any portions of attorney invoices been redacted.

What is unique about this case is the communications with Attorney Holly Wells. Ordinarily communications would be confidential, but in this case she was acting as a neutral attorney because of the dual representation of members of the law firm. She was ethically bound to only provide the Board in a neutral capacity. A non-neutral attorney can do all sorts of things, wherein Attorney Wells was restricted to only providing the Board with procedural advice. She indicated she had done a lot of research on Mr. Griswold's questions and responded, but he never got the responses. Whatever information she provided should have been available to everyone. It is a distinction that probably will not be provided in case law.

Mr. Griswold wished the Council luck in their decision and entertained a motion for extending the Friday deadline.

LEWIS/REYNOLDS - MOVED TO GO TO EXECUTIVE SESSION.

Mr. Griswold objected to Councilmember Zak's participation in executive session.

City Clerk Johnson advised Councilmember Zak is not able to participate in executive session pursuant to city code.

I have contacted the Homer City Lobbyist to set up some meetings with our legislators while I am there. I will be available by phone. Jo Johnson will be acting manager in my absence.

Land Purchase

Several years ago Walt had discussions with a land owner regarding the parcel of land next to the sewer treatment plant. The parcel sold but is now for sale again. I received an email that there was an offer on the property but that the city could have the first chance to purchase.

This parcel would give public works a buffer around the public works complex and offer opportunity for future expansion. Is there a consensus to begin discussions with the owner? If a tentative agreement was reached, it would be brought to the council on a future agenda.

Library Grant

The library received notification that they have been awarded a continuing education grant. The city will be reimbursed up to \$1000.00 for expenses incurred by a library staff member attending the AKLA Conference in Juneau.

FYI

The City received information about the Rasmuson Foundation funding an annual award program for Alaskan artists. The 2015 Individual Artist Award Program application period is now open.

City Manager Yoder reported at the last council meeting there was a request for as-builts so the Council could see the natural gas system. Some properties were deleted from the roll. The information he received back was as-builts were considered Enstar propriety property. If there are specific areas the Council would like to know about he will get specific answers.

Mr. Yoder serves on the ABC Board and will be in Juneau the week of February 10th. He has meetings scheduled with Lobbyist Linda Anderson and both legislators. The State of Alaska provided their STIP priorities. The three projects that affect Homer on the STIP are: Pioneer Avenue rehabilitation has been moved to 2015; Anchor Point is part of 2015, with pavement preservation after that.

Mr. Yoder received an email from a property owner next to the sewer treatment plant. He thought he had an offer on the property and wanted to know if the city wanted first right. It is not a high priority item. The City had looked at it before to add to the public works area. He asked if the Council was interested in pursuing the property.

The Library has received a \$1,000 grant for training to allow a library staff member to attend a conference in Juneau. Additional information is from the Rasmuson Foundation and their program for Alaskan artists.

There was work being done at 3850 Heath Street next to Horizon with no permit in place. We issued a stop order until the permits are in place. He is not sure if they are qualified for a permit.

Councilmember Burgess expressed his frustration with the feedback from the Planning Department on which right-of-ways the gas line was installed in. The Council is going to be approving a \$12M assessment roll without as-builts for right-of-ways. We hired Enstar to build the natural gas line and can't even know which right-of-ways the natural gas line is in. Anyone who dials 811 can have access to this information. Most people objecting to the natural gas

line are relying on the Council's knowledge where the gas line is. He believes the Planning Department needs to step up and provide better information. He doesn't want to rely on Sharpie lines on a map to determine who should and shouldn't get an assessment.

SUBJECT: Project Drive

We have received a grant from the state last fall to fund our "Project Drive" program. I request that we obtain council approval to obligate funds and proceed with Project Drive.

Project Drive is a program we have been doing for approximately five years. It involves us conducting clinics at local schools and events to teach kids the effects of alcohol and drug impairment on driving. We do so by having the children drive a side by side ATV with a police officer in it while wearing fatal vision goggles that simulate the effects of impairment. The program has been well received and seems to be very effective. It also provides us with a great opportunity to connect with young teenage children and have positive interaction with them.

We have been conducting Project Drive with borrowed equipment from other police departments. Every time we want to do it we have had to coordinate the equipment loans and scheduling with the departments and send an officer up to either Soldotna or Anchorage to pick-up the equipment and then take it back when we're finished. This has taken considerable time and expense. This grant funds the purchase of the equipment we need to run the program.

We would like to purchase the two main pieces of equipment for this program as soon as possible. The low bidder for the side by side ATV, a Polaris RZR, is Homer Saw at \$12,699.99. The low bidder for an enclosed trailer to haul it in is White Spruce Trailer Sales at \$10,250. The state has issued us a notice to proceed and begin Project Drive. We are ready to do so.

A. Staff Report PL 15-05, City Planner's Report

City Planner Abboud reviewed the staff report.

Public Hearings

Testimony limited to 3 minutes per speaker. The Commission conducts Public Hearings by hearing a staff report, presentation by the applicant, hearing public testimony and then acting on the Public Hearing items. The Commission may question the public. Once the public hearing is closed the Commission cannot hear additional comments on the topic. The applicant is not held to the 3 minute time limit.

A. Staff Report PL 15-06, Conditional Use Permit 2015-01 for 7 cabins on a lot at 2315 East End Road

Commissioner Venuti declared he has a conflict of interest.

STROOZAS/BOS MOVED THAT COMMISSIONER VENUTI HAS A CONFLICT OF INTEREST.

Commissioner Venuti explained that he has a business relationship with the client and it falls within the limits outlined in city code.

VOTE: YES: BOS, STEAD, HIGHLAND, STROOZAS, BRADLEY

Motion carried.

Commissioner Venuti left the table.

City Planner Abboud reviewed the staff report.

Kurt St. Jean, applicant, commented about Homer's housing needs and the good results he has had with the cabins he built on Kachemak Drive. He thinks the small one bedroom cabins give renters more of a feeling of independence and leaving some of the trees on the property will provide buffers for the tenants. The cabins will be professionally managed, boat storage will not be allowed, there will be a dumpster on site, and he will build storage facilities so there won't be stuff strewn around the yards.

Chair Stead opened the public hearing.

Leah Jenkins, city resident and adjacent property owner, referenced the aerial photo to show her lot and identify a gully that runs along the property. She expressed her concern about plans for the septic and water, and that she is unclear where the utility right-of-way is. She sent a letter to the Commission that was provided in their meeting packet.

Ken Ozment, city resident and neighboring property owner, referenced the aerial photo to show his lot and where the power line is located. He stated he is adamantly opposed to the project because he believes it will negatively impact the neighborhood and property values. He believes there are better areas for this type of a housing project. His concerns include increased noise, excessive vehicles, pets, and it could attract more bears to the area. He sent a letter to the Commission that was provided in their meeting packet.

Ron Broste, city resident and property owner in the noticed district, opposes the development. He cited concerns with increased traffic in an spot where the speed limit increases from 35 to 45 MPH. The grade of the driveway is fairly steep and the line of sight is questionable there. He also expressed concern about increased noise.

Ray Kranich, city resident and property owner in the noticed district, commented in opposition of the project based on the density of the project. He doesn't believe the lot is big enough to meet the minimum requirements.

Barbara Williams, city resident and property owner in the noticed area, said she has lived on her property since 1965. She commented in opposition of the project because of the increased traffic, the steepness of the driveway, and increased congestion when the cabins are full.

There were no further comments. Chair Stead closed the public hearing and opened the floor to rebuttal by staff and applicant.

City Planner Abboud explained that Mr. St. Jean will have to get permits from Public Works and approval by DEC for the sewer line utility easement and have a legal connection before any of the structures can be permitted. He concurred with concerns about the speed limit and noted people have attempted to get it lowered in that particular area. The density for the development is legal for this subdivision, and it is next to the infrastructure which the Comprehensive Plan would say is where you would want the development.

Mr. St. Jean commented that work is currently being done to improve the grade of the driveway. He understands this is something new and hard for people to envision, but he doesn't believe it will devalue the property. It will be a clean and well put together project.

In response to questions from Commissioners, Mr. St. Jean said he may consider an onsite manager if he found the right person. He wouldn't consider lowering the number of cabins because what he has proposed fits on the property. The sewer line is stubbed to the lot as shown and the property has been surveyed. Fencing is an option if there is an apparent problem. He explained that the units will be built on pilings, similar to what he did on Kachemak Drive. This area isn't wetlands but excavating for foundations would be detrimental to the land.

BOS/STROOZAS MOVED TO ADOPT STAFF REPORT PL 15-06 AND APPROVE CUP 15-01 AT 2315 EAST END ROAD FOR MORE THAN ONE BUILDING CONTAINING A PERMITTED PRINCIPAL USE ON A LOT, WITH FINDINGS 1 THROUGH 10 AND CONDITIONS 1, 2, AND 3.

Commissioner Bos commented that this project will have to go through the requirements to make it a safe project. Maybe after this is complete the speed can be addressed again. The applicant has been a good steward in other projects he has built.

Commissioner Bradley agrees and sees the need for affordable housing. This project offers a great opportunity and it is a good location for it.

Commissioner Stroozas added that the density of the project complies with code and as long as the conditions are met there is no reason to deny it.

HIGHLAND MOVED TO LOWER THE NUMBER OF CABINS TO SIX.

Motion died for lack of a second.

HIGHLAND MOVED TO REQUEST PRIVACY FENCING ON THE SIDES THAT HAVE RESIDENCES ON IT NOW.

Motion died for lack of a second.

VOTE (Main motion): YES: HIGHLAND, STEAD, STROOZAS, BRADLEY, BOS

Motion carried.

Commissioner Venuti returned to the table.

B. Staff Report PL 15-07, Proposed Ordinance to amend the Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District impervious coverage allowance

City Planner Abboud reviewed the staff report.

Chair Stead re-opened the public hearing.

Kevin Dee, non-resident in the Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District, said he enjoyed the worksession discussion regarding the BCWPD, and agrees that property owners with smaller lots need some relief. He has concerns about the integrity of the watershed as there are many components to maintaining it. He agrees with voting down the ordinance and working on new ideas.

Sue Mauger, Science Director at Cook Inletkeeper and non-resident in the Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District, appreciates the the Commission being thoughtful about making changes to the original ordinances and encouraged them to continue to use caution in considering this area. She explained that if the smaller lots were scattered across the area there would be less concern, but because they are concentrated it changes the dynamic.

Joel Cooper, non-resident in the Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District, appreciates the recommendation to not pass this draft ordinance and encouraged the Commission to continue to look at other options for these property owners.

Bill Smith, non- resident, commented that when developing the current BCWPD as it is in code they looked at a lot of methods using Alaska numbers and chose the high end of the range that was given for impacts. They made allowance for impervious coverage in rights-of-way and roads in the district. True science would take in the roads and driveways that serve the lot and in terms of science you may find the lots are over 10% impervious coverage. He hopes the Commission goes forward with making recommendations to Council because it's important that the community does something for the people we are asking to help protect our water.

Rich Fetterhoff, city resident and owner of a smaller lot in the Kelly Ranch Estates, appreciates the initiative to accommodate property owners. The restrictions imposed on the property owners there are hardships. The total acreage in the subdivision is about 4 acres out of 2,000 or .002%. It's hard to believe that is really going to be detrimental to the watershed. He asked that they continue to consider this.

Lance Prouse, owner of a lot in the watershed district, said he lives on Eagle View because it isn't feasible to build on his lot, which is about 1.5 acres. He appreciates the Commission looking at this and agrees with Mr. Fetterhoff that it's time for some relief up there. He understands the concern and mitigation for runoff and pollutants, having worked on putting the gas line in the area. It is very expensive to do mitigation on the lots up there, it takes hours upon hours of time, and the typical homeowner isn't going to be able to find the financing to hire someone to spend those hours. The land owners don't want to pollute the water, other stop gap measures are in place, and property owner need to be able to use or sell their lots.

There were no further comments and the hearing was closed.

VENUTI/BOS MOVED TO APPROVE THE BRIDGE CREEK WATERSHED PROTECTION DISTRICT DRAFT ORDINANCE.

HIGHLAND MOVED TO AMEND THAT IF THIS IS APPROVED SHE REQUESTS STATE HYDROLOGIST GIVE US A PRESENTATION AND THAT WE ASK THE STATE TO DO SOME ON GROUND WORK WITH THE BRIDGE CREEK WATER SHED.

Motion failed for lack of a second.

STROOZAS/HIGHLAND MOVED TO AMEND THE DRAFT ORDINANCE TO CHANGE FROM 40 GALLONS OF RETAINAGE ON A LOT TO A MINIMUM OF 1000 GALLONS PER LOT.

There was brief discussion to confirm staff agreed with 1000 gallons not 4000 gallons.

VOTE: YES: STROOZAS, HIGHLAND NO: STEAD, BRADLEY, BOS, VENUTI

Motion failed.

Commissioner Venuti commented there has been minimal testimony of making this change. Most of it has been against making a change to the district as it stands. He suggests taking in to consideration information shared by Mr. Smith at the worksession, and approach this differently and try to make some non-zoning incentives to land owners up there.

Commission Highland agreed and said the previous work done on this ordinance was immense and they chose to go conservative because it is our only water source. She likes the idea of incentives and wants to further explore them. She is also interested in seeing what possibilities there are to get funding to purchase some of the property.

Commissioner Bradley also agrees with previous comments and supports the idea of incentives.

Commissioner Stroozas reiterated a comment of the public that we are looking at 4 acres in the entire acreage of 93 lots. It is .0019%. He acknowledged the work that was done in creating the district and this is not going to bring them to a ten percentile figure, the point where engineers and scientists have expressed is where you need to start being concerned. We need to do something to help the lot owners who can't build and can't sell. They are stuck.

Commissioner Bos recognized there has been a lot of testimony relating to water quality and its history. There hasn't been much testimony for it. If we end up moving it along to the city to try to get help for the land owners he would like to say that it shouldn't just be the city taking on the adjustment, it should be everyone getting water from the watershed.

Chair Stead appreciates the previous work that was done. He believes the current studies provided have given them some additional things to look at, but doesn't think it's conclusive or that they have any way to help specify reasonable mitigation methods. He doesn't support this particular ordinance, but they should revamp it.

VOTE (Main motion): YES: STROOZAS NO: BRADLEY, STEAD, VENUTI, HIGHLAND, BOS

Motion failed.

There was brief discussion that the cost causer/cost payer approach of increasing water rates to have funds to offer some sort of relief could be a challenge. It was also noted that the four acres would create a lot of concentration in close proximity to the creek and some sort of unified or subdivision mitigation could address concerns we heard, it just isn't clear what that might look like.

It was further noted the information from Cook Inletkeeper says we should be able to go up to 10% if there are some sort of buffers provided and protect the riparian zones. Hopefully something can be done along those lines so these people can have some relief.

They talked about the state hydrologist for DNR and that our local NRCS people have a lot of information. There could be a way to work with NRCS to sift through what questions should be asked

to be more specific on the direction this should be going. They also touched on different avenues for funding to acquire properties.

Discussion ensued regarding tower height, fall zones, and conditional use. They used the table included in the packet and plugged in the following heights as a starting point for consideration of conditional use:

UR, OSR, CONS, CBD and TC – greater than 60' requires CUP RR and RO – greater than 85' requires CUP MI, MC, GC2, EEMU- greater than 120' requires CUP GC1 - greater than 120' or FAA requirement BCWP (outside city) – greater than 150' requires CUP

No suggestions were made yet on the maximum height.

Commissioner Bos thought it was a good meeting. He commented that nobody wants anything new around their place. He knows a little bit about what was there before, and he thinks this can only be better.

Commissioner Venuti echoed Mr. Bos's comments.

Commissioner Stroozas commented that there is more work yet to come on Bridge Creek, we'll get it precise one of these days and have it done. He will be absent at the next meeting.

Chair Stead said he appreciates everyone's work, it can be tough at times, especially when the audience is full of people.

Adjourn

Land Leases

As noted in my previous report there were letters sent to leases on the spit that had one or more non-compliance issues that needed to be resolved. We have received some responses and are working to resolve the outstanding issues. Unresolved issues will be brought to the council.

Emergency Preparedness

Bob Painter, Fire Chief, is working with the Hospital and the State Emergency preparedness personnel to conduct a large disaster training exercise in March. Bob and/or the hospital staff will provide additional information as the plans are formalized.

Resolution 15-004

The City Council at its last meeting voted to postpone Res 15-004 which would request the legislature re-appropriate \$1,405,000 from the Waddell Way project to the Public Safety Building project.

Staff has reviewed that Resolution and has determined that re-appropriating \$1.2 million will accomplish what is needed for the PS building until October of 2016. The remaining \$200,000 will complete the ROW survey and engineering portion of the project. These projects are bid ready.

Using HART funds the city could then construct a pioneer road that could be finished and paved at a later date. The soils in the area will require some time to compact before a paving project could proceed.

While we are in the midst of the Parks, Arts, Recreation and Culture (PARC) needs assessment, there have been many discussions on possible future funding mechanisms to assist with PARC related programs, services or community center, including the city's own Community Recreation division. One potential idea (in addition to a service area/property tax or a new sales tax option) through the discussions with Recreate REC and the PARC Committee is to look into the idea of reallocating existing sales taxes that the City of Homer already collects.

The specific tax that should deserve a second look is City's HART Fund. The City of Homer voters approved to dedicate 3/4 (.75) of 1% of all Sales tax for the Homer Accelerated Roads and Trails Program. The "HART" program calls for 90% of the revenue to be allocated towards **road** programs and 10% of the annual revenue to be spent on **trails/sidewalks** projects.

With 90% of this .75 sales tax dedicated to Road Projects, the HART Roads reserves has **a current balance of \$6,902,873** as estimated in the FY 2014 budget.

The total HART ROAD (90%) has annually collected with interest:

2012:	\$1,059,830
2013:	\$1,222,088
2014:	\$1,113,701 (projected)
Current balance:	\$6,902,873

With 10% of this .75 sales tax dedicated to Trail Projects, the HART Trail reserves has a current balance of **\$439,787** as estimated in the FY 2014 budget.

The HART TRAILS (10%) has annually collected with interest:

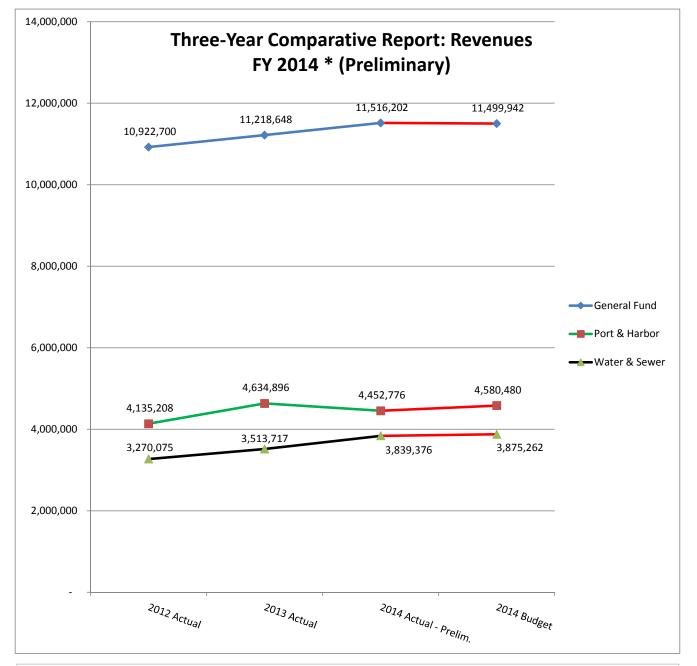

This reallocation proposal is simply informational and requires no action from the city council. It does not detail on exactly how the funds would be budgeted and allocated. This could be a potential funding option question on the upcoming statistically valid survey as part of the PARC needs assessment.

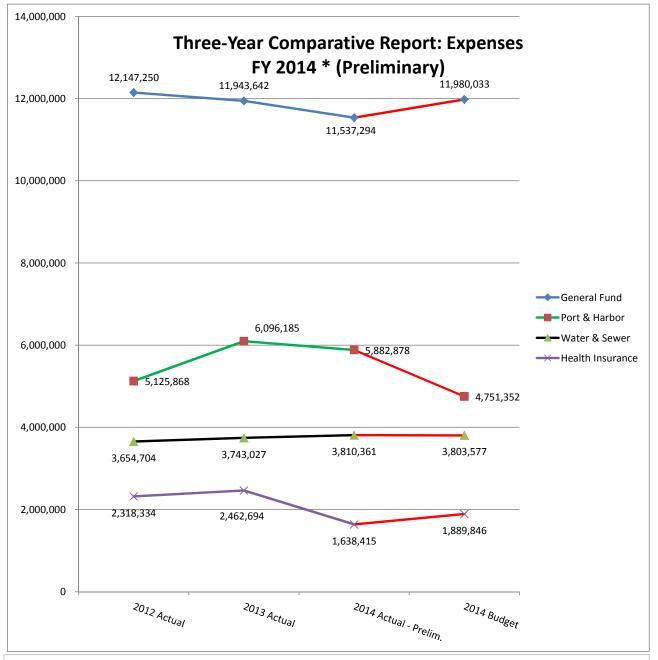
