Please defeat Ordinance 21-63S. This ordinance is at best premature and at worst a sneaky taking of the eligible Enstar customers' Free Main Allowance (valued at nearly \$2M) without their knowledge or consent.

Most eligible Enstar customers are probably unaware of the FMA. According to city memos, the city used \$1,971,808 of collected FMA payments from Enstar plus \$488,137 from the General Fund to cover the early payoff of the borough loan for the gas line. This was a smart use of everyone's dollars. Presumably when all ontime assessments and Enstar FMA payments are received in 2024, or shortly after, both the General Fund and the FMA account will be made whole, or nearly whole, again.

Now is the time to identify eligible Enstar customers and determine what their likely FMA might be. Conduct some outreach and education.

2024 will be the right time to decide whether it is more appropriate to distribute the FMA to the eligible customers or use it for the general benefit of the city.

## **In Recognition of Council Member Heath Smith**

Heath Smith was elected to Homer City Council on November 3, 2015, and reelected for a second term on October 2, 2018. He attendance and service to the citizens of Homer was exemplary.
