Dear Rob:

The Homer Foundation has administered the City of Homer Grants Program since 2000. In that time over \$891,400 has been awarded to local nonprofits to support the programs and services they provide to the community.

A total of \$31,401 was available for distribution in the 2022 funding cycle. This funding included \$25,000 from the city budget line item and earned income from the City of Homer's and the City of Kachemak's endowment funds, which Kachemak City includes each year in the spirit of good neighbors. The total amount is administered under agreement between the City of Homer and the Homer Foundation. Recommendations for awards are at the discretion of the City of Homer Grants Committee.

This year's City of Homer Grants Committee consisted of HF Board of Directors Paul Seaton (chair), Sara Reinert, and Dave Derry, with community members Barb Angaiak, Sarah Banks, Francie Roberts and Mike Pate. All participants adhere to the Homer Foundation's Conflict of Interest Policy. There were no conflicts disclosed.

A total of 14 applications were received and reviewed. The committee's recommendations for the following awards were approved by the Homer Foundation board of trustees at their March 24^{th} board meeting:

It is a difficult task to review organizations with very different missions, but all committee members agreed these nonprofits are high functioning organizations providing valuable programs and services to the community. The committee this year was very impressed by these organizations and the broad services they provide to our community.

Each year, we take the opportunity to compile a synopsis of the economic impact of the nonprofits that have submitted applications. In 2021 these organizations generated over \$7.2 million in revenues, including \$3.2 million in new money coming into Homer from State, Federal and Foundation grants. They also employ 104 full, part-time, and seasonal employees with combined personnel expenses exceeding \$4 million. The data from these organizations help to illustrate just how important Homer's nonprofit sector is as an economic driver in our economy.

During times of economic downturn, the City's continued support is more important than ever by providing important general operating support. These organizations are also able to leverage additional funding with City support. The community benefits because a strong nonprofit community makes Homer a safer, healthier, more vibrant place to live, play, and work.

On behalf of the nonprofit community, the Foundation Board thanks the City of Homer for their continued support for Homer's vital, and economically important nonprofit community.

Homer Spit Parking Challenges

Tourism has significantly increased parking pressure on the Spit over the last several years. This has become very apparent to Spit workers and harbor boat slip holders.

Port and Harbor staff is attempting to mitigate the problem with the planned addition of three new or modified parking areas to be developed this year. This is a good start but there is probably more that could be done, prior to this summer, to increase revenue and reduce parking congestion.

Revenue could be increased by simply changing the

daily paid parking rate from \$5 to \$10. The harbors at Seward and Whittier charge \$10 and \$11 respectively. The maximum number of days allowed for free parking could be reduced from the current 7 day stay to 3 days maximum for vehicles and boat trailers. While allowing a vehicle to occupy a space for 7-day free parking is convenient for that individual, it is a major inconvenience for folks that need a parking space at the harbor on a daily basis. Seward harbor has one parking lot with a 7-day maximum, and six lots that have a 1- or 3-day maximum stay.

An example closer to home, of an efficient parking plan, is the Homer airport. There is a paid lot with a 30-day maximum stay and a free parking lot with no overnight stays allowed. One can easily imagine what a parking nightmare there would be if free 7-day parking was allowed at the airport.

The above fee schedule and parking duration changes could be implemented at limited expense in a very short time frame with existing signage. A couple of stencils and cans of spray paint changing fees and duration would do the job. The public could be informed of the changes through the media and the mobile reader board on the Spit.
