ADERHOLD/VENUTI MOVED TO INTRODUCE ORDINANCE 23-61 AND REFER THE ORDINANCE TO THE PLANNING COMMISSION AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADVISORY COMMISSION.

Council Member Aderhold shared that she pulled this from the consent agenda for discussion and so their comments can be sent on to the Commissions. She shared the background that they've been talking about short term rentals (STR) since their last visioning session in March of 2022. They attempted to work with a company that would help locate the STR's around town, but it wasn't successful. This ordinance is a first step opportunity to get a sense of who's out there and have them receive a permit to operate, similar to what the food trucks have, so we know where they are and that they are collecting taxes due to the city, and to establish a fine structure for non-compliance. There's potential for follow on ordinances in the future, but this is a starting point for next year.

Council Member Lord looks forward to feedback from the Planning Commission and Economic Development Commission to hear their perspectives and also feedback they have based on public comments they receive. She noted this is Title 5 and City Manager Dumouchel added that there will need to be an amendment to Title 21 in the future. Council Member Lord also noted that the \$100 per day fee that a couple members of the public have referenced is in the fine schedule and only a per day fee if they are in violation of this section of code.

Council Member Venuti commented regarding enforcement and potential staff impacts. City Manager Dumouchel responded general permitting will be a function of Administration and any serious health and safety violations will be handled by the Police Department. He also shared about efforts for rebuilding capacity for Planning.

Mayor Castner commented briefly how this relates to business licenses.

VOTE (introduction): NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

a. City Manager's Report

City Manager Dumouchel noted his report in the packet and highlighted upcoming tsunami siren testing, council champion updates, parking and camping reporting, and the upcoming work session about.

They discussed the campground operating report and the feeling there's more to consider there. The campground also operates as a large vessel haul out, and there's tension with the competing interests between the enterprise and general fund. Council values both the campground and the haul out, and recognizes it wouldn't be unreasonable for the enterprise to proposing that the campground go away. It's a Council role to make the decision whether it's a campground or a haul out, and this could be a good opportunity for a work session with Port and Harbor to have the conversation.



b. Roads and Trails Financial Plans

Public Works Director Keiser reviewed proposed projects in the roads financial plan and trails financial plan which are intended to be used as budget planning documents, and responded to questions from Mayor and Council.

PENDING BUSINESS

NEW BUSINESS

 Memorandum CC-23-254 from Council Members Lord and Hansen Re: Harbor Expansion General Investigation Continuation Resolution. (10 minutes)

There was brief discussion that this is provided as follow-up from discussion at their last meeting of the intent to bring back a resolution. The sponsors felt it would be most appropriate to bring it forward at the November 27th meeting when a full council is expected, and the intent of the resolution will be to support moving forward with funding and new development plan. The need for Council to work as a body and a team in conversations with federal and state partners and maintain positive relationships was also addressed.

This was provided as an informational item and no action was taken.

RESOLUTIONS

COMMENTS OF THE AUDIENCE

Scott Adams, city resident, recommended watching the video for the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission meeting regarding discussion on the campground and large vessel haul out. What they want is a budget to run things out there. He has concerns about eliminating camping. He commented about proposals for parking fees increasing to \$25 per day and eliminating the long term parking pass. He explained about his experience at a Florida beach where visitors could use a QR code displayed on signage instead of having to find a parking meter. He also commented about the continued lack of action for clean up at Mattox and East End Road.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY ATTORNEY

City Attorney Gatti had no comments.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY CLERK

City Clerk Jacobsen announced openings on the ADA Advisory Board and Parks Art Recreation and Culture Advisory Commission, and a Student Representative seat on the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY MANAGER

City Manager Dumouchel commented the City is recruiting for Planning staff and Fire Fighters. Information is available on the City website.

COMMENTS OF THE MAYOR

Mayor Castner reiterated that 2024 is the 40th anniversary of the Sister City relationship between Teshio and Homer. He anticipates the Council will be making moves to make it a celebration. He also shared that he was called by a surveyor who's laying out the sewer line to Jack Gist Park, he's pleased that's happening before the ground freezes up.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Council Member Lord loved having the kids a Committee of the Whole and thanked Megumi Beams and all the families for helping get them here. She shared about her experience in Anchorage last week attending the Inter-Tribal Agriculture Council first Alaska Summit and the Alaska Food and Farm Festival. She noted Karen Sonnen, from Homer's Natural Resource Conservation Service office who's the only range land specialist in Alaska who presented on reindeer habitat at the summit, and the many Homer participants at the festival.

Council Member Venuti wished everyone happy Thanksgiving. She shared about the successful Empty Bowls fundraiser for the food pantry where they sold all of the 140 bowls donated by local potters and all the great soups that were donated.

Council Member Aderhold commented she was also in Anchorage last week but didn't bump into anyone from Homer, and she got the last bowl at the Empty Bowls event. She wished everyone happy Thanksgiving.

Council Member Hansen recalled the beginning of the Sister City relationship from when she was a kid, it was amazing. She announced the All Things Recovery bonfire planned at Bishops Beach and emphasized the importance of supporting our sober community and normalizing it.
