- I. **Issue:** The purpose of this Memorandum is to recommend appropriating \$15,000 from the CARMA funds to be applied to the construction funding for the replacement of the sidewalk at the Homer Airport Terminal so a change order can be issued to include replacing the failing pavement in the forklift loading area with a concrete slab.
- **II. Background:** The FY24 Capital Budget includes \$76,175 from the General CARMA Fund to replace the sidewalk at the Homer Airport Terminal, and an additional \$98,714.98 was appropriated in Ordinance 24-12. The replacement sidewalk will have heat piping to keep it ice free and properly constructed ADA handicap ramps.

This additional pavement replacement work is necessary now as the contractor has proposed a price to do the work while he is on site finishing the sidewalk replacement project. It will be much more cost efficient to add this additional work through a change order to the project now than to try and contract it out at a later date.

The cost for the additional repairs is \$11,125 and this request includes an additional \$3,875 for a small contingency.

III. Recommendation: That the City Council appropriate the \$15,000 CARMA funds to the Airport Terminal Sidewalk Replacement Project.

The Parks, Art Recreation & Culture Advisory Commission reviewed the Transportation Plan at their regular meeting on September 19, 2024. Staff facilitated discussion on the following:

- Beluga Lake was misidentified as Lampert Lake
- Lampert Loop was the descriptive used in the document to describe the Lampert Lane and Lambert Lane area
- Recommending roads to be constructed
- Lots of follow-up work is recommended such as a parking study, Identify a priority pedestrian network and develop a plan to build these connections, developing a complete streets policy, etc.
