These proposed amendments are intended to clarify the intent of the ordinance.

1. Line 14, add the bold underlined phrase to the whereas clause:

WHEREAS, The City of Homer adopted the Diamond Creek Recreation Area (DCRA) Plan <u>as a</u> <u>management and development plan for the 273 acres</u> through Resolution 13-055; and

2. Line 13, add a new whereas clause:

WHEREAS, The City of Homer adopted Ordinance 07-03 and accepted ownership of two parcels totaling 273 acres outside the Homer City Limits and in the Diamond Creek area as part of the Forest Legacy Program to keep public park land in perpetuity; and

3. Line 48, add a new whereas clause:

WHEREAS, Using HART Trails funds to purchase a parcel for use as a trailhead for trails in the DCRA Plan is an appropriate use of the funds.

4. Line 70, add the following parenthetical statement after the word "parcel":

(41810 Sterling Hwy, Kenai Peninsula Borough Parcel ID 17302202)

**CITY OF HOMER** 1 2 **HOMER, ALASKA** Aderhold 3 **ORDINANCE 25-44(A)(S)(A)** 4 5 6 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF HOMER, ALASKA 7 APPROPRIATING UP TO \$250,000 FROM THE HOMER ACCELERATED ROADS AND TRAILS (HART) TRAILS FUND FOR THE 8 DEVELOPMENT OF A TRAILHEAD AND TRAIL SEGMENT ON THE 9 EAST SIDE OF THE STERLING HIGHWAY AT GREEN TIMBERS IN 10 ACCORDANCE WITH THE DIAMOND CREEK RECREATION AREA 11 12 TRAILS PLAN. 13 WHEREAS, The City of Homer adopted Ordinance 07-03 and accepted ownership of 14 two parcels totaling 273 acres outside the Homer City limits and in the Diamond Creek 15 area as part of the Forest Legacy Program to ;keep public park land in perpetuity; and 16 17 WHEREAS, The City of Homer adopted the Diamond Creek Recreation Area (DCRA) Plan 18 19 as a management and development plan for the 273 acres through Resolution 13-055; and 20 WHEREAS, The DCRA Plan envisioned a "parking area and trailhead facilities at the 21 western border of the DCRA" (east side of the Sterling Highway near Green Timbers) and a 22 23 "non-motorized route across the Sterling Highway near Mile Post 168, in order to extend the recreational corridor to the Diamond Creek State Recreation Site (DCSRS) on the west side of 24 25 the Sterling Highway"; and 26 27 WHEREAS, The Homer Trails Alliance (HTA), a nonprofit organization with a mission to improve access to trails on the north side of Kachemak Bay, is interested in developing the trail 28 connection between DCRA and DCSRS, including fundraising for the purpose; and 29 30 31 WHEREAS, The Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities (ADOT&PF) is 32 in the final stages of designing the Sterling Highway Milepost 157-169 Reconstruction Project and is considering including a pedestrian underpass at Diamond Creek; and 33 34 35 WHEREAS, The City of Homer has worked with ADOT&PF on methods to accomplish the 36 trail connection and underpass; and 37 38 WHEREAS, ADOT&PF requires a firm commitment from the City of Homer that if they incorporate the underpass into the final highway project design that the trail connection would 39 be constructed, including a financial commitment, a maintenance agreement for the portion 40

of the trail in the right-of-way, as well as the establishment of any required private property

easements to facilitate the trail in advance of the underpass being added to the design; and

41 42 WHEREAS, The Homer City Council has expressed interest in pursuing this trail project through the unanimous passage of numerous resolutions, and recognizes the highway reconstruction project as a once in a generation opportunity to develop an underpass to connect the two recreation areas; and

# WHEREAS, Using HART Trails funds to purchase a parcel for use as a trailhead for trails in the DCRA Plan is an appropriate use of the funds; and

WHEREAS, The routing of the trail from a trailhead at Green Timbers to the underpass at Diamond Creek is uncertain, based on the need for the development of easements across private property or the approval to use ADOT&PF right of way.

### NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF HOMER ORDAINS:

<u>Section 1.</u> The Homer City Council appropriates up to \$250,000 from the Homer Accelerated Roads and Trails (HART) Trails fund for the development of a trailhead and trail segment on the east side of the Sterling Highway from Green Timbers to a pedestrian underpass at Diamond Creek in accordance with the DCRA Trails Plan:

<u>Fund</u>	<u>Description</u>	<u>Amount</u>
165-xxx	HART Trails	\$250,000

### <u>Section 2.</u> Use of the funds is based on the following criteria:

• ADOT&PF constructs **approves** a pedestrian underpass at Diamond Creek as part of their current highway reconstruction project.

• The City of Homer can come to agreement with property owners to create trail easements across their properties and/or with ADOT&PF for the use of the right of way on the east side of the highway.

 The use of the funds must comply with the most current version of the HART Policy Manual approved by the Homer City Council.

• The funds must be used for work on the east side of the Sterling Highway.

 • If the above criteria are met, a portion of the allocated funds may be used to purchase a parcel near Green Timbers that is more amenable to construction of a trailhead than the adjacent city-owned parcel (41810 Sterling Highway, Kenai Peninsula Borough Parcel ID 17302202.

 • If the first two criteria are met, HTA may include the City Council's appropriation of these funds as a match when applying for grants to complete the full trail connecting DCRA and DCSRS.

Mayor Lord and Members of the Council,

I am writing to personally voice my opposition to Ordinance 25-52, which would place before voters on October 7, 2025 a proposition to provide for an increase of 0.3% sales tax for a term of eight years for the purpose of financing the acquisition and construction of a multi-purpose community recreation facility in Homer.

As you know I have gone on record numerous times supporting this project. I believe we need this facility. However, I cannot support a proposition that asks voters to approve it without the basics in place: a confirmed site, a defined plan, and a clear financial strategy. Without those elements you are asking us to vote on blind faith.

This project is too important to rush. Advancing it without those details almost guarantees failure, regardless of the proposed \$8,000 public information campaign. If this measure goes to the voters and fails, we will lose more than a vote: we will lose time, credibility, and momentum.

I urge you not to set this project up for defeat. Pause, complete the necessary due diligence, and present voters with a proposal that is complete, transparent, and ready to succeed. When that occurs, I stand by ready to help.

Hello Rachel, Jason, and Donna-

I am curious about this ordinance as a business owner in the CBD. Are these temporary businesses required to have parking and ADA accessibility like those of us with permanent buildings? I can tell you that parking is at a premium on Pioneer Avenue in the summer and if there are going to be a bunch of tiny businesses popping up, where are their patrons going to park? I love the idea of a walking accessible downtown shopping area, but since we have no city or public parking lots for people to park their vehicles while strolling this pedestrian accessible shopping area...... how does this work?

Also, it seems that the city has a spoken commitment to increasing ADA accessibility. (And we have a long way to go!) Many businesses have done their best to provide access when remodeling, at their own cost. Others have not. This is where I see a temporary shop as different from a food truck. In every food truck I have seen, only employees enter and as long as the surface where the truck is parked is smooth and reasonably level, accessibility is generally

not a problem. If customers are entering these shops, then it is my personal opinion that they need to be following the same accessibility standards as a permanent building. Otherwise we are just perpetuating the current double standard of accessibility only for the able.

I'm also concerned about the allowance of generators. Not a fan of adding to the noise pollution already present by the increasing number of floatplanes and growing traffic. I see that the ordinance does say that noise shall not impede the business of others. But who will enforce that? We have a current sandwich board ordinance in place, and it's pretty clear that there is no enforcement of that when the sidewalks and road edges are routinely blocked both in the CBD and on the Spit. (Also creating accessibility problems and unsafe conditions on the Spit where pedestrians walk into the traffic lane to get around the sandwich boards.)

I agree with Melissa that perhaps this needs to go back to planning and be thought through a bit more. I think it's great to offer an avenue to enter retail in a small way, but I would much prefer to see a planned area (maybe adjacent to the new rec center?) where shops could be clustered, and electrical hookups could be offered to minimize noise pollution and parking is available on site.

Our town is growing by leaps and bounds. I think planing and wise growth will keep it a spot tourists love to visit, and where people can live and raise families.

Thanks for your time and all the effort you put in to make our town a safe and livable place!
