


SUBJECT: HART Finances

The purpose of this memo is to provide the Council with information on funds from HART that are currently being redirected to General Fund, potential future anticipated need for HART funds, and facilitate a conversation on the possibility of requesting a permanent suspension of a portion of HART from voters.

2017 sales tax value

(HART is .75% with 10% of that value going to HART Trails)

What would the 2017 budget have looked like without the suspension of HART? *\$350,000 operating budget deficit*

Without the suspension of HART for the 2017 budget, the City would be \$1.1m short for the current General Fund budget, \$350,000 of which represents operating budget needs alone (\$750,000 represents non-mandatory transfers to reserves). This number takes into account the overhead charges that previously went into the General Fund.

What if only a portion (3/4) of HART was redirected to General Fund? *\$500,000 transfer to reserves in 2017 budget*

For example, during the 2017 budget if the voters had retained .25% sales tax to HART and allowed .5% to be redirected to General Fund (\$850,000), we would have covered our operating budget needs (\$350,000) and been able to allocate \$500,000 to reserves.

How do we know what our future budget needs will be? *\$500,000-\$1m*

That is a difficult question as there are so many variables at play: for example, continued cost shifting from the State to municipalities and increased costs/inflation. We have already tackled low hanging fruit like

renegotiating our insurance contract, attorney contract, and trimming 6 positions in the 2016 budget cycle. I believe by 2019 we will need between \$500,000 and \$1m in revenue to replace HART to avoid a reduction in City services. This estimate is a snapshot and anticipates continued growth in taxable sales, a lean status quo operating budget, no new major projects that increase maintenance costs, and limited funding of reserves. It will undoubtedly change over time and with more information.

How do we know what the future demands on HART are? \$500,000/yr

Future demands will depend on available budget, and the City may have to say no to large infrastructure projects if the funding is not available. The current unencumbered HART Roads balance is \$5.2m. Staff analyzed historical use of HART over the last 5 years, both by the City and by SADs and came up with an annual average encumbrance of City funds of \$546,228. Based on the historical success of SADs and future anticipated City project needs (slip lining and repaving, for example) the average annual encumbrance of HART City funds is \$504,306. See the attached chart for more information.

Do we still need HART?

The City uses these funds for major road improvement projects such as storm drain rehabilitation and repaving. HART is also used for new construction, such as Waddell Way and Greatland Street.

The SAD Roads program offers an important avenue for citizens to organize and improve their roads. Without this venue, complaints could go directly to Council with no official way of obtaining neighborhood buy in.



There is pressure for expansion of HART (sidewalks, maintenance, etc.). See Memorandum 17-028 from Deputy City Planner Engebretsen. The policy recommendations contained in the memo need to be taken up at a future date by Council. I recommend scheduling a work session to discuss HART policy questions.

Recommendation?

Discuss asking voters for a permanent redirection of a portion of HART. A starting point is .5% of sales tax to General Fund (\$856,047) and .25% to HART (\$428,023 with \$42,802 going to trails).







AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF HOMER, ALASKA, AUTHORIZING AN EXPENDITURE OF \$359,800 (\$67,860 FROM THE WATER/SEWER RESERVE AND \$291,940 FROM THE HOMER ACCELERATED ROADS AND TRAILS PROGRAM (HART) FOR THE PURPOSE OF COMPLETING THE DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION OF SOUNDVIEW AVENUE /WOODARD CREEK CROSSING IMPROVEMENT.

WHEREAS, The sewer main on Soundview Avenue at Woodard Creek has settled and needs to be repaired (described in a Memorandum 10-36 from Public Works); and

WHEREAS, The Woodard Creek culvert at Soundview conflicts with the needed sewer repair and needs to be removed and replaced; and

WHEREAS, Public Works recommends that the existing Woodard Creek culvert be replaced with a bridge type structure (described in Memorandum 11-022 from Public Works); and

WHEREAS, The cost of the design and construction of the recommended new creek crossing improvement (including the repair of the sewer main and replacement of the water main) is estimated to be \$359,800.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF HOMER ORDAINS:

Section 1. The Homer City Council hereby authorizes \$359,800 to be expended for the design and construction of the Soundview Avenue/Woodard Creek Crossing Improvement from the accounts described below:

23 WHEREAS, The City of Homer has identified port and harbor activities as a substantial
24 contributor to the economic viability of our community; and

25
26 WHEREAS, The City of Homer has also identified, through the Climate Action Plan, a
27 desire to support the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions in a variety of ways including the
28 use of tidal energy; and

29
30 WHEREAS, More research is required in the area of viable tidal energy in order to obtain
31 this objective; and

32
33 WHEREAS, There are a variety of low-cost projects recommended for inclusion in the
34 2013 – 2018 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) which will meet both the objective of tidal power
35 and support of the port and harbor industry in Homer; and

36
37 WHEREAS, The City of Homer has designated income to the Homer Accelerated Roads
38 and Trails (HART) Fund through the collection of sales taxes for the purpose of road
39 improvements; and

41 WHEREAS, Both the re-pavement of the Fish Dock Road and the upgrade to the Outer
42 Fish Dock Road are proposed for inclusion in the CIP but also qualify for funding through the
43 HART Fund; and

45 WHEREAS, The collective cost of these two projects is estimated to be \$212,270, which
46 is an amount easily covered through the HART Fund; and

49 economy of the community and that there is potential for the proposed Homer Tidal Incubator
50 Project to generate local jobs in addition to providing for a needed research location; and



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

AN ORDINANCE OF THE HOMER CITY COUNCIL AMENDING THE FY 2015 OPERATING BUDGET BY APPROPRIATING A 25% MATCH TO THE WADDELL ROAD IMPROVEMENT LEGISLATIVE GRANT IN THE AMOUNT OF \$357,500 FROM THE HOMER ACCELERATED ROADS AND TRAIL PROGRAM (HART) FUND; AUTHORIZING THE PURCHASE OF THE WADDELL PROPERTY IN SUPPORT OF THE WADDELL ROAD IMPROVEMENT PROJECT; AND AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE ALL APPROPRIATE DOCUMENTS.

WHEREAS, The City Council accepted and appropriated a Legislative Grant (Ordinance 14-42(S)) in the amount of \$1,430,000 for the Waddell Road Improvements; and

WHEREAS, The grant covers design, utilities, property acquisition, and construction costs for the Waddell Road Improvement project; and

WHEREAS, The grant application indicated that a 25% match from the Homer Accelerated Road and Trail Fund would be provided to facilitate the completion of the road project; and

WHEREAS, The project requires the purchase of Tract 2-A Waddell Park Subdivision 1985 Replat, referred to herein as the Waddell property (see Memorandum 15-134); and

WHEREAS, The property was been determined by appraisal to have a value of \$855,000; and

WHEREAS, The aforementioned legislative grant will cover 75% (\$641,250) and the City match will cover 25% (\$213,750) of the cost of the property purchase; and

WHEREAS, The funds generated from the sale of the remaining parcel and the cabins will be distributed back into the grant project account and the HART Fund in generally the same proportions.

HART Policy Manual Review Tasks

The City Council requested the Planning Commission review the Homer Accelerated Roads and Trails (HART) policy manual. The assigned tasks from Council were:

1. Update and improve the organization and readability of the HART Policy Manual
2. Make HART policies as consistent as possible with HAWSP policies
3. Review project eligibility
4. Provide for funding of SAD's for sidewalks w HART funds
5. Develop a matching grant program for trails.

Additionally, the City Manager requested that the calculation for the 1.25 debt ratio be described.

Work Completed

Task 1: Readability

Staff has removed duplicate information and things that are spelled out in code. This document was first written circa 1987, and there have been a lot of code amendments since then! Any items that are spelled out in code or other adopted city documents have been removed.

Task 2: Consistency between manuals. Staff has formatted the manuals and revised the wording so they are more consistent.

Task 3: Review Project Eligibility. (See new section, Page 2 Section D)

There appears to be a need for funding major patch jobs that are outside the scope of the operating budget, but are lesser than a total road rebuild that requires a Special Assessment District. To be clear, HART funds cannot be used for routine maintenance, like ditch cleaning or grading. In 2015, the City Council authorized \$30,000, with an additional \$7,000 in matching funds to do patch repairs to annexed roads on the hill – Fireweed Ave and Cottonwood Lane (Ordinance 15-10 (S)). There was not enough land owner support for a full road SAD. The HAPC struggled with this use of HART funds and feels that City funding for road maintenance in general is inadequate. However, the Fireweed-Cottonwood reconstruction project is outside the scope of the operating budget and the HART SAD process has traditionally filled the need for major road reconstruction projects. Staff recommends

revising the manual to include more detail on eligible projects. With increased pressure on HART for major road reconstruction and repair, Council may want to consider requesting more definitive language from the voters.

Task 4: Provide for funding of SAD’s for sidewalks with HART funds.

Staff researched other community sidewalk policies and found that some have a required property owner match, but it’s capped at \$2,000. City costs are capped at \$15,000 per lot. Our Homer costs are significantly higher. Additionally, a community may have a sidewalk plan, or a prioritization of sidewalk improvements. This focuses where new sidewalks should be constructed. The Homer Non-motorized Transportation and Trails Plan does a nice job of mapping where our community improvements are desired, and also states that special populations are of importance to our community. The HAPC supports using the HNMTTP as a guide for when HART funds will be used on sidewalks. THE HAPC did not support capping the property owner assessment for sidewalk construction.

New Section: *“E. Sidewalks. To use HART funds, projects must be mapped as either sidewalks, paved shoulders or separated pathways, or directly serve the special populations discussed in sections 3.1 and 3.2 of the HNMTTP. Effort will be made to find grants or non-city funding sources to match city construction funds, whenever possible.”*

Task 5: Develop a matching grant program for trails.

Currently, there is about \$600,000 of trail money available. The city has had some success in building trails (Reber Trail), but generally, we don’t have the staff to plan and construct trails, despite the community desire for them. The fund has grown by \$100,000 a year as taxes are collected but we’re not building trails. Homer citizens have responded by suggesting a small grant program. Citizens apply for funds to build trails – think neighborhood groups, youth groups, scouts etc. These would be projects that don’t require heavy equipment and would not require a lot of engineering. The Calhoun Trail is a good example. Trail builders would leverage volunteer labor, fundraising, and city funds to build new trails.

Julie Engebretsen worked with the Parks, Recreation Arts and Culture Advisory Commission (PARCAC) and the local ad-hoc trails group on a grant process. Within the HART Manual, things have been kept very simple. On page 3 of the Manual, it states “C. Citizens may work with the City Administration to use HART funds to construct public trails.” Also, the availability of volunteer efforts or matching funds can be considered when the City is selecting trail projects. The details of this program will be worked out administratively, with the City Council approving funds for projects via ordinance. A sample grant application, and scoring sheet are attached.

Task 6: 1.25 Debt Service Ratio. Staff recommends and the HAPC agreed that this provision should be removed. First, the City pays cash for HART projects because there is a fund balance. Second, this program is only authorized through 2027. The city will not be able to collect sales tax to pay any debt payment after this date (unless voters extend the program).

Further comments from HAPC:

- Recommend codifying conservation easement exemptions and project payment mechanism
- Request legal review of 17.04.180(a) – is it still valid and current regulation? (Pertains to lots with double frontage).

Staff Recommendations:

1. Adopt a resolution adopting the revised HART Policy Manual.
2. Request staff draft an ordinance codifying conservation easement exemptions and project payment mechanism
3. Request legal review of 17.04.180(a) – is it still valid and current regulation? (Pertains to lots with double frontage).

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of the HART program is to pay for reconstructing substandard city roads, upgrading existing roads, and constructing new streets and non-motorized trails. The intent of the program is to reduce maintenance costs, improve access, increase property values and improve the quality of life. State maintained roads are not part of this program. The program is funded by a voter approved dedicated sales tax, and assessments levied on adjacent benefited properties

II. DEFINITIONS

- A. Sidewalk- the term “sidewalk” means a pedestrian facility associated with a road and generally within a street right of way
- B. Trail – a pedestrian facility detached from a road, or not within a street right of way
- C. Fund Balance - is the unreserved fund balance that is not allocated to pay the city portion of a project
- D. HAPC – Homer Advisory Planning Commission
- E. Homer Non-Motorized Transportation and Trail Plan (HNMTTP) – a document that is an adopted part of the City of Homer Comprehensive Plan
- F. 2005 Homer Area Transportation Plan (Transportation Plan) – a document that is an adopted part of the City of Homer Comprehensive Plan

III. ROAD QUALIFYING AND PROJECT CRITERIA

To be eligible for HART funds, roads and projects must meet the qualifying criteria below.

- A. Qualifying Criteria for Existing Roads. HART fund may be used on existing roads that meet one or more of the following criteria:
 - 1. Road has been accepted for city maintenance.

2. Right of way was dedicated prior to March 14, 1987 (Ord. 87-6(s)).
 3. Right of way was dedicated prior to being annexed into the City.
- B. Qualifying Criteria for New Roads. HART funds may be used for new roads when one or both of the following criteria are met:
1. The City owns the property wherein the road is to be constructed.
 2. The construction project benefits the entire City.
- C. Project Criteria. The following criteria may be considered for using HART funds:
1. Project is listed in the 2005 Homer Transportation Plan or furthers a stated goal of that plan.
 2. HART funds may be used in accordance with Title 11.04.05, to pay to the developer the cost difference between the required street and the proposed street.
 3. Improves life, safety and traffic flow
 4. Corrects deficiencies of existing systems
 5. Completes traffic circulation pattern
 6. Encourages economic development
 7. Corrects drainage problems
 8. Reduces maintenance costs
 9. Other factors deemed appropriate by the City Council
- D. Use of HART funding for major repairs. HART funds may be used for major eligible road and drainage repairs that are beyond the scope of routine maintenance. The use of the SAD process and property owner participation is preferred. However there may be situations in which a section of road may be repaired to a reasonable level of service without the expense of a complete rebuild.
- E. Sidewalks. To use HART funds, projects must be mapped as either sidewalks, paved shoulders or separated pathways, or directly serve the special populations discussed in sections 3.1 and 3.2 of the HNMTTP. Effort will be made to find grants or non-city funding sources to match city construction funds, whenever possible.

IV. TRAILS QUALIFYING AND PROJECT SELECTION CRITERIA

To be eligible for funding, trails must be located within trail easements or within the boundaries of municipal lands that will be held in perpetuity for public use. The goal is to avoid building trails across lands that could become privatized and result in the loss of public access. An exception to this is the use of trail funds to construct short term trails within platted rights of way. Trails within rights of way should benefit the community circulation system and be low cost, since trails will likely become part of the road when the right of way is developed.

- A. New local non-motorized trails shall be prioritized according to the following:
 - 1. Project is listed in the HNMTTP or furthers a stated goal of that plan
 - 2. Solves a safety concern
 - 3. Creates connectivity to existing trail(s), completes pattern or provides access to a point of interest
 - 4. Protects an established trail
 - 5. Creates or improves a trailhead
 - 6. Has significant scenic or aesthetic value
 - 7. Existence or potential for contributing funds or volunteer efforts
 - 8. Property owner participation

- B. Trail Project Selection Criteria. The Homer Advisory Planning Commission and Parks Art, Recreation and Culture Advisory Commission will review the trail priority list during the bi-annual review of the HART. The list will be presented in a memorandum from staff, and will contain a mix of large and small projects. Generally it will include up to five trail projects that staff has reviewed and found ready for preliminary work. Trails on this list are planned for construction in the near term (one to three year timeframe). Staff will actively work to prepare those projects for construction.

- C. Volunteer Projects. Citizens may work with the City Administration to use HART funds to construct public trails.

- D. Developer Cost Sharing. When a developer builds a trail as part of a new subdivision, HART funds may be used to reimburse up to 25% of trail construction costs.

V. FINANCING and ASSESSMENTS

This program is funded by a dedicated sales tax of up to three quarters of one percent (¾%), and the collection of assessment payments due from completed projects. The tax will be collected for up to twenty years expiring December 31, 2027, as approved by voters. Roads are allocated 90% of the annual revenue, and trails are allocated 10%. Expenditures under the HART program are subject to the availability of funds.

1. Sidewalks shall be paid for out of road funds, and trails shall be paid for out of trail funds.
2. HART funds may be used to leverage outside funds for New Local Roads and Trails.
3. New local trails may be constructed using 100% program funds.
4. When additional right-of-way is required, acquisition costs will be paid by this program, at no additional cost to abutting property owners.
5. Interest, if any, generated from the program will remain with the program funds.
6. This program includes paving driveway aprons on contracts funded by HART.
7. Abutting property owners will share the cost of upgrading a street by paying the cost sharing specified in the fee schedule as adopted in the year the project or special assessment district was initiated.
8. Lots having a frontage on two parallel streets, or flag lots having a frontage on two perpendicular streets, are exempt from a double front footage assessment unless actually accessing the lot from both streets either prior to or after reconstruction and/or paving Deferred Assessment Agreement Required pursuant to HCC 17.04.180.
9. The City will pay all costs for any additional improvements required when deemed necessary by the City.
10. Other improvements requested by the benefited property owners will be paid by those same property owners.
11. City share can apply to related utilities, sidewalks, street lighting, drainage, paving and/or reconstruction of roads identified on the road maintenance map.

VI. UTILITIES

1. Prior to street reconstruction, necessary related non-existing water and sewer improvements shall be encouraged whenever possible.
2. Water and Sewer utility extensions necessary to extend the utilities short distances beyond a construction area will be paid for by the program.
3. Water and sewer utility relocations directly caused by reconstruction will be paid for by HART funds.
4. Water and sewer utility upgrades necessary for future capacity that are done concurrently with reconstruction and/or paving will be paid for by the utility fund.
5. The City shall recover from the property owner the cost of construction of City-provided sewer and water service connections by including the cost of construction of such connections in the service connection fee established under HCC Chapter 14.13. Costs will be recouped from benefiting property owners through deferred assessments. The Finance Department will maintain a listing of these deferred sewer and/or water service connection fees.
7. Whenever practical streetlights shall be included in the construction of new local roads and shall be paid by HART funds. Property owners participating in a road reconstruction and/or paving Special Assessment District may request streetlights. If the project is deemed feasible, the property owners shall be

assessed for the installation of the streetlights on an equal share per parcel methodology. Property owner approval of the street light assessment shall follow the process in HCC 17.04. Once constructed, the City will absorb the utility billing for the street light(s).

VII. SPECIAL PROVISIONS

1. The Homer Advisory Planning Commission shall review the criteria for the H.A.R.T. program bi-annually, with recommendations reported to the Homer City Council.
2. The City Council shall review the HART fund on an annual basis during the third quarter.
3. Pedestrian amenities shall be included in all new road projects unless exempted by the City Council.
4. Funds may be used to finance projects where property owners pay 100% of the costs. Subject to City Council approval.
5. The City Council may exempt lands from assessment if the land will not be developed due to a conservation easement, or if the land is owned by a conservation organization that holds the land for public purpose or for habitat protection.

VISITORS

A. MAPP Steering Committee, Update on Community Needs Assessment, 10 minutes.

Hannah Gufstason, Mobilizing Action through Partnership and Planning (MAPP) Committee Coordinator, provided the most recent results of the community needs assessment. MAPP's vision is a proactive, resilient, and innovative community. Great strides have been made over the last eight years with the entities involved.

MAPP has utilized a national template comprised of four sets of assessments: community themes and strengths, local public health system, community health status, and forces of change.

Community themes and strengths: People see the top reasons and strengths of the community as natural beauty and people helping each other. Schools and cultural and arts opportunities are often listed. New to the list this time is recreational opportunities. Most negatively affecting people and the community are physical health, economic costs, and mental and emotional health. Substance abuse is the number one item negatively affecting the community.

Local public health: People see schools, churches, city planners, and elected officials attributing to a positive local public health.

Community health status: Demographics, leading causes of death, and family well-being are tracked. It is hoped that the goal to reduce the number of Alaskans experiencing poor mental health will be met.

Forces of change: Allowing us to better anticipate change, increase our agility and to raise awareness factors that are often out of our control are all forces. These things include politics, legislation, technology, the economy, and the environment.

A. Borough Report

Kenai Peninsula Borough Assembly President Kelly Cooper provided a report on the Assembly's business. The MAPP program is so well done that Ms. Cooper has provided the school board members their program to review health improvements.

The Assembly has received a Borough efficiencies report. Administration continues to reduce costs and improve efficiencies. There is an estimated savings of \$999,000 which is a combination of a one-time savings of \$592,000 and an annual savings of \$406,000. This was achieved by refinancing South Peninsula Hospital's current bonds for a savings of \$325,000, a fleet reduction to Central Emergency Services for a savings of \$200,000, consolidation of capital projects and purchasing for a savings of \$351,000 annually, publishing the assembly agenda online, converting the annual auction to an online product, and consolidating cell phone service and other improvements.

The Assembly had three turnovers mid-term. Gary Knopp was elected to the State Legislature and his seat was replaced in January. The Assembly will be replacing Glen Gilman's seat at the February 14th meeting and Brandi Holmdahl's seat in March. They both moved out of their districts. The appointments will be for the remainder of this year and then the three seats will run for election in the fall.

The Assembly has completed their state capital project priorities for 2017. Although there will be no capital funding, it is important to stay on top of the needs in the community. As a member of the Alaska Municipal League Board of Directors, President Cooper receives notice of federal grants when they become available. There is \$252M in grants available to fund broadband and underserved rural areas. The information is available on Senator Murkowski's website.

Lastly, the Assembly has begun their budget process. Departments will begin presenting to them in the upcoming months. This week she and Assemblyman Dunn met with the Chamber's Legislative Committee.

Opening up the auto uses in the entire Marine Industrial District will avoid spot zoning. Reference was made to Frank Griswold’s comments on spot zoning. In the 1992 court case, Griswold vs. City of Homer, the plaintiff prevailed because a council member did not recuse themselves from voting on a zoning change when he owned land there. Council supports helping the Homer Hockey Association, but wants to avoid spot zoning. The Planning Commission will review the ordinance and then it will go to the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission.

Council expressed consensus on not allowing auto repair work and keeping all other uses temporary. The ordinance also needs to be sensitive to auto rental businesses so it does not undermine the people that have built businesses over the years.

City Planner Abboud expressed appreciation to the Council for providing their input to pass on to the Planning Commission.

LEWIS/REYNOLDS - SO MOVED.

There are three different plans for the extension. Council heard from citizens who support Option A. When the Transportation Committee was active they recommended Option C.

LEWIS/STROOZAS - MOVED TO AMEND TO CHANGE OPTION C TO OPTION A AND JUST DO THE STRAIGHT LINE AND IN THE LONG RUN IT WOULD BE CHEAPER.

Councilmember Aderhold would like to see the Planning Commission evaluate each of the options and come back to us with a recommendation.

Public Works Director Meyer said at first glance Option A that uses the existing right-of-way seems to be the appropriate action. The Transportation Plan approved by Council in 2005 suggests Homer could use another east/west corridor. Part of that was constructed this last summer with the Waddell portion. Many of the intersections are not planned well; there are quite a few that are not at 90 degree angles. Option B is in conformance with the Transportation Plan and Option C is a compromise between the two. The Transportation Plan called for the connection to Bartlett Street. The extension of Greatland Street up to Pioneer Avenue creates a weird alignment on the intersection. Greatland Street on the other side of Pioneer Avenue has already been vacated. Option C is a compromise that will make a connection to Pioneer Avenue and will allow for future construction in compliance with the Transportation Plan.

Council discussed the options and offered the following comments: Option A maximizes the usability of the lots which increases land values and property taxes. At the four-way stop at Main Street there is already consternation with the large rigs that have to stop in the winter and traction up to get through the intersection. A straight line would be more efficient to plow. Both directions of Greatland could be right hand turn only. Option A loses less green space and trees. Option A is also the least expensive at a \$300,000 savings from Option C. Option A is not compliant with the Transportation Plan.

Public Works Director Meyer noted there is a short, relatively steep grade from Greatland Street before reaching Pioneer Avenue. The road will still meet the design criteria manual that has a maximum grade of 6%, but provides up to 15% grade for short sections away from intersections. Water and sewer service already runs along Greatland Street. The plan is to have a sidewalk from the Bypass to Pioneer Avenue with curb and gutter and sidewalks on both sides.

City Manager Koester advised Council Option A has multiple property owners and would require a special assessment district. Council would need to initiate it by resolution. She suggested Council include the three options to allow the Planning Commission to have the conversation. If their recommendation comes back as Option A we will then need to proceed with a special assessment district. Adding a whereas clause to the ordinance for Council's preference to Option A was suggested.

VOTE: (amendment) YES. REYNOLDS, LEWIS, STROOZAS, SMITH, ERICKSON

VOTE: NO. ADERHOLD

Motion carried.

Councilmember Aderhold commented there should be the option for the Planning Commission to review all options. There should also be a chance for the public to weigh in. It is a project that will affect everyone in the city.

Councilmember Stroozas noted when the Transportation Plan was put into force in 2005 the state coffers were full of money. We had no issues with money and could get state funding on projects. Times have changed. Here's an opportunity to meet our objective and build this road and save \$300,000.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

A. City Manager's Report

Industry Forum Travel Report

I, along with other City staff, a representative of the EDC and Mayor Zak, attended the 2017 Industry Outlook Forum on the 11th in Kenai. It was an informative update on the industries that make the Peninsula economy tick including oil and gas, tourism, health care and commercial fishing. Presentations can be found at the Kenai Peninsula Economic Development District website <https://kpedd.org/>

Seawall Report

The attached letter was sent to property owners along the Ocean Drive Seawall updating them on the maintenance procedures and finances of the seawall. As you recall, the City Council established a separate mill rate (special service area) for the purpose of funding maintenance to the seawall. The City also contributes \$10,000 a year to a seawall reserve account. It is my intention to update property owners annually with a maintenance and finance report. It is evident when researching the history of the Seawall that the property owners would benefit from a homeowner's association. This would give them more control over maintenance of the wall and how their tax dollars are spent, a unified voice when communicating with government entities and the ability to insure the infrastructure. I have also attached an impactful picture of the Seawall during a storm that highlights the power of the ocean.

Assistant Fire Chief Update

The hiring climate proved difficult the first round in our search for an Assistant Fire Chief. The City of Homer and KESA both had jobs posted (KESA, for a Deputy Chief) during the same recruitment period. The City re-posted the Assistant Chief position after an unsuccessful search for the right candidate, and KESA fell into the same position. Our original posting was from September 29 – November 13, with 13 candidates applying for the position. The top two candidates were invited to attend in-person interviews scheduled for January. However, one candidate decided against leaving his current job, and the other was offered another position. The position was re-advertised, and does not close until February 7. The hiring committee will meet on February 9 to go over applications, following up with essay questions for the most qualified applicants and Skype interviews. Face to face interviews, a meet and greet with the volunteers, and an instructional component will take place in a two-day process scheduled for mid to late March.

Electronic Monitoring at Homer Jail

The Alaska Department of Corrections is working with the City to install electronic monitoring capabilities at the Homer Jail. The main purpose of electronic monitoring is to reduce the number of people in our jails. Studies have shown that non-violent offenders do better in electronic monitoring programs. They are less likely to have employment related problems and are not any more likely to reoffend. Electronic monitoring will initially be offered to 1st time DUI's. The program may be extended in the future to include other pre-trial cases involving non-violent, first time offenders. Electronic monitoring is court ordered home confinement. The State will provide the required equipment and training. HPD will be able to attach ankle devices to the subjects and then monitor their location via GPS signals. The system will alarm if the subject leaves a defined area resulting in an officer responding to investigate and a possible arrest. The City will be helping the State by reducing the amount of utilized bed space, which lowers costs. At this point we do not have a timeline for implementation, but are in contact with the DOC.

Hickerson Cemetery Update

Public Works is incorporating comments on this project received during Planning Commission public meetings. The final plan will be presented to the Planning Commission in February. Below is the schedule for completion of the project:

Barge Mooring Facility

Good news: the State recently approved the City's request to transfer capital project funds originally allocated to the Sheet Pile Loading Dock to the Barge Mooring Facility. Council authorized this reallocation request as part of the 2017-2022 CIP update. The City will utilize the remaining Sheet Pile Loading Dock design funds to reach final design of the Barge Mooring Facility, a port project that will improve service to the same fleet that would have benefitted from the Sheet Pile Loading Dock had it proved feasible. We look forward to moving ahead with the Barge Mooring Facility which will provide safe moorage in the harbor's tidal zone and a haul out ramp to access an uplands repair facility, an associated project prioritized in the 2017-2022 CIP for a Legislative request. The Barge Mooring Facility and Haul Out Repair Facility will offer improved services to large vessel owners and will attract additional business to the community.

Legislative Worksessions

The 30th Alaska State Legislature gaveled in on January 17th marking the beginning of a fast paced legislative session with many weighty issues facing the State. The Homer City Council

has decided to take a more personal and proactive role in interacting with Juneau. Many members of the Council expressed an interest in closely following Juneau when I asked about it at the November 21, 2016 meeting. The best way I can come up with for all members to participate and provide timely input to the legislature would be to form a weekly standing worksession that can easily be cancelled when things are slow in Juneau. A standing worksession would be open to the public and advertised as “Issues before the Alaska Legislature including:”

- Revenue Sharing
- PERS/TRS and the Unfunded Liability
- Fiscal Policy
- Revenue measures new taxes (sales tax, income tax, etc.)
- State of Alaska Operating Budget
- Transportation
- Public Safety

Items can be added to the list as appropriate. Members would update each other on the issues they have been following, delegate tasks such as testifying before the legislature and decide on which issues need to come before City Council at a regular meeting for a position statement of the City. A worksession would be a transparent way to quickly confer and organize next steps. I propose meeting at 4 pm on Tuesday so items can be added to the next council agenda if needed. Using the conference room and encouraging telephonic participation by members will help keep things moving quickly, allow for the group to reach a quorum, and hopefully not interfere too much with your busy schedules. I propose the first meeting February 7 at 4 pm. This meeting will be used to plan for the trip to Juneau on the 21st.

Council discussed the plan for the council Worksessions to track the legislative session. The Worksessions will be held each Tuesday at 4:00 p.m. Council will be allowed to participate by phone, creating less impact for all. With full council participation, topics can be divvyed up and reports made at the meetings.

Upon the suggestion of Mayor Zak, there is now a customer feedback postcard available at city offices wherever the public interacts. Council would like to review the plans for the expansion of Hickerson Memorial Cemetery to try to make it more affordable for people purchasing plots. Council asked that the Police Chief look at costs of implementing electronic monitoring. Then councilmembers that travel to Juneau can talk to relevant people about increasing the public safety appropriation or restructuring services. Council commended City Manager Koester for her report to Ocean Drive Loop Special Service District (seawall) owners. City Manager shared the kudos with city staff who were instrumental in putting the report together.

Holly Wells reported on Griswold vs. City of Homer, one of the three appeals brought to the Superior Court in 2015 and 2016. The City prevailed and final judgment has been issued. To date it has not been appealed to the Alaska Supreme Court. The other two Griswold vs. City of Homer cases where the City prevailed are before the Supreme Court on appeal.

Councilmember Aderhold reported the committee met last week to recap their mission: self-evaluating the City's practices and policies for compliance with ADA, establishing a transition plan for city facilities, and development of a grievance procedure. They reviewed correspondence from David Barton of Northwest ADA on developing a transition plan. David has an interest in providing training for the committee and volunteers. The committee will recommend a contract with Northwest ADA to prepare a transition plan. Council will see that soon. Additionally, the committee reviewed the provisions to the City's special event application to be compliant with ADA.

Mayor Zak called for a motion for the approval of the recommendations of Memorandum 17-017 to refer to the Planning Commission.

LEWIS/REYNOLDS - SO MOVED.

Council concurred of the need for temporary shelter for people from the inclement weather. Additionally, agencies could help by setting parameters and helping people move towards a resolution to their homeless situation. The intent is to open zoning for temporary shelters, at the same time refraining from becoming a destination for homeless people. People will need to be working towards helping themselves.

City Planner Abboud said the first step is a shelter from immediate harm. There are ten-year plans sponsored by federal agencies to help eliminate homeless. Some of the bigger issues are the transitional housing. He is committed to working with the agencies and will gather more information as to who is willing to participate.

VOTE: YES. NON OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

- B. **Memorandum 17-018** from Acting Finance Director, Re: Waiver of Penalties for Natural Gas Distribution Special Assessment.

LEWIS/REYNOLDS - MOVED TO MOVE CHRISTOPHER ROBINSON 17405119 UP TO SECTION ONE
– APPROVED.

Council has not reviewed the requests for waivers, the recommendations before them are from staff. Resolution 16-079(S)(A) recommends penalties be waived for exceptional circumstances.

City Attorney Wells advised Council there is a process in place for waivers. Council has testimony from one individual through public comment, but doesn't have it from others. It is best to have the Acting Finance Director look at the evidence and make recommendations. Otherwise it is difficult to draw the legislative versus quasi-judicial line. Council should follow the process in place for waivers.

City Manager Koester told Council Mr. Robinson provided detailed and thorough information to the finance department and contacted her personally. His request for abatement does not meet the set of requirements in Resolution 16-079(S)(A). It has been difficult for staff as there are a strict set of requirements for waivers of penalties. She doesn't believe we can come back with a different recommendation, but Council may review the applications at the City Clerk's office. Applications for waivers are not included in the council packet as to keep the applicants' information private. City Manager Koester suggested Council take a moment to review all applications so that it is done in a fair and consistent manner.

Councilmember Lewis commented if the other individuals felt their application was turned down unjustly they would have been here. Mr. Robinson has come to us. Since most people go through realtors and the title companies for purchasing properties they should know whether the assessment has been paid so everyone is on the same page.

Councilmember Stroozas was under the impression that property that when property that had an assessment transferred ownership the assessment had to be paid in full at the time of closure. There are provisions within the sale documents that can transfer the assessment responsibility to the purchaser.

Councilmember Smith believes Mr. Robinson has merit in his request and Council needs to act in good faith. He is not willing to act tonight on Mr. Robinson's testimony that conflicts with the Acting Finance Director's findings without reviewing the documents provided.

City Attorney Wells advised Council it is okay for Council to make a decision with Mr. Robinson's testimony. This decision is a quasi-judicial one circulating documents that are subject to

confidentiality. We have to be careful that some of the more general public documents are still available to the public through a public records request.

Councilmember Aderhold commented there are a lot of people that don't get bills in the mail and there is confusion with the title companies. She believes we need to reassess our process to make sure it is flowing properly and people are getting notified properly.

Councilmember Reynolds agreed with Councilmembers Smith and Aderhold, but if we are going to review one request we should review them all.

VOTE: YES. ERICKSON, LEWIS

VOTE: NO. REYNOLDS, STROOZAS, ADERHOLD, SMITH

Motion failed.

SMITH/ERICKSON - MOVED TO AMEND TO REMOVE #3 FOR FURTHER REVIEW AND ADDRESS THOSE AT THE NEXT COUNCIL MEETING.

Council discussed having a special meeting dedicated to review of penalty waivers.

LEWIS/REYNOLDS – MOVED TO AMEND TO DISCUSS THESE AT A SPECIAL MEETING.

Councilmember Smith had hoped Council could review the applications now.

Asked if Council could discuss the request for waivers in executive session, City Attorney Wells advised they could since Council would be acting as judges. It is appropriate to meet and deliberate outside. When Council has a quasi-judicial role they usually have a public hearing process. Then Council will go into deliberations without an executive session. Council can review the documents and can hold a special meeting solely to have an executive session in which they go into deliberations. It is combining the processes of legislative and quasi-judicial. Council does not have to take testimony. There is a process outlined in Resolution 16-079(S)(A). Council would like to change the process to review the waiver applications to make their decision and that is valid. The process can be changed next year for Council to take a closer view at waiver applications.

City Clerk Johnson told Council there is not an available time slot for a special meeting at the next council meeting.

Motion carried.

City Attorney Wells advised Council they can chose to go into executive session or chose not to.

Council discussed options for hearing from individuals who have been denied the waiver of penalties. Only Mr. Robinson appeared to protest or challenge the finding. City Attorney Wells advised Council they could take the denials of penalty waivers one by one or as a group with the exception of Mr. Robinson.

VOTE: (main motion as amended) NO. SMITH, REYNOLDS, LEWIS, STROOZAS, ADERHOLD, ERICKSON

Motion failed.

LEWIS - MOVED TO AMEND TO REMOVE MR. ROBINSON FROM THE LIST AND WE REVIEW IT FOR OUR NEXT MEETING AND THEN MAKE A DECISION IN EXECUTIVE SESSION.

This motion was not seconded nor voted on based on recommendations from City Attorney Wells.

City Attorney Wells offered Option 1 and Option 2. Option 1: MOVE TO ACCEPT STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS EXCEPT FOR MR. ROBINSON'S AND WAIVE THE PENALTIES ASSOCIATED WITH MR. ROBINSON'S PARCEL. Option 2: MOVE TO ACCEPT THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF STAFF AND MEMORANDUM 17-018 WITH THE EXCEPTION OF MR. ROBINSON'S PARCEL WHICH WE WILL REVIEW AT OUR NEXT MEETING.

About 1,000 people in Homer participated in the March on Washington. She gave a shout out to the City of Homer for their support of the march. Public Works got out bright and early and plowed streets and sanded sidewalks to make it a safe walking environment. The Police Department also provided safety. Kachemak Bay Campus provided a place to meet. Many local businesses donated coffee and snacks. We have a wonderful community.

Councilmember Reynolds thanked Council for the excusal from the last meeting. She had a nice vacation, but missed the Women's March. She recognized the proclamation on congenital heart defects, something close to her heart as she has known the joy, the pain, and the sorrow of that. Many people have had successful operations, but for others it hasn't worked out quite as well. She encouraged everyone to enjoy their loved ones. Life is fragile and a gift.

Councilmember Smith echoed Councilmember Erickson's comments about Sonny and JJ. They were both here before him and their families continue to be here as active participants in the community. They both added a flavor to what makes up this little community. He has known the Carroll family for over 30 years and conducted JJ's funeral on Saturday. It was beautiful to see the people show up and share stories. Atz Kilcher wrote a special song for JJ that was amazing. Councilmember Smith chatted a lot with Sonny at the Glacier. He has a lot of good memories of both men. They were good people and he's grateful to have known them.

Councilmember Lewis attended the Telluride Film Festival put on by City Recreation under Mike Illg. There were wonderful films for both nights. Mike did a great job at the presentation and reminded people it was the City of Homer bringing it forward for the 15th year. He hopes we have many more.

Quotes were requested from several dealers in Anchorage, Fairbanks, and Kenai. Dodge was contacted, but could not provide a quote since a 4x4 option was not available.

The quotes were for a 4x4 cargo van capable of handling 8-foot long boards/tables behind the seat bulkheads. Both Stanley Ford and Worthington Ford are now owned by Kendall Ford, though separate quotes from Kendall dealers were obtained. Price does not include standard documentation fees. 15 WHEREAS, The City Council highly values the public's confidence in the propriety and
16 fairness of City of Homer ("City") administrative hearings and appeals; and

18 WHEREAS, It is in the City's best interest to designate a hearing officer to decide ethics
19 complaints filed against City Council members or the Mayor, preserving the ability of Council
20 members to work collaboratively and respectfully with one another while maintaining the
21 accountability and responsible governance of each member; and
22

23 WHEREAS, Permitting the Board of Ethics or a hearing officer to utilize witness
24 testimony in a manner that preserves the confidentiality of the Board's or the officer's
25 investigation and review.
26

27 NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF HOMER ORDAINS:
28

29 Section 1. Section 1.18.050 entitled "Procedures for violation reporting" is amended to
30 read as follows:
31

32 a. Any person who believes that a violation of any portion of this chapter has
33 occurred may file a written complaint of potential violation with the City Clerk's
34 office.

35 b. All written complaints of potential violation submitted under this chapter
36 shall be signed by the person submitting the complaint. A written complaint of
37 potential violation shall state the address and telephone number of the person
38 filing the complaint, identify the respondent, and affirm to the best of the
39 person's knowledge and belief the facts alleged in the complaint of potential
40 violation signed by the person are true. The person filing the complaint of

41 potential violation shall identify the section of this chapter the person believes
42 was violated, state why the person signing the complaint of potential violation
43 believes the facts alleged constitute a violation of that section, and identify any
44 documentary or testimonial evidence the person filing the complaint believes is
45 in support of the notification of potential violation.

46 c. Written complaints of potential violations filed with the City Clerk's office shall
47 be forwarded to the Board of Ethics under Chapter 2.80HCC. **Except as**
48 **otherwise provided in this section,** ~~the~~ the Board of Ethics has sole jurisdiction
49 to decide the merits of the complaint filed under this chapter.

50 **d. The City Clerk shall appoint a hearing officer to decide and investigate**
51 **properly filed written complaints against City Council members or the**
52 **Mayor and shall have sole jurisdiction to decide the merits of the complaint**
53 **filed under this section.**

56 Section 2. Section 2.80.010 is repealed and replaced as follows:
57

58 a. There is hereby established a Board of Ethics.

59 b. The Board shall be comprised of all members of the City Council and the
60 Mayor. The Mayor, or the Mayor Pro Tem in the Mayor's absence, will serve as
61 presiding officer of the Board. In the absence of both, the members of the Board
62 shall elect a presiding officer from among its members.

63 c. The City Attorney or other legal counsel for the Board may assist the Board at
64 every stage of the proceedings, but shall have no vote.

65 d. A quorum of the Board shall be a majority of all members who are not excused
66 for cause, such as being the complainant, the respondent, a witness, having a
67 conflict of interest, or other cause for recusal. However, in no event may a
68 quorum be less than three.

69 e. Decisions of the Board shall be adopted by a majority of the members who are
70 qualified to act on the matter, where a quorum is present.

71 f. Unless the Board delegates such authority to another member or decides that
72 no one shall have such authority, **and except as provided for hearing officers**
73 **in subsection (h) of this section,** the presiding officer shall have authority to
74 make procedural decisions between Board meetings on behalf of the Board.

75 Examples of matters that may be decided by such delegate include scheduling
76 hearings and other matters, establishing pre-hearing requirements and filing
77 deadlines for motions, exhibits, witness lists, hearing briefs, and deciding other
78 procedural matters.

79 g. The presiding officer shall vote on every question, unless required to abstain
80 for cause, and shall not have power to veto any action of the Board.

81 **h. A hearing officer designated by the City Clerk under HCC 1.18.050 shall**
82 **have sole authority to investigate the complaint they have been retained to**
83 **hear and to make procedural decisions regarding the investigation and**
84 **hearing of that complaint. The designated hearing officer shall be the sole**
85 **decision-maker and shall comply with the procedures and requirements of**
86 **this chapter provided for the Board and its members.**

88 Section 3. Section 2.80.020 is amended to read as follows:

92 The Board of Ethics or a **hearing officer appointed under this chapter** has

Additional Information on Hickerson Cemetery Expansion, Phase 1

In the last City Manager's report, I provided an updated timeline for the phase 1 of the expansion of Hickerson Cemetery (completion date end of May 2017). Since then the Planning Commission has held public comment on the project and recommendations from the Commission and the Department have been incorporated into the design including:

- Reduced the number of platted burial plots for Phase 1
- Changed some 10x5 grave burial plots to 2x2 urn burial plots
- Grave plots sections are configured in a 2 plot by 5 plot configuration
- As currently designed, there are 106 10x5 grave plots and 60 2x2 urn plots
- Burial plots section configured to allow for tree plantings
- Plan provides for future columbarium with ADA accessible walking path
- Plan provides for future memorial plaque wall with ADA accessible walking path
- Plan provides for future maintenance equipment storage shed
- Plan provides for snow storage areas

The attached map provides more information on the revised plans. I commend the Planning Commission, Planning staff, and Public Works Department for taking the time and effort to incorporate neighborhood feedback and public comment in the planning process. Public Works is proceeding full steam ahead on this project to meet the goal of having plots available for sale in the spring.

Purchase of Two Used Trucks for Public Works

Public Works was able to purchase two small used trucks under \$40,000 per the direction of City Council in the 2017 budget. Because a small truck with a short bed suits the needs for PW administration vehicles, staff was able to find a good deal and come in just under the budgeted allocation at \$39,718. It is unlikely that the savings would be as great with the purchase of a full sized truck due to the fleet pricing we can obtain through the State contract. On average, the City saves \$7,000 to \$9,000 on a new vehicle with government pricing and can get a utilitarian vehicle without the 'extras' that are common in the used market. A memo from Superintendent Gardner with further detail and price comparisons is attached. Staff is working on a fleet

replacement plan to present to Council to demonstrate a holistic picture of the future vehicle needs of the department.

Subject: Used Vehicle Purchases

During the 2017 budget cycle, a capitol request was made for a new light duty truck to replace one of the very old vehicles at Public Works. Council ultimately approved funding for two used vehicles, and I have pursued that action since the end of December.

As you know, we were able to find two small 2012 trucks that kept us just under the \$40,000 approved for the purchases (Total combined cost for two purchases came to \$39,718). But, this was only because we were able to use these smaller vehicles for PW Admin trucks (Superintendent truck and Inspector truck). Based on my research, I would not recommend buying used trucks if a full size truck is required (Ford F150 or larger) due to the fleet pricing that we, as a government, can obtain. We are able to get \$7000 to \$9000 off of the regular price of a new Ford F150 or Chevy 1500. So, the used vehicles that are available four years old or newer rival the same price as a new one, or don't produce a significant savings. Additionally, used vehicles do not come with a warranty, colors can range from red to black and often come with more expensive features that we don't normally obtain. Following are dealer prices that were quoted for a new 4x4 half ton truck with extended cab and sample pricing for used vehicles for comparison:

Considerations

- Significant time is required to shop for, wait around for a deal, and travel to inspect/select
- Buying new saves the depreciation that a used vehicle absorbs (Govt Fleet Rebates \$7K to \$9K)
- Buying new provides a warranty & the vehicle doesn't need to be replaced as soon as a used
- To obtain a significant savings, the used vehicle has to be pretty old with high mileage
- Although a used purchase price may be less, tires, U-Joints, transmissions, exhaust, etc. will need repair/replacement sooner

Conclusion

Due to the fleet savings available to the City of Homer, I believe we are better served purchasing new vehicles.

SUBJECT: **Highlights of O&M Work Accomplished - 2016
Water and Sewer Department**

The purpose of this memo is to remind us of the types of operations and maintenance activities that City water and sewer personnel routinely complete so that the community can continue to enjoy clean, safe drinking water; dependable fire protection; and protect Kachemak Bay from potential wastewater contamination.

Here are a few highlights from 2016 regarding major operation/ maintenance activities completed by the Homer Water/Sewer Division:

Water System:

- 1) Replaced failed flow meter under the foot of the Bridge Creek Reservoir dam. This meter controls the valve that is important to maintaining a safe water level in the Reservoir.
- 2) Completed tri-annual dam Safety Inspection.
- 3) Replaced the second of three 26 foot deep raw water feed pumps (capital project).
- 4) Annual system wide flush of the distribution system to maintain drinking water quality.
- 5) Initiated system wide leak detection of the distribution system with equipment borrowed from Alaska Rural Water Association.
- 6) Prepared and painted fire hydrants on Pioneer Ave (more City-wide next year).

Wastewater System:

- 1) Completed annual sewer line cleaning (including cleaning 8 lift stations).
- 2) Smoke test sewer lines in Old Town (to identify potential inflow/infiltration problems).
- 3) Flushed both sewer force mains coming off the Spit.
- 4) Removed, the last underground fuel tank serving City building. Proactive hazard mitigation.
- 5) Removed, refurbished and reinstalled 68 clarifier skimmers (extended life of treatment plant equipment).
- 6) Dewatering and disposed of 90 cubic yards of bio-solids at the Homer Landfill.
- 7) Receive a new APDES sewer treatment plant discharge permit from ADEC.
- 8) Replaced impeller in pump in the Kachemak City sewer lift station.
- 9) Replaced guide rails and impellor in Bay Ave sewer lift station.

Resolution 16-079(S)(A) outlines procedures for waiving penalties on delinquent special assessment payments. WHEREAS, In 2004, in conjunction with an Alaska Department of Transportation East End Road Improvement Project, the City of Homer recognized an opportunity to install water and sewer mains to serve City of Homer residents along East End Road to Kachemak Drive; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 04-42(A) authorized the City of Homer to proceed with the petitioning process as outlined in HCC 17.04.030 that eventually established the East End Road Sewer Local Improvement District (LID) and the East End Road Water LID; and

WHEREAS, When the East End Sewer was extended, Kachemak City was allowed to pay for a portion of the sewer improvement (based on the area and lots potentially served) with grant monies and assessments Kachemak City levied on Kachemak City benefited lots; and

WHEREAS, This extension of City of Homer sewer service to Kachemak City lots increases throughput in City of Homer's existing sewer system thereby contributing to City of Homer revenues beyond the cost of providing the service; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 04-42(A) further resolved not to extend City water to non-City properties; and

WHEREAS, This resolve excluded sixteen Kachemak City properties that could potentially benefit from City of Homer water services; and

WHEREAS, The Kachemak City Share of East Road Water Extension Improvements was calculated at \$265,069.88 (.484% of the total based on the area and lots potentially served plus a standard 5% administrative fee) for creating water assessments to be collected in some fashion at such time as connections are permitted; and

WHEREAS, The Kachemak City share of the East Road Water Extension Improvements was estimated at \$16,738.43 per parcel in 2009; and

42 WHEREAS, Extending water service to these Kachemak City lots on the north side of East
43 End Road along the utility corridor is wise and prudent because:

- 44 • the utility infrastructure is already in place;
- 45 • the benefited lots already receive City of Homer Sewer service;
- 46 • the additional water service would be at the expense of the new customer(s) making it
47 low cost/no cost to the City of Homer; and
- 48 • the increase in throughput will increase City of Homer revenues.

50 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of Homer, Alaska, authorizes
51 the extension of City of Homer Water services to benefited lots in Kachemak City under similar
52 terms and conditions as the City of Homer East End Road Water Local Improvement District.



THAT THE CITY OF HOMER AFFIRMS ITS POSITION NOT TO EXTEND ITS CITY WATER
TO NON CITY PROPERTIES.**

Concern was expressed regarding the importance of City residents receiving water and that there are a lot of City residents who are not currently connected to the City system. It was stated that Council does not want the implication that the Council is in the business of sending City water outside of City limits to properties, which are not City of Homer tax paying properties. Council expressed opinion that the costs seem a little high and questioned the reasonableness of the property owners being assessed for, what appears, as the entire cost of the trunk line. Trunk line size was discussed and is noted as being twelve inches.

VOTE: (primary amendment 1.) YES: NON OBJECTION . UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

Public Works Director Meyer responded to Council question that a twelve inch trunk line does not double the cost and that there is some justification for, in the end when the project is done, the City to pick up oversizing costs. Oversizing costs are the cost of the pipe going from an eight inch to a twelve inch which could be \$10.00 per linear foot. The majority of the cost of installing the pipe is the trenching, pretty much the same cost under either scenario. He pointed out that these assessments are in the ball park of the assessments from other areas, adding that the Hillside Acres assessments

are higher and that these East End Road lots are some of the largest the City has run water and sewer to.

Council discussed allowing people to connect on at a later date at the 75% property owner share amount. There may be additional individuals who want to connect that are adjacent to the benefitting property owners.

Discussion ensued specifically regarding deferral and grace periods.

NOVAK - MOVED TO AMEND TO STATE THAT WE WILL GIVE THEM SIX MONTHS TO FORM AN LID TO ACHIEVE THE TWENTY FIVE PERCENT CREDIT PLUS THE GOOD DISCOUNT RATE ON THE INTEREST AND AFTER THAT THEY WOULD JUST BE ASSESSED THE FULL RATE WHEN THEY DO DECIDE TO HOOK UP. SO THE INCENTIVE IS TO DO IT NOW.

This amendment was not recognized.

Mayor Cushing called for a recess at 10:14 p.m. at the City Clerk's request regarding the Code requirements on LID deadlines. He reconvened the meeting at 10:19 p.m.

Mayor Cushing clarified that the deadlines for the LIDs are set by Ordinance, however, Council sets the deadline on the final assessments and at that time the Council could extend this offer.

NOVAK/ - MOVED TO AMEND IF ASSESSMENT PASSES PROPERTY OWNERS WHO HAVE NOT JOINED CAN GAVE SIX MONTHS TO JOIN IN SAME FINANCING PROGRAM, AFTER THAT THEY WOULD HAVE TO PAY WHOLE THING.

This motion died for lack of a second and, simultaneously, was withdrawn.

Discussion ensued regarding the LID process and a deferred payment plan. Throughout the discussion it was noted, more than once, that the bubble area property owners, the newly annexed area along East End Road to the east of Kachemak Drive, have expressed desire for City utilities.

Determination of Assessments

City of Homer Water LID Assessments

The total cost of water improvements associated with the City of Homer LID is \$269,213.74. The City (HAWSP) is responsible for 25% of the cost of the improvements. The cost to the property owners is \$212,005.83 (75% plus 5% admin) . There are 17 lots in the water LID (see attached water LID map). The estimated per lot assessment is \$12,470.94. The original estimated assessment was \$15,689.97.

City of Homer Sewer LID Assessments

The total cost of sewer improvements associated with the LID is \$255,061.69 The City (HAWSP) is responsible for 25% of the cost of the improvements. The cost to the property owners is \$200,861.09 There are 12 lots in the sewer LID (see attached sewer LID map). The estimated per lot assessment is \$16,738.43. The original estimated assessment was \$20,721.26.


Kachemak City Share of East Road Water Extension Improvements

The original estimate for Kachemak City was .484% of the total of water improvements based on the area and lots potentially served. The total amount due is .484% of the total plus the standard 5% admin fee, for a total of \$265,069.88. Assessments will be created for the affected lots to be collected in some fashion at such time as connections are permitted. Estimated property owner assessments are \$16,566.87, based on 16 existing lots.

Kachemak City Share of East Road Sewer Extension Improvements

The original estimate for Kachemak City was .333% of the total of sewer improvements based on the area and lots potentially served. The total amount due is .333% of the total plus the standard 5% admin fee, for a total of \$133,602.25. Kachemak City will assess their own residents and pay Homer the entire amount.

Recommendation: The Council schedule public hearings and create the assessments for this project.

SUBJECT: AWARDING CONTRACT TO PUFFIN ELECTRIC FOR HIGH MAST LIGHT RFP

City Staff advertised a Request for Proposals on December 15, 2016 per Resolution 16-49 with a total budget amount of \$180,000. The purpose of this RFP was to upgrade the Port and Harbor's high mast light system from high-pressure, sodium lighting to LED.

While writing the RFP, staff became aware that additional energy savings can be found through lighting control systems. Our current lights are either full-on or full-off; new control systems give facilities options to gradually bring the lights to full power at sundown and reverse order at sunrise, which reduces electricity use and helps further lower the harbor's monthly bill. It was for this reason that staff included an additive alternative in the RFP for wireless lighting controls.

The project detailed in the RFP consists of two phases. In Phase One, the contractor will replace all lights on High Mast Pole #7 with their all new LED fixtures and then a light meter test will be conducted to compare the new lights to readings to the original lights. This requirement will be done to confirm that the new lights will actually meet or exceed the current lighting levels. If the new luminaires live up to the claims made in the contractors proposal, we will then move to Phase Two of the contract, which is to install the new lighting on the other six high mast light poles around the harbor.

On January 30, 2017, five bids from qualified firms were received at the City Clerk's Office; results for Phase One and Two are as follows:

- Kencare Inc. \$320,945
- NoDak Electric & Construction, Inc. \$190,966
- Cook Inlet Lighting \$171,790
- Puffin Electric Inc. \$168,423
- Woodworth Electric \$146,900

The review team scored the proposals individually using the scoring criteria published in the RFP, and met in-person to thoroughly discuss the merits of the proposals based on the RFP guidelines as well as keeping with the goals of the Council's supporting Resolution.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that City Council approve Resolution 17-016, awarding a contract to Puffin Electric of Homer, Alaska for the purpose of replacing the existing 1,000-watt high-pressure sodium lights on the Port and Harbor's high mast poles 1 through 7 with all new, energy efficient 640 watt Ap-Pack LED lights in the amount of \$168,423.

Further, staff requests City Council's support in approving an ordinance for funding the additional lighting control system work detailed in the Puffin Electric proposal for \$30,702.00.


