The survey is on the Economic Development Advisory Commission webpage on the City of Homer website. There are web articles written for the site with a link to the survey. The article will be featured on the City's main page as well. Press releases should go out this week and postcard mailings to 1680 names should be done by July 7th, flyers are done, and a power point is done for people who might want to share it in their own organizations. Requests for the information or for the survey can be made by calling 907-435-3102 or email jcarroll@ci.homer.ak.us. Paper surveys are available as well. They tried to be inclusive in their mailing, but encouraged sharing postcards with other businesses so they can participate as well. Their goal is to gather and provide information to be able to set up specific plans and projects, and they are very interested in red flag items that people in the business community would like to see solved. These will be things the Commission can work on in 2018. Again, she encouraged everyone to participate.

4. Parks Art Recreation and Culture Advisory Commission

Deb Lowney, Parks Art Recreation and Culture Advisory Commissioner, reported that the commission discussed the Capital Improvement Plan and their struggle to get items on the CIP which is very limited and there is a history of projects they would like to see completed. Their top two recommendations this time are the Main Street Sidewalk and Karen Hornaday Park road upgrade. Hornaday Park is the one of the most used parks and there are safety issues with traffic, parking, and pedestrians. The Commission discussed the ramp 2 restroom improvements and supported option C as it offers the greatest public use and there will be savings in the winter by closing most of the restrooms. Ms. Lowney talked about the Adopt a Park and Adopt a Trail program and encouraged individuals and organizations to sign up for the program. Applications are available at the Clerk's Office. Lastly she thanked the Councilmembers for attending and supporting the various activities in town.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

A. City Manager's Report

City Manager Koester commented regarding budgeting for and holding a Citizens Academy in 2018. She touched on the schedule and success of the one that was held in 2014.

Councilmember Reynolds and Aderhold expressed their support for scheduling the academy, and Councilmember Aderhold suggested a training session open to the public to talk about some of the basic things about what the Council does.

City Manager Koester also brought their attention to Ordinance 17-23 that was adopted to repeal the permanent fund and allocate the funds, acknowledging it was done so with incomplete information. She referenced the updated information included noting the value of the fund has increased by about 22% and the savings in interest on the library loan is just shy of half a million dollars, not the \$1 million that was reported. She expressed that she hopes both the Council and public knows, that while mistakes will happen, when they happen she will bring them to their attention and operate in a transparent manner.

Councilmember Erickson gave notice to bring forward a motion to rescind Ordinance 17-23 at the July 24th meeting.

Councilmember Lewis added that he'd like to see another ordinance with the same idea of paying off the library loan and leaving the remaining money in the fund. He suggested they also talk about how they want to continue to invest the funds.

Councilmember Stroozas noted for the audience that since the fund was started through June 2017, the rate of return is 22.86% and equates to \$368,943 generated. He's glad to be able to reevaluate this going forward.

Councilmember Smith pointed out it's important to understand we haven't realized a return, we've realized an increase in value, and until we cash out that asset is hasn't really made or lost anything, and that it can change at any time.

Attorney Wells noted that the amendment should be more specific to the language so it's very clear how we are changing this.

Councilmember Erickson suggested "Whereas to enhance traffic flow it should right hand turns only at Pioneer Avenue and the bypass."

Councilmembers Smith and Stroozas commented regarding the complications of this change on traffic flow and impact to neighboring parking lots by drivers cutting through to make that left turn, as well as trying to access other business along the route. It could create more confusion and public safety issues than we would solve by opening up this route.

Councilmember Aderhold added that she doesn't think it's appropriate to add this language to the ordinance appropriating funds to the project.

Councilmember Reynolds commented she like the idea and could see some benefit, but thinks it should be a recommendation or decision of a road planner, rather than the Council.

Attorney Wells recommended this be added as another section and remove language specifying this as a budget ordinance.

Mayor Zak acknowledge the expressed opposition and asked for a roll call vote.

VOTE (amendment): NO: ADERHOLD, REYNOLDS, LEWIS, STROOZAS, SMITH, ERICKSON

Motion failed.

Councilmembers Lewis and Aderhold weren't in support of the ordinance based on the past information from the State Traffic Engineer and Planning that don't support option A.

Councilmember Smith said he doesn't support the other options that are based on the Transportation Plan that was adopted in 2005, he thinks its information is fairly antiquated. He doesn't know if it takes into account the traffic from Save U More being in that location. There is no indication when the Town

Center buildout could happen, and he questions if they really want to take the lots off the market to make the connection outlined in the Transportation Plan.

Public Works Director Meyer was asked to give feedback on his conversation with DOT that is referenced in the packet materials. He explained one of the main tools DOT uses when reducing conflict and maintaining a level of service is a traffic signal. An intersection study has been done by DOT focused on the triangular Lake Street, Sterling Highway, and Pioneer Avenue and about half of those intersections are on signals right now. Mr. Meyer thinks the point the State's regional traffic engineer was trying to make is that signals need to be separated by at least a quarter mile. Where Greatland would connect into Pioneer Avenue is close to the Bartlett Street intersection, and looking into the future as the regional traffic engineer will, if we can minimize the number of intersections along Pioneer Avenue, that's best for the long run when it comes to the ability for side streets to be able to enter and leave Pioneer Avenue in an effective manner.

Councilmember Stroozas commented opening up Greatland through to Pioneer in a straight line format at the least cost to the city will open up more lots along the way and increase property value. If we continue to put this off, the price will increase. It's his opinion this would be a great asset to our community to have another egress way from Sterling Highway up to Pioneer, and supports this effort.

Councilmember Erickson was disappointed not to have more feedback from property owners. Her main concern is driving down the bypass and the number of near misses because there is so much traffic coming in and out of Greatland and agrees with a way to get off Greatland on the upper side. She's opposed to a stoplight at Bartlett due to the ice in the winter time. She thinks the connectors are important and this will give an opportunity to get a sidewalk to get people safely down the hill.

Councilmember Reynolds agrees with the need for pedestrian safety but noted there is currently a walking path at the top of Greatland that could be improved if we don't need to have a road there, however it is a long walk from Main Street.

City Manager Koester asked that line 34 the delete "and recommendations of the Homer Transportation Plan and line 51 replace \$970,870 with \$671,053.

Megan Reeves, city resident, congratulated the three councilmembers on retaining their seats after the election. She commented in support of the Greatland Street improvement and the police building because the reality is that Homer is growing quite rapidly. She shared her experience as a flagger on the East End Road and Spit Road projects hearing from tourists that this would be such a great place to buy property and there is a lot of it available out there. It's not only retiring seniors, but also people her age with families, degrees, and business ideas. They need to have space to open those businesses and make this a really incredible place. She also shared that she had the luxury of expediting for three days the Police Department after a DUI and it needs to be updated. Instead of worrying about how you're going to bring it to the community, she suggests they trust they trust us because we know, and tell us why we don't have a choice, because we really don't.

He explained that originally he'd been charged for two assessments because of the previous owners attempt in combining two lots before he and his family bought the house at 423 Grubstake. He expressed his frustration with the process and is frustrated he and his family are being held responsible for the previous owner's inactions.

Mayor Zak commented that the parade Grand Marshall's Leroy and Rita Jo Schultz and other peony growers are another example of new economy in our area. The beautification of Pioneer Avenue and the time Rita Jo spent planning and working with other volunteers in planting will be seen during the parade. He encouraged everyone to come out and celebrate in the community.

Councilmember Stroozas read a statement he prepared for the special meeting on the 19th but didn't have an opportunity to share. He read, Our Community has gone through a period of conflict. These are the times that have tried the souls of Homer residents on both sides of the issue. She's part of a generation that did that and seeing her own children and grandchildren love this place and want to come back to live and raise their families is exciting to her. Councilmember Smith said thank you Homer for being Homer. I love you, you're my home, and I'm grateful for the opportunity to serve on the Council. She knows Melissa has a lot on her plate as the new City Clerk but thinks it would be great to work with the State Legislature on purging the voter rolls so we have a better idea of how many people actually are registered to vote in Homer. She also would like the Clerk's Association to work with the State Legislature to clarify some of the things that ended up not being so clear to attorneys regarding the recall process, to make sure their intent is something that is easy to follow and get to, like wise with tightening up language in our city code. She is looking forward to the 4th of July parade, it's one of her favorite moments of the year.

Councilmember Aderhold had no comment.

Alaska Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management recently announced recipients of FY2015 State Homeland Security Program Reallocation grant funds. The City of Homer was awarded \$110,000 to purchase and install a back-up generator and automatic transfer switch at the Harbormasters Office.

Back-up power was identified as a high priority vulnerability in the Port and Harbor during the City of Homer's Alaska Assessment (December 31, 2015). The Port & Harbor is a critical infrastructure. Reliable back-up power plays an essential role in effective emergency response to and mitigation of both natural disasters and man-made incidents.

State Homeland Security Program funding greatly assists in maintaining the integrity of City of Homer's operational communication for local incident response, mutual aid and broader emergency response. Funding is dependent the City Council formally accepting the grant award.

A majority of benefitted property owners agreed and the Council approved a special assessment district for the paving of Frisbee Court (Resolution 17-017) at the February 27, 2017 City Council meeting. Public Works proceeded to complete the design of the improvements.

On July 13, 2017, bids were received for the Frisbee Court Road Paving Project. This work was advertised in the Homer News on June 15 and 29 and in the Peninsula Clarion on June 25. Procurement was completed in accordance with the City's procurement regulations.

Two responsive bids were received from qualified firms. The bid results were evaluated and the results are as follows.

SUBJECT: Purchase of New ATV and Rescue Skid Unit

The Homer Volunteer Fire Department has witnessed an increase in medical responses off road on the local beaches and trails. Our current response equipment is a 2002 ATV with 15 years of service that has taken its toll on the frame and electrical system. This unit pulls a rescue trailer for packaging and transporting a patient. The trailer is still in good usable condition and can be used for transporting equipment and an additional patient if needed. We are requesting a new, "side by side" ATV, with a bed mounted "skid unit" that incorporates room to transport a supine patient and a care provider in the bed of the ATV. We feel that this configuration will provide for a smoother ride for the patient and allow closer observation than the trailer system, as the care provider sits beside the patient instead of at the end of the trailer.

In the last 2 months we have we have evaluated 6 different units from 3 local businesses. We have concluded that our best option is the CanAm Defender, supplied by All Seasons Honda of Homer. We have test driven each of the units quoted and conferred with the manufacturer of the bed mounted skid unit, KimTek, for compatibility and they have confirmed great success with this combination. All Seasons Honda provided the lowest bid quoted at \$14,000 with a government discount offered by CanAm. The KimTek Medic Response slide in transport module has been quoted at \$4,095 FOB Homer. We will install the skid unit in-house to save money. Funding for this package will come from the Fire Department Donation Account that has a balance of over \$40,000.

Thank you for your consideration; this package will allow the Fire Department to respond to off road emergencies quicker with the sound mind of knowing the equipment will be response ready. Most importantly, it will give us the ability to perform better patient care.

SUBJECT: Fence Relocation at Sewer Treatment Plant

Sewer Reserve Funding Request for \$16,000

Twenty-eight years ago, chain link fence was installed around the sewer treatment plant as part of the project. A four hundred foot stretch of the fence is along the roadway adjacent to the STP operations building. The fence prevents our ability to maintain the ditch along the roadway which has filled over the years, and now causes periodic flooding of the operations building.

This memo is a request for \$16,000 from the sewer reserve fund (approximate balance \$1.9 million) to relocate the fence so that Public Works crews can do the necessary ditching and roadway shaping to move water away from the sewer operations building. The new location on the other side of the ditch will allow for periodic maintenance of the ditch without having to move it in the future. We have a proposal from Four Seasons Fence of Kenai to do the work for \$15,600. They will demo the old fence and posts, install new posts (old ones cannot be used) and reinstall the existing barbed wire and fence matting material.

Public Works will obtain additional quotes for the work as required by the Procurement Policy and request award of the low bid at the July 24 City Council meeting.

At the June 26, 2017 Committee of the Whole and Regular City Council Meeting, City Manager Koester informed Council that they had adopted Ordinance 17-23 on June 12th with incomplete financial information. City Manager Koester reviewed the updated financials included in the City Manager's Report and advised Council they had three options to address the problem:

- a. No change, maintain policy decision to abolish Permanent Fund. No need to take action.
- b. Rescind Ordinance 17-23. Maintain Permanent Fund and do not pay off library loan or dedicate funds to a new police station at this time.
- c. Rescind Ordinance 17-23 and replace it with a new ordinance liquidating only a portion of the fund. For example, Council could liquidate \$1.2m to pay off the library loan and leave the remainder in the Permanent Fund until needed by the Police Station project.

Councilmember Erickson gave previous notice of her intent to move to rescind Ordinance 17-23 at the July 24th regular meeting.

SUBJECT: Permanent Fund Info

The purpose of this memo is to provide relevant background for Council's consideration of the two Permanent Fund related ordinances on the agenda and rescinding action on Ordinance 17-23.

The growth portion of the permanent fund is invested in two separate pots: one that tracks the S&P 500 and one that tracks the NASDAQ. The intent behind selecting these two was to keep the investing very simple (read no steep management fees) and track a nationally recognized index that is easy to follow. See the attached screen shots from Morningstar.com that show historical performance of the S&P 500 and NASDAQ.

Market value of growth fund as of July 17, 2017: \$1,625,542

S&P 500: \$936,205 NASDAQ: \$689,337

The income fund is stable by its very nature. It is invested in two government bonds with a combined value of \$678,259. The City's investment firm, TVI, recommends a minimum of \$100,000 to purchase a decent bond.

Market Value of Permanent Fund as of 7/18/2017: \$2,303,801

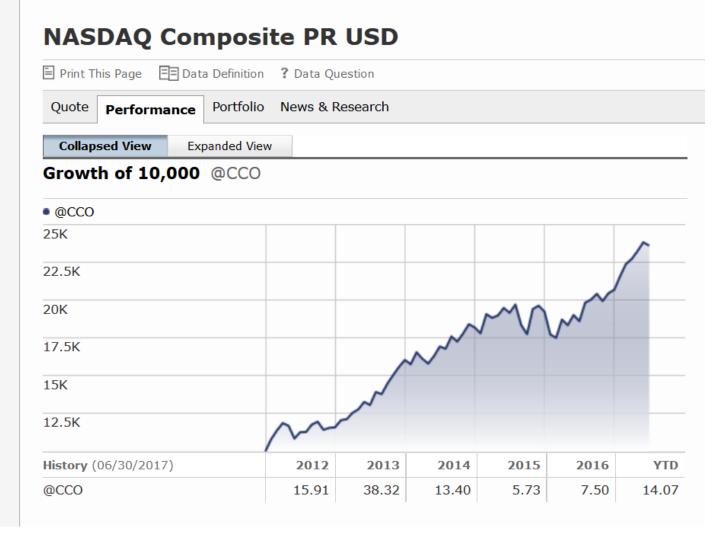
If Council decides to adopt the two ordinances before them, paying off the Library loan and rebalancing the fund, TVI recommends paying off the Library loan entirely by selling off equities. This would still leave the need to sell approximately \$140,000 in equities to purchase a bond in order to achieve the 25/75 growth/income split Councilmember Stroozas recommends.

TVI charges a \$250 transaction fee to sell off any portion of an equity fund or \$500 to close it (sell all the shares). Bond fees are undisclosed but range from \$200 to \$400 per \$100,000 in bond value. These fees are minimal compared to an actively managed fund where the City was paying between \$11,500-\$15,200 annually.

Maritime Response Meeting

Chief Painter organized a meeting between responders to maritime emergencies in an effort to look at what the community has available and where gaps might be for both near shore and far shore rescue. In attendance were representatives from the Civil Air Patrol, Coast Guard Auxiliary, Anchor Point Fire Department, Kachemak Emergency Services, Pathfinder Aviation, Homer Volunteer Fire Department, and Homer Port and Harbor. In many cases, these organizations have to be dispatched through the Troopers or the Coast Guard. This covers any liability and expense of the rescue. Response times range wildly depending on time of year, where resources are, and volunteers that are available. The Auxiliary stressed their efforts on prevention and boating safety as the most important tool in maritime response. The apparatus needs identified were divided into two categories: near shore where a safe boat or emergency response jet ski would be valuable and far shore where a fire boat that could respond to vessel fires. Acquiring apparatus is just the first step, crew, regular training, convenient storage, and liability coverage were just some of the other factors discussed. Council has expressed an interest in a worksession on community maritime response capabilities in order to provide the public with education regarding the maritime response capabilities of Homer and brainstorm ways to increase our response capacity as a community. I will work on scheduling a worksession for September when boating season slows down.

Borough Bed Tax Proposal

I traveled to Soldotna on July 19th at the invitation of the Borough Mayor mayor's office to participate in a Peninsula City Manager's meeting on Ordinance 17-17 introduced at the July 18th Borough Assembly meeting. Ordinance 17-17 puts to the voters at the regular election in October an 8% borough wide bed tax. If a City adopts an authorizing ordinance, the 8% would be split between the city and the Borough within City limits. Revenue estimates for Homer range from \$500,000- \$580,000. Ordinance 17-17 will be up for a public hearing at the August 1st Assembly Meeting. Ordinance 17-17 and back up memos are attached.

Visit from State Assessor

State Assessor Marty McGee stopped in to visit with administration in early July. He is working on a Performance Audit for the KPB Assessing Department that although not specific to the 2017 assessment process, will include information on Homer. The State Assessor expects the audit to be public by the end of the month and may be of some interest to Homer taxpayers.

Update on Northern Edge Training Exercises Scheduled

Alex Stone, a Navy environmental expert and Tim Croft with Alaska Command, will attend the City Council meeting on August 14th to report on the Northern Edge training exercise held this spring. It is likely that

Senator Murkowski will be sending staff from her DC office as well. The Senator's office has been instrumental in organizing outreach between coastal communities and the Navy.

Emergency Repairs to City Hall Elevator

The City has a service contract that provides inspections and routine maintenance of the elevator at City Hall every 2 years based on a checklist of items. The next visit is coming up at the end of July. Recently, the State inspector looked at elevator certifications and identified the need to complete a Category 5 inspection (a load test is required every 5 years). He also identified two other minor issues (ADA phone compliance and a faulty key switch). The State inspector gave the City until July 23rd to resolve the load test deficiency. The quote received to fix the problems the State inspector identified and perform a load test (\$6,000) is based on sharing significant mobilization costs with a planned visit to Homer for another load test and is saving us at least \$2,500. The load test is scheduled for July 19 and will be incorporated into our maintenance and inspection schedule in the future. I will be including an adjustment to the budget with midyear budget amendments to reflect this expenditure.

Holland America Ship Tour

I had the pleasure of joining the Homer Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors and Mayor on a ship tour of the Amsterdam when she was recently in port. The tour was an excellent opportunity to learn about how cruise ships make their decisions on port calls. The Homer trip is an unusually long (14-day) cruise and the result of pulling a ship out of Europe due to a declining market there. It was explained that due to the length of the cruise and the journey, it is unlikely Homer will receive additional ships despite our best efforts, but that effort could be spent in getting more passengers off the ship to visit Homer's many attractions. I could see the wheels turning of the staff and directors of the Chamber and I am looking forward to the creative ideas they will come up with to share more of Homer with our visitors. Homer is already known as a very welcoming port due to the efforts of the volunteers who great the ship armed with visitor guides and smiles. Cruise ship passengers are likely to return as independent travelers, by far the bulk of the visitors Homer gets. Sparking that interest in people is another important way that Homer benefits from cruise ship visits.

Expanded Use of the HERC

Resolution 13-095 authorized use of the gym at the HERC for Community Recreation activities and Ordinance 14-37 authorized funding to make minimal upgrades to the gym to bring it in compliance with fire code for minimal occupancy (50). There is a large room adjacent to the gym that has been used in the past as a classroom/exercise space. According to Community Recreation Manager Illg, the public has expressed interest in using the space for Zumba and other activities. The HERC is also brought up in community conversations regarding the need for after school activates and a potential Boys and Girls Club. However, in order to allow for full occupancy of the HERC gym and expand occupancy into the two adjacent rooms, another Fire Marshall review will be required.

A preliminary estimate has been acquired from Taylor Fire Protection for the installation of a sprinkler system in the first floor of the building. A 6" water line will also need to be installed from the street to the building since the existing service is only 2 inch.

Following is a rough cost estimate for completing improvements that would be needed to increase the occupancy load at the HERC.

Sprinkler System Installation \$78,000 Fire Alarm System \$30,000 New Water Line \$20,000 Fire Marshall review (Fee and admin) _\$1,500 Total \$129,500

Not included in the cost estimate are any improvement items that the Fire Marshall/or Contractor may discover (entry modifications, doors, etc.), asbestos abatement that could arise during the sprinkler system installation, and contingencies. As a reminder; other costs associated with increased occupancy are utility cost increases for the expanded use and increased janitorial/maintenance costs. Also, the roof on this building is in very poor condition and replacement needs to be planned in the very near future. It has been patched often since 2004 and should not be counted on to function adequately for much longer.

Timeline for Greatland Extension

Based on Council authorization with the passage of Ordinance 17-05(A-2) Public Works has contacted Kinney Engineering, our term contract engineer for road and trail design projects, to complete the design of the Greatland Street Extension. Kinney Engendering has experience with local road projects including design for Waddell Road (now known as Grubstake) and the Lillian Walli/Eric Lane road improvements.

Based on the successful design contract negotiations, we expect that the project would proceed as follows:

Design Begins August 15, 2017 **Wetlands Delineation** August 30, 2017 **Geotechnical Investigation Complete** September 15, 2017 Field Survey Complete September 30, 2017 35% Design Complete November 15, 2017 **Neighborhood Meeting** November 21, 2017 65% Design Complete January 30, 2018 **Environmental/Regulatory Permits** March 1, 2018 95% Design Complete March 30, 2018 **Bid Documents Complete** April 1, 2018 **Bids Advertised** April 15, 2018 Bids Open May 15, 2018 **Award of Construction Contract** May 30, 2018 **Construction Begins** June10, 2018 **Construction Complete** August 30, 2018

New (and Expensive) Vac Truck may be Needed Soon

The vac truck used by Public Works has reached the end of its life expectancy, 25 years, and has been giving Public Works trouble. The truck has accumulated around \$15,000 in repairs over the last couple of years and racked up \$3,000 in repairs just since March of this year.

The vac truck is a critical piece of equipment for many operations in water/sewer and roadway work. It is used to excavate for water service and gate valve repairs (sucks the ground and makes a small deep hole rather than full excavation with backhoe); also for manhole repairs (both sewer and storm drain); for vacuuming sewer mains and service lines; for washing down sewer lift stations and vacuuming out sewer lift stations; for vacuuming out all of our storm drain manholes; for jetting (cleaning) sewer mainlines and service lines; and more.

At present, the vehicle is down with some pretty major repairs anticipated. This may end up being simply a labor intensive repair that doesn't cost much in materials, but it could also turn into labor and some extensive material costs on a very old and heavily used piece of equipment. In addition to the costs, there is the several weeks that this equipment has been down due to the recent repairs, and now the ongoing new repairs. This equipment is essential for many operations from general road maintenance to water and sewer maintenance and repairs. When it's down, work suffers.

At this point, Public Works plans to keep repairing the unit, but a budget request may materialize before the 2018 budget, and definitely by then, for replacement. At \$400,000 this is quite the expense. The cost would be split between the water, sewer and public works vehicle reserve funds.

ADA Self-evaluation Underway

During the 2017 budget cycle Council appropriated \$25,000 to help the ADA committee and City staff with a self-evaluation and transition plan for making city facilities and programing more accessible to individuals with disabilities. David Barton with the Northwest ADA center will be in Homer during the week of August 7-11 to work with the ADA committee and the City's ADA Coordinator and City Clerk, Melissa Jacobsen, on our self-evaluation and help get us started on the transition plan. This will be a time intensive project and I really appreciate the committee and staff stepping up to the plate to take it on. It will be a valuable guide for future improvements at the City and a model for other communities.

Visit with Governor Walker

Mayor Zak and I had a great visit with Governor Walker, Commissioner Mack, Chief Oil and Gas Advisor Hendrix and staff on their way through Homer this week. Topics included the City's plans for a large vessel harbor, how to connect more local farmers with national grocery chains, and the Governor's aggressive stance on combating the opioid epidemic. I will be following up with the Governor's office on these issues and others and greatly appreciate Governor Walker finding time when traveling to hear from local municipalities.

Local Business Product Recognized

SUBJECT: VOTER ROLL INFORMATION

At the June 26, 2017 Regular City Council meeting during Councilmember Comments, Councilmember Reynolds requested I work with the State on purging the voter rolls to have a better idea of how many people are actually registered to vote in Homer.

The City Clerk's office staff assists the public with voter registration, but the State Division of Elections is responsible for adding voters to and removing voters from the voter rolls. I emailed Lauri Wilson, Region 1 Elections Supervisor, for more information regarding the voter rolls and her response, in which she explains rules for determining residence, systems used for reviewing registered voters status, and the process for annual list maintenance, is included with this memo.

Hi Melissa,

I thought I'd also throw in information on voter residence since that is tied to voter rolls in determining which House District a voter is registered and eligible to vote.

Rules for determining residence of a voter can be found in AS 15.05.020. A voter must be registered to vote for 30 days prior to an election in order to be eligible to vote in an election. Although a person may register to vote at any time, their vote would not count or could be partially counted in an election only if they were registered 30 days before the date of the election. Address changes would also have to be received by that same deadline. It is up to the voter to notify the division of any changes to their voting record, including address changes.

Please see AS 15.05.202 on Rules for determining residence of a voter.

Excerpts from AS 15.05.020 state:

"A person does not lose residence if the person leaves home and goes to another country, state, or place in this state for temporary purposes only and with the intent of returning." The law does not specify a length of time associated with "intent of returning."

"A person loses residence in this state if the person votes in another state's election, either in person or by absentee ballot, and will not be eligible to vote in this state until again qualifying under AS 15.05.010."

Voter Roll Maintenance Clean Up

In regards to voter roll maintenance and clean up, the division performs various tasks for maintaining and cleaning up voter rolls in Alaska through these processes: Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC), our annual List Maintenance (LM) process required under federal law and newly passed initiative "15PFVR" which allows for automatic voter registration when applying for a PFD which provides us with current address information.

ERIC - New

The Division participates in ERIC as a new member state since 2016. ERIC is a multistate partnership that uses a sophisticated and secure data-matching tool to improve the accuracy and efficiency of state voter registration systems. Through participation in ERIC, states can compare official data on eligible voters — such as voter and motor vehicle registrations, US Postal Service addresses, Social Security death records — to keep voter rolls more complete and up to date. ERIC is owned, managed, and funded by participating states and was formed in 2012 with assistance from The Pew Charitable Trusts.

PFD - New

In 2016, voters approved Ballot Measure 1 (15PFVR) which will automatically register eligible

individuals to vote when they apply for a PFD unless they opt-out. Under the new law, the division is required to send a notice to voters whose address on their PFD application is different than their voter record address, or to applicants who are not currently registered to vote. The mailer notifies the voter that the information on their PFD application will be used to update their voter registration or register them unless they 'opt-out' within 30 days. How this new law will affect voter turnout statistics is yet to be seen as there is a potential for higher voter registration numbers vs turnout. (See the News section of our web site at: http://www.elections.alaska.gov/ to read more on this)

Annual List Maintenance Process

Once each year, the division examines the master registration list and performs list maintenance on registration records that have had mail returned as undeliverable to the division, no contact with the division, or no voter history in the last four calendar years.

Under state law AS 15.07.130, voter registration list maintenance is a two-step process. Through the list maintenance process, the division will attempt to contact the voter by sending two notices requesting address confirmation or correction to the information on the voter record or to see if the voter wished to cancel their registration in Alaska. Any voter whose first notice is returned as "undeliverable" must be sent a second notice to the voter's last known address with a request for the post office to forward it to any new address on file for the voter. If the voter does not respond to the second notice within 45 days, the voter's record will be inactivated and their names will not appear on the list of voters used at the polling place.

Once a voter has been inactivated through list maintenance, the voter may still vote using a questioned ballot. If they vote at any time within four years after being inactivated their ballot will count. Voting a questioned ballot will also activate and update their voter registration record. If a voter who was inactivated does not contact the division or appear to vote, the voter's record will be cancelled and removed from the registration system after the second general election that occurs after the registration is inactivated.

- WHEREAS, due to the continuing decline in state assistance to municipalities along with the increasing loss in property tax revenues to the borough from exemptions on real property, and due to increasing reliance on borough funding for the school district, the borough must take steps to maintain its unrestricted fund balance into the future within financially prudent and responsible parameters; and
- WHEREAS, currently, 43 Alaska municipalities including cities and boroughs have a bed tax in addition to other sales taxes, with such bed tax rates ranging from a low of 4 percent to a high of 12 percent; and
- WHEREAS, the Kenai Peninsula Borough and the Aleutians East Borough are the only second-class boroughs in the state without an additional sales tax on temporary lodging; and
- WHEREAS, several hundred thousand visitors travel to the Kenai Peninsula each year and contribute in a large way to the area's economy but also create a large demand on public services in the borough; and
- WHEREAS, other than the general sales tax, the borough currently receives no direct revenue from these visitors to the peninsula; and
- WHEREAS, while the revenue generated from this additional sales tax on temporary lodging would be used for educational purposes, it would make other borough revenues available to offset these visitor costs: and
- WHEREAS, to enable the cities to levy a similar tax and allow the tax to apply evenly throughout the borough, the ordinance exempts from the borough's 8 percent temporary lodging tax any similar additional city tax up to 4 percent so as to share revenues between the borough and cities; and

- **WHEREAS,** "temporary lodging" is currently defined in the borough sales tax code as "a service to provide any lodging of less than one month"; and
- **WHEREAS,** as this is an increase in the sales tax rate, voter approval is required before this could go into effect;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE KENAI PENINSULA BOROUGH:

SECTION 1. That KPB 5.18.100 is hereby amended as follows:

5.18.100. - General—Levied—Amount.

- A. There is levied by the borough a consumer's sales tax of up to 3 percent maximum rate on all retail sales, on all rents, and on all services made or rendered within the borough, measured by the gross sales price of the seller.
- B. In addition to the tax levied in paragraph A of this section, there is levied in the borough a sales tax on the rental of temporary lodging of up to 8 percent of the rental price of all such rentals within the borough, except as specifically exempted herein.
- C. In addition to the <u>sales</u> tax<u>es</u> levied by the borough, any municipality within the borough may levy a consumer's sales tax <u>and temporary lodging tax</u> as provided by Alaska Statute which shall be reported, collected, and enforced according to the terms of this chapter.

SECTION 2. That KPB 5.18.215 is hereby enacted as follows:

5.18.215. - Exemptions/waivers—Temporary lodging within cities in the borough.

Rentals of temporary lodging within any city in the borough are exempt from the borough's 8 percent tax in an amount equal to the amount of a similar sales tax that may be levied by the applicable city in addition to the city's general sales tax, if any, up to a maximum exemption of 4 percent of the rental price.

SECTION 3. That a ballot proposition shall be placed before borough voters at the regular election on October 3, 2017 to read as follows:

Shall Ordinance 2017-____, providing for the levy of a tax on temporary lodging of up to 8 percent of the rental price, subject to existing exemptions in the borough sales tax code and an exemption of up to 4 percent in any city in the borough that levies a similar additional sales tax on temporary lodging in its boundaries, be approved? "Temporary lodging" means "a service to provide any lodging of less than one month".

October, 3, 2017 (Mayor)

Due to the continuing decline in state assistance to municipalities, the increasing loss in revenues to the borough from real property tax exemptions, and increasing reliance on borough funding for the school district, the borough is considering a variety of measures to maintain its unrestricted fund balance within the financially prudent and responsible parameters established by Resolution 2017-031.

Currently, 43 Alaska cities and boroughs have a "bed tax" in addition to other sales taxes. Of those municipalities that impose the tax as a percentage of the room rate, the tax ranges from a low of 4 percent (Seward, Gustavus and the Haines Borough) to a high of 12 percent (Anchorage and Bethel). The Kenai Peninsula Borough and the Aleutians East Borough are the only boroughs of the seven second-class boroughs in the state without such a temporary lodging sales tax. The other five second-class boroughs have taxes that range from 5 percent to 10 percent.

The arguments in support of a bed tax in the Kenai Borough are substantial. The several hundred thousand visitors that travel to the Kenai Peninsula each year are a large part of the area's economy, and create a large demand on public services (direct services for visitors and indirect for the almost 3,000 people employed each month in the Kenai Peninsula visitor industry). Absent the general sales tax, the borough receives no direct revenue from visitors to the peninsula. While the revenue generated from this additional sales tax on temporary lodging

would be used for educational purposes, as required by borough code for all sales tax revenues, it could make available property tax revenues that otherwise might have gone to educational funding to help offset such visitor costs. "Temporary lodging" is currently defined in the borough sales tax code as "a service to provide any lodging of less than one month."

We estimate that a year-round 8 percent borough-wide temporary lodging sales tax would generate \$4.3 million a year in revenue, based on our estimate of about \$54 million a year in taxable transactions.

As proposed, the tax would be structured to provide that the same 8 percent rate shall be applied borough-wide, both inside and outside of cities, regardless of whether a city chooses to enact its own such tax in addition to an existing sales tax. As proposed, this ordinance provides for an exemption of up to a maximum of 4 percent of the 8 percent levy for such rentals occurring in incorporated cities in the borough that adopt, if they choose, their own such tax. The exempt amount of the 8 percent levy would match the percentage rate levied by a city up to a 4 percent tax rate so that the total levy in all sales is 8 percent to be allocated between the borough and city. The intent in this proposal is to implement the same tax rate (8 percent) borough-wide, so as to avoid any competitive advantage or disadvantage to a business based on their physical location in or out or a city's boundaries, while allowing cities to participate and receive up to half of the collections within their jurisdiction.

As proposed, with the \$4.3 million full-year estimate of annual revenues, and if all of the cities participate at the 4 percent maximum rate, we estimate the revenues would be distributed as follows:

The temporary lodging tax would require hotels, motels, bed and breakfasts, inns, lodges and other establishments providing lodging for a guest of less than one month to collect an 8 percent tax on a per-unit, per-night basis for all temporary lodging sales, just as is the current code requirement for applying the borough's general sales tax. Businesses currently covered under an exemption in KPB Chapter 5.18 would continue to be covered under those same borough exemptions for purposes of the new accommodations tax. For example, a hospital or a university would not be required to collect and remit the tax on the lodging portion of their sales. If cities adopt a temporary lodging tax, their exemptions might vary from borough exemptions.

We plan to use the same sales tax return form we currently require, minimizing the work and avoiding any new forms for business owners. For example, if a hotel currently completes two columns on its Joint Sales Tax Form (one for the borough and one for a city), it would complete a third column for the accommodations tax. Businesses would be required to track and collect the tax on temporary lodging sales and report those figures to the borough, including any tax-exempt sales, just as with general sales and services transactions. They would have the ability to

provide one payment with one return. The borough would then remit to each respective city its portion of the collections.

If approved by voters, borough sales tax staff would conduct presentations on the new tax at multiple locations throughout the borough. We would provide information about the tax, how to compute and report it, and would provide opportunities to ask questions. Materials also would be made available on the borough website, and we would provide an information hand-out with the first few sales tax form mailings in 2018.

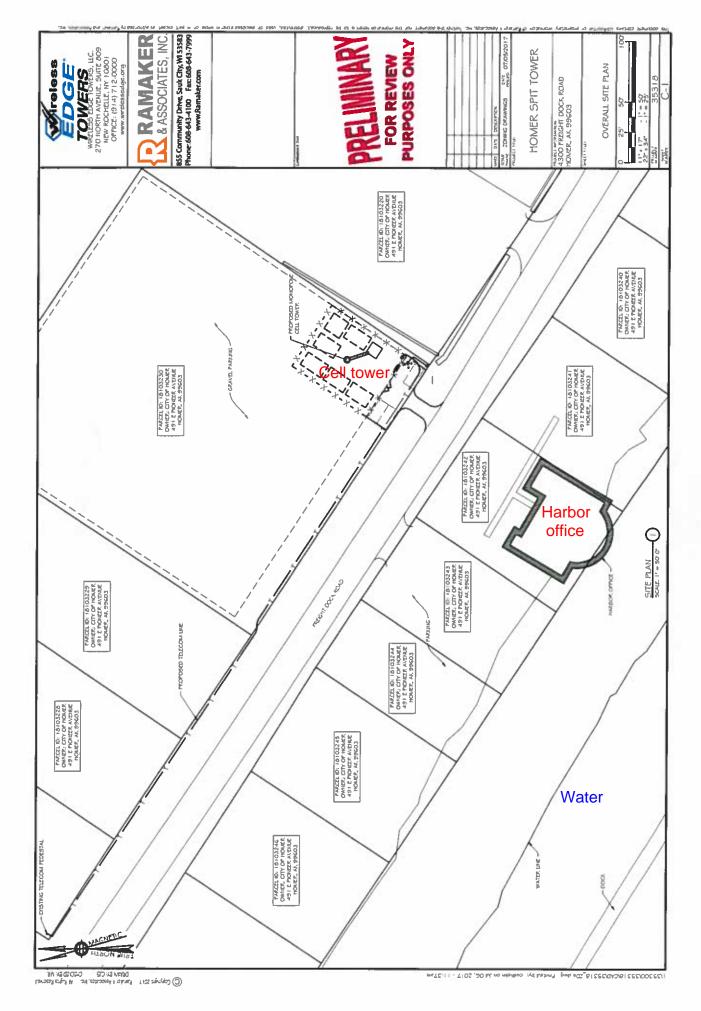

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES TERMS AND CONDITIONS

The following Terms and Conditions are attached to and form part of a proposal for services to be performed by Consultant and together, when the CLIENT authorizes Consultant to proceed with the services, constitute the AGREEMENT. Consultant means the Stantec entity issuing the Proposal.

DESCRIPTION OF WORK: Consultant shall render the services described in the Proposal (hereinafter called the "SERVICES") to the CLIENT.

DESCRIPTION OF CLIENT: The CLIENT confirms and agrees that the CLIENT has authority to enter into this AGREEMENT on its own behalf and on behalf of all parties related to the CLIENT who may have an interest in the PROJECT.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS: No terms, conditions, understandings, or agreements purporting to modify or vary these Terms and Conditions shall be binding unless hereafter made in writing and signed by the CLIENT and Consultant. In the event of any conflict between the Proposal and these Terms and Conditions, these Terms and Conditions shall take precedence. This AGREEMENT supercedes all previous agreements, arrangements or understandings between the parties whether written or oral in connection with or incidental to the PROJECT

COMPENSATION: Payment is due to Consultant upon receipt of invoice. Failure to make any payment when due is a material breach of this AGREEMENT and will entitle Consultant, at its option, to suspend or terminate this AGREEMENT and the provision of the SERVICES. Interest will accrue on accounts overdue by 30 days at the lesser of 1.5 percent per month (18 percent per annum) or the maximum legal rate of interest. Unless otherwise noted, the fees in this agreement do not include any value added, sales, or other taxes that may be applied by Government on fees for services. Such taxes will be added to all invoices as required.

NOTICES: Each party shall designate a representative who is authorized to act on behalf of that party. All notices, consents, and approvals required to be given hereunder shall be in writing and shall be given to the representatives of each party.

TERMINATION: Either party may terminate the AGREEMENT without cause upon thirty (30) days notice in writing. If either party breaches the AGREEMENT and fails to remedy such breach within seven (7) days of notice to do so by the non-defaulting party, the non-defaulting party may immediately terminate the Agreement. Non-payment by the CLIENT of Consultant's invoices within 30 days of Consultant rendering same is agreed to constitute a material breach and, upon written notice as prescribed above, the duties, obligations and responsibilities of Consultant are terminated. On termination by either party, the CLIENT shall forthwith pay Consultant all fees and charges for the SERVICES provided to the effective date of termination.

ENVIRONMENTAL: Except as specifically described in this AGREEMENT, Consultant's field investigation, laboratory testing and engineering recommendations will not address or evaluate pollution of soil or pollution of groundwater.

PROFESSIONAL RESPONSIBILITY: In performing the SERVICES, Consultant will provide and exercise the standard of care, skill and diligence required by customarily accepted professional practices normally provided in the performance of the SERVICES at the time and the location in which the SERVICES were performed.

LIMITATION OF LIABILITY: The CLIENT releases Consultant from any liability and agrees to defend, indemnify and hold Consultant harmless from any and all claims, damages, losses, and/or expenses, direct and indirect, or consequential damages, including but not limited to attorney's fees and charges and court and arbitration costs, arising out of, or claimed to arise out of, the performance of the SERVICES, excepting liability arising from the sole negligence of Consultant. It is further agreed that the total amount of all claims the CLIENT may have against Consultant under this AGREEMENT, including but not limited to claims for negligence, negligent misrepresentation and/or breach of contract, shall be strictly limited to the lesser of professional fees paid to Consultant for the SERVICES or \$50,000.00. No claim may be brought against Consultant more than two (2) years after the cause of action arose. As the CLIENT's sole and exclusive remedy under this AGREEMENT any claim, demand or suit shall be directed and/or asserted only against Consultant and not against any of Consultant's employees, officers or directors.

Consultant's liability with respect to any claims arising out of this AGREEMENT shall be absolutely limited to direct damages arising out of the SERVICES and Consultant shall bear no liability whatsoever for any consequential loss, injury or damage incurred by the CLIENT, including but not limited to claims for loss of use, loss of profits and/or loss of markets.

INDEMNITY FOR MOLD CLAIMS: It is understood by the parties that existing or constructed buildings may contain mold substances that can present health hazards and result in bodily injury, property damage and/or necessary remedial measures. If, during performance of the SERVICES, Consultant knowingly encounters any such substances, Consultant shall notify the CLIENT and, without liability for consequential or any other damages, suspend performance of services until the CLIENT retains a qualified specialist to abate and/or remove the mold substances. The CLIENT agrees to release and waive all claims, including consequential damages, against Consultant, its subconsultants and their officers, directors and employees arising from or in any way connected with the existence of mold on or about the project site whether during or after completion of the SERVICES. The CLIENT further agrees to indemnify and hold Consultant harmless from and against all claims, costs, liabilities and damages, including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs, arising in any way from the existence of mold on the project site whether during or after completion of the SERVICES, except for those claims, liabilities, costs or damages caused by the sole gross negligence and/or knowing or willful misconduct of Consultant. Consultant and the CLIENT waive all rights against each other for mold damages to the extent that such damages sustained by either party are covered by insurance.



PROFESSIONAL SERVICES TERMS AND CONDITIONS

DOCUMENTS: All of the documents prepared by or on behalf of Consultant in connection with the PROJECT are instruments of service for the execution of the PROJECT. Consultant retains the property and copyright in these documents, whether the PROJECT is executed or not. These documents may not be used for any other purpose without the prior written consent of Consultant. In the event Consultant's documents are subsequently reused or modified in any material respect without the prior consent of Consultant, the CLIENT agrees to defend, hold harmless and indemnify Consultant from any claims advanced on account of said reuse or modification.

Any document produced by Consultant in relation to the Services is intended for the sole use of Client. The documents may not be relied upon by any other party without the express written consent of Consultant, which may be withheld at Consultant's discretion. Any such consent will provide no greater rights to the third party than those held by the Client under the contract, and will only be authorized pursuant to the conditions of Consultant's standard form reliance letter.

Consultant cannot guarantee the authenticity, integrity or completeness of data files supplied in electronic format ("Electronic Files"). CLIENT shall release, indemnify and hold Consultant, its officers, employees, Consultant's and agents harmless from any claims or damages arising from the use of Electronic Files. Electronic files will not contain stamps or seals, remain the property of Consultant, are not to be used for any purpose other than that for which they were transmitted, and are not to be retransmitted to a third party without Consultant's written consent.

FIELD SERVICES: Consultant shall not be responsible for construction means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures, or for safety precautions and programs in connection with work on the PROJECT, and shall not be responsible for any contractor's failure to carry out the work in accordance with the contract documents. Consultant shall not be responsible for the acts or omissions of any contractor, subcontractor, any of their agents or employees, or any other persons performing any of the work in connection with the PROJECT. Consultant shall not be the prime contractor or similar under any occupational health and safety legislation.

GOVERNING LAW/COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS: The AGREEMENT shall be governed, construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the jurisdiction in which the majority of the SERVICES are performed. Consultant shall observe and comply with all applicable laws, continue to provide equal employment opportunity to all qualified persons, and to recruit, hire, train, promote and compensate persons in all jobs without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, disability or national origin or any other basis prohibited by applicable laws.

DISPUTE RESOLUTION: If requested in writing by either the CLIENT or Consultant, the CLIENT and Consultant shall attempt to resolve any dispute between them arising out of or in connection with this AGREEMENT by entering into structured non-binding negotiations with the assistance of a mediator on a without prejudice basis. The mediator shall be appointed by agreement of the parties. If a dispute cannot be settled within a period of thirty (30) calendar days with the mediator, if mutually agreed, the dispute shall be referred to arbitration pursuant to laws of the jurisdiction in which the majority of the SERVICES are performed or elsewhere by mutual agreement.

ASSIGNMENT: The CLIENT and Consultant shall not, without the prior written consent of the other party, assign the benefit or in any way transfer the obligations under these Terms and Conditions or any part hereof.

SEVERABILITY: If any term, condition or covenant of the AGREEMENT is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions of the AGREEMENT shall be binding on the CLIENT and Consultant.
