SUBJECT: THE SALE OF LOT 1 HARRY FEYER SUBDIVISION

In 2015, 2016, and again in 2017, the Homer City Council has resolved to sell Lot 1 Harry Feyer Subdivision.

The lot is a triangular-shaped sliver that fronts Kachemak Drive with development constraints that includes a section line easement, and water and sewer assessments totaling \$34,140.80. The 2017 assessed value of the property is approximately value of the assessments, \$34,200.

In March 2017, the City posted an Invitation to Bid noting the developments constraints and the assessment balances of \$34,140.80. The City received one bid, for one dollar and Resolution 17-034 authorized the sale. After two-months of countless phone calls to city staff the prospective buyer chose not to close unless the City reduced the balance of the assessments by approximately \$7,000.00. Based on the Invitation to Bid and Resolution 17-034 we could not proceed without reposting the Invitation to Bid.

To make the best use of staff time, I am recommending that the City use a real estate professional to market the property. Resolution 16-053 affirmed a three-year contract with Homer Real Estate based on a 10% commission rate. Since the value of this lot is approximately the value of the assessments, I am recommending that the 10% commission be based on the combined sales price and the value of the assessments. A real estate professional can contact adjacent property owners (who have the most to gain by purchasing this parcel), help to facilitate a replat of the parcel with the three adjacent property owners, and negotiate a sale that takes into consideration access issues and the assessments.

To be efficient, some flexibility is needed in regards to the sales price and the balance of the assessments. This resolution states that if the sales price, including the balance of the assessments, lowers by more than \$5,000 from previously accepted purchase agreements, (\$34, 141.80 = assessments + \$1 bid) the City Council will approve the final terms of the sale.





<u>The parties</u>. The parties to this contract are the Alaska Department of Public Safety (hereinafter referred to as the "Department") and the City of Homer (hereinafter referred to as the "City").

<u>Sole Agreement</u>. The City and the Department undertake this contract under the terms set forth below. This contract is the sole agreement between the parties relating to special services, and there are no other agreements, express or implied.

<u>Effective Date/Termination/Amendments</u>. This contract is effective July 1, 2017 and continues in force until June 30, 2018; except that it may be terminated by either party upon thirty (30) days written notification to the other. This agreement may be amended by written agreement of the parties.

1. The Department will pay the City for services provided in accordance with, and under the terms of, this contract. Payments will be made quarterly in the amount of \$9,000.00, for a total of \$36,000.00. Payment for services provided under this contract will be made in four annual payments in the amount of and covering the periods indicated below:

Lewis Ordinance 17 xxx to pay off library loan

I fully support using Permanent Fund proceeds to pay off the library loan even though we will save \$464,314 instead of the original projection of \$1M. This is a significant savings and a wise use of the windfall. I also support using the remainder of the Permanent Fund for the future police station, whether the Fund is dissolved now or when the police station is ready for construction.

The windfall we received is not large enough to grow to a productive endowment in a reasonable timeframe. It is a perfect windfall to pay for critical city infrastructure.

RE: Binding Effect of Homer Permanent Fund Ordinance

I have been asked whether the City Council is precluded from taking legislative action contrary to the provisions of HCC Chapter 3.12 that require deposits to the Homer Permanent Fund ("Permanent Fund"), or restrict expenditures from the Permanent Fund. I conclude that the City Council is not so precluded, but instead at any time may enact an ordinance either (i) amending or repealing HCC Chapter 3.12, or (ii) appropriating funds without complying with the provisions of HCC Chapter 3.12.

HCC Chapter 3.12 requires that 95% of "monies from the distribution of the Exxon Valdez settlement," and certain "wind-fall monies" be placed in the Permanent Fund.¹ "Windfall monies" include "monies from any source other than standard budgeted operating revenues and not allocated to any specific purpose," but do not include "bond proceeds, grant funds allocated to a specified purpose, or the proceeds of non-Exxon Valdez litigation when such proceeds are recovered as damages to compensate or reimburse the city for expenditures previously made by the city."²

60% of each contribution made to the Permanent Fund is allocated to an income subfund, and 40% is allocated to a growth sub-fund.³ The income from the income sub-fund may be expended for general governmental purposes, and its principal may be used for loans for City capital projects.⁴ The income from the growth sub-fund may not be expended, but is added to the principal of the growth sub-fund and reinvested.⁵ Except for loans from the principal of the

income sub-fund for City capital projects, the principal of both the income sub-fund and the growth sub-fund may not be distributed or spent without the authorization of 60% of city voters at a regular or special election.⁶

The City may "exercise any power not otherwise prohibited by law." The legislative power of the City is vested in the Council. It is a well established rule of municipal law that a city council may not limit the legislative power of future councils by prohibiting the repeal of certain ordinances:

The power of repeal extends, generally speaking, to all ordinances. Indeed, a municipal corporation cannot abridge its own legislative powers by the passage of irrevocable ordinances. The members of its legislative body are trustees for the public, and the nature and limited tenure of their office impress the ordinances enacted by them with liability to change. One council may not by an ordinance bind itself or its successors so as to prevent free legislation in matters of municipal government. Accordingly, in the absence of a valid provision to the contrary, a municipal council or assembly, having the power to legislate on, or exercise discretionary or regulatory authority over, any given subject, may exercise that power at will by enacting or repealing an ordinance in relation to that subject.⁹

Thus, the Council's could not "abridge its own legislative power" by enacting the provisions of HCC Chapter 3.12 that require the placement of certain monies in the Permanent Fund, or that restrict the expenditure of monies in the Permanent Fund.

The Council enacted HCC Chapter 3.12 by ordinance. Just as the Council was authorized to adopt HCC Chapter 3.12, the Council may amend or repeal it at any time. Alaska case law and general principles of municipal law establish the authority of the Council to repeal an ordinance:

Specific grant of power to repeal ordinances, however, ordinarily is not necessary since it is the general rule that power to enact ordinances implies power, unless otherwise provided in the grant, to repeal them. It is patently obvious that the effectiveness of any legislative body would be entirely destroyed if the power to amend or repeal its legislative acts were taken away from it.¹⁰

In addition to amending or repealing HCC Chapter 3.12, the Council may abrogate its restrictions simply by appropriating money from the Permanent Fund for any City purpose. The Council makes appropriations by ordinance, ¹¹ and the subsequent legislative act of such an appropriation would release the City from the prior legislative constraints of HCC Chapter 3.12. ¹²

Soundview Sidewalk and Pedestrian Safety Improvements

The Homer City Council (Ordinance 17-08) accepted and appropriated an Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities ATAP Grant in the amount of \$520,125.30; and appropriated the required match of \$208,049.70 from the HART Fund, for the purpose of completing the Safe Route To School improvements on Soundview Avenue. These improvements include construction of a concrete curb/gutter and asphalt sidewalk between Mullikin and the driveway entrance to the West Homer Elementary School, signage, crosswalks, radar warning signs and other traffic calming measures.

On July 20, 2017, bids were received for the Soundview Sidewalk and Pedestrian Safety Improvement Project. This work was advertised in the Homer News on June 22 and 29 and in the Peninsula Clarion on July 2, 2017. Procurement was completed in accordance with the City's procurement regulations and the ATAP Grant conditions.

Two responsive bids were received from qualified firms. The bid results were evaluated and the results are as follows.

Responsive Bidder's Names Amount

13	WHEREAS, Council created a Public Safety Building Review Committee (PSBRC) in
14	January 2014; and
15	WHEREAC The DCDDC colored a management of the Charles Highway and
16	WHEREAS, The PSBRC selected a property at the corner of the Sterling Highway and
17	Pioneer Avenue, commonly referred to as the HERC site, because it met the PSBRC's selection
18 19	criteria (e.g., lot size, property ownership, and above the tsunami zone); and
20	WHEREAS, The proposed new fire department was separated from the public safety
21	building project when it became apparent the cost was too steep to simultaneously build a
22	new police and fire station; and

24	WHEREAS, Council supported a bonding request to construct a reduced size public
25	safety campus with police station only that repurposed the HERC building as non-essential
26	space to the voters at the general election in October 2016 in an amount not to exceed twelve
27	million dollars; and

29	WHEREAS, Proposition #1 that would allow the City of Homer to incur debt and issue
30	general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed twelve million dollars (\$12,000,000) to
31	finance the planning, design, and construction of a police station and related capital
32	improvements was defeated by the voters at the October 4, 2016 regular election by 71 votes;

35	WHEREAS, Council created the Police Station Building Task Force in February of 2017
36	to provide guidance on how to move forward on the police station including site selection,
37	budget, operations and maintence, and public private partnerships; and

WHEREAS, The Police Station Building Task Force presented recommendations to Council via Memorandum 17-082 on May 30, 2017; and

WHEREAS, The Police Station Building Task Force recommended Heath Street and Grubstake Avenue (north of the post office) as the preferred site for a new police station; and

WHEREAS, The Task Force further recommended two building options for consideration by Council: option 2A an approximately 8,400 square foot building with a not to exceed budget of \$6 million and option 2B a 13,900 square foot building with a not to exceed budget of \$13.9 million; and

WHEREAS, The Council discussed the recommendations at length at the May 30 and June 12 meetings without being able to come to a consensus on cost or site for a new police station; and

WHEREAS, Council expressed an interest in keeping the HERC site as an option for the location of a new police station; and

WHEREAS, The HERC gym is currently used for Community Recreation including pickle ball, toddler play group, and Zumba, among other activities; and

WHEREAS, The Parks, Arts, Recreation and Culture Needs Assessment in 2015 concluded a that the most pressing recreational/cultural need in Homer was for a general-purpose gymnasium and multi-purpose space for dance, martial arts, performing arts, and community events; and

WHEREAS, The Needs Assessment further concluded that while a long-term option for a cultural and reactional center is explored, the City should investigate ways to keep the HERC open to help meet indoor space needs; and

WHEREAS, Investing in the HERC to increase the life span of the building and bring the downstairs up to fire code will allow expanded public use with greater occupancy capabilities than are currently allowed; and

WHEREAS, Repurposing the HERC in a way that is useful to the police department while maintaining the gym access to the public fills two very important needs in the community; and

WHEREAS, Currently the City spends \$40,000 - \$60,000 a year keeping the HERC in warm status. Repurposing the facility with improved energy efficiency, renovating the roof, and making it a useful facility will allow those operating dollars to be spent constructively on operating and maintaining a new police station; and

WHEREAS, Stantec Architecture is the firm selected by the City Council in March of 2014 to manage the design and construction for the public safety building under the General Contractor /Construction Manager model; and

WHEREAS, The Council has been working on meeting the need for a new police station for over 3 years and is still struggling with major variables such as site and cost; and

WHEREAS, Given the importance of the project and the differing opinions, it would be useful to have a professional facilitator guide Council thorough an extended worksession evaluating the pros and cons of different options with the goal of coming to consensus on an option that can be brought to the public for their feedback.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of Homer, Alaska authorizes Stantec Architecture to prepare three 10% concept designs for the new police station for consideration by Council:

- 1. A 9 million dollar facility located at the corner of Heath Street and Grubstake Avenue
- 2. A 6 million dollar facility the corner of Heath Street and Grubstake Avenue
- 3. Modified plans for the HERC site that remove the shooting range and allow public access to the downstairs/gym section of the building for recreation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City will contract with a <u>an independent</u> facilitator to conduct an extended worksession scheduled after the general election in October to discuss the three options in <u>detail</u> with the intent of gaining city council agreement on one site and <u>building concept</u>.
