### Memorandum 19-021

TO: Mayor Castner and Homer City Council

SUBJECT: Legislative Priorities

The purpose of this memo is to review the legislative priorities the City of Homer has taken a position on in order to inform discussion during the worksession on items to bring to the attention of legislators and members of the administration during the upcoming trip to Juneau for the 2019 Alaska Municipal League Winter Conference in Juneau.

Pertinent Resolutions passed since 2016:

-Resolution 18-088: A Resolution of the City Council of Homer, Alaska, Supporting Full Funding (\$7,409,439) for the State of Alaska Municipal Harbor Facility Grant Program in the FY 2020 State Capital Budget.

Governor Walker's budget included \$5 million for the program, which was maintained in the first draft release of Governor Dunleavy's budget. However, a final budget won't be released until February 13.

-Resolution 18-070(A): A Resolution of the Homer City Council Adopting the 2019-2024 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) and Establishing Capital Project Legislative Priorities for Fiscal Year 2020.

Homer's CIP book has been mailed to legislators, however we will hand-deliver the legislative priorities again during our meetings in Juneau. Though there continues to be fiscal uncertainty that will likely constrain any capital budget, it is important for our delegation to know the City's priorities so they can be on the lookout for any and all opportunities. These meetings will also be a good chance to update legislators on the Large Vessel Moorage Facility project.

- -Resolution 16-017: A Resolution of the City Council of Homer, Alaska, Expressing a Deep Sense of Urgency for the Alaska State Legislature to Take Immediate and Decisive Action During the 2016 Legislative Session to Enact a Complete Package of Initiatives to Provide for a Balanced, Sustainable, and Predictable State Budget for the Foreseeable Future.
- -March 13, 2017 Letter from Homer City Council to Governor Walker regarding the impact of proposed budget cuts and revenue measures.

Fiscal issues continue to be the largest challenge the state faces. Stay tuned for how these issues will be addressed by the current administration. We will know more once the final budget is released on the 13<sup>th</sup>,

but it is clear that cuts will continue to be part of the conversation. Municipalities need to stay alert and watch out for the downstream effect of state budget cuts.

-July 15, 2016 Letter to Governor Walker regarding importance of sales tax revenue to the City of Homer.

In 2018, the Supreme Court ruled in *South Dakota v. Wayfair Inc.* that states can mandate online retailers to collect sales tax. The landscape on sales tax has thus changed since the Wayfair decision and municipalities are struggling to interpret how to take advantage of opportunities the decision provides for expanding the local sales tax base and putting online companies on an even playing field with local retailers. It is possible the state will reopen the topic of a statewide sales tax given the increased revenue to be captured with online sales. The City of Homer contributed \$4,500 to the Alaska Municipal League's (AML) efforts to investigate a municipality-based tax alternative to the state sales tax collection. AML will provide updates to the participating municipalities while we are in Juneau.

-Resolution 18-091: A Resolution of the City Council of Homer, Alaska, Supporting the Siting of the Alaska Gasline Development Corporation's (AGDC) Alaska LNG Liquefaction Plant and Marine Terminal in Nikiski, Alaska.

After speaking with ADGC, staff told me that they think a different location for the terminus of the project at this point is very unlikely. They explained that the rigorous review process that went into site selection, along with the funds and time that have been invested thus far in Nikiski as the terminus, make it unlikely for the location to change. The bigger question is how committed the current administration and the Alaska State Legislature are to the project.

- Resolution 19-008 (yet to be adopted, on agenda for February 11 meeting): A Resolution of the City Council of Homer, Alaska, Opposing the \$20 Million Dollar Repeal of the K-12 State Aide to School Districts for the Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2019.

Issues/ Legislation to Watch:

Comprehensive reform to Title IV: Stakeholders have been working on sweeping changes to Title IV, the statutes that govern alcohol in the State of Alaska. Though the City of Homer has not taken any official stance on this very large and evolving piece of legislation (SB76 during the previous legislature: <a href="http://www.legis.state.ak.us/PDF/30/Bills/SB0076F.PDF">http://www.legis.state.ak.us/PDF/30/Bills/SB0076F.PDF</a>), we have been following this issue due to the economic impact beverage and restaurant establishments have in our area. As an FYI, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board will be having a meeting at the Alaska State Library while we are in Juneau this month (February 19-20).

Senate Bill 5: Senator Stevens has introduced a bill that would allow municipalities to invest in the Alaska Permanent Fund. With an excellent track record for protecting capital and rate of return, this could be an interesting opportunity for municipalities looking to increase the value of their savings. This would be a good issue to ask the Senator about during our visit.

1 CITY OF HOMER 2 **HOMER, ALASKA** 3 City Manager/Port Director 4 **RESOLUTION 18-088** 5 6 A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF HOMER, ALASKA, IN 7 SUPPORT OF FULL FUNDING (\$7,409,439) FOR THE STATE OF ALASKA MUNICIPAL HARBOR FACILITY GRANT PROGRAM IN THE FY 8 9 2020 STATE CAPITAL BUDGET. 10 11 WHEREAS, The majority of the public boat harbors in Alaska where constructed by the State during the 1960s and 1970s; and 12 13 WHEREAS, These harbor facilities represent critical transportation links and are the 14 transportation hubs for waterfront commerce and economic development in Alaskan coastal 15 16 communities; and 17 18 WHEREAS, These harbor facilities are ports of refuge and areas for protection for oceangoing vessels and fishermen throughout the State of Alaska, especially in coastal Alaskan 19 communities; and 20 21 22 WHEREAS, The State of Alaska over the past nearly 30 years has transferred ownership of most of these State-owned harbors, many of which were at or near the end of their service 23 life at the time of transfer, to local municipalities; and 24 25 26 WHEREAS, The municipalities took over this important responsibility even though they knew that these same harbor facilities were in poor condition at the time of transfer due to the 27 state's failure to keep up with deferred maintenance; and 28 29 30 WHEREAS, Consequently, when local municipal harbormasters formulated their annual harbor facility budgets, they inherited a major financial burden that their local municipal 31 governments could not afford; and 32 33 WHEREAS, In response to this financial burden, the Governor and the Alaska Legislature 34 passed legislation in 2006, supported by the Alaska Association of Harbormasters and Port 35 Administrators, to create the Municipal Harbor Facility Grant program, AS 29.60.800; and 36 37 WHEREAS, The Alaska Association of Harbormasters and Port Administrators, is 38 pleased with the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities administrative process to 39 review, score and rank applicants to the Municipal Harbor Facility Grant Program, since state 40 funds may be limited; and 41

WHEREAS, For each harbor facility grant application, these municipalities have committed to invest 100% of the design and permitting costs and 50% of the construction cost; and

WHEREAS, The municipalities of the City of Anchorage, the City and Borough of Juneau, City of Ketchikan, City and Borough of Sitka, City of Whale Pass, and the City of Whittier have offered to contribute \$7,409,439 in local match funding for FY 2020 towards eight harbor projects of significant importance locally as required in the Harbor Facility Grant Program; and

WHEREAS, Completion of these harbor facility projects is all dependent on the 50% match from the State of Alaska's Municipal Harbor Facility Grant Program; and

WHEREAS, During the last ten years the Municipal Harbor Facility Grant Program has only been fully funded twice; and

WHEREAS, During the last ten years the backlog of projects necessary to repair and replace these former State owned harbors has increased to over \$100,000,000.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that City Council of Homer, Alaska, urges full funding in the amount of \$7,409,439 by the Governor and the Alaska Legislature for the State of Alaska's Municipal Harbor Facility Grant Program in the FY 2020 State Capital Budget in order to ensure enhanced safety and economic prosperity among Alaskan coastal communities.

WHEREAS, Major business leaders in the state have warned that they would be unlikely to continue making significant commercial investments in Alaska if the Legislature fails to address the fiscal deficit during the 2016 legislative session; and

WHEREAS, Governor Walker has introduced a complete fiscal plan to provide a sustainable and predicable balanced budget, using the strength of our existing financial assets, and a balanced blend of spending reductions and additional new revenues; and

WHEREAS, While spending reductions must be a part of any balanced fiscal solution, extreme care must be exercised to not inadvertently cut our way into an economic recession as was done in the 1980's; and

WHEREAS, Every dollar of cash reserves spent now to fund one-time budget shortfalls, is then unavailable to continue working for the state as an ongoing income producing asset into the future; and

WHEREAS, Continuing to spend down cash reserves in the short-term, will reduce the amount of sustainable revenue we can plan to generate from our current financial assets in the future, resulting in the necessity to increase other sources of revenue (taxes) in the future to compensate; and

WHEREAS, Now more than ever is the time for statesmanship, not provincial politics or electioneering rhetoric. Politically difficult decisions are required this year.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of Homer, Alaska that:

<u>Section 1</u>. The City Council of Homer, Alaska, calls upon the Alaska State Legislature to take affirmative and immediate action this year to enact a comprehensive package of initiatives that will provide for a sustainable and predictable balanced state budget for the foreseeable future.

<u>Section 2</u>. The City Council of Homer, Alaska, appreciates the difficult work of the Administration to put forth one possible comprehensive fiscal solution; and while the (Community Name) may not support every aspect of this plan, does recognize it as an appropriate starting point for legislative deliberation.

<u>Section 3</u>. The City Council of Homer, Alaska, insists that the Alaska State Legislature engage in meaningful discussions of all fiscal options without regard to perceived negative political fallout.

Governor Walker and Legislators of the great State of Alaska,

The Homer City Council continues to recognize our ongoing state fiscal crisis. During our recent visit to the state capitol we were encouraged by the attention being given to this serious matter by legislators. However, we found it disconcerting to find the House and Senate so far apart on the solution to the crisis. We reaffirm Homer City Council's position submitted to you during the last legislative session via Resolution 16-017 (see attached). Producing an ongoing balanced, sustainable, and predictable budget brings confidence to Alaskan residents, investors, and the economy as a whole. We support new measures that will create a balanced and fair revenue stream to offset oil revenue losses.

The Homer City Council evaluated proposals being discussed by the legislature for balancing the state budget and has developed positions as follows:

#### REVENUE

- Homer City Council recognizes the need to use our largest asset the Permanent Fund as part of the solution and supports a percent of market value (POMV) approach that funds government while protecting the principal of the fund.
- Potential mechanisms to fill the remaining gap include an income tax, a statewide sales tax, and a variety of taxes on specific goods (such as studded tires and motor fuels). Sales taxes and taxes on specific goods may have direct impacts on municipalities such as the City of Homer.
  - O Sales Tax: Over 50% of general fund revenue for the City of Homer comes from sales tax, making it an important part of how government is funded in a small town that serves as a hub community for a much greater area. Combined with the Kenai Peninsula Borough sales tax, Homer shoppers pay 7.5% sales tax. Any state-wide sales tax MUST consider the impact to local communicates and not simply add a new sales tax on top of what local municipalities charge.
  - Taxes on Specific Goods: Specific taxes goods (such as studded tires or motor fuels) hit rural areas harder than urban areas because the cost of these items is already higher. Multiple taxes on specific goods results in "death by a thousand taxes" to municipalities and local residents.

#### **BUDGET CUTS**

- The Homer City Council understands that budget cuts will continue to be considered as the state struggles to make ends meet. The community of Homer has suffered from cuts to state government during the past several years. As cuts are made, problems in our municipality, ranging from drug violence to heavy snow loads, do not go away. Below are examples of past and proposed state budget cuts that have direct or indirect impacts on the City of Homer.
  - Community Jails—the City of Homer contracts with the Department of Corrections to help fund our jail.
     Alaska State Troopers house prisoners at the Homer Community jail from well outside City limits. Past

- cuts to our contract have affected our ability to staff the jail and future cuts would be highly detrimental.
- State Troopers—the Homer police department partners with the Alaska State Troopers on law enforcement. Reductions in coverage on the lower Kenai Peninsula affects the ability of the Homer police to do their jobs and compromises the safety of the greater Homer area.
- O Transportation—Homer is criss-crossed with state maintained roads and our community has one highway linking us to the central peninsula and Anchorage. We depend on the Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities (ADOT&PF) to perform year-round maintenance on the state highway and state roads within Homer. We also have agreements with ADOT&PF for winter maintenance that would be jeopardized with further cuts to the agency. In addition, as the home port of the M/V Tustumena and the Alaska Marine Highway System (AMHS) link to Seldovia, Kodiak, and southwest Alaska, Homer City Council recognizes the importance and value of the AMHS. We are concerned about the economic impact further cuts to the AMHS would have on coastal municipalities.
- K-12 Education—While K-12 education is a function of the Kenal Peninsula Borough, cuts to the school district's budget result in changes that directly affect our community's economy.
- O University—Homer is home to the Kachemak Bay Campus (KBC) of the Kenai Peninsula College. KBC is at the heart of Homer, providing classes our community members depend on to seek undergraduate and graduate degrees, learn trades, and continue their educations. KBC is a direct positive for our economy and its loss or diminishment would leave a deep hole.
- Community Assistance—The City of Homer no longer includes Community Assistance (formerly known as Revenue Sharing) in our annual operating budget due to its uncertain nature. However, we use the funds for capital projects in the community and appreciate that it offsets the unfunded mandate of the senior property tax exemption.
- PERS/TRS—Homer City Council appreciates the state legislature honoring the existing agreement with municipalities on funding rates for PERS (Public Employees' Retirement System) and TRS (Teachers' Retirement System).

We applaud your diligence in working to resolving this crisis. As you work to balance the state budget for a sustainable future for our state, we encourage you to fully weigh the ramifications cuts and taxes have on municipalities.

Thank you again for your willingness to serve the residents of this state and your work to secure a stable future for generations to come.

The City of Homer would like to take this opportunity to express how important sales tax revenue is to our community. Homer shoppers pay 7.5% sales tax (4.5% City of Homer and 3% Kenai Peninsula Borough) making Homer one of the highest sales tax rates in the State. Sales tax makes up over 70% of our tax revenue. The City of Homer's population is a little over 5,000. However, we serve as the hub for over a 30 mile radius. The City could not provide the services it does without contributions from non-residents through sales tax. These area residents use our roads, library, parks, and many other services. For the most part, they are happy to contribute their share to the services they enjoy. The City does not tax non-prepared food year round; only during the peak summer months (June-August).

The City understands the need to take immediate and decisive action to solve the state's fiscal crisis and was one of the first municipalities to pass a resolution to the Alaska State Legislature to pass a balanced, sustainable, and predictable state budget for the future (Resolution 16-007). However, when weighing fiscal options, please consider the impact of state sales tax on smaller communities who have a reduced tax base and depend on sales tax dollars to provide essential services.

## 'The information and the data is based on economics, it shouldn't be based on politics'-Former Gov. Sean Parnell examines AKLNG

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (KTUU) - Former Governor Sean Parnell has started the long process of reviewing and being briefed on everything regarding the multi-billion dollar trans Alaska natural gas pipeline project.

"The public needs the confidence that everything that's happening is in the state's best interest, and in their interests," Parnell said. "So the governor-elect has tasked me to help get that information for him, and then he gets to make the decision on a path forward as the new governor."

Gov.-elect Mike Dunleavy has been skeptical about Gov. Bill Walker's deal with China to build a natural gas pipeline off the North Slope. And, for his own part, Parnell's own plan for an AKLNG project was vastly different from Walkers, with Walker having the state in the lead role versus private industry being in the lead.

The dream of building a gasline goes back several years. Before Walker's plan there was Parnell's, and before his, Sarah Palin's. The idea has existed in some form since the Trans Alaska Pipeline system began shipping crude oil in 1977.

The AKLNG project would cost \$43 billion to construct an 807-mile pipeline, as well as a liquefaction and gas treatment facility. After all the bills are paid off, the state would be the majority owner of the infrastructure.

The financing structure is still in flux, but would most likely be paid for through the partnerships in the Bank of China and Goldman Sachs.

All the other details about what has happened since Parnell was running the state will be revealed to him over the next few weeks, which he will then report on to Dunleavy.

"My job is to get Gov.-elect Dunleavy the best information I can get him so that he can make the decision based on where he's coming from," Parnell said. "The information and the data is based on economics, it shouldn't be based on politics, so it kind of drives a person in his shoes to a decision, in the sense that the data will demonstrate what's in Alaska's best interests from an economic perspective, from a social perspective, and then he gets to make that decision."

Industry expert and co-publisher of the Alaska Legislative Digest, Tim Bradner says Parnell was a good pick to examine the project. He says Dunleavy's comments during the election show he might have "philosophical" problems with the plan.

"During the campaign, several times, he said he felt they (the state) should step back and invite the companies (the producers) back in to lead the project again," Bradner said. "Now I'm not really sure the companies want to lead the project at this point. In fact, they're supporting the state in its efforts to continue work."

Previously, Dunleavy has said he'd like to see the confidentiality agreements regarding the project.

"As I mentioned on the campaign trail, once we get in there and have that conversation, take a look at those confidentiality agreements, we'll have a better idea and we'll report out to you guys as soon as we understand more about the pipeline process," Dunleavy said during the campaign.

Austin Baird, a spokesperson for Walker sent this statement: "Developing the North Slope's vast proven natural gas reserves has been a priority of the State of Alaska for generations, regardless of who occupies the Office of the Governor. The Parnell Administration and the Legislature created the necessary framework for the Walker Administration to make historic progress on the Alaska LNG Project over the past four years. Now, we hope to have a collaborative transition to ensure continuity for the project as Governor-elect Mike Dunleavy prepares to take office."

Parnell says he's met once with AGDC for an update and he plans to meet with them twice this week as well.

"I'd like to be able to say at the end of this, and have the governor elect be able to say, that there is a way forward, there is a way to maximize this gas in Alaska's interest," Parnell said. "That remains to be seen, in our time, and in this point in our history, but I think Alaskans can help make this happen."


- Congenital heart defects (CHDs) are the *most common* birth defects in the United States, affecting approximately **1** in every **110** (about 40,000) babies each year.

- For many forms of CHD, **surgery is not a cure**. Congenital heart disease is a lifelong condition requiring specialized care, and often additional surgeries and medications are needed later in life.
- Most causes of congenital heart defects are unknown.
- About 25% of children born with CHD need heart surgery or other interventions to survive.



## **VISITORS**

## A. Opioid Task Force Quarterly Update (10 minutes)

Stephanie Stillwell, facilitator of the South Kenai Peninsula (SKP) Opioid Task Force, addressed the SKP Roadmap for Success in Treatment and Recovery form Substance Use Disorder. In 2017 the group assessed what services were available and identified gaps in services including no detox facility on the peninsula, no residential treatment facility, limited recovery efforts and 12 step programs, limited accessible treatment services for addiction, and no sober living or peer support services. She reported some of those gaps have been filled over these two years that include:

- A detox facility available through Central Peninsula Care Transitions
- Full time services are now available through CICADA
- Expanded services through Ninilchik Traditional Council Clinic including Peer Support Staff and an office in Homer
- Expanded services through South Peninsula Hospital including medication assisted treatment for pregnant women, and medication assisted treatment in the emergency department
- Improved relationships between law enforcement and treatment services
- Growth with all the agencies that have been engaged with the Task Force
- Peer Support and Recovery Groups
  - o including NA and AA groups,
  - o Parent to Parent Support Group,
  - o Fit to Recover Program,
  - The syringe exchange program

Ms. Stillwell reported there will be a Peer Support Training in April and May and the Task Force continues to work on prevention efforts. They are continuing the community conversation, and events and outreach efforts to de-stigmatize addiction and recovery.

## B. Set Free Alaska, Substance Abuse Treatment (10 minutes)

Philip Licht, Executive Director of Set Free Alaska, shared a success story of four men who participated in and graduated from an 18 month intensive program with over a year of sobriety, they were all employed, and through the program were able to get their driver's licenses back and become productive members of the community. He explained Set Free

Alaska is a Christian program and their vision is Freedom from Addiction. They have a belief that everyone is valuable, they have incredible worth, and they have something to give this world, and the program champions them in the road to recovery. Their program services all individuals regardless of their belief system, gender, and age, through evidence based, best practice means.

Mr. Licht provided an overview of Set Free Alaska's program in the Valley where they have an outpatient adult counseling program that serves about 130 people, and a 16 bed women's residential facility that serves women with children and/or women who are pregnant. They have a children's behavioral health program for kids who have are struggling because of traumatic experiences and treat them to the end of prevention because they are at high risk to become substance abusers later in life. There are around 50 kids in that program. They have 45 to 50 professional staff members and peers that include seven graduated clients who are in recovery and have been hired and give back to the program. They've been certified by the State since 2010 and he shared the statistics of the positive results and success with their program, which are significantly and statistically greater than the statewide average for outpatient and residential treatment services. Initially the thought for Homer was sober support and outpatient but after receiving feedback from the Task Force, providers and the community, the real need is residential services and the majority of the clients that are being referred are men. They have decided to move toward a men's residential facility and it's a project that is substantially more expensive to launch. Set Free Alaska submitted a proposal for a \$1.5 million grant and he feels they have a strong possibility to launch and sustain the program within one years' time. They have commitment of a \$400,000 donation towards a facility, a \$200,000 invitation for a grant to go toward the project, and are asking for consideration of the \$177,172 from the city. This will help leverage other funding toward the project and help show the State there is a local match. This will bring money into the local economy with the remodel, and bringing in staff. He noted the letters of support for the grant that were provided by local organizations.

## A. Mayor Pro Tem Report on Committee of the Whole Discussion

Councilmember Smith reported Council discussed the HERC community conversation that was held on January 22<sup>nd</sup> and Resolution 19-006 regarding requesting letters of interest from potential users.

## B. Councilmember Report on Worksession Discussion (when applicable)

Mayor Castner reported there was a Special Meeting scheduled instead of a worksession. There was no action taken to go into executive session and it was rescheduled to their next meeting to allow for better notification of the topics to be addressed.

## C. Borough Report

Kelly Cooper, Borough Assembly Member, reported the Governor introduced legislation that pulls back the one time appropriation of \$20 million to public education, which equates to \$1.4 million for the Borough. She encouraged people to look at the information on the website and reach out to legislators. The assembly has appropriated \$425,000 for the design and replacement of the boiler plant at Homer High School, and people should expect to see additional things come up to be replaced at these aging buildings. They approved the lease purchase of two diagnostic ultra sound machines for South Peninsula Hospital funded through the SPH Service Area Capital Project fund, entered into agreement to ask for an extension for the Kachemak Silo school project, appropriated \$450,000 for earthquake response and repairs, and are participating in AML working group to establish a centralized sales tax administrator for online sellers. The assembly introduce ordinances to appropriate \$2,322,000 for phase II closure of the Homer Landfill, and to adopt the 2018 Homer Comprehensive Plan. They accepted the final installment of \$75,000 from the Tesoro Foundation Grant for their Public Safety Communication Center. She and Assembly Member Smalley have introduced an ordinance to enact local provisions for the protection of whistleblowers. The Assembly established the Borough's 2019 State Capital Project Priorities for road projects allowing them to apply for grants to supplement road projects, and established Capital Project Priorities for Public Safety. Their number one priority is the self-contained breathing apparatus for all borough and municipal fire department volunteers, and that includes the City of Homer.

There was brief discussion about the age of the roof at the high school and that the City had a section in code regarding whistle blowers.

Kate Finn, Library Advisory Boardmember reported the Board hasn't met since her last report and gave an overview of upcoming events at the library.

Karin Marks, Economic Development Advisory Commission Chair, reported the Commission continues their work on wayfinding, streetscape, and walkability. Now that there is discussion on the Transportation Plan which correlates with what the Commission is talking about, they are looking at trying to bring other interested parties into the discussion and trying to figure out how to consolidate this and do it in a workable form to have a chance to vet some of the ideas before they bring them to Council.

## 4. Parks Art Recreation and Culture Advisory Commission

Dave Lewis, Parks Art Recreation and Culture Advisory Commissioner, reported the Commission met on January 17<sup>th</sup> and discussed the Ben Walter's Park Celebration scheduled for Friday, February 8<sup>th</sup> from 4:00 to 7:00 p.m., hosting the March 29<sup>th</sup> Native Youth Olympics, the RFP for Art for the Police Station Project, and donation of a bench to the City.

## 5. Port and Harbor Advisory Commission

Steve Zimmerman, Port and Harbor Advisory Commission Chair, reported at their last meeting the recommended a lease amendment for Alaska Custom Seafoods with conditions that the Commission and Council receive immediate notification from city administration when there is a problem, rather than trying to handle it in-house. They reviewed the Land Allocation Plan and recommend adding one small piece of property to be available for overslope development lease across from Lot 9A on Fish Dock Road. The Anchorage Boat Show is next month and the Marine Trades Association and the City participate in that, it's a great show and introduces Homer to people who haven't been here yet. He encouraged people to attend if they're in Anchorage.

6. Americans with Disabilities Act Compliance Committee

Councilmember Aderhold report the committee hasn't met since her last report.

## 7. Attorney Report

City Attorney Wells provided a brief summary of legal work the firm has been doing for the last month including the Griswold matters, most recently Mr. Griswold's appeal of the Hearing Officer's decision granting and approving a conditional use permit on a local bike shop. He shared an experience where the parent of a young man who was struggling with methamphetamines was reaching out for help on what options might be for their son, and the tragic result of the son taking his life in front of the parent. He emphasized there are a lot of people struggling in our community and we need to have services available to assist in their recovery.

Councilmember Venuti commented she's had people approach her about this because there isn't any information about where the facility might be located. She agrees we need these services, but the not in my backyard attitude is real in our community, and she feels the Council needs to have a plan on how to address these concerns to help people allay their fears.

Councilmember Smith agreed that Homer is small and there's nowhere in the area that isn't in our back yard. Currently it exists in its worst form. Ms. Stillwell talked earlier about destigmatization, and they need to be in a safe space, where ever it is, we need to be accepting of the fact that we need to help these people.

Councilmember Erickson commented that Set Free Alaska is a professional organization with trained staff, people who know what they're doing, and where ever it is, it's going to be done right. That's the way we need to approach this. We want people to address their addiction and have families come back together. She supports this program.

Councilmember Lord added that we have planning and zoning, a Planning Commission, and regulations in place and standards that have to be met, and she is a believer in that process. To consider that it's not in your back yard in some form is a form of complete denial. It's out there and they are our neighbors. As a community we can't afford for people not to acknowledge it's a truth in our community.

Councilmember Aderhold commented another piece to this puzzle is having positive outlets in the community for people to do, and that's where our discussion around the HERC come in. She wants to make sure that if we're willing to put money toward this new facility that we're also willing to put City money toward our own building to create a safe and healthy place for people to congregate.

## **COMMENTS OF THE AUDIENCE**

Former Mayor Bryan Zak commented he's been travelling and it's great to be back, this is the best town in the world. He's been traveling around the South China Seas and visiting nations that don't have opioid addiction because they have been addressing the issue. When thinking about the root cause in our nation we need our legislators to deal with that. It's positive that we're addressing it in our community. We can address it here, but at some point how are we going to deal with the root cause issue in our nation.

Mark Edens, local pastor, shared about a call he received from a mother whose son has gone through several rehabilitations over the last few years, and is in trouble again, and asked what to do. He replied the best thing he knows is to send him to Wasilla where Set Free Alaska is. There's no better addiction free operation out there. He's known Philip Licht for some time and views him as a professional, as fiscally responsible, and someone who has an incredible record of seeing people free from addiction.

Larry Slone commented he doesn't know anyone he's aware of who's addicted, but will take on faith everyone's information about it being a social problem. He's curious about Mayor Zak's comments and how they deal with it in Asia. He suspects he's talking about the top end and the availability of drugs and those promoting it. If that's Mayor Zak's point then more emphasis needs to be put on stopping the introduction of drugs at the top end and more severe punishment for the pushers. It comes down to cost/analysis benefit and that has to be considered.

Minnesota and supervised one in Iowa. The numbers presented tonight about people getting through these treatment programs with success are pretty incredible. It really stands out to him that they hire some of the people on. He shared that he has three sons in school here and he's seen it first hand in the parks, at Safeway, and his nephew was poked by a needle stuck in a pull out couch at a hotel. It's very real and it is here. He knows the concern about people not wanting it in their back yard, but it is here in our back yards. He'd like to see the people sleeping in the woods in a place where they're receiving help.

Tom Hagen commented he's been involved in this process since April, and reiterated that the problem is here in our backyards. It's our kids, our moms, and our dads, no one is exempt. The in town aspect is important to consider because when you hit bottom, it's important that things are in walking distance. Addicts are already camping in town, why not have treatment and help available in town. Set Free has exhibited a remarkable ability to successfully do this. Let's bring help to where the problem is.

Jaclyn Rainwater commented on the importance of inpatient treatment. She has five years clean and sober, she went to five different treatment centers in Washington and Oregon, has been in the system a lot and got clean in a 16 month faith based treatment center. She remembers being 19 in Homer addicted to pills and meth and wanted to go to inpatient, but there was nothing in State. She shared about the importance of having a local facility where family can visit, and it's a blessing that there is inpatient in the MatSu Valley and hopefully here in Homer.

Philip Licht, Executive Director of Set Free Alaska, acknowledged they dealt the same issue in the MatSu where a majority was generally supportive, but there were some who they lovingly termed the loud minority, and their concerns are genuine. In the Valley he met with people individually and held a community meeting to allow people to come, ask questions, and share information. Usually its fears on the unknown, and information is really powerful. He's willing to do the same thing here. The best information to give is the program has 24 hour wake staff, full security cameras on the outside, and individuals are not free to come and go without staff presence.

Josh Garvey, city resident, thanked Council for considering supporting Set Free Alaska, he's excited about the prospect of getting help from such a professional outfit. There services are desperately needed and long overdue. He believes the funds being directed to Set Free Alaska will, in the long run, make it easier on our Police Department and reduce enforcement costs to the City overall. Personally it gives him a lot of hope that we'll now have a real solution for those who want help getting better. He shared how he and his family have made a point to minister to three young men as a part of an outreach, but that can only do so much. We need professional here to be part of a solution to the current crisis.

Kate Finn, city resident, said she's thrilled about the Set Free Alaska opportunity. She acknowledged Mayor Zak's comments and questioning of how we umbrella everything that supports healthy growing up, relationships, family, and community, so we don't end up having to have people who go into rehab, here or anywhere. She noted Assembly Member Cooper's comments about the reduction in education funding and she thinks we need to do whatever we can to lobby and to help our borough and city support the organizations and facilities that support women, children, and families.

## **COMMENTS OF THE MAYOR**

Mayor Castner thanked Council for their work tonight. He explained he's been working with Administration on the budget and looking at how money moves in the City. He looked into the natural gas line debt and reported on an issue he discovered. It was his understanding, as well as Representative Seaton, and City Administration that they gave an aid to construction to Enstar in the amount of \$2.5 million that was going to be paid back at \$1 per thousand cubic feet of gas. He spoke to John Simms, president of Enstar, and found out that an internal rate of return of 11.075% was added. In reviewing the City's files, this isn't something the City inadvertently agreed to, it was something the Regulatory Commission had approved prior to our getting involved in the gas business. He ensure everyone that this is being addressed and the City has expert legal counsel experienced in regulatory filings working to resolve this.

## **COMMENTS OF THE CITY COUNCIL**

Councilmember Venuti thanked the Mayor for this information, and for the information he shared regarding New York's efforts to ban plastic. That is coming up here locally and she doesn't want people to forget about it.

Councilmember Smith thanked the Mayor for looking into the Enstar issue. He also thanked community members who came out and testified tonight, and Mr. Licht for his presentation.

Councilmember Lord also thanked everyone for testifying and everyone who's paying attention to what's happening in the City. Addiction is so challenging because it's a community social issue and also deeply personal. She appreciated Mr. Licht's comments about treatment for everyone, regardless of faith. It's important to remember that open service doesn't have to come from a secular place. She highlighted things going on and programs she's been participating in with her kids including skiing, ice skating, SPARK open gym, the pool, the library, Bay Club kids rock climbing, SPROUT activities, and PTA after school programs at Paul Banks.

Councilmember Erickson thanked Set Free Alaska and the Opioid Task Force for being here tonight. She recognized Aaron Weisser for his efforts in putting together the New Year's Eve Fireworks event. She said she enjoyed seeing the dogs come through for the Tustumena 200 race, and encouraged people get out and enjoy the upcoming Winter Carnival and other February events. She shared stories about her grandparents and winter carnival parade floats from the 1950's.

Councilmember Aderhold commented she prefers to be there in person, but she's at the Alaska Marine Science Symposium. Today was interesting and enlightening with keynote speakers

sharing information about the status of our oceans. Over the weekend she had the opportunity to attend and Alaska Common Ground Community Forum that was on the cost of Alaska's economic rollercoaster and she encouraged everyone to look up the information on their website. There were six diverse panelists and an economist from ICER. Key topics were on uncertainty, which is bad for investment and increases costs. We are in a very uncertain time in the State with the new administration and one thing the group had consensus on was the need for the State to have diverse revenue sources. The CEO of Northrim Bank was a panelist and said we need to be invested in the State we live in, we cannot rely on industry to pay for everything, and a quote was "All of Alaska Together." She encourage people to participate in the Big Read events and look at the Story Walk with the story boards of cartoons by Roz Chast.

Councilmember Stroozas thanked the Mayor for his work on the issue with Enstar. He thanked everyone who came to the Hospice spaghetti feed fundraiser on Saturday night, and thanked all the local merchants who contributed to the auction.

At the January 28<sup>th</sup> City Council meeting under comments of the Mayor I disclosed an issue that I discovered only days earlier regarding the \$1 per MCF Tariff Southern Peninsula Natural Gas rate payers have been paying on their Enstar bill as part of a Contribution in Aid of Construction to help fund brining natural gas to Homer. The issues will perhaps be more sharply defined following Enstar's visit Monday evening.

In any event, there are many inconsistencies and questions regarding the reporting and terms and conditions of this arrangement that need expert attention and advice. The City of Homer has brought this issue to the attention of our law firm, Birch Horton Bittner and Cherot for legal advice. They have, within their firm, expertise in the technical workings of the regulatory agency. Understanding the issue is complicated and has the potential to be time consuming.

The purpose of this memo is to inform the public that the City is taking this very seriously and to obtain the approval of the Council to spend budgeted attorney dollars investigating on behalf of Southern Peninsula Rate Payers under our existing contract.

I have also met with Mayor Overway from Kachemak City, and they are willing to help with costs should the need arise.

SUBJECT: FIRE DEPARTMENT FIREFIGHTER PPE NEEDS

One of the most important items that HVFD can do for its members is to ensure their safety. On the front line of this is providing PPE that meets the current industry standards, is in good condition, and fits the user appropriately. NFPA 1851 sets the industry standard for this equipment and is what we strive to meet. The NFPA standard sets a life span of the FF PPE to 10 years of use and in what serviceable condition it is to be maintained.

Our current budget is \$16,000/ year for safety equipment. To outfit a firefighter with helmet, boots, and gloves is around \$4,000. This allows us to purchase around 4 sets of gear per year.

In January, HVFD did an inventory of all of it current personal protective equipment for age and condition. This information will be used for planning purposes to allow us to budget appropriately for future purchasing needs of the department. Unfortunately, several immediate needs became apparent. First, the majority of our helmets, although in good condition, are out or soon to be out of this 10 year period. Secondly, we had an outstanding recruitment for our firefighter class that started this month. Our average class is 5-8 students and this one is currently has 13. Although this is good problem to have, it has put a large strain on our gear inventory.

Firefighting PPE is also made custom to fit person who is wearing it. As we all know, people come in every size and shape. This makes an interesting dilemma when fitting members for gear. We can't allow firefighters to operate in hazardous conditions with gear that is too small and could allow a sleeve to ride up their arm and expose skin to the heat of a fire. The gear also must also not be so large as to not allow the firefighter to move and work safely. Due to these circumstances, we have some inventory of gear available but it's not meeting the safety levels we require.

To meet the current needs of the Department, we are requesting addition funding for 8 sets of gear to the 4 we already have budgeted FY2019 and 25 helmets to replace the current inventory that is over the 10 year life span. This totals to \$32,000 for gear and \$7,500 for helmets.

The Homer area has a significant need for affordable housing. Communities throughout the state where housing costs overburden residents tend to lose population which has a negative impact on the economic vitality of the region. In Homer hospitality workers, teachers, Safeway employees, and others are struggling to find decent housing at affordable rates. A recent market study indicated that the existing affordable housing around Homer has a 0 percent vacancy rate and significant waiting

To address this need for additional affordable housing, East End Partners, LLC., an Alaskan based company, is developing 24 new rental units at 60398 East End Road. Affiliates of East End Partners have built over 1,000 similar housing units throughout Alaska including in Anchorage, Kodiak, Fairbanks and Juneau.

lists exist at these properties. Even regular market rate rental properties have very few vacancies.

The East End Road project will be called East End Cottages. Construction is expected to start this summer and units will be finished a year later. 80% of the units in this development will target those making 60% or less of median income and the balance will have no income restrictions. The 24 units will be split up into 20 two bedroom units and 4 three bedroom units. Some units will be set aside

1

for those with physical or mental disabilities and those that are coming out of transitional housing (homeless). The 1.46 acre site will include parking for 50 cars. There will also be a playground.

Focus will be placed on developing a property that functions efficiently. Units will meet the Alaska Building Energy Efficiency Standards (5 Star plus BEES rating), all appliances in the units will be Energy Star rated, and special attention will be placed on equipping units with low flow faucets, shower heads, dishwashers, and washer and dryers. In addition, both solar photovoltaic and solar thermal alternative energy system will be incorporated into the building design. These systems will reduce energy consumption by at least 10%.

Developments like this have many challenges. One the biggest obstacles in this particular case is delivering high quality water to our tenants. Water wells in the area show poor results and would require treatment and monitoring. Hauling water is possible but it is expensive and logistically challenging. We have calculated that 1,500 gallons would need to be delivered to the property every day. Hooking into the Homer waterline that runs along East End Road would be a much more practical alternative.

Under the circumstances, we request that the City of Homer allow us to hook into the City's water system. In return, East End Partners would agree to pay a \$100,000 hook up fee and any costs associated with tapping into the water line. East End Partners LLC would pay the established rate for water, set by the City of Homer for multi-family properties, thereafter.

Please present this proposal to the City Council as soon as possible for consideration. The project is entering the final design stages and the design would change if not relying on well water or hauling water to the development.

East End Partners LLC, is excited to be part of Kachemak and the Homer community. We hope that this water hook-up proposal will be well received. Please let us know if we can provide any additional information. A concept drawing has been included for your reference. We look forward to providing affordable housing in the Homer area and being good long-term neighbors.

#### **Executive Summary**

## **1. Project Narrative** – this section must describe the following:

- The target population to be serviced by the project: East End Cottages is an affordable rental townhome development project targeting families whose household incomes are between 50% and 60% of the area median income. 20% of the units will have no rent restrictions. Six (6) units in the development will be fully equipped (mobility and sensory) for tenants with a family member with physical disabilities and one (1) additional unit will be sensory equipped. Eleven (11) units will be set aside for tenants with disabilities and two (2) units will be set aside for homeless families. Swell, LLC will be coordinating special supportive services for these residents through agreements with several local agencies.
- Configuration of the units and buildings within the project: East End Cottages will consist of two story homes in 4 buildings on about 1.46 acres of land. The mix of two-bedroom homes (20), and three bedroom homes (4) are positioned to take in as much natural sunlight as possible with some having views of Kachemak Bay and the Homer Spit. All units have multiple parking spaces so there is ample parking throughout the site. In fact there are 51 parking spaces for 24 units.
- How the project's design will facilitate serving the needs and lifestyles of the target populations (e.g. singles, families, senior populations, persons with disabilities, etc.): The East End Cottages project will offer families a housing option with more affordable rents in an ideal suburban neighborhood. The property is located on East End Road, which is the main artery running through the Homer area. The property is located next to and across the street from several local businesses that offer employment opportunities for East End Cottage residents. Tenants are also within 5 miles of all schools and the main commercial district of the lower Kenai Peninsula. The ADA units are specifically designed for Homer area seniors. Swell will be working with The Homer Senior Citizens Center, which provides transportation, to insure that senior tenants can get to medical appointments, shopping,

and the Homer Senior Center. Each residential unit is designed to provide a family or individual with privacy and maintenance free accommodations. Units will meet the Alaska Building Energy Efficiency Standards (5 Star plus BEES rating), saving residents 20% – 30% on their utility costs all within a neighborhood setting that is attractive, comfortable and a safe place to raise a family. The new residential units at East End Cottages offer 2 bedroom one and a half bath units (900 square feet of living space), and three bedroom two bath units of 1,100 square feet. All the residential units will have large storage areas, washer and dryer hookups, microwave ovens, and dishwashers. All appliances in the units will be Energy Star Rated.

- If the project includes 20 or more units, applicants are required in this section to identify how they will satisfy the 5% (rounded down) special needs set-aside. The East End Cottages project is required to set aside one unit for a tenant with special needs. Swell has chosen to go beyond the basic special needs requirement and is setting aside eleven (11) units for those with physical/mental disabilities, and two (2) units for homeless families. In addition, East End Cottages has a homeless and veterans preference as part of its management plan.
  - **2. Project Cost** this section must describe the following:
- The basis for the construction cost estimates used in the project budget. Have these been checked with historical construction estimates in the community or State (specify which)? What similarities and differences exist, with regards to time and scope, between the proposed project and the buildings whose cost data were used to evaluate the reasonableness of the cost estimates provided in the budget? Swell has built 30 to 50 units annually in different parts of the state over the last few years so it has very good construction cost data. For purposes of this funding application Swell solicited a conceptual bid from SR Bales Construction who is currently building Spruce Cape Homes Phase I in Kodiak. SR Bales self performs much of the construction work including the civil work so they are able to provide solid numbers on labor. Material pricing, especially lumber, has been rising

quickly but Bales has the most recent data since they are buying materials for Spruce Cape Homes I now. Swell intends to bid out the construction work post funding award to satisfy procurement requirements and also insure that we receive the best pricing. Although East End Cottages is subject to many of the same challenges that Spruce Cape Homes I has experienced (lack of vendor competition and weather), East End Cottages has some unique challenges, principally providing water to the site and poor soils. Bales has accounted for these issues in its East End Cottages estimate.

- Inflation assumptions that have been made regarding the project costs and timeline (e.g. for materials, labor, freight, etc.). Construction pricing is a little volatile right now due to the recent weather events in the lower 48 and the on-going trade war with China. Even so, it is believed that, through contingency and value engineering, project cost increases that may occur over the next six months can be absorbed within the current construction pricing. The developers have demonstrated the ability to significantly value engineer previous projects under difficult economic circumstances.
- Contingency amounts: If the contingency has been set below 50% of the contingency cap for your project type, please provide an explanation for the lower contingency amount. If cost-overruns manifest, that exceed the specified contingency, what resources will be made available to ensure project completion? The contingency has been set at 5% which is the maximum allowed under the GOAL program for new construction. If cost overruns exceed the contingency, the development team will use developer fee to pay for cost overruns. Members of the development team have built more than 20 tax credit projects and have never exceeded the contingency.
- Timeline for when the project costs will be incurred (e.g. 20% at property closing, 40% by milestone X, etc.). Design, engineering, and environmental costs will be incurred during predevelopment. These items along with legal fees, permit fees, insurance and bond fees, construction loan costs, title/closing costs, tax credit syndication costs, and a portion of the developer fee will be paid at the initial closing in the spring of 2019 when the tax credit investor enters the limited liability company. The amount expended at initial closing represents about 12% of the total development costs.

The costs paid at the initial closing will be funded with tax credit equity and construction loan financing.

Construction is slated to take 12 months. Each month a construction draw of about \$320,000 will be paid to the contractor. These costs will be paid primarily through the construction loan. Rasmuson funding and HOME money will also come in during construction. The project is expected to be completed by July 2020. Within eight months of construction completion, the ownership entity will close on the First National Bank Alaska permanent loan and the construction loan will be paid off by the permanent loan and additional tax credit equity. About 10% of the tax credit equity will be withheld from the project until IRS 8609 forms are completed, at which time most of the developer fee will be paid. Swell is expected to carry a deferred developer fee of \$140,000, which will be paid over 12 years at 0% interest.

- Nature of the funding provided by each source (e.g. loan, grant, property tax abatement, etc.):
  - a.) Tax Credit Equity \$4,291,054 (inc. solar tax credit equity)

  - e.) Swell Deferred Developer Fee \$140,000
  - f.) FNBA Construction Loan \$4,800,000
- Repayment schedule and terms associated with each source (e.g. from cash flow, scheduled payments, tax abatement for specified period of time, etc.) The construction loan will be paid off at the final closing around April 2021 using permanent loan proceeds and tax credit equity. The FNBA first loan will be paid from cash flow remaining after paying for all operating expenses. The debt coverage ratio of 1.97 at this point in the cash flow waterfall means that there will be a significant

amount of cash available (\$35,225) after the FNBA loan is paid. Of the \$35,225, \$14,415 will go towards paying the Rasmuson hard second loan. The debt coverage ratio after the hard second loan is paid will be 1.41. Following the payment of the second loan, the deferred developer fee payment of \$11,667 will be made out of available cash flow. The deferred developer fee payment is soft and dependent on available cash flow. The FNBA first loan will be refinanced in 16 years. The Rasmuson loan will also be refinanced in year 16.

- Timeline for how each of the identified funding sources will enter the project. Approximately 5% of tax credit equity will come in at initial closing and the start of construction to pay a portion of the developer fee, syndication costs, and predevelopment expenses. The construction loan will be available at closing to pay for design and construction costs. During construction, the Rasmuson funds will be used. At construction completion, the tax credit investor will put another 25% of their equity into the project. 60% of equity will come in around April 2021 when the closing on the permanent loan is planned. The final 10% of equity is expected when 8609's are issued in July of 2021. The late entrance of the tax credit equity will help insure that we're getting the best tax credit pricing.
- If LIHTC equity is anticipated, describe the anticipated equity pay-in structure and the associate milestones. When describing milestones, please identify the anticipated date(s) these milestones will be realized (e.g. units brought on-line, 8609, etc.). The first capital contribution of tax credit equity (5% of the total amount) will come into the project in June 2019 when construction is starting. When the project is 100% complete (July 2020) the investor will provide another 25% of their equity. In April of 2021, at perm loan closing, the largest slug of cash (60% of the total equity) will come into the project, The final 10% of equity will enter the project in July 2021 once 8609's are generated.
- 4. Project Operations: this section must describe the following:
- Assumptions for utilities and operating expenses: If rehab, detail utility and operating expense
  assumptions and reference documentation supporting the change in utility and operating costs

from historical levels. We are primarily relying on operating information from our property managers, Quantum Management, who currently manage the Conifer Woods Apartments in Homer. Ouantum manages other Kenai Peninsula apartment complexes including Woodridge Apartments in Kenai, Kimberly Court in Seward and Northwood Apartments in Soldotna. The data from Quantum was also back checked with operating information that Swell has from CDI and VOA properties. We are also beginning to get operating data from our Mill Bay Townhomes property in Kodiak and Turnagain Place in Anchorage. These properties are now complete and 50% to 70% occupied. The biggest unknown on the operating side is the water. Our plan is to drill a well and if the water is good then tenants will use this for all their water needs. Under this scenario, on-going water costs would be low (water testing of about \$5,000 per year). We have done some water testing of a well in the area which has led us to believe that water quality will be poor. If that turns out to be the case, then our plan is to truck in water to tenants, which is considerably more expensive. The "trucking in" water scenario is the one that we have accounted for in our budget. To help combat high utility costs we are installing solar thermal and solar PV systems. In this particular development the owner is shielded to a certain extent from utility spikes because the tenants are paying their own electricity. The owner is paying for heat and hot water, natural gas for cooking, water and sewer, trash, and a small amount of common area electricity. In an effort to make the property run efficiently special attention is being placed on equipping units with low flow faucets, shower heads, dishwashers and washer and dryers. By meeting the BEES and IECC standards and certifications, structures at East End Cottages should be very energy efficient which will dramatically assist in keeping heating costs down. Milder weather conditions (relative to Anchorage) should also help.

• Assumed inflation of utility costs. If standard 3% assumed in trending is appropriate, please state why; if a different trending percentage is appropriate, please provide the rationale and include evidence in the Financial Feasibility attachments section of the application. The East End Cottages family project will use the standard 3% operating cost and 2% income escalators. These

percentages are consistent with the actual performance of rental properties that we own. Quantum, our property manager, is also comfortable with these escalator percentages.

- Repair / maintenance and replacement needs for the property. Based on the project design, materials used and target population(s), please identify the cost-drivers for these repair / maintenance and replacement numbers. Family housing projects with larger bedroom counts and lots of children and youth tend to take more punishment than smaller bedroom projects. The development team will use a commercial grade rubber or asphalt roof, cementitious board and metal siding, and durable flooring materials to improve the durability of the project and lengthen the time that replacement of building systems needs to be contemplated. Also, the project is placing \$86,400 in a replacement reserve at perm loan closing which will be available for unforeseen building system failures. After the first twelve years this reserve will be supplemented by \$300 per unit per year throughout the remaining life of the project.
- How will unforeseen events during the project operations be addressed (e.g. vacancy spikes, flat rental income growth, etc.)? Are there operating reserves in the project budget sufficient to accommodate a reasonable mix of these events? The debt coverage ratio on the first loan and second loan is quite comfortable (1.41). After paying these loans, there is expected to be almost \$21,000 in available cash flow that should allow the property to weather operating cost spikes or vacancy problems. The investor member of the owner entity will also fund an operating reserve of \$115,424.
- If any special needs and / or diverse populations will be served by the project, please summarize the management approach to successfully accommodate the divergent interests of the tenants through a cohesive management policy. Swell has established memo of agreements with several local service providers including Homer Haven and The South Peninsula Behavioral Health Center. Within the East End Cottages development there will be units specifically set aside for those with disabilities. These tenants will be provided services from The South Peninsula Behavioral Health Center (SPBHC). Swell has also signed an involvement agreement with the SPBHC which means that

this non-profit group will be intimately involved in the design and operations of East End Cottages to insure that the needs of tenants with mental and physical disabilities will be met. Homeless services and referrals will be provided by Homer Haven. The onsite manager will assist tenants by helping to coordinate bringing in services. The developers have experience with similar projects that had higher percentages of special needs units and have noted very little negative tenant interactions. Quantum will work with the on-site manager, with input from the owners, to smooth out any tenant versus tenant issues which could develop.

The Supportive Services Plan for East End Cottages' residents with disabilities and/or homeless families will include two components: 1) service coordination and 2) services provided by local community agencies. All services included in this Supportive Services Plan are backed by a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the service provider and the Owner of the property. The East End Cottages on site manager will coordinate the delivery of services provided by other community partner agencies. Swell will also provide ongoing training opportunities for the on-site manager so that tenants are given the best opportunity to get services that they need.

On August 22, 2018 the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission was presented with a submitted lease application from Alaska Custom Seafoods to amend their current lease development plan and it was requested that the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission review and make a recommendation to City Council regarding the submitted application. At the time of the August 22 meeting the motion was made to recommend to council to not approve the Alaska Custom Seafoods lease amendment Application. Vote. Non-Objection. Unanimous Consent.

### Taken from the August 22, 2018 meeting minutes:

"The commission deliberated over the lease application, with questions, answers, and comments regarding:

- Number of businesses on the property/changes in use
- Insufficient financial information in the application
- Clarification on lessee's responsibility to provide Certificate of Insurance; staff had only received confirmation of insurance by calling the lessee's insurance company
- Staff's recommendation; the City Manager considered it incomplete
- Timeframe given to lessee to meet lease deadlines
- Concerns regarding the incompleteness of the application
- Default status due to not meeting lease deadlines
- Continued issues with late payments"

Alaska Custom Seafoods/Faulkner was notified in writing of the commission's decision and rather than continue forward to council with his incomplete application had chosen to take additional time to gather the documents needed to complete and resubmit his lease application for consideration. Changes to the lease application and information presented with regard to the meeting minutes listed above are as follows:

- The decreased number of businesses on the property and proposed changes in use remain the same
- Financial information has now been provided to the City
- Proof of current Insurance has now been provided to the City
- The application is now considered complete
- The lease is still in a current default status due to not meeting lease deadlines in regards to the property development plan outlined in the lease agreement
- Alaska Custom Seafoods/Faulkner has signed up for Automatic monthly payment of his bills to attempt to correct the late payment issue. The account is currently paid in full within the due date for the month of January 2019.

The decreased number of businesses on the property and proposed changes to the property development plan are Alaska Custom Seafoods' response to being out of compliance with the current lease contract. They wish to make their lease contract match their existing conditions to remedy the default status of the lease without a required further construction timeline.

On January 23 2019 the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission reviewed the re-submitted lease application by Alaska Custom Seafoods requesting an amendment to its current lease to change the development plan to match existing conditions on the lot to remedy the default status of the lease. After consideration of all of the above listed material and information the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission made the following recommendation:

Recommendation: The Port and Harbor Advisory Commission moved to recommend to City Council the approval of the proposed amendments to the Alaska Custom Seafoods lease with the contingency that any further default issues will be immediately brought back to the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission for consideration to recommend further action by the City Manager and/or City Council.




Dear Mr. Mayor,

#### **POLICY:**

Set Free Alaska is a Christian treatment center that uses a mind-body-spirit approach to recovery. Our multi-generational programs facilitate hope, healing, and resilience resulting in lasting change. The faith-based initiative ensures that individuals have equal access to faith-based programs, while also assuring neither staff nor clients experience discrimination.

In accordance with state and federal laws, Set Free Alaska will provide services to clients as a Christian organization. The agency's founders and current leadership believe that this is the best way to accomplish its vision and mission. We do not require our employees, contractor or clients to believe any, some, or all of the following, but believe it useful to provide the foundation from which Set Free offers services.

## **Set Free Alaska Bylaws Article III Sections 1-4:**

- Section 1. We believe that the Bible is the inspired Word of God equally in all parts and without error in its original manuscripts, absolutely infallible, and our source of supreme revelation from God, superior to conscience and reason, though not contrary to reason; and it is therefore our infallible rule of faith and practice. - **Section 4**. We believe that Jesus desires to set people free from the bondage of addiction. (Luke 4:18; Acts 10:38)

#### **PROCEDURE:**

- 1. Set Free Alaska does not discriminate in its hiring. Staff will be respected in their own spiritual journey and belief system regardless whether it aligns with the organization's.
- 2. Set Free Alaska does not discriminate in its services to clients. Clients will be respected in their own spiritual journey and belief system regardless of whether it aligns with Set Free.
- 3. Staff are permitted to pray with, incorporate scripture, and use Biblical Christian principles in the context of treatment:
  - a. Set Free serves clients of many faiths and those without a faith background. When clients come to Set Free they are aware, or made aware at the outset, of its foundation as a Christian program. Staff will be mindful to meet each client where they are and be respectful of their unique belief system, regardless what it is.

- b. Clients who do not wish to incorporate Christian principles into their recovery process will either be reasonably accommodated within the Set Free Alaska program, or referred to a more appropriate program, depending on each unique situation.
- c. Staff will not be required to pray and/or promote Biblical Christian beliefs if they do not align with their own, or if they are not comfortable doing so. Reasonable accommodations will be made upon request based on sincerely held religious beliefs, practices or lack thereof if an accommodation will not impose an undue hardship on the conduct of the business.
- 4. As a Christian organization and in accordance with agency bylaws (Article III Section 1) the Bible is the only religious material provided to clients.
  - a. A Bible is offered as a gift to clients at admissions. Some clients accept, some decline, and Set Free's clients are free to do either.
  - b. Staff will not be required to give a Bible to clients, if doing so makes them feel uncomfortable, or if doing so does not align with their own belief system.

  - b. Clients living within Set Free Alaska facilities will be allowed to have religious materials other than the Bible.

Furthermore, the potential to refer individuals for residential treatment when needed will improve the overall health and wellness of Homer and other Kenai Peninsula residents. We intend to collaborate and partner with Set Free Alaska for the mutual benefit of our shared clients. Specifically, this collaboration will take place by serving individuals who are in Set Frees program who need MAT services. We can provide the MAT while clients are receiving services at Set Frees residential or outpatient programs. The NTC community clinic offers an outpatient MAT program and recently received a SAMSHA grant to expand services. 



## **Police Station Public Meeting**

The Police Station open house was held Monday, February 4<sup>th</sup> in Council Chambers. Staff had flooring and siding samples on display as well as preliminary drawings of the facility. Approximately half a dozen members of the public stopped in, including some new faces which was good to see. Thanks to all of the councilmembers who came to both listen to the public and provide additional input. Project Manager McNary assembled the attached summary of the comment cards received at the meeting. He has spoken at length with the Design Team and relayed all of these comments and responses for incorporation into the next steps.

# Resilient Communities Program Grant Opportunity for Bridge Creek Watershed

An exciting grant opportunity is available through the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation in partnership with Wells Fargo. The City of Homer, Kachemak Heritage Land Trust (KHLT), and the Kachemak Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve (KBNERR) hope to partner and apply for funding that would lead to an increase in protected lands in the Bridge Creek Watershed by identifying key properties for conservation, as well as provide leading research on the carbon storage capacity of peat wetlands. The really big picture here is these wetlands have the potential to be protected through carbon credits if research can quantify carbon storage capacity. These wetlands are important to the City's drinking water supply and further downstream to salmon. Grant awards range from \$200,000 to \$500,000, and both the City and KHLT qualify as applicants. As of the writing of this report, KHLT is considering being the applicant; I will provide a verbal update at the meeting. Should KHLT decide against being the applicant, the City is eligible to apply for this grant independently. There is a 1:1 match requirement, which KBNERR is able to provide. This project would place the City and partner organizations in the forefront of carbon research in Alaska, and also identify which properties the City and Land Trust should focus on to protect water quality in the watershed. A short summary of the proposal is attached. If the initial letter of interest is accepted, a longer application process will follow along with a resolution for City Council to consider.

# Borough Public Transportation Committee

On behalf of the City, City Planner Abboud has joined the Kenai Peninsula Borough-sponsored steering committee that will be developing a new Coordinated Transportation Plan. This plan will address the Borough's public transportation needs. In the past, the Central Area Rural Transit System

(CARTS) organization spearheaded the effort, but now the Borough is leading the group. The last plan was created in 2010 and was updated in 2015. A new plan is needed for the Borough prior to FY2021 in order to be eligible for Human Services grant funds through the Department of Transportation/Alaska Community Transit (ACT) <a href="http://dot.alaska.gov/stwdplng/transit/">http://dot.alaska.gov/stwdplng/transit/</a>. Currently, the group is looking at gathering data in preparation for the plan. The group includes representatives from the Borough, cities, individuals, and agencies that benefit from the program, such as the Independent Living Center.

# Staffing for Adequate Fire & Emergency Response (SAFER) Grant Extension

We have reached the end of the performance period of our FY2015 Assistance to Firefighters Grant, which provided valuable financial assistance to the City for hiring an Assistant Fire Chief. Due to a lengthy hiring process, we did not expend the entire grant award of \$248,241.00. The City applied for a grant extension to utilize the grant's remaining amount of \$92,407 but unfortunately FEMA is unable to offer an extension since the position is not filled at this time. We will subsequently close out the grant and I offer my thanks to FEMA for making these kinds of grants available to municipalities. It provided the City the opportunity to fill an important position at the Fire Department, one that supports our volunteers through ongoing trainings and benefits our community by bringing operational staff up to the level necessary for safe and more effective incident response. The City is currently in the process of filling the Assistant Chief position.

## Personal Protective Equipment Training Update

In my January 14<sup>th</sup>, 2019 City Manager message, I shared with Council that AML-JIA's risk analysis identified Port & Harbor and Public Works employees as having a number of claims concerning "Foreign Body in the Eye." The study looked at data over a 10 year block and noted 6 incidents. Within the past 30 days, both departments have completed additional trainings to reinforce the importance of personal protective equipment while upholding safety as one of the City's top priorities for its employees.

# Large Vessel Moorage Facility Project Update

Port and Harbor Director Hawkins met with Army Corps officials on Tuesday, February 5th regarding the Planning Assistance to States (PAS) study to investigate reopening the Large Vessel Moorage Facility project. The meeting covered the progress to date, preliminary findings, and data gaps. At this time, the team plans to have a draft report ready for the City by March 15, 2019 and a final report by April 15, 2019. Preliminary findings show a .95 benefit-cost ratio (BCR). That is a significant improvement from the original .26 finding in 2008. This improvement is due to the benefits that the team was able to show. It was decided that rather than spending project money to create a new rough order of magnitude (ROM), the analysis would use construction cost estimates from the original study. This was troublesome since we know that those original estimates were one of the main reasons we had such a poor BCR the first time around. Nevertheless, it was the most cost effective option and if we could see positive results with the old numbers, updated numbers will only increase the BCR. When we re-engage with the general investigation, we will be able to challenge the old ROM with real numbers. The team talked at length about the "data gaps" which will be our focus for the next month. Once we have answered the rest of the questions, the draft report will be sent over to the administration for comments with the final report delivered one month later. Corps management have been watching the project's progress and told me that, based on these preliminary findings, they would recommend a new Letter of Intent from the City asking the Corps to resume our port expansion general investigation (GI). They are just beginning their budget planning for the 2021 budget year and would like to include this project into their proposed budget. They believe that if approved, there would be a chance they could begin the GI in 2020 using "work plan" budget dollars. All this is to say,

it is moving fast and the City needs to start talking about local share. The GI study will take three years to complete and will cost no more than \$3 million dollars. The cost share for the study is 50/50 and we will be able to use in kind services as part of our cost but it is still a significant investment for our community to make. There is no commitment for money with the Letter of Intent. I will move forward with drafting the letter and will include it in the next packet.

# City of Homer Community Recreation-HERC Letter of Interest Posted

In order to make sure that respondents are able to understand and accommodate the needs of the City Community Recreation program and HERC building, we have posted the attached letter of interest with the notice online. In addition to being online, the notice will be advertised in the paper and we have reached out to MAPP, the Homer Foundation, and the Kachemak Bay Realtors Association to try and solicit as much interest as possible. The turnaround for potential HERC tenants submitting a letter of interest for Council consideration is February 19<sup>th</sup>. # HOMER POLICE STATION - PUBLIC MEETING 2-4-2019

#### PUBLIC COMMENTS AND RESPONSES

Public was invited to submit comment cards. Three were cards were received and are addressed here. Several general questions were discussed and addressed for information at the meeting.

Comment #1 – "My encouragement is to explore Gypcrete and radiant floor intermittently throughout. Long term maintenance mitigation. Higher fuel use efficiency".

Response: - Current design calls for in-slab radiant heat in the cell blocks only, (eliminates heat registers that can be tampered with), and baseboard radiant heat in the remainder of the building, in effect, an intermittent use as a practical component. In-room heat registers, (baseboards) allow for environmental control of each room, with near immediate temperature response times –vs- large zone, (in-slab heat tubes), control of heat with slow temperature response times. Addition of a Gypcrete floor system in 1/3 of the building square footage in lieu of radiant baseboard units would add costs to the project, (floor structural re-design, additional heat tube configuration, cost of Gypcrete and an additional subcontractor to provide and install, Gypcrete encapsulated heat tube failure maintenance, additional manifold/zone costs, etc.). The additional cost is substantial enough to be a determinant budget factor.

Long term maintenance mitigation – City of Homer Maintenance personnel advise that individual heat baseboards are more economical to maintain –vs- potential failure of an inslab radiant tube. Mechanical Engineers and General Contractor have advised radiant baseboard is more economical for the project budget than Gypcrete radiant heat.

Higher fuel use efficiency – Mechanical Engineer calculations did not recognize any significant cost differential with either system that would impact one over the other. The boilers will be fired by Natural Gas. A detailed cost differential exercise was not carried out, based primarily on the pros/cons and cost benefit points listed above.

Comment #2 – "Black floors show a lot of dirt. I like the rubberized plank for all traffic and Public areas. Floor tiles for offices. Please break up roof lines for views from North, (toward mountains)"

Response: - Flooring comments will be forwarded to Design Architect for consideration in the Finish Schedule to be detailed in the 65% design drawings. Revised North Elevation has been

proposed to break up the roof line per previously submitted similar comment from City Council meeting.

Comment #3 – 1). "Move Chief/Lieutenant offices to forward locations where they may readily observe and/or interact with activities".

2). "For physical appearance – maintain neutral, (gray), appearance that will withstand the fickle taste of the public".

## Response:

- 1). Police Chief and personnel have reviewed office locations and chosen current plan office locations deemed best for facility use.
- 2). Exterior appearance considers location in the Central Business District, continuity with surrounding structures, Community Design Manual guidelines, Homer "nature/natural" thematic feel, Planning Commission comments and comments by the buildings end users. It was the intent to avoid an "institutional" Police Station look. Designing a high profile public building with the intent of satisfying all public tastes is subjective beyond the scope of this project.

Comment #4 – There was a general verbal comment that the exterior siding, (east side in particular), seems to be too "busy". The pattern of the 2' x 8' panels suggests a randomness that some may find un-appealing.

Response: - Elevation drawings will be requested to show optional siding patterns with a more linear panel layout.

Comment #5 – "RE: New Police Building. Both the red and the blue entry colors are garish. More natural tones of red and blue would look much better"

Response: - Architect will provide more subdued color options for consideration.

Comment #6 – "very Crucial to find a way to implement renewal energy in form or wind-solar—geothermal for police station – don't make mistake as with the library. There are ways, it's not all about \$ ©

#### **Bridge Creek Watershed Conservation Project Summary**

The Bridge Creek watershed encompasses 8.6 square kilometers, over half of which is comprised of forests that form the catchment for the City of Homer's sole water supply. Sixty four percent of the watershed is in private ownership, with many small sized parcels that are currently undeveloped, but are increasingly likely to be developed as the region's population grows. Some lands in the watershed are already shielded from development impacts via conservation easement and fee ownership held by Kachemak Heritage Land Trust and the Center for Alaskan Coastal Studies. Furthering protection of the remaining portions of the watershed is a priority for the City of Homer in order to maintain a clean and abundant water supply for the region.

The City's water supply is held in a reservoir. Below this reservoir, Bridge Creek flows into the headwaters of the Anchor River, which is a high-profile river recognized for supporting significant populations of Coho and Chinook salmon, steelhead and Dolly Varden, which are important to the culture and economy of the region. The Kachemak Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve (KBNERR) led a robust body of research showing connections between salmon use of headwater stream habitats, and the productivity that supports those habitats, coming from surrounding forests, peatlands and groundwater flow connections. A spatial data tool has been developed that identifies these landscape support features important to salmon habitat, both in the headwaters and downstream.

The Kachemak Heritage Land Trust, the Center for Alaskan Coastal Studies, and the Kachemak Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve and the City of Homer are proposing a project that will result in a plan for prioritizing conservation of the Bridge Creek watershed, including pilot methods for using carbon project financing for the acquisition of conservation easements and fee simple purchases of land. With support from the Resilient Communities fund, this collaborative effort will have the following outcomes:

- 1) Application of the spatial data tool developed by KBNERR to identify forests, peatlands, and groundwater flows within the Bridge Creek watershed that are important for salmon stream support. This approach will identify high priority properties that support the City's water supply and enhance downstream salmon stream productivity.
- 2) Establish monitoring methodology for evaluating carbon storage in peatlands and forests on existing conservation easements held by the Land Trust and the Center for Alaskan Coastal Studies. This approach will provide evaluation of monitoring methods for peatland and forest carbon projects that can be used as finance mechanisms for conservation easements.
- 3) Working with willing land owners, Kachemak Heritage Land Trust will establish a process for purchasing fee simple title and conservation easements restricting development and protecting water quality and habitat on parcels within the Bridge Creek Watershed.
- 4) Provide community education on watershed ecosystem services through field trips on Kachemak Heritage Land Trust and Center for Alaskan Coastal Studies properties.

These outcomes will result in advancing protection of the City's only water source, in the downstream protection of important salmon bearing streams, and will further the development of a carbon project for the region. The City, as well as the surrounding region, has abundant peatlands, which could be promoted as a carbon project on the world carbon markets, which could provide financing for the City's watershed conservation easements.

It is important to note that this letter of interest details current activity in the facility; with improvements to the building that allow for expanded occupancy (such as sprinkler systems and ADA accessibility), the ability of the space to house more activities and participants will grow.

Resolution 19-006(A) included a requirement that potential tenants of the facility take into consideration the recreation needs of the City, and this letter is meant to help prospective tenants understand that landscape. Please feel free to call the City Manager's office with any questions regarding current or future anticipated municipal use of HERC 1.

#### The space needs of the tenant:

The City of Homer Community Recreation (CR) program currently uses the gymnasium, activity room and downstairs rest rooms (that also serve as equipment storage space) in the lower portion of HERC 1. We also use the kitchen as a place to store cleaning supplies, towels, broom and mop. The City of Homer Community Recreation mission statement is:

"The City of Homer Community Recreation will promote community involvement and life-long learning through educational and recreational opportunities for people of all ages. This will be accomplished through maximizing usage of all community facilities and resources, while utilizing, expanding and uniting local business and school resources and expertise. Our program shall be designed to recognize cultural diversity and to address social and community concerns."

We currently offer pickleball, gymnastics, Zumba dancing, Native Youth Olympics, youth basketball and adult basketball at HERC 1 (see attached February 2019 calendar for reference). The CR relies exclusively on volunteers and contracted instructors to offer programs and activities therefore having the flexibility and accessibility for scheduling is paramount in responding and determining what activities will take place based upon the community interests and people willing to volunteer, lead or instruct each designated program. While we know today what programs we offer are popular, there is always the possibility of either a new program on the horizon or existing programs losing participation and interest.

#### How the space will be used by the tenant including time of day:

The primary needs for City of Homer Community Recreation at HERC 1 is for municipal recreational, educational and physical activities. The programs are a combination of ongoing drop in activities such as pickleball, basketball and dance as well as instructional classes with a flat fee and a designated start/end date, such as youth basketball. We recognize that weekdays after school and evening has the highest demand.

We would need the gymnasium, activity room and downstairs restroom areas Monday—Friday 3-9pm. Ideally, we would have youth activities from 3-5pm and from 5-9pm teens/ adults during the weekday. These times are subject to change based upon the request and demand of programs. The weekend hours are somewhat intermittent with current usage being 11am-1pm and 5-7pm on Saturday and 10am-1pm on Sundays in the gym. It should be noted that we do see a decrease of indoor activity participation for youth programs during the summer months due to the lack of staffing, volunteers or contracted instructors willing to offer programs in the summer. It is also helpful to have the ability to use the gymnasium for random days and times during the summer months as a backup location for City of Homer Community Recreation activities if and when the local high school gym is closed due to maintenance.

#### How much a tenant is able to pay for space on a monthly basis

The City of Homer Community Recreation program currently generates \$9,000-\$12,000 per year with existing activities in the HERC. I would conservatively estimate approximately \$850-\$950 per month. Relevant to the issue of paying for space for municipal programming, the City of Homer Community Recreation program pays \$6,000 a year for combined use of both Homer High School and Homer Middle School that includes office space, free use of equipment, office supplies and some photo copying.

#### What improvements to the space would be necessary for tenant to occupy the space

At the present time, per State Fire Marshall approval, the City of Homer Community Recreation program can operate in the facility "as is" with no upgrades needed for the short term. The ideal improvements for long term use would include: improving facility accessibility, upgrades to the rest rooms, hot mopping of the gymnasium and activity room roofs and a floor refinishing and repainting of floor lines. It would be helpful to have a small office space for staff and volunteers for registration, record keeping, computer/internet access, equipment storage but the programs can do without these as space for activities is the priority.

If/how much tenant would be willing to contribute in capital costs to improvements

This is up to the Homer City Council.

How long of a lease tenant would be willing to commit to

Indefinitely.

The City of Homer appreciates that Homer Soil and Water will make every effort to limit the adverse effect of herbicides to the environment by working in conjunction with DOT and DEC utilizing the DOT Integrated Vegetation Management Plan.

The City of Homer does not object to Homer Soil and Water applying a systemic broad-leaf selective herbicide to an area of less than 0.4 acres at the intersection of Skyline Drive and Katie Jean Circle. The target invasive is the plant *Vicia cracca* (bird vetch.)

The City of Homer appreciates that this process will follow the proper guidelines including a 30 days public notice period, appropriate signage on site, and supervision by DEC and DOT staff.






