Economic Development Advisory Commission Chair Karin Marks and Economic Development Manager Julie Engebretsen presented to Council on the EDC Year in Review summary that was provided in the Julie & Karin presented the Council's packet and supplemental packet.

F. Library Advisory Board

Library Advisory Board Chair Kate Finn reported at their last meeting they had a high number of public present in person and on zoom to share comments on both sides regarding removing certain items from the children's section of the library. She was pleased that everyone was respectful in their exchange and explained that the Board will take this back up at their next meeting on January 17th. The Giving Tree is set up at the Library, there is a book magnifying machine on loan thanks to the Independent Living Center, and the Library Endowment Fund has received an anonymous donation that will match donations to the Endowment Fund up to \$2500 through the month of December.

G. Parks Art Recreation & Culture Advisory Commission

Parks Art Recreation and Culture Advisory Commissioner Robert Archibald reported the Commission heard from the Finance Director regarding the budget, the Community Recreation Specialist reported on their programs and building usage, and the Public Works Director reported on ongoing projects. The Karen Hornaday Park Master Plan is due for a revision, a timeline is set, qualified landscape architect firms have been identified. This is the first step in developing an up to date plan for the park. The Parks Superintendent reported the Mariner Park Beach is open to the seawall for collection of coal, and winter work that's planned. They heard from the Director of Homer Animal Services on animal control issues in the city and the Commission continues to work on code amendments regarding animals on leashes.

Malcolm Milne, non-resident, questioned what the City gets out of this expenditure and what expertise the Kachemak Bay Conservation Society (KBSC) has for the items mentioned in the materials.

There were no further comments and the hearing was closed.

ADERHOLD/LORD MOVED TO ADOPT ORDINANCE 22-77 BY READING OF TITLE ONLY FOR SECOND AND FINAL READING.

At the request of Council Member Erickson, Public Works Director Keiser explained the City is working with several groups related to the green infrastructure and conservation topics. KBSC has expertise in public education, engagement, and community outreach on the benefits of green infrastructure and how to go about it. Public outreach and education is very time consuming and the City doesn't have the time, staff, or expertise to engage in it ourselves so this is a good deal for the City.

Council Member Lord commented it's new over the last few years that we've been using professional services for more things. She supports this as City staff can only do so much, and she's enjoyed the Public Work Department utilizing the services of local smaller nonprofits. She asked if during the budget process if there could be a summary of funds from the City going back into the community for these projects.

Mayor Castner opened the public hearing.

Crisi Matthews, Port and Harbor Advisory Commission Chair, commented this is a budget amendment as work is done based on the parking study that was completed. The Commission's intention is that work is being implemented in phases based on the amount of income received from paid parking.

Bruce Friend, Port and Harbor Advisory Commissioner, commented in support. The public is calling for attention to parking, especially in the summer. This will have year round benefits.

Malcolm Milne commented on behalf of the NPFA in support of Ordinance 22-78. He highlighted the information in the back up of a motion by the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission to allow stall slip holders and marine tradesmen a discount on season passes and short term parking.

There were no further comments and the hearing was closed.

She thinks Council understands from the materials that the Commission is talking about that and it would be figured out at a later stage and warrants good consideration.

Mayor Castner opened the public hearing.

Casey Siekaniec, Port and Harbor Advisory Commissioner, commented in support of Ordinance 22-79. After hearing the proposal from HDR he feels it will be worth the investment to relieve staff of some of the work and they bring a lot of experience with these types of projects.

Crisi Matthews, Port and Harbor Advisory Commission Chair, noted Commissioners Shavelson and Pitzman, and Planning Commissioner Brad Conley weren't able to attend but share support for this project. She shared efforts of the Commission coordinating a Think Tank to see this ACOE study forward for the port expansion project.

Bruce Friend, Port and Harbor Advisory Commissioner, commented in support of Ordinance 22-79 and contracting with HDR. This project will make a lot of difference to a lot of people and the investment with HDR will be a big part of its success.

Karin Marks, city resident and Economic Development Advisory Commission Chair, commented she participated with the Think Tank that drew a group of interesting people together and their consideration on how this project will affect economic development for our area. She shared her support for Ordinance 22-79 and contracting with HDR.

Malcolm Milne commented on behalf of the NPFA in support of Ordinance 22-79. They look forward to participating in the efforts as commercial fishermen.

ADERHOLD/LORD MOVED TO ADOPT ORDINANCE 22-79 BY READING OF TITLE ONLY FOR SECOND AND FINAL READING.

Council Member Erickson appreciates where we're going with this and commended the Port and Harbor for their efforts to move forward with the harbor expansion. She also looks forward to the next project of float replacement.

Council Member Lord supports the harbor expansion project and she appreciates the feedback from HDR at Committee of the Whole to help them better understand what HDR's role will be as owner's representative.

Council Member Venuti shared her support and appreciation for the feedback from HDR.

VOTE: NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Jake Richter, Fire Department Employee, commented in support of Ordinance 22-81 and shared briefly regarding the need for a new ambulance.

There were no further comments and the hearing was closed.

Council Member Venuti commented in support of the ordinance. She shared some experiences with the older ambulance and understanding of the need to purchase a new vehicle.

VOTE: NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

Mayor Castner opened the floor to City Manager Dumouchel and Fire Chief Kirko to share their presentation regarding Ordinance 22-81 and 22-82.

City Manager Dumouchel and Fire Chief Kirko reviewed their presentation that was included in the packet regarding the need for the City to purchase a new ambulance and the strong need for additional personnel at the fire department to help ensure adequate response to emergencies.

Memorandum 22-199 from City Manager as backup.

Mayor Castner opened the public hearing.

Jaclyn Arndt, Fire Department employee, commented in support of Ordinance 22-82. Over her 9 years she's seen a steady increase of emergency calls with our growing population and a decrease in number of volunteers, creating increased stress on the staff and volunteers. These two positions will allow them to meet the minimum of having two people on staff at all times. She shared her experience of wait times for a second person to respond and how impacts their customer service to the community.

Kaleb Harvey explained he's a former volunteer who is now serving as a temporary part time Fire Department employee and will return to volunteer status. He commented in support of Ordinance 22-82 and shared that having these positions would be very valuable to the department.

Eric Schultz, Deputy Fire Chief of Kachemak Emergency Services, commented in support of Ordinance 22-82 and shared how labor intensive undertaking fire and EMS work is. It's imperative that the department have adequate crews at the station ready to go.

Robert Archibald, city resident, commented in support of Ordinance 22-82. He's been a marine firefighter for a long time, its labor intense, traumatic, and you can't do it with a short staff. The population is growing in Homer and it's time to address this.

Joe Kahles, Deputy Fire Chief, commented in support of Ordinance 22-82. He addressed the Fire Department's service and response capabilities, sharing how over the holiday weekend they had one person at the station the entire time. He explained two call outs that occurred simultaneously with the limited staff and the implications of that scenario.

Jake Richter, Fire Department Employee, commented in support of Ordinance 22-82 and shared about the recent Bunnell Street fire. There were two people in the building who were able to escape on their own, which was extremely fortunate. He, Jaclyn Arndt, and a volunteer were the first on scene at the fire and that is not adequate response to have effectively rescued them. They need more instructors and paid staff to maintain the volunteer service.

Devin Fairbanks, Fire Department employee, commented in support of Ordinance 22-82. A minimum of two personnel are required to drive an ambulance and to enter a structure. There are training requirements members and volunteers have to accomplish to better support the community and also a need for coverage for people to be able to take time off. He doesn't see volunteers going away, but the department needs enough staffing to more effectively operate. Two additional staff is a step in the right direction.

Franco Venuti, city resident, commented in support of Ordinance 22-82 and shared his recent experience of requiring EMT care after a serious fall. He praised the response team for their work and encouraged the funding of the additional staff.

There were no further comments and the hearing was closed.

ADERHOLD/VENUTI MOVED TO ADOPT ORDINANCE 22-82 BY READING OF TITLE ONLY FOR SECOND AND FINAL READING.

Council Member Lord thanked everyone for their testimony, it's important to have this information to help her and others understand the full picture. A question was raised earlier about what we're doing to incentivize more volunteerism, which is an issue for a lot of organizations, and she's understanding that maintaining high morale is one of the best things we can do for people in our community that we are asking to show up and serve every day, whether paid or volunteer. She hears loud and clear the need for two more paid staff. She appreciates the plan that's put forward to cover the cost and have to figure out how it will be absorbed into the operating budget.

In response to the Mayor, City Manager Dumouchel explained the ordinance shows the funding accounts that will be impacted and funds will be moved over year by year into the budget.

Council Member Erickson shared her appreciation of the Fire Department staff and volunteers. She understands the strain of being on call constantly and how wearing that can be. She realizes having two people on staff at the department is important and she supports it. She'd like feedback in the next three months or so on what they as a Council can be doing to give the department the resources to get volunteers. It's bigger than just the two positions.

Council Member Davis thanked everyone for their compelling testimony. He questioned why other departments are funded through a mil rate. City Manager Dumochel explained that unincorporated area departments are funded through a mil rate for the service area.

VOTE: NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.



Summary Statement:

Introduction

Ordinance 21-01(A) adopted January 24, 2022 authorized the purchase of two properties within the Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District, as well as the acquisition of two drainage easements. One of the property owners, Jay Farmwald, was instrumental in working with the City and the longtime owners of these lots to facilitate these transactions. When the City Council held the public hearing on the ordinance, Councilwoman Aderhold mentioned it would be beneficial to vacate the cul-de-sac between these lots, as there is a creek running through what would be an eventual turn around area. Mr. Farmwald pursued this idea and began working with another adjacent land owner (Frommer) to see if they were interested in selling. City ownership of this additional lot would allow the City to replat the properties, vacate the entire cul-de-sac, and result in the creek not being located in a dedicated right-of-way. Due to Mr. Farmwald's efforts, the property owner (Frommer) and the City have reached a purchase agreement for the subject property. Please see attached map.

After the land sale is complete, staff can work with Mr. Farmwald on a platting action to vacate the culde-sac. Mr. Farmwald would be a party in the platting action and has offered to split the platting costs with the City, up to \$5,000. This platting action would net the City an additional four tenths of an acre (17,000 square feet) and place the portion of the creek into City ownership.

Property Description

40958 Farmwald Circle, 4.525 acres. See attached KPB Tax Assessment Information. The property is generally upland with a small portion of the lot that contains discharge slope wetlands. There is a very small cabin currently on the property which the City may remove the future to prevent unauthorized use. The KPB taxed assessed values in this area are very low and also do not take into account that this specific property has legal and physically constructed access. The City's broker Angie Newby and staff feel the purchase price is reasonable given the current high cost of real estate in the greater Homer area. Additionally, significant effort was made to negotiate the purchase price down.

Closing Conditions

At the beginning of negotiations it was determined there are(?) some junk cars currently located on the property. It is a condition of sale that these cars be removed from the site; staff will verify their removal prior to closing.

Financial Impact:

Funding

Funding for Ordinance 23-03 would be divided between two funds: Land Reserves and HART Trails. The subject property has a driveway constructed to it and to the property, which could easily serve as a future trailhead to the 200 plus acres the City owns north of the Bridge Creek Reservoir. To date, no other purchases the City has made in this part of the watershed have the potential to be a good trailhead. While there are no immediate plans to construct a formal trailhead or trail system, this is an opportunity to purchase a lot with a constructed driveway and protect additional creek corridor to protect lands in the watershed as well as create future recreational opportunities.

Costs

The purchase price of the property is \$55,000 with closing costs of \$5,725 on the transaction. Platting costs would be in the range of \$5,000 to \$10,000. Staking of property corners would be required, which would raise the costs to that of more than a basic plat. Therefore, staff is requesting funding in the amount of \$70,000 to reasonably cover all the expected costs. As noted before, Mr. Farmwald intends to split the platting cost with the City, up to \$5,000.

Recommendation:






City of Homer – Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District in Yellow. Subject Area is marked in red.







The Coast Guard (CG) leases berth space on the west side of the Pioneer Dock to moor their 225' Cutter. In the contract between the City and CG it was agreed that the Port would perform the maintenance on the floating camel fendering system. As part of that agreement, a portion of the funds paid monthly by the Coast Guard is set aside in a separate city account for use in the event of any required maintenance or repairs. City finance reports that this special account has a current available balance of approximately \$170,000.

When port maintenance staff conducted their most recent assessment of the berth, it was noted that the weld seams at the bottom of the camel slide pipes on 3 of the fender units have rotted away and need rebuilt (as shown in the photo below)



Additionally, the tabs that the Camel slides rest on have been likewise corroded and need replacing:



Each of the fenders is 35ft long and weighs approximately 30,000 lbs. There are a limited pool of available contractors who have the experience and equipment to complete such a job.

Scope of Work includes:

1) Unfasten the fenders from the dock

2) Use a crane to pull the fenders off the pin piles and lay them on the dock

- 3) Secure the pin piles while the welding is being done
- 4) Repair the welds, and replace the resting tabs preferably with a flange
- 5) Re-install the fenders



Staff reached out to 4 local such agencies/individuals with the following scope of work outlined and details of the job. Of the 4, Homer Steel Fabricators and D&D Fabricators did not submit a quote, BP welding submitted a quote of \$11,310 per fender, and Alaska Industrial Services(AIS) came in with a quote of \$8,000 per fender. AIS had the lowest bid and has satisfactorily completed projects for the City in the past.

The Coast Guard vessel is currently out, with its arrival back to the Hickory berth expected in May of 2023. We would like to complete all repair work before its return, so that the contractor can have unimpeded access to the needed project areas.

Recommendation

Council approval of Ordinance 23-04 appropriating \$24,000 from special account 415-0397 for Hickory berth fender repair and award of contract to lowest bidder, AIS, to complete the work.

Summary Statement:

Background/Project Updates

The port has been working on many pieces of a large parking improvement project on the Spit to improve the parking lots, expand paid parking areas, and support better parking management.

As one part of this project, City Council passed Ordinance 22-78(A) at their November 28 meeting, which approved the appropriation of \$49,690 from the port reserves for the civil engineering design improvements for the Boat House Pavilion and Seafarer's memorial parking areas, as well as the areas between Ramp 3 and 4. Public works has since issued a task order to HDL, one of the City's contracted engineers, to complete this design work and that portion of the project is currently in process. With that portion moving ahead, staff are working on some of the other needed components for the project.

Parking support components

To stay on schedule, the 2 additional pay kiosks (one for Sea Farer's memorial parking area and one between ramps 3 and 4) will need to be ordered soon to allow for shipping times and assure they arrive to Homer in time for the install. The cost of the 2 kiosks is quoted at \$22,870.75.

The second support component needed is a way to manage the increased work load/enforcement requirement of doubling the Spit's paid parking footprint. It currently takes two dedicated parking enforcement officers to manage the summer parking season. Enforcement is done on foot, citations are written by hand, payments are made in person or over the phone individually, and late fee letters are created, tracked, and hand mailed by staff. As we move forward with increased parking improvements and management, the current system of enforcement will become untenable. As with the pay kiosks, compatibility was the high priority guiding factor of these single source purchase quotes. The City currently has ten(10) T2

kiosks at an infrastructure investment of around \$70-100K. It was important for the Port that we find a compatible system.

Staff researched several staffing and management software combinations and recommend implementing a parking management software called UPSafety that is completely compatible with our current T2 city pay kiosks. Below are some of the main benefits:

- <u>Consolidates the data -</u> puts parking passes, citations, payments, etc. into one location, streamlining record keeping requirements and allowing for a faster response in the field
- <u>Frees up valuable resources</u> In the current system, Police Dispatch supplies vehicle and registered owner information to parking enforcement officers issuing citations. Dispatch does this on top of their other emergency services duties. The software system can provide that vehicle registration information and free up police time. The software itself was actually developed by retired law enforcement, in part to address this admin burden U.S. wide. The Homer PD has reviewed the software and is supportive and excited about its capabilities.
- <u>Better Customer Interfaces -</u> Has an online payment portal. Customers will be able to purchase passes, pay for daily parking, and/or pay citations directly from their phones or computer devices.
- <u>Data analysis-</u> Having the data in one place allows opportunity for better analysis of patterns and growth which will help with parking development in the future to find the best use of the limited space.

The training, software/hardware integration, and equipment package for the parking citation management system is \$15,904. In following years, the annual maintenance/support fee for the system is \$7,176. In this first year, the Port hope to not hire any additional parking enforcement officers. Staff will test to see how much the management software assists the current two seasonal officers in managing the doubled, expanded area and examine results.

Financial Impact:

The total cost for both of the needed parking support components (2 kiosks and the management software) is **<u>\$38,775.</u>** As with the other components (design, engineering, and construction) of this overall Spit parking improvement project, this cost would qualify for DOT's approved use of parking revenues collected on these City/DOT shared land ownership lots that allows for managing agencies to pay themselves back for any improvements. Using the parking study conducted by HDL for projected estimates, the Port Reserves would pay itself back for the whole project cost (of which this a part) in approx. 3 to 7 * seasons with the predicted revenues from the expanded/improved lots

* dependent on the set cost of the daily parking fee rate (i.e. \$5 per day,\$10 per day, etc.)

Summary Statement:

The City of Homer receives revenue from the State of Alaska for fish tax collected by the State in two different ways. The Department of Revenue distributes "Raw Fish Tax" from licensed seafood processors, floating processors and seafood exporters to eligible municipalities. These funds, when received by the City of Homer, are allocated to Fish Dock Revenues.

The second way the City of Homer receives fish tax revenue is through the Alaska Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development (ADCCED). ADCCED receives 50% of the undistributed Raw Fish Tax from the Department of Revenue to distribute through a program known as the Shared Fisheries Business Tax Program. The purpose of this program is to provide for a sharing of state fish tax collected outside municipal boundaries with municipalities that have been affected by fishing industry activities. For the Cook Inlet Fisheries Management Area, of which the City of Homer is a part, there are ten communities that will receive a shared portion of that collected shared fish tax. The ten communities are the Municipality of Anchorage, Homer, Kachemak, Kenai, Kenai Peninsula Borough, Seldovia, Seward, Soldotna, Houston, and Palmer.

A Resolution from the Homer City Council is required annually to receive these funds. If any of the communities listed above do not apply by the deadline in March of 2023, then the funds will be reallocated to communities that did apply.

Summary Statement:

The City of Homer's Animal Shelter is operated under a contract held by Homer Animal Services, LLC (formerly known as Alaska Mindful Paws). They also provide animal control services in partnership with the Homer Police Department. The services received by the City and the community at large are high quality and of a high quantity considering the size of the organization. In 2022, January through November, the shelter fielded 269 complaints, took in 124 strays, had 67 animals surrendered to the shelter, reunited 77 animals with their owners, and facilitated 127 adoptions. It is very important that the relationship between the City and the animal shelter be equitable and sustainable to ensure that this service can be offered well into the future.

In 2021, Council approved Resolution 21-088 which provided a contract adjustment that included a 5% increase for Calendar year 2022 and a 3% increase for calendar year 2023 to help account for impacts related to inflation. Even with the increases, the Animal Shelter struggles to afford the labor and services required to maintain the very high standards they've exhibited since taking on the animal services contract with the City. While a larger conversation about animal shelter funding is necessary as we move into the FY24/25 budget cycle, I've identified an area in which we can increase revenue to the Animal Shelter without increasing the City's direct investment in fees for service.

At this time, the Animal Shelter's staff is required by contract to collect fees on behalf of the City for services they provide to include licensing, adoptions, impound fees, etc. (Appendix A, Section IX). All of that money is then forwarded to the City's General Fund. This creates a unique disincentive for the Animal Shelter to encourage the use of certain services. For instance, an increase in licensing results in more work for the shelter, but no additional income because it is all directed to the City instead.

I propose that the City continue to set fees via the fee schedule for Animal Control, however, those fees should be kept by the Animal Shelter to support the services they provide to the City. While this will be a small reduction in revenues to the City (~\$14,000-17,000), it could give the Animal Shelter some fiscal relief without drawing from existing General Fund Fund Balance.

Each year, the U.S. Coast Guard (USCG) is required to review the certification for the Prince William Sound Regional Citizens' Advisory Council (PWSRCAC) under the Oil Pollution Act of 1990. Every three years, of which this is one, a more extensive application process is conducted, followed by a public comment period.

In November, PWSRCAC submitted our application for review and the public comment period has now opened. It is extremely important that the USCG hears from our stakeholders, partners, and the public during this process and we are hoping The City of Homer would be willing to provide a letter of support.

The letter doesn't need to be long – just a few paragraphs emphasizing how important the work of PWSRCAC is to preventing oil spills like the Exxon Valdez and ensuring a prompt, effective cleanup should a similar event happen in the future. We have attached some sample text for your reference and encourage those using the sample language to personalize it as that will carry more weight.

Letters need to reach the USCG by *February 8, 2023, and should reference "PWSRCAC Recertification Docket USCG-2022-0707,*" which is the document number of the Coast Guard's Federal Register notice about our recertification.

Sample base text for letter of support:

The [organization] <u>City of Homer</u> supports recertification of the Prince William Sound Regional Citizens' Advisory Council (PWSRCAC).

The PWSRCAC was established after the Exxon Valdez oil spill and has worked diligently since then to fulfill its mission: citizens promoting environmentally safe operation of the Alyeska terminal and associated tankers.

PWSRCAC works with industry and regulators to ensure response readiness, evaluate risks, and propose solutions. We hope you will recertify PWSRCAC as the citizens' advisory group for Prince William Sound.

Examples of PWSRCAC work that can be referenced:

Monitoring weather in Prince William Sound: The Council maintains two weather buoys in Port Valdez: one near the terminal, the other near the Valdez Duck Flats. These buoys will improve understanding of weather conditions in Port Valdez that could affect marine vessel safety and movement of spilled oil, as well as help with decisions regarding the timing of protecting environmentally sensitive sites in the area. The Council works with the Alaska Ocean Observing System and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's PORTS[®] (Physical Oceanographic Real Time System) to share the data collected by these buoys.

Monitoring of snow damage to crude oil storage tank vents: The Council has been monitoring efforts to address the substantial tank vent damage that occurred at the Valdez Marine Terminal in February and March of 2022, and the subsequent work by Alyeska and state and federal regulators to investigate this incident, repair the vents, and prevent a reoccurrence. While no substantial injuries were associated with this event, and no fire or explosion occurred, the Council believes this event was a near miss and could have resulted in devastating consequences. The subsequent actions taken by Alyeska, and state and federal regulators, will be critical to ensure that such snow damage does not occur to the tank vents or other critical infrastructure at the terminal in the future.

Ensuring the adequacy of secondary containment liners: The steel crude oil storage tanks at the Valdez Marine Terminal are required to have secondary containment systems around them in order to protect ground and surface water from contamination in the event of an oil spill. Part of those systems is a liner that is supposed to hold spilled oil until it can be cleaned up. Investigations from 2014-2017 showed that there were cracks and holes in the liner, indicating it may not prevent water contamination if a spill occurred from one of the large crude tanks. The Council has asked the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation (ADEC) to take steps to ensure the liner would prevent such water contamination. Additionally, the Council is contracting with a geotechnical engineering expert to identify non-destructive methods to evaluate the secondary containment liner and determine how much of the liner should be tested in order to have confidence in the results.

Environmental monitoring: PWSRCAC continues its Long-Term Environmental Monitoring Program (LTEMP), initiated in 1993, to monitor hydrocarbons and their effects in our region. The Council also supports citizen-based monitoring efforts in its region, particularly for the invasive European green crab and invasive tunicates. The Council has continued its work monitoring sensitive species in Prince William Sound that may be impacted and could use additional protection during an oil spill response. The second of three anticipated years of atsea marine bird surveys took place in March 2022, identifying important wintertime nearshore habitat and areas of high bird density. The fourth and final year of aerial forage fish surveys was conducted in June 2022. "Forage fish" are species that are preyed on by larger predators, and include Pacific herring, Pacific sand lance, capelin, and candlefish.

Monitoring of cleanup drills and spill response: PWSRCAC devotes considerable effort to monitoring drills, exercises, and training events, as well as the responses to actual incidents, which fortunately are relatively rare in Prince William Sound. Staff often participate as a member of drill planning teams along with ADEC, USCG, and industry, and drill monitoring reports are prepared by staff and contractors. When significant spills occur, Council staff, Board members, and volunteers work with Alyeska staff to understand why they occurred and how Alyeska would prevent similar incidents in the future.

Review of Valdez Marine Terminal and Prince William Sound Tanker Oil Spill Contingency Plans: As part of our OPA 90 mandate, PWSRCAC reviews and comments on changes to oil spill prevention and response plans that cover the Valdez Marine Terminal and tankers that transit Prince William Sound. PWSRCAC participates in a workgroup consisting of industry, regulators, and stakeholders, which meets on a quarterly basis to discuss conditions of approval and improvements to the terminal plan. Additionally, PWSRCAC participates on drill and exercise design teams with industry and regulators that test response readiness. In 2022, the Council commissioned a report that documented the history of the oil discharge prevention and contingency plan for Prince William Sound oil tankers.

Testing devices used to deploy messenger lines: Passing a messenger line is the first step in setting up a tow line between a rescue tug and a tanker in distress. This can be a difficult and dangerous task. In 2021, the Council sponsored a study of devices used to deploy a messenger line. In 2022, field trials testing various devices were conducted as follow up to recommendations included in the original study. Results will be used to develop a set of recommended practices that will be shared with industry and regulators.

Course on shiphandling customized for Alaska: In 2022, the Council commissioned AVTEC Maritime Training Center in Seward, Alaska, to develop a shiphandling course specific to Alaska. This new coursework will better prepare mariners for handling vessels in Prince William Sound and Alaska. The scenarios are based on real activities and use high-resolution data previously funded by the Council. AVTEC was notified in April 2022 that both the basic and advanced shiphandling courses received approval by the U.S. Coast Guard and was subsequently add to the AVTEC schedule.

Oil spill planning for the Copper River Delta and Flats: The Council commissioned a report documenting the current state and history of developing sensitive area protection strategies (also known as geographic response strategies or GRS) for the Copper River Delta and Flats region. The goal of this project was to better understand what drove the development of these past strategies, what exercise activity and training had occurred in this region to date, and what content is still relevant today. The Council would like to see this information updated and once again referenced in Prince William Sound Area contingency planning documents.

I would like to thank the City for allowing me to go and be a part of the AML conference this year. I really enjoyed the new venue.

It is always good to go and get a sense of what the Municipalities and State are working on. The following are my highlights and take alway from a very packed schedule of events.

1. The Keynote Speaker, Matt Lehman really put perspective on community, and how we as leaders need to build the trust back between the community and government. I found it quite interesting that the word that was most used to describe the state of our communities was "Frustrated". What was even more interesting was that his last 12 seminars around the US was the same word.

How do we as a community earn back the trust of each other, being able to look at each other in the eye with genuine friendship and care and not worry about how someone doesn't like us anymore because of how we view the issues surrounding us? Do we really listen to each other, or as one elder from up north said, "or are we listening to respond"? What are our core values as a City that keeps us in a healthy emotional place with all different kinds of people, beliefs, ethics etc.? How can we have community dialogue that everyone participates in, not just like minded groups of people?

2. The next major topic was about Grants. With the Transportation Bill, come lots of money. The take away from this is:

This is something the Council needs to address immediately.

c. While the intentions are great to help out our communities, there are many communities like ours with worthy projects and the COMPETITION for those grants is fierce. With short lead time to have the grant submitted, it is imperative that we are very proactive in the projects that we desperately need the funds to help us take care of our infrastructure needs (Port, water/sewer, or big ticket items).

3. AML is great way to meet people of influence within the government and it was a pleasure to talk with many that are working on different items. I was able to speak to Workman's Comp, DNR and trail maintenance, Childcare needs. It was also good to get to know fellow elected officials.

4. The major topic that always came around was that "People had lost trust in the government." How do we change that? I believe that it is imperative that we respect each others opinion and not judge from what side of the political spectrum we lean. We need to see each other as our friends and neighbors. Put down the swords that have been dividing us as a community, and ask how can we work together on these issues. Thank you for the opportunity to attend the Alaska Municipal League (AML) conference December 6-9, 2023 and testify on behalf of the city at the North Pacific Fishery Management Council (NPFMC) meeting on December 8 and 10, 2023. AML is a great opportunity to learn the latest information related to municipal governance and connect with elected officials from communities around Alaska. The NPFMC addressed many issues during their meeting, including issues Homer City Council has weighed in on, a Bering Sea red king crab Savings Area rule request and snow crab rebuilding analysis and Cook Inlet salmon Fishery Management Plan amendment.

AML Takeaways

During the opening session, AML Executive Director Nils Andreassen held a one-on-one chat with Tyson Gallagher, Governor Dunleavy's chief of staff about the governor's priorities during his new term. My key takeaway from this discussion was Mr. Gallagher stating that Governor Dunleavy plans to grow the economy, create jobs, and have fish in the rivers. Nils then held brief one-on-one chats with several legislators about their priorities during the upcoming legislative session: Sen. Andy Josephson (Anchorage), Sen. Calvin Schrage (Anchorage), Rep. Bryce Edgmon (Dillingham), and Rep. James Kaufman (Anchorage). It was interesting to hear each of these legislators speak on their backgrounds, present their priorities in relation to AML, and share their perspectives on what good governance looks like.

Some of the topics during the opening session that may affect Homer include the following:

- Recent federal spending laws were intended to benefit local governments in several ways, though federal grants will continually become more competitive as more local governments figure out the system. There are resources to support municipalities in seeking federal funds for local projects.
- PERS, and the proportion paid by municipalities, needs to be fixed. With the current significant reduction in state and university employees and static numbers of municipal employees, municipalities are taking on more and more responsibility for funding PERS and it is not sustainable.
- There are several issues related to the Alaska Department of Transportation and public Facilities (DOT&PF):
 - Road construction costs are now exceeding local planning budget estimates because of inflation
 - DOT&PF is more and more interested in transferring maintenance and ownership of state roads to municipalities
 - Contingency amounts required at the beginning of design and construction are now higher
 - AML has teamed with DOT&PF for federal infrastructure grants to municipalities

Matt Lehrman, Social Prosperity Partners, presented on the topic "from conflict to conversation" with 6 steps to better public dialog (this was a fantastic presentation):

- 1. Own leadership imperative
 - a. The purpose of local government is to enable individuals to join together in recognizing and solving community problems. (join together being key words)
- 2. Champion community values
 - a. What are the City of Homer's core values? Should we establish our core values?
- 3. Give them what they want
 - a. What do people want from civic engagement?
 - b. Sometimes disagreement is disagreeable
 - c. Can't be angry all the time
 - d. Be accountable
- 4. Convene courageous conversation
 - a. Hold real community conversations
 - b. Idea from one community: Topics on the Move (TOM) van with "white board" on the side where people can write their issues and ideas on the van
- 5. Avoid binary choices
 - a. Public dialog should not be about wins and losses
 - b. End with respect and people being heard
- 6. Invest in a healthy future
 - a. What bad habits should we stop modeling?
 - b. How do we inspire civic mindedness in future generations?

Those of us who attended AML attempted to spread out and attend different breakout sessions, though this did not always work if breakout sessions did not relate well to topics of interest for Homer. Here's a brief overview of the breakout sessions I attended:

- Broadband Planning and Implementation
 - There are four pots of funding outlined in IIJA with \$60 billion divided among them: Tribal Connectivity Program, Broadband Equity Access and Deployment (BEAD)—broadband should cost the same anywhere in Alaska, Digital Access—everyone should have access to the internet, and Middle Mile—fill in infrastructure gaps over distances
 - The Alaska Office of Broadband (within Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development) which was established through HB 363 is still being staffed and is in early days. \$100 million of BEAD funding set aside for each state and territory, \$5 million has been authorized to Alaska so far. There is a 5-year action plan to improve broadband in Alaska. Alaskans are either served, underserved, or unserved by broadband in Alaska. The Federal Communication Commission (FCC) has published a map showing in the US that fall into each category. The State of Alaska has challenged many locations on the map that are shown as served.
 - The Governor's Task Force on Broadband report is available online. The report defines gaps, targets unserved and underserved populations and locations, identifies middle mile needs, and states a preference for fiber optic over microwave for middle mile upgrades.
 - The Rasmuson Foundation is administering the Digital Equity program for Alaska. Covered populations include those over 60, people who are incarcerated, veterans, people with disabilities, people who experience language barriers, racial or ethnic minorities, and rural residents.
 - FCC's affordability program subsidizes internet for low-income individuals and families.
- Managing Effectively through Community Growth
 - o Three speakers presented on municipal growth issues in recent years.

- Sitka recently developed a tourism master plan in response to a drastic increase in the number of cruise ship passengers coming to Sitka.
- The Mat-Su Borough has long been the fastest growing area of Alaska. The borough currently has 110,000 residents and the population is expected to double by 2050. They are experiencing numerous planning and zoning, stormwater management, land use conflict issues.
- An increase in independent travelers associated with the pandemic is one of the reasons short term rental issues have increased across Alaska.
- Kodiak is experiencing aging harbor issues because all of its harbor infrastructure is the same age after it was destroyed in the 1964 earthquake.
- The Sterling Highway Cooper Landing bypass project has led to the need for a master plan for Unit 395, a 1,000-acre parcel transferred from the state to the Kenai Peninsula Borough. Most folks in Cooper Landing understand they need new and affordable housing but what they want for the parcel is recreation.
- Work Shield Protecting People, Organizations, and Cultures
 - Work Shield is a human resources program municipalities (and companies) can subscribe to for Equal Employment Opportunity Commission Title VII issues (harassment, bullying, and discrimination of various types).
 - Employees report issues through Work Shield. As a third-party, attorneys investigate each report and provide recommendations to the employer HR department within 5 days. All reports are investigated and are not lost when other HR issues take priority within a municipality. Investigations conducted by neutral parties.
 - Work Shield is now an AML shared service.
- Short Term Rentals GovOS Demo
 - GovOS has developed a comprehensive software system for managing short term rentals within a municipality. This session was a demonstration of the software and Q&A on how the company can support municipalities in developing short term rental regulations.
 - Through August, Alaska experienced 29% growth in short term rentals.
 - GovOS and its software help municipalities understand the short term rental landscape within the community, the software can notify properties so they know ordinances, and there is a feedback loop for long term success.
 - GovOS provides ordinance consultation. They have a compliance dashboard based on the codes and ordinances of an individual municipality.

NPFMC testimony

Homer City Council passed Resolution 22-092 in November. The resolution encouraged NPFMC to immediately adopt fishery conservation and mitigation measures to facilitate the restoration of the directed Bering Sea Crab fisheries. I provided testimony to the NPFMC on December 8 under their agenda item "Red King Crab Savings Area Emergency Rule Request" that was consistent with the resolution and written testimony submitted by Mayor Castner ahead of NPFMC's deadline (December 2). The Alaska Bering Sea Crabbers had submitted a petition asking the Department of Commerce and National Marine Fisheries Service to close the Red King Crab Savings Area in the Bering Sea to all fishing gear from January through June 2023. NPFMC voted not to close the area to all fishing gear. The testimony I provided also related to the next agenda item "Snow Crab Rebuilding Analysis", but I did not testify specifically on that topic.

Homer City Council has weighed in numerous times regarding the Cook Inlet salmon fishery management plan issue, including having our attorney submit an amicus brief on the Cook Inlet Drift Association's lawsuit on the previous fishery management plan decision. I provided testimony to the NPFMC on December 10 under their agenda item "Cook Inlet Salmon FMP Amendment". The judge's ruling in the lawsuit requires NPFMC to develop a workable solution to management of the Cook Inlet drift fishery that crosses state and federal waters. The NPFMC will discuss this issue further at their next meeting in February 2023.

After concern of the legality of signs that are not legible from the right-of-way due to distance or size, an amendment was proposed to make signs exempt from the sign code.

Staff report 22-66 replies to the concern presented. The Commission found it acceptable to exclude these signs from the sign code and made a motion to change the wording of the title to reference 'legible' as opposed to 'visible' to avoid confusion as to the intent of the ordinance.

The Commission held a public hearing on September 21st. With six Commissioners present, the Commission voted in unanimously support of the ordinance and recommends that the Homer City Council adopt the draft ordinance with the amended title.

Summary Statement:

Introduction

After having a conversation about about replacing a sign that was located nearly 400ft for a right-ofway, an ordinance has been proposed by Councilmember Lord to exclude signs that are not legible from the right-of-way from the sign ordinance.

Policy Implications:

<u>Analysis</u>

This subject has brought up two different answers to the question of replacing a legacy sign that is not legible from a right-of-way. A strict compliance with the sign code might make a sign unacceptable, such as the case where the sign constitutes a second free-standing sign that is prohibited by code. A pragmatic answer might be that a sign not visible/legible from the right-of-way would not be regulated, as it does not convey information to the general public, only those on-site.

As this subject is not spelled out in code, except for reference to signs located inside a building, this amendment was proposed to further clarify the issue. The language, as proposed, would continue to apply to a sign located inside a building, except the standard would move from "not legible from three feet beyond the lot line" to "not legible from the public right-of-way."

It is reasonable to consider the ability of a sign to convey a message to the general public. My research from the American Planning Association, found in the November 2019 issue of Zoning Practice,

Practice Sign Regulation, states that; "generally, a sign is defined as an object that attracts attention and is visible from a right-of-way." The proposed ordinance reinforces this concept.

Staff Recommendation:

Background

Thank you for your consideration of Ordinance 22-70. This action was inspired by the sign in front of Paul Banks Elementary, which is almost 400 feet downhill from the public right-of-way (ROW), and impossible to see from the road. It is falling apart and the school staff and Parent Teacher Association would like to replace it. My understanding is that last year they were told by the City that they've already maxed out their sign allotment and so if they took that one down they would not be permitted to replace it. That made no sense to me at all.

I asked City Planner Abboud about this situation and he said that as a matter of practicality, if it's not visible from the right-of-way to the public, it would not be considered a sign subject to regulation under the code. But he noted that he hadn't looked at that specific sign. I went to look at the code to see where that exemption might be explicitly stated, and I found the verbiage about the interior signs only. Nothing about signs not visible from the public ROW.

In this amendment, I am suggesting that we fully replace subsection HCC 21.60.100(c) to limit the City's regulation to signs clearly visible from the public ROW and intended to be viewed by the public. Below I have provided some examples from other Alaskan municipalities sign codes.

While I believe this is a fairly straightforward and simple amendment to code, I look forward to feedback from the Planning Commission. I would like to see the City limit resources to regulating what is in the interest of the public. Signs that cannot be seen by the public from the public right-of-way should be clearly exempt from regulation under Homer City Code.

Wasilla: 16.32.020 Scope.

This item is on the next scheduled Planning Commission meeting held on December 7th, the next opportunity for the Council get the recommendation is January 9th.

Background

Thank you for your consideration of Ordinance 22-70. This action was inspired by the sign in front of Paul Banks Elementary, which is almost 400 feet downhill from the public right-of-way (ROW), and impossible to see from the road. It is falling apart and the school staff and Parent Teacher Association would like to replace it. My understanding is that last year they were told by the City that they've already maxed out their sign allotment and so if they took that one down they would not be permitted to replace it. That made no sense to me at all.

I asked City Planner Abboud about this situation and he said that as a matter of practicality, if it's not visible from the right-of-way to the public, it would not be considered a sign subject to regulation under the code. But he noted that he hadn't looked at that specific sign. I went to look at the code to see where that exemption might be explicitly stated, and I found the verbiage about the interior signs only. Nothing about signs not visible from the public ROW.

In this amendment, I am suggesting that we fully replace subsection HCC 21.60.100(c) to limit the City's regulation to signs clearly visible from the public ROW and intended to be viewed by the public. Below I have provided some examples from other Alaskan municipalities sign codes.

While I believe this is a fairly straightforward and simple amendment to code, I look forward to feedback from the Planning Commission. I would like to see the City limit resources to regulating what is in the interest of the public. Signs that cannot be seen by the public from the public right-of-way should be clearly exempt from regulation under Homer City Code.

Wasilla: 16.32.020 Scope.

This chapter shall not regulate: building design; official traffic or government signs; the copy and message of signs; *signs not intended to be viewed from a public right-of-way*; window displays, product dispensers, and point of purchase displays; scoreboards on athletic fields; flags of any nation, government, or noncommercial organization, unless part of a sign; gravestones; barber poles; religious symbols; commemorative plaques; the display of street numbers; or any display or construction not defined in this chapter as a sign. (Ord. 17-09 § 3, 2017; prior code § 16.43.902)

Seward: 15.20.015 - Definitions.

Sign. AMMA and AML Conference

I traveled to Anchorage the week of December 5th to participate in the Alaska Municipal Management Association (AMMA) and Alaska Municipal League (AML) conferences. During the AMMA conference I participated in a panel on Council/Manager relations, gave a presentation on regional networking for City Managers, and was elected Vice President of the organization. During the AML part of the conference, I officially took my seat on the AMLJIA Board of Trustees and attended a number of sessions on local government issues with a nexus to Homer. Joining me were Special Projects Coordinator Jenny Carroll; and Economic Development Manager and member of AML Cities of Opportunity cohort, Julie Engebretsen.

Teleconference with Governor Dunleavy

On November 30th, Mayor Castner, Harbor Commissioner Crisi Matthews, Port Director Bryan Hawkins, and Special Project Coordinator Jenny Carroll had a discussion with Governor Dunleavy regarding the Homer Port

Expansion. The Governor was very supportive of Homer and clearly understands how important our working waterfronts are to the entire State of Alaska. During our meeting he said, "I've got to build a State of Alaska for the next 50 years." I found that sentiment exciting as Homer finds itself on the edge of a major comprehensive plan update and preparing for the transformative change that will come with the expansion of our port and harbor facilities.

Check-in With Representative Vance

Special Projects Coordinator Jenny Carroll and I met with Representative Vance to discuss City goals and the upcoming session in Juneau. We covered topics ranging from the City's capital improvement needs to community jail funding and speeds on East End Road.

Homer is a StormReady Community

Homer renewed its National Weather Service StormReady Community Certification and its commitment to implement the infrastructure and systems needed to protect lives and property. Special Projects Coordinator Jenny Carroll and Associate Planner Bella Vaz worked with the National Weather Service to have Homer certified as StormReady, adding to our recent TsunamiReady certification. This program works to protect communities from the effects of severe weather through advanced planning, education and awareness. StormReady promotes hazard preparedness to improve public safety before, during and after weather-related emergencies. To be recognized as StormReady, a community must maintain a 24-hour warning point and support emergency operations center (EOC) operations; support ongoing education and outreach; support more than one way of receiving warnings and alerting the public; and develop a formal emergency operations plan and hold annual exercises. The recognition program is valid for four years and can be renewed.

Operational Budget Worksheets Distributed to Leadership Team

In line with our budget development schedule, the Finance Department has distributed budget worksheets to department/division leaders. Once we've gone through this internal part of the budget process, we should have a lot more to talk about with Council regarding vision for FY24/25.

Audit Progress

Auditors from BDO will be in Homer this week working with staff on our current audit.


Homer Foundation Funding for Hornaday Park Playground Maintenance and Repair

Last year, the Homer Foundation reached out to my office to discuss ideas for the potential use of approximately \$20,000 in remaining funds from the Homer Playground Project and the Boat House Pavilion. We proposed putting the funds towards repair and replacements of certain pieces of equipment at Hornaday Park playground to include swings, diggers, slides, tire swings, etc. As costs have been volatile, we expect the cost of the project at the time of implementation to exceed the funds available from the Homer Foundation, so we will be asking for an appropriation at a future meeting to ensure we have sufficient funds to complete the upgrades.

Hornaday Park Summer Camping Closure and Master Plan Update

Like last year, I am using my authority under Homer City Code 19.08.030(d) to close all City-operated campgrounds for the winter. Winter camping has been problematic in years past and requires too much staff time to manage successfully. There have traditionally been private sector options for winter camping within City limits, and I expect that will continue to be true this year.

In 2023, I am not planning to re-open Karen Hornaday Park Campground. This is the least popular of our campgrounds, and it has been creating a significant amount of trouble for both the City and nearby residents. I am aware of numerous complaints from the public regarding perceptions of safety at the park. Those perceptions are backed up by the high volume of calls found in the Homer Police Department's (HPD) logs. Since 2020, 101 calls for service have been recorded by HPD at the park. The most common calls are for disturbances, suspicious circumstances, security checks, and welfare checks. HPD has also fielded calls for things like vandalism, harassment, assault, and drug activities. Multiple arrests have been made at the park over the last three years.



Activity at Hornaday Campground spiked in 2020 when it was designated as a free camping spot for those experiencing COVID symptoms. I discontinued the program in 2021, and the calls for service decreased. Unfortunately, calls remain very elevated compared to the very low number of complaints in the years before the free-camping program.

By suspending Hornaday Campground for 2023, it will give City staff a chance to break the cycle of abuse the campground has been facing. At the same time, we will be working with PARCAC on a Karen Hornaday Park Master Plan though which I would hope that we can figure out how we want to best use that space in the future. An improved camping program? A fitness trail with park exercise equipment? Some other yet to be determined use?

Staff continues to work diligently to achieve 2022 Council visioning priorities. This is the third installment of what are intended to be roughly quarterly updates on project progress. It took a little bit of time to get up to speed, but we are now well underway. We're getting a lot of traction on various goals and hitting important check points – RFPs are being issued, grants are being applied for, and applications are being submitted.

• **Fiscal Policy Improvements** – Our project with JDO related to debt service found that we're in a good place for the most part, no observed violations of loan contract terms, but some potential improvements were identified by our legal team. This resulted, in part, in the introduction of Ordinance 22-48 which codified the HAWSP fund as a debt service fund that can also be used for water and sewer improvements (as allowed by the HAWSP manual). This ordinance was suggested and written by our attorneys at JDO. We have also successfully negotiated some contract updates with ADEC across the last few months for future agreements.

We continue to make progress on the procurement policy goal from 2020. The Finance Stakeholder Group has conducted research, including an internal survey, which has been forwarded to my office. Clerk/Deputy Administration Director Melissa Jacobsen has attended procurement training through the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) and is working with the Finance Stakeholder Group on getting a draft ready for future consideration by the Council.

In mid-January, I have a finance term contract partner tentatively scheduled to come to Homer for an in-depth systems and workflow analysis.

- **Comprehensive Plan Fast Forward** After hiring Special Project Coordinator Ryan Foster, we worked on getting the RFQ/RFP sketched out for a firm to help us complete this very large and complicated task. The draft went through review by staff and Councilmembers Aderhold and Davis before it was provided to Council in a Manager's report. We advertised an RFQ that netted us three firms which have been invited to provide a full RFP. We will be back in front of Council once that process is complete.
- **Zoning Code Modernization** This item is split into two pieces, pre- and post-comprehensive plan. As a pre-comprehensive plan item, the West Hill rezone is complete (Ordinance 22-35). Additionally, the conditional use permit reform project was completed in October (Ordinance 22-68(A)). Ordinance 22-68(A) has been challenged in Superior Court and our legal team is addressing that

complaint. As for post-comprehensive plan zoning, we are including the zoning code in the comprehensive plan RFP for the most streamlined approach to getting this massive project completed.

- **Building Code Adoption and Implementation** We submitted an application in late December for the BRIC (Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities) Grant Program through FEMA as a possible source of funding to get our building program off the ground. The response to this application will have a large influence on how we proceed to the next steps. In the meantime, we're also working on permitting concepts for grading, dirt work, and burning which impact the same general stakeholders.
- Housing Challenges The Special Projects Team, along with Economic Development Manager Julie Engebretsen completed a series of meetings about short term rentals with groups such as the Chamber of Commerce, Economic Development Commission, and City Council. As a follow up, this group is looking at hosting a housing workshop in late February/early March to talk about the bigger picture of housing in Homer. Related to STRs, there will be an ordinance introduced at the January 9th meeting to set aside funds for an STR tracking software solution.
- Water and Sewer Expansion Public Works has been putting significant effort into the general concept of expanding our utilities for the last two years. Expect more detailed updates in the future as we work to secure funding for significant expansion opportunities.
- **Expansion of Sidewalks and Trails** The Main Street sidewalk has been completed and the Master Transportation Plan is underway. In November, Council passed Ordinance 22-42(S-3) which creates new specifications for when new streets are required to provide for non-motorized transportation.
- **Emergency Preparedness and Training** The All Hazards Plan has been completed and accepted by Council. Likewise, the tsunami brochure design project with UAF has been completed and printed copied distributed. There remains much work to do related to the Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) and future training opportunity development. I have staff actively looking for funding opportunities related emergency preparedness.
- **Public Safety Conversations** The Volunteer Fire Department hosted an open house in October which brought the public inside the fire hall for a discussion about fire and EMS services here in Homer. The Homer Police Department has had success engaging the public with women's self-defense classes.
- Volunteer Action Plan Special Project Coordinator David Parker was out front on this project collecting data, drafting reports, and building forms and databases for future volunteer programs. Due to the seasonal nature of some of our volunteer programs, we had a hard time getting as much access as we desired to staff during the summer. I am working on getting this effort back underway this winter and wrapped up before the end of the fiscal year.
- **Coast Guard City Designation** The City's completed application was submitted by Assistant to the City Manager Christine Drais at the end of November 2022. We are waiting on word back from the Coast Guard as to the status of our application.
- **Harbor Float Replacements** Council passed Ordinance 22-19(A) which made \$56,540 available from the Port Reserves Fund for grant and engineering assistance related to a harbor float

replacement project. While prep work will happen in calendar year 2022, it is likely that any grant submissions will occur in calendar year 2023.

- **Recreation Priorities and Planning** While this is a bigger conversation than the HERC/Pioneer Gateway Redevelopment Project, much of the general recreation conversation is occurring in parallel to those work sessions/discussions. We did host a presentation by Community Recreation Manager Mike Illg on August 22 that covered the City's recreational relationship with the Kenai Peninsula Borough School District.
- Cybersecurity Improvements A key part of improving City cybersecurity is having sufficient staff to manage our digital infrastructure. Ordinance 22-20 provided funding for a Network Administrator position. That position was filled internally. A new IT Support Specialist joined the team in December. We also had turnover in the IT Manager position which has been refashioned into a Chief Technical Officer position. That recruitment is ongoing and final interviews are the week of January 9th.

2020 Highlights

- HERC Demolition demolition of the smaller HERC building went out of bid after we completed one more report on the buildings (at the request of those firms bidding on the project). Expect to hear more soon.
- Stormwater Management Plan and Implementation we have a grant pending to support the portions of the Kachemak "sponge" stormwater plan and one grant pending for portions of Beluga Slough stormwater treatment system; this is also a top item on the CIP and one we will lobby Juneau to support this year.
- Climate Action Plan the CAP is intended to be integrated into the Comprehensive Plan which is currently out for RFP
- Wayfinding Plan was adopted by Council, next steps will involve testing designs and installing prototypes around town
- Water and Sewer Policy
- Procurement Policy Has been rolled into 2022 goal of financial policy improvements; nearing completion
- Reserve Funding; Election Code; Council Operating Manual; Funding for Large Vessel Harbor Study Largely complete

At the October 24th Council meeting, there was an extended discussion in the Committee of the Whole related to Ordinance 22-72 which proposed changes to Title 20 Animals. The item was postponed during the regular meeting for reevaluation after comments were received from the Animal Shelter Director indicating that it was not realistic for her organization to enforce the proposal under the scope of their current contract and staffing. The Animal Shelter's contract includes animal control services, but the City's current contract does not provide sufficient funding for the organization to patrol and enforce the rules suggested in Ordinance 22-72.

After a brief discussion with the Public Works Director and the Animal Shelter Director, I have put together an alternative proposal which instead focused on Title 19 Parks, Campgrounds and Public Places. The focus on Title 19 puts more of the enforcement impetus upon City staff, although Animal Control support would be available in extreme cases.

The amendments I'm proposing are as follows:

HCC 19.08.070 (f): (It shall be unlawful for any person to:) Allow any dog owned, harbored, or controlled by a person to be **physically unrestrained and** at large in any City-owned or City-controlled campground. All fecal wastes of any dog discharged or deposited on any lands within a City-owned or City-controlled campground shall be immediately removed by the person owning, harboring, or controlling said animal and shall be deposited in trash receptacles or otherwise stored in containers pursuant to HCC 19.08.080;

HCC 19.20.020 (g): <u>Dogs may not be physically unrestrained or at large within city parks. Dogs may be</u> <u>restricted from sensitive habitat areas by signage posted by the city.</u> A person having control or supervision of an animal that excretes feces in a park shall immediately collect and properly dispose of the feces.

HCC 1.16.040 already includes \$300 fines for violations of 19.08.070(f) and 19.20.020.

My intent with the phrase "physically unrestrained" is that a literal physical connection must exist between dog and handler. Electronic leashes are **not** sufficient as there is no physical connection.

I recommend that this targeted approach to restrict loose dogs in campgrounds and parks be followed by a period of animal control stakeholder engagement and a comprehensive review and update of Title 20 Animals.

Staff Recommendation: Replace Ordinance 22-72 with an updated ordinance focused on Title 19

Background:

Over the years the Parks, Arts, Recreation & Culture Advisory Commission (PARC) has fielded complaints regarding unfavorable interactions between dogs, humans and wildlife in areas such as city owned campgrounds, beaches, parks, parking lots and sensitive or protected habitats such as Beluga Slough. These interactions have increased exponentially over the last few years and various city personnel and Commissioners have fielded numerous complaints and witnessed several incidents of dogs at large and not under the direct control of their owner.

The Commission has attempted to address the actions of owners who allowed their dogs to be at large by implementing non-punitive measures such as educational campaigns, providing free leashes and they have not worked.

The Commission has reviewed the proposed amendments to City Code addressing the issue regarding restraint and amending the fine schedule to hopefully bring the public more awareness and address the fact that voice command or control is not an effective measure to controlling animals. This lack of control has been acknowledged by Public Safety both city and state.

These proposed changes are supported by Homer Police Department.

Recommendation

Approve the proposed amendments to Homer City Code presented in the Ordinance 22-xx

I am in support of amending Title 20 regarding animals at large and nuisance animals. I fully support increasing the associated fines.

We do not issue many citations under this ordinance section. Problems with animals being at large, dogs off of leashes, etc. are seldom brought to our attention. We have records of four animal at large complaints in the last two years. In three of the four cases responding officers were not able to locate the offenders or identify them. In one case the animal owner was issued a warning. Approximately five years ago we dealt with a continuing problem of goats being at large and damaging private property in the Kachemak drive area. We issued over 20 citations in the case and eventually gained compliance from the goats' owners. This case eventually required the involvement of our city attorney.

Trying to define "noise" relating to complaints with animals is difficult to do. Relatively low amplitude noise in the form of continuous whining or whimpering from a dog can be extremely annoying. Birds can make various noises for a considerable period of time that is also low in volume but still very aggravating. I think leaving the noise definition alone and instead continuing to refer to repeated or continued noise in the ordinance is best. Having a firm definition of noise could restrict our ability to take enforcement action with this ordinance in some cases. We have run into issues trying to enforce the current ordinance. Two years ago we had a citizen report problems with a neighbors geese making continuous, irritating noise. He tape recorded the noises and we did eventually issue a citation in the case. The judge dismissed the case and stated; "This is Alaska and we have animal noises here". The goose noises continued and the citizen continued to tape record them. We listened to the recordings for hours and never noticed a new, louder or different noise than was originally reported so no further citations were issued. The city manager became involved in this case and helped to mediate it. I think we need to have the flexibility to judge noise complaints independently based on the circumstances of each case.
