Bulk Water Customers: The bulk water customers are the resellers of water or water users who purchase water from the water plant directly and are not in the metered water distribution system.

Non-Bulk Customers: All customers who receive water from the metered water distribution system.

Multi-Units: An additional \$5 monthly charge shall apply to each of the units of a building or lot occupied by more than one household or commercial entity contained within one building or several buildings within one complex. Examples of multi-family units include duplexes, four-plexes and up, apartments, condominiums, co-housing projects, and multiple structures on one lot (where units are normally rented or occupied for longer than one month at a time). Examples of units not considered as multi-family include hotels, motels, and B&B's seasonal rooms/cabins (where units are routinely rented or occupied for less than one month at a time.)

\$750 meter deposit shall apply to metered fire hydrant connections. The deposit will be returned when the meter is returned undamaged. This deposit may be waived upon the recommendation of the Public Works Superintendent.

If a bulk water customer purchases a meter from the City for measuring the quantity of water purchased, it shall be exempt from the monthly meter service charge. It is the responsibility of the bulk water customer to maintain that meter so the City can accurately determine the amount of water being purchased. In the event the meter fails, it is the bulk water customer's responsibility, at its expense, to repair it or purchase a replacement meter from the City. The City may at any time test the meter for accuracy.

VISITORS

A. Joy Steward, Homer Foundation

Joy Steward, Executive Director of The Homer Foundation, reported the City of Homer Grants Program is in its 17th year with \$750,000 distributed to date. The support is vital for the nonprofit community. This year's \$19,000 allocation from the City allowed a total of \$24,875 (including earned income from the City of Homer and City of Kachemak's endowment funds) for distribution to ten nonprofits. Funding for the nonprofits is important for them to garner additional funding. Last year the ten nonprofits generated nearly \$4.4M in revenues. This includes \$2.3M in new money coming into Homer from State, Federal, and Foundation grants. They also employ 65 full and part-time employees with personnel costs exceeding \$2.2M. The Foundation does not charge fees to the City to administer the endowment fund.

B. Week of the Young Child, Lisa (Red) Asselin Martin

Homer Early Childhood Coalition Coordinator Red Asselin Martin and Haven House Prevention Coordinator Rachel Romberg reported Alaska has fallen short in child abuse prevention and neglect. Alaska has six times the national average in reported abuse. Long term exposure to abuse increases poor performance and mental health problems. The Coalition is trying to build a shared understanding about brain development. Between newborn to five years old is an important time for brain development and to establish a neurological foundation. Positive experiences create connections between children and community members. When the experiences are not positive it creates gaps in the brain with no activity in some places. This can happen with neglect, sexual abuse, domestic violence in the home, and adverse experiences. Connections can be made later in life to help heal the brain. There is the power of empathy for children suffering from abuse. The community is urged to connect with families, the legislature, early learning resources, or with a child.

C. Safe & Healthy Kids Fair Committee, Mike Illg and Ginny Espenshade

Community Recreation Coordinator Mike Illg and Youth Court Director Ginny Espenshade announced the Safe & Healthy Kids Fair on April 30th from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. This is the 24th year and 30 different entities are involved. City personnel from the Library are showcasing summer programs, Public Works is sweeping the parking lot to make it safe for the bike rodeo, Community Recreation is operating the bike rodeo with the help of volunteers, HVFD is cooking food, and HPD is operating project drive with the go-cart. This is Elaine Grabowski's last safe kids fair as she will be retiring from the City.

Deb Lowney, city resident, commented SPARC has brought forward an incredible opportunity. Number one on the PARC Needs Assessment was a multi-use year-round community facility. SPARC has received the political support and has secured space for the building. She supports leveraging city dollars for secure funding. Whatever is developed it should be a selective process with strong guidelines and accessible by volunteers, non-profit recreational organizations, and private businesses that provide recreation opportunities and facilities.

Ken Castner, city resident, said there is no better strategy than having partners. It is the only way the city will have a recreation program in the future. Whether the money comes from the Permanent Fund, future funds, or money in the bank, this is something tangible. Daniel Zatz, Homer resident, commented we need to diversify the economy. We have a chance to build an infrastructure to generate revenue and provide a healthier lifestyle. SPARC can double what money the City puts in. It is a good investment on behalf of the City. Mayor Wythe closed the public hearing.

Mayor Wythe called for a motion for the adoption of Ordinance 16-18(A) by reading of title only for second and final reading.

LEWIS/VAN DYKE – SO MOVED.

Councilmember Lewis asked that the ordinance be voted down since Ordinance 16-21 is coming up. Later he will be presenting an ordinance for the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission to review. It will be something sustainable.

Councilmembers expressed the need to put more thought into a recreation ordinance.

In 2017 the City anticipates \$215,000 in revenue sharing. The facility is a win win for the community because of the economic and health benefits it will provide. Daniel Zatz and Anders Gustafson need to order the building within a few weeks. Without the City's commitment they will have to move on. Leveraging additional funds will help build a multi-use facility.

City Manager Koester told Council the revenue sharing will be received in 2017. Revenue sharing for 2016 was allocated to the public safety building project.

Councilmember Lewis offered support and a recommendation that any projects of this nature go through Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission before the City Council.

Discussion on the City's \$1 match to each \$2 contribution to the fund ensued. Two-thirds of the total cost of the SPARC project is provided by the proposers and donations.

ZAK - MOVED TO AMEND TO A 1:1.5 MATCH.

Motion died for lack of a second.

A. City Manager's Report

Tom Klinkner Steps Down as City of Homer Lead Attorney

After 8 years of service to the City of Homer, Tom Klinkner of Birch Horton Bitner and Cherot will no longer be our lead attorney. Holly Wells, who you know well from her tenure with the City, will take over as the point person for City of Homer issues and be the City Attorney listed on official City documents. She will be working with Katie Davis and Leila Kimbrell to provide quick and thorough advice for BHB municipal clients. Luckily Tom's historical knowledge won't be totally out of reach – he plans on continuing to work part-time for the firm.

How City Manager Navigates Requests for Support and Legislation

In the short time that I have had the privilege to serve as your City Manager (1 year last week!), I have tried to be very cognizant of my role as advisor and implementer and your role as policy makers. Council has to make the tough decisions, which is appropriate since you have the backing of the electorate (and a division of labor I am forever grateful for). In that vein, I try to bring you legislation that pertains to how the City works. Policy statements, such as the City of Homer's support for another agency's policy should come from a Councilmember. That being said, I am often approached by members of the public to support or oppose something on behalf of the City with very little turnaround time. If the issue is clearly in the interest of the City, such as the letter opposing the Alaska State Hockey Association's proposal to consolidate all state level tournaments included in this packet, and time is of the essence, I will pen a letter and include it for your review in the City Manager's report. If I have time to approach the Mayor, I try to, as a letter from the top elected official is

more meaningful. If a resolution is needed, my goal is to ask the requestor to either contact a Councilmember or I will put them in touch with a Councilmember that may be interested in their cause. This extends to recommendations from Boards and Commissions, unless the recommendation of a Commission is brought to me by a department head (who makes a good argument for the proposal and it is relevant to the business of the City). I will ask commission members to find a Councilmember to sponsor their recommendation and to take up the issue. I am happy to facilitate this and do any necessary research or drafting. I know this is not a new practice, but I thought it would be valuable to communicate to the Council, Commissioners, and public. Because we are government and we have internal best practices to adhere to, please give us sufficient turnaround time (it seems like we have been approached a lot this month). A big thank you goes to all the Boards, Commissions, organizations, and community members who are working to make our community a better place. The City appreciates the opportunity to participate in those efforts and learn from the public where we can do things better.

Real Estate RFP Extended

The City of Homer issued an RFP for real estate agent services that expired April 14. There were no responses so I have extended the deadline to May 5. I am hopeful this extension will give local firms the time they need to prepare a bid and help the City move some property back onto the tax roll.

Input from the Borough on Tax Code

The KPB Finance Director has informally solicited input on items that municipalities would like to see changed in the Borough's sales and property tax code. We have not yet been provided with a list of possible changes that the Borough is considering, so it is difficult to comment. Once the Borough administration has presented the Assembly with the recommendations, I think it is appropriate for Council to weigh in officially on items by resolution, as we discussed at the revenue worksession on the 18th. At this stage, I cannot say that the City is opposed or supportive of a particular revision without Council review, except for changing the definition of non-prepared food, which was incorporated into City code last year. With Council approval, I plan to forward to the Borough Finance Director that the City of Homer would like to see the following items *considered* with an official opinion of the Council (by resolution) to follow.

-raising the sales tax cap from \$500-\$1,000 -excise taxes on alcohol, marijuana, and tobacco -changing the definition of non-prepared food

I anticipate there being additional items the Council would like to comment on once we have seen what the Borough administration is considering. Changes in KPB tax code will be discussed at the May 16 revenue work session with potential resolution(s) before Council on May 23.

Pioneer Avenue Revitalization Project

The City of Homer is participating in a cross-sector task force to revitalize Pioneer Avenue, Homer's historic downtown commercial corridor with over 86 businesses. The goal is to promote Pioneer Avenue as a prominent Homer destination by creating a cohesive 'Peonies on Pioneer' brand identity. Peony farming is a burgeoning industry in Homer (with over 25 local farms) and a symbol of Homer's pioneering spirit cultivating new forms of beauty and industry to help sustain the local economy. Efforts so far include an upcoming mural project and development of peony flower beds. The group is also working on providing benches, contiguous bike and walking trails, trash cans, and wayfinding signage embellished with Alaskan peonies as a consistent theme. Bunnell Street Arts Center has agreed to be a fiscal sponsor and may be asking the City of Homer for letters of support in the future for peony related projects. (See attached letter to Pioneer Avenue businesses.)

The Legislature...

The Legislature was scheduled to adjourn at midnight on Sunday the 17th of April. As of the drafting of this report, they are well past that deadline and not closer to progress on closing the fiscal gap. However, a number of pieces of legislation that would be devastating to municipalities have been stalled – for this year at least, so thank you to everyone for their effort on that front. SB 210 changing revenue sharing to municipal assistance and adjusting the formula passed. Due to the late passage of the bill and the time it takes to verify population numbers, payments for State fiscal year 2016 won't be seen by municipalities until June of 2016 and SFY2017 payments July of 2017.

Public Safety Building Review Committee Chairman Ken Castner reported on Wednesday, April 27th there is a Worksession at the HERC with the architect and construction manager to begin the charrette process. People will meet at the HERC at 8:00 a.m. to go over areas that can be used for public safety needs. They will return to the Conference Room around noon and adjourn no later than 3:00 p.m. There are cost controls throughout the project to stay within the \$12M budget established by City Council. Additionally, the committee is developing plans for the fire station. They may use the term contractor for the design and put the project out for bid. In the upcoming six weeks the committee has meetings and will provide detailed designs of the police facility to prepare for a bond proposition. He is optimistic they will come within the \$12M budget.

D. Americans with Disabilities Act Compliance Committee

Councilmember Donna Aderhold reported the committee met last week and reviewed the draft ADA grievance procedure and form. The grievance procedure will come before Council after the committee has approved it. Next, the committee will develop a transition plan for the City of Homer to comply with ADA. The transition plan starts with a self-evaluation, comprehensive checklist, and a variety of things related to employment practices. For those areas that are not in compliance, there will be a building transition plan. The plan will require a lot of cooperation from each department within the City.

Motion on the floor from March 29th: MOTION FOR THE ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE 16-10 BY READING OF TITLE ONLY FOR SECOND AND FINAL READING.

City Manager Koester referenced Memorandum 16-072 from Public Works Superintendent Gardner that includes options to downsize the project not to exceed \$374,391 or increase the amount to \$700,000 to complete the entire paving project.

LEWIS/REYNOLDS – MOVED TO AMEND THE AMOUNT TO \$700,000 FOR ALL OCCURRENCES.

Councilmember Smith questioned the administration fee of 15% and inspection fee of 4%. There's no representation for the money collected from HART. Charging an administration fee when it is time to spend it is almost double dipping. When it is time to allocate the hours and expenditures we can do it in house.

City Manager Koester asked that the administrative fee in this ordinance remain and a closer scrutiny of the fee be given to HART at a later date. We will only charge the hours that the person works.

Councilmember Lewis called for a point of order to discuss the amendment on the table.

Councilmember Reynolds opposes the increase as she believes it has to do with contingency for the project.

Councilmember Aderhold supports the increased amount as it is important to keep our roads maintained. For the roads that are presented Public Works has demonstrated a need. We have to trust our Public Works Department to assess projects and determine their need. Those personnel have engineering degrees and professional engineering licenses.

Councilmember Zak suggested a smaller amount this year and go back to the \$700,000 every three years based on an analysis of how many road repairs are needed in the future.

VOTE: YES. ADERHOLD, LEWIS VOTE: NO. REYNOLDS, ZAK, SMITH, VAN DYKE

Motion failed.

ZAK/VAN DYKE – MOVED TO APPROVE \$374,391 WHICH INCLUDES A 5% OVERALL CONTINGENCY.

Councilmember Reynolds would like to see all road projects move ahead.

VOTE: YES. VAN DYKE, ZAK, SMITH VOTE: NO. REYNOLDS, ADERHOLD, LEWIS

Mayor Wythe broke the tie with a NO vote.

Motion failed.

SMITH/ZAK – MOVED TO REMOVE THE ADMINISTRATIVE FEE OF 15%.

Councilmember Smith commented there is no representation of HART if we collect first and then charge again when the money is spent.

Councilmember Aderhold prefers to look at the administrative fees when the monies come to the City. An administrative fee with a specific project makes a lot more sense.

Finance Director Li was asked to join the conversation. He agreed that administrative fees pay for accounting, staff, and tax collecting. Administrative fees are used to pay for the person managing the project while it is underway.

Mayor Wythe called for a recess at 7:41 p.m. and reconvened the meeting at 7:48 p.m.

Mayor Wythe clarified overhead allocations are distributed between various funds for accounting purposes. HART contributes 4% for roads and 1% for trails towards general administrative expenses. Those include Council expenses, City Clerk, City Manager, Economic Development Advisory Commission, personnel issues, IT, Finance Department, City Hall complex use fees, janitorial services, and Public Works administration. All of those components go into calculating the overhead distribution. The overhead operation is allocated to the general fund, the water fund, the sewer fund, Port and Harbor, roads and trails, and HAWSP to create 100%. That is the total expense of all these divisions of the City that provide services everywhere. They are not funds available to pay for the project administration. People will be allocated to manage the project and their expenses will be allocated to the project.

City Manager Koester further explained a person's salary can be billed to a project. It is not a concrete tangible number that can be budgeted.

Finance Director Li told Council we don't charge labor costs to a project. It is charged through the administration fee. The project manager is not part of the general fund budget; if he works on a project it gets charged to the project.

Mayor Wythe called for a motion for the adoption of Resolution 16-044 by reading of title only.

LEWIS/REYNOLDS - SO MOVED.

City Manager Koester reported the City loses about \$800,000 a year by not taxing nonprepared foods. Reducing the exemption to three months will produce at least a couple hundred thousand dollars.

Council noted the exemption dates tie in with fiscal quarters, making it easy for stores to switch the tax. The shortened exemption period will be brought up by the Borough Assembly and they will hold a public hearing. If KPB Ordinance 2016-09 is adopted, the citizens may come back against it. At the town hall meetings the majority of participants favored a seasonal sales tax as a revenue source.

VOTE: YES. NON OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

Councilmember Smith acknowledged the statements of objection for people who felt the assessments were excessive and that they should not be assessed.

VOTE: YES. NON OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT. Motion carried.

H. **Resolution 16-045,** A Resolution of the City Council of Homer, Alaska, Requesting That the Kenai Peninsula Borough Categorize Snack Food as Prepared Food and Categorize Diapers and Feminine Hygiene Products as Essential Goods for Sales Tax Purposes. Lewis. Recommend adoption.

Mayor Wythe called for a motion for the adoption of Resolution 16-045 by reading of title only.

LEWIS/REYNOLDS – SO MOVED.

Councilmember Lewis defended the resolution although the Borough does not like the idea of deciding what is prepared and non-prepared food items. Taxing snack food may be a way to capture tax revenue without extending or raising taxes. At the same time the resolution removes diapers and feminine hygiene products that are essential for certain individuals. Many states are having the discussion with the tampon tax. It may take a store a day or two to set up its tax system. In the long run it may bring in extra funds that we need.

Councilmembers Van Dyke and Reynolds agreed that snack foods are discretionary food items and should be taxed. It may be difficult to define the snack foods as there are many cereals that qualify too.

Councilmember Smith pointed out wipes and toilet paper are necessities and the list could be extended with other essentials.

VOTE: YES. NON OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

COMMENTS OF THE AUDIENCE

Mike Illg, city resident, expressed gratitude to Elaine. She is an amazing person who is not just a face of the Fire Department or the City of Homer, but a truly kind person. There is a goingaway party for her this Wednesday. Robert Archibald, city resident, thanked Council for passing Resolution 16-046. The former city manager is going to work for PWSCAC. He is happy we are moving forward with parks and recreation in town, but we still have some issues.

Ginny Espenshade, city resident, appreciates Council's support and funding of recreation. It is crucial to wellness and prevention. Leveraging is a good idea with 1:2. Although this is reactive and a one-time expense, she hopes Council moves forward with a grant program for recreation.

Ken Castner, city manager, commented on the SPARC project and that Council is not being reactive. It has been pounded on for years that we need more recreation. Services and supplies are real value and should not be discounted on the 1:2 match. It is unfair to say HART is only contributing 5%. That is the percentage of the operating budget for administration. Converting HART money into administrative money by trading it along the way is a little washing operation.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY ATTORNEY

City Attorney Wells was not present.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY CLERK

City Clerk Johnson wished Elaine well. She is an example of an exemplary employee and the City has been fortunate to have her. She is always a bright spot when visiting our office.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY MANAGER

City Manager Koester congratulated Elaine for over 30 years of service to the City. She appreciates the thorough vetting and debate Ordinance 16-10 for HART roads received. She assured Council when they give city staff a contingency for any project we will always try to do it for the least amount. Projects often do come in under project. She is a little concerned with the expectation to do the entire project at a reduced amount. She is hopeful we will be able to do that with the bidding climate; she will not bring Council a project that will run over. If we need to drop something after getting the bids she will keep Council apprised.

COMMENTS OF THE MAYOR

Mayor Wythe commented on Ordinance 16-18(A) and the implication there was suddenly money available. It came together with Ordinance 16-21. In bringing funds together that are single source funds, you can't use those monies to balance your budget or for staff. You cannot guarantee those funds and that is why we took community revenue sharing out of the

budget process. It can only be allocated to a single project expenditure. It is a viable source to help with the soccer field recreational facility. She commended Councilmembers Smith and Lewis for bringing it forward to consider those funds. In light of the recognition of clerks, the week of May 4th is Public Service Appreciation Day. She challenged people in the community to appreciate public employees that provide service to you. That includes fire, police, public works, harbor, administration, and library employees, and people at the post office. There is always the perception that people that work for the government are overly enriched. Those positions are not highly compensated, but traditionally are secure jobs. The City of Homer axed that this year with the reduction of six positions. It's a different environment for public employees and she challenged people to show their appreciation. She told Council that the food tax will come back to bite them in the butt. It does every single time we talk about it. She is not thrilled with signing the resolution and usually doesn't veto when council votes unanimously. She feels it will cost a lot of people a lot of heartache. There are a lot of things we are putting on the Parks and Recreation agenda that requires a substantial amount of staff time and she would like Council to be conscious of staff time and overtime.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Councilmember Lewis congratulated Elaine on 30 years of service. It is a long time to be in one job. His butt's been bit a number of times and he is sure this is not the last.

Councilmember Smith commented he knows Elaine personally as he delivers to the Fire Station. He has seen her there at the front desk for many years. He appreciates her disposition and smile. She has been a great representative of the City and our Fire Hall. He gave a shout out to the Homer Softball Girls Fast Pitch who kick off their season tomorrow. They then travel to Juneau to play twelve games and get primed for their region play here. We've been talking about how old some of our vehicles are and how much use we get out of the roads. It brings back the old adage: Use it up, fix it up, wear it out, or do without. The City has done a good job of doing that. It doesn't bother him that we drive around some 1985 vehicles; if they function and they are safe let's use them until they're done. He commented on the goggles Mike Illg provided.

Councilmember Aderhold reiterated Ginny Espenshade's announcement that April 30th is National Drug Take Back Day. There are posters around town and an announcement on the Homer Police website that is a nice statement on why you want to dispose of your drugs. Disposing of them in a proper manner prevents misuse and them ending up in the water system. Drugs dissolve in the water and become a health hazard to our marine wildlife and then come back to us. There is a drop box at the police station. When you are going to the Safe & Healthy Kids Fair you can drop them off.

Councilmember Van Dyke commented the three speakers were informative and well thought out. Our children are our future. The safer we can get them and the more educated they are the better the place we will have in the future. The Safe & Healthy Kids Fair is an excellent example of the cooperation between government, private sector, and nonprofit organizations. He can't tell you how many hours he has spent picking up trash for Homer Clean-Up Day and how many hours he has spent at the Chamber cooking hot dogs. He complimented the advisory commissions and boards who do so much work behind the scenes.

Councilmember Zak commented Council did a wonderful job with further discussion on processes. He appreciates Dan Gardner and Carey Meyer coming before the Council and agreeing to provide more information on the roads' repairs and costs to have a clear understanding. We need to be aware of budgeting funds for repaving roads every three years. The Council is trying hard to figure out ways to reduce costs and pay for increased expenses. In October the voters will be considering the public safety building and we are working to gain their support and trust when we ask that question on the ballot.

Councilmember Reynolds just returned from Washington, D.C. She visited Capitol Hill and spoke with staff members of Senators Sullivan and Murkowski, and Representative Young's offices. She took plans of the Army Corps of Engineers harbor feasibility study and Resolution 16-039 about the Remote Transactions Parity Act. She spoke about those and other issues affecting the City of Homer and the state of Alaska. She had a good reception and an appropriate amount of time to talk to people. She heard about the concern of the Zika virus. A message to anyone of reproductive age is that there is a lot of uncertainty. If you are traveling check in with your medical provider if pregnancy is ideal at this time. Councilmember Reynolds wrote a grant to the Awesome Foundation to provide seed money for the syringe exchange program and it was approved. The money should be sufficient for supplies and the pilot program this summer. The next meeting for the syringe exchange program is May 3rd. The hospital is going to allow the syringe exchange program to be in the education and training room on Pioneer Avenue. It is a good example of being responsive and reactive. She recognized Elaine Grabowski who was her first contact with the City of Homer when she moved to town. The Public Safety Building Review Committee is going to be doing a lot of work in the next six weeks and she appreciates that and all the volunteer work.

Mayor Wythe wished Elaine the best of luck; she certainly deserves the opportunity.

ADJOURNMENT

SUBJECT: RECOMMENDATION TO COUNCIL TO CREATE A NEW COMMISSION PARKS, ART, RECREATION AND CULTURE ADVISORY COMMISSION (PARCAC)

The Commission was presented the idea of merging the Public Arts Committee and the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission at their regular meeting on October 15, 2015 and entertained discussion which resulted in posing more questions for staff and decided to postpone the item to the following year.

The item was on the March 17, 2016 regular meeting agenda; the Public Arts Committee members attended as visitors and presented the following in support of consolidating the two Advisory bodies:

> Both can solicit donations and funds for their respective uses.

Both use the support of staff from the following Departments: City Clerk, Planning, Administration and Public Works.

- > Both submit recommendations on proposed artwork that is placed in parks.
- > Both have recreational aspects to them.
- > Art and Recreation have been combined successfully in many cities.
- > Both are valued components of a community and are compatible with each other.

➤ The Committee has had a steady decline in interested public members to participate within the confines of the committee. There are many times they have been unable to obtain a quorum to conduct the business brought before them.

➤ The Commission has enjoyed strong support through the various programs that have been established along with a funding mechanism that allow them to leverage volunteers and grant funding to complete many of their projects.

➤ The financial uncertainty in the coming years adds further stress upon department staff to accomplish more with less.

> The likelihood of less capital projects that would allow some funding for public art.

Support to grow the City of Homer as an Art Destination as well as a Recreational Destination.

The Commission reviewed and discussed the points made to consolidate the two advisory bodies into one nine member commission at the regular meeting on March 17, 2016.

Commissioner Roedl requested a review of the ordinance creating the new commission before submitting their final recommendation to Council for approval, stating that he wanted to know what he was recommending before it was a done deal. Additional commissioners agreed with Commissioner Roedl.

At the regular meeting on April 21, 2016 the Commission reviewed the Draft Ordinance and discussed the following points regarding the new proposed commission:

- removing the word "Culture" from the new commission title;
- defining what culture meant and how it was to be enacted by the commission;
- designating two seats for arts and culture and how that may pose limitations for the commission;

reducing the commission to 7 and replace commissioners whose terms will be expiring with those of the Committee;

> expressing concern on obtaining a quorum of five to hold a meeting; and

> reviewing in one year how things are working and recommending amendments to change what is not working.

Following is the excerpt from the minutes of the March 17, 2016 and April 21, 2016 meetings reflecting the motions and discussions of the Commission made at the two meetings

Excerpt from March 17, 2016 Regular Meeting:

PENDING BUSINESS

B. Combining the Public Arts Committee with the Parks and Recreation Commission Recommendation to Council

Chair Steffy read the title into the record.

ROEDL/BRANN – MOVED TO RECOMMEND CITY COUNCIL COMBINE THE PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION AND THE PUBLIC ARTS COMMITTEE TO FORM A NEW COMMISSION ENTITLED HOMER PARKS, ART, RECREATION AND CULTURE ADVISORY COMMISSION (PARCAC)

The commission discussed the pros and cons to consolidating efforts with the Public Arts Committee. Commissioners discussed the following:

-Lack of knowledge about the arts and vice a versa

- How consolidation would affect the meetings regarding agenda items and time management
 - including and incorporating art related topics as required into the agenda
- Adding additional seats to the commission and how that would detail out
 - Existing members stepping up to fulfill the new commission seats

- Actual seating of additional members

- Continuing the momentum of the PARC steering committee and implementation of recommendations from the needs assessment

- Responsibilities of the Public Arts Committee

- Overseeing the 1% for Art program related to capital projects
- Placement of art on or in city owned facilities
- Managing the Municipal Art Collection and donations of art to the city

- Funding of projects that would be available to the commission that has art and recreational components

- Public Art in Parks recommendations and donations

- Public Arts Committee has not been able to recruit new members believed in part because they do not have a fixed budget, are not part of a department per se and lack of members make it difficult to obtain a quorum

Commissioner Roedl questioned the sense of urgency and requested reviewing the draft ordinance before signing off on it and Chair Steffy explained that there was no urgency but it was brought before the commission last year and the commission postponed discussion and decision. In all fairness to the Public Arts group the Commission should address their request. He further advocated that if there was no opposition to assimilating the committee into the commission he did not see why they could not accommodate the committee and address the issue sooner rather than later since the season is fast approaching and they will not be meeting for a lengthy period over the summer. Chair Steffy agreed it was reasonable to review the ordinance before submitting to council.

Staff explained that it will be a multi-step process since there will be changes needed to the bylaws to incorporate aspects of the Public Arts Committee and their administrative guidelines. Commissioner Ashmun expressed the desire to retain existing policies regarding the arts as part of the new commission.

Chair Steffy called for the vote.

VOTE. YES. HART¹, STEFFY, BRANN, ROEDL, ASHMUN

Motion carried.

Excerpt from the April 21, 2016 regular meeting minutes:

PENDING BUSINESS

A. Combining the Public Arts Committee with the Parks and Recreation Commission Recommendation to Council – Draft Ordinance Review

Vice Chair Brann requested comments from the Commission.

¹Commissioner Hart did not voice a vote. Chair Steffy noted that she was not in favor. Commissioner Hart rebutted she was not opposed to the motion but was abstaining. After checking with the City Clerk and Robert's Rules regarding this abstention it is found that abstaining is not permitted on this class of motion. Since Commissioner Hart stated on the record that she was not opposed her vote was included in favor of the motion.

Commissioner Ashmun referring to a comment submitted by Mr. Jack Wiles believed that the commission has done due diligence regarding the issue he brought up on Arts and Parks by the respective commissioners. She believed that the Commissioners should not consider Mr. Wiles comments.

Commissioner Archibald inquired about appointments to the Committee and the Clerk explained that it was reappointment of two members and it would represent better to Council the continued involvement, he further expressed feeling negatively on the idea and that they have a vibrant art community who should want to be involved in that committee.

Commissioner Lowney offered rebuttal on defining arts people within set guidelines and that there was a lot to be said to evolving the two into one. She further opined that the art is taking place in the parks and green spaces and that as a commission they should be taking part in those decisions.

Ms. Engebretsen proceeded to explain that the policies have been established and explain that committees are formed to address individual project needs and that it may require more refinement on managing their meeting times and content and she is not sure that there will be too many art related issues that will be required to be addressed in the near future and because of that there is not enough to generate interest in belonging to the committee by the community. Commissioner Ashmun added that this is also public art and proceeded to explain the nuances that would make the difference between someone who is an artist or involved in various aspects of art.

Further discussion followed hearing comment and opinion from each member of the commission on the aspects of the new commission and how it applies to this commission. Further explanation in that the focus will not be solely on parks and recreation but will have aspects of art and culture which is very much a part of a community.

The Commission covered making changes to the Ordinance such as removing the word Culture if the Commissioners were not comfortable with that word. Staff recommended that they make a motion. No motion was made to remove the word culture from the title.

Commissioner Archibald requested enlightenment on culture in regards to the commission promoting culture. Commissioner Lowney did her best to explain culture as an evolving part of the commission and focus and as part of their community.

Commissioner Hart expressed concern on having two people on the commission that are not interested in parks and recreation initially and she further expressed concerns on the requirement of five as a quorum. She would like to see this issued tabled. Vice Chair Brann inquired if that was a motion. Commissioner Hart responded that it was.

HART/ - MOVED TO TABLE THE ISSUE UNTIL MAY.

Vice Chair Brann requested a second. Motion died for lack of a second to the motion.

Commissioner Lowney acknowledged the concerns expressed with adding two more seats at this table. Advocating embracing the enthusiasm and believes that they have added to their community, and the parks and recreation community. Artists tend to think out of the box and that is an added benefit. She added that she doesn't believe that if they did not have an interest in parks and rec they would not have signed up for another term referring to the Committee members. She added her interest and participation as an artist and also parks and recreation on the commission.

Staff explained that if the circumstances come up in the future there are options available to make changes via ordinance. The worst case scenario is shown by what is happening to the committee.

Commissioner Roedl offered that they should change the membership to seven and if they (art folks) have comments on the work of the commission people can come in and offer comment. He knows that his commission expires in October and suggested that they fill vacating seats with art folks, there have been three people who left since he signed up almost two years ago. Commissioner Ashmun disagreed with that approach saying that her term expires in October too but she does not plan on leaving. There was a suggestion of having committees for art related items.

ROEDL/HART - MOVE TO AMEND THE COMMISSION TO SEVEN MEMBERS.

Discussion ensued that the seven members is for the new commission, having to choose from the two Public Arts Committee members who are interested, defining seats on the commission, current interests of existing commissioners may already fill that "art" role, having the same makeup in the commission that they have now, strong volunteerism, and support for a nine member commission for at least a year to see how it works.

VOTE. YES. ROEDL, HART. VOTE. NO. LOWNEY, ASHMUN, ARCHIBALD, BRANN.

Motion failed.

LOWNEY/ROEDL - MOVE TO ADOPT THE NINE MEMBER COMMISSION BY INCORPORATING THE CURRENT MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC ARTS COMMITTEE AND THEN REVISIT THE MEMBERSHIP ISSUE IN ONE YEAR.

Concerns were expressed on being able to make changes if the nine member commission was having issues with obtaining quorums, vacancies or non-attendance, etc. There was an inquiring on keeping the quorum at four instead of five members but the Clerk stated it was not permissible in accordance with Robert's Rules, that they needed a majority of the membership for a quorum.

There was a brief discussion on including the one year review in the recommendation and staff noted that this can be included in the bylaws to review after one year since this Ordinance creating the new commission is to be written in code and permanent in nature; that type of task could be reflected in the commission Bylaws to outline requirements of the commission.

The idea of consolidating the Public Arts Committee (Committee) with the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (Commission) was presented at the regular meeting on August 13, 2015 but due to the absence of two committee members a formal motion was postponed to the next regular meeting.

The Committee had been unable to obtain a quorum since the August regular meeting; they were able to have a discussion at a worksession on February 11, 2016 and at a Special Meeting held on March 24, 2016 were able to make a formal motion of support to consolidate the two advisory bodies. Following were several factors considered when looking at consolidating the efforts of the Committee and the Commission:

- > Both can solicit donations and funds for their respective uses.
- Both use the support of staff from the following Departments: City Clerk, Planning, Administration and Public Works.
- > Both submit recommendations on proposed artwork that is placed in parks.
- > Both have recreational aspects to them.
- > Art and Recreation have been combined successfully in many cities.
- > Both are valued components of a community and are compatible with each other.
- There are many times the Committee has been unable to obtain a quorum to conduct the business brought before them.
- The Commission has enjoyed strong support through the very programs that have been established along with funding mechanisms that allow them to leverage volunteers and grant funding to complete many of their projects.
- The financial uncertainty in the coming years adds further stress upon department staff to accomplish more with less.
- > The likelihood of less capital projects that would allow funding for public art projects.
- Community support to grow the City of Homer as an Art Destination as well as a Recreational Destination.
- > The possibility to expand grant opportunities with a more diverse commission.

Dear City Council members,

I thought I would, as current Chair of the Public Arts Committee, offer some background on the ordinance that will be before you on May 9:

In August 2015, the Public Art Committee (PAC) discussed combining the PAC with the Parks & Recreation Advisory Commission (P&R). Because of successful grassroots collaborative work behind the PARC Needs Assessment, PAC members thought improved coordination and sharing of resources for the City would be beneficial to all: it would save the City money; it would create a more robust commission, reflective of the quality of life issues that are important to Homer residents; and it would elevate public arts from committee to commission status.

The drivers that initiated this discussion were the City's budget shortfalls and an attempt to save staff time.

PAC members discussed the barriers to success at the PAC:

- The committee meets quarterly, so it has been difficult to sustain momentum. It is difficult to conduct business without a quorum.
- Each year a budget must be justified, with the last budget in 2014 at \$5,000.*

While committee members over the years have examined grant opportunities for public/private partnerships, including revitalization of Pioneer Avenue, the PAC did not have the capacity to follow through with the community-building necessary to receive such a grant or to achieve the continuing work necessary to successfully complete a revitalization project.

Committee members discussed whether the P&R would be amenable to this suggested change, noting that it already had a comprehensive schedule. The concept was floated, by former PAC member Adele Person, at a P&R meeting in the fall of 2015. Nothing was formally asked of the Commission at that time; just that they think about the concept.

Early in 2016, PAC member Erin Hollowell and I met with City Manager Katie Koester to further discuss the idea. Katie had been aware of the earlier P&R meeting and seemed receptive, if the Parks & Rec Commission was amenable, noting that code would need to be revised.

Erin and I asked to be visitors at the next P&R meeting in February, where we again presented the idea to members in attendance, suggesting that two PAC members could then be reappointed to the newly revamped commission. After we spoke and at that same meeting, the Parks & Rec commission did pass a motion in support of creating a new commission that would include the arts within it.

Subsequent to that meeting, on March 24, the PAC met and approved this Motion: *to recommend that the Homer City Council support and approve the recommendation to create a new commission, entitled* **Homer Parks, Art, Recreation and Culture Advisory**

Commission (PARCAC), by combining the mission, duties and responsibilities of the Public Arts Committee with the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission and adding a minimum of two additional seats on the new commission with three-year terms.



They have bid to renew the contract at the existing rate. The Center has had the contract for the last five years and has provided good service to us.

Sealed bids for **Prisoner Meals at the Homer Jail** will be received at the Office of the City Clerk, City Hall, City of Homer, 491 East Pioneer Avenue, Homer, Alaska, until **2:00 p.m., Thursday, April 21, 2016** at which time they will be publicly opened and read. The time of receipt will be determined by the City Clerk's time stamp. Bids received after the time fixed for the receipt of the bids shall not be considered. **All bidders must submit a City of Homer Plan Holders Registration form to be on the Plan Holders List and to be considered responsive.** Plan Holder registration forms and Plans and Specifications are available online at http://www.cityofhomer-ak.gov/rfps

This project consists of preparing three daily meals (breakfast, lunch, and dinner) for each prisoner. The number of prisoners varies daily from zero to eight. Meals must be available 365 days per year. All meals (except lunch) must be supplied in individual disposable containers, with plastic eating utensils, napkins and appropriate condiments.

All meals will normally be picked up by City personnel. Meal provider shall, however, be prepared to deliver meals on specific request when jail personnel cannot respond. Delivery is expected to be infrequent required and a delivery fee (which fee shall comprise as part of your bid) may be added to any order, which the provider is requested to deliver. (Exception: bidders outside of the limits of the City of Homer will have to deliver <u>all</u> meals to the jail).

All meals must be properly prepared in facilities licensed by the State of Alaska and inspected and approved for food service by the appropriate State Agencies. Evidence of current licensing and inspection must accompany all bids.

An electronic copy of the bid packets and meal guidelines is available on the City's website <u>http://www.cityofhomer-ak.gov/rfps</u> or you may purchase hard copies at the office of the City Clerk upon payment of \$10 per set (\$40 for overnight delivery). All fees are non-refundable. The City of Homer reserves the right, to accept or reject any or all bids, to waive irregularities or informalities in the bids, and to award the contract to the lowest responsive bidder.

CONTRACT FOR PRISONER MEAL SERVICE

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, The City maintains and operates the Homer Jail facility and is charged with the responsibility for providing meals to inmates; and

WHEREAS, Provider has a current State of Alaska business license together with current evidence of inspection and approval as a food service establishment from applicable State Agencies.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual agreements and covenants hereinafter set forth, the parties agree as follows:

1. <u>Provision of Meals.</u>

Provider agrees to prepare and furnish all breakfasts, lunches, and dinners for prisoners who are incarcerated from time to time in the Homer Jail. Meal orders shall be given telephonically or in person to the provider approximately thirty (30) minutes prior to scheduled meal times. Meals shall be picked up by an authorized employee of the City at the place of preparation if the same is located within the City of Homer. Any provider located outside the City limits shall be required to deliver all meals, seven days per week and cost of their deliveries shall be included by any provider in the overall price of meals. Meal providers located in the City shall be required to deliver meals on the specific request of City personnel

in situations where City personnel cannot respond. In the event delivery is required for any meal order, a delivery fee may be added to the effected meal invoice. The delivery fee shall be a fixed "trip" fee independent of the number of meals on the invoice. The delivery fee shall be as specified in provider's bid sheet. Breakfast shall be available for pickup (or shall be delivered) between 7:30 a.m. and 9:00 a.m., lunch shall be available for pick up (or shall be delivered) between 11:30 a.m. and 12:00 noon, and dinner shall be available for pickup (or shall be delivered) between 4:30 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. Provider shall stand ready and able to furnish meals at other times, however, upon request.

Provider specifically understands and recognizes that the City does not control the number of occupants of its jail facility and thus cannot specify the minimum or maximum number of meals that may be required under this contract.

2. Special Meals (Religious or Medical diets).

Meal Provider shall prepare any necessary "special dietary" meals upon the request of the City, when said meals are necessitated by religious diets (Most commonly, but not limited to, Russian "Old Believers"), and any special diets ordered by medical personnel. If the cost of any "Special" meal exceeds the contract price for the normally provided "Contract" meal; the Meal Provider may charge the City whatever price it deems customary and reasonable up to, but not to exceed the level of price the Meal Provider charges the general public for the same or similar items on its regular menu.

3. <u>License Requirements.</u>

Provider must have a current State of Alaska business license, and must additionally

have current evidence of inspection and/or approval for the operation of a food service establishment from the applicable State agencies. All meals must be prepared in licensed and inspected premises.

4. <u>Meal Guidelines.</u>

Guidelines for all meals are contained in the attachment to this contract, marked Appendix "A".

5. <u>Payment.</u>

The City shall pay on a monthly basis for all meals prepared and furnished to inmates. Prices, per the bid accepted by the City on <u>May 9, 2016</u> are as follows:

An invoice shall accompany each meal delivery, specifying the date, number of meals, entree served, and the total price for each meal. No sales tax shall be included. The price for each meal served shall be the price specified above, per the bid by provider; however, substituted meals shall be provided at a fixed average price as indicated on Appendix "A" of

this contract.

A monthly statement shall be submitted to the City no later than the third weekday of the month following the month that the meals were actually served. A copy of all invoices shall be attached to this statement.

5. <u>Term.</u>

This contract shall commence on July 1, 2016 and expire June 30, 2019, unless terminated earlier or extended as hereinafter provided. All costs of delivery and any administrative costs shall be included in the individual meal costs - no additional charges or fees are permitted; except for providers costs for special delivery services at request of authorized City agents.

7. <u>Renewal Option.</u>

This contract may be extended by written amendment expressing the mutual agreement of both the City and the meal provider. Each renewal shall extend this contract for an additional twelve (12) month term from the preceding expiration date, and up to two (2) renewal options may be executed. This contract cannot be extended beyond June 30, 2021.

If the meal provider wishes to renew this contract, he <u>must serve written notice</u> on the City (Chief of Police) at least sixty (60) days before the existing contract expires. If the City and meal provider cannot reach a mutual agreement for renewal at least forty-five (45) days prior to the existing contract expiration date, this renewal option shall expire, and the contract shall be publicly re-bid.

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8. <u>Termination of Contract.</u>

The City reserves the right to terminate this contract, with two weeks (14 days) notice to the meal provider for the following causes:

(a) Meal portions are frequently less than specifications;

(b) The 25% monthly ceiling on substituted meals is exceeded;

(c) Failure to rotate meals;

(d) Failure to comply with billing requirements and provision of documentation (invoices).

(e) Failure to provide daily meal service as required, either directly, or by failure of his alternate meal provider.

(f) Meal Provider has served spoiled or "soured" food products; and has failed to <u>immediately</u> rectify the spoilage problem(s) upon notification by the City. For purposes of execution of the City's intent to terminate the contract pursuant to this section, notice to Meal Provider shall be in writing.

9. <u>Hold Harmless Agreement and Liability Insurance.</u>

General Liability: \$1,000,000 limit per occurrence for bodily injury, property damage, personal injury and advertising injury.

To the fullest extent permitted by law, the named Provider below agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the City of Homer, its elected and appointed officials, employees and volunteers against any and all liabilities, claims, demands, lawsuits, or losses, including costs and attorney fees incurred in defense thereof, arising out of or in any way

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connected or associated with this agreement.

10. <u>Alternate Meal Provider Authorized.</u>

Meal provider is authorized, should he elect to close his business for a limited number of days (not to exceed thirty in any calendar year), to make arrangements for an alternate meal provider of his choice, subject to the following conditions:

(a) Primary meal provider shall be jointly and severally liable with alternate meal provider for any breach of contract or damages suffered by City as a result of actions of any alternate meal provider.

(b) Primary meal provider shall submit all monthly billing statements/invoices to the police department for all meals served, including those served by the alternate meal provider. The City shall neither be billed by, nor remit directly to alternate meal provider.

(c) All meals served by the alternate meal provider shall be delivered to the police station.

(d) The City will pay the primary meal provider for meals served by his alternate provider at the standard rates as specified in Article 4 of this contract. Any difference between the standard meal contract price, and the price charged by the alternate meal provider to the primary meal provider shall be paid by the primary meal provider.

(e) Primary meal provider agrees to pay alternate meal provider for any meals he has provided, within 30 days following the last day of the month in which the meals were served.

(f) Alternate meal provider shall comply with all terms and conditions of this contract, including but not limited to; meal specifications, business licensing, health inspections and

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insurance coverage.

(g) Primary meal provider shall deliver a written notice to the police department, signed by the alternate meal provider, in which the alternate provider shall acknowledge and endorse the terms and conditions of this contract. Notice shall be delivered before any meals are served by alternate meal provider. Formal notice shall be as stated in Appendix "B" to this contract.

11. <u>Penalty Provision for Failure to Provide Meals.</u>

In the event that meal provider fails to provide 365 day/year meal service, the City may purchase meals from any other source during the period of non-performance by meal provider. Meal provider hereby authorizes the City to deduct the difference between the contract meal prices, and the costs of the purchased meals, from the monthly payment to meal provider for the month in which the meals were actually purchased. An additional penalty of \$25.00 shall be deducted from the monthly payment for each day of non-performance. City shall attempt to order comparable meals to those specified in the contract, and shall order a "daily special" if one is available. This penalty provision shall not constitute a waiver of any of City's remedies for breach of contract.

12. <u>Special Conditions.</u>

The following special conditions shall apply to and govern the operation of this contract:

(a) Delivery fee shall be \$5.00 per trip.

13. Entire Agreement.

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The provisions embodied in this contract contain all covenants, conditions and agreements between the parties and no change or amendment thereof shall occur without the express written agreement of the parties.

14. Assignment.

This contract may not be assigned by provider, in whole or in part, without the express written consent of the City.

APPENDIX "A"

MEAL GUIDELINES

Breakfast Guidelines

Breakfast shall be served in individual portions in individual disposable containers. Each breakfast shall contain the following accessory items and condiments:

- (a) One napkin
- (b) One set plastic utensils (knife, fork, spoon)
- (c) One individually packaged serving of salt & pepper
- (d) One individual ketchup serving in sealed container
- (e) One individual mustard serving (with ham slice only)
- (f) One 1/2 oz. or larger, sealed serving jelly or jam

Each breakfast entree shall be accompanied by two slices of buttered white or whole wheat toast; a 1/2 pint (8 oz.) individually packaged serving of fresh milk or juice, and a 4 oz. (wt) minimum serving of fried or hash brown potatoes. Breakfast entrees shall be served in the following sequence for variety:

- (1) 2 fried eggs, over easy; 4 slices bacon (1 oz each)
- (2) 2 eggs, scrambled; 1 sausage patty, 4 oz. minimum
- (3) Ham Omelet (using 2 eggs and 4 oz. ham)
- (4) 2 fried eggs, over easy; 1 slice ham 4 oz. minimum
- (5) 2 eggs scrambled, 4 link sausages, 4 oz. min. (total)
- (6) 2 eggs, fried, over easy; 4 slices bacon, 1 oz. ea. slice
- (7) Cheese Omelet, (using 2 eggs and 1 oz. cheese)

Lunch Guidelines

Each prisoner shall have an individual lunch in a paper sack which shall consist of:

- (a) One item fresh fruit (apple, orange, banana, or pear)
- (b) One 12 oz. container of soda pop (non metal)
- (c) One 1 oz. bag of potato chips

- (d) One napkin
- (e) One sandwich, wrapped in plastic for freshness

Lunch orders will be called in at least 30 minutes prior to pickup. Lunches need not be delivered (except for firms outside the City limits) - a City employee will pick up all prisoner lunches. Sandwiches shall be prepared on either white bun, or whole wheat bread; and shall be garnished with lettuce, and the condiments traditional and customary for the specific sandwich (i.e. mustard, mayonnaise, salt and pepper, etc.). Sandwiches shall be rotated as follows:

- (1) Sliced turkey or chicken, 3 oz. meat minimum
- (2) Hamburger, 4 oz. meat minimum
- (3) Sliced beef, 3 oz. meat minimum
- (4) Sliced ham, 3 oz. meat minimum

Other meat based sandwiches may be substituted, at a frequency not to exceed 25% of the lunches in any given month; provided that they contain the 3 oz. minimum meat serving. The price on any substituted sandwich shall be <u>fixed</u> at the <u>average</u> of the bid price for the above four basic lunch sandwiches.

Dinner Guidelines

A hot dinner is provided for all prisoners. Each dinner shall be delivered in individual disposable containers, for the entree, potato dish, bread, and vegetable. Soup and salad shall be in separate disposable containers. The following items shall accompany each dinner:

- (a) One disposable cup with lid, containing 6 fluid ounces or more of hot soup;soup to be varied daily
- (b) One disposable cup with lid of tossed salad with dressing, container 12 fl. oz. or larger, essentially full; dressings to be varied daily
- Two individual, two cracker servings in sealed wrappers (i.e. 4 crackers total);
 rotate types for variety
- (d) Two slices of french, white, or whole wheat bread, pre-buttered or supplied

with two butter patties

- (e) Vegetable side dish, vary daily, 4 1/2 oz. min. (wt.)
- (f) Potato, rice, or pasta (noodles, macaroni), 4 oz. (wt.) portion minimum; gravy where appropriate
- (g) Napkin, set of plastic silverware (knife, fork, spoon), salt, pepper in individual packets; and the condiments customary and usual for the entree (such as ketchup, tartar sauce, etc.)
- (h) One fresh fruit (apple, pear, orange, banana, etc.)
- (i) One individually packaged 1/2 pint (8 fluid oz.) serving of fresh milk or juice

The standard dinner entrees shall be as follows: and will be served in sequence, except for the substituted items:

- (1) Hamburger patty, 8 oz. minimum (wt.)
- (2) Fried Chicken; 4 individual pieces, not more than one of which shall be a wing or back
- (3) Two (2) Fried or baked Pork Chops, center cut; at least 1/2 inch thick after cooking
- (4) Fried or baked Fish, 6 oz. minimum (wt.)
- (5) Meat Loaf slice, 6 oz. minimum (wt.)
- (6) Roast Beef, 6 oz. minimum (wt.)
- <u>NOTE:</u> In <u>all</u> of the meal specifications for breakfast, lunch and dinner all weights are <u>after cooking.</u>

Other dinner entrees may be substituted on an irregular basis as a frequency not to exceed 25% of all dinners served in any one month, provided that they contain at least a 6 oz. (wt.) edible portion of meat or fish. The price charged for substituted entrees shall be <u>fixed</u> at the average price bid on the above seven standard entrees.

Meal provider shall provide cardboard boxes for, and shall package all City Meals in cardboard boxes sufficient to facilitate convenient pickup, handling, and transportation of all contact meals to the jail facility.

This project consists of the construction of 2700 LF of water main along Shellfish Avenue and South Slope Drive and the installation of a PRV station on Shellfish Avenue from Mountainview Drive to East Hill Road.

Five responsive bids were received from qualified firms. The bid results were evaluated and the results are as follows.

SUBJECT: RECOMMENDATION OF SUPPORT TO ALLOW RETAIL CANNABIS ON THE SPIT

At the regular meeting on April 28, 2016 the Cannabis Advisory Commission reviewed the Memorandum dated April 12, 2016 from the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission in support of allowing retail marijuana on the Spit. The Cannabis Advisory Commission had this item on their February meeting agenda also.

Discussion points were:

- Safety concerns for first responders in relation to an extremely smoky environment
- Not allowing anything until state regulations are completed
- Allowing retail business to sell other consumables such as food and drink
- Allowing other forms of consumption except smoking such as vaping

The Cannabis Advisory Commission supports the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission's recommendation in its entirety.

The excerpt of the minutes are attached for review.

Recommendation: Allow Cannabis sales in the Marine Commercial District. Following is the excerpt of the minutes regarding the discussion.

B. Cannabis Businesses on the Spit (This item was carried over from the February 25, 2016 meeting agenda)

1. Memorandum from the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission dated April 12, 2016 re: Recommendation to Allow Retail Marijuana on the Spit

HARRIS/REYNOLDS – MOVD TO FORWARD A MOTION IN SUPPORT OF THE PORT AND HARBOR ADVISORY COMMISSION MTION TO ALLOW CANNABIS BUSINESSES ON THE SPIT.

There was a brief discussion in support of the motion.

VOTE. YES. UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

Commissioner Harris would like to recommend that they do not limit the onsite consumption especially on the Spit. Commissioner Reynolds opined that they should be able to include that in the previous motion and requested clarification. The Clerk noted that they could amend the motion to address consumption.

REYNOLDS/CARROLL – MOVED TO IMMEDIATELY RECONSIDER THE PREVIOUS MOTION.

There was no discussion.

VOTE. YES. NON-OBJECTION. UNAIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

HARRIS/REYNOLDS – MOVED TO SUPPORT THE PORT & HARBOR ADVISORY COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION TO ALLOW CANNABIS BUSINESSES ON THE SPIT AND FURTHER RECOMMEND ALLOWING ONSITE NON-SMOKE CONSUMPTION IN ANY CANNABIS RETAIL BUSINESS ON THE SPIT OR IN THE CITY UNTIL STATE REGULATIONS HAVE BEEN DECIDED AND APPROVAL OF HOMER POLICE DEPARTMENT CHIEF.

Commissioner Robl was opposed to onsite consumption due to the exposure to first responders and believes that will also be a major concern at the state level. There was further discussion on the ventilation system requirements and how the consumption of marijuana is conducted in various manners and that most popular is by vaping. Discussion also included the use of protection equipment but use of masks, Commissioner Robl added that Fire or EMT may be able to use face masks but that type of apparatus would impede a police officer by providing impairment to the peripheral version. It was noted that they would not move to allow the consumption until regulations were established at the State level. REYNOLDS/CARROLL – MOVED TO AMEND ALLOWING RETAIL AND CONSUMPTION ESTABLISHMENTS ON THE SPIT THAT DID NOT ALLOW SMOKING OF CANNABIS.

There was a brief discussion on the process for the amendment to the motion, preferred combustion (vaping) of cannabis, applicants from Homer aware that they will allow consumption on site since it is being considered by the State to allow sales of food and drink other than cannabis related in the same location.

VOTE. (Amendment) YES. NON-OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT.



Currently HCC 17.04.040(a) provides that a special assessment district (SAD) is initiated by either (i) a resolution approved by a vote of not less than three-fourths of the Council; or (ii) petition signatures of the record owners of not less than one-half in value of the real property in the proposed SAD. I understand that the Council wants the second alternative to be rewritten to provide that a SAD may be initiated by petition signatures of the record owners of real property that would bear 50 percent or more of the assessed cost of the improvement. A draft ordinance making this change is attached.

Currently HCC 17.04.050(b) provides that after initiation of an SAD, the preparation of an improvement plan for the SAD, and notification of the record owners of property in the proposed SAD of a public hearing on the necessity of the improvement and proposed improvement plan, "[i]f owners of real property that would bear 50 percent or more of the assessed cost of the improvement file timely written objections, the Council may not proceed with the improvement unless it revises the improvement plan to reduce the assessed cost of the improvement that is borne by objecting record owners to less than 50 percent of the assessed cost of the improvement."

With the requested change to the signature requirement on the petition to form an SAD, the objection procedure in HCC 17.04.050(b) repeats the property owner vote that would be required for an SAD initiated by property owner petition, and may seem redundant for an SAD initiated in that manner. However, the objection procedure must remain, as it is required by state law.

AS 29.26.020(a) authorizes a municipality by ordinance to prescribe procedures for the formation of special assessment districts, making local improvements, levying

and collecting assessments, and financing improvements, which the City has done in HCC 17.04. Under AS 29.46.020(b), a municipal ordinance prescribing the procedure for forming special assessment districts is subject to the requirement that "[i]f protests as to the necessity of a proposed local improvement are made by owners of property that will bear 50 percent or more of the estimated cost of the improvement, the governing body may not proceed with the improvement until the objections have been reduced to less than 50 percent, except on approval of not fewer than three-fourths of the governing body." Because of this statutory mandate, the objection procedure in HCC 17.04.050(b) must be retained for every SAD, including one that is initiated by property owner petition.



Responding to your request for clarification regarding the affect of legislation on previously initiated SADs, I offer the following:

- 1. Resolution 16-41(S)(A), amended to clarify that the changes to the HART policy apply only to SADs initiated after May 10, 2016.
- 2. Under HCC 1.08.030, Ordinance 16-20 regarding the vote required to initiate a SAD becomes effective the day after its adoption. This is sufficient to establish that the initiation of a district that was initiated before the effective date of Ordinance 16-20 remains subject to the vote required before Ordinance 16-20 becomes effective.

Happy Public Service Recognition Week

Last week was Public Service Recognition week and is a great opportunity to reflect on the dedicated, talented and hardworking people we have working for the City of Homer. Working in government can be thankless – and it has been a hard year for City of Homer employees with the budget scrutinizing and talk of cuts. These are the people that keep the peace, keep your water clean, your streets sanded, the bills paid, and the City of Homer world turning. Make someone's day the next time you see a City employee and thank them for their work!

Code Blue Grant Award for Gurney for New Ambulance

Chief Painter has been informed that the Code Blue request to fund 50% of a gurney for the new ambulance has been approved. Funding for Code Blue Phase 16 is included in the Governor's budget and there is no indication at this point that it is in jeopardy, but of course that will not be final until the budget is passed and signed. Funding will not be available until about September with the state only picking up a total of \$7,000 towards the project's \$14,010 current estimate. The City will have to commit any unmet match before the gurney will be ordered by Southern Region EMS Council. However, there is the chance that the per gurney allocation will be increased to \$14,000, as was the case last year when unspent funds were reallocated. If an additional appropriation is needed, I will bring an Ordinance forward to Council this fall.

ADEC Extends Comment Period for Changes to the Regional Stakeholder Committee process

Mayor Wythe sent a letter on April 11, 2016 to ADEC requesting an extension period for comments to the proposal to update the portions of Annex B specifically related to the Regional Stakeholder Committee process. Council followed that with Resolution 16-046 opposing proposed updates to Annex B of the Alaska Federal/State preparedness plan for response to oil and hazardous substance discharges/releases (Unified Plan). To help facilitate further public discussion and input on this proposal the deadline for submitting comments has been extended to the close of business May 31, 2016. ADEC will also post a fact sheet available to the public on the Public Notice website.

Utility Poles on Pioneer

Councilmember Lewis brought to my attention a citizen's concern regarding the safety and unsightliness of the utility poles down Pioneer Avenue (see attached email). The poles are owned by Alaska Communication Services (ACS) and in ADOT right of way. Public Works surveyed the poles and took the attached pictures. However, they are not qualified to say whether or not there is a safety concern with the state of the existing poles. It would be nice to have the poles underground, but there is a large expense associated with that. HCC 22.10.055(b) states that utilities must go underground if they are being majorly modified. However, there is lots of room in city code for the poles to be maintained without requiring underground installation. Major modifications exclude reconducting, reinsulating or in-kind replacement. There is a long list of exceptions to the underground requirement that can be granted by the City Manager. Furthermore, City Council can grant an exemption to the underground requirement.

Natural Gas HSAD Payment and Loan Update

With July 1, the annual installment payment date for the Natural Gas HSAD just around the corner and the proposal to change the penalty structure for the Natural Gas HSAD in Resolution 16-052 before you this evening, I wanted to provide Council with an update on the Natural Gas assessments, loan, and payment schedule.

Cash Flow

Finance Director Li prepared the attached amortization tables reflecting the payment schedule with the Borough for the Natural Gas HSAD. Through free main allowance payments and payments that have been made since the City made our last payment in 2015, we have a balance of \$2.3 million in the natural gas HSAD account. I plan on making a pre-payment on June 1, 2016 to bring our annual payments under what our anticipated cash flow will be with 2,269 parcels making payments.

Delinquent Properties

I have attached a list of the properties that are currently in delinquent status, excluding leases and government parcels. If none of these properties pay, the Natural Gas HSAD will be required to absorb over half a million dollars in delinquent payments (excluding interest). Payments have trickled in, most commonly with the sale of a property. At some point Council should discuss ways to encourage payment from these properties. Options include initiating foreclosure proceedings or contracting with a collections agency. Part of that conversation will be the cost associated with foreclosure and a collections agency would take around 25% of what are relatively easy funds to collect. The Borough publishes a list of properties every year that they initiate foreclosure proceedings on due to back taxes owed. These properties are rarely actually foreclosed on – it is an effective mechanism to get people's attention and payment.

I wish to bring forth this correspondence to shed light on the Alaska Communications Pole line down Pioneer Avenue.

I would like to give my opinion that it is a safety concern, as well as an eyesore to public traffic along the main pathway through Homer. Furthermore, trying to hopelessly fix the deteriorating pole line will alter the only strength points still holding the line together. There are no down guys along the poles that are leaning the most and the cables being suspended are far too large for the support system currently in place. Multiple drops coming from the pole line are "banjo tight" to the customer's attachments. One business (Sunny Service) has had its weather head completely pulled over due to the side strain coming from these poles.

Due to Homer statutes, the pole line cannot be restored and must be placed underground.

It is my opinion that a mutual agreement between the city of Homer, The Alaska stat DOT, and Alaska Communications MUST be discussed to prevent this situation from becoming catastrophic.

The City Attorney is hired by and serves at the pleasure of the Council. Birch Horton Bittner & Cherot (BHB) has been Homer's municipal attorney for the past 8 years. Their contract was renewed in 2012 for 4 years. They charge the city a flat fee for an unlimited amount of consulting services (drafting ordinances, negotiations, advice, legal opinions, lease reviews, etc.). Though their contract limits their retainer services to 50 hours a month, they have not applied that cap for some time. This includes travel to one Council meeting a month, and as of recently telephonic attendance at department head staff meetings. Any litigation is charged an hourly rate.

Per the contract signed in June of 2012, BHB monthly retainer amount for 2016 is \$12,000. The City spends a tremendous amount on legal fees - consistently over \$250,000 a year. However, much of that is due to the litigious nature of our community. Though Attorney Tom Klinkner has served as lead counsel for the City of Homer since 2008, last month he handed over the reins to Holly Wells. As you know, BHB also has a number of attorneys on staff ranging from specialists in human resources to construction law that we lean on frequently.

I gave notice in November in my City Manager's report the intention to re-RFP the attorney contract, though it is a Council decision. Like any human, there have been mistakes made by the attorneys representing the City of Homer and hindsight is 20/20. However, there have also been successes – and the times the attorney's advice and assistance keeps the City of Homer out of court are the ones you are less likely to hear about. There are benefits to advertising an RFP, even if BHB is the best respondent. However, I believe that the risk of bringing someone on who is not familiar with city code and the unique character of Homer would be detrimental. If I had 12 years of experience with Homer City Code and could provide the historical knowledge, it would be a different story. However, I am one year into this job and often lean on the attorneys to remember how it was done before and help to not repeat past mistakes. I communicate with BHB multiple times a day, and that is just me – they are working on projects with many of the department heads from re-writing agreements, providing human resources advice, to helping the Cannabis Advisory Commission negotiate the complex world of marijuana.

What about an in-house attorney? I have given thought about the cost/benefit of hiring a City Attorney in house as a City employee. It would be great for the community to provide that

position and I would appreciate having someone to bounce issues off of. However, I think it would be very expensive and difficult to find an employee with the breadth of knowledge in municipal law that is necessary. The City would likely still have to hire outside counsel with specific knowledge (whereas with a large firm we can use the expertise of many different lawyers). At times, one staff person may have a difficult time keeping up with the work load, at any given time we have multiple attorneys working under deadline on City of Homer issues. There would also be the concern of creating a new class of employees that would then be subject to PERS termination fees and fines if we ever changed our mind and went back to not having a designated employee as the City Attorney. It would be expensive – the City of Kenai is the only municipality on the Peninsula of comparable size with a City Attorney. Their legal department, an attorney and legal assistant, comes in at \$375,807 for 2015 budget. Just over 70% of that is salaries and benefits. The Professional and special services line, which I presume is used to hire outside counsel, since 2013 varies from \$32,500- \$83,000.¹

BHB has done a good job representing the City of Homer. As their firm grows and evolves with new attorneys and Attorney Wells taking on the reins as lead attorney for Homer, I think they will continue to be able to serve us well. If the Council authorizes a new contract with BHB, I would use the existing contract as a starting place for negotiations, which BHB is agreeable to.

I. OVERVIEW OF REQUESTED SERVICES

The City of Homer is a first class-municipality located within the Kenai Peninsula Borough with a population of approximately 5,153. The greater Homer area contains 15,686 residents (Ninilchik south). The City is soliciting proposals for general counsel legal services. It is the intention of the City through this solicitation to enter into a contract with a general counsel that will serve the Homer City Council, the City Manager, and City Commissions as appropriate. The City Attorney is hired by and serves at the pleasure of the City Council. The City reserves the right to enter into contracts with attorneys other than the general counsel for specialized legal services should the Council so choose. Proposals are invited from any qualified State of Alaska licensed attorney at law or law firm. Attorney/Firms (**proposers**) must be qualified to represent the City in all State of Alaska Courts and the U.S. District Court for the District of Alaska.

II. SCOPE OF SERVICES, TERM, AND QUALIFICATIONS

The City prefers to enter into an agreement under which a qualified proposer will provide general counsel legal services on behalf of the City on a flat, fixed monthly fee basis. The fixed fee shall include all general counsel work and attendance at on Council meeting per month. The anticipated workload (excluding Council meetings) varies by month but averages approximately 50 hours per month. Court cases and legal proceedings shall be billed at an hourly rate and separate from the monthly fee for general counsel services. Other proposed agreements that address the scope of services outlined below will be considered.

- A. SCOPE OF SERVICES. The Proposer is expected to provide the City with general counsel legal services, to include the following:
 - 1. Serve as the legal advisor of and be responsible to the City Council; advice the City Manager and City Clerk concerning matters affecting the City Administration and perform other duties prescribed by the City Council.
 - 2. Prepare legal documents including, but not limited to ordinances, resolutions, contracts, conveyances, leases, easements, and legal opinions as needed.
 - 3. Be readily available for consultation by the City Council, City Manager, and City Clerk.
 - 4. Provide limited representation in court and manage the activities of other attorneys who may represent the City in Court.
 - 5. Assist the City Manager in negotiations on the City's behalf and handle other legal matters as they may arise.

- 6. Draft opinion letters regarding, among other things, the interpretation of the City Code, State and Federal laws, and policies.
- 7. Perform other such duties as may be prescribed for the City Attorney by ordinance or by direction of the City Council and/or City Manager.
- 8. Work effectively with the City Council, City Manager, City Clerk and with all other public agencies and other entities with which the City has a legal relationship.
- 9. Attend at least one meeting per month in person and others telephonically as requested.
- B. TERM. The term of the professional services agreement shall be one year initially. A longer term may be negotiated by the parties after the initial year. The agreement may be terminated at the convenience of the City at any time with or without cause.

C. QUALIFICATIONS.

- 1. The proposer (or primary/lead attorney for the City in a firm) must be a member in good standing of the State of Alaska Bar Association and be qualified to represent the City on all State of Alaska Courts and the U.S. District Court for the District of Alaska.
- 2. The proposer (or primary/lead attorney) should have at least five years of professional experience as legal counsel for an entity such as an Alaska city, municipality, or borough.
- 3. The proposer (or primary attorney) should be experienced and proficient in legal matters affecting the City, to include without limitation, Alaska municipal law including Title 29, the Homer Municipal Code, the Kenai Peninsula Borough Code, and other applicable State of Alaska and Federal laws.

III. <u>RESPONSE TO RFP</u>

To achieve a uniform review process and obtain a reasonable degree of comparability, a proposer should submit a response to the request for proposals that is consistent with and follows the format presented below. The proposal should not exceed fifteen (15) pages in length, double spaced, including page 1 of this RFP and the Letter of Transmittal. In page 1 of this RFP, provide the name, address, phone number, fax number, e-mail address, together with the name of the person who the City Manager may contact in regard to the proposal. Provide detail in the proposal for each of the following points:

- A. Letter of Transmittal (limited to one page)
 - 1. Briefly state the proposers' understanding of the services to be performed and make a positive commitment to provide the services as specified.
 - 2. State the long term availability of the proposer to the City of Homer.
 - 3. Give the names(s) of the person(s) who are authorized to make representations for the proposer, their titles and telephone numbers.
 - 4. The letter must be signed by an individual who has the authority to bind the Proposer.

- B. Statement of Qualifications
 - 1. Provide a statement of qualifications of the attorney who will be the primary or lead attorney providing general counsel and who will attend Council meetings.
 - 2. Provide a statement of qualifications of other attorneys, if any, who will support the primary attorney. These attorneys may be in the same firm or available under some other arrangement approved by the City Council.
 - 3. Provide a statement of qualifications of other attorneys (if any) in the firm who may have specialized experience and expertise that may be of value to the City.
 - 4. Describe the municipal experience, other applicable legal experience, and education of the attorney's listed in B1 through B3 above.

- C. CONFLICTS. List all matters and/or cases where the proposer currently represents an individual or entity with interest potentially adverse to the City. Describe the scope of the representation and the nature of the conflict.
- D. AVAILABLITY. Specify how available the primary attorney will be to the City. State whether the City will be the primary attorney's main client or one of several or many. State the current workload of the primary attorney and how that attorney intends to accommodate the City's legal work requirements. State the location of the office from which the primary attorney will serve the City.
- E. DISCLOSURE. Disclose any alleged significant prior or ongoing contract failures, contract breaches, and civil or criminal litigation or Bar Association investigation which involve the proposer as a party or in which the proposer has been judged guilty or liable or sanctioned. This is a mandatory disclosure.
- F. COST. Proposals must state the following cost information:
 - 1. A monthly fixed fee to provide general counsel plus travel to Homer for 12 Council meetings per year.
 - 2. The hourly rate for the lead attorney, supporting attorneys, and other attorneys for specialized services (i.e. litigation) outside the contract for general services.
 - 3. Cost per hour of travel (above the contracted 12 trips).

- G. MUNICIPAL EXPERIENCE. List all municipalities for which the proposer has performed legal services in the past five years. Provide a short description of the services, the date performed, and the municipal contract person.
- H. REFERENCES. Provide a minimum of five (5) references from similar clients, to include local government, State, and/or private clients, for whom the proposer has performed legal services within the last three (3) years. - C. The City may contact the references provided by proposer, contact any proposer to clarify a response; contact current and/or prior clients; solicit information from any available source concerning any aspect of a proposal; and see and review any other information deemed pertinent to the evaluation process.
- D. After the proposals are received, the full City Council will evaluate and score the proposals. The Council may ask the City Manager, current City Attorney, and City Clerk

to participate and/or provide support as needed. The Council will, after initial scoring, invite the three highest scoring attorney's/firms to interview.

E. At the conclusion of the interview process, the City Council will determine its choice of the highest rated proposer. Any award is contingent upon the successful negotiations of final contract terms and upon approval of the contract by the Council. Negotiations shall be confidential and not subject to disclosure to competing proposers unless and until an agreement is reached. If contract negotiations cannot be concluded successfully, the City upon written notice to all selected proposers may negotiate a contract with the next highest scoring proposer or proposers of withdraw the RFP.

- J. All proposals submitted become the property of the City and will be returned only at the City's option and at the Proposer's request and expense. The master copy of each proposal shall be retained for official files and will become public record after the award of the contract.
- K. The City will not be liable for Federal, State, or local excise taxes.
- L. The Proposers' response to the RFP shall constitute an agreement to all terms and conditions specified in the RFP including, without limitation, except such terms and conditions that the proposer expressly excludes, which must be written in **bold, italicized and underscored font.** Exceptions will be taken into consideration as part of the evaluation process.
- M. The City reserves the right to negotiate final contract terms with the proposer selected. The RFP and the awarded proposer's proposal shall be incorporated therein.
- N. Proposer understands and acknowledges that the representations above are material and important, and will be relied on by the City in evaluation of the proposal. Any Proposer misrepresentation may be treated as fraudulent concealment from the City of the true facts relating to the proposal.

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
