There's no one way to do this, so step outside and shine a light! Take photos or videos and share them if you like on social media using the hashtag






Hazard Mitigation Plan

Our community is launching an effort known as the 2022 City of Homer Hazard Mitigation Plan. Over the next few months, we will work with a consultant to assess risks posed by natural disasters and develop strategies to protect life and property in Homer from future hazard events.

Hazards addressed in our plan include the following: earthquake, climate change, flood, erosion, landslide, tsunami, wildland fire, and volcano. Once our plan is completed and approved by FEMA, our community will be eligible to apply for and receive certain types of non-emergency disaster assistance, including funding for mitigation projects identified in our plan.





Water, Water Everywhere

Mother Nature played tricks over Halloween weekend, dumping about 1.5 inches of rain on the Homer area. This caused a variety of problems for the City's infrastructure. First – it affected the sewer system. Our



normal sewer flow is 300,000 to 400,000 gallons per day. We measured 800,000 gallons on Saturday, October 30! When this happens, the lift stations have to work harder to pump the extra flow to the Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP) and the WWTP has to work harder to treat the flow. The WWTP Operators monitor conditions and make adjustments to maintain required treatment levels.

The extra flow comes from Infiltration & Inflow, mostly from sump pumps in people's basements and roof drains, which are connected to the City's sewer system. We are working to identify where this inflow happens, so we can disconnect the flows from the sewer system.

The heavy rain also affects the roads. It can fill roadside ditches with water, which can wash out culverts or flow over the roads and cause hazards to drivers. Public Works Operators monitor conditions and are ready to make repairs as needs arise. For example on Sunday, October 31 the Operators repaired a culvert washout on Saltwater Drive and by the next day opened a blocked culvert on Mt. Augustine Road, so water could keep flowing. Great work crew!


EMT-1 Training Course January 29, 2022

Sharpen up your skills or start a new career. Sign up now to reserve your spot and learn to become an EMT. Skills covered in basic training include CPS, AED use, patient assessment, splinting, airway management, bleeding and shock management, basic medications, and above all - teamwork. The course emphasizes hands-on training with daily scenarios. At the end, students will take the Alaska State EMT1 written exam. Classes start Saturday, January 29 and run through March for a total of 160 by completion.

Diamond Creek Recreation Area Improvements



In 2007, the Kachemak Heritage Land Trust, with funding from a Forestry Legacy Grant, purchased over 270 acres of land from UAA near Rogers Loop Road. This was immediately transferred to the City of Homer via Ordinance 07-03. Land purchased under this program is for recreation, conservation and general forestry uses. The City of Homer then passed Resolution 10-48 to approve the land as a conservation easement with the Alaska Department of Natural Resources.

This property is now known as the Diamond Creek Recreational Area (DCRA) and is home to a maze of ski trails, which get heavy use during the winter months and are maintained by the Kachemak Nordic Ski Club. In 2013, a master plan outlined future usage strategies and potential developments for the DCRA. Two exciting developments being discussed are a disc golf course and summer walking trails. The disc golf course would start in the upper portion of the DCRA and follow the proposed summer walking trail around the perimeter of the area to avoid the wetlands in the center of the DCRA though. The trail includes an alternate route that weaves through the middle of the property between areas of wetland. The disc course would be accessed via Cirrostratus Loop and via the proposed summer walking trails.

Both trails and the disc golf course are still in planning phases, though it is probable that construction will begin in the next 2-3 years. The summer walking

trails will likely begin before the disc golf course because the course will align with the walking trails.

For now though, as the winter months begin, we can all look forward to skiing on the trails already available.

How to Prepare and Protect Pipes for Winter Months

Looks like February weather showed up early this year and it ain't leaving any time soon! Here are a few tips from <u>redcross.org</u>. Pipes that freeze most frequently are exposed to severe cold, like outdoor hose bibs, water supply pipes in unheated interior areas like basements and crawl spaces, attics, garages, or kitchen cabinets, or pipes that run against exterior walls with little or no insulation.



How to Protect Pipes from Freezing

Ideally, before the onset of cold weather, you can protect pipes from freezing by following these recommendations:

- Remove, drain, and store hoses used outdoors. If you don't have a frost free hose bib, close inside valves that supply outdoor hose bibs, if available. Open the outside hose bibs to allow water to drain. Keep the outside valve open so that any water remaining in the pipe can expand without causing the pipe to break.
- Add insulation to attics, basements and crawl spaces to maintain higher temperatures in these areas.
- Insulate water supply lines located in unheated areas.
- Add products to insulate water pipes like a "pipe sleeve" or UL-listed "heat tape," "heat cable," or similar materials on exposed water pipes. Newspaper can provide a degree of insulation to exposed pipes even ¹/₄" of newspaper can provide protection in areas that do not have prolonged temperatures below freezing.

How to Prevent Frozen Pipes

- Keep garage doors closed if water supply lines are inside the garage.
- Open kitchen and bath cabinet doors to allow warmer air to circulate around plumbing.
- Seal gaps around holes where pipes run through walls or floors. Use caulk or spray foam insulation to fill the gaps.
- Seal gaps on skirting around raised homes. Even the smallest holes or gaps will allow a breeze in , which lowers temps.
- Let cold water drip from faucets served by exposed pipes. Running water even at a trickle helps prevent freezing.
- Keep your thermostat set to the same temperature both during the day and at night. By temporarily suspending the use of lower nighttime temperatures, you might incur a higher heating bill, but you can prevent a costly repair job if pipes burst.
- If you go away during cold weather, leave the heat on in your home, set to a temperature no lower than 55° F.

How to Thaw Frozen Pipes

- If you turn on a faucet and only a trickle comes out, suspect a frozen pipe. Likely places for frozen pipes include against exterior walls or where your water service enters your home through the foundation.
- Keep the faucet open. As you treat the frozen pipe and the frozen area begins to melt, water will begin to flow through the frozen area. Running water through the pipe will help melt ice in the pipe.
- Apply heat to the section of pipe using an electric heating pad wrapped around the pipe, an electric hair dryer, a portable space heater (kept away from flammable materials), or by wrapping pipes with towels soaked in hot water. Do not use a blowtorch, kerosene or propane heater, charcoal stove, or other open flame device.
- Apply heat until full water pressure is restored. If you are unable to locate the frozen area, if the frozen area is not accessible, or if you cannot thaw the pipe, call a licensed plumber.
- Check all other faucets in your home to see if you have additional frozen pipes. If one pipe freezes, others may freeze, too.

Don't Forget...

Sewer lines are just as susceptible to freezing as other components in your plumbing system. To keep drain pipes from freezing, follow the same recommendations for water lines. If you intend to be gone for an extended period of time during winter, it's a good idea to fill P-traps and floor drains with RV antifreeze. RV antifreeze will not adversely affect the Sewer Treatment Plant operations. Local hardware and building supply stores should have everything you need to protect your pipes this winter. Shop local to support our locally owned businesses!





Unless you were off being a tourist in Hawaii or visiting Grandma in San Diego for Thanksgiving, you experienced the first blizzard of the season over Thanksgiving weekend, which dumped 4 feet of snow on Diamond Ridge.

Snow, continuing for almost three days and blowing in the wind, created white-out conditions and drifts along the roads. Public Works Operators were out in force, keeping the roads open. They accomplished this feat with experience and stamina as well as trust in their equipment, each other, and the public. Only our most experienced operators have the know-how and dexterity to navigate Homer's narrow, steep, winding backgrounds, which can become ice skating rinks when conditions are really bad. Other operators are on loader and dump trucks, picking snow up from the middle of the paved roads with concrete curbs and carrying it to a snow storage site. We also use independent truck drivers when we need extra help.

Public Works also plows Homer's pedestrian ways. We have a special piece of equipment, called a Tool Cat, which has a smaller blade that tends many of the trails, paths and sidewalks in town. We also keep the Airport Terminal plowed out, for the convenience and safety of travelers.

Why is trust a factor? The Operators need to know their colleagues have what it takes to help when a dump trucks slides off the road. They need to know their equipment won't break down, when it's needed most. And, they need to know they won't run into cars parked in the right of way! So, please make sure the ROW is clear of cars, motorcycles, garbage cans, or anything else the grader could run into.

Season's Greetings from the Homer Animal Shelter

Cold temperatures sure keep us hoppin' at the shelter! But our current four-legged residents are cozy and warm while awaiting their new forever homes.

While we continue to operate by appointment, we still allow people in to socialize with our animals. We ask that you call first, as we limit the number of visitors in the building.

Looking back, 2021 has been another odd year of pandemic proportions. From January of this year through the end of October, we facilitated 82 adoptions; 120 stray dogs and cats; reunited 82 animals with their owners; and took in 36 owner surrendered pets.

We would like to remind our lovely, local pet owners that the holidays are a wonderful, yet sometimes stressful time for pets. We recommend having a safe space for pets to go and hide, or rest, when extra people are in the household, or during outdoor festivities (like fireworks). We expect a lot from our animals, but sometimes they don't adjust to new situations like we'd like them to.

Port & Harbor

North Pacific Update

After some delays, Alaska Scrap finished dismantling the derelict vessel North Pacific last month. They broke apart the vessel and transported scrap steel to a pile on the chip pad, which was then broken down to a size that can be resold. Other refuse went to the transfer station. It was fascinating to watch the ship being dismantled after being broken in two like a toy by a large crane.

RADM Moore is the Commander of the 17th Coast Guard District and is responsible for Coast Guard operations throughout Alaska, the North Pacific, the Arctic Oceans, and the Bering Sea. We had a very productive discussion with RADM Moore in which he shared current Coast Guard goals and objectives for our region, and were able to bring him up to speed on Homer issues including development of the large vessel expansion. We look forward to continuing to work RADM Moore and his staff in the future.

Emergency Trauma Technician

Biennial Training

The harbor is a huge facility that serves commercial, charter, and recreational boat owners, as well as thousands of tourists each year. Inevitably, some of those harbor users will need emergency medical attention. Our Harbor Officers are often the first responders on an emergency scene, and can provide essential first aid as well as a comforting word to the patients. For the EMTs arriving on scene, our officers can be an extra set of hands, and knowledgeable guides to navigate the harbor facility to locate a patient, or even extricate them from a vessel by crane.

To keep our skills fresh, the Port & Harbor staff convene for a week of classes to recertify as Emergency Trauma Technicians every two years. No other harbor in the state makes the commitment to train their officers as a cohesive team. Instructor

Samantha Cunningham, the Assistant EMS Chief at Homer Volunteer Fire Department drilled staff from every port department on essential skills and taught the most up-to-date techniques for CPR, trauma, hypothermia, and even emergency childbirth! We are now prepared for whatever 2022 has to throw at us.


