Governor Dunleavey Visits Port & Harbor

On September 7th, Governor Mike Dunleavy paid a visit to the Homer Port and Harbor to meet with Mayor *Ken Castner*, Port Director & Harbormaster *Bryan Hawkins*, City Clerk *Melissa Jacobsen*, Port & Harbor Commissioner *Crisi Matthews*, and Assistant to the City Manager *Christine Drais*. The group sat down with the Governor to talk about Homer and the Port and Harbor Expansion project, followed by a tour. The Governor shared his thoughts on the expansion as well as ideas to consider for future alternative energy sources to protect the environment like electric and hydrogen power.

The City has long been working with the State and Corps of Engineers to initiate a joint feasibility study of expanding Homer's harbor to match mooring needs of large vessels. The City set aside \$750,000 to cover half of the local share requirement for the study in 2020. The State of Alaska appropriated the other half in the FY23 State of Alaska Capital budget.

In August, the City learned that the appropriations request for Federal matching funds by Senator Lisa Murkowski made it into the Senate's proposed Federal budget. The City is working our Federal partners and hopes to secure the Federal funds to move the study forward in early 2023. 

New Water & Sewer Rates Effective November 15

Customers will receive notice of the recent water and sewer rate changes that will go into effect November 15. You will see the new rates on your December statement. Rates were approved by City Council via <u>Ordinance 22-61</u>.



4th Quarter Sales Tax Revenues

Sales tax numbers are in from the Borough, and they are strong for the 4th quarter of FY22, which is April through June 2022. We had \$76M in taxable sales which generated \$3.7M in local sales taxes (does not include remote sales tax). This is an increase of 9% over 2021 and 32% over 2019. The total expected sales tax revenue for FY22, per Kenai Peninsula Borough and the Alaska Remote Sellers Sales Tax Commission's reporting is estimated at approximately \$12.3M.

from the Homer Animal Shelter

Hello, friends!

The Homer Animal Shelter is finally starting to slow down a teeny, tiny bit after a very, very busy summer – just in time to make room for Autumn kitten season! We've seen so many animal surrenders and abandoned animals in the past few months, but, silver lining, we able to find them all great, new homes! Our longest-ever stay – Lily, the white and black husky-mix – just got adopted in mid-September (see photo) and we are beyond thrilled with her new family. As well, a big black cat named Saka was at the shelter for six weeks and finally found his perfect home. Sometimes, it just takes a little longer for the right people to come along and see the diamond in the rough!





The Homer Animal Shelter, run by Homer Animal Services, LLC, currently staffs two full-time and two-part employees, plus several volunteers who have been with the shelter for years. We have opened up our volunteer program for high school seniors who need service hours toward graduation and have started our Feline Friend Finder (FFF) program once again! The FFF is for kiddos who come in to socialize with shy cats. They are given a worksheet and can fill out as little or as much information as they want about the cats they visit to provide shelter staff with more insight when looking for the cat's new home.

Meanwhile, the Homer Animal Shelter partnered with Kenai Peninsula Animal Lovers Rescue to host several dog and cat spay/neuter clinics over the past couple of months. Dr. Christine Marlowe performs the surgeries in our own medical room with assistance from shelter staff and volunteers. Members of the community have been grateful for this low-cost option, and with the all the unwanted pets on the Southern Kenai Peninsula, to get to the source of the overpopulation issue and help us immensely in the long run.

Of course, we still work closely with our local nonprofit Homer Animal Friends for help with some of the shelter pets spays and neuters. Along with all our rescue and nonprofit friends, the Homer Animal Shelter continues to save, shelter and rehome more than 100 animals a year, as well as help keep pets in homes by providing supplies, food, and vaccines. Our live-release rate remains around 98 percent, which puts us firmly in the "no-kill shelter" category. We invite everyone to come down and see what's new at the shelter!


October 20th is the Great Alaska ShakeOut

What is the ShakeOut? It's a worldwide earthquake drill and a great way for your family or business to practice being prepared to survive and recover quickly from a big earthquake.

When is the ShakeOut? The ShakeOut drill is set for 10:18 am on Thursday, October 20th. At 10:18 am, practice how you will *Drop, Cover, and Hold On* during a large earthquake, which only takes about one minute out of your day.

The main goal of ShakeOut is to help Alaskans be prepared for major earthquakes, so use the ShakeOut as an opportunity to learn and do more to be safe before, during, and after an earthquake.

- 1. Know the signs of an earthquake
- 2. Learn the safe spots in your home to drop, cover and hold on
- 3. Create an evacuation plan for your family and business
- 4. Create an emergency supply kit
- 5. Prepare your home as illustrated below.

Know your Hazard: Earthquake

As we know, earthquakes happen quite often in Alaska. The City's Local Hazard Mitigation Plan covers the scientific nature of earthquakes, location of where they are most likely to occur, history of them in Alaska, their extent or severity, and probability of recurrence. You can dive deeper into the subject by reading the Local Hazard Mitigation Plan.

According to the 2018 State of Alaska Hazard Mitigation Plan, on average, Alaska has one "great" earthquake (magnitude 8 or higher) every 13 years, one magnitude 7-8 every year, and six magnitude 6-7 earthquakes every year. Homer has a 5% probability of severe shaking in the next 50 years. Folks in Homer still talk about the March 27, 1964 Great Alaska Earthquake, which had a magnitude of **9.2**! Locally, the shaker caused the Homer Spit to drop about six feet and flooding during high tides.

Know Your Tsunami Hazard in Homer

If you are a water and sewer customer you have received this helpful brochure that was included with your City of Homer utility bill. The brochure is a great resource to know how to stay safe, where the high risk areas are located, and has a map that shows the evacuation line designated by the City of Homer along with the designated assembly area and tsunami shelter.

Brochures are available at City Hall and will be distributed locally as part of the TsunamiReady program with the University of Alaska Fairbanks and the Alaska Earthquake Center.

Short Term Rentals

During the Council Visioning 2022, local housing was identified as a priority to explore the relationship of Short Term Rentals to Homer's housing environment. Emergency Culvert Repair: Spencer Drive & Paradise Place

Earlier in September, the road crew was conducting routine maintenance and noticed a collapsed culvert on Paradise Place. We immediately searched for replacement materials, which was not easy because the existing culvert is larger than what we normally have in our inventory or what can be sourced locally.

We were able to cobble together pipe from multiple sources, so that when the culvert was ultimately washed out from the heavy rains, we had the replacement materials on hand. Public Works did not have sufficient staff capacity to do the job in-house. East Road Services was able to provide support by delaying some of their contracted KPB road grading work to help us dig out the failed culvert and put the road back into service.
