Local Farmer's Efforts Get Emus Legalized in Alaska



Port & Harbor staff member *Pike Ainsworth* has been on a mission since 2019 to get emus added to the Clean List - a register of livestock allowed in the state without a permit. Emu is considered poultry and is harvested for meat, leather and oil. Until this summer, they were illegal in Alaska.

In March of this year, Pike made his case to the Board of Game to testify about the condition of food security in Alaska and get emu added to the Clean List. "Food security is an extremely serious issue, especially now during wartime and Covid-19, stores have been consistently out of food, the price of meat has skyrocketed, making red meat unattainable to most Alaskans," he said.

Emu meat is more nutritious than beef, they can be "hatched from an egg and be ready to market in six months," he said. They birds have a low-impact on the land compared to other livestock. Plus, they make great pets.

After an investigation by the Alaska Department of Fish and Game and the state veterinarian, the proposal passed unanimously, and went into effect July 1.

1st Quarter Sales Tax Revenues

The Kenai Peninsula posted the taxable sales numbers for the first quarter of FY23 (third quarter of calendar year 2022), and we've set another record for the City of Homer. Taxable sales are reported at \$99,553,824, a \$6M increase over last year. The City expects to receive approximately \$4.8M in revenue which will be shared between the General Fund, HART, HAWSP, and the Police Station.

LOCAL HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN



Homer has several areas inherently prone to flooding including low-lying areas surrounding Beluga Lake, along the entire shoreline coast, and the Homer Spit as identified on FEMA's Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs).

Excessive snowmelt or rainfall have a large impact on lands and homes and also areas such as streams, rivers, canyons or coastal areas.

Spring and summer are the most likely seasons to see floods with heavy snowmelt and rainfall runoff though the fall and winter are also likely due to rainfall and freeze/thaw cycles. Based on history of flood events in Homer, severe flooding is most likely to occur every 2 to 7 years.

Major flood events occurred in 2002, 2007, and 2013, which resulted in bridges being washed out on the Kenai Peninsula that isolated Homer for several weeks while repairs were made. Two of those events were declared disasters and resulted in disruptions to the economy because of limited road access to transport goods and materials here except by barge or airplane.

You can follow this link to learn more about <u>Coastal Flood Maps, Permits and Flood</u> <u>Protection Information</u> and tap into the Hazard Maps for your area. However, the flood maps do not include risk from tsunami or sea level rise.

What can you do to prepare?

- Make a plan to have extra food and provisions on hand should roads go out.
- Go to higher ground.
- Divert the flow of water on your property away from your home to storm drains.
- **<u>Flood Proof Your Building</u>**: Helpful FEMA documents with suggestions on how to protect your buildings from flooding.

Sulfur Export Project

The Port of Homer facilitated a bulk sulfur export project on Friday, November 18 that took several days to complete. North Star Stevedoring and Kar-a-Van Transport loaded approximately 20,000 tons (10,400 bags) of crushed bulk sulfur via truck, forklift and ship's cranes to the ship, M/V TBC Praise, moored at the Deep Water Dock. The sulfur was kept at the cargo storage terminal (Chip Pad) on Freight Dock Road until it was time to load for transport. Under current market conditions, this load represents about \$4 million worth of materials bound for Mexico for use in fertilizer products.

The stevedoring effort included 54 longshoremen, split into two crews, running 12-hour shifts, 24/7 until loading is complete. However, before work commenced, crews gathered for an in-depth safety meeting and to go over the logistics of the operation. As you can imagine, there are a host of security plans, facility regulations, and inspections to ensure everything is done safely and effectively. Deputy Harbormaster Matt Clarke met with US Coast Guard officials that morning to process the required 'declaration of security' and assure the vessel's safety systems were in compliance.

Sulfur is a byproduct of the oil refining process. This sulfur comes from the Marathon-Kenai Refinery located in Nikiski where it is crushed and bagged, and trucked to Homer to be safely stored until a ship is hired to receive the product for transportation. Homer's deep water port offers the most cost effective way for Marathon to get their product to market. Sulfur is a globally traded commodity and an integral component of fertilizers and the phosphates industry.

The last time a load out this size was December 2019-January 2020, which occurs approximately every 5-10 years in Homer. The Homer Port & Harbor is happy to provide services for this project in the form of wharfage, dockage and storage costs.

- Designate a sober driver or arrange a cab ahead of time if you plan to drink at holiday gatherings.


HOME FOR THE HOLIDAYS

PROTECT YOU PROPERTY FROM GETTING

How do I do that? Keep roads and Right-of-Ways clear, so snow plows and sanding trucks can do their job and keep roads safe for everyone. If not, unfortunately, you could be fined.

- Blocking the Right-of-Way and Roads is prohibited. Keep everything out of the Right-of-Way and off roads.
 - Do not push snow into roadways or into the Right-of-Way.

What is the Right of Way? It's the roads, sidewalks and also the space between the road and your property that is used for utilities, channeling of storm water via ditches, area for the City to store plowed snow and accessing roads for maintenance.

Other helpful tips:

- Check the City website for road closures and winter advisories
- Be prepared! Carry a kit in your car in case you get stranded

Ready for Action!

Roads crews are happy to have two new sanding trucks, above, at their disposal this winter. Mechanics got the trucks all set up with plowing and sanding equipment to and are ready to go to maintain our roadways safely and reliably.

Public Works in Winter Prep Mode!

Mechanics, operators and building maintenance crews have been busy getting tires changed over, chains on the heavy equipment, plows and sanders mounted back on trucks, ice melt ready, etc. Superintendent Mike Zelinski says, "We all can do our part to aid in being ready for snow and icy conditions. Our focus right now is to encourage folks to keep the right of ways clear and remove anything in the roadway that would hinder access to clearing snow and sanding."

Snow Removal Dashboard

GIS Technician Aaron Yeaton created Snow and Sanding Map "dashboard" that is available on the City's website and is updated during winter operations, so people can see where crews are working. The dashboard is an ESRI GIS product that can provide near-real-time updates on city road conditions and snow removal status in a mapping environment. Supplemental information, such as travel warnings and road crew operations can also be posted. The dashboard will be available on the City's website on an as needed basis, i.e. during major snow events.

Transportation Plan Update

Economic Development Manager Julie Engebretsen and contractor Brad Parsons with the Independent Living Center have been busy over the past few weeks, presenting to Homer High School students, attending a luncheon at the Senior Center, conducting interviews with individuals with disabilities, and talking with taxi companies. Outreach will continue for another few weeks to include conversations with other focus groups. Thank you to Council Member Shelly Erickson for helping staff connect with truck and bus drivers.




Public Works Director Jan Keiser presents Transportation Plan to KPC group.

City staff and consultant Kinney Engineering held a public meeting at Kenai Peninsula College on November 9th. About 25 members of the public turned out to learn about preliminary survey results and comment on draft goals for the transportation plan update.

The transportation survey helps us to prioritize and address pedestrian related needs that are important to people in Homer who take advantage of alternate modes of transportation during different seasons. To date, 253 survey responses and 450 map comments have been received. Common themes have emerged, see below. Both surveys ended the Wednesday before Thanksgiving. Over the holidays, general comments can be submitted via the project website, and broader outreach will occur in the first quarter of 2023. The chart below shows the top priorities that were revealed from the survey. Thank you to everyone who participated.


