Economic Development Manager Engebretsen spoke to her written report, highlighting the notable events and work that took place through December. She verified with the commission that they would

like to add the Kenai Peninsula Economic Development District (KPEDD) Industry Outlook Forum to the EDC's calendar for every January as a reminder for participation and to have it as an agenda item.

There was brief discussion on the new Food System Resilience tool that Commissioner Arevalo provided information on.

Chair Marks noted the HMTA meeting information that was provided in the packet.

9. PENDING BUSINESS

9.A. Housing Report Agenda Item Report - EDC 23-002

Chair Marks introduced the agenda item by reading the title.

Economic Development Manager Engebretsen explained how the City was intending to host a housing forum partially as a way to give people the opportunity to speak their concerns, and partially to help staff with Comprehensive Plan work. Staff recently learned that there are other organizations in the community who would like to do the same thing. So rather than duplicate that effort the City would like to collaborate with those groups, such as MAPPS and South Peninsula Hospital Foundation, and what some of that joint effort may look like. Any forums or public events scheduled will likely be in March.

Chair Marks noted there will be an initial stakeholders meeting on January 30th; she and Ms. Engebretsen will be participating and she encouraged other commissioners to attend if interested.

There was discussion on the upcoming housing stakeholder's meeting and who is involved, when it's taking place, and what information will be discussed at that meeting.

10. NEW BUSINESS

10.A. Discussion of KPEDD Industry Outlook Forum & EDC Strategic Plan Agenda Item Report - EDC 23-001

Chair Marks introduced the agenda item by reading the title. She noted the agenda from the Kenai Peninsula Economic Development District (KPEDD) Industry Outlook Forum is in the packet and deferred to Economic Development Manager Engebretsen.

Ms. Engebretsen highlighted a few of the forum presentations she had good takeaways from, including:

- Demographic statistics from the Alaska Travel Industry Association on who is visiting the State of Alaska and Kenai Peninsula, and what those stats may be saying about Homer.
- Upcoming resource opportunity on how to start and operate an in-home daycare.
- Infrared drying technology, initially started for fish products but is now being used by peony industries.

Chair Marks shared her takeaways from the forum and how she applied them to the EDC's strategic plan, most notably:

- Efforts by a local State employee to get better understanding of what it takes to license and work with the State.
- Local resources that provide workforce development; lots of work being done by the transit task force; that workforce development is getting that child care and transportation to get people to/from home and work. Potentially having person from Nine Star present to EDC at a future meeting. Ms. Engebretsen suggested the presentation be at the Council level.
- "Long Trail" project; using existing trails and creating signage and connection points that creates one long trail from Fairbanks to Seward, maybe to Homer as well.

There was discussion on the various forum sessions, the comments made by Chair Marks and Ms. Engebretsen, and how the EDC can address some of these topics at future meetings and through their strategic plan. In response to Chair Mark's comments regarding job presentations at the high school, commissioners and Student Representative Pearson further discussed the Focus On Learning (FOL) classes for high school students where they learn about specific topics or careers. Some commissioners voiced an interest in giving future presentations.

Chair Marks noted the informational items in the packet.

Deputy City Clerk Tussey facilitated discussion on the EDC calendar to determine who would be reporting at upcoming Council meetings. She noted she will work with Economic Development Manager Engebretsen on updating the Annual Topic/Events column, and they can fill in the remaining Council Report openings at the next meeting when more commissioners are in attendance.

13. COMMENTS OF THE CITY STAFF

Deputy City Clerk Tussey shared information on the Special Mayoral Election that will be taking place February 14, 2023. Ms. Engebretsen clarified that would mean the EDC's February 14th meeting will be held in the upstairs Conference Room.

Economic Development Manager Engebretsen commented it was a great meeting and thanked the commission for brainstorming on some of the ways she can help connect people and businesses in the community.

14. COMMENTS OF THE COMMISSION

Commissioner Perez announced he now has a happy healthy little girl.

Student Representative Pearson commented on the "long trail" project and how she thinks a lot of people she knows would be really interested in that idea. Chair Marks noted the Homer Trail Alliance would very much appreciate having additional input, particularly from younger people. Ms. Pearson suggested it be one of the Focus On Learning topics.

Commissioner Arevalo commented on how technology allowed her to join the meeting while driving to the meeting, and on the Homer Grown show on KBBI. The show interviews local business people in the agriculture realm or local scientists and other professionals who assist those on the Southern Kenai Peninsula regarding their food system businesses. Episodes can be found on the KBBI website or any podcast platform.

Commissioner Gamble spoke to Commissioner Arevalo's comments in relation to food security and how we are not producing enough food in our area. He agreed with Student Representative Pearson's point that they cannot go after seniors for work/job recruiting because they already have plans for postgraduation; they should be directing job training efforts towards freshman and sophomores. He commented on the "long trail" project and how it was an extremely large undertaking, is glad to hear there's a lot of local resources and activity, but it's important to advocate for it on a State level. In response to Commissioner Gamble's inquiry on where they were at with meeting with the Chamber, Ms. Engebretsen confirmed with the commission around when they would like to hold a worksession. Commissioner Gamble congratulated Commissioner Perez on the birth of his daughter.

Chair Marks remarked on Commissioner Arevalo's comments on technology, setting a worksession with the Chamber possibly in April or earlier, and on the Outlook Industry Forum topic of broadband. Commissioner Arevalo had spoken to it earlier and things are seriously moving forward on it at the Federal level.

Summary Statement:

- <u>March meeting</u>: Head Count! Please let staff know if you will be gone for the March 14th meeting (spring break if you have kids in school).
- <u>HERC work session</u>: On March 20th, staff will have a worksession with Council on the HERC buildings/Pioneer Ave Gateway project. The time is not yet set, but late afternoon/early evening is the idea.
- <u>Port Expansion project</u>: You may be hearing about the proposed expansion of the Homer Harbor. The next step is a three year process with the Army Corps of Engineers, called the General Investigation (GI). This process has not started but should in the coming weeks/months. It includes quite a bit of public process, and a full NEPA review. Check out the project web page on the Port and Harbor website. You can also sign up for project updates via email. If you are interested, watch the Port and Harbor Commission agendas. (When things officially get started, you can expect a lot more outreach. I am not heavily involved in this project, and I don't expect that to change much. Longer term, like fall, think about how/if the EDC wants to participate.

Old Town Work

City staff including Public Works Director Jan Keiser, Economic Development Manager Julie Engebretsen, and Associate Planner Bella Vaz, partnered with Bunnell Street Arts Center to host a neighborhood meeting to discuss road improvements in Old Town on Tuesday, February 7. In July 2022, City staff and their consultant, Nelson Engineering, asked the neighborhood's community members for ideas on what road improvements they would like to see in the Old Town area. At the February 7 meeting, Nelson Engineering presented design options that were drafted in response to that conversation. Design options included landscaping, parking, and sidewalks along Ohlson Lane and Bunnell Avenue. Residents and business owners had the opportunity to voice their concerns and provide feedback, and staff was able to gather valuable community input on the proposed project as a result of the meeting.

The meeting was attended by neighborhood residents and business owners who had suggestions on the proposed designs for the two streets. There was overall support of the construction of the sidewalk and parallel parking along Ohlson Lane from the group, so discussion was focused on the design of West Bunnell Avenue. Specifically, on how parking stalls could be aligned in the two blocks of West Bunnell Avenue and where crosswalks could be located. Representatives from Kinney Engineering, who are the City's consultants for the Transportation Plan, also attended the meeting. Kinney Engineering provided an overview and feedback on traffic calming and parking to meeting attendees. A component of this work in Old Town will be reflected in the Transportation Plan.

From some of the attendees, there was support for making the area more pedestrian-friendly and less vehicle-centric. Staff provided the opportunity of utilizing the upcoming comprehensive plan update and zoning code rewrite processes for community members to contribute walkability ideas to the overall vision of the community. More information from Public Works is to come on this project, as it is competing for resources with other needed infrastructure improvement projects in the city. Public Works Director Jan Keiser will be available to provide a presentation and answer questions in an upcoming work session to the Planning Commission.





Homer Marine Trades Association Regular Business Meeting January 4, 2023 Bay Welding Services

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order at 6:15 p.m. by Vice President, Eric Engebretsen.

Officers/Directors Present: Eric Engebretsen, Cinda Martin, Josh Hankin-Foley, Kate Mitchell, Mark Zeiset and Bruce Friend. Aaron Fleenor, Claire Neaton, Adam Smude and Jen Hakala were absent/excused.

Guests: Amy Woodruff, Jesus Trejo and Harbormaster, Bryan Hawkins

Guest Presentations:

- Amy Woodruff applicant for our Communications Director; she currently holds an administrative supervisor position at The Port & Harbor primarily in the billing area which expertise, knowledge and existing work schedule will compliment HMTA and be mutually beneficial. Her resume has been provided to board members.
- Jesus Trejo previous marine trade coordinator at KPC, has been able to establish a relationship with the Training Resources Limited Maritime Institute and can now proctor USCG approved online courses and testing. He is looking for an office to use periodically to proctor exams. He also assists the students with submitting certification documentation. He asked that we include information on our site/social media about the option for the online courses with local testing. Bryan offered the conference and meeting rooms at the Port & Harbor as an option.
- Bryan Hawkins reported that they are working with the Army Corps of Engineers to get started on the study since receiving budget approval. The City has hired HDR as the contractor to work with the Corps. They are also working on the City's priority legislative list and will be visiting Juneau soon. He is serving on the board for Alaska Marine Exchange which covers vessel tracking; they are currently looking for some funding to tackle improvements for communications with Voice over IP to improve marine safety. He would like HMTA to write a letter of support if possible.

- Website/Social Media Josh reported that he and Claire were working on updating the membership list; Claire indicated that the list was just about complete, Josh will connect with Claire to finish up
- Workforce Development -
 - FOLs Mark reported that he did his in November; all of the December FOL's were postponed to January however there has been no follow up with Walter. Eric will see if he can contact Walter.
 - KPC courses Kate reported that there is no replacement for Jesus but that Reid and Jill are working on coordinating courses. Eric reported that the collaboration between Bay Welding and the KPC Welding course is moving forward and all paperwork has been completed and a class schedule has been advertised. Cinda will invite Jill to attend our next meeting to give an update on the new courses.
 - Career Fair at KPC 3/3/23 Cinda reported that she will be putting a Marine Trades panel together to present at the Career Fair; will need a few member businesses to participate and some panel discussion topics. HMTA will have a table and Cinda will email members for any information they would like presented. HMTA will be advertising the Fair through the website and social media and will cover any cost which should be minimal.

- Anchorage Boat Show Feb 17, 18, 19, 2023 at Dena'ina Center Eric reported that Bay Weld will be taking two full size boats as well as the Chamber raffle boat. The Chamber will be paying for their space/table within our block. Looking for vendors to participate in our block. Published price is \$8/sf for a 10x10 booth. Eric will be negotiating the cost of the space, just needs to lock down the size of the space. Bruce and Eric will be negotiating/organizing the block. Historically we take a 50' x 60' space with 20' x 60' available for vendor displays but may need more space this year with the inclusion of the Chamber. We will need to have an email vote since we have no firm numbers at this point. Eric/Bruce will negotiate the contract and email the board with a plan and Bruce will work on filling spots. It is anticipated that they will want their booth space fee upfront.
- PME 2022 Recap Kate reported that the show was successful however the booth was the same 10' x 30' as in the past but we did not have the traditional HMTA representation. The booth primarily consisted of the Port & Harbor and NOMAR which made for very long days for those

two participants. Member businesses should be encouraged to take advantage of this opportunity; start prospecting early.

Summary Statement:

Each year, the EDC and the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission (PHC) review the City's Land Allocation Plan (LAP). The purpose of the review is to make a recommendation to Council on which City lands should be available for lease. Most years these lands are on the Spit, and PHC provides the majority of the comments. Staff also uses this process to bring up problems with City lands. For this meeting please review Section A of the LAP, Lands Available for Lease.

<u>Staff Discussion:</u> You'll notice the over slope areas around the harbor on page A-3. These are locations someone would build a boardwalk out over the edge of the harbor, and there are four locations available for lease. *Staff recommends* removing areas 2,3 & 4 from lease. Area 1 has a prospective tenant that has been working through the process, so I would not want to change the status of that area at this time. But for the others, there has been no interest. These locations are very complex to develop, and the City needs a plan for parking, etc. We've learned a lot through the process on Area 1. I don't think the City is really ready to lease these over slope areas, and our time is better spent on other work. Commission thoughts?

On Page A-4, those two lands should be reserved for fisheries uses or short term lease.







Vision Statements: What Do We Want to Become?

It is especially important for managers and executives in any firm to agree on the basic vision the organization strives to achieve in the long term. A **vision statement** should answer the basic question, "What do we want to become?" A clear vision provides the foundation for developing a comprehensive mission statement. Many organizations have both a vision and mission statement, but the vision statement should be established first. Examples of vision statements are provided in Table 2-1. The vision statement should be short, preferably one sentence, and as many managers as possible should have input into developing the statement. Recall Proverbs 29:18 that says "Where there is no vision, the people perish."

TABLE 2-1 Six Exemplary Vision Statements (paraphrased)

- Dr Pepper Snapple: to be the best beverage business globally; our brands are synonymous with refreshment, fun, and flavor today and tomorrow.
- IBM: to be the world's most successful information technology company focused on helping customers apply technology to solve their problems now and in the future.
- Hilton Worldwide: to fill the Earth with the light and warmth of hospitality by delivering exceptional experiences—every hotel and guest for all time.
- Starbucks: to be the premier purveyor of the finest coffee in the world while maintaining uncompromising principles as we steadily grow.
- Kellogg: to enrich and delight the world through foods and brands that matter today and tomorrow.
- Harley-Davidson: to fulfill dreams through the experiences of motorcycling for all time.

Characteristics of a Vision Statement:

- 1. Clear: Reveals type of industry and what firm strives to become
- 2. Futuristic: Reveals what the firm strives to become or accomplish within time frame
- 3. Concise: One sentence
- 4. Unique: Reveals firm's competitive advantage
- 5. Inspiring: Motivates the reader's to support firm

This letter serves as our quarterly report for the period October 1 to December 31, 2022. The Homer Business Advisor, Robert Green, had a strong finish to the calendar year, even with his first vacation since joining the Alaska Small Business Development Center in 2020. Not only did Robert's advising result in the creation of 16 new businesses, he also achieved the second highest amount of non-COVID relief capital infusion for the Homer area in a calendar year, with \$2.5 million in loans and investments. Robert provided assistance to 115 business owners and entrepreneurs, which supported 342 jobs in the Homer area. SBDC assistance in the Homer area has been very well received, with Robert providing 392.7 more advising hours in 2022 than what was provided in 2019, the last year Homer did not have an SBDC advisor. Here is a summary of deliverables to the Homer community during the quarter (year):

Client Hours: 71.6 (556.8) Total Clients: 34 (115) New Businesses Started or Bought: 3 (16) Jobs Supported: 70 (342) Capital Infusion: \$2,040,000 (\$3,172,650) Client Surveys: 100% positive (92% positive)

The contract rate for a business advisor is \$55 per hour, which includes salary, benefits, fixed, and administrative expenses. In addition to local expertise, the Alaska SBDC provides IBISWorld industry reports, retailing for \$925 each, and ProfitCents financial analyses, valued at \$2,750 each, to clients free of charge. Here is a summary of value provided to the Homer community during the quarter (year):

Business Advisor: \$10,340 (\$51,755) IBISWorld Industry Reports: \$3,700 (\$36,075) ProfitCents Financial Analyses: \$2,750 (\$33,000) Total: \$16,790 (\$120,830)



Library Advisory Board Upholds Decision

On January 17, the Homer Library Advisory Board (LAB) unanimously voted to uphold a decision to keep 55 books in the children's section of the public library. The decision follows a month-long debate over the future children and young adult titles that largely feature LGBTQ themes.

In October, Library Director Dave Berry denied a request for books to be removed from the children's and young adult sections of the library. An appeal was made to the board in November. The list of books being contested were read by the seven member advisory board, which led to their ultimate decision to keep the books in place. Further exploration of how to handle contested titles will be reviewed at the LAB's next meeting on February 21st.

Emergency Crews Respond to Boat Fire

Homer Police Department and Homer Volunteer Fire Department alongside fire services from across the Kenai Peninsula service area responded to a call in the Northern Enterprises Boatyard Thursday, January 19. They arrived to find the R/V *Qualifier 105* fully engulfed, which spread a cloud of black smoke over the area. Flames were extinguished, but the research vessel sustained extensive damage. The cause of the fire is yet to be determined. The *Qualifier*, operated by Support Vessels of Alaska, is a research vessel that typically creates hydrographic surveys, charts for NOAA and contract work for other government agencies.

Fire Department



Winter Training Exercises

January was extra exciting at the Fire Station with training exercises, 'double-tone' calls and recruitment. Traditionally the winter months are when we sink our teeth into training exercises. Deputy Chief Kahles had staff going every which way, training to search for and then rescue a victim. What you can't tell is that the Firefighters have "blackout" shields in their helmets, so they follow the hose back out with their (very heavy) victim while 'blindfolded'. This technique trains firefighters how to rely on their hose, each other, and their skills when conditions are too smoky for any visibility during rescue.

Keeping Up With Call Volume

The HVFD has seen run volume grow through the roof, with an average of 2.75 calls daily. The number of "double tones," (i.e., two calls overlapping each other) have risen too, keeping everyone on their toes. The call at Homer Boatyard on January 19 saw a turnout of 14 providers from Homer with Mutual Aid response from KESA and WESA. We were grateful for the assistance to cover the 100 foot boat. In a critical event like that, it's always good to have plenty of help on scene in addition to the staff needed to ensure 911 is still on duty for other calls.

Recruitment News

Newly graduated EMS students are responding to calls along with last spring's more seasoned EMTs. We now have 13 more providers to take care of our community.

Deputy Chief Kahles will be adding to our numbers with the **Firefighter 1 class starting up February 13th**. Already, we have a great crew ready to get started, including both brandnew providers, students from Homer High School, and inhouse active volunteers looking to up their game. There's always room for more though!

Spring Firefighter I Class starts soon and there's still time to sign up! The course runs from February 13 through April 29. and meets conveniently on Monday and Wednesday evenings, and Saturdays. Completion of the course is required to obtain FF1/EMT1 certification. **Train local - Serve local!**



Flood Map and Protection Information

The City of Homer regulates development on coastline properties to mitigate risk and comply with FEMA's National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). The City's Planning Department has the following information available to help explain the NFIP.

- Determine whether a property is in or out of the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) as shown on the current Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM). The current maps became effective on October 20, 2016.
- Provide additional flood insurance information for any address, such as the community number, FIRM zone, panel number and suffix, date of the current FIRM, and the base flood elevation.
- Obtain handouts explaining the mandatory flood insurance purchase requirement for property owners who need a federally backed mortgage or loan.
- More information on existing elevation certificates for new and substantially improved structures that have been built in a SFHA since 1999.
- Review mapping data for area wetlands, coastal erosion, and tsunami inundation zones. City Planning can provide lotspecific maps and information regarding development in these sensitive areas including best management practices and regulation requirements.
- Obtain information about areas that provide natural floodplain functions such as Beluga Slough, Louie's Lagoon, and the Homer Airport Critical Habitat Area.

LOCAL HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN





Alaska is no stranger to extreme weather including thunderstorms, lightning, hail, heavy and drifting snow, freezing rain/ice storms, extreme cold and high winds. No wonder folks fly south for the winter!

Winter storm events involve precipitation like snow, sleet or freezing rain and can be accompanied by high winds, cold temperatures, and a storm surge. Storms in our area can range from a moderate snow over a few hours to blizzard conditions with blinding winddriven snow that can last several days. Homer has a more temperate climate, so storms are often experienced during other seasons throughout the year too.

What does this mean to me? The entire Homer area is vulnerable to the effects of severe weather. Strong winds can cause widespread power outages, downed trees and structural damage. Accompany these winds with freezing temperatures, it is a good idea to have an emergency power source and provisions on hand should roads become unpassable.

Notable severe weather from 2000 to 2021 include:

- In December 2019, a southerly jet stream brought several low-pressure systems to Southcentral Alaska. These were accompanied by above freezing temperatures, abundant rainfall, and high winds as the fronts passed through. A primary impact of this event was the flooding of the Anchor Point River. In addition, North Fork Road was impassable, and the Sterling Highway was flooded in several locations between mile 161 and 163, there was flooding across East End Road at Bear Creek Drive, and a mudslide on East End Road at Kachemak Bay Drive.
- In January 2020, a low-pressure system developed south of the Aleutian Islands and then moved north along the Alaska Peninsula and up Cook Inlet. A strong high-pressure system that followed brought a large amount of cold air, which created high winds through the Cook Inlet area. Homer reported 8 hours of blizzard conditions and nearwhiteout conditions.

Homer Harbor Crew and Team Salvage Submersed Sailboat

Shout out to the Port and Harbor for their efforts to salvage a vessel that need to be rescued and hauled out of the water quickly to prevent further damage. On December 27-28, Deputy Harbormaster Matt Clarke led the charge to engage the harbor tug and hydraulic winch to salvage the 28-foot sailboat. With the owner's permission, Clarke called on services from C & C Aquatics, a local dive salvage operator, to help efforts to save the immersed vessel.


The Port and Harbor is staffed 24 hours a day to keep an eye over the facility and to respond to issues as quickly as possible. To keep the 'ship' running smoothly, the Homer Harbormaster has 19 full-time employees to cover administration, operations, maintenance and crew for the fish dock/ice plant. During peak summer months, more staff is employed for additional support.

Port Expansion Charrette

The City, working together with Corvus Design, hosted a port expansion charrette on January 16th. The event was held because the existing conceptual design is getting old and with the Army Corps' General Investigation on the horizon, it was a good time to conduct public engagement related to the design of the port expansion. While the original intention was to keep the work session relatively small, nearly 40 participants participated, which included a large number of individuals who make a living on the water, or supporting those who do. Corvus will be reviewing the information collected during the charrette and creating two design concepts that will be used to continue engaging the federal delegation, the State legislature, and the public.

Four groups of commercial and industrial users with vested interest in the project broke into groups to share their knowledge.

The purpose of the charrette was to gather information to develop a revised conceptual master plan for the proposed Large Vessel Harbor to better reflect current and projected future needs. The plan will be used to communicate the project to continue to develop support and to seek funding.

The large vessel harbor will be solely for commercial and industrial uses, with the significant benefit of removing these uses from the existing small boat harbor.


The Kenai Peninsula Borough Office of Emergency Management (OEM) has a new website that provides information, real-time maps and preparedness tips by hazards.

Hornaday Park: Campground Closure and **Playground Improvements**

Like last year, under the authority of Homer City Code 19.08.030(d), all City-operated campgrounds were closed for winter 2023. Winter camping has been problematic in years past and requires too much staff time to manage successfully. This year, the Karen Hornaday Campground will not re-open, so we can take time to determine needs for improvements.



Hornaday Campground is the least popular of our facilities with a most number of complaints. Since 2020, 101 calls for service have been recorded by HPD at the park for various disturbances, including vandalism, harassment, assault and drug activities with multiple arrests over the last three years. Suspending Hornaday Campground for 2023 will give City staff the opportunity to break the cycle of abuse the campground has been experiencing and work with PARCAC on a master plan for the best use of the space - Improved camping program? Fitness trail with park exercise equipment? Some other yet to be determined use?

Last year, the Homer Foundation reached out to discuss ideas for the potential use of approximately \$20,000 in remaining funds from the Homer Playground Project and the Boat House Pavilion. The City proposed directing the funds to repair and replace certain pieces of equipment at Hornaday Park playground to include swings, diggers, slides, tire swings, and more including ADA equipment considerations.


