SUBJECT: SIGNS NOT LEGIBLE FROM THE RIGHT-OF-WAY

After concern of the legality of signs that are not legible from the right-of-way due to distance or size, an amendment was proposed to make signs exempt from the sign code.

Staff report 22-66 replies to the concern presented. The Commission found it acceptable to exclude these signs from the sign code and made a motion to change the wording of the title to reference 'legible' as opposed to 'visible' to avoid confusion as to the intent of the ordinance.

The Commission held a public hearing on September 21st. With six Commissioners present, the Commission voted in unanimously support of the ordinance and recommends that the Homer City Council adopt the draft ordinance with the amended title.

Summary Statement:

Introduction

After having a conversation about about replacing a sign that was located nearly 400ft for a right-of-way, an ordinance has been proposed by Councilmember Lord to exclude signs that are not legible from the right-of-way from the sign ordinance.

Policy Implications:

Analysis

This subject has brought up two different answers to the question of replacing a legacy sign that is not legible from a right-of-way. A strict compliance with the sign code might make a sign unacceptable, such as the case where the sign constitutes a second free-standing sign that is prohibited by code. A pragmatic answer might be that a sign not visible/legible from the right-of-way would not be regulated, as it does not convey information to the general public, only those on-site.

As this subject is not spelled out in code, except for reference to signs located inside a building, this amendment was proposed to further clarify the issue. The language, as proposed, would continue to apply to a sign located inside a building, except the standard would move from "not legible from three feet beyond the lot line" to "not legible from the public right-of-way."

It is reasonable to consider the ability of a sign to convey a message to the general public. My research from the American Planning Association, found in the November 2019 issue of Zoning Practice,

Background

Thank you for your consideration of Ordinance 22-70. This action was inspired by the sign in front of Paul Banks Elementary, which is almost 400 feet downhill from the public right-of-way (ROW), and impossible to see from the road. It is falling apart and the school staff and Parent Teacher Association would like to replace it. My understanding is that last year they were told by the City that they've already maxed out their sign allotment and so if they took that one down they would not be permitted to replace it. That made no sense to me at all.

I asked City Planner Abboud about this situation and he said that as a matter of practicality, if it's not visible from the right-of-way to the public, it would not be considered a sign subject to regulation under the code. But he noted that he hadn't looked at that specific sign. I went to look at the code to see where that exemption might be explicitly stated, and I found the verbiage about the interior signs only. Nothing about signs not visible from the public ROW.

In this amendment, I am suggesting that we fully replace subsection HCC 21.60.100(c) to limit the City's regulation to signs clearly visible from the public ROW and intended to be viewed by the public. Below I have provided some examples from other Alaskan municipalities sign codes.

While I believe this is a fairly straightforward and simple amendment to code, I look forward to feedback from the Planning Commission. I would like to see the City limit resources to regulating what is in the interest of the public. Signs that cannot be seen by the public from the public right-of-way should be clearly exempt from regulation under Homer City Code.

Wasilla: 16.32.020 Scope.

This chapter shall not regulate: building design; official traffic or government signs; the copy and message of signs; **signs not intended to be viewed from a public right-of-way**; window displays, product dispensers, and point of purchase displays; scoreboards on athletic fields; flags of any nation, government, or noncommercial organization, unless part of a sign; gravestones; barber poles; religious symbols; commemorative plaques; the display of street numbers; or any display or construction not defined in this chapter as a sign. (Ord. 17-09 § 3, 2017; prior code § 16.43.902)

Seward: 15.20.015 - Definitions.

Sign. Any device fixed to, painted on, or incorporated into the building surface; displayed from or within a building or structure; or free-standing upon the site, and **which is (a) visible from a public right-of-way and** (b) designed to convey or direct a message to the public concerning the identification of the premises or to advertise or promote the interests of any private or public firm, person or organization.

Planning Staff review per 21.95.040

21.95.040 Planning Department review of code amendment

The Planning Department shall evaluate each amendment to this title that is initiated in accordance with HCC 21.95.010 and qualified under HCC 21.95.030, and may recommend approval of the amendment only if it finds that the amendment:

a. Is consistent with the comprehensive plan and will further specific goals and objectives of the plan.

<u>Analysis:</u> The proposed amendment aligns with Goal 3, Objective A, create a clear, coordinated regulatory framework that guides development, specifically, the implementation strategy to "review rules and regulation options with consideration of operational constraints and community acceptance.

Finding 1: The proposed amendment is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan.

b. Will be reasonable to implement and enforce.

<u>Analysis:</u> The proposed ordinance expands upon an existing premise that applies well to working code.

<u>Finding 2:</u> The proposed ordinance will be reasonable to implement and enforce.

c. Will promote the present and future public health, safety and welfare.

<u>Analysis:</u> The proposed ordinance allows for messaging and markers that address those found on a site located well away and not viewable from a public right-of-way.

Finding 3: The proposed ordinance will promote the present and future public health, safety, and welfare.

d. Is consistent with the intent and wording of the other provisions of this title.

<u>Analysis:</u> The ordinance has been reviewed for consistency for its use in title 21 and has not been found to be in conflict with other regulations.

Finding 4: The proposed ordinance is consistent with the intent and wording of other provision in Title 21.

STAFF COMMENTS/RECOMMENDATIONS:

Planning staff has reviewed the ordinance per HCC 21.95.040 and recommends the Planning Commission conduct a public hearing, and recommend approval to the City Council.

SUBJECT: Planning Staff review of draft ordinance exempting signs not legible

from the right-of-way.

Due to a problem scheduling a public hearing for the item with the Planning Commission, I am unable to present a recommendation to the City Council until their first meeting in January.

At the October 24th meeting of the City Council, I suggested that I would be able to get Planning Commission input on the item and have it back for a second reading at the November 28th meeting of the Council. The Planning Commissions next meeting was scheduled for November 2nd. HCC 21.95.060(a) requires that the Planning Commission review all amendments to Title 21 and HCC 21.95.060(c) requires that they hold a public hearing. Unfortunately the deadline for submittal had already passed as item would have had to been to have been submitted to the newspaper the prior Thursday/Friday to meet noticing requirements.

This item is on the next scheduled Planning Commission meeting held on December 7th, the next opportunity for the Council get the recommendation is January 9th.

SUBJECT: Ordinance 22-70 Amending Homer City Code 21.60.100 Regarding Signs Legible from

Public Rights of Ways

Background

Thank you for your consideration of Ordinance 22-70. This action was inspired by the sign in front of Paul Banks Elementary, which is almost 400 feet downhill from the public right-of-way (ROW), and impossible to see from the road. It is falling apart and the school staff and Parent Teacher Association would like to replace it. My understanding is that last year they were told by the City that they've already maxed out their sign allotment and so if they took that one down they would not be permitted to replace it. That made no sense to me at all.

I asked City Planner Abboud about this situation and he said that as a matter of practicality, if it's not visible from the right-of-way to the public, it would not be considered a sign subject to regulation under the code. But he noted that he hadn't looked at that specific sign. I went to look at the code to see where that exemption might be explicitly stated, and I found the verbiage about the interior signs only. Nothing about signs not visible from the public ROW.

In this amendment, I am suggesting that we fully replace subsection HCC 21.60.100(c) to limit the City's regulation to signs clearly visible from the public ROW and intended to be viewed by the public. Below I have provided some examples from other Alaskan municipalities sign codes.

While I believe this is a fairly straightforward and simple amendment to code, I look forward to feedback from the Planning Commission. I would like to see the City limit resources to regulating what is in the interest of the public. Signs that cannot be seen by the public from the public right-of-way should be clearly exempt from regulation under Homer City Code.

Wasilla: 16.32.020 Scope.

This chapter shall not regulate: building design; official traffic or government signs; the copy and message of signs; **signs not intended to be viewed from a public right-of-way**; window displays, product dispensers, and point of purchase displays; scoreboards on athletic fields; flags of any nation, government, or noncommercial organization, unless part of a sign; gravestones; barber poles; religious symbols; commemorative plaques; the display of street numbers; or any display or construction not defined in this chapter as a sign. (Ord. 17-09 § 3, 2017; prior code § 16.43.902)

Seward: 15.20.015 - Definitions.

Sign. Any device fixed to, painted on, or incorporated into the building surface; displayed from or within a building or structure; or free-standing upon the site, and **which is (a) visible from a public right-of-way and** (b) designed to convey or direct a message to the public concerning the identification of the premises or to advertise or promote the interests of any private or public firm, person or organization.

Soldotna:

15.08.010 - Administration. C. Scope .1.

General. The scope of this chapter shall be to regulate signs of a commercial nature intended to be viewed from public rights-of-way. This code does not regulate government signs; the copy and message of signs; window signs; product dispensers and point of purchase displays; scoreboards on athletic fields; flags of any nation, government, or non-commercial organization; gravestones; commemorative plaques; display of addresses; or any display or construction not defined herein as a sign.
