11	WHEREAS, The Alaska Legislature regularly proposes various exemptions on municipal
12	property and sales taxes and evaluates proposals for statewide sales taxes to generate new
13	state revenues; and
14 15	WHEREAS Article 10 of Alaska's constitution states that "The number of this article is
16	WHEREAS, Article 10 of Alaska's constitution states that "The purpose of this article is to provide for maximum local self-government with a minimum of local government units, and
17	to prevent duplication of tax-levying jurisdictions. A liberal construction shall be given to the
18	powers of local government units."; and
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20	WHEREAS, The City of Homer relies predominantly on sales and property taxes to fund
21	general services to our residents and visitors; and
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23	WHEREAS, Sales taxes represent 57% of Homer's general fund; and
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25	WHEREAS, Real property taxes represent 23% of Homer's general fund, based on a mil
26	rate of 4.5 mils; and
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28	WHEREAS, An example of a tax exemption that the Alaska Legislature has imposed on
29	municipalities is the \$150,000 senior property tax exemption for primary residences, an
30	exemption that in the past was reimbursed by the State but is now an unfunded mandate; and
31 32	WHEREAS For the City of Homen the series are set to be series and the series of the se
33	WHEREAS, For the City of Homer, the senior property tax exemption represents a 10%
34	reduction in our annual budget, or the portion of revenues that are transferred to other property taxpayers; and

36	WHEREAS, Homer's sales tax rate is 4.85%, divided among the following specified

45	WHEREAS, A statewide sales tax may cause the City of Homer to reduce its sales tax.
46	may force the City to reduce its sales tax with no guarantee of reduced expenses
47	through increased state services that benefit our local citizens.
48	
49	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of Homer, Alaska, provides the
50	following comments to the Alaska State Legislature regarding mandating real property and
51	sales tax exemptions and the imposition of a statewide sales tax:
52	• We ask that the Legislature Honor Title 10 of Alaska's constitution and allow for the
53	maintenance of local government control.
54	• The Legislature and local governments should work as a partnership, and we believe
55	the Legislature should consult with the Alaska Municipal League and municipalities
56	regarding any bills that propose property or sales tax exemptions to understand how
57	those exemptions would impact the ability of municipalities to provide critical public
58	services to residents and visitors, including, but not limited to, providing police and fire
59	services, maintaining local public infrastructure, managing zoning codes, conducting
60	local elections, and responding to public needs.
61	• We ask that the Legislature recognize that implementing a statewide sales tax would
62	likely force the City of Homer to reduce its sales tax, which would hinder our ability to
63	provide the public services listed above; expand water and sewer infrastructure;
64	maintain, improve, and expand roads, sidewalks, and trails; and pay down bond debt.
65	<ul> <li>Property tax exemptions on specified classes of property owners shift the burden of</li> </ul>
66	funding municipal services on other classes of property owners in ways that may not be
67	fair or equitable.
68	• The cumulative impacts of multiple Legislatively imposed property tax exemptions and
69	implementation of a statewide sales tax is detrimental to the ability of local
70	governments to provide critical public services.

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13	WHEREAS, For decades the Public Libraries Assistance (PLA) grants have supported
14	libraries across Alaska with \$6,000 to \$7,000 in annual funding, and the Homer Public Library
15	has received many such grants; and
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17	WHEREAS, The Statewide Library Electronic Doorway (SLED) has provided Alaskans
18	with access to online resources that would otherwise be unaffordable for their local libraries,
19	including 60 of the 68 subscription databases currently offered to patrons of the Homer Public
20	Library; and
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22	WHEREAS, The budget for the Division of Libraries, Archives and Museums reduced all
23	PLA grants to \$1,829 before reversing those cuts, while SLED funding has been reduced from
24	\$500,000 to \$369,514; and
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26	WHEREAS, Cuts to the PLA grants would force the Homer Public Library to reduce its
27	purchases of new materials, particularly picture books, foreign languages and medical texts;
28	and
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30	WHEREAS, The Seldovia Library would have to decrease materials purchases and
31	service hours; and
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33	WHEREAS, The Ninilchik Community Library would be forced to close over winter; and
34 35	WHEREAS, The reduced PLA grant would only support Anchor Point Public Library's
36	operations for one month; and
37	operations for one month, and
38	WHEREAS, Loss of SLED funding means all public libraries in the state will have to
39	eliminate significant online resources.

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15	WHEREAS, The Homer Spit is a 4.5-mile-long glacial sand and gravel spit extending into
16	Kachemak Bay and the Spit road is a State highway that serves as a critical infrastructure
17	corridor supporting Homer Port and Harbor, a multimodal transportation hub, and essential
18	recreational, commercial, industrial, and residential activities, as well as valuable State of
19	Alaska and Federal assets; and
20	
21	WHEREAS, The Homer Spit is experiencing accelerated erosion due to changing storm
22	patterns that have disrupted historical sediment movement patterns along the spit, resulting
23	in severe coastal degradation; and
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25	WHEREAS, Previous mitigation efforts, including the United States Army Corps of
26	Engineers' 1992 installation of 1,000 feet of rock revetment and 1998 extension of 3,700 feet,
27	proved insufficient without the recommended beach renourishment, leading to beach
28	lowering and increased erosion south of the protected area; and
29	
30	WHEREAS, Despite emergency revetment projects by the Alaska Department of
31	Transportation and Public Facilities, unchecked erosion continues to actively undermine the
32 33	State-owned Sterling Highway, the sole transportation lifeline connecting the Homer Spit to the Kenai Peninsula mainland and a tsunami evacuation route; and
33 34	the Renal Pennsula maintand and a tsunami evacuation route, and
35	WHEREAS, The City has been monitoring and reporting the intensified erosional
36	damage on the Homer Spit to the State of Alaska through the Alaska Department of
37	Transportation and Public Facilities (ADOT&PF) and the federal government through the
38	United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), the two parties responsible for the funding,
39	approval and implementation of State road maintenance, erosion mitigation measures and a
40	long-term maintenance plan to stabilize erosion conditions on the Homer Spit; and

WHEREAS, An October 16, 2024 storm with southwest winds of approximately 25 miles per hour and a 22-foot tide caused significant damage to the road bed in the unprotected section of the road, brought erosion to within two feet of the edge of the pavement and created an immediate public safety concern; and

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WHEREAS, Any additional moderate wind and high tide events now threaten to
 compromise the outbound lane of the Spit Road, risking partial or complete closure of this vital
 transportation corridor; and

51 WHEREAS, Multiple technical studies, including the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' 2017 52 Dredged Material Management Guidance Manual, their 1989 *Storm Damage Reduction Final* 53 *Interim Feasibility Report with Engineering Design and Environmental Assessment* report, and 54 HDR, Inc.'s 2019 Coastal Erosion Assessment, have provided detailed erosion management 55 strategies, with the HDR report recommending a traditional revetment coupled with a beach 56 renourishment program and sediment management plan for long term viability of the Spit and 57 maintenance of the Spit Road.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, The City of Homer urgently calls upon the ADOT&PF
 and the USACE to:

- 1. Immediately implement emergency erosion mitigation measures to protect the threatened Homer Spit Road from imminent failure; and
- 2. Simultaneously develop and execute a comprehensive, long-term erosion mitigation and stabilization strategy that includes both hardened protection strategies (including perched bench, groin field, offshore breakwater) and sediment management for improving resilience of existing roadway embankment.

69 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, The City of Homer implores the Alaska State Legislature to 70 prioritize this critical infrastructure project by:

- Allocating necessary state funding to protect this vital transportation and economic corridor; and
   Advocating for and supporting a long-term Homer Spit erosion mitigation and stabilization project in partnership with the USACE; and
   BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, The City of Homer calls upon Alaska's federal delegation to:
  - Champion the Homer Spit protection project at the federal level; and
     Secure federal funding required for both immediate emergency measures and long-term stabilization efforts through the USACE.

12	WHEREAS, Senate Bill 291 established the Municipal Harbor Facility Grant Program on
13	July 1, 2006, in which the total amount of grant money made available to a municipality was
14	limited to not exceed \$5,000,000 in a fiscal year; and
15	
16	WHEREAS, The Municipal Harbor Facility Grant is the single most significant funding
17	tool available to Alaskan Harbormasters to plan, maintain and recapitalize port and harbor
18	infrastructure; and
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20	WHEREAS, Testimony from a legislator advocate stated "SB291 would establish the
21	municipal harbor facility grant fund to which the Legislature would make an annual
22	appropriation from the watercraft fuel tax account and from the state portion of the fisheries
23	business tax. Both sources come from the marine industry, so harbor users would generate the
24	<i>revenue for the program"</i> ; and
25	
26	WHEREAS, Senate Bill 291 was envisioned to cap the funds that can be used per
27	community per year at \$5 million so that a large community could not take all the available
28	funds in any given year; and
29	WUIEDEAC. The superstation is that communities would establish maintain and sup an
30	WHEREAS, The expectation is that communities would establish, maintain, and run an
31 32	enterprise fund into perpetuity; and
32	WHEREAS, The State of Alaska over the past nearly 30 years has transferred ownership

43 WHEREAS, The United States Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index calculator indicates that \$5 million in July 2006 when Senate Bill 291 was enacted would be 44 inflated to \$7,511,000 as of July 2023. 45

WHEREAS, The City of Homer urges the Governor and Alaska Legislature to Amend 47 48 Alaska Statutes 29.60.800 raising the maximum Harbor Facility Grant Fund Award to \$7,500,000 per eligible project. 49

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of Homer, Alaska supports 51 raising the maximum available Municipal Harbor Facility Grant to \$7,500,000 for eligible 52 projects on an annual basis. 53
