10	FROM THE GENERAL FUND BALANCE FOR COMPLETION		
11	OF THE NICK DUDIAK FISHING LAGOON DREDGING

14	WHEREAS, The Homer City Council adopted Ordinance 12-43 and Ordinance 12-44		
15	(A)(S) which together appropriated \$376,500 for the Fishing Lagoon Dredging Project; and		
16			
17	WHEREAS, The approved project budget/appropriation was based upon the removal of		
18	25,000 cubic yards of material and it is now apparent that 32,500 cubic yards of material will		
19	need to be removed if the Lagoon is to be dredged to its original design depth; and		
20			
21	WHEREAS, The City of Homer received a supplemental \$100,000 in revenue sharing		
22	this year and it would be appropriate to allocate this money toward the repair of the fishing		
23	lagoon.		
24			
25	WHEREAS, Dredging an additional 7,500 cubic yards will cost \$101,500; and		
26			
27	WHEREAS, An emergency exists and an emergency ordinance is justified because:		
28			
29	• The contractor is already on site and mobilized. To remobilize would cost approximately		
30	\$20,000 and it cannot be assumed that the contractor would be available later or would		
31.	complete the job for the same unit price.		
32	• The Council, under its present schedule, could not adopt an appropriation ordinance until		
33	December 10, far longer than the equipment can be retained on site. The contractor would		
34	likely need to be compensated for sitting idle.		
35	 A new RFP for dredging the remaining material would be costly and time consuming, 		
36	and could increase the total expenditure and jeopardize the targeted completion date.		
37	 Stopping now and/or completing the job using another method of dredging would drive 		
38	the cost higher, cause the City to miss the environmental window for dredging, and		
39	potentially require new permits.

Stopping now or delaying would likely result in the City Council not being able to 40 achieve its goals including restoring the Lagoon to its original design depth, insuring 41 optimal conditions for fish survival, and completing the project before ADF&G stocks 42 the Lagoon in the spring. 43 44 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City of Homer: 45 46 Section 1: The City Council hereby amends the FY 2012 Capital Budget by appropriating 47 an additional \$101,250 from the General Fund Balance for completing the Nick Dudiak Fishing 48 Lagoon Dredging Project as follows: 49 50 Expenditure: 51 From Account: 52 Amount Description 53 Account No. \$101,500 Fishing Hole Dredging 54 100-100 55 To Account: 56 <u>Amount</u> Description Account No. 57 Nick Dudiak Fishing \$101,500 151-779 58 Lagoon Dredging 59 60 Section 2. The Council finds that an emergency exists and that an emergency ordinance 61 is justified for the reasons stated in the Whereas clauses. 62 63 Section 3. This ordinance is a budget amendment ordinance only, is not of a permanent 64 nature, and shall not be codified. 65 66 Section 4. The material generated by this project can be sold for use off the Spit. 67 68 Section 5.
