A. Discussion of October 24th Presentation and Proposal from PND Re: Float Replacement

Commissioner Hartley noted a question that came up was regarding R and S float and expanding the bunks so they are big enough for the modern design of boats. Doing that will result in losing some spaces, he recalled it being 8 spaces. Harbormaster Hawkins commented that it doesn't surprise him that would happen. He noted a question about width of finger floats. His opinion is that three foot finger floats would be adequate for a 24 foot stall. He will have to sit down with PND to dial in for the stall width when the 65% report is available. They discussed that there isn't a lot of carry over regarding the 24 foot stalls, as many people will trailer their boats at the end of the season rather than keeping the stall. Improvements to the R and S floats will not have a big impact by having to move vessels. Harbormaster Hawkins reviewed the current layout of some of the systems and noted that when he sees the 65% design, he will know better what impact the adjustments to R and S floats might have.

Harbormaster Hawkins noted that the timeline is incorrect in respect to the funding. Currently there is only funding for design work. The construction funding would come from the municipal harbor's grant program, and that information won't come out until June or July. There was discussion of the status of the bonding project. Harbormaster Hawkins explained that the city won't apply for bonds until there is confirmation of the grant funds. There was general discussion about challenges with marine transportation in relation to Anchorage being a hub and other harbors like Seward and Homer being sub-hubs.

B. Approval of the 2013 Port and Harbor Meeting Schedule as outlined in the Draft Resolution

There was brief discussion of the meeting schedule in relation to the November meeting. It was noted that the date can be amended if they find that it conflicts with the marine trade expo, as it did this year.

- The Port and Harbor's participation in the Pacific Marine Expo in Seattle is the cumulating of several months' coordination with the Homer Marine Trades Association. Many hands make for a lighter load and that is certainly true for our joint venture with the associations' members involved in marketing their businesses and our Port and Harbor. The participation didn't end at the planning level in town either. Many businesses sent representatives to the Expo and took turns in the booth helping with questions about Homer, passing out information, and connecting with customers. Homer was well represented at the Expo and for the second year in a row our banner was a hit. In years past, Homer Harbor had a booth in the Expo like many of our sister harbors around the State, but it's been since the late 90's since our participation. It has been a long term goal of the harbor to step up promotions; and this joint venture focuses on some of our strongest attractions for bringing new vessels to Homer. A first class harbor and an excellent support industry, we've got it covered from supply to installation to new construction to transportation. As for the Port, our role at Expo is much the same as our role on the end of the Spit: we facilitate commerce as an enterprise (since that's how an enterprise is designed) and the community benefits from the success of the businesses providing services to our fleet.
- The Unimak Trader has arrived: this is the barge you most likely have read about in the papers last month that went aground just west of Cold Bay. After a herculean effort, the cargo was lightered from the deck and the barge refloated/towed to Homer where it's now moored (or rather allowed to sink in place) on the beach east of Pier One Theatre. Since the barge was severely damaged during the whole saga, owners Northland Tug and Barge sold it to Peninsula Scrap and Salvage. At this time, Peninsula Scrap is working on a plan to either repair the barge and return it to service, or break it down for scrap salvage. The barge has always served as a deck cargo barge and never carried fluids below deck; it's certified clean. We have a very good business relationship with Peninsula Scrap, having worked with them to complete many of our sensitive salvage projects. I am confident that they will keep this project moving ahead one way or the other in their normal expeditious manner.

The evaluation of the Harbor Office being conducted by Klauder and Company Architects Inc. was not
completed by packet time for the Port Commission meeting. We will have a full report of their findings in
the next packet for the January meeting. K&C Architects were re-tasked by City Council to complete a study
on the HERC building, causing the delay in delivery for this project.

2. Operations

Mid December's combination of warm temperatures, large tides, and strong west winds helped to alleviate ice congestion in the Small Boat Harbor. There are approximately 325 boats moored in the harbor with 70 participating in the Winter Metered Power program.

Activity at the Deep Water and Pioneer Dock remain strong. Notable activity on the Deep Water Dock included a scrap iron load-out involving the tugs Ocean Ranger and Redoubt, Barge SSB-V, and North Star Stevedoring. The load-out occurred simultaneously on the inside berth without incident while accommodating Buccaneer's Rig Endeavour on the outer face. The M/V Discovery began weekly supply landings (every Friday) at the Deep Water Dock inside berth on November 16th; and bi-monthly crew changes (every Thursday) on December 13th. These landings are scheduled regularly through April 15th. The CISPRI Endeavor continues to use both docks for provisioning and crew changes.

- Harbor Officers installed a VHF radio at the Deep Water Dock longshoreman's shed for the purpose of facilitating communication between ships and dock crews.
- Operation, Ice Plant, and Port Maintenance Staff are preparing for snow removal in the vicinity of Fish Dock Road. Snow removal and lot access lanes have been designated.
- Footage recorded on a Deep Water Dock video surveillance camera was used to identify a vessel responsible for damaging a support pile on the inside berth.
- Harbor Officers have been busy removing debris deposited in the harbor from the prevailing northeast winds.

3. <u>Ice Plant</u>

The Ice Plant Staff finished making repairs on the bait room. They've now moved into the ice rake delivery room and compressor room where they'll be doing winter maintenance.

4. Port Maintenance

For November, above and beyond their normal routine, Port Maintenance dealt with damage to the Deep Water Dock by pulling out the north face fender and securing the pin piles. The pin piles and south face fender will be removed this month. They worked with PND Engineers on the proposed harbor float and electrical upgrades, brought a new sweeper unit into service, and re-secured the Pioneer Dock dolphin fender.

PORT & HARBOR RATES STUDY

At the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission's last regular meeting dated November 14, 2012, it was requested that the Commission have some discussion at the next meeting on possibilities of charging scenarios for boats, and consider options such as linear footage, square footage, draft, or other categories; and decide if they want to recommend a study be done.

During the November 26, 2012 regular meeting, Homer City Council discussed budget Ordinance 12-47, Resolution 12-088, and Resolution 12-089. Council moved to propose a budget amendment for the Port and Harbor Enterprise fund in the amount of \$20,000 for the purpose of a fee and tariff study.

With the approval from City Council, Port and Harbor Staff will proceed forward with writing a Request for Proposals. Staff is requesting the assistance of the Port and Harbor Commission to create a project scope and setting some of the goals for this study. Some possible points include:

- Current harbor moorage rates are set at an annual \$37.86/foot for overall length. What other options would the commission like this study to include?
- Square ft rate, simple length X beam or should there be some consideration made for the bow?
- Pros vs. cons using the square foot method: The Kodiak Harbor had a rate study done a few years ago. The square foot rate was proposed but in the end they went with the graduated schedule they now have as a compromise. The argument is that the larger vessels have a bigger impact on the facility and require stronger docks that cost more to build than the smaller boats so then they should have to pay more for that use. The other side of the argument is that the bigger workboat brings in more revenue than the smaller vessels and the communities benefits from the spin-off economics. We don't want to drive these larger vessels away with a rate structure that is set higher than our competition.
- Port landing rate study: Do we want the docks to be in the rate study as well? In July we adopted the new
 rates for the docks mirroring Anchorages rates. The new rates are a graduated schedule that does help
 account for the range of vessels using these facilities. In short, the larger the vessel, the more they pay per
 liner foot.
- In studying other rate surveys I know that one suggestion that will be offered from a study is a rate based on the tonnage of the vessel.

I believe a study of rate structure options can be beneficial in our future expansion plans for the Deep Water Dock; and that it is a reasonable and proactive approach to managing these facilities in the future.

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

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Seattle event gives good exposure to Homer's harbor, marine trades

For the second year in a row, thousands of people visiting the three-day Pacific Marine Expo in Seattle got to hear about Homer, thanks to a collaborative effort between the city of Homer and the Homer Marine Trades Association.

"It went really well, said Bryan Hawkins, Homer's harbormaster. "Homer did the expo years ago, but hadn't done it since I was here, and I've been here since 2000. It's something I've been wanting to do, take the show on the road."

Mike Stockburger, owner of the Homer Boat Yard and a founding member of Homer Marine Trades Association, agreed.

Homer Harbormaster Bryan Hawkins and Mike Stockberger of the Homer Boat Yard represented Homer harbor and marine trades at the Pacific Marine Expo in Seattle on Nov. 27-29.

"It seemed like everybody that was there was interested in finding out information and talking to us rather than just passing through," said Stockburger, comparing this year's expo to last year's. "There were a lot more people there for a specific reason rather than for something to do on a Saturday. There was a noticeable difference."

This year the Homer group also joined the "Alaska Trail" sponsored by Alaska Airlines. Visitors to the expo are given a card to be punched by expo vendors, the card then is put in a drawing and the winner receives free airline tickets.

"Some of the flow we had were those people just looking to win the lottery, but that did get us on a list so people were circulating around and finding us," said Stockburger.

The event draws visitors from Alaska to California that are "looking for everything they need, from bow to stern, for the most important component of their business, the boat," according to information provided by the expo.

The buyers represent commercial, passenger, charter vessel owners and operators, shipyards and boatbuilders, commercial fishermen, seafood processors, engineers and architects, pleasure-boat owners and operators, equipment manufacturers and distributors, representatives from other ports, marine surveys and marina operators, military officials and anyone else related to the marine industry. According to expo statistics:

- * Eight of every 10 people attending the Pacific Marine Expo find new products that fit their business;
- * 70 percent of the visitors purchase for their business as a result of the expo;
- * 78 percent think finding new products at the expo is the most important reason to attend;
- * 86 percent found new products;
- * 85 percent are involved or influence purchasing decisions.

"It's a great venue for advertising our ports and harbors in Alaska," said Hawkins. "We need to be going down there and flying the flag."

The backdrop for the Homer booth was an attention-getting photo of the Spit taken by Scott Dickerson and reflecting a working harbor.

"That was a big hit. It seemed like everyone that had ever been to Homer had to swing by and take a look and see if their boat or their uncle's boat was in the picture," said Stockburger.

Hawkins also had conceptual drawings for the east harbor and Deep Water Dock expansion projects. The harbor expansion was designed to make room for larger vessels and open the area they currently occupy for smaller vessels. Hawkins said the Deep Water Dock expansion would make it twice as wide, twice as long and twice as strong. It would make it possible for the dock to accommodate more than one ship at a time, handle containerized freight and roll freight on and off ships.

"Having those was great because people could stop and talk about it and get a visual," said Hawkins.

An ongoing PowerPoint presentation and the brochures, rack cards and business cards of Homer Marine Trades members provided other information about Homer. Having association representatives at the booth also added to the information available.

"Many of the business owners in association come to the expo and spend the whole time there," said Hawkins. "They're all scheduled to spend time in the booth, so there's business connections being made while we're standing on the floor. There were easily a dozen men and women who came and spent hours of time in the booth, answering questions and giving ideas."

Among the guests visiting the Homer booth was former legislator and Halibut Cove resident Clem Tillion.

"He was heading to Juneau and asked what message we wanted to send to Juneau, so Bryan showed him the extension project," said Stockburger. "Apparently we're at the top of the list for some of the capital improvements we've proposed and being number one is great, but you've got to be funded. Clem said he'd talk to the appropriate people about that."

Homer Marine Trades officially formed Nov. 1, 2011, as a 501(c)6 business organization. Its mission is to promote Homer's marine trades and work to bring more boats and businesses to Homer and the membership businesses, said Kate Mitchell, also a founding member. There are currently 60 business members.

The organization's first year was focused on advertising, raising awareness of the services available in Homer and extending an invitation to "choose Homer for your boatwork" via state and national publications.

At the association's annual meeting, members were asked what was needed to make their businesses grow. The leading answers were finding skilled people and providing a haul-out for larger vessels.

"We have formed a committee to look into training programs that we might be able to help Homer supply those (skilled) workers," said Mitchell. Of a haul-out for larger vessels, she said, "We have been so lucky to have private business Northern Enterprise and Homer Boat Yard able to haul the fleet up to 75 tons and have a place for work and workers. Homer is ready to provide service to our local fleet and others, the big boats that currently have to go elsewhere to be hauled."

That's a project that will take some work, but isn't impossible, according to Hawkins.

"We have to sit down and put our heads together and make a concentrated effort toward achieving that, but it certainly is achievable," said Hawkins.

After the Council approves the consent agenda, there is a spot for visitors, and then agenda item number seven, announcements, reports from Commissions, the Borough, etc. That is when you would jump up and speak. If the mayor moves on to public hearings, you have waited too long! Typically if there is no visitor or special presentation, you would be talking within the first half hour (or less) of the Council meeting. The Regular meeting start time is 6:00 p.m.

Each commissioner is assigned a month and is responsible for attending one of the two council meetings, *OR finding another commissioner to do it in their place* if they will not be attending the meeting.
